## Voters Approve Budget, Moment of Silence

Hicksville voters approved the 1984-85 school budget on Wednesday, June 13, 2191 to 1463. In an overwhelming turnout, Proposition #2 was passed with 3011 votes to 774. This proposition directs the Board of Education to reinstate its policy pertaining to conducting a Moment of Silent Meditation at the start of each school day. The Board discontinued the practice in February but agreed to place the matter on the ballot in June for voter approval. In the race for School Board Trustee, Jay Schwartz was re-elected with 2052 votes to Bernard Goldman's 447 and John Montalto's 1239. Lawrence Moor unseated John Ayres 2071 to 1614 and Honey Singer, with 1499 votes, lost her seat on the Board to Daniel MacBride who received 2186 votes. All positions are for three year terms.

The Board unanimously approved the appointment of Richard Hogan as Principal at the Senior High School during the business portion of the June 13th meeting. Mr. Hogan has been acting principal since the departure of Dr. William Rieck. His annual salary will be \$51,000 and his position is effective as of June 14.

Dr. Daniel T. McCann was appointed Principal of the Old Country Road School and will replace Mr. Louis Penque who is retiring at the end of the school year. Richard Greenfield, current Assistant Principal at the Junior High School, was appointed Department Chair, Vocational and Occupational Education. His present position has been terminated.

The following staff members were granted tenure effective in August and September of 1984: Robert Greenberg, Carolyn Halperin, Grace Marra, Patricia Massa, Barbara Meyer, Andrew Rosen, Tobey Rosof, Margot Louthan, Patricia Musynske, Roberta Soroka, Rita Schulman and Adrienne Rosenberg.

In addition, the Board approved the resignations, for purposes of retirement, to: Pauline Jonason, Senior H.S. art teacher; Marjorie Giannelli, 3rd grade teacher, Woodland Avenue School; Vincent DeTrinis, music teacher, Junior High; Rose Eckstein, 2nd grade teacher, Dutch Lane School; Anne Hansen, 5th grade teacher, Fork Lane School; Maynard Munch, science teacher, Senior High; Diana D'Avino, physical education teacher at East Street and Burns Avenue Schools; Beatrice McNamle, art teacher, Senior High. All employees will officially retire on June 30 or July 1 of this year.

The next regular meeting scheduled by the Board of Education will be held on Wednesday, June 27 at 8:15 p.m. in the Administration Building. The annual Reorganization Meeting is planned for the first week in July.

**Five Gerbils Stolen From School**

The 2nd Squad reports the details of a burglary in a school in Plainview sometime between 12:01-6:15 a.m. June 13.

Head custodian John Gaugneur of the Jamaica Avenue Elementary School, Jamaica Avenue, Plainview was informed by an unidentified kindergarten

teacher that someone had entered Room 102 and took 5 gerbils from a cage.

One of the animals was found hung on a string, 2 others were apparently dissected with scissors and 1 or 2 others were burnt and 1 other partially flushed in a toilet.

No other loss was reported. The investigation is continuing.

**Students Raise Funds For Statue Of Liberty**

In the past few months, Mrs. Hansen's 5th graders from the Fork Lane School in Hicksville took up the challenge to help in raising funds for the Statue of Liberty restoration, needed for the observance of the 1986 Centennial Celebration. This was a class project and it was the hope of the 17 students, that they might lead the way, in having private individuals help in financially supporting this most important community effort.

The students decided that they could raise some monies through the sale of both flower and vegetable plants, which they would raise from seeds. They also sold ice cream in the lunch room for two weeks and raised another few dollars from the collection of pop-corn bags. These precious funds were placed within a Statue of Liberty Renovation Fund.

During the past year, another program was undertaken, where in the students, while working on their social studies, developed a number of drawings and poetry to the memory of the late Joseph Stanley Hydrusko. Joseph Hydrusko was being considered for our Nation's highest honor, the prestigious "Congressional Medal of Honor" because of his heroic efforts in saving the lives of over 300 seamen at Pearl Harbor, during December 7 and 8, 1941. Joseph Hydrusko passed away from a freak aircraft accident and was buried in our Nation's Arlington Cemetery, with full military honors on July 18, 1983. In observance of his countless buddies who had paid the supreme sacrifice at the beginning of WW II, at Pearl Harbor, Joseph Hydrusko had for the past 13 years, flown over the Statue of Liberty, and dropped his bouquet of roses which had been blessed by the Pope, and Joe shouted his prayers to God.

His many friends in Long Island and the Nation decided to carry on his tradition; so the "Flight over his Lady" was carried out on December 7, 1983.

It seemed to be appropriate that the 1984, fifth grade students of Mrs. Hansen at Fork Lane School, would accept this most interesting challenge. It will be noted that their program to raise funds has amounted to over \$200. They are to be commended for their most genuine interest and caring for one of our Nation's most precious treasures. During these most troubled times, it is encouraging to note that there is a spark of patriotism which could very well be developed into a National school room effort.

## Taxes Due

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Gary F. Musciello reminded residents that the second half of the 1984 General Tax Levy is due on July 1 but may be paid without penalty through August 10.

"By law, a taxpayer has a 40 day grace period from the date the tax is due during which time payment may be made without penalty," Musciello stated. After that 40 days a penalty is attached for each month the tax remains unpaid.

Residents may pay in person at the Tax Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, at the Hicksville Annex, Newbridge Road and Duffy Avenue, and at the Massapequa Annex, John J. Burns Town Park, Merrick Road, or they may pay by mail. Stub #2 of the tax bill should be included with the payment. Musciello noted that if a resident has not paid the first half of the 1984 General Tax Levy they may not pay the second half until payment has been made for the first half.

## Our Children

### Reading readiness

By Willard Abraham

**Q.** My wife has a reading "fetish" when it comes to our 3-year-old. I feel sorry for the little guy.

She wants to be sure he gets off to a good start reading when he goes to school, so she has begun to push him to learn letters and words. He gets upset, she becomes frustrated, and I can't stand it anymore.

It's obvious to me that he is not ready for all of that pressure, but she goes right on anyway.

A. I hope that the article I've sent you is useful. It is called "Helping Your Child Get Ready to Read." I'll send a copy to anyone who forwards a stamped, self-addressed envelope to me. (Please state the name of the article so I get the right one in the mail to you.)

Some children are ready during the preschool years for the start of a formal reading program, but most are not.

Good preschool teachers know that broadening children's experiences and reading to them are two of the approaches that pay off. Such teachers talk about "reading readiness" and it's an important factor to consider.

If your youngster is registered in a preschool, it may be worthwhile for you and your wife to discuss this matter with the teachers there. You'll then be able to avoid a possible conflict with the techniques they use in preparing children to read.

**Q.** Our 16-year-old son is an extremely cautious driver, but he faces a problem just because of that carefulness.

He is part of a group of really quite nice boys and girls. A few of them have begun to be critical of this trait of his, and he just doesn't know how to handle it.

He doesn't want to lose their friendship, but neither does he want to become a careless driver as some of them are. Any suggestions?

A. It sounds as though there are others among his friends who feel

as he does, perhaps even more of them than there are of the critical type. If the larger groups sticks with him on this issue, he may feel more secure in his efforts to be cautious on the road.

In fact, with their help he may be able to convince the others how dangerous their own carelessness is.

A valuable ally might be the driver training instructors at their school. They have a lot of facts, figures and especially pictures that can provide supporting evidence showing that your son is on the right track.

Your encouragement in this potentially difficult situation is important, so stick with him.

**Q.** My husband is dead set against our daughter becoming a teacher, and it isn't for the usual reason of too little income.

His objection is based on the idea he has that all teachers look alike — dull, dismal, colorless, old. He uses words like that freely in talking to her which results in frequent fits of tears on her part.

I know he's wrong, but I haven't been able to reason with him.

A. It's obvious that he hasn't been in a school lately, almost any school, at any level.

I have, and you can take my word for it that I've seen some of the prettiest, most tastefully dressed young women that any other professional setting would be glad to have.

They aren't all young, of course, and they aren't all women, but as a total group they can hold their own for intelligence, a sense of humor and awareness of the world around them, as well as appearance.

Every occupational field has its "duds," and teaching is no exception. But for him to generalize in the direction he has is both inaccurate and unfair.

A visit or two to a nearby school may help enlighten him.

## Your Social Security



### Benefits now subject to income tax

**Q.** I read something about Social Security benefits being taxed. I never heard of this before. Is it something new? — G.P.

A. Yes, this was one of the recent changes in Social Security.

Starting with the tax year 1984, if you have substantial income in addition to your Social Security benefit, up to one-half of your annual benefits may be subject to the federal income tax. No one will pay taxes on any more than half the Social Security benefits he or she receives.

**Q.** My brother, who was never married, recently died in a rest home. The administrator there told me he had willed his belongings to me before he died.

Will I also get his Social Security benefit? — B.T.

A. Social Security benefits cannot be willed to anyone. The lump sum death payment can only be paid to a surviving spouse or eligible child.

**Q.** I receive half of my husband's Social Security. As a widow will I still receive half of his Social Security or the full amount of what he receives? — H.L.G.

A. At age 60 you can receive a reduced widow's benefit which is approximately 71 percent of your deceased husband's rate. However, the full amount would be payable if you took benefits at age 65, providing that he never elected to take reduced benefits.

**Q.** If I take early retirement at age 62, does my wife draw half of my age 65 benefit or half of my age 62 benefit? — Anonymous

A. A spouse's benefit is always a percentage of the retired worker's age 65 benefit rate. If the spouse is 65 at the time benefits are elected, the spouse's rate would be 50 percent. At age 62 the rate would be 37.5 percent.

## Most Input Callers Against 10 Cent Bottle Deposit

Most callers to Input are against an increase in the deposit on bottles and cans in answer to this question: "Will increasing the return deposit to ten cents increase the number of bottles and cans returned?"

### MORE DEBRIS

I cannot imagine them increasing the amount of deposit on beverages to 10 cents. What they are doing is trying to make believe that the only debris is caused by bottles and cans. The truth is that all types of paper and paper products are strewn throughout the area and this is what really looks bad. K.T.

### WRONG APPROACH

The problem is not that too few bottles and cans have been returned as those who check the statistics imagine. What has happened is that many of the bottles that were thrown away are being returned but there is a sizable number of people who do not want to go to the extra trouble of returning the bottles so they are throwing them out and taking the loss. But should it be the function of our elected officials to force people to use their time returning bottles? The idea was to keep the bottles and cans off of the streets and countryside. The deposit has done that as well as it could but with the great amount of other refuse thrown away it does not show. The problem was simply that the bottle bill was a poorly thought out idea that failed. The real tax should be levied on those caught littering in any way and the cost of enforcing this would be with large fines. Now we are penalizing everyone and letting the offenders off the hook. K.R.

### ANSWER IS 'YES'

In answer to the question whether ten cents would make people return bottles more than five cents, the answer has got to be yes. Whether we should put this added burden on everyone is another question. J.Y.

### ALL THE SAME

I do not know why anyone should be against a 10 cent deposit. When the bottles or cans are returned they get the money back. If this keeps everything cleaner then why worry? H.R.

### MORE MONEY

This is getting to be a foolish cycle. First all of the politicians like puppets pass the bill. Then when they see it is not working they say let's do the same thing but twice as much. At this rate we will have more of our money tied up in return bottles than we can afford. Forget the whole thing. P.L.

### SALES DOWN

The distributors certainly will like the idea of doubling the deposit to ten cents. Right now a large proportion of the bottles and cans are not returned and they are able to keep the money. This amount will increase considerably if the deposit is ten cents. But the sales may go down. K.E.

### SILLY IDEA

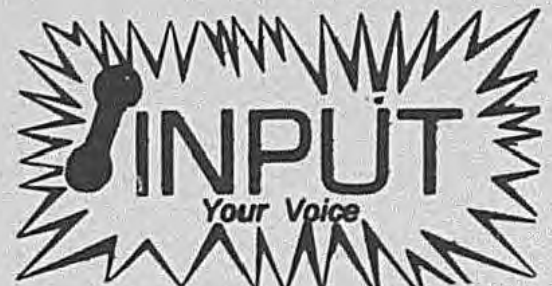
If the bottle bill is presently a success what is that debris we see out there? And how come the Town still charges us as much for sanitation cleanup. We are already paying an extra tax for unredeemed bottles and broken ones. The Bottle bill was a silly idea. N.Y.

### POOR POLITICIANS

Practically no one likes the bottle deposit bill, yet the politicians passed it unanimously. Practically no one likes seat belts yet the politicians are passing that bill. Do you wonder why people have no faith in politicians? Rather than handle the affairs they are elected to handle they try to run everyone's life. L.T.

### NOT EFFECTIVE

Logically, a ten cent deposit should increase the number of bottles and cans returned. In my opinion, even the current charge of a nickel could add up to a worthwhile refund but the cans and bottles strewn about have given no real evidence of the value involved. They are still scattered on the streets of the city and in suburbia generally tossed on the lawns in small or even large quantities as for example a carton of Budweiser cans (30 of them) neatly stacked in a carton carefully placed in the road near my home. Obviously, the young people are more interested in getting rid of the evidence than in the money involved, in the latter case \$1.50. As some one once said, "People are funnier than anybody!" They will go out of their way to save a few cents on a purchase and then think nothing of discarding a refund container because of the inconvenience. I think that a ten cent charge will build up the quantity of returns but not to the extent one might expect. The big winners will be the suppliers despite the extra expense involved. P.G.S.

## A Voice From The Past

"Strawberries! Strawberries! 10 cents a quart strawberries!" The words rang out and were heard in the streets. Children ogled and women came out of their homes to purchase or perhaps merely to watch neighbors purchase fresh fare for their tables. The fruit and vegetable peddler of the 20's and 30's through hindsight becomes a romantic figure out of the early third of our century. Of course you would have had to be present in those years to fully appreciate them today. Still their mystique might not be totally lost to others who hear of them or see them portrayed.

If we focus in on a typical peddler we see he was a male, dressed mainly in brown and gray, with clothing overly heavy for his occupation but needed because of the vagaries of the weather. His pants bagged and worn shoes turned up at the toes. His skin was leather-like, hands rough and strong. He wore a cap always, to shade his eyes, which were often blue as the Mediterranean. Or black, if he migrated further. The veins in his neck stood out and his voice sounded hoarse and raspy from all-day shouting. He was average in height and muscular, and from under his cap jet black hair peeked out. Young children fell in awe of the peddler, often for different reasons. Some had been told he not only sold fruit but bought misbehaving children. Others dreamed of the peddler's life with all the fresh fruit, whenever you wanted it. And a horse and cart which could, with imagination, be used as a covered wagon of the old West.

On the back of his cart hung swinging scales which may or may not have given correct weight. Who cared? He would always err on the side of generosity.

And the women would touch and smell and heft the wares from the wooden crates propped-up on the cart as salesmanship took over. Oranges, apples, plums and grapes.

"They're beautiful lady. Look at their color."

"Look a little over ripe to me."

"No..lady..they're fine. You don't want them hard. You have 'em tonight for dinner. Delicious, lady, believe me."

And generally he prevailed and generally he was absolutely right. The fruits and vegetables were delicious.

Where did this one-man business put all the nickles, dimes, pennies, and quarters he garnered? For prices were, by subsequent standards, scandalously low, and coins were rampant in everyday purchasing. His pants must have come with super pockets, while the old cigar box on the wagon held the bills. When the drayman reached the middle of the block he would rein his doleful brown steed to a rocking halt and swing ape-like down from the seat. The springs on the wagon axes would groan. Somehow everyone knew the man's name. It was, most always, "Tony", or if dark-eyed, "Louie". He would lean against an

iron-rimmed wooden-spoked wheel and acclaim his presence over and over again, looking nowhere in particular and shouting: "Mel-oons! Mel-oons! Get yer sweet ripe melons here!" Or: "Fresh, ripe-tomatoes! Tomatoes! 5 cents a pound! Get yer tomatoes here!" In the quiet of the Brooklyn street he seemed very forceful.

During the summer the poor horse was truly a beast of burden. Not only did he pull the man and his laden wagon mile after mile over rough cobblestone streets but the heat was intense and the flies unmerciful. His bony rump showed signs of rubbing of the harness-rubbing that could open sores.

The faint-hearted, usually young, impressionable girls, mourned at the sight and tried to chase the flies away, or ran for water to give the horse. Of course it was a lost cause. Misery would continue unabated.

Little ones timid at first, finally dared to reach and touch the animal. Tony, meanwhile, went about the hawking of his sales items, using superlatives as glibly as a poet.

"Carrots? Missus, they're sweet as a nut-tender, delicious, marvelous carrots! Look at the color, beautiful, right? How many bunches ya wanna? Nickel a bunch. How many Missus?"

Into a paper bag they went: melon, carrots, lemons and strawberries, with Tony totaling the prices on that brown bag using a heavy black lead pencil.

And so it went on until the block was served and the women returned to their homes. The peddler took the reins again, the feed bag swung from its hook underneath, the coins clanked in his pockets, and the wagon with grinding noise moved on, children watching, some running along the sidewalk.

Shortly, a voice called out to the next block.

"Strawberries! Strawberries! 10 cents a quart! Strawberries!"

**Q.** Tipping has always bothered me. I know there are many facets to it but why do I have to tip at all?  
J.C.

**A.** The answer to this is obvious if you think about it. If you want any control at all over what type of service you are going to get you should be able to give more or less according to how you have been treated.

Many people may not know it but waiters generally get a very low wage scale, some below minimum wage because tips can be expected to balance to scale and they do depend on between a 15 percent and 20 percent tip to make the job worthwhile.

**Q.** I feel a little awkward in reading a menu to ask the waiter what the entree includes. Is it correct to ask?

**A.** By all means ask. Generally if the menu does not state that the potato and vegetable are included the price is a la carte. But not always. So ask. The waiter will tell you and that is his job.

**Q.** This may be a little different but I wonder if you could determine what is the proper plate to use when serving salad during luncheon? I give luncheons on Saturdays, as a rule and I don't have wooden bowls but I do have flat glass plates. Could you help?

**A.** While some stores may say that there is only one kind of dish for salad this is not really true. Wooden bowls are good because they keep the dressing from running out. But of late many restaurants use glass bowls and small plates for salad. So long as a plate has a center indentation it may be used for salad. It is simply a matter of preference.

**Q.** Which is a better choice, ala carte or a full dinner?

**A.** The answer to this question is found in another one. How hungry were you when you went to dinner. Many times ala carte is a good choice because you only feel like eating a certain amount.

But on the other hand the restaurant usually chops a little off of the ala carte prices so that they can include them in a full dinner. Some restaurants say that they want to serve a full dinner because when the guests leave they feel that they have had a full meal and therefore the restaurant makes a good impression.

**Q.** Is the introduction of salad bars in some restaurants a way of saving labor?

**A.** The answer to that is simply that salad bars use almost as much labor as if the food were brought to you. The advantage of the salad bar to a restaurant is to let the diner feel that he can have as much of an item as he wants and also it provides a longer interval for preparing the main course so that guests are not pushing the waiter for faster service. These are some of the reasons for salad bars. Individual restaurants may have their own reasons for having them or not having them.

## Cooking Corner

# The magic of chicken

It's 5:10 p.m. You've gotten home late from your Nuke the Whales rally (burning Flipper in effigy took longer than you thought). The dog has chewed your "Yogurt and Yoga: How to Tell the Difference" handbook into hundreds of irreconcilable pieces. The cleaning woman left streak marks on your cheese knife.

But the real tragedy? The entire soprano section of the all-male glee club is coming tonight for dinner and absolutely no later than 6-ish.

First of all, forget about the cheese knife, pipe cleaners and discarded pantyhose can be fashioned into a variety of helpful household tools.

But more importantly, i.e. averting disaster with the dinner at hand, the choice is simple — take the chicken way out.

The reasons: Be it boiled, broasted, baked or barbecued, there's no place like the barn as a source of mealtime mastery. Fried, fricasseed, fruited or french sauced, chicken is first in the pecking order for fast yet fancy eating extravaganzas.

### CHICKEN SOUFFLE

- 6 slices white bread
- 3 cups diced chicken
- ¼ cup chopped onion
- ¼ cup chopped celery
- ¼ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 2 eggs, beaten
- ½ cup milk
- 1 (10¼ oz.) can cream of mushroom soup
- 1½ cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Trim crusts from bread. Cube two slices into bottom of an 8x8x2-inch buttered baking dish.

Combine chicken, vegetables, mayonnaise and salt. Spoon over bread. Cube remaining four slices of bread over top. Combine eggs with milk; pour over all. Cover and chill at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

When ready to bake, spread soup over top. Bake, uncovered, at 325 F about 1 hour. Sprinkle cheese over top last 5 minutes of baking. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 8 to 10 servings.

### SALADE BASILICO

- 2 cups loosely packed fresh basil leaves
- ½ cup fresh parsley
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- ¼ cup pine nuts or walnuts
- 3 large cloves garlic
- ½ cup olive oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ lb. (2 cups) fresh snap beans or snow peas, washed and trimmed
- 1 red pepper, seeded, cut in julienne strips
- 1 medium zucchini, cut in half lengthwise and thinly sliced

- 4 cups cooked, sliced chicken (about 1½ lbs.)
- 6 to 8 red potatoes, boiled, peeled and sliced
- Salad greens

Wash basil and parsley. Remove stems; dry thoroughly between paper towels.

In container of electric blender or food processor, blend basil, parsley, Parmesan cheese, pine nuts and garlic. Process 30 seconds or until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Add olive oil and salt; blend until smooth.

In large bowl combine basil sauce, snap beans, red pepper and zucchini; mix well. Gently fold in chicken and potatoes. Cover. Chill. Serve on salad greens. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### GERMAN CHICKEN SLAW

- 2 cups cabbage cut in long thin shreds
- ½ cup thinly sliced onion
- ¼ cup bottled creamy Russian dressing
- 2 tbsps. bacon bits
- 1 tsp. caraway seeds
- 1 (5 oz.) can chunk chicken
- Shredded mild cheddar cheese

In bowl, lightly toss all ingredients except cheese; chill at least one hour. Garnish with cheese. Makes about two cups, or 2 to 3 servings.

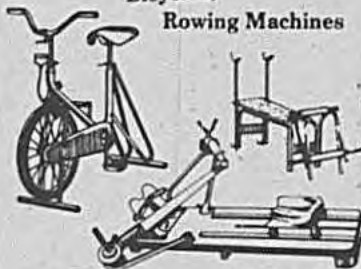

## Here's How

By Gene Gary

Q. I have yellowed oak kitchen cabinets and would like to clean them.

I believe I read once in your column to wash them with bleach. Do I have this right or do you have another method? Will you please run it again? — Susie S.

A. First try washing with a solution of trisodium phosphate. Mix 1 cup of trisodium phosphate with 1 quart of household bleach in 3 quarts of warm water. Rinse well, then dry with a soft cloth.

Yellowing of bleached wood takes place as the wood ages. It is a change in the wood itself or in its finish. It is not caused, as some people suppose, by a particular polish or wax. Yellowing is accelerated, however, by exposure to sunlight.

If the yellowing is severe in your case, consider refinishing.

Q. My friend has a Baccarat crystal decanter that has its stopper stuck tight. She has asked Baccarat for help. So far, no one has an answer to remove the stopper. Can you help? — Robert J. M.

A. You could try using dry ice. Put the dry ice in a plastic bag and wrap it around the neck of the



decanter. Leave for several minutes, then try gently to turn the stopper. Sometimes this is caused by a sticky substance.

If the dry ice treatment doesn't work, heat may do the job. Use a hair dryer and gently warm the neck of the decanter. Then test to see if the stopper can be removed. One of these methods should work.

Q. Your column is a gold mine of information and I hope you will be able to assist me.

After taking up a rubber-backed cotton carpeting on my tile-floored bathroom, a residue of goop was left. I have tried to remove it with a razor blade, scouring powder, ad infinitum. Nothing has succeeded so far.

The floor is approximately 60 years old, covered with hexagonal-shaped tiles, and the tape used to secure the carpeting was white, sticky on both sides. It was remarkably efficient but now refuses to come up. Thank you in advance for your help. — Billie F.L.

A. There are several things you can try. Spray 'n' Wash or Magic Wash, ordinarily used to remove spots and stains on clothing to be laundered, will sometimes accomplish the results you seek. At least it is worth a try.

## Vinegar has many real benefits

Dear John: I'm writing to tell you about vinegar and honey.

I take it once in the morning and once before I go to bed, and if I wake up later and can't sleep, I again take V&H. I keep a pint jar, half honey, half vinegar.

I take two teaspoons at a time. It's wonderful. I pray that this helps. — Mrs. E.N.

Dear John: In regards to vinegar, quite some years ago my mother was struck by a car and knocked down.

She refused to go to a doctor but used hot vinegar compresses for two weeks and all the black and blue bruises on the side of her face and over her eyes were healed. This happened when she was in her 50s and she lived to be almost 90 years old.

I also use vinegar to rub over meat, which is a good tenderizer. Mother also used vinegar in her water when boiling beef. I strongly recommend it. — Mrs. H.S.

P.S. Our neighbors drank it and all stayed thin.

Dear John: I am writing about the items in today's paper. As for vinegar helping arthritis, it is true.

I am a diabetic, so sweeteners were out and I just took a shot glass (about five teaspoons vinegar) in a glass of water once a day. It helps truly.

Also, if subject to varicose veins, rubbing vinegar on the legs where veins can be seen will help to make them go down.

It must be apple cider vinegar. Now I have found from my nutrition headquarters for all types of vitamins, an apple cider vinegar tablet. With these there is no taste, but still the results are the same. — Dorothy.

Dear Readers: Here are just some samples of the comments on vinegar which have been pouring in from readers. Thank you all very much.

They sort of tell their own story. For more details about the use of apple cider vinegar for arthritis, refer to our new arthritis leaflet.

Fruit pectin is still No. 1, but many readers apparently prefer and get good results from vinegar and honey.

The arthritis leaflet also gives Mrs. A.S.B.'s arthritis diet, a rigorous but helpful way to diet, and explains more about nightshade foods.

Also heat, using a hair dryer, will soften the adhesive enough so that the tape can be pulled loose. Then clean up any residue left on the floor with paint thinner or naphtha. Be very careful in using the latter, as it is flammable.

Q. My toilet tank has dirt or grime in it, and the bowl keeps getting a black ring. Is there any way I can clean the tank without the expense of a plumber? — LaVerne H.

A. Add about 1 cup of household bleach and 1/2 cup of liquid detergent to the water in the tank. Allow this to remain at least 15 minutes, then scrub the inside of the tank with a long-handled brush. Flush to remove the water from the tank and then scrub the toilet bowl with a good toilet bowl cleanser.

Your problem may be caused by hard water, in which case a water-softening unit would help.

Q. The paper across the back of an old framed print is brittle and torn. Is there a way to replace the paper back? — U.N.Y.

A. Completely remove the present paper back. Then cut a piece of heavy brown wrapping paper, slightly larger than the frame and moisten with water until limp. Blot off any surplus water. Apply a liquid glue to the back of the picture frame and lay the paper smoothly across. In drying, the paper will shrink and become very tight fitting. Trim off excess paper with a razor blade.

Nick: Burning is caused by ultraviolet rays. These rays are strongest in the mountains and at the seashore.

You can get burned when you are in the water. Even if you are under a beach umbrella, you are exposed to a certain percentage of burning rays.

You can get a severe burn even if it is cloudy or hazy.

Always use a sunscreen for your particular skin type. Reapply it generously.

Darker skin burns, too. It also needs sunscreen.

Get your tan slowly — 15 minutes the first day, 30 minutes the next, etc. Use good sense.

## A rare doll

Q. My doll is 14 inches tall, has sleep eyes, human hair wig, open mouth and ball joints. The mark is sketched as shown.  
Please tell what you can about its age and value.



A. Your doll was made by Kammer & Reinhardt in Waltershausen, Germany, in the early 20th century. The current value is about \$2,000, so you have a rare one.

Q. When I asked you about my elaborately carved teak chair you referred to it as "Chinese export" furniture. What does that mean?

A. Chinese export furniture was made in China expressly for export to America and Europe. It was made to look like what the experts thought Chinese furniture should look like.

Chinese household furniture was very plain with very little carving. In our opinion, it didn't look "Chinese."

The same applies to Chinese export porcelain: it was made to please us, it was quite different than the porcelain made for the Chinese people.

## Don't ignore animal bites

The risk of getting rabies from animal bites is much greater if the biting animal is a farm animal or a wild animal because they are less likely to have been vaccinated against the disease. Fortunately, most biting animals are not rabid. However, because the risk is so great, all biting animals should be captured and confined for observation. The length of observation required by law varies among various states and communities.

You should contact your local veterinarian, Humane Society or law enforcement agency for instructions regarding observation and confinement of biting animals. If a biting animal escapes, as much information as possible regarding its description (size, color, etc.) and the direction in which it escaped should be given to the local law enforcement agency.

If the biting animal is a pet, information regarding its rabies vaccination program will be requested. In most localities, vaccinated animals are not required to

wolves and coyotes may transmit rabies. The virus is transmitted through the saliva of infected animals.

**Q** Recently our 4-year-old son was bitten by a neighbor's dog while playing in our neighborhood park.

There were various opinions among our neighbors regarding what we should have done. The bite did not look serious. Our son provoked the dog by clawing and screaming at him. We do not want to cause our neighbors problems over this situation.

**What should we have done?**

**A** Bites by animals, whether they be pets, farm animals or wild animals can cause very serious wounds and following medical complications.

Although puncture wounds caused by dog or cat bites usually do not look serious, they can be quite dangerous because of the number of germs (bacteria and viruses) in the biting animal's mouth.

The threat of serious infection

and the risk of contracting tetanus and rabies are present following animal bites — dogs, cats, farm animals and wild animals such as skunks, foxes, bats, raccoons, be continued and observed for as long a period of time as unvaccinated animals. The animal's veterinarian should be able to supply all the necessary information regarding its vaccination history.

Following any animal bite, regardless of how insignificant the wound looks, you should contact your physician immediately and follow his directions exactly. Your physician may recommend antibiotics and injections to combat tetanus. Any necessary local wound treatment will be recommended.

If possible, the biting animal should be captured and your local veterinarian or local law enforcement agency should be contacted. All of the individuals, the physicians, veterinarians, and law enforcement authorities should communicate regarding the situation. The important thing following animal bites is to not ignore them. Animal bites can be quite serious.

Children should be taught to respect animals and to not provoke them. Parents should feel responsible for their children's actions.

CARE

Be sure the garment you select for active days will stand up to lots of frolicking and frequent washings. Select garments cut from durable, permanent-press shrinkage-controlled fabrics. # FACT OR FICTION? Folklore advice for best fishing

Weather, fishing and folklore are forever wedded in the outdoorsman's mind.

Were you fishing yesterday? Did you catch anything?

I found the fish in a foul mood, jaws clamped shut. Yet, the day before, knowledgeable fishermen were saying it was "normal" to catch "a fish a cast on split-tail worms."

Most were undersized, spotted sand bass, to be sure, but even these did not bite with their usual alacrity. Was it because of the moon?

"When the moon is round and bright — Sore-mouth fish refuse to bite.

"Channel catfish hold a banquet after a rain.

"It's poor to fish that time of year — when 'dog days' are looming near.

"When smoke curls down and ditches reek, the wise angler heads straight for the creek.

"Before a rain the fishes rise — and nimbly catch incautious flies."

Thorn Bacon, in his delightful "Weather for Sportsmen," takes a look at these proverbs. Some of them are factual, in his view.

Let's take them in order and listen to Bacon.

"When the moon is round and bright — Sore-mouth fish refuse to bite."

"Pure hokum. ... As far as I can discover, it is an Old South saying, disreputable, without foundation. Apparently, it derives from the mistaken belief that the full moon — induces a general lethargy in the fish which affects its feeding habits," said Bacon.

Most fishermen believe that fish feed at night when the moon is full and that if you're allowed to fish then, you'd better be on the lake early next day to get the last vestiges of the bite.

"Channel catfish hold a banquet after a rain."

"Weather-wise fishermen who run trot lines know that (after a) rainfall ... drowned insects, worms, grubs — a variety of edibles — float downstream. It would be wrong to say that channel cats

only feed after a rain, but it is certainly true that they feed much better when the water level rises.

... A falling barometer is the best guarantee for a catfish fry," he said.

"It's poor to fish that time of year — when 'dog days' are looming near."

This is another of those surviving folklore superstitions without any basis in fact. This derives from the South and is attributed to the fact that, during and after the Civil War, the period starting about July 26 and lasting about five weeks, was under the influence of Sirius, the Dog Star.

"Since this period spanned some of the summer's hottest weather, including periods of drought when people living in poor sanitary conditions were struck by the plague, the idea spread that illness came with the appearance of the Dog Star. People avoided the water, particularly, feeling fish were contaminated and the eating of them would bring on madness," said Bacon.

"When smoke curls down and ditches reek, the wise angler heads straight for the creek."

"This one survives scientific weeding out. It's accurate. The saying indicates that humid air has flowed in, accompanied by a lowering of atmospheric pressure. The previous high pressure of fair weather has kept odors in ditches, creeks and swamps close to the ground.

"A lessening of atmospheric pressure releases captive odors, but people also react. Corns ache, old wounds throb, human nerves complain due to a greater dehydration of tissues.

"Fish react, too, by developing sudden activity."

"Before a rain the fishes rise — and nimbly catch incautious flies."

The biometeorologists don't know exactly why a falling barometer affects feeding habits of fish ... but fish do get restless, excited by weather changes. (One) fascinating conclusion is that, like humans, when fish are frightened or nervous, they eat," he said.

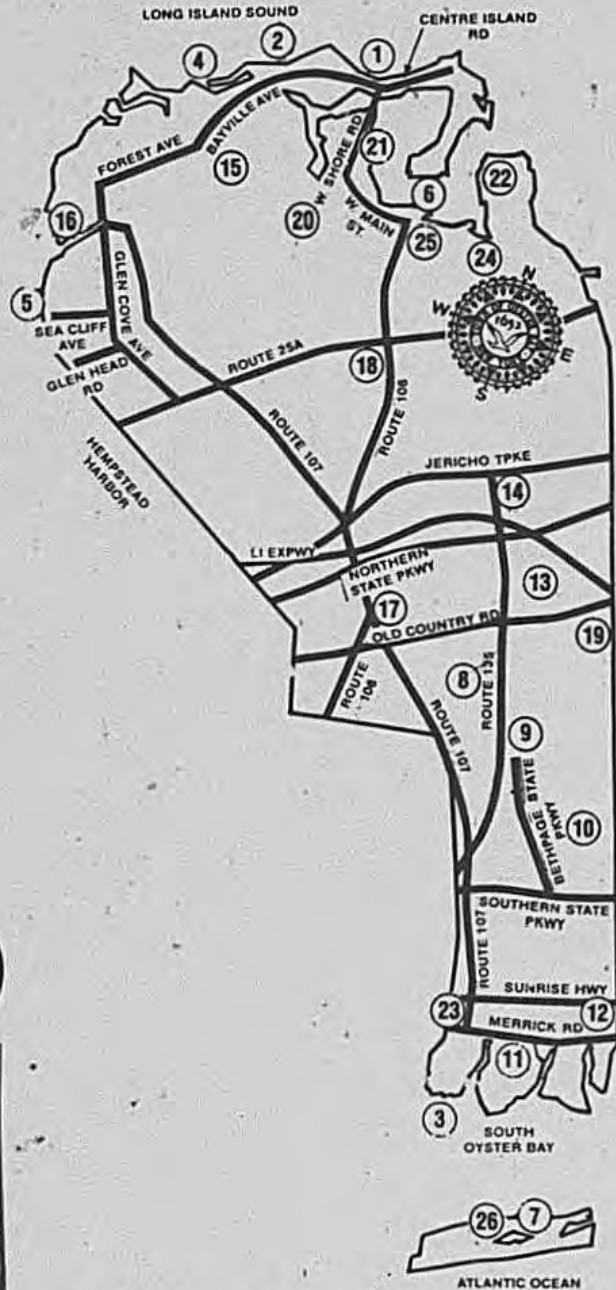

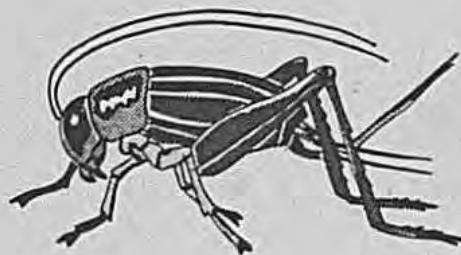

## CRICKETS

### The sweet song of a night outdoors

The song of summer usually commences around dusk, sneaking up without fanfare like the dew. One moment there is silence, then the cricket begins his nightly celebration.

It is the male cricket who provides the sweet, reassuring refrain that can transcend time. You can ride it in your memory back to youth when the sound blended with the taste of watermelon and the earthy aroma of night.

The music is made by a cricket rubbing a scraper located on one forewing along a row of 50 to 250 teeth on the opposite forewing. The tone and duration of the chirp varies with the number of teeth struck per second.

The most common songs are the calling song, which attracts the female, the courtship or mating song, which induces the female's bedroom favors, and the fighting chirp, which repels other males.

Crickets are found in nearly all parts of the world where plants grow. Eggs are laid in the soil in late summer, they hatch in spring and new adults appear by the following midsummer.

There are 2,400 cricket species. But because it has been deemed the favorite of fish, only one species — the Australian gray — can be found at Selph's Cricket Ranch Inc. in Memphis, Tenn.

"We've got about 20 million crickets," Manager Richard Thompson boasted in an interview.

The bulk of the crop is sold to fishermen, he said, while the rest goes to zoos, universities, research labs and other biological institutions for use in experiments and as feed. It's common for the ranch to sell 2 million or more crickets a day in the summer to people in all 50 states and Canada.

"Zoos and labs use them to feed birds, reptiles and small animals because they are high in protein," said Thompson. Prices vary with size, but generally 1,000 crickets sell for about \$10, he said.

The ranch was begun 35 years ago by Raymond Selph, a former railroad mail clerk who loved to fish but tired of mailing away for crickets. He started raising a few himself, then other mail clerks started dropping by for them.

A "Selph-made" millionaire, he figured to do well because you can raise crickets on chicken feed — they go through 10 tons of it a week at the ranch.

"It's funny, but the chirping doesn't really bother me," said Thompson. "They don't make noise until they're almost fully grown and then it's only the males who chirp. It sounds like a big motor, you know, just a large hum."

Crickets come in two main types — those that keep to themselves in pastures and woods and those who cuddle up to man and make themselves at home around the yard and house.

The field cricket and the house cricket may feed on plants, animals, clothes and each other.

The tree cricket is green, has transparent wings and is beneficial to man, as are most crickets, because it feeds on aphids.

Tree- and bush-inhabiting crickets usually sing at night; weed-inhabiting crickets sing both day and night.

Crickets play a large role in myth and superstition. Their presence is equated with good fortune and intelligence — harming a cricket supposedly risks misfortune.

A large brown cricket, fried and sold in Mandalay markets, is a favorite food of wandering Buddhist monks. In the Orient, male crickets are caged for their song; cricket fighting has been a popular sport in China for hundreds of years.

# Kids' camp isn't easy task

"Summer camp." Say those words and parents sigh in anticipation as they imagine the luxury of being alone for a while.

But they can't enjoy that luxury until the kids are gone, and the kids can't go until an appropriate camp has been chosen.

And because of the variety of camps in operation, choosing the right one isn't always easy.

Which will it be? Day camp ... resident camp ... private camp? What about a sports or travel camp? Perhaps even a computer camp?

Just what should a parent look for in selecting a summer camp?

"First, determine if the camp is accredited by the American Camping Association," suggests Dr. Robert Hanson, a certified camp director.

"Find out about the people operating the camp," adds Hanson, a life member and past president of the American Camping Association and co-author of several books on camping.

"Find out how much experience and what kind of training the staff has. And try to find parents or people who sent their children to the camp the previous summer. Talk to neighbors whose children have attended the camp."

Hanson says another determining factor is the continuity of the camp in terms of management.

"If the camp has changed directors or its entire staff from the summer before, that should be considered," he said.

Other considerations in choosing a camp include cost and dates to fit into the family vacation schedule.

He also reminds parents most day camps do not provide meals (they usually serve juices or milk at lunch), meaning children will have to take their own lunches.

Depending on the program chosen, the cost of attending day camps can vary tremendously. Hanson says fees at resident camps can range from \$100 per week to considerably more at private camps — again depending on the schedule of activities.

"Of course," Hanson says, "the important thing is to keep the child's interest in mind when picking a camp. What does he or she like ... what kinds of hobbies and activities do they enjoy?"

The key to a successful camp, he believes, is the staff: "If you have a responsive staff that loves children ... a camp where the counselor has a chance to work with small groups ... for the camper, it will be a meaningful and rewarding experience."

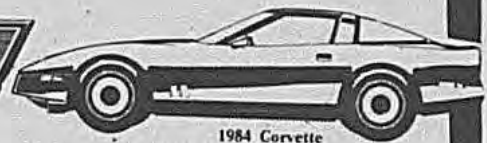

### INSECT CONTROL

## Don't let bugs bug you

The great outdoors calls to you, full of possible activities. But, before running out with your tennis racket, gardening tools or camping equipment, remember that the bugs are out to bite and can spoil your fun unless you prepare yourself.

To help combat pesty insects, Paul Fisher, tool catalog product manager of the Brookstone Co., a mail-order catalog and retail company specializing in outdoor accessories and tools, recommends the following precautions:

**BLEND IN.** There are more than 120 varieties of hungry mosquitoes in North America that use both sight and sensors to find a meal. Insects see best whatever contrasts more strongly with the background. Shiny, pale or bright clothing is easier to zero in on, so wear darker more neutral colors such as tan or khaki to blend in better with the outdoors. Also, avoid wearing perfume or aftershave.

**COVER UP.** The mosquitoes' sensors are attracted to warm, moist objects, so partially clothed human beings are prime targets. Skin temperature varies from person to person, one reason why some people are "eaten alive" and others are left alone.

For some outdoor activities such as gardening, it pays to wear lightweight long-sleeved shirts and long pants to cover up vulner-

able skin. In areas where insects, especially chiggers, are really thick, tuck pant legs into your socks and seal wrist openings with elastic bands. Also, you may want to wear a head net for prolonged outdoor work to avoid constantly swatting insects away from your face.

**INSECT REPELLENT.** A good insect repellent is one of the best ways to keep bugs at a distance. Some repellents with high concentrations of NN diethylmetatoluamide claim to be effective for up to 10 hours. However, if you're perspiring heavily or if you get wet, you must reapply more frequently.

**ELECTRONIC BUG KILLERS.** Electronic bug killers are a convenient and unobtrusive way to control backyard bugs. These devices may be placed in a corner of the back yard to draw bugs away from the patio, swimming pool or back porch.

Electronic bug killers have a light that attracts insects to electrode plates that kill them upon contact.

**PLANNING VACATIONS.** Vacations are precious. To ensure a pleasant and bug-free one, it's worth a phone call ahead to check out the insect situation, especially if you're planning to spend a lot of time in wooded areas. Every part of the country has times when insect infestation is thicker than at others.

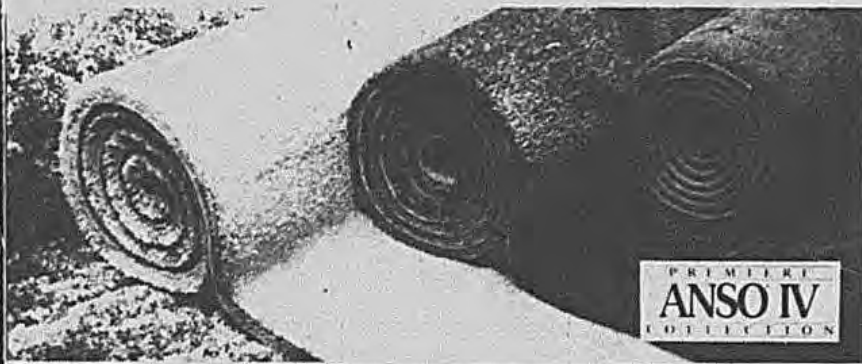

# Gardening No. 1 outdoor activity

While most Americans prefer to watch television, listen to music or read books during their leisure time, for those who prefer outdoor pursuits, gardening is No. 1.

Forty-two percent of 3,000 households surveyed planted food gardens in 1983, according to results of a Gardens for All-Gallup Organization survey.

Based on the number of households involved in each activity, gardening ranks sixth in overall leisure activities. More than 80 percent of the households watch TV; 64 percent listen to music; 54 percent read books; 44 percent take pleasure trips in their car, and 43 percent go to the movies.

But gardening still is ahead of watching professional sports on TV, home baking, going on vacation trips, general exercise and all other outdoor activities mentioned, including: fishing (31 percent), bicycling (22 percent), camping (20 percent), jogging (19 percent), hunting (16 percent), tennis and golf (12 percent each).

Jack Robinson, president of the non-profit Gardens for All, says: "If the percentages from the survey hold throughout the U.S. population, 35 million households garden — presumably to save money, to get fresh vegetables and for enjoyment.

"During the 12 years Gardens for All has undertaken the national gardening survey, we've observed a relationship between gardening and the nation's economy."

Robinson continues.

"While there is a core group of dedicated gardeners who raise food every year, there is also a small segment of the gardening population that will garden one year and not the next depending on economic conditions. Gardening incidence rises in rougher economic times. When the economy shows even a slight gain, the popularity of gardening decreases for this marginal group. The upward trend of our nation's economy during 1983 combined with the weather problems experienced throughout the country probably account for the slight decline in gardening's popularity from 1982's survey," Robinson says.

In 1982, 46 percent of the households surveyed were involved in gardening.

The main reasons given for not gardening were: lack of suitable space (35 percent), lack of time (28 percent) and too much work (13 percent).

Other trends emerging from the surveys: The Midwest consistently ranks as the nation's No. 1 gardening region; gardening has been more popular in rural areas than in small towns, suburbs or cities, and gardening has had a greater following among married households and people 50 years old and over.

In addition to food gardening, 82 percent of the households surveyed were involved in some form of gardening activity from flower gardening to lawn and houseplant care.

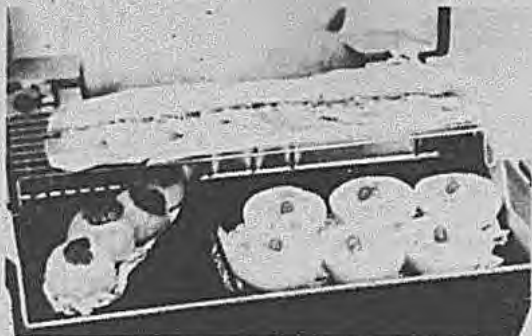

# ALL-AMERICAN Outdoor barbecue can be a gas

**BBQ**—The traditional backyard barbecue now can include some not-so-traditional foods.

— Although the word "barbecue" is of French derivation, this activity is a favorite American pastime, associated with holidays, families, parties and plain all-around fun.

Early settlers in Virginia learned about barbecuing from local Indians during the 17th century. By the 18th century, the Colonial settlers had made barbecuing — although it wasn't known by

that name yet — a fashionable pastime in New York City. The custom eventually became part of election rallies.

Meanwhile, the custom of roasting a pig or cow over a pit and wood coals spread to Acadian Louisiana, whose Cajuns coined the word barbecue from the French words "barbe," meaning beard or whiskers, and "queue," meaning tail. Thus, when one had a barbecue, one roasted every-

thing from "whiskers to tail." Although each U.S. region has had its variations, the name has stuck.

And so has the pastime, although Americans have come a long way equipmentwise since first roasting a pig over a pit.

According to Arkla Industries Inc., a manufacturer of gas barbecue grills, Americans bought more than 10.2 million charcoal grills, 2 million gas grills and 200,000 electric grills in 1983.

The distinctive flavor probably is the key element to the popularity of barbecuing.

"The barbecue flavor comes from the smoke created when the juices of the meat drip on the lava rock or coals below," says William Regan of Arkla Industries.

The outdoorsy smoked flavor can be enhanced by using moistened wood chips packed in foil to create smoke. Particularly delicate flavorings develop by using chips from fruit and nut trees and by adding garlic, bay leaves or other herbs.

Barbecuing is convenient for a variety of cooking methods. Roasting and baking are accomplished by using indirect heat with the flame lit on only one side of a two-burner grill. In order to circulate the heat, it's best to leave the lid closed.

Direct cooking is the most traditional grilling style, and it's also the fastest. Place the food directly over the heat source to allow the smoky "outdoor" flavor to permeate the food. Steaks, chops, burgers and kabobs cook best with this method.

A gas grill also works for wok cooking. Simply remove the cooking grids and place the wok directly on the lower grate.

Barbecuing obviously is much more than just franks or hamburgers. It now includes exotic foods, succulent sauces, imaginative appetizers and baked goods. Some sample recipes:

### HORSERADISH-STUFFED RUMP ROAST

- 1/4 cup prepared horseradish
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 5-lb. boneless beef rump roast, rolled and tied
- 1 clove garlic, halved

Combine horseradish and minced garlic. Unroll roast; make lengthwise cut slightly off center, going almost to but not through the other side. Leave center area uncut for spit to go through. Spread cut surface with horseradish mixture. Re-roll roast and tie securely. Insert spit rod through center. Adjust holding forks; test balance. Rub outside of roast with halved garlic. Insert meat thermometer.

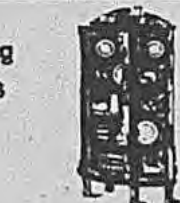
Remove cooking grids from grill. Preheat both sides of grill. Turn both sides to heat; attach spit. Position foil drip pan under roast. Turn on motor and close hood. Cook for 1.5 hours or until thermometer registers 140 degrees Fahrenheit for medium-rare, slightly longer for medium. Let roast stand 15 minutes before carving. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

# Suggestions for swimming safely

Going beyond tested swimming ability, failure to read warning signs and use of drugs and alcohol are three major causes of water-related accidents among adults and children, according to Regis Kearney, aquatic director of Raging Waters, a water park near Los Angeles.

A former aquatic coordinator for the city of Pasadena Recreation Department and activities director for many children's camps, Kearney has designed safety programs for numerous swimming facilities and organizations. Some tips from Kearney:

— **Heed the Limitations of Your Swimming Ability.** "It sounds crazy," Kearney says, "but some people — even non-swimmers — will go into deep-water areas and panic when they realize they're in over their heads. Don't try to impress your friends with your skills unless the swimming skills are accomplished."

— **Don't Drink or Take Drugs and Swim.** "If a picnic or party just isn't right without stimulants, then stay out of the water," suggests Kearney. "Alcohol, sun and water just don't mix. Often, people believe they can do the impossible after a few drinks and going into the water can be very dangerous."

— **Read Warning Signs and Take Heed.** "It may sound ridicu-

lous, but many people just plain don't read the signs," Kearney says. "If a sign says, 'No Swimming,' it means exactly that — for a good reason."

— **Don't Be a Hero Unless You're a Trained Water-Safety Professional.** "Too many times, people with less-than-average swimming ability will rush to the rescue of others," Kearney says. "It usually causes more problems and the lifeguard or other water-safety expert ends up rescuing two people instead of one."

— **Use Good Judgment in Selecting Water Games.** "Sometimes people will think it's cute to swim up behind a friend and dunk his or her head," explains Kearney. "But the sight of someone coughing up water isn't so cute — use good judgment and avoid this kind of 'game.'"

— **Use Common Courtesy When Swimming in a Public Facility.** "Don't think you're the only one in the pool when you swim," says Kearney. "Too many people will swim right into others and cause injuries that wouldn't happen if they were more conscientious."

— **Walk, Don't Run.** "The ground surrounding most public pools or water facilities can be quite slippery and hazardous," Kearney explains. "Walk slowly around pools and even in surrounding facilities where people have tracked in water and sand."

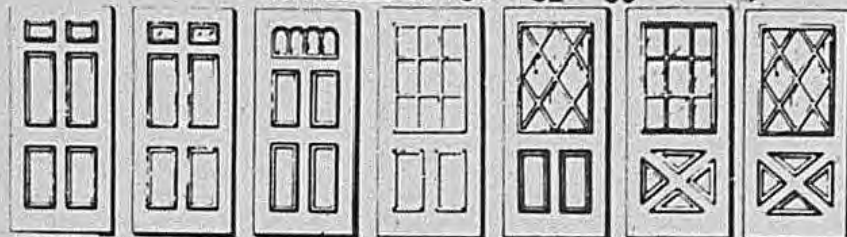

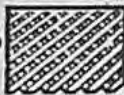
