## Memorial Day Parade Draws Large Turnout

The Annual Memorial Day Parade took place in Hicksville on Monday, May 28. Despite cloudy skies and intermittent rain, a large crowd of spectators greeted the marchers along the new route which ended at the reviewing stand located in the parking field adjacent to the Charles Wagner American Legion Hall on Nicholas Street.

A brief ceremony was conducted during which time several speakers addressed the crowd regarding the observance of Memorial Day. Principal speaker was Major John Mullarky who urged citizens to request the return of servicemen still missing in Vietnam. Kenneth Dircks, a Hicksville High School junior spoke briefly noting a young American's view of the symbolism of the day and Richard Evers, Publicity spokesman for the Charles Wagner Post #421, read the General Orders written in 1868 giving direction for honoring the war dead. The Invocation was given by Pastor Richard Smeltzer of the United Methodist Church. Father Alfred Rogers of St. Ignatius Loyal R.C. Church gave the Benediction and a Closing Prayer was offered by Father George Stravropoulos of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church.

## School Bd. Uses Surplus Funds To Reduce Tax Inc.

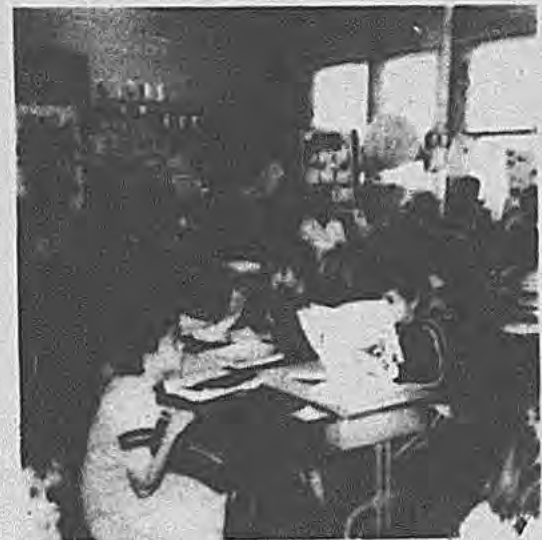
Drawing from a \$1.3 million surplus the Hicksville Board of Education voted 6-1 last Wednesday to add \$250,000 in revenues to the 1984-85 school budget reducing the estimated tax increase to \$1.49 per \$100 assessed valuation instead of the \$1.71 originally projected. In voting against the measure, John Ayres said he opposed reducing the surplus to \$1 million since he doubted that figure would even cover one payroll.

The Board also voted to increase the monies granted through school district funds to the Gregory Museum for operating expenses by \$10,000 making the total \$40,000 for the coming year. Thomas Nagle and Jay Schwartz opposed and Lawrence Wolfson abstained from voting. All three expressed a concern that the museum should look to other districts for matching funds. Speaking on behalf of the Museum, Richard Evers told the group that funds have been allocated to the Museum through grants and special funding however these monies are not intended to pay the light bills nor repair the roof.

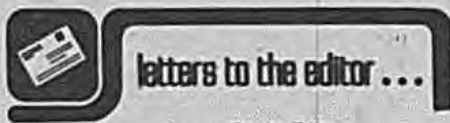
Honey Singer informed the Board that a host family has been found for the American Field Service foreign student who will spend the year attending Hicksville Schools. Kenneth and Arlene Rudin have volunteered their home for this purpose. Mrs. Rudin is a member of the Board of Education.

The following employees will be retiring: Vincent Alekna, a Junior High School Industrial Arts teacher will leave the district June 30; Arthur DelRe, also on June 30, a science teacher at the Junior High; Shirley Bergman who teaches 5th grade at Burns Avenue on July 1; Nina Mudryk a cleaner/attendant at the Senior High on September 30.

Voting for the school budget and proposition #2 dealing with silent meditation takes place on June 13. Next week this newspaper will print questions and answers from all the candidates running for the School Board.

Now, go on from there and cast your school board vote for a qualified candidate who cares.

To the Editor:

A recent letter proclaimed that Hicksville is faced with a record tax increase - 51.49 or 7.2%. This is simply not the truth! In the last ten-year period, three other years - 1974-5, 1975-6 and 1983-4 - had higher increases by percent - 11.1%, 9.1% and 9.9% respectively. One year, 1983-84 had a higher increase by dollar amount - \$1.86.

This year's budget is a very accurate reflection of your educational needs. There is money for training workshops in new programs to strengthen the skills of our teachers. We have new programs for your children in writing and study skills. We have a computer literacy program for all the primary grades district wide. We have many cultural arts programs for all the students with special talents. In the secondary schools we have eight levels of instruction from basic through advanced. We have various developmental programs for the special education student district wide. We continue in 1984-85 to have our Curriculum Council, which includes input from parents, teacher and staff. Most importantly, for the large majority of our residents we have an extensive and enriching program of adult education and to suit their needs and tastes.

An example of a new program which has proven measurably successful is In-Depth Studies. Once a year, students from all over the district prepare displays, simulations and presentations which they and their stimulating teachers invite everyone to experience. The name given to this wealth of education is Expo II. Share a part of the excellence you and I can be proud of in our school district. On Monday, June 4, in the administration building and the senior high school auditorium you will find learning at work. Time schedules can be obtained from your elementary school principal.

Beginning in September, we will have begun a new after school recreational program for our elementary students throughout the district. More details will be available soon.

Remember, vote for the budget and you, the residents, will be the winners.

To the Editor:

For the past two weeks I have read Mr. Schwartz' self-proclaimed accomplishments as a School Board Trustee. Since it is not unusual for an incumbent to take credit for the actions of a corporate body I won't comment on that.

However, there are issues in

his May 25 letter that must be addressed.

The Policy Committee like all Board Committees was established to encourage community participation in the policy making process. Yet, for 2 1/2 years, until December of 1983 that committee functioned as a committee of one. Mr. Schwartz chose not to solicit community input. Only after repeated public requests from myself and members of the community did he open his committee to the public. His second committee meeting took place in April, 1984, followed by a flurry of meetings, in what I can only conclude was his re-election fever.

Mr. Schwartz also addressed his need to support the powerful voice of the people. Let's set the record straight!

Two years ago, when the teachers were without a contract and the community was enraged, a public meeting was held to hear the community's concerns. Several hundred residents came. During that very heated meeting Mr. Schwartz abruptly stood up, slammed his briefcase closed and stormed out of the meeting. He was brought back by a fellow Trustee. Are these the actions of a man who claims to be responsive to the voices of the people?

During last year's budget hearing several hundred residents spoke against the Board's fragmenting the budget and having elementary foreign language and elementary guidance as separate referenda items. Mr. Schwartz voted to eliminate both of these programs over the angry protests of the community. When these two propositions failed, the residents of Hicksville presented the Board with petitions from hundreds of community members. Their request for a referendum fell on deaf ears. Mr. Schwartz reminded the community that their petitions were only advisory and he voted against a motion for a referendum. Does this sound like a Trustee who will "defend the community's right to have their voices heard in our educational system?" I believe his actions disqualify his self-proclamations!

**Parenting is  
not a snap**

**Q.** My problem is that I come home from work tired and cranky, and I can't seem to help it. My job (I'm a saleswoman in a high-fashion women's clothing store) is very demanding because the customers are. They should be. They pay a lot for the stuff they buy.

So when I get home (a few nights after 9 o'clock) I'm worn out.

My children aren't, though. They are 5 and 8 years old and have a lot of energy. My husband is very patient with them even though his work is just as frustrating and tiresome as mine often is (he's an insurance salesman).

So how about some hints for preserving my sanity? Tell me it isn't easy to be a good parent.

**A.** Right on target! It isn't easy to be a good parent!

The first few minutes after getting home may be the most crucial time in a family's day. That's when everyone seems to have an accumulation of things to talk about and a need to be listened to.

Most working parents require at least a brief chance to take a

deep breath in order to slide into the home setting. It can come in different ways for different people: A calm ride home (freeways seldom provide that one); preparing dinner together if it can be done calmly and not in too hurried a manner; a few minutes of television watching together; a short reading period for all family members, all reading their own choices; conversation, taking turns; a quiet game.

Since your husband may have a calmer nature, perhaps he could share the "coming home" period with your children, and you might be more involved in the going-to-bed period of talk, reading together or TV involvement. Working parents can set up a schedule of shared responsibilities that satisfy their personalities as well as their children's needs.

I hope other readers will send in any approaches they've used successfully. I'll share them with this reader.

**Q.** Thank you, thank you, for your column on safety belts and how one of them saved your

daughter's life. You gave our family the greatest gift anyone ever received.

Our son and his high school friends always bragged about what great drivers they are and how unimportant safety belts are.

Then your article appeared, and I shared it with him. He was impressed and showed it to some of his buddies, but it didn't change their minds. Safety belts are useless, they told him, and went right on ignoring them.

Then, one rainy night their care skidded (three of them were in it), went off the road at a high speed, turned over several times — and you know the rest.

My son was one of them. He had his belt on. He was badly injured, but will be all right in time. The other two were thrown out and died at the scene.

Your experience and ours should be such a lesson to other families. If only they'll listen to us.

**A.** Your story has been repeated so much around the country. Emergency room physicians in hospitals see it day after day.

Good luck with the rest of your boy's recovery, and thank you for writing.

**Q.** Our little boy is happy, delightful, fun to be with — but one problem dominates my life with him.

I just haven't been able to get him toilet trained.

I know a lot of people go through this stage with their children, and seem to come out of it unscathed, but it's no joy while it's going on.

Help, please.

**A.** This subject continues to be one that remains high on the list of parental concerns. In "self-defense," I've now written an article about it, and it's on its way to you.

**Q.** I've been in the hospital for two weeks. I'm all alone and the doctor wants me to go to a nursing home until I get back on my feet. Will Medicare pay for this? — T.L.

**A.** Medicare does not pay for care in nursing homes. After hospitalization, Medicare may pay for care in a skilled nursing facility if you need and actually get skilled nursing or rehabilitation services for a condition which was treated in the hospital. There is no payment for care that is strictly custodial.

**Q.** I won't be 65 for several months but I will continue working for at least two more years.

My wife is older than me and is upset because she can't get Medicare until I retire. That's what a friend told her. — I.R.

**A.** Her friend's advice is wrong. Your wife can get Medicare at 65 as long as you are eligible even though you're still working.

Get all the particulars at your local Social Security office, which is the best place to get the correct answers about Social Security and Medicare.

**Q.** I thought I was all set to apply for Social Security but I can't find my birth certificate. Do I have to have it before I can apply? — P.T.

**A.** You should write for a certified copy of your birth certificate right away. In the meantime you should file your application at your local Social Security office.

If you were baptized prior to age 5 and you have a copy of your baptismal certificate, that may be used in lieu of a birth certificate.

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**Q.** I get monthly Social Security disability payments because I was hurt on the job. Workmen's Compensation has just notified me of a settlement.

Will this affect my Social Security benefits? — H.E.

**A.** Yes, it will. The amount of your Social Security payments may be reduced. You must notify Social Security of the amount of your settlement and the date you get it.

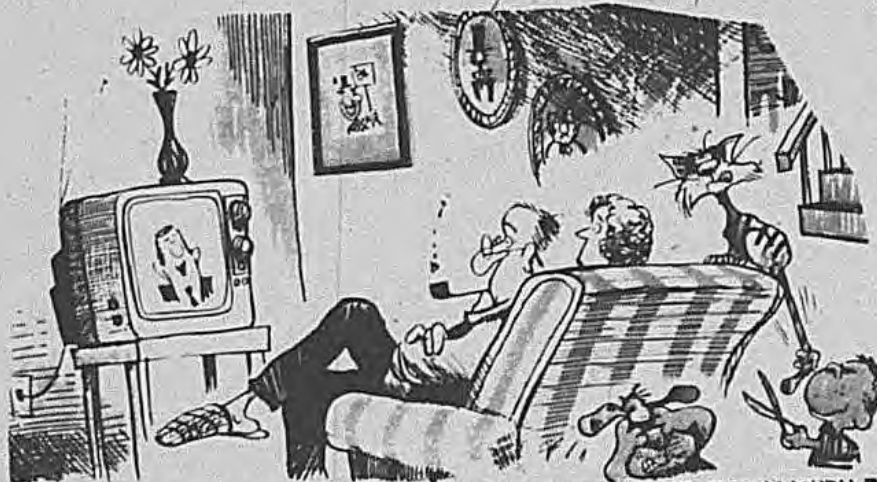

## Bill Burgess: Birth of A Salesman

When Alabama Governor George Wallace vowed in 1963 to never allow a black inside the segregated halls of the University of Alabama, he was two years too late. A talented young black high school student, William H. Burgess III, has gotten there first, in 1961.

"I was barely into my teens at the time, but I was very interested in science. It was the Sputnik era, and I'd decided I wanted to be a doctor. So, every day after 1 p.m., I was let out of my high school early so I could use a lab at the university for some studies I was doing. I guess no one told Wallace about me," the 35 year old Birmingham native recalls with a smile.

George Wallace may not have noticed him, but others have. Breaking the color bar at Alabama was only the first step in an unusual career that culminated recently when the former science whiz became president of Furniture Consultants of Long Island, a million-dollar furniture dealership selling, installing and servicing a broad range of high-quality contemporary office furniture and systems. Bill Burgess is a businessman with an unusual success story to tell.

He began making his way early, just as his grandfather did when he launched a trucking and moving business in segregated Birmingham: "Contrary to what people assume about blacks in the South, segregation required blacks to establish their own businesses. Under Jim Crow, people had to band together. We had our own banks, doctors, dentists; a positive was forged out of a negative situation.

"My grandfather was able to build his business among the black community, but gradually he was able to broker himself into wider markets within the mainstream society until, today, under my father, the business extends throughout the Southeast."

He grew up in an atmosphere in which he was expected to achieve, and he did, particularly in the realm of science.

His work at the University of Alabama, for example, wasn't merely the afterschool experiments of a precocious kid. Burgess conducted studies of the fertility drug Thalidomide. His experiments showed that, indeed, chicken embryos exposed to the drug became damaged. Ultimately, the government banned the drug.

A clutch of science awards and citations followed Burgess during his high school years. He attended the prestigious Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire during summer vacations. At the age of 16, he graduated from high school and began attending Lake Forest College in Illinois. It was there that Burgess felt a new era in American history take hold of him: "It was the flower-child generation, and I'd begun to see my research work as a little Frankensteinian. I decided to swing over to a path that concerned itself with beauty and esthetics. I became an art history major, and it was a welcome change."

A degree in art history from Lake Forest in 1969 set him on a path that led to notable jobs in the New York City art world. He was named a Chester Dale Fellow and Assistant Curator of 20th Century Art at the Metropolitan Museum of Art right out of college. He was also director of education at the Studio Museum of Harlem and, in the early 1970s, he coordinated the Board of Education's Arts Resources Program while studying for a graduate degree in Egyptology in New York University.

"I worked during that time at redirecting energy and attention back toward the black community, trying to make art available to people who weren't normally exposed to it."

It was during a fundraising effort on behalf of the Brooklyn Children's Museum that Burgess discovered a new and unexpected direction for his talents: "I found I was a pretty good salesman. This was in '74. I was in a job that was paying a good salary but which also wouldn't grow. At the time, I was going out with a girl who worked for Xerox, and when I saw how much she was making, I thought I could too."

He was right. After joining the Xerox Corporation as a management trainee and salesman, his career path began an upward spiral steeper than the soaring inflation rates of the day. In short order, he went from salesman with Xerox to district manager at the Steelcase Corporation, to regional manager for American Seating Company and to national accounts director at the Gunlocke Company; all well regarded, growing manufacturers in the "high end" of the contemporary office furniture and systems business. Burgess discovered that he felt at home in the office-furniture industry, perhaps because it harkened back to the family business.

In 1975, shortly after turning 30, Burgess met David and Larry Itkin, energetic businesspeople who, together with architect John Varacchi, were partners in Furniture Consultants, Inc., located in midtown Manhattan. All were of similar age and well experienced in the office furniture industry.

Burgess could see that FCI did things differently than other furniture dealers; the company worked closely with leading architects and designers who created and redesigned corporate offices. The esthetic in Burgess was drawn to this new style of doing business, with its emphasis on high-quality "designer" furniture.

And the businessman in Burgess could hardly ignore FCI's fantastic growth rate - in the four years since its inception, company sales had shot from \$750,000 to \$20 million. In 1981, Burgess teamed up with the New York based company and opened Furniture Consultants of Long Island. He retains a 51 percent ownership and controlling interest in the business, and last year had \$2 million in sales.

Despite the apparently divergent paths his life has taken, Burgess sees an underlying pattern made necessary by changing times. "It's not like when our parents were establishing themselves. Then, there wasn't much experimentation - they tied their knot and hung on."

"While I was growing up, we had to deal with many more things. I think the challenge of a period like the '60s has been to reconcile the experiments of those days with making a living today. Those people who've done that are the ones making it through the Big Chill now."

What about the persistence of racism? George Wallace may have yielded in Alabama, but the end of segregation hasn't brought an end to racism.

"For me, I've always been able to get along pretty well with people. But when I run into something like that - something that's not in my control - I either confront it or go around it to some higher authority. If you let that stuff in, it's like poison. You have to protect your sense of self-esteem. If you don't, you're doomed, in my opinion. And that goes for anybody." His advice for young people trying to break into the contract furniture business may be unorthodox in this time of specialization, but it follows his own experience.

"Today, lots of young people are doing things like going for the MBAs right out of school. I think that kind of early specialization can prevent a person from realizing other opportunities. There was a time when, for example, being a blacksmith was a dependable way of making a living. But times change, and people have to be able to adjust. A broad-based education and experience allows you to do that, to fashion a life for yourself."

A. You just say, "Mrs. Jones", or "Mr. Jones", or more usual now, "John Jones". If you are a very special Jones, the person who introduces you finally to the guest of honor sometimes has the opportunity to define you, as it were. The receiving line should never be held up for lengthy conversations, however.

Q. Will you please describe the correct procedure for introducing one couple to another (1) when the couples are approximately the same age, (2) when one couple is older or more distinguished in station than the other?

M.J.

A. When the couples are about the same age it doesn't matter whose names are mentioned first. When one couple is older or more distinguished - or perhaps guests in your town - you introduce the younger couple.

Q. When ladies already seated at a luncheon table are introduced to each other, do they shake hands, seated, when they may conveniently do so?

T.G.

A. No, they bow. In this country, there is very little shaking hands between women, although the hostess always shakes hands with her guests, male and female, and anyone acting the role of hostess - say, a teacher at the school, a woman representative of a firm being visited by outsiders - would rise and shake hands with the visitors, women as well as men.

Q. There was a receiving line, with the hostess first in the line and our representative next to her. As the guests entered I noticed that there was some confusion as to who should be greeted first - the hostess or the representative next to her. What is the rule when the host holds such a prominent position?

A. The rule is always the same. One greets first the person first in line, who is the hostess or the acting hostess, always shaking hands. Occasionally there is a line made up only of men, and in this case the first man encountered is the one one greets first. As a matter of fact, very often the most important guest, for whom the reception is given, is placed in the middle of the line.

Q. When a match is used, would a man light his own cigarette first and then his woman companion? If a lighter is used is this still true?

P.M.

A. A man lights his woman companion's cigarette first. In a high wind he lights his own cigarette first, then he lights his companion's cigarette with his own cigarette if he does not have a lighter or if the lighter does not work in a high wind. In using a lighter he needs merely to hesitate long enough to be sure that the flame is adequate, then he lights his companion's cigarette.

Q. How do you eat corn on the cob?  
H.F. A. This is only for informal eating and is best eaten on the cob. A long ear may be broken in half, but only a row or so at a time is buttered and seasoned, never the whole ear at once. A mixture of salt and pepper may be made unnoticeably, on the side of the plate, then spread a little at a time on the corn with a knife as you are eating it. If the corn is to be cut off the cob, the cob is held on one end with the left hand and the kernels cut off a few rows at a time with the dinner knife. The kernels are then seasoned and eaten a forkful at a time, as one eats peas.

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## Cooking Corner

- 2 tbsps. salad oil
- 2 tbsps. chili sauce
- ½ cup honey
- 1 tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. ginger
- ¼ tsp. garlic powder

Place chicken in baking pan. Mix remaining ingredients, pour on chicken. Cover and refrigerate 1 hour or more, turning chicken over occasionally. Bake chicken 30-45 minutes in 375-F oven. Reserve marinade and brush chicken occasionally.

### MARINATED SHRIMP

- Marinade:  
 1½ cups salad oil  
 ¾ cup white vinegar  
 1½ tbsps. salt (less to taste)  
 2½ tbsps. celery seeds  
 3 tbsps. capers  
 ¼ tsp. Tabasco sauce  
 2 cups sliced red onion rings  
 2 bags Crab Boil (available at fish markets and supermarkets)  
 2½ lbs. large peeled, uncooked shrimp  
 3 qts. water  
 4 tbsps. salt

Combine marinade ingredients and set aside. Bring water, salt and Crab Boil to fast boil in large pot. Add shrimp, return to boil, cook 2 minutes (or less). Remove from fire, put shrimp in colander and cool with cold running water. Cool cooking liquid. When liquid cools, return shrimp to cooking liquid and soak 1 hour. Drain shrimp, add to marinade and refrigerate at least 24 hours. Use toothpicks to serve. About 40 marinated shrimp.

- Crab Boil:  
 ¼ cup mustard seeds  
 ¼ cup coriander seeds  
 2 tbsps. dill seeds  
 2 whole allspice  
 2 tbsps. dried red pepper  
 1 tsp. cayenne pepper  
 6 bay leaves

Put all ingredients in cheesecloth and secure with string. Place in boiling water.

### GREEK CHICKEN ROLL

- 1 stewing chicken
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 3 tbsps. pimiento
- 2 tbsps. dry mustard
- 2 tbsps. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. dried mint
- 1 tsp. salt

Bring chicken and broth to boil; reduce heat, cover and simmer 45 minutes. Remove chicken and set aside to cool. Boil broth until reduced to ¾ cups. Skim off fat and cool until thick and gelatinous. Meanwhile, remove meat from bones and discard skin. Chop meat in ¼-inch pieces (4 cups).

In medium bowl, mix jelled chicken broth and all seasonings. Then stir in chicken. Shape into loaf. Cover and refrigerate until firm.

### STUFFED PEA PODS

Wash Chinese pea pods and dry them. Slit them to make pocket and stuff with cream cheese, using a pastry bag or knife.

### HONEY-GLAZED CHICKEN WINGS

- 1½ to 2 lbs. chicken wings or pieces
- ¼ cup soy sauce

### CHERRY CHOCOLATE CAKE

- ¾ cup sugar
- ¾ cup oil
- 2 eggs
- 2 tbsps. vanilla
- 2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 1 cup walnuts
- 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 can cherry pie filling

Mix sugar, oil, eggs, vanilla, flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt, then add walnuts, chocolate chips and pie filling. Bake in bundt pan in 350-F oven approximately 1 hour. Serve plain or glaze with 1 cup confectioner's sugar mixed with 2 tablespoons milk.



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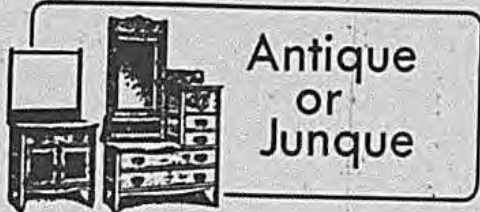
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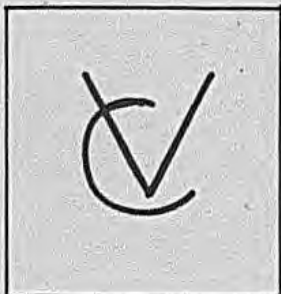

A. Your pitcher was made by Charles Volkmar in Greenpoint, N.Y., between 1879 and 1888. It would sell in the \$175 to \$225 range.

Q. Several times you have referred to cloisonne in your column. Would you please explain just what it is?

A. Cloisonne is made by attaching metal wires to a metal base. The spaces between the wires are filled with various colored enamels that are then fired at high temperatures.

The result is a pleasing design or picture with the different colors separated by the wires. The metals used are brass and copper.

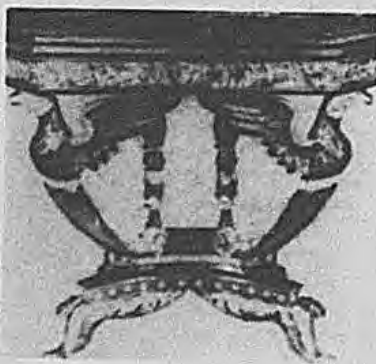

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# Here's How

**Q.** I need to know if heavy vinyl upholstery can be painted? I have a custom built-in breakfast area. The seating is light beige vinyl which no longer goes with my kitchen color scheme.

**A.** I know there are spray paint products on the market, but these do not include the color that I need. I would appreciate your advice. — Jean McC.

A. Vinyl fabrics can be painted, although it is very important that you use only quality primers and paints, because only quality products have lasting adhesion and hiding power and retain their color brilliance.

Here is the proper paint system for each type of vinyl surface, as recommended by the National Paint and Coatings Association:

For smooth vinyl fabric without design, first brush on a coat of alkyd-based flat paint to act as a primer. Wait for this to dry. Then apply a final coat of either quality latex paint or alkyd paint, or enamel.

For smooth vinyl fabric with design, use a latex primer-sealer — not an ordinary latex — to prevent the printed design from bleeding through. After this has dried, apply any quality latex or

alkyd finish as a top coat.

For textured vinyl fabric, use an oil-based primer-sealer as the first coat, followed by any quality alkyd paint or enamel. You may use an alkyd flat as a prime coat if you cannot get an oil primer-sealer.

Check with your paint dealer for choice of colors and assurance that you are getting the right product.

Another note of caution: These recommendations are for vinyl surfaces, and not necessarily for a seat covering.

It may be that painted vinyl will not wear as well for a seating area.

**Q.** Eight years ago, we bought a home that was three years old. It has a wooden deck and wooden steps with a railing going down three flights. It was painted a red-wood color at the time, but the paint will not stay on, especially on the walking area. We have had it scraped and painted over and over again and it seems that nothing will last very long.

**A.** My husband says it is either pine or fir, and should never have been painted. However, it was painted and is there anything we can do that would make it look

**A.** I suspect, from your description, only the top side of the decking was finished. If so, the underside of the deck, with no protection, has been absorbing dampness rising from the ground. This causes discoloration, peeling paint, and eventual rotting.

The only solution is to treat the underside of the decking with wood preservative, followed by aluminum paint to act as a vapor barrier.

Another suggestion is to prevent ground moisture from rising by covering the area below the deck and steps with overlapping strips of moisture- and vapor-proof building paper or polyethylene plastic.

If the ground is level, heavy rocks are enough to seal the seams, otherwise use roofing cement. Allow several days for thorough drying of the wood on the underside before repainting the deck and steps.

Mrs. Harold W. of Traverse City, Mich., asks a similar question.

I hope the explanation above offers a solution to her problem.

**Q.** I am planning a slope of three feet on a 16-foot roof, using strip asphalt shingles. Is this sufficient? — Carl N.

**A.** It would not be sufficient. Minimum practical pitch should be four inches to the foot.

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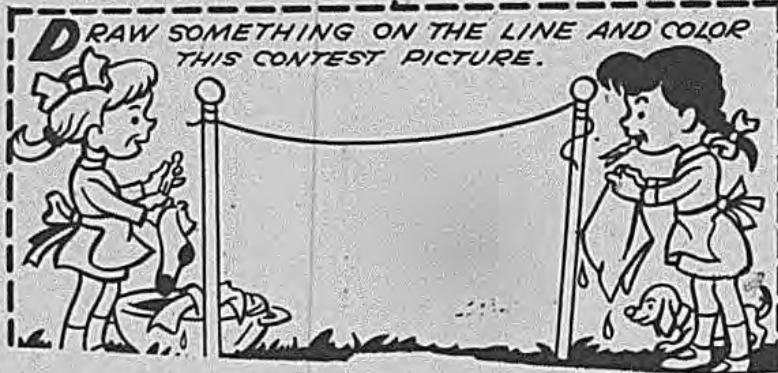

inarian or a veterinarian that he or she designates is always available to handle real emergencies.

In many localities veterinarians cooperate in sharing emergencies for the entire community. Some veterinarians routinely send all of their clients to emergency clinics. The location of the emergency veterinary clinic in relation to your residence is very important.

You should expect all the staff of the veterinary clinic to be courteous and act professionally at all times. Each member of the staff should be well-groomed and dressed neatly. All of the staff should treat your animals with care. They should all have an attitude of compassion toward your pets. Any unnecessary rough handling should not be tolerated.

Your veterinarian should be willing to openly talk to you about your pet's problems and explain fully all recommendations regarding treatments or procedures. You should find a veterinarian with whom you are comfortable talking.

If you expect competent treatment of your pets, you should be willing to pay for it. Veterinarians spend a minimum of six years in college prior to being eligible to take licensing examinations. Hospital equipment, surgical procedures, radiographic techniques, ultrasound techniques, and medicines are essentially the same as those used in human medicine. Therefore, the costs of establishing and operating a veterinary practice are usually very high.

Fortunately, most practicing veterinarians genuinely love animals and enjoy working with their owners. Do not end your search until you find one with whom you are completely comfortable.

## Selecting a veterinarian

**Q.** How should we select a veterinarian? We have recently purchased our first Boston bull terrier and want to do everything correctly.

There are over 10 veterinarians listed in the Yellow Pages for our area. Please give us some advice.

**A.** Selecting a veterinarian for your new pet is a very serious matter. Recommendations from the breeder or store owner that you bought your dog from or from other pet owners in your area will help you make a tentative selection.

Following making a tentative selection based on recommendations from others, you should visit his or her veterinary clinic and answer the following questions:

How convenient is the location of the veterinary clinic? Location is extremely important, particularly during emergency situations. Heavy traffic or long distances can greatly increase frustrations during emergencies.

You should check to see if the hospital is scrupulously clean. The reception area and examination rooms should be clean and in order whenever you arrive. The clinic should not have offensive odors. Hair, debris, etc., from previous patients should not be evident in the examination rooms.

Likewise, kennel areas should be clean and smell fresh. If you board your dog or if it is necessary for your dog to remain in the clinic overnight, your veterinarian should be willing to show you the kennel or cage area.

It is important to find out whether the veterinarian schedules patients by appointment or only has open office hours. Open office hours often lead to long waits. With the exception of occasional emergencies, you should expect your veterinarian to be on time for appointments.

You should ask your veterinarian how emergencies are handled. Veterinarians, like everyone else, do not like to be bothered at home about trivial problems. However, you should expect that your veter-
