Town Offices Have Holiday

All Town of Oyster Bay governmental offices will be closed Wednesday, July 4, in observance of the Independence Day holiday, it was announced this week by Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca.

"All Town governmental offices will be closed on Wednesday, July 4," Mosca stated, "but all park and beach facilities will be open. Since there is normally no sanitation collection on Wednesday, the holiday will have no effect on the collection schedule."

Mosca noted that there are no special restrictions on the opening and closing times of businesses because of the holiday.

Pedestrian Robbed In Hicksville

The Second Squad reports the details of a robbery that occurred in Hicksville at 2:30 a.m. June 25.

Michael Kelly, age 30, was walking at the intersection of Old Country Road and Charlotte Road when he was approached from the rear by two unknown male blacks who punched him. They then took a wallet from his pocket and fled on foot. The wallet contained personal papers.

Michael refused medical attention. The investigation is continuing.

Protest Petition Given On Proposed Office Bldg.

The Town Board was given a 101 signature petition Tuesday against the construction of a 10,000 square ft. building on the north side of West John Street, Hicksville. The site is a three quarter acre tract near a number of one family residences. About 30 people were in attendance at the Board meeting and complained that the building would increase traffic on their streets. The Town Board would have to change the designation of the land from residential to business to allow the office building to be constructed. Rockwell Realty is the developer and was represented by Bertram Corwin, attorney.

In another matter before the board, the B. Dalton Co. asked for a special permit to construct a 3,000 square ft. bookstore on the southwest portion of the Plainview Shopping Center. The building would require a reduction in the size of parking spaces and less setback for the building.

Hearing July 31 On Zone Change

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a public hearing for Tuesday, July 31, on a request for two changes of zone and two special use permits to operate a senior citizen residence home and construct an office building on the site of the former Central Park Road School in Plainview, it was announced this week by Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

"The applicants, Donald Monti, Dr. Ralph Parisi and the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District, are seeking a change of zone from 'D' residence to 'F' neighborhood business and a special use permit to operate a senior citizen residence home in the former Central Park Road School," Clark stated. "The zone change would apply to 4.191 acres of the 5.368-acre parcel, which is located on the south side of Old Country Road with frontage on the west side of Gerhard Road."

"The applicants are also requesting a change of zone from 'D' residence to 'G' general business and a special use permit to operate an office building on 1.777 acres of the parcel," Clark said. "Plans call for the construction of a three-story, 35-foot high office building with a total area of 19,800 square feet."

The hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. on July 31 in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

To the Editor:

The chronicles of Hicksville will show that the community grieved, indeed, this past week as a beloved pastor and two most active veterans group leaders were taken by death. In the passing of Reverend Dr. Roland J. Perez, Pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, and of Past Commanders John Sheppard of the American Legion and Daniel Hoison of the Amvets Posts, Hicksville was diminished. These were men who gave long years of service to God and community, contributing to the welfare of many in this village and the Island at large.

To be present Monday night at St. Stephen's, Hicksville's historic "English" Lutheran Church, as older residents knew it, was to be with people of many faiths honoring the memory of Pastor Perez who died Friday. The large turnout of his congregation, friends and community representatives for the memorial service was a tribute to one who was active for 15 years in so many areas of service.

This writer's records and newspaper clippings tell of pastoral leadership and inspiration; his organization of programs for handicapped children and his role as proponent of interfaith understanding and cooperation. We will remember, too, that as a citizen, Pastor Perez did not shrink from a call to Democratic political candidacy, in the early seventies, when the impact of a blighted West Broadway aroused his Zola-like anger and eloquence.

Those present in the charming little Tudor church Monday evening for Dr. Perez's memorial service were a most ecumenical gathering. Among those Hicksville religious ones glimpsed were Pastor Theodore Grant of Redeemer Lutheran Church who rendered a warm eulogy; Father Frederick Harrer, Pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola R.C. Church; Father Domenick Ciannella, Pastor of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church and Pastor John Krahn of Trinity Lutheran Church.

This participant found the requiem service more exultant than sad and in a beautiful setting the Pastor's casket before the altar he served, his religious colleagues in their beautiful robes once more with him in ecumenical company, and the church and basement hall ringing with the old hymns dear to all Christians and, especially, to the Pastor: "I Know That My Redeemer Lives", "Praise to the Lord", "The Strife's O'er, The Battle Is Done" "Onward Christian Soldiers" and the recessional hymn "For All

The Saints".

In eulogizing his deceased friend, Pastor Grant recalled Pastor Perez as a man of varied experience and talents, as one who had the opportunity and the ability to serve in larger churches, but who preferred to respond to the pastoral call of St. Stephen's and the Hicksville community. There are many in Hicksville who are thankful that he chose to spend his ministerial years in our vineyards.

In Memoriam



John Sheppard

Past Commander Sheppard of the Charles Wagner Post 421 American Legion, who died this past Sunday, in his quiet, determined way left a legacy of sterling service to his post and the Hicksville community of which he was a part for over 30 years. Few American Legion leaders have shaped the development and destiny of their post as did John Sheppard, who served as Commander in 1971-72 and held most other vital post chairmanships at one time or another.

John Sheppard came later to Legion membership than many veterans. Once a part of the Hicksville Legion, this veteran of U.S. Army service in Hawaii during World War II, utilized skillfully the talents which carried him to chief teller's position in his 40 years with the New York Citibank system.

He will be remembered for his most effective chairmanship of the Post 421 Bingo Committee which, in less than ten years, paid off the Charles Wagner Post building expansion mortgage of \$100,000. John Sheppard not only raised funds for his post, he saw to the wise and generous use of that portion of bingo game proceeds which, by law, must be utilized for charitable causes. His support of the Hicksville American Legion's Child Welfare Youth and School programs was unstinting. This writer may attest to Commander Sheppard's ready expenditure of bingo funds for: the Legion's Boys State Program; the high school Oratorical Competitions which, in the eloquent late Barry Lebowitz, took Hicksville to the State Finals and the Annual School Award Programs for school service and excellence in American History.

With Mae, his enthusiastic wife and help-mate, John was equally faithful in maintaining the Charles Wagner Post's program of visitation and entertainment to the handicapped children at the Suffolk State Home. Almost every American Legion program in Hicksville, these last 15 years, bears the influence of this dominant but devoted veteran's leader.

He was not well these last years, but John Sheppard never lost his interest in his post and community's welfare. His place in Charles Wagner Post's annals and Hicksville's history will be significant and memorable.

Hicksville Veteran's organization ranks were notably thinned this month with the deaths of two leaders who were prominent in community and servicemen's affairs, Past Commander Daniel Hoison of the Robert O. Ulmer Post of the Amvets and Past Commander John Sheppard of the Charles Wagner Post of the American Legion.

Dan Hoison who died on June 19, represented that type of veteran's and civic leader whose club activities and personal contacts were legion; there are few in Hicksville leadership circles who did not know Dan, particularly in the unceasing activity of his retirement years.

A veteran of active service with the U.S. Navy in World War II, Mr. Hoison came to Hicksville some 35 years ago, after spending his earlier life in Indiana, Texas and Florida. Employed for many years by the Oyster Bay Town Highway Department, he was a most active person in his free hours. His many vigorous activities belied his age which was 75, at the time of his death.

He was a Committeeman of the Hicksville Republican Club and served on the Board of Hicksville's H.A.D. (Health-Aid-Direction) organization.

But, Daniel Hoison is best remembered for his contributions to the programs of Hicksville war veterans. He served as Post Commander for the Amvets, and was active in many functions involving The United Veterans Organizations of Hicksville, such as the planning and execution of the community's annual Memorial Day Parade and Service.

Active with Amvets color guards during the American Revolution Bicentennial years, and since in the Town of Oyster Bay Bicentennial and Historical Commission's patriotic programs marking the Fourth of July and the Annual Pilgrimages to the Grave of President Theodore Roosevelt, Dan was a marching vet, until the last year or two.

Outspoken on issues of bungling government, America's honor, veterans' welfare and our men missing in Vietnam, Dan Hoison will long be remembered.

Hicksville Mourns Rev. Dr. Perez

Rev. Dr. Roland J. Perez, Pastor of the Lutheran Church of St. Stephen died June 22, 1984, 15 years to the day he preached his first sermon at St. Stephens.

Called to the ministry after a career as an accountant, married and with two children, Rev. Perez attended the Lutheran Theological Seminary of Philadelphia. He served one year as assistant Pastor of Epiphany Lutheran Church in Hempstead. After serving five years as Pastor of Advent Lutheran Church, Elmont where he began a Sunday School for handicapped children, he answered the call to serve as Pastor of St. Stephens. During his 15 years as St. Stephen's Pastor he was also one of the co-founders and present treasurer of the Ecumenical Consultation Center. Eight years ago he began the St. Stephen's Nursery School with seven children and one class. This year's registration totals 12 classes and 175 children. Rev. Perez also wrote a column for the Metro N.Y. News, a syndicated paper. His "Pastor on Pictures" won two awards for best column category with his articles on "The Verdict & E.T."

Born March 18, 1932, Rev. Perez was 52 years old. He is survived by his wife, Edna, daughter Elaine Ciacco of Fishkill, Lynette, Janet, son John and brother Robert of Hempstead.

Auxiliary Police Attend Int. Games

Officers of Hicksville's Auxiliary Police Unit 312 have volunteered their time and expertise in response to the request for trained personnel to assist Nassau County Police by providing security at the International Games for the Disabled. The need for manpower was particularly critical during President Reagan's appearance at Opening Day Ceremonies on June 17. Because of their record of excellence in the field, Auxiliary Police Officers were assigned to cover posts for the County Police while they attended to more urgent matters. In addition, Hicksville Auxiliary Police officers have served at various posts in and around the Games sites at the Mitchel Park complex in Uniondale in an effort to free the County Police for emergency duties.

The International Games present two major concerns: security for the athletes (who have traveled from around the world to participate) and consideration of the possible problems of mobility that the disabled athletes and spectators may encounter. In preparation for dealing with these aspects, all Auxiliary Police volunteers were required to attend a training seminar at Police Headquarters before receiving clearance to perform security-related services at the Games. Like their counterparts from other communities in Nassau County, the Hicksville Auxiliary Police have helped to ensure the safety of the athletes and spectators at the International Games for the Disabled.

More Parking At Library

Patrons of the Hicksville Public Library will be able to use additional parking on Second Street, east of Jerusalem Avenue. Through the cooperation of the Town of Oyster Bay and Hicksville Public Schools, two hour parking is now permitted on the south side of Second Street at all times. This service is available to Hicksville residents only.

What's Safe For Breakfast?

While sorting through my pantry the other day, I was impressed by the number of foods that have been either singled out as being a potential health problem due to either contamination or by the presence of dangerous chemical additives.

It has become quite a challenge in determining what is safe to eat. We are confronted with numerous pesticides, sprays and preservatives used on foods which may tamper with our health.

Bread and stored grain products including flour, noodles, cereals, rice, stuffing, breading mixes and cake mixes have recently been found to contain high concentrations of EDB, a pesticide sprayed on grain which has been found to be high carcinogenic. Citrus is also treated by this spray. Long Island potatoes are sprayed with Vydate, and this has posed a problem in that traces have been found in the underground water supply.

Past problems have existed with mercury found in canned tuna fish and in the canning process for salmon. Cold cuts and hot dogs as well, contain nitrates, which are converted by cooking into nitrosamines, other cancer causing substances. Meat and poultry still retain the chemicals consumed by cattle and chicken that is sprayed on the grain they eat which ultimately gets to our table.

The saccharin scare has produced a safe substitute: Nutrasweet. However, it has been found too costly to use alone and is, therefore, combined with saccharin. We should not get overly confident with this innovative replacement for when we start tallying the daily grams of Nutrasweet consumed in diet foods and beverages, we may find ourselves back where we started with saccharin consumption still a problem.

My concern extends into the area of pet foods: I am surprised that no concern has been elicited on our pet's consumption of grains. Ingredients listed on dog food products are: ground corn, wheat flour, soybean meal, corn gluten meal, ground oat groats, etc. Also similar substances are noted on meat by-products. Wouldn't the spraying of these grains constitute a threat to our pet's health as well?

Water is one of our most precious resources and utilized daily for cooking and food preparation. Long Island water has been contaminated by irresponsible companies who dispose of their toxic waste materials into landfills. Wells have been shut down and reopened. There are controls and regulations but enforcement

continues to be the problem. Yet, we are not helping as residents by using chemical pesticides, drain and cesspool cleaners to pose a threat to our own underground water supply and to our health.

The optimum situation would be a return to a natural and chemical free way of life. Unfortunately, as long as a chemical industry exists and continues to operate as big business to permeate our lives with potential health hazards, we do not stand much of a chance in maintaining good health. I question the old advertising slogan "better living through chemistry."

What are we coming to when we can't safely offer bottles to babies? Nitrosamines have been found in the rubber nipples on bottles and yet they are used with confidence under the guise of safety. Some years back, specific lots of prepared infant formula was found contaminated and recalled.

We as consumers must band together as a unified force and start making demands on product safety. Data must be made available to the public, apprising them of the content and composition of chemical additives.

As of this writing, to my knowledge, we are left with dairy products for breakfast. We experienced a problem with milk some years ago when radiation was found in the milk of cattle when nuclear testing was done. Bags of pesticide were also inadvertently mixed and put in cattle feed in Michigan and got into the food supply.

I thought that salad might be a nutritious lunch, and then I remembered something else: Although recent studies have concluded that cabbage, carrots and broccoli are among the safest vegetables to eat and act as a deterrent to cancer, these and other greens are sprayed with the very chemicals that are carcinogens. Is there any way to win?

What's for dinner? Your guess is as good as mine. I prefer to close right here. Let's keep our fingers crossed that by morning there are no subtractions from our already limited list of foods.



It's never 'just' desserts with juicy peaches

During the peak summer months, orchard-sweet peaches are perfect for cool and refreshing ideas, from juicy pies to cool parfaits. This honey-sweet fruit wins consumer approval for its delicious versatility, fuzz down.

Use fresh peaches in milk shakes or pureed into fruit punch. Party desserts and frozen treats can be something special when

prepared with peaches.

Some peaches have carried a few celebrities to immortality. Such as Peach Melba. It was inspired by Australian opera star Nellie Melba, who sang in major European cities during the 1890s. Her stage name was a shortened version of her hometown of Melbourne.

One of her admirers was the

great French chef, Escoffier, who was in charge of the Savoy Hotel's kitchen at the time of Melba's London triumph. He dedicated a new dessert to her.

His creation, *peches Melba*, actually was an improvement over a dish called *peches cardinal*, in which peaches were served with a raspberry or strawberry sauce (for the red hat of a cardinal). He served the dish with vanilla ice cream, carried on the wings of an ice swan, the hero of the opera "Lohengrin," in which Melba was singing.

Escoffier also created another famous peach, *peches Eugenie*, for Empress Eugenie, wife of Napoleon III of France. It's made of ripe peaches and maraschino liqueur and served with champagne sauce.

The classic Melba recipe involves making vanilla ice cream, poaching peaches and creating a raspberry sauce out of the fresh fruit. Here's a quicker version served in many Paris cafes.

QUICK PEACH MELBA

- 4 fresh peaches
- 1 pint vanilla ice cream
- 6 tbsps. raspberry jelly
- 3 tbsps. water
- 1 1/2 tbsps. lemon juice

To peel the peaches, scald in a pan of boiling water for 30 seconds; drain, rinse under cold water and peel with a knife. Cut peaches in half and chill.

To make the raspberry jelly sauce, gently heat the raspberry jelly, water and lemon juice, stirring until smooth. Let cook, stirring often.

To serve, place scoops or spoon

fuls of ice cream in each of 4 deep dessert dishes. Top with peach halves. Spoon a little sauce over peaches. Serve the remaining separately.

What's a better way to enjoy fresh peaches than with a homemade pie? Minute tapioca acts as a thickener without affecting the taste or the fruit flavor.

PEACH CRUMB PIE

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3 tbsps. minute tapioca
- 4 cups sliced fresh peaches
- 2 tbsps. lemon juice
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
- Crumb topping

Combine sugar, salt, tapioca, peaches and lemon juice; let stand 15 minutes. Pour peach mixture into pie shell and sprinkle with crumb topping. Bake at 425 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes or until syrup boils with heavy bubbles that do not burst.

Crumb topping: Combine 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/4 cup all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon and 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened. Mix with pastry blender or fork until crumbs are the size of large peas. Makes 1 1/4 cups.

If you are interested in trying an unusual combination of flavors, try this recipe for chicken with fresh peaches. The chicken is marinated in an Oriental-style sauce, then sprinkled with four different spices and baked. Fresh peaches and water chestnuts go into the pan shortly before the chicken is ready. Rice complements the dish.

CHICKEN WITH FRESH PEACHES

1/4 cup soy sauce
1/4 cup water
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 1/2 tsps. finely chopped fresh ginger
1 large clove garlic, finely chopped
3 1/2-lb. frying chicken, cut up
1/4 tsp. anise seed, crushed
1/4 tsp. ground allspice
1/2 tsp. ground cloves
2 large fresh peaches, quartered
1 (8-oz.) can water chestnuts, drained and sliced

In 3-quart rectangular baking dish, stir together soy sauce, water, onion, ginger and garlic; add chicken in a single layer, marinate 2 or 3 hours, turning several times. Turn chicken skin side up; stir together anise, allspice, cinnamon and cloves; sprinkle over chicken.

Bake everything in a preheated 350-degree oven 50 minutes, basting several times; add peaches and water chestnuts; bake until chicken is tender and peaches are heated through — 10 minutes longer. Serve with rice. Makes 4 servings.

Cornish game hens

By Olivia and Paul Bensen

You can find Cornish game hens in the frozen food section of almost every supermarket. They are small, averaging about a pound each, and are far better in many poultry recipes, in our opinion, than chicken.

The surprising thing is that so few people, in our experience, have any idea how to cook them. Often, when we've served game hens to company, they've said, "Oh, those are beautiful ... so that's what you do with them?"

Game hens cost, on the average, about \$1.75 for a 1-pound bird, which is a perfect serving for one person. This makes game hens a best buy among festive entrees to

serve at a special dinner.

For Indian and Pakistani recipes calling for chicken, game hens are unsurpassed. They have much less fat than chickens available in this country, and so are much more similar to the chickens raised in India and Pakistan, which are kept outside to forage for themselves, and do not develop as much fat as our cage-raised chickens.

Like the foraging chickens of many other countries, game hens require a bit longer cooking time for their size than our domestic chickens.

The Oriental ingredients listed are available in Oriental food stores. If you have trouble finding

them, all are available (along with thousands of others) from Merapi Inc., 139 White St., Danbury, CT 06810, 203-743-9761.

5-SPICE GAME HENS (Si Ya Gai)

- 4 Cornish game hens
- 1 tbsp. five-spice powder
- 2 tbsps. hoisin sauce
- 1 tbsp. plum sauce or duck sauce
- 2 tbsps. black bean paste (or chili paste with garlic)
- 1 tbsp. sherry
- 1/4 cup dark soy sauce
- 1 tbsp. maple syrup

Wash hens and pat dry. Mix five-spice powder, hoisin, plum (or duck) sauce and black bean paste (or chili sauce) and sherry. Rub cavities of game hens with half this mixture, and skins with other half, and salt. Refrigerate overnight.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Mix soy sauce and maple syrup and rub into skins. Roast, back up, for 30 to 40 minutes, then turn breasts up and roast another 30 to 40 minutes, or until golden brown. Serve with pan juice. Serves 4.

GAME HENS IN INDONESIAN HOT SAUCE

- 2 tbsps. hot water
- 2 tbsps. tamarind
- 2 game hens, halved
- 1 tbsp. fresh lemon juice
- 2 tbsps. chopped onion
- 2 tbsps. chopped hot green chili pepper
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. ground coriander
- 1/2 cup chicken stock

Stir hot water and tamarind together and allow to stand for 15 minutes. Strain liquid into bowl and set aside. Discard seeds.

Rub game hen halves with lemon juice and allow to sit for 15 minutes.

Finely chop onion and chili pepper, and mix with salt, sugar, reserved tamarind liquid and coriander; make a paste using mortar and pestle (or whatever you have available for the purpose). A food processor, if you have one, can be used effectively for this step.

Add chicken stock to the paste and whisk (or process) until thoroughly mixed. Transfer to a large skillet and set aside.

Grill game hen halves over a charcoal fire for about 5 minutes on each side (or broil for 5 minutes on each side).

Place skillet over moderate heat and simmer reserved sauce for 3 minutes, stirring continually. Add the grilled game hens and baste with sauce for 10 minutes, or until most of sauce has evaporated.

Return game hens to charcoal grill (or broiler), and cook 3 to 4 minutes on each side, brushing often with remaining sauce. Serves 4.

(This recipe, though it's intended for four, allows only one-half game hen per serving. If you're cooking for people with hearty appetites, you may want to double it, serving each person two halves.)

The solutions offered have been to remove the slate entirely or have another acid employed. Can you help with our problem? — Mrs. James W.

A. I am not sure I can cope with your problem, but I can offer some suggestions.

First consult with the company from which the slate was purchased. This is to determine what type of remover can be used to take off the present finish. If the dealer cannot supply this information, some of the things you can try are paint removers, naphtha or lacquer thinner.

If successful in removing the present finish, wash the slate surface well with 1 cup of trisodium phosphate mixed in 1 gallon of warm water. Rinse well and dry. Then finish with a colorless terrazzo sealer which is recommended.

ed for slate.

After the slate floor has been thoroughly cleaned and allowed to dry, a coat of sealer will make the floor easier to clean and keep clean. Spread the sealer thinly and rub out well.

Being non-porous, slate will absorb very little of the sealer — just enough to adhere, but it is not the purpose to build up a surface coating.

The richness of the slate can be improved somewhat, without producing an artificial luster or sheen, by waxing, either with the solvent type or a water wax emulsion.

If the present finish cannot be removed, replacement of the slate may be the only solution to your problem.

Q. I desperately need some expert advice on how to deal with a concrete carport. It is not covered, and unlike garage floors, it has a rough finish and is so very porous that grease and car stains are apt to become indelible.

Concrete contractors have suggested that the rough surface should be ground down to a smooth surface and then sealed with a product called "Rainproof." However, the new surface would

only last six months and would take yearly applications to be even semi-satisfactory. The lowest bid for the job is \$700 and I really cannot afford renewing the sealer every year.

I would be most grateful for any ideas you might have to help me solve the problem.

Could I apply the sealer without grinding down the present surface? Please come up with something brilliant. It is a very awkward situation as the carport is directly in front of my door and grease is not neat. — Patsy N.

A. It should be possible to put a thin coating of cement over the rough surfaces, a treatment which will also fill the cracks or indentations and level any low spots.

To do this, use a concrete patching material and concrete glue. (One brand name is Red-E-Crete topping material and Red-E-Crete concrete glue.) Be sure to follow instructions on the container carefully.

This may be somewhat expensive if you have a contractor do the job, but it should be permanent. After resurfacing, a masonry sealer should be applied.



Wobbles a very serious disease

Q. Our yearling quarter horse colt was recently diagnosed as a "wobbler." Our veterinarian did not give us any encouragement in terms of treating the condition, nor was he very precise regarding the cause of wobbles.

Please enlighten us. We are quite distraught about our colt.

A Wobbler syndrome, also called ataxia of foals, wobbles of foals and equine incoordination, is a serious lameness disease of young horses.

Signs of the wobbler syndrome may appear at any time from birth to 3 years of age. However, the majority of cases appear prior to 2 years of age.

Wobbles of foals has been reported in Thoroughbreds, standardbreds, Arabians, American saddlebreds, Tennessee walking horses and quarter horses. Although unreported, it probably occurs in other breeds of horses, as well.

The disease begins as an incoordination of the hind legs. Wobbles always involves both hind legs. As

ment usually occurs within the first few weeks, though it is rare for diseased horses to show any great improvement.

Early in the disease, dragging of the toes of the hind feet occurs. Many affected horses experience difficulty in turning. Horses with wobbles appear to be normal in every way with the exception of the rear limb incoordination. Affected horses have normal body temperatures, normal appetites and normal body functions. Most affected horses degenerate to a certain level of incoordination and then remain that way indefinitely.

The cause of wobbles in foals is complex and not well understood. It is possible that the disease is inherited. The disease can be transmitted by non-wobbler horses. Many horse owners believe the cause of wobbles is injury to the spinal cord. However, it appears that the disease makes the foal more accident prone and the accident blamed for the condition is really secondary.

Nutritional deficiencies and worms also have been listed as causes.

Diagnosis of wobbles of foals is

usually based on the clinical signs. If recovery occurs, it is very unlikely that the condition was wobbles. Horses with incoordination of the hind limbs without other noticeable signs should be suspected of having wobbles.

There is no known cure for wobbles. Although corticosteroids have been reported to be helpful, most affected horses usually suffer relapses. It is very rare for horses to recover from this disease.

Severely affected horses should not be used for breeding animals since the disease may be heritable. The offspring may either be affected with the disease or carry the genetic factor for the disease.

Your veterinarian was correct in not being too encouraging regarding wobbles in your foal. Much research needs to be done to discover the causes and effective treatment for this very serious disease of young horses.
