Many Residents At Town Bd. Oppose White Castle

In a room bulging with an over-capacity crowd, the Oyster Bay Town Board opened their night hearing on the request by White Castle Systems, Inc. and Ricmar Equities Corp. for a special use permit to build a fast food restaurant at the corner of Willet Avenue and Bethpage Road, Hicksville. The morning and evening open hearings were held on Tuesday, March 26, at Town hall, Oyster Bay. The entire 7 member Board will vote on the permit issue within four to eight weeks.

Special exception to the G-Business Zoning is being requested in order to build the 24 hour fast food restaurant with a drive-up window. The five Board members present heard opening remarks by Jacob Bernstein of Marino, Bernstein and LaMarca, attorneys for the permit applicants. Mr. Bernstein presented a modified preliminary site plan which put his client's request more in line with Town restrictions. The plan included provisions for inward facing lights along the property perimeter; a 55 foot setback of the building; access only from Bethpage Road; and an 8 foot buffer to the north of the property.

He stressed that deliveries would be made between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. and that garbage collection by private carters would be made in the morning hours. Mr. Bernstein pointed out that all White Castle restaurants are wholly-owned by the company, and there are no franchises.

Hundreds of tax-paying homeowners attended the hearing with their presence and their opposition to the special use permit. Their objections centered on their concerns for the safety of their children, the pollution factors of car exhaust, litter and odors from the facility, the large amount of additional traffic and, in the words of Willet Avenue School Principal John Maher, that the restaurant would be "an attractive nuisance" where children might find a place to spend their idle hours.

Several times during the presentation on behalf of White Castle, Councilman Hogan had to admonish the audience and ask them to hear out the applicants. More than a dozen times, there were loud outbursts of clapping and whistling at questions and facts posed by Councilmen and other spectators.

At one point, Councilman Hogan stated to Mr. Bernstein that he was sorry if Mr. Bernstein was offended that so many residents came out and voice their opposition. He suggested that the corporations involved could "put off (their request) for a year or so" in order to conduct an environmental impact study.

Others testifying on behalf of Ricmar and White Castle included the New York area White Castle manager, who gave testimony as to the expected volume of customers; a traffic expert, who felt the establishment would not cause increased traffic on Willet Avenue or in

Supt's Contract, Budget School Board Topics

Hicksville Public Schools March Board of Education meeting began this past Tuesday with a moment of silence for Kay Goodman who passed away recently. Goodman was a long time volunteer in many capacities in the community and was also founder of HAD (Help-Aid-Direction) a community organization to help young people overcome drug and social problems.

One of the more active items on the agenda concerned Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Catherine Fenton's new five year contract. The contract calls for an annual salary of \$75,000. The contract had been omitted from the board members' agenda sheets and was only presented to them at the time the action was brought forth by President William Bennett.

Vice President Arlene Rudin said more time should be taken in considering the contract since it had just been presented. She claimed that the board did not have enough experience in these matters and since there is still one and a half years remaining on the present contract, "more patience", should be used.

President Bennett defended the contract stating that he had all the confidence in Dr. Fenton and he considered her the best for the job. In confirming her worth in relation to the new contract he called her, "valuable." He also stated that he believed she would help give Hicksville, "stability, direction and peace", with no turmoil.

The contract was passed unanimously with Rudin abstaining.

Dr. Fenton took the opportunity to state that she was pleased and honored by the new contract and looks forward to the next five years. She said there was a need to get back to the basics in education and that the student body should be considered, "number one."

Also discussed was the 1985-86 school budget. The projected budget has been set at \$39,748,830. This is a five per cent increase over the 84-85 budget. The tax estimate has been realized at \$1.69 per \$100 assessed valuation. President Bennett felt that the board should try to reduce the budget, "responsibly". The actual budget will be released in April and voted on in May. Dr. Fenton said that a great deal of the budget outcome will rely on Albany's reaction to various proposals.

It was also put into record by President Bennett that the Board has decided to support a resolution by the Midland Civic Association against the building of a White Castle restaurant at the intersection of Bethpage Road and Willet Avenue in Hicksville.

Two items were brought up by members of the community in attendance.

One woman asked about the early retirement plan for Hicksville Public School employees. President Bennett explained that it was on the agenda and would be discussed in Executive Session which is closed to the public.

Another Hicksville resident asked what was being done about a letter received by the school board complaining of public address announcements in the High School for the Christian Youth Alliance. Some of the wording in the announcement, according to the letter, had been considered persuasive. President Bennett reacted by saying that Dr. Fenton was responding to the letter.

Bennett and Board member Thomas Nagle stated their intentions to run for the School Board again. A resolution was also passed nominating George Farber and Seymour W. Weiner to BOCES seats for five year terms commencing July 1.

The Board accepted the resignation of Mr. Richard Jennett, Principal of the Fork Lane School who is retiring after 31 years of service.

Hospital Opens Psychiatric Unit



It's a good thing that no one yelled out "Is there a doctor in the house?" The Jericho Players' production was blessed with two first rank community theatre stars who sport "M.D." after their names. Dr. Heddy Zirin (pediatrician) devotes her strong voice and well-honed acting abilities to portraying Eliza Doolittle as both the tattered flower girl with dreams of owning her own flower shop and the newly transformed lady who doesn't quite make it at the races at Ascot, but finally captivates London at the Embassy Ball. With blazing eyes, fixed jaw and venom in her heart, she is both pathetic and savage as she castigates her mentor in "Just You Wait," Enry Higgins. After finally conquering the speech of the upper classes in "The Rain in Spain", her uncontrolled joy is contagious as she sings "I Could Have Danced All Night."

Dr. Bruce Rebold (GYN) was equally superb as the coldly cynical Prof. Henry Higgins. He takes Eliza on as a phonetics pupil only because he has wagered that he can mold the dirty faced, howling guttersnipe of a flower girl into someone who can be taken for a dutchess—or even a lady's maid, which, as we all know, requires better English. Rebold, who has a more melodious singing voice than Rex Harrison, who largely spoke the role, is also a fine actor. He ranges from a finely boned cynicism in "Why Can't the English" and "I'm An Ordinary Man" to a truly selfish prig in "You Did It," when he and Col. Pickering take when he and Col. Pickering take total credit for Eliza's feat at the Embassy Ball, to a self-surprised lover in "I've Grown Accustomed to Her Face." Last year's irascible "Music Man," Rebold is this year's Faustian phonetics teacher.

The Jericho Players' production was further graced by three excellent supporting players. Allen Miller was truly engaging and delightfully comedic in his portrayal of Eliza's red-nosed, ne'er-do-well father, Alfred Doolittle. He weaves around the stage with his patchwork cronies in fine reprises of "Just A Little Bit of Luck" and the second act show stopper, "Get Me to the Church on Time." Alan Abramson hits just the right touch in his portrayal of the stuffy Col. Pickering. And Kevin Barry displays a rare and beautiful voice as Freddy Eynsford-Hill, the bumbling fool hopelessly in love with the Cinderellaized Eliza.

Loretta Donohue does a fine job as Prof. Higgins' housekeeper, Mrs. Pearce. She has a fine clear voice. Jericho playgoers will remember her as Marion's mother in "Music Man." And those with good memories of past Jericho Players' shows will fondly recall Carolyn Seiff's starring role as "Mame" and Goldie in "Fiddler on the Roof." She plays the small but critical role of Henry Higgins' mother with her usual aplomb.

Other more than able featured players included Betty Goldstein as Mrs. Eynsford-Hill, Rabbi Philip Bentley as the villainous Prof. Zoltan Karpathy; Jack Cassin and Charles Portolano as Alfie's cockney cronies and Hedda Rappaport as Mrs. Higgins.

It's hard to believe that Director Kevin Harrington was not even born when "My Fair Lady" opened in 1956. But the deft, sure touch of this Molloy College faculty member and directing student of Agnes DeMille, and director of last year's "Music Man," molded the 60 member cast into a well-knit and finely crafted ensemble. Look for more fine things in the future from him. He was ably assisted by Linda Mossey and Music Director Bill Margiotta.

Producer Myrna Oshen's devotion and attention to detail was apparent throughout. The perfect costumes by Barbara Kirby ranged from tattered Cockney clothes to elegant Ascot and Embassy Ball gowns.

As usual, a strong part of

Jericho Players' production is the choreography and dancing. Choreographer Diane Lichtenberger upheld the tradition of both the Jericho Players and "My Fair Lady" as a strong dance show. The dancers, who easily made the change from Cockney ruffians to English ladies and gentlemen, were Joanne Antonucci, Scott Awley, Laurie Beller, Ann Cassin, Elayne Fastenberg, Ruth Foxman, Donna Friskes, Jean Geluso, Judy Klarman, Donna Leipziger, Peter Levy, Erika Lingley, Matthew McAtee, Steve Oury, Sandy Ressa, Al Rossai, Scott Schaffer, Anne Schmidt, Gayle Silver, Maria Suroff and Melanie Turkisher. Jodi Turkisher, a veteran of all three past Jericho Players' productions, was, as usual, particularly strong and athletic.

Members of the chorus included Ken Bornholdt, Marie Cassiano, Alice Densen, Shelly Friedman, Lois Friedman, Joan Friess, Marilyn Levinson, Wendy Levy, Connie Oliver, Steve Phillips, Murray Rosenthal, Sonia Rosenthal, Iris Rothstein, Martin

Rotter, Harry Seaton, Simi Siegel, Alice Weiner and Debra Wolther.

"My Fair Lady" with its 18 changes of scenes, was a particularly difficult show to stage. Stage managers May Brotter and Gloria Novak and the crew of stagehands deserve a big hand.

The Jericho Players and their producer, Myrna Oshen, have justly developed a reputation for mounting the finest community

theatre performances on Long Island. Public recognition of this reputation was evident from the virtual sellout of the opening night performance and the audience's enthusiastic response.



Your Social Security

At age 65 file for Medicare

Q: I presently am working full time in a job where Social Security is being deducted from my check. I will be 65 in six months but I plan to continue working. Should I do anything when I reach age 65? — J.S.

A: You should contact your Social Security office when you reach age 65 to file for Medicare even if you plan to continue working. There is an initial enrollment period that covers the three months prior to age 65 through the three months after age 65. Someone who is receiving Social Security benefits at age 65 automatically will be contacted about participation in Medicare.

Q: I am 67 years old and I have been married since 1957 to my present husband. He is 56 years of age. I previously was married for nine years, divorcing in 1953. Am I eligible for any benefits on my first husband's record? He was older than I am. I do not know if he is alive. — M.W.

A: You should not be eligible for benefits on your divorced husband's record because you were not married to him for at least 10 years. Another requirement to collect divorced spouses benefits is to be unmarried.

Q: My wife and I both worked. She drew on her own Social Security at age 62 with a reduced rate and I retired at age 65 on full unreduced Social Security benefits. If I should die could she draw my full Social Security? We are over age 65. — D.D.A.

A: Yes, inasmuch as your wife is over age 65 and you did not receive reduced benefits she would be entitled to your full unreduced amount if it is larger than her own unreduced amount.

Q: Is it true that my physician must obtain some kind of authorization before I can be admitted to the hospital? I have Medicare, Parts A and B. — J.P.

A: As of Nov. 15, 1984, in order for hospital stays to be covered under Medicare, physicians are required to obtain preadmission review and authorization for certain surgical procedures, prior to a patient's admission to the hospital.

Q: A child is receiving benefits under her deceased father's name. The mother has remarried and changed the child's name to her present husband's name. Is the child still entitled? — K.B.

A: Neither the remarriage by the mother nor adoption by the stepfather affects the child's entitlement.

Q: I am 61 years old as of February this year. I retired early. My pension will be reduced when I reach 62.

My wife will be 62 in July of this year. At 62, is my wife eligible for Social Security? She worked a period of time during World War II. — J.A.

A: Your wife needs 8½ years of work credit to qualify for retirement benefits on her own work record. Once you become entitled to retirement benefits, your wife can apply for spouse's benefits on your record. Contact your local Social Security office for particulars.

Q: I retired in 1984 at the age of 58. I will be 62 in November 1987 and I plan to start collecting my benefits at the beginning of 1988. Can you tell me what effect the lapse of almost four years will have on my benefit amount? — A.J.F.

A: If you retire from employment covered by Social Security before you are old enough to get Social Security benefits, those years of no earnings may have to be considered when your benefit rate is figured. As a result, your benefit rate may be lower than it would be for a person who continued in covered employment until he became eligible for benefits.

Q: I will retire July 30, 1985. Someone told me you have to apply for Medicare in either January, February or March (first three months) of this year or wait until January, February or March 1986. Please advise.

A: You do not have to retire to have Medicare hospital (Part A) insurance protection at 65, but you should apply at a Social Security office about three months before you reach age 65. If a person doesn't apply during his initial medical insurance (Part B) enrollment period, which is three months before age 65 and three months after his 65th birthday, then he must wait for a general enrollment period, which is the first three months of each year.



Chair not true antique

Q. This chair was left to me by a friend. I was told that it is very old and wonder about its true vintage and value.

Is there any way of telling what country it came from?



A. This chair was factory-made around the turn of the century and does not qualify as a genuine antique (100 years old). However, there are many people who collect furniture like this. It probably would sell for \$125 to \$135 in good condition.

It's almost impossible to tell what country produced it. Most probably it was made in America.

Q. My Belleek plate is 9 inches in diameter and is decorated with thistles.

Can you tell me when it was made and how much it is worth?



A. Your plate is not genuine Belleek; it was made by Ott Brewer in Trenton, N.J., between 1863 and 1893.

They employed many immigrants from Ireland who had worked for the Belleek factory here, so their porcelain was of unparalleled quality.

Your plate would sell in the \$75-\$95 range.

Q. I have noticed that things

connected to beer and breweries are being sold as collectibles. Can you give me some idea of the kind of items that are popular and what they might sell for.

A. This field of collectibles is called "Breweriana" and here are some items with typical prices:



the adjacent residential area; and a real estate appraiser, who explained the site position in relation to existing zoning. The appraiser, Mr. Burt Nelson, emphasized that "since White Castle is complying with the restrictions for the site, then at least the Board must give them serious consideration."

Councilman Diamond noted that the Nassau County Planning Commission recommended that the Town Board disapprove the permit.

After two hours of testimony on behalf of White Castle, testimony was received by the Board from the assembled residents. School Principal Maher read a resolution by the Hicksville School Board opposing the permit. Also voicing opposition was the Willet Avenue PTA, the Hicksville Garden Civic Association and various Jericho civic associations.

New York State Assemblyman Dan Frisa reflected the outpouring of opposition from his constituents when he stated that this is a "totally unacceptable use" for the Hicksville site.

Speaking on behalf of the newly reactivated Midland Civic Association, civic chairman Ellie Draycott presented a petition from the association opposing the permit. She stressed the negative impact on the residential neighborhood.

In reference to the already abundant lighting, one resident likened the area at night to "the Land of the Midnight Sun". Mr. Hans Reiser, a homeowner living a mere few hundred feet from the site, summed up his argument in this way: "Do we (really) need another fast food operation in this section of Hicksville?"

Mrs. Gert Paul, whose home for over 30 years is located just 98 feet from the site, called on the Board for prudent planning which would "let Hicksville lead the country into the 21st century." She asked, "Has anyone done an in-depth study as to what the Hicksville residents want?"

MEN'S FASHION

How to select what looks best

There are few men who look really as good in every garment they wear, but the average man can make himself look better by following a few simple rules when buying a wardrobe, according to a clothing expert.

The first thing anyone buying a new item of clothing should do is determine what looks best on him, said Marvin A. Blumenfeld, president of April-Marcus Inc., a merchandising consulting firm that represents more than 200 men's stores. "Too many men are influenced by ads that show what celebrities are wearing," he said.

"Even Paul Newman, Burt Reynolds or Robert Redford has certain styles that are more flattering than others," Blumenfeld said.

The best way to determine what will look best is to assess your height, weight and coloring. Once you're aware of your body type, clothes selection will be easier.

"For instance, stripes make a person look thinner and checks make him look heavier. Dark colors also tend to make a person look thinner while lighter ones emphasize stout areas.

If you're narrow-shouldered, a padded look might give you the appearance of looking broader, while a natural-looking shoulder

probably is a better bet for a man with broad shoulders."

Blumenfeld also advised heftier men to avoid the tapered European look in favor of more conservative American styles. "You'll look great in a tapered suit if you're tall and thin, but avoid them if you're short and heavy," he said.

If you're blond and fair-skinned, then shades of brown might be very flattering while certain shades of blue and navy may make you look pale," said Blumenfeld. Men with darker hair and skin, however, might look washed out in certain shades of brown or beige and look far better in darker blues and grays.

Fit is obviously one of the most important considerations when you're buying a garment. If you fall in love with an item of clothing but it requires extensive tailoring, chances are you should leave it and find something that fits better and requires less work. Even the best tailors often have trouble reshaping an ill-fitting garment, he said.

Another way that a person can determine how he looks in an outfit is by the comments he receives from others. "If any particular item you wear always seems to inspire such compliments as 'You look good today,' or 'That's a nice outfit you're wearing,' then you know what you're wearing is special," said Blumenfeld.

WOMEN ON THE GO Wardrobe basics and more

From the office or home to sports and entertaining, women always are wondering what to wear and how to wear it.

Building a versatile wardrobe — one that meets all occasions but doesn't cost a fortune — is the goal of every fashion-conscious woman. And she wants to build a wardrobe that won't have to be replaced every year.

Following are some suggestions for building a basic and lasting wardrobe from Maxine Forman, senior vice president for Russ Togs Inc., a clothing manufacturer.

Absolute musts for a working woman's wardrobe include:

— A classically styled suit in a neutral color such as camel, gray, navy or black. This can be mixed or matched with other pieces — different skirts and jackets, pants and blouses — to dress the suit up or down.

— A textured suit, tweed or herringbone, for less formal office or day wear.

— A dressy dress, either solid colored or in a pattern that complements your suit jacket.

— A two-piece dress for versa-

tility and mixing-and-matching with other pieces in your wardrobe.

When selecting skirts, have hemlines hit just below the knee. That length always is in style, year after year through all the seasons.

Buy blouses whose color and pattern will go well with as many as possible of the skirts, jackets or slacks you own.

Make sure jacket sleeves hit your wrist bone, allowing about one-half inch of your blouse cuff to show.

When selecting dresses, choose conservative, small patterns or solid colors. These will go best with jackets you own to give a total look.

As far as accessories go, be creative yet conservative, Forman suggests. Switch belts and scarves from one outfit to another. Muted paisleys, stripes and floral prints are good scarf choices because they easily can be adapted to many outfits.

Even your favorite old scarf can be given a new twist by varying the way you tie it: ascot style, tied on the side with a pin; softly tied loose bow, or simply tucked in around the collar for a turtleneck effect.







Input Callers Do Not Favor Wine In Grocery Stores

Most callers to Input do not favor supermarkets and grocery stores selling wine in answer to this question: "Should the state permit the sale of wine in supermarkets and grocery stores?" Here are some of the answers.

BAD IDEA

No. Who needs grocery stores to turn into liquor stores? It is getting harder all of the time to get around in supermarkets. What should be done is for stores to feature more groceries and less other things. If they now are allowed to go into liquor sales they will all devote their time and space to those sales and things will get worse. F.W.

PRIORITIES

Somewhere the state is getting its priorities mixed up. On the one hand they are selling people on drinking less and on the other they want to find more openings to sell wine. There is no shortage of stores selling wine now and they seem pretty well controlled because they value their licenses. If the state keeps on watering down the value of a license it will have less control over the selling of wine. G.R.

JUST GROCERIES

I think a grocery store should be a grocery store. Selling wine and liquor is serious business because it can do potential damage. In addition from the customer point of view you need more help than just reading the wine label in making some purchases. On the supermarket shelf you wouldn't get help at all. I see no merit in making the change. J.R.

NO BAN

There should be no ban on responsible stores of all kinds selling wines and even hard liquors. The state should only be in the picture to see that responsible people are handling the products not on saying who can make a profit. And from the point of view that grocery stores already sell beer which is just as intoxicating as wine, there is really no reason to distinguish. G.E.

ALL LIQUORS

Why just wine? Why not all liquor? It all has the same effect and presently grocery stores sell beer and ale and cooking wine. It should be up to the owner of the store to decide whether wine or liquor is sold just so long as the limitations on sales to minors are upheld. G.W.

MODERATION

It gets foolish to even think of adding the thousands of outlets of grocery stores as vendors of wine. We are trying to teach moderation and then trying to make the wine more accessible. Somewhere on this whole question of liquor what people say and what they do never add up. The answer is No to wine in grocery stores. J.Q.

FORGET IT

Your question would present a great way for people to spend their food money on wine. Presently nearly half of the things sold in food stores are not edible. So now a new diversion for the food dollar would be wine. Forget it. L.T.

NO SALE

Absolutely not! I can't think of a single valid reason to change a marketing method which has stood the test of time and consumer satisfaction. A wine merchant is a specialist requiring an intimate knowledge of the product in all its variations as well as changing tastes, customers and suppliers. Furthermore, the present sales method permits a measure of control against indiscriminate sale to youngsters which beer retailers have been unable to fully demonstrate judging by the continued evidence of empty beer containers in public places despite the five cent refund. Finally, the role of the wine merchant just can't be transplanted into a supermarket or grocery store operation without economic dislocation. With wine in the hands of the supermarketiers and grocery store proprietors, I could see the commencement of a lot of fringe operations just to complement standard gastronomical and household product lines which would really do nothing more than to create financial problems for the specialists who know their business and constitute an important segment of the business and social community. P.G.S.

P.S. This entire matter may be purely an exercise in rhetoric. I just returned from my favorite supermarket. On their shelves I found "coolers" and light wines - rose, chablis, burgundy - 5% and 6% alcohol by volume.

Q. Why in some restaurants do I have to sit there so long before the waitress gives me the check?
A. Well the answer to your question is hard to define. It might be simply because the restaurant is so busy that the waitress hasn't time to add up the check. In these establishments they feel that the guests should decide how long they wish to talk or occupy the space after eating and only on rare occasions will they bring a check that has not been solicited and then with apologies.

Q. Some restaurants make a big thing over a lobster tank, but I think it is disgusting to have to kill these animals in order to get a meal. Why do they have these tanks?

A. The reason is simply that lobster has to be freshly killed to be eaten. The lobster tank lets the diner see that what he is getting is really fresh lobster. Possibly some squeamish people believe that the lobster tank should be somewhere else but most diners want to see the live ones and if you do not, you should be suspicious. They are killed instantly in boiling water.



Fine Italian Cooking

Is it proper to apply lipstick at the dinner table? W.C.

You don't do it in anyone's home. You may, however, apply lipstick and a dab of powder at a restaurant table. If you are traveling abroad, applying cosmetics at a restaurant table is often considered gauche. If you are with a party of Americans, on the other hand, you may wish to follow your own custom in the matter. It is wise to be discreet.

Q. Are restaurants allowed to serve you something else if you ask for "Coke" or "Coca Cola" and they do not serve it?

A. The answer is technically they are not. But many will say they only carry "Pepsi" or another beverage. But you should be able to know in advance and refuse something you did not order. At the "Coca Cola" company probably would want it that way, and "Pepsi" will also if it is the other way around.

Cooking Corner

The marriage of wine and food

In Europe, wine always has been an essential partner to food. But we have been slow to appreciate how certain varietal wines mate with specific food characteristics.

Balance is the key in blending food and wine, said Barbara Lang, a culinary director for Inglenook who has been researching how certain food flavors can heighten the wine experience while others alter the taste of wine or mask its subtleties.

Dry wine, she explained, will taste bitter when served with sweet food. "The wine is going to taste sour and even drier. A better balance would be a wine with a bit of sweetness such as a Gewurztraminer or a Johannisberg Riesling."

Salty or smoked foods also require wine with some sweetness. Sweetness, Lang said, gives wines body and structure. When they're served with salty or smoked foods, the sweetness balances the saltiness. Smoky flavor, she said, can be very pervasive so it contrasts well with a fruity wine.

Acidic wines, she explained, usually complement acidic foods because they have similar flavor and texture. Generally, dry, acidic wines cleanse the palate, allowing it to pick up subtle flavors, Lang said.

Apples and citrus fruits are other examples of foods that are complemented by wines that have similar acidity and aromas, she said. "Apples have malic acid and so do grapes. Chardonnay is known to have an apple aroma, so apples bring out the fruit quality in the wine."

Lang recommends that people take care when serving wine and cheese. Pungent cheeses like a sharp cheddar or a bleu cheese, she said, should not be served with older wines, but are best paired with a young, aggressive wine such as a Zinfandel. Such a match creates a better balance of flavor and texture.

If serving an older wine like a Merlot, Lang suggested that people choose a more mellow cheese such as Washington Cougar gold or Monterey Jack, which will not overwhelm the wine but will allow it to develop its own character.

Serving temperature is important also, Lang said. "Dry wines such as Sauvignon Blanc and Chardonnay should be taken out of the refrigerator about 20 minutes before serving. These wines need to warm up a little to taste their flavors. But you don't want that with a Gewurztraminer or a Riesling — with those you're trying to get the freshness, and the chilling accentuates that crispness."

If you don't know much about

pairing food and wine, Lang suggests having a party and serving two different wines with the entree. "The only way to learn is to taste the wines and start developing your own preferences," she said. "But to do this, you need to compare. And that's hard to do when you serve just one wine at a time."

Here are recipes for some of the dishes developed by Lang for showcasing specific wines.

CHAMPAGNE SAUCE FOR POACHED FISH FILLETS

1 tbsp. butter
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely chopped shallots
 1 cup champagne
 3 cups heavy cream
 Sprig of fresh rosemary or 1 tsp. dried rosemary
 Sprig of fresh thyme or 1 tsp. dried thyme
 Small bunch of parsley stems
 4 or 5 bay leaves
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fish veloute (fish stock thickened with a flour and butter roux)
 Salt and white pepper

Garnish:
 1 large carrot
 2 celery stalks
 1 leek (white part only)
 Chopped parsley

Heat butter and saute shallots until translucent, about 2 to 3 minutes. Deglaze pan with champagne. Continue cooking until champagne is almost evaporated; add cream, bouquet garni of rosemary, thyme, parsley stems and bay leaves. Cook until liquid is reduced to one-fourth. Whisk in fish veloute to thicken; season with salt and pepper to taste. Strain through very fine sieve or several layers of cheese cloth. Keep hot in hot water bath or double boiler.

Cut carrot, celery and leek into fine julienne pieces (about 2 tablespoons of each). Blanch a few seconds in boiling water. Drain well and add to sauce.

Serve sauce over poached fish fillets. Garnish with freshly chopped parsley.

SHRIMP AND ORANGE SALAD WITH APPLES

1 1/2 lbs. medium-size shrimp, shelled and deveined, reserving shells for fumet (fish stock)

Fumet:
 Shrimp shells
 1 carrot, peeled and coarsely chopped
 1 stalk celery, coarsely chopped

1 onion, coarsely chopped
 2 cloves garlic, crushed
 2 parsley sprigs
 6 peppercorns
 2 qts. cold water
 1 cup Chardonnay or quality dry white wine

SALAD:

1 orange
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely chopped Pippin or Granny Smith apple
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup finely chopped celery
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup quality mayonnaise
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp. Grey Poupon mustard
 Salt and pepper to taste

To make the fumet: In medium-size stock pot that is not aluminum, combine fish stock ingredients except wine. Slowly bring stock to boil, reduce heat and simmer stock for 15 minutes. Add wine and simmer stock for additional 15 minutes.

Strain stock and bring just liquid back to simmer. Poach shrimp in simmering stock for 4 to 5 minutes. Remove shrimp from stock and allow to cool. Reserve some whole shrimp for garnish.

Finely chop the rind of orange, reserving $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon. Juice orange and place juice in small mixing bowl. After chopping apple, immediately place apple in orange juice to avoid discoloring.

Coarsely chop shrimp and place in large mixing bowl. Add finely chopped celery and apples to shrimp. The apples will carry some of the orange juice with them; do not add additional juice to salad. Add mayonnaise, mustard, orange rind, salt and pepper to salad.

Taste for seasonings. Since orange's flavor will bloom and develop, taste only for subtle orange flavor. Add more apples or mustard if their flavors are not noticed. The flavors in salad should blend together; no one flavor should be dominant.

To serve, place portion of salad on plate, surround with curly leaf or endive lettuce. Garnish with whole shrimp.

Serves 4 for luncheon entree or 6 as first course.

(Wine accompaniment: Chardonnay.)

PORK TENDERLOIN WITH

MUSTARD-SAGE SAUCE

1 (approx. 2 1/2 lb.) whole pork tenderloin, at room temperature
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup Chardonnay or dry white wine
 2 tbsps. water
 1 clove garlic, mashed
 2 tbsps. fresh sage or $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. dried rubbed sage
 Salt and white pepper to taste
 1 egg yolk
 2 tbsps. Dijon mustard
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup heavy cream
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. brandy

Gremolata:

$\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped parsley
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. chopped lemon zest
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. finely chopped garlic
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. finely chopped fresh sage (if fresh sage is not available, omit and use only the previous three ingredients)

Place pork tenderloin on oiled roasting pan and roast in 350 F

oven for 25 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer reads 160. Remove tenderloin from roasting pan and place on cutting board; cover meat with foil. Let rest 15 minutes for better slicing.

On medium heat, deglaze roasting pan with wine and water. Add garlic, sage and salt and pepper to roasting pan. Reduce liquid by one-third. Pour reduced liquid into saucepan and place over low heat.

In small bowl, combine egg yolk and mustard; whisk in heavy cream.

Whisk small amount of hot, reduced liquid into cream mixture. Slowly, whisk warmed cream mixture into saucepan. Over low heat, gently cook sauce until thickened; do not allow sauce to boil because it may curdle.

Add brandy to sauce and taste for seasonings. Slice tenderloin and place on serving plates. Lightly coat with sauce. Garnish with sprinkling of gremolata.

Serves 6.

(Wine accompaniment: Chardonnay.)

CINNAMON STREUSEL COFFEE CAKE

1 cup butter or margarine, divided
 1 cup chopped walnuts
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
 5 tbsps. ground cinnamon, divided
 1 tsp. ground nutmeg, divided
 2 eggs
 2 tbsps. pure vanilla extract
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup dairy sour cream
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup confectioners sugar
 2 tbsps. water

 3 cups all-purpose flour (un-sifted)
 1 tsp. baking powder
 1 tsp. baking soda
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
 1 cup sugar

Preheat oven to 350 F. In small saucepan, melt $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter. Stir in walnuts, brown sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon nutmeg; mix well and reserve for later use. In medium bowl mix together flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and remaining 3 teaspoons cinnamon and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon nutmeg; set aside. In large bowl of electric mixer, cream remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter with granulated sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in vanilla extract. Alternately stir in reserved flour mixture with sour cream and milk, beginning and ending with flour. Blend until smooth. Spoon half of batter into greased 9-inch tube pan. Spread half of reserved nut mixture over batter. Repeat once more. Bake until golden and cake tester inserted into center comes out clean, about 45 minutes. Cool cake in pan on wire rack 10 minutes. Remove cake from pan; cool on rack. Mix confectioners sugar with water; drizzle over cake. Makes one 9-inch cake.

Microwave Magic

Microwave safety tips

According to the Food and Drug Administration, the majority of microwave ovens are quite safe for use in the home. When the FDA does find a safety problem in a particular make or model, it requires the manufacturer to correct all defective ovens at no cost to the consumer.

While there is little reason to fear radiation leakage from most ovens (several safety measures have been required by law since 1971), there are some things the home microwaver can do to add to the safety margin already built into the oven:

— Read the owner's manual carefully, and thoroughly, for guidelines on cleaning, care and operation.

— Do not stand directly in front of the oven for long periods of time while it is in operation.

— Some ovens should not be operated when empty, so check your instruction manual before doing so.

— When using metal foil, be careful that it does not touch sides or top of oven, as sparks may occur.

— Never try to deep-fry in the microwave. Grease may overheat and possibly could cause a fire.

— While microwaves do not heat food containers, they do heat the food. This heat transfers to the dish, so keep pot holders handy to avoid burns.

— Be careful when removing plastic wrap from hot dishes to avoid steam burns.

Finally, Francis L. Merat, assistant professor of electrical engineering and applied physics at Case Western Reserve University, offers this microwave safety advice:

1. Keep the door seal clean and functioning to make sure the mechanical latches work properly.

2. Do not slam the oven door. If the door is not working properly, radiation may escape.

3. If food spatters inside the oven, clean it up right away or it will continue to cook each time the oven is used. This eventually could cause the window to crack and radiation to leak out.

4. Do not rest food on the oven door if the door opens down. Food could dribble down and damage the seal.

5. Clean the oven frequently with detergent and water.

6. Call a professional to repair damaged windows, seals, timers and magnetron tubes.

BEEFY SUPPER CASSEROLE

$\frac{3}{4}$ lb. lean ground beef
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped onion
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. pepper
 Dash garlic powder
 3 cups cooked rice
 1 cup cooked corn kernels
 1 cup cooked green vegetable (peas, green beans, etc.)

1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups diced cheddar cheese
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. dry mustard
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. paprika

Combine beef, onion, salt, pepper and garlic powder in 2-quart glass casserole. Microwave 4 to 5 minutes, stirring every minute, until beef no longer is pink.

Pour off fat and gently stir in remaining ingredients. Microwave 5 to 6 minutes longer, stirring every 2 minutes, until cheese melts and casserole is heated through.

Serves 6.

RISSOLE POTATOES

2 dozen baby whole round potatoes
 1 cup water
 6 tbsps. butter or margarine
 1 small onion, finely chopped
 3 shallots, minced
 1 clove garlic, minced
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. pepper
 1 small bunch fresh parsley, chopped
 Paprika

Peel potatoes and place one dozen each in 12x8x2-inch glass baking dish. Add one-half cup water to each dish. Cover with waxed paper and microwave 16 to 18 minutes. Microwave second dish; let stand for 5 minutes.

Combine butter, onion, shallots, garlic, salt and pepper in 1-quart glass casserole. Microwave 3 minutes. Drain potatoes and add half of topping to each dish. Sprinkle with parsley and paprika before serving.

Serves 8.

FILLET OF SOLE ALMONDINE

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or margarine
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup slivered almonds
 2 tbsps. lemon juice
 2 tbsps. white wine
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. dill weed
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
 3 or 4 whole peppercorns
 1 lb. fresh or thawed fillet of sole
 2 tbsps. chopped fresh parsley
 1 lemon, cut in wedges

Place butter and almonds in 8x8-inch glass baking dish. Microwave 3 to 4 minutes, stirring every minute, until almonds are just browned.

Stir in lemon juice, wine, dill weed, salt and peppercorns. Place fillets in butter mixture, turning to coat both sides. Arrange fish with larger, thicker pieces toward outside and smaller pieces toward center.

Cover casserole with plastic wrap or glass lid and microwave 5 minutes. Fish should flake easily with fork.

Let stand, covered, 5 minutes before serving. Garnish with parsley and serve with lemon wedges.

Serves 4.

Here's How

Q. My house is a cement block home covered with stucco. I want to repaint the outside but there are several minute cracks running the same way the cement blocks do. How 'o I fill in these cracks before painting? — I.E.S.

A. Thin cracks and small damaged areas can be patched with a premixed dry mortar mix. Most hardware stores and lumberyards have this dry mix in 80- and 45-pound bags. All you have to do is add water to it.

The first step is to clean thoroughly any loose debris out of the crack. Also use a hammer and cold chisel to carve out the bottom portion of the crack so it is wider there than at the top. This is called undercutting. Now there's no way the mortar patch can fall out once it has dried.

Use any convenient container, such as a tin can or small bucket, to mix the mortar. Add water slowly until the mixture has the consistency of peanut butter.

Moisten the crack before applying the mortar. Use a paintbrush to dash on the water. Don't leave any standing water in the crack.

Now force the mortar into the crack with a triangular masonry trowel. Fill the crack up to the level of the surrounding wall surface. Wait about an hour until the

mortar has stiffened somewhat, then tool its surface so it matches the texture of the surrounding walls. Be sure to use a sealer over the patched areas prior to painting.

Q. I always find something to cheer about in your column; if you could answer these questions, I'd give three cheers. 1. On a varnished oak floor, there are dark rings from flower pots (and perhaps from the watering of the plants, too). How can I restore the floor?

2. We recently bought a silver-on-copper lazy Susan that is beautiful. When we shined it, we discovered some copper spots showing through the very beautiful silver plating. How do I get the copper covered, or what should I do to maximize the beauty of this lovely heirloom?

3. The lazy Susan has a small design etched into the bottom rest. The design resembles three attached arches within which are a crown in one, an engraved large "S" in a second and a shield in the third. Can you identify this insignia for me? A somewhat similar design on another piece of silver also has the words "Sheridan Silver" beneath the design. Is that a clue? — A.C.L., Gardena City

A. For the dark spots on your oak floor, clean the spots and surrounding area with No. 1 steel wool and a good floor cleaner or mineral spirits. If the spots remain, sand with fine sandpaper, feathering out 3 to 4 inches into surrounding areas. If spots still are present, apply oxalic acid solution (1 ounce oxalic acid to 1 quart water). Caution: This is a poison so be sure to use rubber gloves and handle carefully.

Let the solution stand one hour, then rinse with clear water. A second treatment may be helpful if spot refuses to yield.

If second application of oxalic acid fails, sand area with No. 00 sandpaper and apply matching finish, feathering out into surrounding floor area. Let dry. Buff lightly with No. 00 steel wool. Apply second coat of finish, let dry and wax. If spot still is visible, the only remaining remedy is to replace the affected flooring. (Note: Oxalic acid is a bleaching agent. Whenever it is used, the treated floor area probably will have to be stained and refinished to match the original color.)

In answer to your second question, the best way to restore a valuable piece of silver is to have it replated. A source for replating can be found in the Yellow Pages.

On your third question, I recommend that you consult a reliable antique dealer. I am not an expert in this area, so maybe I deserve only a cheer and a half.

**Children****A checklist for giftedness**

Q. Although there is no question in my mind that our 3-year-old is bright, I can't convince my wife of that fact. She refuses to settle the matter by getting someone to give him an IQ test because she has no faith in them.

Can you help me by providing a checklist of giftedness in young children? I'd appreciate it very much.

A. Many parents are sure that their young children are bright — but it's so easy to be wrong.

Because they say clever things, put words together in unusual ways and ask questions that may be hard for you to answer, you may think they are gifted. After all, if a child asks, "What makes the sky blue?" or, "What makes thunder?" doesn't that mean he's very smart?

The problem parents face is that they often don't see their youngster in comparison with others. He or she may seem so quick — but others might be faster.

So here are some items that can help you tell whether your preschool child is gifted. It is not necessary to score on all of them but if your youngster is strong on at least half, you can be quite sure he or she is bright.

— Started to walk and talk before most other children you know about.

— Is at least a little taller, heavier and stronger than others his or her age.

— Shows an interest in time — clocks, calendars, yesterday and tomorrow and days of the week.

— Learned to read even though not yet 5 years old. Likes to read.

— Arranged toys and other possessions, putting the same kinds of things together.

— Knows which numbers are larger than others.

— Can count and point to each item as he or she correctly says the number.

— Creates make-believe playmates as he or she "plays house" or different games.

— Is interested in what is on television and in newspapers, in addition to cartoons and comics.

— Learns easily, so that you have to tell him or her something only once.

— Shows impatience with jobs around the house that seem to have no meaning, like putting toys away when he or she is just going to have to take them out again.

— Asks, "Why?" often, and really wants to know the answer. Is curious about a lot of things, from a tiny insect and how it's made, to a car and how it works.

— Doesn't like to wait for other children to catch up.

— Sticks with a task longer than others do. Won't give up easily.

— Does things differently in ways that make good sense, whether it's piling up blocks, setting the table or drying dishes.

— Likes to be with older children and can keep up with them.

— Collects things, likes to organize them and doesn't want anyone to mess them up, but doesn't always collect neatly.

— Can carry on a conversation and enjoys it. Wants your ideas and likes you to listen to his or hers. Uses big words and often knows what they mean.

— Shows an interest in drawing and music, knows colors and has rhythm.

— Makes up jokes. Has a good sense of humor.

Now, that list may respond to the request of this reader, but what now? If the young child really is gifted, what does one do about that fact?

A few possibilities that might be considered are these: Talk to the child about what he or she does, likes and thinks; listen to the youngster; read to him or her; take the child places; locate the best preschool, nursery school or day-care center you can find and afford. And find the most creative, brightest teachers for him or her. Television watching together and appropriate toys, puzzles and games can be included in this less-than-complete group of possible involvements for young bright children (and for others too).

Knock-knees unpredictable

Q. Our mare recently gave birth to a foal that had seriously deformed front legs. The knees of the foal were severely bent toward each other. Our neighbors told us that the foal was "knock-kneed."

The foal has had a great amount of difficulty in getting around. Should we put splints on the legs? Will the foal outgrow this problem?

We never have had foals with this problem before.

A. Many foals are born with knock-knees. The knees of these foals are bent medially, or toward each other. The knees tend to knock or bump each other as the foal stands or walks. One or both legs may be affected.

Some foals improve without any corrective treatment as they grow older. Others worsen with age to the point that permanent deformity results. It is difficult to predict which foals will improve without treatment. A small percentage of foals develop knock-knees after being born with reasonably straight limbs.

A condition similar to knock-knees of the front limbs is sometimes seen in the hock joints of the rear limbs. Medial deviations of the real limbs usually are due to the same cause and treated in the same manner as medial deviations of the front limbs.

There are many reasons foals are born with knock-knees. The condition may be related to hereditary factors. Hereditary factors should be considered whenever mares repeatedly have foals with knock-knees, especially if the mares are bred continuously to the same stallions.

Nutrition may play a role in the development of knock-knees. Deficiencies in calcium, phosphorus, vitamin A, carotene and vitamin D may be involved. Also, deviations of the limbs may be caused by the position in which the fetus was carried in the uterus.

There are many ways to treat knock-knees in foals. The best form of treatment is related to the age at which the condition develops, the degree of deviation and the cause of the problem.

Because each case is different, recommendations for every case cannot be given here. Your local


