## Board Considers Turning School Into Apartments

An application to rezone the Central Park Road School property in Plainview was heard this week by the Town Board. The application would allow the building to be converted into 100 units of senior citizens apartments.

The application was supported by a 1,000 name petition from people favoring the project.

The applicants, Donald Monti and Ralph Parisi, have a contract with the Plainview School District to buy the property. It consists of 5.3 acres. The buyers want to build a 19,800 sq. ft. office building on the Old Country Road side of the property in addition to the apartments.

The rezoning of the land had been before the Board on two previous occasions and was turned down because of traffic conditions. The present plan has the approval of a number of local people who were in attendance at the hearing and the Morton Village Civic Association.

The Board reserved decision on the plan.

### Public Hearing On Levittown Pools

A public hearing on a proposal to rehabilitate the Levittown Pools has been set for August 7 at Levittown Hall, in Hicksville, beginning at 9 a.m., it was announced recently by Presiding Supervisor Thomas S. Gulotta and Town Councilman Joseph N. Mondello. Councilman Mondello explained that the Levittown pools were constructed in the late 1940's at the time of the rapid development in the Levittown Community, and that they have not undergone a extensive rebuilding since that time. "The average useful life of a public pool is 20:25 years", stated Mondello. "These facilities are well over the 30 year mark. "The weathering effects of time and heavy usage have taken their toll on these facilities, and they are in need of major reconstruction. These pools provide a valuable network of recreational opportunities for many residents of Levittown, and our Town Board is dedicated to preserving the integrity of these pools. We believe the proposed expenditure will facilitate that preservation."

Under the Gulotta/Mondello plan; \$4.2 million will be raised through the issuance of bonds, with the proceeds to be applied towards structural rebuilding of all the pools in the district.

Approximately 87% of the required funds will be raised by Hempstead Town, while the remaining 13% will come from the Town of Oyster Bay. The Levittown Pools are actually part of the Oyster Bay-Hempstead Joint Community hall and Swimming Pool District, since a portion of the pools serve residents in the Town of Oyster Bay. For this reason, a joint meeting of the Hempstead and Oyster Bay Town Boards will be required to approve the rehabilitation expenditure.

Under the proposed plan, work would commence on the pools following the closure for the season. Included in the plan are: Slate Lane Pool, Acorn Lane Pool, Bluegrass Lane Pool, Wolcott Road Pool, Azalea Road Pool, Jerusalem Avenue Pool, West Village Green, Carman Avenue Pool and Parkway Pool. "The project will take several years to complete and hopefully it will not cause any pool closure during the summer season", stated Mondello.

## Our Children

### Shock may cure reckless driver

B) WILLARD ABRAHAM Ph.D.

**Q.** Our 17-year-old son is a senior in high school, doing quite well with his grades, and a fine boy in all ways — except one. He is a very reckless driver.

He has had a driver training course in school, and I am sure he knows all the rules, but he doesn't follow them. I suppose I could take his car keys (he has his own car that he bought with earnings from his grocery carry-out job), but would that teach him what he should know about auto safety? I don't think so.

**What suggestions do you have for relieving this terrible worry of mine? I don't want to be a nag, but I do want my boy to live.**

A visit to the emergency room of a hospital, an interview with one of their physicians, a session at a traffic court hearing, a conversation with one of its judges — these are a few ideas that may have a shock value for your son. So may a meeting he schedules with his driver training instructor, after you share your concern with him or her.

Your worry is shared by all thoughtful parents. Nice kids can end up in headlines and morgues, a tragedy that hits families among the friends and relatives of many of us. It is a national problem that remains unsolved.

I have felt for a long time that our youngsters, and most of us as well, could benefit from a periodic exposure to the Driver Improvement Program of the National Safety Council. Its emphasis is on "defensive" driving. A lot of drivers need reminding of the gamble they take with their lives, and those of others, every time they enter their cars.

The following facts come from the "Student Workbook" prepared by the Safety Council:

The major cause of death among youths under 25 years of age is traffic accidents.

Every 12 minutes someone dies in an automobile accident — five every hour, 129 every day.

In just one year nearly 50,000 persons are killed in traffic accidents, almost

equal to the total number killed in the Vietnam War — plus 2 million disabling injuries and economic loss of about \$20 billion dollars.

We can't always avoid the crackpot driver who may be in the back, in front, coming at us from the opposite direction, or speeding through a red or yellow light, but there are ways to build the odds on our side. Here are just three of them — and there are many more essential savers.

**Wear a safety belt.** It can help reduce injuries and save a life. Whether near home (half of all traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of home and at speeds of 40 mph or less), in a crash (being thrown out increases your chance of death or serious injury; chances of survival are five times as good if you stay inside the car), or in a car that catches on fire or goes into water (rare occurrences, with safety belts creating an extremely unlikely cause for being trapped — the belt may be your life-saving link).

**Don't drink and drive.** In fatal auto accidents 50 percent of the drivers had been drinking. It doesn't take much to reduce the necessary quick reactions and coordination — and black coffee, a cold shower or physical exercise may have only one result, turning a sleepy drunk into a wide-awake dangerous one.

**Learn, and remember, the "two-second rule."** It is based on staying at least two seconds behind the vehicle in front of yours. One way to judge this distance is to watch the vehicle in front pass a stationary object alongside the road. If you reach this same spot before completing a "one-thousand-one, one-thousand-two" count, you are just too close for comfort.

I guess we have to think about all this more often, and act on it too. An organization that has tried to take on at least one part of it is called MADD ("Mothers Against Drunk Drivers"), and its members need all the help they can get.

Is a "defensive driver training" course taken every two or three years too expensive? Compared to what? 50,000 lives a year? Yours? Your children's?

## Your Social Security



### No lump-sum payment

**Q.** I understand that the 1983 amendments changed the retirement age. How soon will this change become effective? — I.H.

A. The age of eligibility for unreduced retirement benefits, generally referred to as the retirement age which is now 65, will be increased to 67 in gradual steps starting in the year 2000.

**Q.** I am currently receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI). My daughter has a life insurance policy which names me beneficiary. If anything happened to her and I received the proceeds from the insurance, would this affect my SSI? — M.K.W.

A. Under SSI, income includes anything you receive. It even includes items you wouldn't have to report for federal or other tax purposes.

You are required to notify the Social Security Administration promptly of any change in your income.

**Q.** My husband has been deceased for 10 or more years. I was 56 this past April.

**When can I collect on my husband's Social Security? I also worked many years myself. Can I cash in on mine and get it in a lump sum? — V.P.**

A. You can apply for a reduced widow's benefit as early as age 60, but your retirement benefit based on your own work record is not payable until age 62.

Benefits would be payable for the rest of your life. You would not be able to receive them in a lump sum.

**Q.** I am receiving Social Security for myself and two teenagers based on my deceased husband's record. I am 36 years old. Will I still be able to draw for myself when my children's benefits stop? — L.S.

A. Your entitlement to mother's benefits end when your youngest child becomes age 16. However, benefits can be paid to the children for all months they attend high school full time up to age 19.

## Older mother at risk

We are in the midst of a baby boom again, and it is expected to peak around 1986. Exciting as this may be, there is apparently a new type of woman who is becoming pregnant. She is older, better educated and usually a career woman who has postponed early marriage and pregnancy. Now, she is over 30, married and wants a family, and she may be having some problems.

Dr. Vicki Georges Hufnagel, a Los Angeles obstetrician and gynecologist who spoke to food editors and writers at the 14th annual nutrition press conference sponsored by the Dairy Council of California, warned that older prospective mothers may face certain health risks, often due to prior and current lifestyles.

These career-oriented professional women live in a stressful world, and usually have all the destructive habits that stress produces. Though they may be highly motivated towards pregnancy, the ingrained habits developed in coping with stress can put them into both nutritional and physical risk situations. Hufnagel spoke of the "coffee drinkers, the smokers, and the wine-for-lunch group, who are too busy to exercise," as the women most likely to be at risk.

Today's fad of overdoing things and the sometime neurotic need to look like a magazine fashion model can also be non-productive when it comes to making healthy babies. Heavy aerobics can expose a pregnant woman to hyperthermia (excessive body temperature) which elevates the body core temperature and produces smaller growth of the fetus. Running marathons while pregnant can produce a stillborn child if the cord happened to be in the wrong position. Hufnagel also warns against heat-producing saunas and Jacuzzis because high temperatures can be dangerous to a developing fetus.

Working toward a healthy pregnancy is easier if couples have preconception process counseling to learn what to do, and what not to do before pregnancy occurs. Nutrition and education begin before conception. Outdated ideas and old-time notions have to be replaced with current information on needed nutrients and safe exercise.

Today, the male is also involved. His nutrition, alcohol and cigarette use prior to conception are important in his sperm, chromosome development. Men with low vitamin C levels have been found to have a slow-moving sperm, a possible infertility prob-

lem.

The most important time in pregnancy is the first 6 to 12 weeks, because the neuro-cord and brain development begin. Fat is vitally needed for brain development, and if the nutrition of the mother is enhanced well ahead of time, many sad, unnecessary problems might be avoided. Women are urged to gain between 25 and 30 pounds for a healthy pregnancy. It is no time to go on fad weight reduction diets. The stakes are too high.

If birth control pills have been used, vitamin supplements are suggested at least three months before becoming pregnant. Hufnagel said that older women need both folic acid and folate for three months prior to conception, because there is greater risk of chromosome problems and neuro tube defects than for younger women.

On the other hand, megadoses of vitamins, especially vitamin A, can be toxic and cause major problems. High doses of lecithin have been linked to retarded children. Tiny embryos cannot tolerate huge overdoses of anything.

A good nutrition program, based on the four food groups — milk and dairy products, fruits and vegetables, bread and cereals, and meat, fish and poultry, is vitally important to supply the needed nutrients. Supplementing with folic acid, B6, and a prenatal vitamin is suggested.

Weekly or every other week monitoring by a physician is recommended in all pregnancies, but is especially important in older, higher risk women. Increasing protein intake to between 80 and 100 grams, plus 2,000 milligrams of calcium per day are recommended protective measures.

Low levels of vitamin B6 and tryptophan are directly related to depression both during and after pregnancy. Milk and milk products provide them both, and are highly recommended in the diet.

Hufnagel suggests small multiple meals during early pregnancy to help decrease nausea and morning sickness.

A simple urine test for ketone, protein and sugar can be purchased at a pharmacy, and tested regularly by the patient at home. If ketones show up, the fetus is starving, and the diet must be improved and revised.

Positive protein or sugar reaction may mean an infection or other abnormality, and should be reported to the physician immediately.

Coffee, tea, alcohol, cola drinks and smoking are strictly prohibited during pregnancy. A fluid intake of 8 to 10 glasses per day is necessary to provide adequate body fluids, which are often low in older pregnant women.

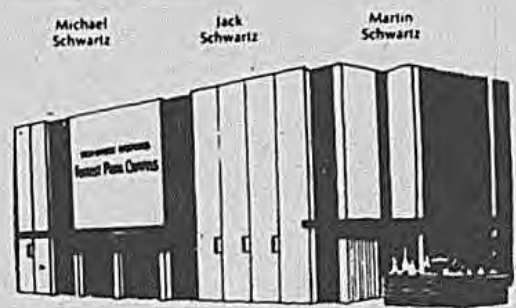

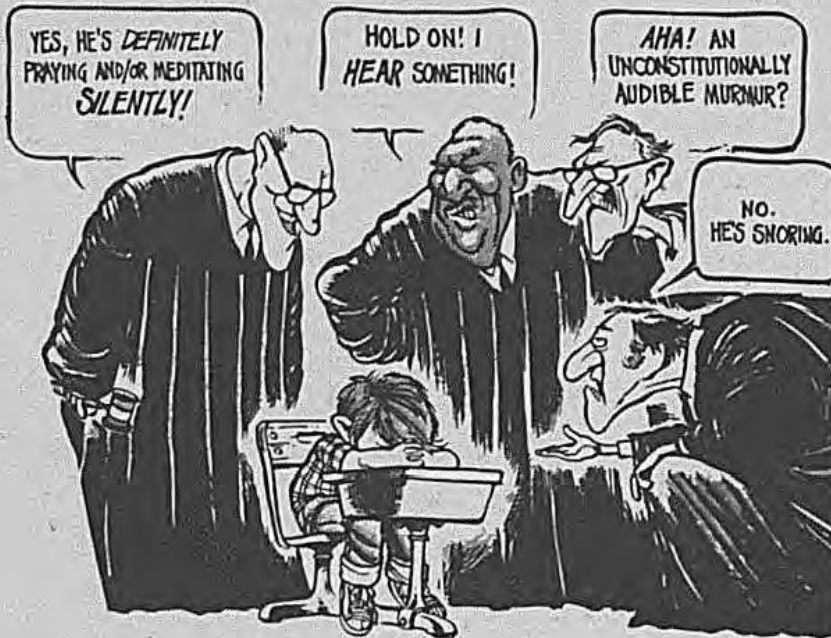

Trapped in the evolution taking place in film making we witnessed romantic (?) heroes like Lee Marvin, Charles Bronson, Richard Benjamin, Dustin Hoffman, Charles Coburn, and Arthur Kennedy, up there winning the girls: Liza Minelli, Barbara Streisand, Meryl Streep, Sally Field, and Margot Kidder. For my taste maybe that's a bit too much realism! Where's the glamour, the fun, the aspiration? Yes, I know we have Paul Newman and John Forsythe as exceptions but aren't they hold overs? Still it's easier this way. Everyone is in blue jeans or sweats. You needn't wonder about male and female. Sex goes all the way from PG to XXX and the language is normal everyday vernacular mumbled between a succession of four-lettered words.

So...now we have improvement...the ultimate in realism! The impact of this so-called realism has clobbered our society: as you know if you keep your eyes and ears open. Still, I'm optimistic: I sense a change acoming. I've noticed fewer hairy men, better dressed, and more feminine women of late. Is the cycle passing midpoint and heading to the return of the elevating images of the 40's and 50's? Boy, I can hardly wait for the appearance of another Maureen O'Hara and her impact on the feminine passing scene. Too...can there ever be another Cary Grant?

Q. Who is served first at table and when is the proper time to begin eating? F.G.P.

A. The hostess is not served first unless she is the only lady at the table or is alone with her husband and children. If Grandmother or even a young girl guest is present the dishes are first presented to her after inspection by the hostess. When the hostess is serving from in front of her place, with or without the aid of a servant, she is served next to last and her husband last. For her to serve herself earlier will mean her food will be cold and her filled plate in the way.

After several people have been served, urged by the hostess, guests begin eating so their food will not be cold. And, except at breakfast, the polite husband waits until his wife has been served before beginning to eat.

Q. Is it considered bad manners to take anything to drink to your lips while there is still food in your mouth? B.C.J.

A. Yes, because this may leave particles of food in the beverage or leave an unattractive smear on the glass. Your mouth should be empty before you take anything to drink. Certainly you should avoid the effect of "washing down" food that is already in your mouth. It is amazing how many people are guilty of this breach of etiquette.

# Cooking Corner

## New Orleans cooks

### NEW ORLEANS — Character and gusto

That's what the exuberant city of New Orleans is all about, particularly when it comes to food and music. Twenty-four hours a day, musicians wail out jazz, blues, Dixieland, ragtime, rock — you name it. And eating and drinking are allowed round the clock in elegant restaurants as well as on the streets of the city that never sleeps.

While recently visiting New Orleans, home of the 1984 World's Fair, I had a chance to zero in on the extraordinarily memorable foods of the area. Consider the dishes — always done "just right" and piled high — rich with zingy sauces reminiscent of the New Orleansians and their eating palaces that made the food famous. Ever present is the freshly caught seafood so abundant in the state: catfish, crab, crayfish (pronounced "crawfish"), gulf trout, oysters and redfish.

Legend holds that the good and righteous in Louisiana don't go to heaven, but to the big kitchen in the sky.

### Hallelujah, brother!

With such outstanding diversions as those in New Orleans and at the fair, can good food be far behind? Certainly not in the city of such legendary restaurants as Antoinette's, Arnaud's, Brennan's, K-Paul's, Galatoire's, Tujague's, Jonathan's — the litany brings memories of delight to the mind and tongue of the New Orleans traveler. And thoughts where food is outdone only by hospitality.

And for those who have not yet had the pleasure of dining at any of those establishments or in New Orleans? For those who have not tasted the succulent crayfish or sipped a Brandy Punch (cool milk, brandy and egg white with nutmeg dashed on top) during a Jazz Brunch — where the musicians move table to table to play personalized pizzazz from a muted horn or a gutsy plunking on a bass?

Into their bag of hope and plans, they can tuck the Crescent City experience — with its food and beauty, its characters and gusto and all that jazz that is New Orleans. For to know the soul of America is to include understanding of the Mardi Gras city of dreams.

Any culture that calls for "toes" of garlic in a recipe has the all-important quality in its food that sets it apart from ho-hum food. That quality is character.

Following are New Orleans recipes to enjoy at home — with all the gusto of the Crescent City.

### SHRIMP ETOUFFEE

- 3 tbsps. butter
- 3 tbsps. oil
- 6 tbsps. flour
- 2 cups chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 4 "toes" (cloves) garlic, chopped
- 1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste
- 2 (10 oz.) cans beef consommé
- 2 cups water
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 tsp. basil
- ½ tsp. thyme
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- ¼ tsp. cayenne pepper
- ¼ tsp. black pepper
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 lbs. peeled shrimp
- 1 cup chopped shallots
- 2 tbsps. chopped parsley
- ½ cup sliced green olives (optional)
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms (optional)

Melt butter and oil in heavy pot. Add flour, stirring over low heat, until flour is brown. (This roux may take up to 20 minutes.) Dump chopped onion, green pepper, celery and garlic in pot. Add tomato paste and mix well. Add beef consommé and 2 cups water. While this simmers slowly, add bay leaves, basil, thyme, chili powder, cayenne pepper, black pepper and salt. After mixture has simmered 45 minutes, add peeled shrimp, shallots, parsley and optional olives and/or mushrooms. Let cook about 20 minutes until shrimp are done. Let pot stand on back of stove for another hour. Reheat if necessary and serve over rice.

A must when visiting New Orleans is to enjoy some leisure moments over a pile of hot *beignets*, deep-fried chunks of dough usually served in a billowy bed of powdered sugar. Some recipes call for a yeast base and two risings. This is one of the easiest recipes we know.

### BEIGNETS (Bayn-AY)

- 2 cups flour
- 1 tbsps. sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- Pinch baking soda
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg

Sift dry ingredients into bowl. Add milk and egg and mix well. Drop by spoonfuls into deep fat heated to 375 F. Fry until golden and drain on paper towels. Serve with powdered sugar (or syrup and butter) and *café au lait* (coffee with milk).

Although Copeland's Cajun-style

restaurant won't share its secret recipe for this dish, here is a version that should be a close reproduction.

### SHRIMP BUCKTOWN

- 1 lb. spaghetti, cooked
- 1½ lbs. medium shrimp, cooked and shelled
- 2-3 artichoke hearts, quartered
- ¼ lb. cooked ham, diced
- ¼ lb. mushrooms, sliced and sautéed
- Cream-cheese sauce:**
- ½ cup butter
- ½ cup heavy cream
- 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- Salt, freshly ground pepper

Cook spaghetti until *al dente*. Drain, but keep hot. In saute pan, heat shrimp, artichoke hearts, ham and mushrooms in bit of butter or oil or both. To make sauce: Heat butter and cream in saucepan until butter is melted. Remove from heat. Add cheese, salt and pepper. Stir until blended and fairly smooth.

To assemble: Toss spaghetti with sauteed shrimp, ham and vegetables. Place in buttered ovenproof serving dish and top with prepared sauce. May sprinkle with finely chopped parsley and/or Parmesan cheese.

One of the most popular Creole dishes, jambalaya can be served with seafood, sausage, poultry, meat or any combination.

### JAMBALAYA

- ¼ cup oil
- 1½ lbs. spicy sausage
- 1 chicken, cut up or boned
- 4 cups onion
- 2 cups celery
- 2 cups green pepper
- 1 tbsps. garlic, chopped
- 5 cups stock or water with bouillon
- 3 heaping tps. salt
- Cayenne pepper
- 4 cups long-grain rice
- 1 cup green onion
- 1 cup parsley, chopped
- Chopped tomatoes (optional)

Saute sausage in oil (lard, bacon drippings). Remove from pot. Season and brown chicken. Remove

from pot. For brown jambalaya, add a heaping tablespoon brown sugar to oil and caramelize or add 1-2 tablespoons of Kitchen Bouquet. For red jambalaya, add some paprika. Saute onion, celery, green pepper and garlic until vegetables are tender. Return chicken and sausage to pot and simmer with vegetables. Add liquid and bring to boil. Add salt, pepper and rice and return to boil. Cover and reduce heat to simmer. Cook 30 to 35 minutes without peeking. (When cooking 6 or more cups of rice, it is necessary to move rice away from sides of pot 10 minutes after covering.) Add green onion and parsley, and chopped tomatoes if desired. For seafood jambalaya, add seafood at this point.

Note: The liquid-to-rice ratio is 1 cup raw rice to 1½ cups liquid; 1 cup raw rice feeds 3 people.

New Orleans cooking teacher Joe Cahn points out that "gumbo need not be thick to be good."

### CREOLE GUMBO

- 1½ lbs. Andouille sausage or

- diced Canadian bacon
- 1 chicken, cut up
- 1 cup oil
- 1 cup flour
- 4 cups onion
- 2 cups celery
- 2 cups green pepper
- 1 tbsps. garlic, chopped
- 8 cups stock or water with bouillon
- Cayenne pepper
- Salt
- 1 cup green onion
- 1 cup parsley, chopped
- Cooked rice
- File (spice which acts as thickening agent)

Saute sausage in oil, lard or bacon drippings. Remove from pot. Season and brown chicken. Remove from pot. Heat cup of oil and stir in flour to make a *roux*, taking it to brown — almost black — stage.

Add onion, celery, green pepper and garlic. Cook until glaze forms on vegetables. Return chicken and sausage to pot and cook on low heat. Gradually stir in liquid and bring to boil. Reduce to simmer and cook an hour or more. Season to taste. Approximately 10 minutes before serving, add green onion and parsley. Serve over rice. Add file to individual servings.

Why so p...

Rice has become an important part of American cooking and American agriculture. The United States is now the world's largest exporter of rice, and people in this country are eating more rice than ever before.

For many years rice was thought of as a Southern food. It first became popular in the cooking of the Carolinas and in the regional Creole cooking of Louisiana. Today, almost every kitchen in the country has a box of rice on the shelf.

There are a number of reasons for this popularity. Rice can be prepared in hundreds of different ways, and a rice dish with a bit of meat, cheese or vegetables makes a satisfying and inexpensive main course.

Rice comes from *Dryza sativa*, a cereal grass that is grown in temperate climates throughout the world, and there are almost 10,000 varieties. The ones most commonly sold in this country are:

Regular-milled long-grain white rice — the most popular in American cooking. When cooked, the grains are fluffy and separate.

Medium- and short-grain white rice — used in desserts and in dishes that require a stickier, less fluffy grain.

Brown rice — the same grain as white rice, but the outer layers of

add their own. The powder acts quickly as a liaison. If boiled, it becomes stringy, so stir it in only after soup or stew has been removed from heat; ¼ to ½ teaspoon per serving is recommended.

In nearly every gift shop and food emporium in New Orleans, these sugary candies are a strong part of the scene. Some candy-making stores have windows that allow views of the giant copper bowls and light-brown bubbling sugar of pralines in the making.

#### PRALINES

- 1½ cups sugar
- ¾ cup light brown sugar, packed
- ½ cup milk
- ¾ stick butter
- 1½ cups pecans

Combine all ingredients. Bring to soft ball stage (238-240 F). Remove from heat and stir until mixture cools and thickens. Spoon on buttered wax paper, aluminum foil or parchment paper.

Other suggestions using praline base: Praline sauce, chocolate-covered praline candy, flavored pralines (chocolate, coffee, brandy), praline sundaes.

Many cooks stay away from rice dishes because they're afraid of producing a gummy mess instead of light, fluffy grains — remember those television commercials in which a young bride anguished over her gooey rice? Here's an easy and virtually fool-proof way to boil the rice of your dreams.

Boil water double the volume of the rice you plan to cook. In a heavy saucepan with a tight-fitting lid, melt a tablespoon of butter for each cup of rice. Measure the rice carefully, add to the butter and stir with a wooden spoon until the grains are well coated. Pour in the boiling water, salt to taste and stir until the water returns to a boil. Cover and cook, without stirring, for 18 minutes on medium-low setting. For extra-fluffy rice, remove the lid from the saucepan and cover with a kitchen towel. Replace the cover and set aside, off the heat, for a few minutes. The towel will absorb much of the steam that comes off the rice. Fluff the rice with a fork before serving.

#### LEMON RICE WITH GRAPES

- 1½ tbsps. butter
- 1 cup uncooked long-grain white rice
- 2 cups boiling water

- Salt to taste
- 1 large lemon
- 1 cup seedless green grapes, halved lengthwise

In large saucepan, heat butter over medium heat. Add rice and cook, stirring, for 3 minutes. Add boiling water, continuing to stir, and salt to taste. When water boils again, reduce heat to low and cook 18 minutes.

#### CALIFORNIA CASSEROLE

- 4 cups hot cooked rice
- 1 cup cottage cheese
- 2 cups sour cream
- 1 cup chopped onion
- ¼ cup melted butter
- 1 bay leaf, crumbled
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. freshly ground black pepper
- 3 (10 oz.) cans peeled, whole green chilies
- 2 cups grated sharp cheddar cheese

Lightly grease large casserole. Mix hot rice with cottage cheese, sour cream, onion, butter, bay leaf, salt and pepper. Spread half the mixture in bottom of casserole, cover with half the chilies, sprinkle with half the cheddar cheese and repeat.

Bake, uncovered, 25 minutes at 375 F.

bran and germ and have not been "polished" off. Brown rice is much more nutritious than white rice, and is higher in calories. Ironically, the more nutritious brown rice was the standard in Asia until this century, when Western polishing techniques were introduced. Today, the less nourishing white rice has become a "status" food in many countries where adequate nutrition is a real concern.

Parboiled rice — treated with a steam-pressure process that seals in vitamins and minerals. Uncooked parboiled rice is light gold in color.

Arborio — grown in Italy's Po River valley. Used for risottos and other Italian rice dishes.

Aromatic rices — mutations of long-grain rice that have distinctive flavors. Aromatic rices are often sold in gourmet and specialty food stores.

Wild rice — not really a rice at all, but an aquatic grass native to North America. Indians in Canada and several Northern states still harvest the rice by hand — a tedious, time-consuming process that accounts for wild rice's very high price. Adding some wild rice — perhaps a quarter of the total rice called for — to a recipe adds a delicious touch without wrecking your budget. Cultivated wild rice, which is sometimes misleadingly sold as Indian wild rice, does not approach the taste of the real thing.

## Here's How

By Gene Gary



Q. We have foul odor coming from the kitchen sink drain on the garbage disposer side. It happens several times a month from that drain, but nowhere else in the house.

The garbage disposer is used only occasionally. I have taken it apart and I've also checked the hose from the dishwasher, looking for decaying material. There was none in either place.

I have scrubbed the garbage disposer cavity, replaced the rubber collar and stopper for the sink drain, and have tried certain other treatments. Nothing helps.

Do you think the foul odor could be coming up from the sewer? If so, what should be done? If not, what else do you think? — E.R.P.

A. The trap may have gone dry because of evaporation of water that should close it, or a crack in a waste or vent pipe, or a loosened joint in the waste line.

The U-trap is designed so that there should always be water in it. This water prevents sewer gases from backing up into the house. These gases are toxic and sometimes inflammable. That is why, when it is necessary for any reason to drain the water from the pipes, that some water be kept in the traps.

Incidentally, when the trap under the kitchen sink gets clogged every year or so, it usually means that someone is permitting non-liquid substances to go down the drain instead of removing them from the sink.

Heavy grease can also coat the wall of the trap and cause trouble. When such grease cannot effectively be prevented from entering the drain, it is a good idea to turn on the hot water for a few minutes to flush away the grease before it has a chance to settle in the trap.

If it is a case that the trap has gone dry, pour a pail of water into the drain. If you cannot find the trouble after probing all these possibilities, I strongly suggest you call a competent plumber for a thorough inspection. A qualified plumber should be able to determine what is wrong.

Q. I have what appears to be a film of grease on the inside of my car windshield. I have tried a variety of commercial cleaners to remove it, but with no luck.

The advice I received from a glass shop to use a razor blade to scrape it off did not work either.

I also consulted with a profes-

sional window cleaner and he tried trisodium phosphate to no avail.

What can I do to remove this hazardous film short of replacing my windshield?

Perhaps it is important to mention that last summer I had a new dashboard put in my car. It was

after this that I noticed the film. Could it be the glue they used? — Terry A.K.

A. I have a couple of suggestions that may or may not work. You could try a wash-away paint remover, being sure to mask off the dashboard area.

Or you could consult a company that paints and refinishes automobiles. These firms have all kinds of chemicals which they need in their business.

Is it possible that somehow the interior of your windshield glass has become so clouded? If so, then you would need a new windshield.

Auto paint company people should be able to give you a more definite answer after a personal inspection of your problem.

Q. I would appreciate your advice on how to clean, strip, restore and refinish a quarry tile floor in an entry hall. The house was built in the '30s and the history of its care is unknown.

Any suggestions for improvement will be welcome. — Anita L.R.

A. Make a paste of scouring powder containing bleach with warm water. Mop this over the surface and let it stand for 15 minutes. Then scrub with a stiff brush and rinse well and dry. The floor can then be waxed with a wax suitable for use on terrazzo.

If this floor has a wax buildup on the surface, use a good floor stripper before you proceed with the above suggestions.

## Mainly For Seniors

Dear John: The cost for health care is still going up and naturally the cost of health insurance is, too. Where is it all going to end?

Or better still, what can we do to put a brake on it all? — Joe P.

Dear Joe: One of the few solutions to the problem of rising health care costs is prevention. People should be made more aware of preventive health measures and the need for early treatment of symptoms. That's when the cost is at a minimum, not to mention the danger of whatever the person has.

In fact, illness and medical problems can often be prevented or alleviated by simple changes in lifestyle and dietary habits.

And annually, with many conditions, the sooner they are treated, the more susceptible they are to treatment.

Yet for some older people in this country, a visit to the doctor or health professional is made only as a last resort. Often this is because of a lack of knowledge of symptoms, fear of illness, or confusion about health services that are available.

For older persons in ethnic or minority groups, these drawbacks can be compounded by a language barrier or differing ethnic and cultural traditions.

To determine what factors act as barriers to use of the health care system by ethnic, minority and rural elderly, and what factors may encourage use, the

Andrus Foundation of the American Association of Retired Persons has just awarded research grants to the Department of Medicine of East Carolina University and the Gerontology Education and Training Center of San Jose (Calif.) State University.

Researchers in San Jose will be interviewing Hispanic, Portuguese and Vietnamese elderly in an effort to determine how various factors, including attitudes, expectations, social groups, past experiences and accessibility, affect their use of health services.

Dear John: I've been reading a lot recently about the use of bee pollen. What is this all about? — Elsa H.

Dear Elsa: Bees gather pollen and bring it to their hive for food. Pollen is the fertilizing dust of flowers. Without pollen, plants, trees and flowers could not exist.

For that matter, neither could we.

Bee pollen contains all 22 nutrients required for perfect health, 18 vitamins, all minerals we need, all known enzymes and coenzymes, fatty acids, carbohydrates, protein and amino acids.

Actually bee pollen is considered nature's most perfect food. Many people use it, including athletes, for stamina and energy.



## TWEEN 12 & 20

Teens: Experiencing disappointment is an unavoidable part of life, but rather than letting it make you sad or mad, learn to redirect your thoughts to take the "glad route."

"You feel the way you do at any given moment because of the thoughts you are having," explains David Friedman, author of a Seventeen magazine feature. So, he advises teens, "the key to changing or controlling your moods is changing or controlling your thoughts."

Scientists have discovered that the thoughts which cause a person to feel sad or mad after a disappointment are nearly always illogical. For example, "If a teen gets a B on a test in which she'd hoped for an A, she reacts as if she got an F — which in reality isn't what happened at all," he says.

In addition, Friedman points out, feelings can often be misleading because "they are not necessarily based on fact."

Start on the glad route by rejecting emotional responses.

"Think about your experiences rather than merely reacting to them emotionally," Friedman encourages teens. "Realize you can learn from your mistakes."

And then, understand that no one can lower a person's self-esteem except himself or herself.

The next time disappointment strikes, talk back to your internal critics, Friedman says. One easy method, he says, involves a technique described by Dr. David D. Burns, author of "Feeling Good."

"Start by finding a private place, and write down all the thoughts (not feelings) that went through your head immediately after your disappointing experience," Friedman says.

Then, write down what you really know to be true. If, for example, you receive a lower than expected test score, an initial thought might be, "I'm a total failure." However, when you write down what you really know to be the case, you'll realize that this grade simply means you might not have scored as well as you wanted to, but you're not a total failure. You know there are lots of tests you've done well on in the past.

Following this strategy as a way to control mood swings will do more than help a teen to bounce back from disappointment.

"The more you think about the way you think," Friedman concludes, "the

less likely you are to repeat the errors in thinking you've made in the past."

Dr. Wallace: My mom promised me that if I got a "B" average on my last report card she would send me to camp this summer.

Well I got a B-plus average but my mom said that she doesn't want me to go to camp. When I told her that she promised me she said that parents can break promises to their children.

Do you agree with her? — William

William: A promise, regardless of who makes it, should be fulfilled.

Dr. Wallace: I'm a 16-year-old girl and for the first time a boy is interested in me romantically. Jim comes over to my house every day and we have been to the movies together. My parents really like Jim and they are thrilled that I have a boyfriend.

But I'm not perfect. In fact, I have two major problems — I smoke and eat too much. I smoke two packs of cigarettes a day and I weigh over 200

pounds even though I am only 5 feet tall.

I plan to quit smoking "cold turkey" tomorrow and today is my last day of "pigging out." I have already visited a licensed nutritionist and will begin my new eating habits the day after I stop smoking. (I don't want to start two difficult tasks at the same time.)

I'm really excited about the "new me." I really like Jim and I won't allow my nasty habits to lose my friendship with him.

Any advice you give me will be appreciated. I'm determined to succeed. — Connie

Connie: You don't need my advice. You know your problems and you are solving them in the correct manner.

I'm thrilled that you have the courage and determination to quit smoking and to eat properly. These are two habits that human beings find difficult to overcome. But I know you will overcome them.

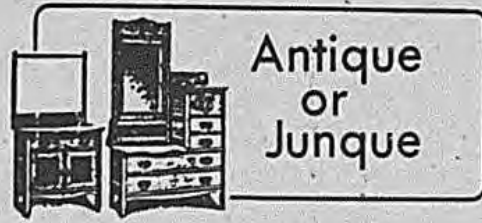

## Haviland could gain value in future

Q. My Haviland china has a mark that is different from any others that I have seen. Can you tell me when it was used? I am enclosing a sketch of the mark.



A. This mark was used from 1936 to 1945. Since World War II also occurred in the same period, there was not much china made with this mark. It is scarce, but not more valuable than Haviland china made just before or just after. However, I think in years to come it will become quite valuable.

Q. This doll is marked on the back of her neck with an "M" in a wreath and "Made in Japan." She is in excellent condition. Can you tell me something about this doll and its approximate value?



A. Your doll was made by Morimura in the early 20th century and would sell in the \$225 to \$275 range.

Q. Why are Mettlach steins worth so much more than other kinds? Some are just as old or older and some are just as good quality.

A. Villeroy & Boch, who made steins at Mettlach, Germany, also added some features that appeal to collectors. Each stein is numbered for

identification; it is easy to establish the vintage. Other steins provide little to identify or date them.

## Points On Pets

Q. Several of our friends have had problems with strangles in their horses this year.

We have two registered quarter horses and are quite concerned about them getting exposed whenever our children and our friend's children ride together. We do not want to ruin our good friendships, but we do want to do the best thing for our horses.

A. The cause of strangles, commonly called distemper, is a bacteria named Streptococcus equi. Strangles is most commonly seen in young horses.

The disease is quite contagious. Strangles epidemics are often seen in groups of horses at race tracks, sale barns, stables, fairs and shows. Strangles can become a problem whenever large groups of horses are assembled.

Conditions that predispose horses to strangles include exposure to wet, cold weather; shipment; stress; fatigue; and viral infections that affect the respiratory tract.

The causative bacteria, spread by contact with infected horses or by contact with contaminated objects, is capable of surviving in the infectious form for months on contaminated objects or in barns.

It takes 4 to 10 days for the first signs of the disease to appear following exposure to the bacteria. Usually the first sign is refusal to eat or drink. Early signs also in-

clude depression, very high temperatures and a white discharge from the nose. A rectal temperature as high as 106 F may be seen. The normal rectal temperature of the horse is approximately 102 F.

By the third or fourth day of the disease, the lymph glands under the jaw begin to swell, become quite sensitive and eventually break open and discharge pus. Affected animals are reluctant to swallow and often stand with the neck extended.

In individual horses the duration of the disease is usually about 2 weeks. The course of an outbreak in a herd may extend over several months.

Treatment of horses with strangles usually includes injections of antibiotics, good nursing care with complete rest and isolation from other horses. The affected horses should have clean, fresh water and clean feed.

Sometimes it is necessary to drain and pack the abscessed lymph glands. In severe cases an emergency tracheostomy may be required to allow the horse to breathe.

Any horse with signs of strangles should be isolated from other horses. Any equipment used on horses with strangles should be thoroughly disinfected before being used on other horses.

At horse shows and fairs, equipment and tack should not be passed between horses. Likewise, water buckets and feed pans
