Town Considers Plainview Building

A public hearing has been scheduled by the Oyster Bay Town Board for June 12, to consider an application for a special use permit to construct a four-story office building in Plainview, according to Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca.

"The applicant, Executive Management Co., is requesting a special use permit in order to construct the office building on a 2.76 acre parcel of land located in an Industrial "H" District (Light

Industry) on the southwesterly side of Amys Court and the westerly side of Executive Drive in Plainview," Mosca said. The applicant requires the special use permit in order to erect a four-story building for general office use on property within an industrial zone.

The hearing has been scheduled for June 12, beginning at 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Coalition Formed On Moment Silence

At a meeting on April 30, a cross-section of Hicksville residents met to form the Hicksville Coalition To Maintain A Moment of Silence.

This group was formed to return to the established policy in the school district for a moment of silence. We intend to accomplish this by urging the voters to pass Proposition 2 on June 13.

On January 25, School Board members John Ayres, Arlene Rudin, Honey Singer and Larry Wolfson voted to delete the 22 year old policy of a moment of silence without consulting the community beforehand.

After their decision, at open school board meetings of February 8 and 29, the majority of vocal outcry fell on deaf ears.

Your support is needed to maintain our current state law and return our policy.

Many Alarms Keep Vamps Busy

The past two weeks have been busy for Hicksville Volunteer Fire Fighters. The following alarms were handled and are reported in the order they were received.

April 17, 1:22 p.m. - The Plainview F.D. under Asst. Chief Zervos requested the Hicksville F.D. Haz-Mat team to respond to a chemical spill. The chemical was identified as hydrochloric acid. Team members in protective gear working with Plainview Vamps cleaned the chemical up. The operation took 1 hour and 21 minutes.

April 20, 10:45 a.m. - The Plainview F.D. under Asst. Chief Zervos requested mutual aid assistance at the scene of a house fire off Old Country Road. One engine from Hicksville responded to the scene to aid Plainview Vamps. The Bethpage F.D. supplied one engine to stand by at Plainview headquarters.

April 25, 6:01 a.m. - Hicksville Vamps responded to an automatic fire alarm at Multi Wire Corp., 10 Andrews Road. Plant workers also called reporting a bad fire involving chemicals. A fire was discovered in a plating tank and surrounding area. The sprinkler system was keeping the fire contained. Fire fighters and team members extinguished the fire and then found leaking chemical containers. Plant Chemical Engineer, Mr. Ben Chin gave valuable assistance to Haz-Mat team members in the identification and containment of the chemicals. The operation under Asst. Chief Bill Schuckmann lasted 2 hours and 44 minutes. Damage was put at \$300,000.

April 25, 5:46 p.m. - Hicksville Vamps were called to 12 West Cherry Street, Hicksville when an apartment dweller, on advice from youths disposed of gasoline in the sink (old water would dilute). The cesspool backed up causing gasoline to back up into the basement. LILCO gas and electric crews shut down power and gas. The spill was cleaned up using Speedi Dry and Sorbent Pillows. As stated before in our articles, dangerous substances such as gasoline, propane, pool chemicals should not be stored in the home. Follow manufacturers instructions on storage and handling.

April 28, 5:23 a.m. - Hicksville Vamps responding to a box alarm at Park Avenue and Woodbury Road found a 7,000 Volt LILCO powerline had fallen and struck a natural gas curb box. The resulting electric charge caused a gas service line at 100 Woodbury Road to explode, damaging one auto. Hicksville Vamps under

Chief of Department Owen Magee evacuated nearby homes and moved endangered autos. The 2 family home was wet down as a precaution. LILCO crews responded and the operation was concluded at 7 a.m.

April 28, 10:32 p.m. - Hicksville Fire fighters responding to a reported house fire at 16 Table Lane found, upon arrival, a fast moving fire on the 2nd floor. The ground floor was occupied by Dr. Wolfer, D.D.S. The lone occupant was not at home at the time of the blaze. Two pet cats died in the fire. Damage was estimated at \$10,000. No injuries were reported. Forty-five Vamps using seven pieces of apparatus responded under Chief Owen Magee. The Fire Marshall is investigating.

April 29, 6:44 p.m. - The Jericho F.D. under Chief Zederbaum working at the scene of a propane tank leak at 123 Birchwood Park Drive, requested the Hicksville F.D. Haz-Mat team to the scene with their newly acquired "Burn Off Unit". One unit, ten men, under Chiefs Magee and O'Brien responded. The Burn Off Unit is connected to a leaking tank, gas is bled off a safe distance away and ignited. A 2-3 hour job is reduced to 20 minutes, and the dangerous fire around the tank itself is extinguished. A reminder to residents before lighting your gas grill be sure all safety precautions are followed. In most cases, this spot inspection will prevent dangerous accidents.

F.D. kicks off annual Fund Drive

The Hicksville F.D. has started mailing out Fund Drive literature to residents. Your Fire Department is 100% volunteer. Two hundred twenty-five members, using eighteen pieces of apparatus, and three fire stations answer alarms 365 days a year. Many sacrifices are made in time and effort to provide Hicksville Residents with the best fire protection. Through efficient operating methods, the Hicksville Fire District Insurance Classification is a Grade 4. The Fire Department does much more than extinguish fires. A year round public education program is provided. A Rescue Squad, Hazardous Materials Response Team, give that little bit extra to keep Hicksville safe. While your tax dollar provides for equipment and maintenance, your generous donations are needed to fund our eight companies and squads. Please help us help you. 

Our Children

Parents should 'clean up act'

By Willard Abraham

Q. The language my 4-year-old uses bothers me a great deal. It is foul, and that is putting it mildly.

I have punished him, used the soap-in-the-mouth routine, and tried explaining to him that it is just not acceptable. I'll admit that once in a while I have lost my temper, and I'm ashamed of that.

His father and I don't get along well, and sometimes we have let our arguments in front of him get out of hand. The language we use at those times isn't always the most clean!

Your specific ideas for controlling what he says would be most welcome. Because he is still young I have a feeling that correcting him now will be easier than trying to do it later.

A. You're right about that, and two of the main approaches are perhaps easier to suggest than to follow.

One is to try "cleaning up your own act" by not arguing in front of him. Even doing so behind closed doors may not be effective because sound travels and little ears are often listening — and "learning."

Children may say and do things because of the attention it gets from their parents. Your youngster seems to have been pretty successful in manipulating your behavior. He swears and you promptly react.

So one possible approach on your part is to do nothing. Ignoring what he says may be helpful in "extinguishing the behavior" (a phrase some psychologists often use). It may take a while for him to catch on, and that period of time might create a hardship for you. However, consistent control on your part could pay off in the long run.

Q. I may have to lose a good friend because she talks about her children so much, and I can't stand it anymore.

She has three children, and so do we. I guess I could ask for "equal time," but that wouldn't solve the problem. I'd still have to listen to her boring details of what her children do, with whom, where, when, why and how.

It's just too much! How can I handle this without hurting her feelings or losing her friendship? Over the years she has been very dear to me.

A. Many parents just do not recognize that their child-related monologues are often a pain in the neck to other parents.

So if she really is a good friend, you may be doing her, as well as yourself, a favor by bringing that

to her attention.

It doesn't mean you have to eliminate all conversational references to either her children or yours. Perhaps you both can even enjoy the process of developing "ground rules" of what topics are fair game. They might relate to birthdays, graduations, awards or other special events in the lives of your children.

Q. A problem recently developed in our neighborhood, and it could so easily have been avoided. All the children have to know is how to turn off the water in their house.

It backed up in one of their bedrooms when the children were home alone. They didn't have the slightest idea of what to do about it, so the entire house was flooded by the time the parents came home. Water-soaked were some valuable Oriental rugs.

A little bit of preventive information shared with youngsters can be so valuable.

A. Right, and while we're at it, let's add some awareness of how to turn off the electricity and gas — and how about safety routes if there's a fire?

A Grandfather Speaks For Survival

"On March 23, 1983 President Ronald Reagan said "My fellow Americans, tonight we are launching an effort which holds the promise of changing the course of human history. There will be risks and results take time. But with your support I believe we can do it."

The underlining is mine. I wanted to support the President, but I didn't know how, or what was planned. Subsequent articles in the press "pooched" the idea and referred to it as if President Reagan was hallucinating or playing the role of a "Space Superman."

Last week I received in the mail a book titled "We Must Defend America - a new strategy for National Survival" by David O. Graham, Project Director High Frontier.

The basic plan is to use our advanced high technology and scientific know-how to put about 432 NASA Solar Power Satellites (SPS) into a geosynchronous orbit 23,500 miles above the Earth. This satellite consists of millions of solar cells which convert sunlight directly into electricity and an antenna which converts this electricity into microwaves (much like those that carry our TV signals), and beams them to Earth. On Earth a large receiving antenna converts the microwaves back into electricity which is fed directly into a power grid. A laser beam in the center of the receiving antenna is aimed to the center of the sending antenna in space, keeping the two locked firmly together at all times. The system is environmentally benign, posing no hazard to life on Earth. Aircraft, birds and butterflies can fly through the beam without risk. One such satellite can generate as much electrical power as five coal burning or nuclear plants - enough to provide electricity for large metropolitan areas such as New York or Tokyo. This is an inexhaustible energy supply for electricity on Earth. There is absolutely no technical obstacle to this, as a joint NASA - Department of Energy research project has proved. Since the (SPS) operates from a geosynchronous orbit 23,500 miles above the Earth, there it is forever in sunshine as it remains at all times over the same spot on Earth utilizing the sun's inexhaustible energy supply. We would for once be adding to Earth's resources rather than depleting them. The cost of this fuel is zero.

All the above has been known since 1980 as technically possible, however, it is not being pursued by the government.

The drawbacks are vulnerability and cost. If today we had such satellites in orbit they would be subject to interference or even destruction by a hostile power. Neither governments nor private industry are likely to commit the tens of billions of dollars necessary for an unprotested and fragile space-based power plant.

Thus the military protection of High Frontier's total strategy is mandatory.

Both history and nature provide the unmistakable lesson that aggressors do not attack those who are willing and able to defend themselves. The politics of appeasement and disarmament now unleashed in America moves as closer to World War III as those same politics in Britain encouraged Hitler to launch World War II.

Most of what I have written above comes from the book "We Must Defend America - A New Strategy for National Survival" by David O. Graham, published by The Conservative Press, Inc., P.O. Box 1430, Falls Church, Va. 22041.

I resigned after 8 years as director of civil defense in my community primarily because I realized that the "MAD" theory "Mutual Assured Destruction" and the apathy of the citizens with the exception of the V.F.W. and the 600 or more volunteers was inadequate, puerile pusillanimous and a fraud. We, with the help of V.F.W. Post #6395 distributed to every home in West Hempstead and Lakeview, pamphlets of self help in event of a disaster. On the night of the Cuban Missile Crisis which incidentally was quite real, I sat with the chiefs of the 18 branches of Civil Defense under my jurisdiction at the Fire House in West Hempstead, waiting literally for the first strike from a hostile nation to put us into action. By the grace of God and firm action by President Kennedy, nothing happened. Pure luck.

We had stored in every school basement adequate emergency first-aid and survival supplies.

I believed then that Noah's Ark if even two survived life was possible (male and female) of course.

The theory was that you could stay underground for two weeks after the conflagration the intensity of radiation fallout would decrease dramatically to near zero and stay that way for about 300 years. In other words, our side was committed to no first strike. The estimates were about 100 million would be killed or seriously wounded. Too high a price to pay even if we retaliated or could retaliate and wipe out the aggressor completely.

Since that time I've seen no system of strategy to repel invading first strikes except the shaky and naive theory of mutual deterrence.

Now for the first time a Military Protection System has been proposed that will not use any additional nuclear weapons, will destroy incoming "nukes" up to an estimated 86 to 90% efficiency. This, although, not perfect, would certainly inhibit Soviet or other "M.A.D." advocates to rethink their attack plans.

As it stands at present the estimate is that if nothing is done and should the Soviets launch an all out nuclear attack on the U.S. the number of Americans killed instantly is likely to be 150 to 160 million. If we then retaliate with all surviving U.S. nuclear forces the number of Soviet citizens likely to be killed is ten to twenty million. These are figures from official computations by the Carter Administration. That is fewer than the Soviets lost in World War II and a third to half of the Soviet citizens liquidated by the Communist Party for inadequate aid in support of their regime.

High Frontier, a new and viable option maintains that it is possible to defend the national against nuclear attack. It can be done so effectively that any first strike by the Soviets or any hostile power can be so severely filtered that the possibility of such an attack can be driven beyond the pale of credibility.

We can change our strategy from Mutual Assured Destruction to Assured Survival and engineer an escape from the balance of terror we live in today.

Obviously no defense in history has been "perfect" although that is precisely what the mid sixties Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara demanded of any strategic nuclear defense.

This sophistry of absolutism was the key ingredient in McNamara's formulation of the M.A.D. theory and has subsequently been the death knell for active defense and civil defense for nearly two decades. An active defense program was no good unless it saved everyone and the same for Civil Defense.

The fundamental military requirements necessary for a reincarnation of national defense are these. II quote from High Frontier, Page 50.

A spaceborne defense system capable of heavy attrition (50% or more) of a Soviet long range missile salvo against the United States in the early minutes of trajectory. The system must be available for deployment in the shortest time possible.

A second layer of spaceborne defense, for later deployment capable of inflicting significant losses (another 50% or more), upon Soviet nuclear ballistic missiles which might escape destruction by the first spaceborne layer.

A point defense of individual U.S. missile silos (IMX or Minuteman) adequate to insure survival of those missiles long enough to allow them to be fired. This system must be quickly available certainly before the MX missile is ready for deployment.

These three tiers constitute High Frontier's "layered" defense which can provide a ninety six percent assurance for all targets of Soviet long range missiles and essentially 100 percent assurance of survival of our now threatened land-based deterrent. Most of this could be accomplished by 1988, all of it by 1993. The so called "window of vulnerability" can be closed in 1985.

High Frontier does not advocate the use of nuclear systems for strategic defense because they are not the best military/technical solution.

Spaceborne defenses would require a large number of orbiting satellites each armed with a great number of interceptor vehicles. Such defenses would require more nuclear warheads than we now have in our stockpile.

Secondly any system requiring nuclear weapons whether in space or on the ground or in the sea - requires presidential approval for firing. Since defenses against ballistic missiles must react within a very few minutes of an attack, the necessary command and control systems associated with nuclear weapons would be crippling. Finally technologies other than nuclear ones can disable Soviet missiles with equal or greater effectiveness.

"High Frontier" is not a "Buck Rogers'" or "Star Wars" solution. It is quite simple. Although lasers or beam weaponry should be pursued vigorously by scientists it isn't necessary at this time.

As Dr. Edward Teller advises, scientists should be heeded when they say something can be done; they are often wrong when they say it cannot. A few scientists believe it can be done in as little as six years.

The Global Ballistic Missile Defense I (GBMDI) is the brain child of Mr. Fred "Bud" Redding, then a conceptual engineer with the Stanford Research Institute International.

It is not a final answer but it will get the job done in reasonable time at a reasonable cost. He drew heavily on a massive amount of work completed twenty years ago by a strong Department of Defense scientific and technical team of over five thousand. This group concluded it would have been technically possible to deploy a defensive system such as GBMDI as early as 1966 (about six years).

Now we know where the Soviets have their missile launchers and submarine based missiles. We didn't know that 10 years ago.

The plan is to put 432 satellites into orbit by space shuttle about 300 miles above the earth. The size of the satellite makes it possible to put it into orbit with an MX booster. They will stay in orbit without decay indefinitely but will become inoperable after five years in orbit.

These satellites would consist essentially of a frame, a computer, a sensor, a communications package, a rocket motor and forty to fifty small rockets capable of intercepting Soviet missiles.

The brains of the satellite, the computer, in order to launch its interceptor rockets, must know at all times where it is in space. Once the orbit is established the satellites path have such little variability that precise location as a function of time is rather easily programmed.

They would detect a Soviet missile salvo about 1,000 miles ahead, track the missile to determine the point in space where it can be struck by interceptor missiles and then pass that information to other satellites. When a satellite's computer determines that one or several of its interceptors can make one or more kills, it automatically dispatches its missiles to the appropriate points in space.

The missile has its own sensor which can pick up the target shortly before impact and can maneuver very slightly with small steering rockets to improve accuracy.

The D.O.D. team of twenty years ago believed this kind of system would achieve only a one to two foot miss distance. But, just to make sure the missile made its mark it would create a cloud of buckshot some twenty five feet in diameter just prior to impact.

The Soviet missile would obviously suffer catastrophic damage if just one of these pellets struck it. It would be kinetic energy which destroys it. The formula for this is: energy equals mass times velocity squared ($E = 1/2 MV^2$). The velocity of the missile is 17,000 miles per hour, the velocity of the interceptor is added to make the pellets strike at about 20,000 miles per hour. With such great velocity the mass need by very small to impart a tremendous amount of energy on the target.

In a normal peacetime situation, the GBMDI would be under positive control by the "man in the loop" at all times. This is necessary since the system operating on full automatic would shoot down cosmonauts, scientific probes and missile tests. The information gathered and processed aboard the satellite in orbit will constantly be passed to a U.S. or allied ground authority by satellites in the system passing over the Earth based space defense headquarters.

This would almost certainly be the large, hardened facility inside Cheyenne Mountain at Colorado Springs. No special tension, no engagement, unless instructed by that authority.

Higher by non-critical world tension the entire system could be semi-autonomous.

In a Crisis period such as the Cuban Missile Crisis the GBMDI would be placed on full alert and would fire autonomously on every missile rising from hostile geography. This would mean notification to the Soviet Union and others capable of space launches that we could not in light of the situation consider any launch as peaceful.

The possibility of a fanatic such as Kaddafi or Khomeini creating such a situation is not diminishing but growing as nuclear weapons proliferate.

This is in a nutshell is GBMDI. It is non-nuclear. You would not hurt a soul on earth with it, no part of it could reenter the atmosphere, and it uses mostly old technology, obtained quickly and at reasonable cost. It would allow us to escape the failed M.A.D. theories, thus protecting us from nuclear attack.

GBMDI is a follow-on system which utilizes more advanced technologies. This is eight to ten years away but its being worked on.

This book impressed me so much I want to tell the world about it, because I have five grandchildren and they are all beauties. I want to be around to see them marry and have children of their own but I'll sleep better tonight knowing its possible again to live in a peaceful world.

waiter. Presently people who are
not traditionalists where the
woman is the host for the evening,
she could ask for the table
particularly if a reservation was in
her name. The seating order is still
the same with the woman going
first.Q. It is often confusing in
restaurants to know whether to
pay the waiter or to pay on the
way out. What is the rule? D.C.

A. There is no rule of etiquette

because each restaurant determines

its own system. But generally the
check will say,"Please pay server," or "Please
pay cashier." When in doubt it is
never out of order to ask the
waiter.Q. In a restaurant last week the
hostess escorted us to a table
right next to the door. When we
said that this was not a suitable
table she seemed quite annoyed.
Is it not correct to ask for a table
to your liking? T.H.A. The hostess should not have
looked annoyed. Evidently she
was more interested in her own
problems of keeping tables and
waitresses busy than serving the
patrons. You were quite right. In
fact if you had a preference in
advance it would not have been

Cooking Corner

How sweet it is on Sunday

Sunday afternoon, long considered a peaceful time of newspaper reading, television watching and naps, is suddenly the preferred party time.

The Sunday afternoon "dessert party" — with a mouth-watering lineup of cakes, tarts, ice creams and flans — is now "in," says Peter Prescott, entertainment editor of *Food and Wine* magazine.

Fashionable restaurants are offering diners tiny samples of several different desserts arranged dramatically on one oversize plate. Folks are meeting over tea and hazelnut torte instead of cocktails. And home cooks everywhere are "structuring whole meals around desserts," says Prescott, "serving smaller portions of food and less-filling foods" so that everyone can splurge on dessert.

Prestcott stresses that a show-stopping dessert need not be a complex or time-consuming affair. Sorbets and granitas are ele-

gant, refreshing and lend themselves to beautiful presentations, yet take a minimum of time and talent to prepare.

More important than the flash and dazzle of a dessert is its compatibility with the rest of the meal. A cream-sauced main course needs something acidic for a final flourish — a lemon sherbet, a citrus tart or a bowl of crème fraîche-topped berries, for instance.

Likewise, a filet of fish sauced with lemon or orange juices needs a creamy, velvety finale.

The following easy but elegant recipes from *Food and Wine's* kitchens promise a delicious and exciting fireworks display.

STRAWBERRY SOUFFLÉ
1 qt. strawberries, rinsed and hulled
2 (4 oz. each) envelopes unflavored gelatin
6 eggs, separated, at room temperature
½ cup superfine sugar

1 tbsp. framboise or kirsch
1 cup heavy cream, chilled
Strawberry Sauce (recipe follows)
Strawberries and whipped cream, for garnish (optional)

Fasten a paper collar around a 5½-cup soufflé dish, so that the collar rises 3 inches above the dish.

Puree the strawberries in a blender and pass through a strainer to remove the seeds. Place the puree in a small bowl, sprinkle on the gelatin and place the bowl in a pan of hot water; stir occasionally until the gelatin dissolves, about 3 minutes. Set aside in the hot water.

In a double boiler, beat the egg yolks and sugar over barely simmering water until the mixture is light colored, creamy and warm to the touch, about 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and continue to beat until the mixture cools, thickens and forms a ribbon when the beater is lifted, about 3 minutes. Stir in the framboise, scrape the mixture into a large bowl and set aside.

Beat the cream until it is doubled in volume and forms soft peaks.

Beat the egg whites until they form soft peaks. Stir the gelatin mixture into the beaten egg yolks. Place the bowl into a larger bowl half-filled with ice and water and stir with a rubber spatula until the mixture begins to thicken and mound, 2 to 4 minutes depending on the type of bowl used (metal chills faster than glass or ceramic).

Immediately remove from the

ice water and fold in the whipped cream until incorporated. Fold in the egg whites, about one-third at a time, until no streaks of white remain; do not over mix. Turn into the prepared soufflé dish, cover and refrigerate until thoroughly chilled, at least 4 hours.

Before serving, remove the paper collar. Garnish the top with strawberries and whipped cream, if desired. Serve chilled with Strawberry Sauce.

Makes 8 servings

STRAWBERRY SAUCE
1 pt. strawberries, rinsed and hulled
1 tbsp. superfine sugar
1 tbsp. framboise or kirsch

Puree the strawberries in a blender and pass through a strainer to remove the seeds. Transfer the puree to a small bowl. Stir in the sugar and liqueur. Refrigerate, covered, until chilled.

GRANITA DI LIMONE

2½ cups fresh lemon juice (from about 12 lemons)
1½ cups superfine sugar
¼ cup orange or tangerine liqueur
3¾ cups water
Frozen seedless grapes, for garnish

Combine the lemon juice and sugar in a large bowl and stir until the sugar is completely dissolved. Add the water and the liqueur and stir to combine.

Pour the mixture into a shallow non-corrodible pan and freeze for 5 hours, stirring every hour to break up the ice crystals that have formed. Pack the mixture into a decorative mold and freeze again.

In some cases the answer is yes. In others it would be a clear example of discrimination.

A federal court recently upheld a hospital's decision to release one of its five pharmacists who refused to work on a religious holiday and did not try to trade the date with a co-worker.

The hospital requires pharmacists to work every fifth holiday. Any inconveniences resulting from this policy are to be worked out among the employees.

The court supports the hospital's action because it felt the employer does not have the entire burden of cooperation with religious employees. The employee must at least try to meet halfway.

In this case the pharmacist made no attempt to arrange for a co-worker to substitute. For this reason, the hospital acted legally in firing the religious pharmacist.

Mark, a 19-year-old Californian, purchases a quantity of liquor at a local store. He and friends drink the liquor and then go for a drive.

Mark drives at excessive speed and crashes the car. One of the passengers is killed and three others seriously injured. The survivors go to court to sue. Put on your black robe and decide this case.

A. It is the liquor store

that is at fault for selling the alcohol to an underage youth.

B. There is nothing the passengers can do. They chose to ride with Mark after knowing he had been drinking.

C. Mark drank an excessive amount of alcohol and is responsible for his own actions.

D. Mark may just be a

bad driver. The accident may have been unrelated to his liquor consumption.

A California appeals court supports judgment A. A liquor store may be responsible for injuries resulting from the sale of liquor to sober minors.

The court presented a link for a chain of events. A licensed merchant sold alcohol to a 19-year-old, which caused him to become intoxicated and resulted in an injury-causing accident.

82 Daily Journal D.A.R. 734 (C.A. 4th, 1982).

Tina, a 9-year-old, is seriously injured when she is struck by a car while she is waiting for the school bus. She remains in a coma for more than three weeks and suffers permanent brain damage. Who is responsible for this accident — the child, school, parents or automobile driver?

The family reached settlement with the car's driver. It then turned to the school district's responsibility in the incident.

The district argued its duty is strictly limited to the bus ride itself. Before

children board the bus they are the concern of their parents, they said. The court said it would agree to this reasoning except that parents do not have an impact as to where the bus will stop. Conceivably, the district could schedule a bus stop in the middle of a traffic island, without first consulting parents.

Once the school has accepted the responsibility of providing transportation, it must display reasonable judgment. The court said the district's responsibility to exercise care extends to any activity beyond the control of parents.

The court concluded the district must provide a safe bus stop. This case becomes further complicated because Tina is a retarded child. Under such conditions, a safe stop for one child may not be safe for another. The Oklahoma Court of Appeals sent the case back to a lower court to give further consideration to this particular issue.

Here's How

Q. We have a swimming pool about 10 years old that has white coping. We would like to replace the white cement decking surrounding the pool with a Mexican red tile. I wonder if there is any product available to paint an existing coping with a color to match the new tile? — Katharine H.

A. Today's concrete stains are solutions that react chemically with the lime in concrete to give permanent coloring. They penetrate the concrete and cannot peel or wear away as a painted surface coat can. The color choice is limited — generally earth shades of red, rust, green, tan, brown and black, so this might come in a color that would blend well with the Mexican red tile.

However, satisfactory results can also be obtained by using exterior latex paints especially made for masonry surfaces. Paints used over concrete surfaces must be able to resist alkali present in cement which attacks ordinary oil-base paints. There is a wider choice of colors in these latex masonry paints.

Q. I need to know how to clean off and eliminate mildew from the base of my house.

I have lived here for 28 years and never had this problem until last year. It seems to be getting worse. At first, it is green, and then turns black. It is even on the wall of the porch which is not in touch with the ground. What is the answer?

I use the word "mildew" wherever it might be something else. At least, it is some sort of fungus. My house has stucco walls. — Matt R.

A. You can clean the walls with a solution of two-thirds cup of trisodium phosphate, one-third cup detergent, 1 quart household bleach, mixed in 3 quarts of warm water.

Scrub the affected area with a stiff brush. Rinse well with clear water. An application of Thompson's Water Seal and painting with a mildew-resistant paint would help curtail the problem.

However, the trouble is caused by too much moisture. If this moisture is not eliminated, the problem will reoccur. Check the drainage around the house. Water should run away from the foundation. If you have crawl space under the house, cover the ground with strips of polyethylene plastic, overlapping each strip at least 6 inches and either seal the seams

or weigh down the overlap with large stones or brick. Trees and shrubbery too close to the house also can complicate the mildew problem.

Q. The tile on my foyer is getting quite dull. Can you recommend a wax or polish for ceramic tile? — Mary Ann W., Eden Prairie, Minn.

A. First clean the floor, using any good detergent. Any stains can be cleaned with abrasive powder. After thorough cleaning, be sure and rinse well and let dry. Then a wax emulsion, synthetic emulsion or Polymer Gel finish can be applied.

Q. When the tank handle is turned in our bathroom, not enough water enters the toilet bowl to flush it properly. I took off the porcelain tank top and found that when the tank fills, the water only goes up about halfway and then the flow cuts off. Is there any way to determine how much water should go into the tank? — G.I.H.

A. Generally, the incoming water shuts off when it is about 1 inch from the top of the overflow tube, the vertical hollow piece of metal located slightly to the left of the center of the tank. If the water is not reaching the height, bend the horizontal float arm up a little so that the float ball is a couple of inches higher than it was. Use both hands to make the bend and work very carefully so that you do not throw the equipment out of line. Make whatever adjustment is necessary to bring the incoming water up to the point just short of the top of the overflow tube. If the water rises too high and begins to flow into the tube, it means you have bent the float arm a little too much.

Q. We are planning to install cedar closets. Which is preferable — panels of cedar or real cedar boards? What care should be given cedar closets? — Maury D.

A. You may use either paneling or boards, as long as the wood is at least $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch thick. Be sure that all crevices are tightly closed and door joints tightly weatherstripped. No special care is needed other than keeping the closet clean and free of dust. Be sure clothes and items sorted there are cleaned and well-aired before storage.

Aging senses

Q. I am gradually losing my sense of smell and my sense of taste is gradually fading. Could you tell me what causes these losses and how I can help myself?

I am 74 years old and still in good health. — R.V.

A. You are not alone — a great many elderly people complain of loss of ability to taste food and to smell odors. However, there is also great variability in the extent to which this occurs.

In one study investigators found much less difference between healthy young and old people than between healthy individuals and those with chronic health impairments whether young or old. Therefore, general health can influence our sensory perception. A thorough health evaluation to identify correctable disorders might help. It's also a sensible part of a program for "preventive maintenance" of physical health.

A large number of theories have been put forth to account for decline in virtually all of our senses with advancing age. Some investigators have reported a diminution in the number of receptor cells involved in detecting either smells or tastes with advancing years; however, other investigators have questioned the validity of these measurements.

Some people believe any degeneration in these senses might be from ill effects from inhaling pollutants and diseases associated with the respiratory system. However, these cells are continually being replaced and have a life of only about 10 days.

Therefore, it is not now possible to draw any specific conclusions regarding the change in these sensory systems that is to be expected with aging.

A group of British public health workers was concerned with the possibility of accidental poisoning of elderly individuals from town gas. They explored the possibility that a decreased ability to detect cooking gas by its odor would lead to older people being vulnerable to accidental poisoning from gas leaks in their home. They made a careful comparison of odor sensitivity in people over and under 65 years old, one-half of whom were judged to be in good health and one-half of whom were not. The data did show that the healthy people over 65 were on the average less sensitive to odors than those younger, but this difference was much smaller than the difference between healthy and less healthy subjects regardless of age.

Current research is more concerned with the ability of the elderly to identify the odor of real foodstuffs to see how changes in his ability may be correlated with different changes in appetite. — Dr.

Dear John: I've seen so much in the press recently about Alzheimer's disease. What is it, something somebody recently invented? And what is being done about it? — Joseph C.

Dear Joseph: It's probably been around for a long time, but the threat of it, particularly to older people, may just be coming to the fore.

It affects close to 1.2 million persons over the age of 65 and 60,000 under that age.

As to what it is, Alzheimer's causes the progressive deterioration of memory, intellect, personality and self-care in the victims.

There is no cure at this point.

Many families try to cope with it at home. When going to an institution becomes inevitable, they feel both guilt and failure.

The Andrus Foundation of the American Association of Retired Persons has just awarded research grants to the New York Medical Center and Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas.

Dear Mainly:

I have had arthritis in the left ankle and instep now for well over two years — couldn't get along without a cane; used four different doctors' prescriptions, plus Tylenol with limited results.

After approximately 10 weeks I

now do not use a cane. Around the house I rarely realize that I have arthritis. I go shopping with my wife and move around the mall three or four hours.

When, because of this activity, my ankle starts to hurt, I pause for about one minute, then proceed, as the pain has subsided. What a blessing! I sleep at night with no pain. I don't have to put my foot on a stool while looking at television, trying all different positions to relieve the pain.

Last week, showing off, I ran up 12 stairs in a mall, not that I recommend this foolish procedure.

My age is 82. The vinegar and honey has not only helped my arthritis, but has certainly improved my general well-being. I feel fine. I religiously take the two teaspoonsfuls of apple cider vinegar and honey each day.

Previously I had reconciled myself to being a painful cripple, but now I just know that continued use will completely eradicate my arthritis (which the doctors say cannot be cured). It is so nice to walk up and down stairs like a regular human being, one foot after the other with no pain to speak of.

I am happy to let you know how pleased I am to be able to report the above experience. — Norman G.

TWEEN 12 & 20

Dr. Wallace: About eight months ago I started receiving a teen magazine through the mail but I did not order it. For the past two months the magazine has been sending me nasty letters saying that I owe them \$7.95.

I'm 16 years old and I'm worried about my credit rating. Should I send them the money? If not, what should I do? I did not return the magazines and I did glance through all that I received. — Jody

Jody: Write to the magazine and inform them:

1. Stop sending the magazine because you did not order it.
2. Since you didn't order it, you have no obligation to pay for the subscription.
3. You are 16 years old.

The law regards unordered merchandise received through the mail as gifts. It does not have to be paid for and it does not have to be returned.

Dr. Wallace: My husband was married to his first wife for 18 years and was legally separated for another three before he was divorced this past December. We (I'm 19, he is 39) married 15 days after the divorce.

Tom's mother hates me and she would not attend the wedding. In no way did I have anything to do with his first marriage breaking up. In fact, they were separated for over a year when I met him. At first I encouraged him to return to his wife but he said their marriage was over.

I feel that family ties are important but his mother won't even call the house. If she wants to talk with her son she calls him at work.

I rather like Tom's mother and I'd like her to become part of our "family." I wrote her a nice letter and told her all this but she has not responded. Please help. — Bertha,

Bertha: It's your husband's responsibility to convince his mother to be part of the family. If he does, fine; if he doesn't, forget about her!

Teens: The death of a pet is a sad experience for every member of a family, but according to Seventeen news it can be particularly devastating for teens.

The loving bond formed between a pet and its young owner often provides a special source of comfort to a teen going through a difficult adolescence, says Arlene Fisher, co-author of the book "Pet

Loss" with Herbert Nieburg, a psychotherapist and professor of community health at Long Island University.

"Parents can yell, teachers can scream, friends can reject, but a pet is unconditionally loving," she explains.

In addition, she notes, the loss of a pet can be especially traumatic for a teen since the pet oftentimes will have been a member of the family for most of the teenager's life.

While the pet was alive, Nieburg says, "a teen learned about responsibility, reproduction, the financial considerations involved in taking care of a living thing and medicine and health care." Now, he adds, "they learn about death and dying, too."

As hard as it is, Nieburg reveals, there are ways for a teen to cope.

"My first suggestion is that you really value and enjoy the relationship with your pet all the time it's there," he says, adding, "but be aware on some level that nothing is forever — that all things have a finite life span."

If your pet gets sick or hurt in an accident, the professor tells teens it's best not to keep it bottled up inside.

"Talk about it with your friends or family, question the veterinarian, cry if you want to — do whatever you need to express your grief from the outset."

In some cases the animal may be so old or ailing that euthanasia is discussed. Nieburg feels that teens should be a part of the decision process, but adds, whether or not the teen actually stays with the pet when it is euthanized should be left up to the teen to decide.


"There are individuals who don't want that final memory," says Fisher. "These people need to be reminded that it's OK to be frightened, that you're not doing your pet a disservice by not being there at the end. If you have given your (pet) lots of love during its life, that's the thing you have to remember."

Finally, when a cherished companion dies, teens should not let themselves feel guilty.

"No matter what has happened," Nieburg concludes, "nothing will alter the fact that you loved your pet."

And that comforting memory will stay long after the pet is gone.

Points On Pets



Q. I hope that you will not think that my question is "off the wall." I recently returned from my physician's office where several samples of blood, etc., were taken from me for various tests. How are samples obtained from animals?

A. Various samples are required from pets to diagnose certain diseases. Depending on the particular type of pet, blood samples are usually easily obtainable from blood vessels in the legs or neck.

Generally, obtaining blood samples from pets causes little discomfort to them. The restraint necessary to hold them still during the procedure is usually more bothersome than the actual venapuncture.

Veterinarians often ask their clients to obtain fecal and urine samples from their dogs or cats prior to bringing the animals to their offices for examination. Collecting a fecal sample for the veterinarian is usually not difficult. Once the dog or cat has had a bowel movement, the sample should be placed in a clean, sealed container and delivered to the veterinarian as soon as possible.

If the sample is obtained outside, you should be careful to not pick up grass, dirt and other foreign objects. Although sometimes difficult, you should not put a lot of cat litter in the sample container with the bowel movement from a cat.

The container containing the stool sample should be identified with your name, the pet's species, the pet's name and the date and time that the sample was obtained.

The stool sample should be fresh. If the sample will not be delivered to the veterinarian for several hours, it should be refrigerated. Heat or delay in delivering stool samples to your veterinarian may cause parasite eggs to mature and burst. This makes identification and diagnosis extremely difficult, if not impossible.

Collecting urine samples at home is usually quite a bit more difficult than collecting fecal samples. To collect a urine specimen at home, a wide-mouthed jar, pie pan, skillet or disposable baking pan is required. The dog should be taken outside on a collar and



CPR Hearing Followup

As a follow-up to a CPR course for the hearing impaired that was specially designed by Kyle Berris of Mid-Island Hospital and that concluded on May 11, Mid-Island will sponsor a visit to the hospital by a van that will give hearing screenings and demonstrate the latest equipment for the deaf and hearing impaired.

The van, owned by Mill Neck Manor Lutheran School for the Deaf, will be at the hospital from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, May 12. It is open to the public and will offer free screenings to all who want them. It will also make available hands-on experience with such equipment as video-tape and decoders, signal devices, and teletypewriters, which are devices that enable a deaf person to use the telephone. Your Social Security



Length of work determines eligibility

Q. I didn't work under Social Security very long and I don't have sufficient work credits to be eligible. I am now over 65 and I was wondering if there is some kind of lump-sum payment I might be entitled to based on the amount of work I have done. — K.D.O.

A. If you have not worked long enough under Social Security there is no monthly benefit payable.

Social Security does have a lump-sum benefit which is paid on the death of an insured worker if there is a surviving spouse or minor children. This amount goes to \$255 and is meant to help defray funeral expenses. The lump-sum may be paid if the deceased has earned at least six quarters of coverage during the 13 quarters ending with the quarter of death.

Q. Does Social Security set a limit for widows on amounts paid to them when they also receive pensions and annuities from other government agencies? — A.E.T.

A. If the widow's work for the other government agency was covered by Social Security, the annuity or pension received from the government agency would not affect their Social Security widow's benefits.

If the work for the other government agency was not covered by Social Security, the widow's annuity or pension would cause a re-

diction in her Social Security widow's benefit — \$200 for every \$300 of the pension received.

Q. Is it true some states pay more Social Security benefits than other states? — R.S.

A. No. Social Security benefits are based on earnings over a person's working lifetime and are the same regardless of residence.

You may be thinking about SSI benefits which are based on need. SSI consists of basic federal benefit which is augmented in some states by a state supplement. The amount of the state supplement varies from state to state.

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the original improvement and embellishment by the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, of various parks and recreation areas located throughout and in and for said Town.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes or purpose is \$700,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$665,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of publication of this resolution, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Post, Mid Island Times, Syosset Tribune & Locust Valley Leader, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.




