Building Permits Continue Rise

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca announced that the total value for building permits issued by the Town's Building Division for January and February amounted to \$20,335,882, marking an increase of \$10,924,367 over the same period in 1983.

Councilman Mosca indicated that the permits issued for four industrial buildings in the amount of \$6,685,651, and the two permits for commercial buildings at \$6,435,210, accounted for a major portion of the increase.

"Once again, construction of one-family homes played a major part in building permit values during January and February," Mosca stated. "Twenty five permits were issued for the construction of new homes, valuing \$1,652,472 and a total of 172 permits amounting to \$1,218,686 were issued for housing additions.

Florist Robbed In Plainview

The Second Squad is investigating a Robbery that occurred at Plainview Florist and Gifts, 1038 Old Country Road, Plainview, at 5:10 p.m., April 5.

Two male whites entered the business and announced a robbery to the cashier. One of the subjects was armed with a large knife. They were given \$350 and fled the store, leaving the cashier unharmed.

The subjects are described as two male whites, both 28-30 years, 5'7" one armed with a knife.

At the conclusion of the show the winners of our annual jelly bean bowl contest will be announced.

Okay Car Storage Depot For Mid Island Plaza

The Oyster Bay Town Board has approved a special use permit application to store new cars in a "G" Business District in Hicksville, subject to 14 restrictive covenants.

Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca said that, "the special use permit was granted to Mid-Island Shopping Plaza and Old Country Toyota Corp. in order to store new cars on a parcel of land located on the north side of James Street, 1,155 feet west of the intersection of Newbridge Road. The cars will be held at this parcel until they are delivered to the Old Country Toyota Corp., which is located at 340 Old Country Road in Hicksville.

In response to concerns expressed by residents, the Board has imposed fourteen restrictions which include that the delivery of vehicles is prohibited after 9 p.m., and must be made only at the northwest corner of the parcel, away from the residential area. Also, that the storage of cars off the premises in the Mid-Island Shopping area or on residential streets is prohibited, and that no preparation or repairs or inspection of the cars be made at this location.

The Town Board also required that a six foot high stockade fence be installed and properly maintained along the residential properties on the western and eastern border of the parcel and that a screen planting of six foot high evergreens be placed six feet apart along that portion abutting James Street.

Mosca said that the applicants are required to submit a detailed site plan for Town Board approval before any building permits or a certificate of occupancy can be issued.

Henry Brengel Sr., Hicksville Leader

Henry Brengel, Sr., 87, died April 5 at Nassau Hospital following surgery. Mr. Brengel was well known in the Hicksville area. He was the retired president of Empire Moving and Storage Co. and had served on the Hicksville School Board for 23 years.

Among the schools he built or planned as president of the Board are the Lee Avenue School, Fork Lane, Dutch Lane, Burns Avenue and Old Country Road elementary schools. The senior high school was in its planning stages when he left.

Mr. Brengel was a resident of Hicksville for about 80 years and had been active in community affairs. He was a past president of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club and past Commander of the Charles Wagner Post American Legion where, last week, he received a service award for "65 Years Continuous Membership in the American Legion". He had served in the Coast Guard during World War I. Brengel was also active in the Long Island Moving and Storage Association. He took the business over from his father and passed it on to his son Henry, Jr.

Mr. Brengel was a former councilman of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church where he was a member for 64 years. He is survived by his wife Anna, two sons Henry Jr. of Jericho and Frederick of Fox Pt., Wisconsin, a sister, Louise Knox of Alexandria, Pa., three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Services were held at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church Friday with interment at Plain Lawn Cemetery. Vernon Wagner Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Our Children

'The last button on the coat'

Let's look at the youngest child in the family, the one sometimes "super-cherished," sometimes even disregarded or neglected. Do you have one treated like the child in this family?

Q. Our "baby" is now almost 10 years old, and yet my husband treats her like a baby. He expects a lot more of her older sisters. The youngest one is obviously his favorite, but I don't think he's doing her any favor by indulging her with special gifts. He even uses "baby talk" with her.

Isn't that ridiculous? I think so. How about you?

A. The youngest child in the family needs something every special — like (1) being treated as the other children are, and (2) receiving recognition in line with his or her own needs.

That's so easy to say, and sometimes very difficult to do. Some recent parental comments have been stated in this way.

"I'm more calm with her. Take her in stride better than I did with the others."

"I worry more. Guess it's because I'm aware of the sicknesses and accidents that can happen to him."

"... The child of my older age. So cherished and loved."

Although every family and every child are different, there are a lot of truisms that apply to the youngest child (or "the last button on the coat," as one wise man said).

He or she may be spoiled, favored, pampered and protected. Or your youngest child may even be a bit ignored because you might be less watchful than you were with your firstborn, or you have less time because you are now more involved in a job or career, with friends or in community activities. He or she might be (or seem) smarter than the older ones because you may talk more to the youngest one, maybe even listen more.

The parents who are sensitive to the possible benefits of having a young child still at home recognize how great a pleasure it can be. The link with youth, the beauty of seeing through a child's eyes, the occasions available to share a youngster's dreams — it's the last time and an opportunity not to be missed or taken lightly. In Rachel Carson's little book, "The Sense of Wonder," she indicated the chance we have to cling to a child's world as he sees it, and the importance of letting him share it with us. (Just as frequently, this child is, of course, a "she.")

The youngest child in the family

still has a hand and mind on things seen and felt for the first time, and it may be our final chance to share a young child's excitement.

But taking part in such wonderment doesn't come easily. It may require a few momentary postponements, like temporarily putting off the evening paper, a relaxing social drink or a phone call, all of them important but perhaps none as enjoyable as what this youngest child has to say if we just give a little time and attention.

Although a young child usually brings a lot of enjoyment into the family, there might be problems too. The youngest may find it comfortable to be "the baby," and to hold onto that special place, and may even be reluctant about growing up and sharing some responsibilities of yard, garbage, dishes, pet care and money that older siblings bear. He may even bring dissension because of the resentment of those who came first.

The youngest one's achievements may not be recognized because although it is the first time for him, you have already gone through Scouts, school, hobbies and all the rest, maybe even more than once. He may have to work very hard to get the attention that older ones obtained so easily.

The youngest child sometimes resembles an only one, especially if there is quite an age difference between him and older brothers and sisters. One problem you may then face could be that of trying to avoid too much dependence on you or his too frequent involvement with adults. The competition may not be with the siblings but with the parent of the same sex for the affection of the other one.

The most healthful attitude of all toward the youngest can be stated quite simply. It is based on answers to questions like these:

What abilities and needs does he or she have?

How can I best improve and satisfy them?

What special personality factors require nurturing or correcting?

What can I do about all of that — and can I afford not to face these questions?

It has probably occurred to you that such questions and answers fit into the picture for all children, and that's right. The needs of the youngest one are really no different than they are for others in the family. But because he or she presents our last chance to help a child grow healthfully, we may have to push ourselves a bit toward meeting them, especially during the important early years.

Your Social Security



Q. I've been living with a man for over a year. He is receiving Social Security and SSI because he's disabled. We can't marry because I didn't get a divorce from my husband.

Is there any way my four children can get benefits from this arrangement? — M.J.

A. No!
You would have to be legally married for one year before you and your children can qualify for Social Security benefits on this disabled worker's account.

There are no dependent benefits payable under the SSI program.

Q. I have been going with a single man who receives \$359 in Social Security. I, myself, receive \$300 (\$119 from my own account and \$181 from that of my deceased husband).

I would like to know whether together our income would total the same if we were to get married. — A.B.B.

A. You will continue to receive the same amounts after marriage.

Q. I am 64 and was divorced after 25 years of marriage in 1966.

My former husband is eligible to receive Social Security but won't file for benefits because he doesn't believe in the system.

Is there any way I can get part of his Social Security? — N.S.

A. Not until January 1985, when divorced spouses age 62 or older will be eligible to receive benefits regardless of whether the former spouse has retired or is receiving benefits, provided the divorce has been in effect at least two years.

Q. I retired at 62 and took a 20 percent cut in my benefits. I am now 70 and would like to know if I can get this cut restored.

I am still working part time. — Anonymous

A. When a person elects to receive benefits prior to age 65 the monthly payments are reduced because the benefits will be paid for a longer period and the person is ahead, insofar as total cash benefits paid, up to about age 77. Therefore, there is no automatic increase at age 65 or 70.

You may, however, be entitled to an increase based on the wages earned after age 62. Check with your Social Security office about this.



Toxic Cleanup Session Apr. 19

Federal and state environmental officials will appear at a Toxic Cleanup Accountability Session on April 19 sponsored by Hicksville and other area members of a local community organization which has been active for cleanup of local hazardous sites.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will be represented by Walter Muggan, who is Chief of the EPA Region II Waste and Toxic Substance Branch; the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation will be represented by Harold Berger, who serves as DEC Region I Director on Long Island; and Congressman Norman F. Lent will be represented by his staff at the event, which is sponsored by local chapters of the New York Community Action Network (New York CAN).

The Toxic Cleanup Accountability Session will take place on Thursday, April 19 at 8 p.m. at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library, 999 Old Country Road, Plainview, located 1/4 mile east of the Seaford-Oyster Bay Expressway (Route #135).

Citizen panelists from Hicksville and other local areas will seek cleanup commitments from the officials present for such sites as the Hooker Hicksville site on New South Road, Anchor Lithkemko in Hicksville, and the Old Bethpage municipal landfill.

New York CAN members will also be seeking support for the federal Superfund reauthorization bill (HR-4813), which would create a non-expiring \$10.8 billion cleanup program with a mandatory cleanup timetable.

"After waiting for years to see cleanup action on local sites affecting our community's health and safety, we feel the expanded Superfund reauthorization program with the cleanup timetable would benefit our community," said New York CAN spokesperson William Steinmetz of Bethpage.

Group members have been urging local residents to write or call Congressman Lent to urge his support for HR-4813. The organization notes, however, that an alternate Superfund plan proposed by Mr. Lent includes two desirable elements: a technical assistance provision for citizen groups, and a provision preventing the transfer of liability of

a site to the government after site closure.

All community residents who are concerned about safe drinking water and community cleanup are invited to attend the Toxic Cleanup Accountability Session on April 19, according to New York CAN. Rides are available. For information, readers may contact New York CAN at 741-1400 or 798-4700.

Federal EPA Responds To F.D. Inquiry

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Emergency Response Chief Fred N. Rubel has responded to questions raised by the Hicksville F.D. regarding the M.E.K. chemical spill on West John Street, Mr. Rubel, in a letter to Hicksville Chief of Department Owen Magee stated that the E.P.A. and a chemist inspected the site along with the clean-up project manager and they determined that the rusting 55 gallon drums are filled with sand and are of no danger to people or the environment.

They also noted, Chief Magee reported, that originally there were 59 drums at the site and that now there are 61. It is not known where the two extra drums came from. Rubel stated in his letter that over \$100,000 has already been spent on the project and that work at the site will begin in June of this year. To remove the M.E.K. (Methyl Ethyl Ketone) chemical solvent from the ground, he also stated M.E.K. is not routinely removed effectively from the ground water, and a new technique had to be developed and tested to meet State Health Dept. guidelines. When the equipment is installed at the site it will be the first of its kind.

Removal of the drums will be one of the first actions on the scene when work starts, but at this time they do not represent an unusual hazard.

Mr. Rubel's letter was in answer to the Fire Department Hazardous Materials team request to check the site, and numerous other requests from elected officials and private citizens.





Tay Sachs Carrier Screening

As a community service the Mid-Island YM-YWHA, 45 Manetto Hill Road, Plainview, is sponsoring a carrier screening for Tay-Sachs Disease on Sunday, April 29, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tay-Sachs is an inherited disease of the nervous system caused by an enzyme deficiency. The greatest risk group includes the Ashkenazy Jews from Eastern Europe. This means that one out of every 25 American Jews is a carrier.

Blood for the carrier screening will be drawn by a medical technician at the "Y" and delivered to a qualified laboratory for analysis and testing. Carriers do not have Tay-Sachs. They are capable of passing the TSD gene to their children if their mate is also a carrier.

The Nassau County Chapter of National Tay-Sachs and Allied Diseases Association is co-sponsoring the screenings. While there is no treatment for this affliction, precautionary blood tests and pre-natal diagnosis by amniocentesis can prevent tragic births.

Screenings are open to the public. In addition to the blood testing procedure, a genetic counselor will be available to answer questions, and NTSAD will provide a wide assortment of literature. A voluntary donation of \$7.50 is requested.

Input Callers Not Happy Over IRS Tax Forms

Most callers to Input believe that the present mass of rules and regulations of the Internal Revenue Service cannot be fully enforced in answer to this question: "Is it possible for IRS to fully enforce the present income tax system." Here are some of the answers:

COMPLICATED RULES

No. The tax rules are so complicated now that most people cannot fill in their own forms and many do not know if the experts are doing right with them. The rules are made more difficult and the IRS cannot keep tabs on everything. There is a need for a better system. J.G.

NEW SYSTEM

Income tax is a poor way to collect any revenue. You have to spy on everyone to know who is paying enough and the IRS cannot do much in a country that is a democracy. The best thing would be to gradually phase out this form of taxation and get one that taxes people on the amount of goods they use and products they buy. After all the only need for money is to purchase things with it so now where people conceal their income they would be caught if they had to pay taxes when they used the money. H.R.

TWO REASONS

There are two things to be said about the income tax system. First the reason so many people probably are evading taxes is because they feel that the taxes take too much of what they earn and the second thing is that the system has been made intentionally difficult by our politicians to give the richer people who can afford special counselling a way to get away with more. Most people cannot understand the system and they have to get someone to make out the form. If they only pay a small amount for the service they get very little help in using the system to pay lower taxes so the system is unfair. Internal Revenue cannot do all they should because it is a small department often trying to enforce unpopular laws. H.E.

HONEST PEOPLE

IRS is only effective with the honest people. The really dishonest can get away with it every time and it is not little things like adding \$50 to a medical deduction. There has to be a better system by which everyone will pay equally or not at all. J.G.

EVERYONE INVOLVED

With taxes so high almost everyone has to resort to some form of evasion with income tax and the IRS would have to put every second person in jail to enforce all of the laws. This system whereby everyone is put to the test every year is bad because it lessens all respect for law. The Internal Revenue should have simple tax returns and enforce them fully. Presently there are so many rules and regulations that little can be done except to make an example of someone around tax time to scare as many people as possible into being more honest. But this is not really a great way to operate so far as I am concerned. F.W.

DEMOCRACY BREAKDOWN

The tax laws themselves are where our democracy breaks down. We have a great belief in the rights of citizens, even those who engage in robbery and murder. We go to great detail to see that they keep their rights. In our income tax system we have to prove to the government that we are not lying to them. Any criminal who was confronted with this type of justice would win but yet the majority of our citizens are not given this democratic respect when it comes to taxes. It is time to change the system to one that protects our democracy for the income tax payer as much as it does for the criminal. S.R.

CANNOT ENFORCE

The answer is unequivocally "No" - IRS could not fully enforce the present income tax system. Naturally, it could come close to it if every return was audited but even then, the regulations are so numerous and the taxpayers' individual conditions so varied, it would be impossible to make water-tight checks. And of course, the cost would be prohibitive. Nevertheless, the fact remains that the invisible economy i.e. undeclared cash transactions involving income and expense, is so vast that no bureaucracy could fully cope with it. And then, there is the area where well intentioned taxpayers seeking advice from IRS experts to solve complicated problems in advance of April 15, receive verbal clarification which seems clear at the time but doesn't quite fit later when 1040 is filled out resulting in questionable interpretations. A flat-tax system which I endorse, would eliminate many of the complexities of the present system and provide more accurate returns but, even here, the invisible economy would defy full enforcement. P.G.S.

DIFFICULT SYSTEM

I read recently that the IRS checks one in every 67 or 68 income tax forms. I also read somewhere that they check mostly incomes of \$50,000 and up. The smaller ones they don't have any help to check. Under the present system I don't think it's possible for them to fully endorse it and I don't think there's a system now or in the future that could really fully endorse it. Whenever they catch a cheater, the cheaters find a new way to cheat. So it's a very difficult situation for the government. H.S.

Babysitting Blues

A trustworthy babysitter is worth his/her weight in gold. If you have such a person be sure to guard her telephone number with your life. After all what is more precious than the well being of your child?

When we leave the children in the babysitter's care, we must either trust that person, or spend the whole time worrying about what might be taking place at home. In our mobile society more and more people are depending on the services of a paid teenager to watch the children, instead of Grandma or Grandpa. Family members are not often close by to help out during special occasions.

Have you ever babysat as a teen? Let's face it, babysitting is not the most desirable and popular job. Having a baby spit food in your face, or being locked in a bathroom by a seven year old is not as much fun as getting a tan sitting in a lifeguard's chair. Although the two jobs are both necessary and extremely important to human lives.

A friend was reminiscing yesterday about her days as a babysitter. She vacuumed, dusted, and even washed dishes for only fifty cents an hour in 1974. Today she exclaimed that she can't find a reliable sitter who will simply pay more attention to her toddler than she does to the Atari at three times the price!

My friend, Joan, and I exchanged stories of babysitting gone sour. She related one instance when the teenager fell asleep in the bedroom. Joan came home from a late evening while her husband ran to the grocery to buy some milk. Since Joan was locked out, she knocked on the door. To her surprise her small son gingerly opened the door, and he proceeded to go upstairs to awaken the sitter!

Another time a babysitter tickled Joan's son while he was eating popcorn, and he almost choked to death. His older sister intervened and may have very well saved his life. Joan wonders where responsibility has gone.

I have had my share of disasters in dealing with the babysitting blues. The most bizarre instance occurred when one babysitter (who came to me highly recommended) took my one year old to a football game in his pajamas without a jacket and without a car seat. My husband walked her home that evening, and she never mentioned the game. The next day my neighbor came over to ask if I knew that my child had not only been to the game, but was passed around the stands by the teens! Obviously I was in shock. That one night out turned out to be costly. I spent the next ten days nursing the child back to health.

Next I tried a girl who was a local honor student. One half hour before we were to leave, the doorbell rang. Two teens with a blaring stereo wanted to know when their friend would arrive. I told them in no uncertain terms that the sitter was not allowed guests. Where did responsibility go?

The next fiasco occurred when we had expensive tickets to a social function. The girl lived across the street, and we noticed that the house was dark just as we were about to leave. I called her home to no avail. Luckily our neighbor babysat for us until the girl finally showed up after an outing with her parents.

The latest episode occurred when my husband and I wanted to attend a church weekend function. We tried another new girl, who arrived on time but looked very pale. We asked her if she was feeling ill, but she said no and proceeded to play with our son on the floor. When we arrived home three hours later, her mother was sewing a hem in our family room. It seems that her daughter was ill with the flu and went home. What do you think happened? Bingo! My son caught the flu and those three short hours away from home turned into one week of playing nurse. Not to mention that we missed the rest of the weekend retreat.

A new friend says that they have not gone out since October. Since they have no family nearby, and there are no older women in the neighborhood this couple has given up on sitters. She had her own arsenal of horror stories. At least Trivial Pursuit is keeping them busy.

I recently found a girl that I can trust and who is very responsible. I have searched long and hard for her and would not give her telephone number, even if I was tortured by the enemy. My schedule often depends upon her, but the peace of mind is worth it. I was beginning to think that the babysitting blues were becoming a permanent malady.



The food should all be served at once or as nearly as possible. Otherwise no one is dining together and you might as well have all gone alone. That restaurant will have to get on the ball.

Q. I have noticed that tips are said to range from 15 to 20 percent of a bill in a restaurant. When you calculate this do you figure in the sales tax?
 R.K.

A. No you do not generally figure the sales tax in the tip but a great many people now are doubling the sales tax to quickly arrive at the amount of the tip. With the new increased fraction the tip will then closely approximate a 15 percent gratuity.

Cooking Corner

Filo dough, also known as fila, fillo and phylla and phyllo, is a paper-thin pastry dough. Very similar to strudel dough, it used to be handmade in storefront shops and was considered a delicacy due to the difficulty in creating the thin sheets of dough with water and flour.

Those tissue-thin sheets of filo/strudel dough can wrap meat, fish, cheese, vegetables, fruit and nuts. The versatile dough can be baked, fried, and used to make snacks or hors d'oeuvres, entrees, side dishes and desserts.

When brushed with butter, filled and baked, layers of filo puff up in flaky golden layers of extra-light pastry.

The commercial filo labeled "thin" is preferable to "ultra-thin" for home use. A 1-pound box contains 25 to 28 sheets, and sizes of sheets may vary a little. If fresh dough is not available, look in the frozen bread section of the grocery store.

Before buying, inspect the edges of the sheets to make sure they are not crumbled or torn, a sign of improper handling or storage.

Once home, be sure to totally defrost frozen filo or the outside

sheets will be sticky and the inner ones still frozen. There are two acceptable thawing methods: 1. Defrost the filo in its original wrapper in the refrigerator for at least two days; 2. Leave it in the refrigerator overnight, then at room temperature two hours before using.

Do not refreeze the dough, as long as it is still sealed in its original package, defrosted filo will keep in the refrigerator for up to a month.

Filo is so thin that it can quickly become dry and brittle when exposed to air, so always have a slightly damp towel handy before removing it from the package. Some cooks place a sheet of waxed paper on the dough, and then cover that with a damp towel. Moisture makes filo easier to handle.

Unwrap the dough, unroll it and remove the required number of filo sheets. Let them stand for 15 minutes under the slightly damp towel. Replace the remaining dough in plastic storage bag at once and seal the bag. Store the leaves to be used under a damp cloth until each is needed.

Be creative! Try some of these recipes using filo and familiarize yourself with the pleasure and

ease of working with this most versatile pastry dough.

VIENNESE

APPLE STRUDEL

½ cup dark seedless raisins
2 tbsps. brandy
2 cups pared, thinly sliced apples
½ cup chopped walnuts
¼ cup granulated sugar
2 tbsps. melted butter
1 tbsps. grated lemon peel
½ tsp. ground cinnamon
½ tsp. vanilla
½ cup fine bread crumbs (or filo flakes)
2 tbsps. melted butter
½ cup apricot preserves

1 tbsps. brandy
6 filo leaves, melted butter and powdered sugar for top of strudel

Soak raisins in 2 tablespoons brandy about 2 hours. Combine raisin mixture, apples, walnuts, granulated sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter, lemon peel, cinnamon and vanilla in large bowl. Set aside.

In small skillet, melt 2 tablespoons butter and stir in bread crumbs. Cook until browned. In small saucepan, heat apricot preserves over low heat until hot; stir in 1 tablespoon brandy.

Heat oven to 350 F. Layer filo leaves on kitchen towel, brushing each leaf with melted butter. Spread entire surface with hot apricot mixture; sprinkle with bread crumbs. Spoon apple mixture along longest end of leaves in a 3-inch strip, leaving a ¼-inch border. Using the towel for assist-

ance, lift to roll leaves over filling. This will form a jelly roll. Place strudel on lightly buttered jelly roll pan, 15½x10½ inches, seam side down. Brush with butter. Score strudel diagonally through top few leaves, into 12 to 15 equal sections. Bake until apples are tender and strudel is brown and crisp, 45 to 50 minutes. Cool to lukewarm; sprinkle with powdered sugar. Cut into 12 to 15 pieces.

INDIVIDUAL WELLINGTONS

4 1½- to 2-inch slices beef filet
Butter or margarine
12 sheets filo dough
¼ cup melted butter or margarine
1 egg, well beaten
Duxelles (recipe below)

Saute filets in butter in very hot skillet, 2 to 3 minutes on each side. Season with salt and pepper. Cool completely.

Place first leaf of filo dough on damp cloth. Brush with melted butter. Place second leaf directly over first and again brush with melted butter.

Add third leaf. Place one filet in middle of dough and spread ¼ of Duxelles over top of filet. Fold in

sides of dough and wrap like a package, making sure filet is completely covered. Seal seams with cold water. Repeat for every piece of beef. Place all Wellington "packages" on a cookie sheet, seam down. Brush each filet with well-beaten egg and bake in preheated 375-F oven 15 to 20 minutes, or until golden brown. Makes 4 servings.







Here's How

Clean terrazzo then seal it

Q. We purchased an old home and the floor of the bathroom shower is terrazzo, which has a heavy dark water stain.

I have tried many cleaners and although I have succeeded in removing some of the stain, I cannot seem to eradicate it all.

I will appreciate any help you can offer. — Mrs. O.B.

A. We suggest you first give the floor a good cleaning, scrubbing with a nylon scouring pad or stiff brush and warm to hot water.

While the floor surface is still damp, apply a poultice 1/2-inch thick, made as follows: Using an abrasive cleaning powder, preferably one containing a bleach, make a thick paste with hot water about 1 pound of powder for each 1 1/2 square feet of surface to be covered. Let the poultice remain on the floor for 48 hours or until completely dry. Remove with wood paddles to prevent scratching the terrazzo surface. Rinse well.

If the above fails, make a poultice

of whiting and hydrogen peroxide, to which is added a few drops of household ammonia. Spread over the stain and let dry.

A third suggestion is to use a "flush-off" paint and varnish remover. After the stain has been removed, give the floor two coats of a terrazzo sealer which should resist further staining.

Q. We stripped the finish off an old chest of drawers and discovered a beautifully grained wood underneath. We applied a coat of shellac, but are not satisfied with the result, as there seems to be a rather uneven surface, especially evident when you rub your fingers over it.

Do I have to take off the shellac in order to put on varnish? — Carl J.D.

A. No. Using a fine grade of sandpaper, sand down the finish until it is smooth to the touch. Brush off all grit, wipe clean and then go ahead with varnishing.



Q. Our problem is a self-cleaning gas oven that is dirty with caked or burned-on stains along wall and bottom surfaces.

What can be used to clean up this mess? Heavy cleansers are supposedly "no-no's."

Your help would be appreciated. — Mrs. R.N.S.

A. I suggest you call the dealer or manufacturer's representative.

Cleaners are not supposed to be used with self-cleaning ovens, which suggests your oven is malfunctioning. An inspection by a qualified repairman is needed.

Q. Our cork floor is more than 30 years old, has been sanded and finished with a dull hard coating. Now that coating shows wear in spots, wearing the cork under the coating.

What finish can we apply since it is impossible to have a new cork floor laid? We have made several inquiries and they no longer make the cork for this purpose. — Mrs. Frank K.

A. The safest and best way we know is to sand the floor. Cork is the only one of the resilient floors which may be successfully sanded.

However, unless you are an experienced sander, do not use a drum sanding machine, or you may ruin the floor. Use a regular floor polishing machine with a sanding disc attached, using a fairly coarse grade of paper first and following with a fine grade.

We suggest that instead of resealing the cork, you give it two applications of solvent-type floor wax, liquid or paste, and buff each coat when dry. After that, the floor can be maintained with water wax.

There are no other additives, only the apple cider vinegar and honey.

Take two teaspoons of honey and dissolve in a small amount of warm water in a medium-size glass. Then add two teaspoons of apple cider vinegar and fill glass with water.

Take this once a day, at meals if preferred. I have taken it and it really helps (arthritis). Have also recommended it to friends and it helped them.

You must use the honey and vinegar a while before getting results. Hope that it helps. — Erma S.





'Schoolboys' carries Full Bee Mark

Q. My Hummel figurine consists of three little boys. I have copied the mark on the bottom. There is also the number 170.

Can you tell me how old this is and what it would sell for?

A. This is called "School Boys" and the mark you sketched is Trade Mark 2 or the Full Bee Mark. It was made between 1950 and 1958. It is currently selling in the \$1,800 to \$2,000 range.



Q. I am confused about Wedgwood china. Some of it you say is authentic; some you say is fake.

Can you explain this so I can understand it and be able to tell the difference?


A. The original Wedgwood was made by Josiah Wedgwood and still is by his descendants. It is

usually inscribed "Wedgwood."

In the late 18th century, Ralph Wedgwood made china marked "Wedgwood & Co." In the 19th century, the same mark was used by Podmore & Walker. It is now produced under the mark "Enoch Wedgwood."

John Wedgwood made China marked with his name in the mid-19th century. The mark "Wedgwood" was used by Wm. Smith & Co. Note the middle "e."



Q. This sewing table is painted a light brown and decorated with hand-painted flowers. I know that it is well over 100 years old, but would like to know what it is called and its value.

A. This style is known as Sheraton and was made in the first quarter of the 19th century.

Its value lies to a large measure in the painted and decorated finish. It should be protected at all costs.

The value would be in the \$800 to \$900 range.
