Hicksville Teachers Protest Lack Of Contract

Protesting the lack of a renewed teacher's contract, over 200 members of the Hicksville Congress of Teachers picketed the Board of Education meeting on Wednesday night.

Led by President Bob Zaleski and Vice President Elaine Kabakoff, the teachers filed into the Conference Room at the Administration Building and waited for the General Public Session of the meeting to voice their message to the Board. The message was repeated by representatives of each school in the district by teachers who are residents of the community. Over and over they stated that the Board did not care about their employees since the practice in the Hicksville School District since 1978 was for delinquent contractual negotiations with all types of employees.

President of the Board William Bennett denied that the Board was not interested in coming to a fair settlement. He added that the union had initiated the services of a fact finder and they were not agreeable to accept his findings.

Michael Melody, a resident and graduate of the Hicksville School System, read a lengthy letter to the Board of Education regarding holiday observances in the elementary schools this year. Mr. Melody cited that some songs had portions deleted for winter concerts and he supported his feelings for continuing the traditions of the schools in Hicksville with a 420 signature petition. He added that more signatures would be forthcoming to support observing all holiday procedures in the future as had been done in the past. Mr. Bennett replied that to his knowledge there had not been any changes in the schools' schedules this year.

The Board also approved the continuation of applying for a \$7500 matching grant from the Town of Oyster Bay for support of the Hicksville Youth Activities Program. The program is conducted in late Winter/early Spring. The winter activities include floor hockey, weight training, aerobic dance, volleyball, basketball and box lacrosse. Last year the winter schedule was held at the senior high school on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays between the hours of 6 and 9 p.m.

With unanimous approval by all seven members of the Board, Susan Wolf, Chairman of Secondary Language Arts, was granted tenure effective March 1, 1985. Ms. Wolf will continue in her assignment at the Junior High School.

Paul Martin, a representative of New York Telephone, presented the Hicksville Board of Education with an award for Commitment to Excellence. In keeping with the "year of the Olympics" Mr. Martin said, the plaque contains several postal stamps denoting the event, and includes the names of the members of the Board.

The Board adjourned its meeting wishing everyone a happy holiday season and announcing that the next meetings would be scheduled for January 30 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room at the Administration Building.

Fork Lane Math Olympiad

The digits of a two-digit number are interchanged to form a new two-digit number. If the difference of the original number and the new number is 45, find the largest two-digit number which satisfies these conditions.

This is just a "brain teaser" among many asked at a recent Math Olympiad that Fork Lane School hosted. In Hicksville, eight elementary schools participate and rotate buildings each month as host to the teams. There are 15 students per building that travel from school to school. Selection of the members at Fork Lane, for instance, are made by the total number of correct responses from the previous meet.

All Enrichment students from Grades 4, 5 and 6 are members of the Math Olympiad team. Additionally, the questions are opened up to the other students in the school. At the discretion of each individual teacher, questions are administered to those students not part of the "traveling teams". At the close of the day, those answer sheets are collected and scored, and the following morning the questions and answers are reversed.

For those 120 students who attend the meet, answer sheets are distributed. Questions are given out and read aloud as well, with the time limit adhered to. Answer sheets are then collected and solutions explained. Refreshments are served prior to the meet. Thanks to Fork Lane's Math Resource Teacher John Maiorino for being the ever-gracious host at this recent event.

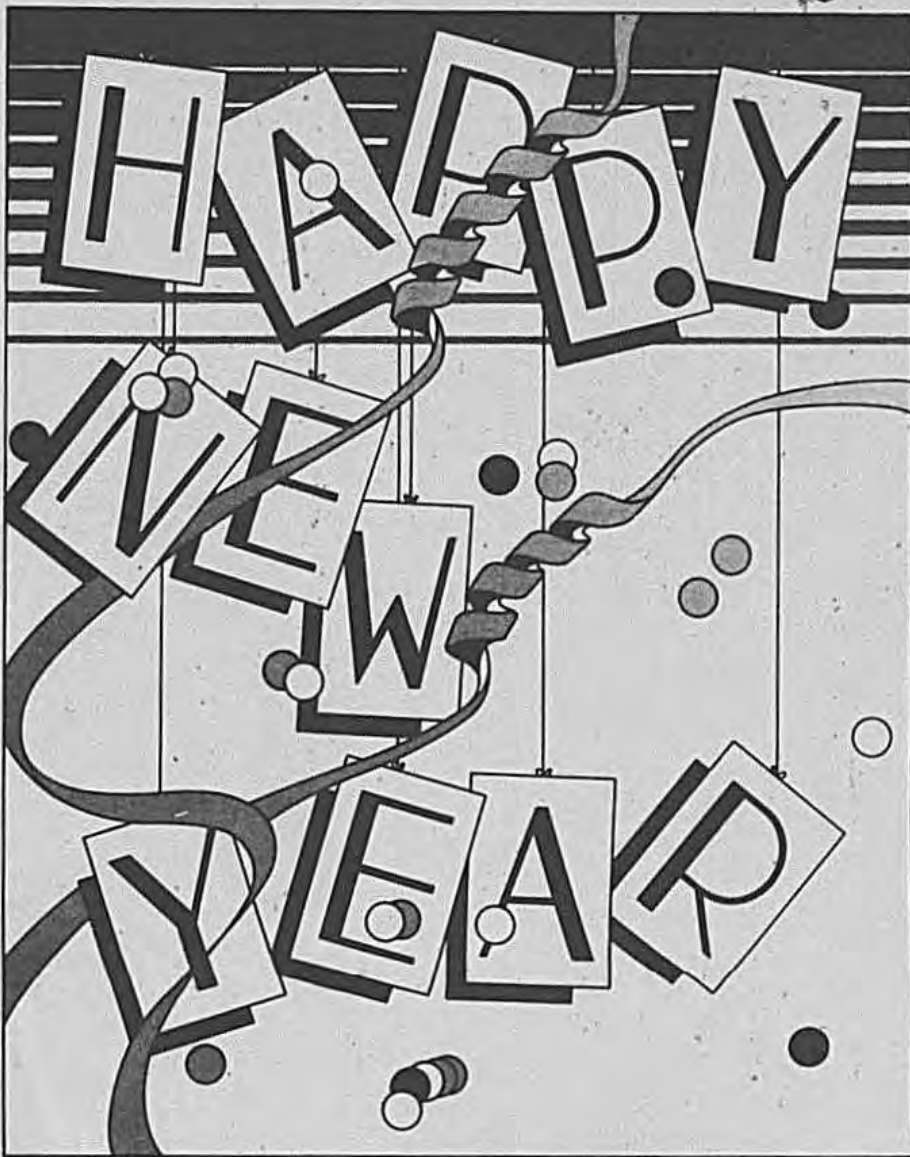

Our Children

Q. My mother is quite old and there seems no chance that she will survive her current cancer involvement. Our children love her very much because she has been very close to them.

Obviously I don't even want to think of her in terms of death, but the inevitability of it forces me to consider our children and the influence of her impending death on them.

A. From a source that you might expect (the National Funeral Directors Association) come some ideas that might be useful to you and others. The following is directly from their news release. Even though you might not agree with all of the ideas, here they are for you to think about.

"Where do people go when they die? Does it hurt to die? Do only old people die? What is 'dead'? These are a few questions children ask about death and dying.

"How can you answer them? 'Tell them the truth,' says Morris A. Nilsen, president of the National Funeral Directors Association. Children should not be told fairy tales about death. Explaining death to a child is not easy, especially if it's the death of a beloved grandparent."

"In her book, 'Grief, Dying and Death: Clinical Interventions for Caregivers,' (Research Press, Champaign, Ill.) psychologist Therese A. Rando, Ph.D., says, 'Children need an honest explanation that will enable them to grapple with the terrible, but unavoidable experience of loss.'

"In explaining the death of a loved one, Dr. Rando suggests:

- "The child be told immediately of the death, in a calm, normal voice to prevent his/her hearing it from someone else.

- "The child should be told by someone close to him/her in secure, familiar surroundings.

- "The child be given as honest an explanation as possible within his/her limits of understanding.

- "Conveying to the child that he/she is loved and will continue to be loved even though a sad thing has happened.

- "Letting the child know that it's all right to feel sad and that he/she should talk about those feelings.

- "Giving the child the option of attending the funeral and other rituals of mourning with the family. Children are often sheltered, but have the right and the need to be included.

"Says Dr. Rando, 'If children are not included, they start to feel insecure and abandoned as they see adults reacting to and sharing in an experience they cannot share. If children do decide to attend the funeral, explain to them in advance what to expect. Funeral rituals offer nothing for a child to fear. Of course, the funeral will be sad, but it is always sad to lose a loved one.'

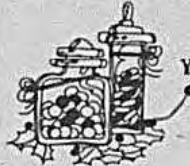

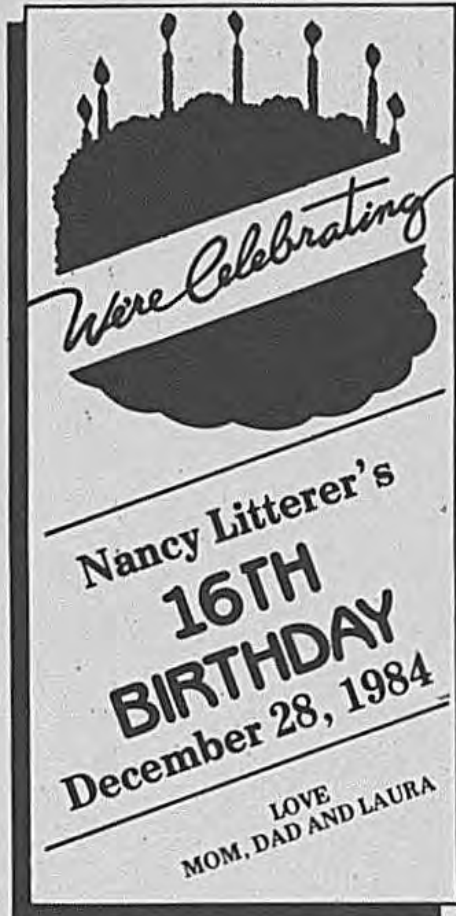

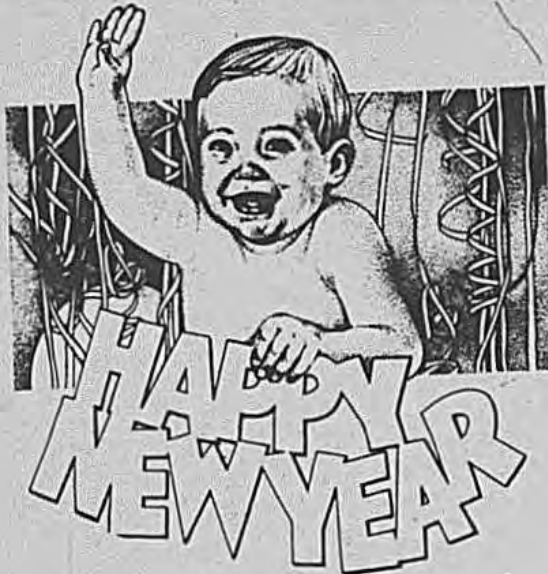

At Year's End -

A Fantasy? Or Future?

As the final days are approaching in this the historic year of 2,000 A.D. I exult first in the incredible phenomenon of 15 years of total peace on the planet Earth. 

Turkey replays

The origin of the word "turkey" probably is the result of confusion in England about the bird's pedigree. American Indians called the bird turkee, and this name probably was used by the Spanish who took some of the fowl home with them from the continent. When the gobblers were introduced to England from Europe, some authorities speculate, the name led people to assume that the species was of Turkish origin.

Turkeys are native to the Americas and the original wild turkey was closely related to the pheasant. Indians domesticated turkeys long before the first Europeans arrived here. The Spanish conquistadores took American turkeys home with them and bred them with European fowl. The resulting cross-strains later were reintroduced to this continent, where they mixed with the native stock, producing the wild turkey which exists here today.

Over the last few centuries the domesticated varieties have been bred for tenderness and a maximum of breast meat so that the turkey from your local market is a very different bird from the primeval wild turkey.

A roast turkey is an excellent choice for holiday entertaining. It's relatively inexpensive, easy to cook and popular with almost everyone. A real bonus is the leftover turkey meat, which lends itself to any number of uses.

Turkey sandwiches, sliced turkey and gravy on toast and turkey soup are probably the most common leftover turkey meals, but there are lots of other delicious

ways to turn your leftovers into special dinners. The following recipes are some of our favorites.

TURKEY TETRAZZINI

6 oz. (dry weight) macaroni or thick noodles, cooked

1½ cups finely chopped mushrooms, sauteed in butter

1½ lbs. cooked turkey meat, coarsely shredded

3 oz. slivered almonds (optional)

¼ cup fine bread crumbs

¼ cup Romano cheese, finely grated

For Sauce:

3 tbsps. butter

1½ tbsps. flour

1½ cups chicken stock

½ tsp. dried basil

½ tsp. rosemary

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

1 cup heavy cream

¼ cup dry white wine

In large skillet, over moderate heat, melt butter and whisk in flour to form roux. Stir in chicken stock, basil, rosemary and salt and pepper to taste. Reduce heat to simmer and stir in heavy cream and wine. Remove sauce from heat.

Add half of sauce to macaroni or noodles and stir in sauteed mushrooms. Add other half of sauce to turkey meat. Lightly grease baking dish and cover bottom with noodles. Layer turkey over noodles and sprinkle with slivered almonds (optional). In small bowl, mix together bread crumbs and Romano cheese. Sprinkle cheese/bread crumb

mixture evenly over turkey and bake in preheated 375 F oven until cheese is lightly browned and bubbling.

Serves 4 to 6.

TURKEY CASSEROLE WITH MUSHROOMS

4 tbsps. butter

1½ tbsps. flour

10 oz. chicken stock

¼ cup dry white wine

1 pinch nutmeg

Two-thirds cup heavy cream

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

1 cup sliced mushrooms

3 egg yolks, beaten in ¼ cup milk

1 tbsp. finely chopped onion

½ tsp. cayenne

1½ lbs. cooked turkey meat, sliced

One-third cup fine bread crumbs

One-third cup Parmesan cheese

Butter to dot casserole

In large saucepan, heat 3 tablespoons butter and stir in flour to form roux. Do not allow roux to brown. Add chicken stock and white wine. Cook sauce for 5 to 6 minutes, until slightly reduced, add nutmeg, cream, salt and pepper.

While sauce is cooking, saute mushrooms in small frying pan in remaining 1 tablespoon butter for 3 to 4 minutes.

Bring sauce to boil and add mushrooms. Slowly add egg yolks beaten in milk, stirring constantly.

Add chopped onion, cayenne and turkey meat and cook, stirring, over moderate heat until turkey is heated through (2 to 3 minutes).

Pour mixture into casserole, top with bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese and place under broiler, about 4 inches from source of heat, until topping is slightly browned.

Serves 4.

Doctor's Forum

Surgery only treatment

Q. Is there any treatment for cataracts besides surgery? Can they be dissolved? — J.T., Parkton, N.C.

A. The lens of the human eye is different from all other structures in the body in that older cells are not sloughed off. Newer cells are laid upon older cells.

One can imagine, therefore, that after 50 to 70 years, the innermost cells which are the oldest would not be as clear as they were in youth. What this all means is that we all eventually will get cataracts if we live long enough.

Since cataracts are produced by aging and since we do not have any particular cure for aging yet, we therefore do not have a means to treat cataracts without performing surgery.

There are some very rare types of cataracts occurring in children which are related to abnormalities of protein metabolism which can be treated by diet, but normal adult-onset cataracts cannot be treated by vitamins, pills, eye exercises, etc., once they have formed.

Some recent theories suggest that ultraviolet light may stimulate the process of cataract formation, and consequently new lenses are being developed to absorb these potentially damaging rays.

The options for the cataract patient today, therefore, are limited to surgery. When should one consider having cataracts removed? It is no longer the standard of care to wait until one's cataracts become "ripe." The time at which cataracts should be removed is that time when the cataracts decrease the patient's vision to the level the patient is not able to perform the normal activities of daily living; for example, reading, sewing, watching television, etc.

The choices to patients today are to have standard and safe intracapsular cataract extraction which requires ultimate correction with glasses, daily wear hard or soft contact lenses, or continuously worn contact lenses.

Another choice is the type of cataract procedure which removes most of the cataract, but leaves behind a membrane onto which an intraocular lens can be

placed. This plastic lens is sewn into the eye at the time of cataract surgery, eliminating the need for contact lenses or thick cataract glasses.

More recently there is a third alternative for patients who already had cataract surgery and who are unable to tolerate glasses or contact lenses and for one reason or another cannot have an intraocular lens. This type of surgery is called refractive corneal surgery (keratophakia).

In this procedure a piece of cornea obtained from a donor eye is ground into the shape of a small contact lens and is then sewn into the middle of the patient's cornea. This "living contact lens" then serves to correct the patient's vision. This procedure is new and investigational, but shows some promise, especially since it is able to help a proportion of patients who cannot be helped by other means.

Research is under way to look at biochemical means of slowing down the aging process and cataract formation. In the last 50 years, billions of dollars have been spent by the National Eye Institute to discover a medical means of eliminating normal adult cataracts, but to date none has been found.

Any claims that pills, exercises or diet can control cataracts are untrue. — Dr. Perry Binder, associate professor of surgery, at the University of California, San Diego School of Medicine.

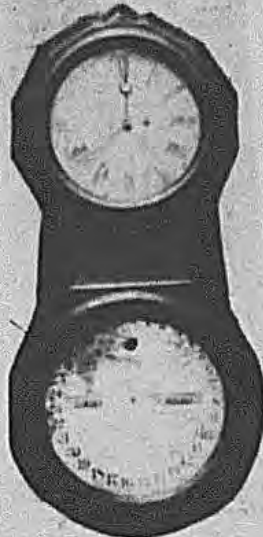

Here's How

Q. We have a stucco house on which one exterior wall was covered with ivy. Because of the damage the ivy was causing, we removed it. The problem is that the tentacles of the ivy, being very tenacious, have left fibrous particles over a large portion of the wall surface.

We would greatly appreciate any suggestions on how these can be removed, short of applying a new coat of stucco — Mr. R.B.

A. Wire brushing should remove most of the residue and because the stucco has a rough finish, what may be left will not show much after painting.

Another method is to use a blow torch to burn off the tentacles. However, this is a tricky operation and must be used with caution to prevent scorching the stucco or causing a fire.

The following method suggested by one of our readers might be of some help in the future with anyone facing this problem. The reader suggests cutting the vines off at the ground level, then waiting until they turn brown and are completely dried before pulling them down off the wall. It may take a month or longer, but the wait is worth it because the vines lose their capacity to cling, and any brown residue left may be wire-brushed off easily.

Q. Could you give us some instructions on what materials to use for a do-it-yourself resurfacing of an asphalt driveway, and also how to find the best sources of purchase, both from the standpoint of reliability and economy?

The driveway is about 20 feet long with a gradual incline. One area of about 2-by-6 feet is sunken and would need more than surface dressing. — E.A.N.

A. A dressing for blacktop driveways should be available at well-stocked masonry supply dealers and dealers in asphalt products. It can be applied like paint, with a large brush or broom over the surface, and it also fills the cracks.

For the areas that need more than a surface dressing, there is an "instant-pave asphalt-patching material" available at some garden supply and masonry supply dealers. It is easy to use, requiring no elaborate heating or rolling equipment.

First step in resurfacing a blacktop drive is to clean it thoroughly with water. Next scrub with a stiff brush and scrape away the bad spots. After the drive is dry, pour on the sealer and spread with a large window squeegee. Allow 8 hours for drying and wait at least 48 hours before driving on it.

For supplies, consult a reputable building supply dealer. As for the most economical prices, I suggest you check with several different outlets and dealers.

Q. We have a rustic redwood board fence around our yard. It has been standing for about 12 years and is very dry and weathered. Is there anything we can do to bring back the original warmth of the wood, rather than painting it? — Mrs. V.R.

A. A linseed oil finish can be applied, although this may darken the wood considerably. During dry, warm weather, either boiled or raw linseed oil can be brushed, sprayed or mopped on the wood. During cool, damp weather, boiled linseed should be used.

To preserve the present appearance of the wood, a clear water repellent is recommended, a solution of hydrocarbon wax such as paraffin, resin or resin and non-volatile oil. These preservatives applied to the surface make the wood repellent to water and add mildew decay resistance to the wood. For wood that is badly weathered, two applications should be used.

Q. I remember my grandfather painting a black or silver-black liquid on the back of a mirror to restore it. Can you advise me about such a product?

Our bathroom mirrors have developed small imperfections and black spots along the edges which are not on the surface but in the mirror. What can be done about this? — Mrs. B.H.N.

A. Moisture collecting behind the mirror edge usually causes this problem.

A satisfactory refinish of a mirror needs very special conditions and treatment, and usually it is a job that should be done only by professionals in shops where there is a controlled dust-free atmosphere.

believe I have gastric enteritis. Is neuritis the same as gastric enteritis? — Jewell F.

Dear Jewell: No one really could help you at long distance like this. You speak of your doctor. Maybe you need a new one.

If you have been reading the column recently you would know that both the burning tongue and the leg cramps have been discussed by our readers. We do not have the space to repeat all this, but one point was made — quinine pills, 5 grain, usually help leg cramps.

Dear John: Scientists around the world are working to solve the mysteries of Alzheimer's disease. The disease is generally found in people over 50, but can appear in younger individuals.

It is characterized by loss of memory, disorientation in time and space, personality changes, dependence and ultimately, death.

Two million people in the United States are believed to have Alzheimer's disease. The U.S. Census Bureau predicts that by the year 2000 there will be more than 32 million Americans over age 65 — about 13.5 percent of the population. — Jim H.

Dear Jim: Let's hope something like a breakthrough is accomplished. We did a long column recently on Alzheimer's.

How do you count a dog's years?

Q. I have a male Pomeranian that is 13 years old.

My dad says that in human years my dog is 91. He says that one dog year is equivalent to seven people years. Do you agree with this equation?

I would also like to know how old a dog can be and still be sexually active. If my dad's equation is correct, my Pomeranian is a very spry and active 91-year-old!

A. It is difficult to equate the age of a dog with the age of a human. Many people use the rule-of-thumb that one year in a dog's life is equivalent to seven years in a human's life. This is probably based on the fact that most humans live to about 70 years of age, more or less, and most dogs live to approximately 10 years of age.

Some authorities equate the first year of a dog's life to the first 21 years of a human life. Of course, in these terms these are the periods required to reach adulthood. These authorities add four years for every dog year lived following the first year. By this method a dog at 10 years of age would be the human equivalent

of 57 (21 years plus nine multiplied by four equals 36). By the "seven-year rule," a 10-year-old dog would be the equivalent of 70 years old in human years.

The smaller breeds of dogs, for example - miniature poodles, or Chihuahuas, usually live longer than larger breeds of dogs such as St. Bernards, Great Danes, and Irish wolfhounds. Large breed dogs usually live for eight or nine years. Small breed dogs may reach 18 or 19 years old.

Although it is fun to try to equate the life spans of dogs to humans, it is probably irrelevant. Apparently every animal type has a predetermined life span.

Scientists have not been able to explain with logical or medical rationales the relatively short life span of dogs.

The age at which dogs quit being sexually active varies among dogs. As older dogs become less inclined toward physical exercise, they also decrease their sexual activity. However, most dogs remain fertile throughout their lifetimes.

Females tend to come into heat less frequently with increasing age. Although most male dogs re-

main fertile throughout their lives, the quality of the semen decreases with increasing age. Generally, male or female dogs greater than 7 or 8 years of age should not be allowed to breed.

You can help your dog reach his maximum potential age by caring properly for him throughout his life. This involves feeding him properly and annual physical examinations. Your veterinarian can recommend specific procedures to ensure a long, healthy life for your particular dog.
