### Storytime At Library

The Fall season is again with us and this signals the start of our storytime at the Hicksville Public Library. On Thursday, October 3, the very first storytime of the new school year will be held at 10:30 a.m. or 1:30 p.m. Thereafter, each Thursday at the same time picture book stories, fables, fairy tales, flannel board stories, films, and games are in store for all Hicksville children who are 3½ to 5 years old. Registration is required and will be held in the Children's Room of the Library the week of September 16. All children who wish to register must be 3½ years old by October 1 and present a birth certificate at the time of registration. Each storytime is approximately 45 minutes in length.

For those youngsters who are too young to attend our regular storytime, a special "Tiny Tot" storytime will be held every Wednesday in November at 10:30 to 10:50 a.m. and 11:15 to 11:35 a.m. All 2½ to 3½ year old children are invited to come and listen to favorite stories. Registration is the week of October 14 and a birth certificate must be shown at the time of registration.

Our regular movietime for preschoolers will again be held this Fall. All 2½ to 5 year old children are invited to come and see short films at 1:30 p.m. on the first Monday of every month. The film program last approximately one half hour and no registration is required.

### Plainview R-O Hearing Oct. 8

A public hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, October 8, by the Oyster Bay Town Board on a request for a change of zone in Plainview, according to Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

"The applicants, Alan and Susan Ross, are seeking a change of zone from Residence 'D' to 'R-O' (Residence-Office District) for general office use," said Clark. The building is located at 525 South Oyster Bay Road at the northeast corner of South Oyster Bay Road and Wendell (Laurel) Street.

The hearing has been scheduled for 10 a.m. on Tuesday, October 8, in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

### 20 Year Lease On Gas Awarded At Landfill

The Oyster Bay Town Board awarded a 20 year lease, September 10, to the firm of Energy Tactics, Inc., of Yaphank for the recovery and utilization of methane gas at the Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex, according to Town Supervisor Joseph Colby.

"Under the terms of the lease agreement," Colby said, "Energy Tactics, Inc. will pay the Town an estimated \$3 million in royalties over the twenty-year period of the lease for the reclamation of the methane gas which will be converted into electric power to be sold to LILCO. The firm has agreed in the lease," Colby stated, "to optimize the amount of gas extracted in order to maximize revenues to the Town. The lease agreement gives the Town two royalty options, one of which the Town will select after field testing has been completed to determine which option will give the Town the best financial return."

The lease agreement provides that Energy Tactics, Inc. will conduct field tests to determine the probable yield and estimated power to be generated within thirty days after the contract has been signed and based on the test results, the Town will opt for the royalty formula which will return the maximum amount to the Town. "The basic factor which will influence the revenues to the Town," Colby stated, "will be the amount of electric power which can be generated from the methane to be extracted over the twenty-year term of the lease agreement. In one formula," Colby continued, "the Town could receive a lump sum payment of \$1,000 per month rental over the twenty-year period and 15% of the gross paid by LILCO for electric power sales. The second royalty option," he continued, "would provide for the town to receive royalty payments at a rate of 16.7% over the twenty year period for electric power sales, but not less than \$1,000 per month. Both formulas provide that the Town could receive an estimated \$3 million in revenue over the lease period."

The lease also calls for Energy Tactics, Inc. to obtain all necessary permits from regulatory agencies and to secure the commitments from LILCO to purchase the electric power to be generated by the extraction and sale of the methane gas.

### Tax Bills To Be Mailed

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Gary F. Musiello advises residents that school tax bills for the 1985-86 year will be mailed out on or about October 1.

"Residents should be receiving their 1985-86 school tax bills sometime during the first week of October," Musiello stated. "They then have until November 10 to pay without penalty. After that date, a 1% penalty will be charged for each month the bill remains unpaid."

Musiello noted that if residents pay the full amount of the school

tax for the year, they will receive a 1% discount. To receive the discount, they must pay the entire amount on or before November 10.

Residents mailing in their school tax payments should allow a reasonable time for the mail to reach the office to avoid any late penalty. Residents are asked not to write on, staple or in any way deface the payment stub as it can cause rejection of the payment by the computer.

# Bd. Sees Issue 'One Way' For Jeanson Pl. Traffic

The Oyster Bay Town Board held its regular meeting on Tuesday, September 10 at Town Hall on Audrey Place, Oyster Bay. In a unanimous "aye" vote, the full Board acted to implement a southbound one-way for Jeanson Place, Hicksville, effective November 18, 1985.

A sizable amount of residents from the Mid Island Shopping Mall area were present to take their stand on the Jeanson Place item. Supervisor Colby gave a detailed account as to the problem at hand: For many years, an increasing amount of traffic, including truck traffic, has plagued the area of Jeanson Place, an access road to the Mid Island Mall. The Town Board has been looking into the problem and has been monitoring the situation. In a survey they conducted four months ago, they determined that there was a large volume of traffic using Jeanson Place as a "short cut" from John Street to Broadway. Traffic would cut through the mall ring road, north on Jeanson Place, east on Nevada to Broadway.

In order to rectify the problem concerning heavy traffic, the State Department of Transportation recommended that the Department condemn the part of Nevada Avenue from Broadway to Jeanson, claim three to four feet of homeowner front property and widen Nevada Avenue, to handle the increased traffic.

The Town Board found this plan "not acceptable", and proposed making Jeanson Place a one-way southbound. The Board has been in contact with the Department of Transportation trying to work out a solution.

Due to the many pleas to the Board made by area residents, the Board, by its own motion, placed the item on the calendar for hearing this week.

First to give testimony on the item was Vincent Iavarone, President of Raymond Keyes Associates, an engineering firm contracted by the owners of the Mid Island Mall. Mr. Iavarone suggested that making Jeanson Place one-way southbound immediately could create a gridlock effect at the exit to Broadway near Nathans. He suggested the Department of Transportation (DOT) make a triple left turn possible from the mall onto Broadway at the Nathans passage. The attorney for the mall asked the Board to "delay any action for a reasonable amount of time," in order for the DOT and mall owners to implement the turning lane procedure.

The Board's concern here was that DOT could not act swiftly enough to alleviate the situation for residents, possibly calling for two years before action. Councilman Diamond suggested: "If we move today, we'll force DOT to make those modifications."

A number of residents approached the Board in favor of converting Jeanson Place to a one-way. Among them was Robert Fischer, a 30 year resident of Hicksville living on Nevada Avenue. Mr. Fischer dates back to 1968 in fighting this problem, and he is responsible for originating the idea of a triple left turn onto Broadway. He presented as evidence well over 400 signatures on a petition against condemnation of Nevada Avenue.

A businessman on the corner of Broadway objected to the Nevada widening, saying the State is squeezing him on all sides (referring to the fact that the State also took property from him at the time of the widening of Broadway.)

Speaking on behalf of the Midland Civic Association, Eileen Richards said the Board must "consider first the residents". State Assemblyman Parola addressed the Board stating, "go for adoption" of the one-way. It can only "benefit the mall and the residents".

Supervisor Colby noted that signs informing motorists of the one-way will be visible in the area within a month. He also warned that on the effective date, November 18, Nassau County police will be stationed in the area to ticket violators of the one-way.

The Town Board then "reserved decision" on the second item of the hearing agenda concerning industrial property on Midland Avenue. Residents have strenuously objected to the outdoor storage of vehicles and equipment by the GGG Construction Corporation. GGG was appealing to the Board to rescind restrictions existing on the property, so that they may correct the problems.

After some discussion among the Board, the attorney for GGG and an able speaker for the residents, the Board acted to close the hearing and have the concerned parties meet to discuss solutions.

Mr. Richard Schneider addressed the Board and placed into exhibit a petition signed by over 600 residents in complaint of the condition of the boat ramp at the Tappen Beach Boat Basin. Supervisor Colby acknowledged the problem there and assured residents that the Town is looking into solutions or alternatives to the long-standing and annoying problem for Oyster Bay leisure boating enthusiasts.

The Board set a hearing date of October 8 on a petition by Dawn Industries and F.J. Antan Properties to refurbish vehicles, retail sale of automotive accessories and the general use of a public garage on Old Country Road west of Newbridge Road. Also on the hearing that day will be a petition by Pickwick Motor Inn to construct and operate 20 additional rooms.



Anthony Villett, builder of several hundred homes in east Hicksville during the post World War II housing boom celebrated his 89th birthday recently, surrounded by loving members of three generations of his family. The veteran builder created the Hicksville Gables north of Old Country Road, homes in the Hicks and Miller Circle area and on Liberty Avenue. Mr. Villett built homes of enduring value, coming to Hicksville from years of custom-home creation in Queens County. He later opened the building boom in Central Islip, pioneered with housing for Ohio atomic energy plant workers and built homes in Pennsylvania, closing his life-long output of 4200 homes with custom built homes in Setauket and West Sayville.

A man of splendid integrity in business, surviving with gentility and fortitude, such setbacks as the Great Depression, land speculation failures in the nuclear age, Tony Villett is remembered also for his unstinting aid to many in the home building industry.

Mr. Villett is the brother-in-law of Anne and Dick Evers of Hicksville.

## Good diet promotes long, healthy life

Is there anything that can be done to slow down the aging process? The fountain of youth continues to elude us, but at least there is a lot more interest today in researching ways of living that may help keep the health, if not the looks, of youth.

The average life expectancy now is 71 years for men and 78 years for women, some 30 years longer than at the turn of the century. By the year 2030, the number of Americans over the age of 65 is expected to double. Clearly the health care needs and nutritional requirements of such a large part of the population are of vital interest to us all.

The way we eat during our lifetime as well as our genetic backgrounds help determine how long we will live. Generally, the lifespans of our parents are the best predictors of the length of our lives. We can't change our genes, but we can manipulate our diets to slow down or postpone some degenerative diseases.

There is considerable evidence now that the lifetime diet significantly influences our chances of developing osteoporosis, heart disease, cancer and diabetes. The interplay between genetics and dietary factors seems to determine the onset of such degenerative diseases.

The way the body metabolizes fat and cholesterol is determined both by genetics and what is eaten. Some people are genetically far more likely to develop high blood cholesterol levels when they eat fat and high-cholesterol foods. Other people are genetically inclined to elevate their blood pressure with excessive salt. Rather than let hypertension and cholesterol problems develop and then treat them medically, isn't it better simply to change the diet to help avoid them? Certainly, and the earlier the better.

There are those who prey upon elderly people, selling them expensive vitamin and food supplements, but unfortunately the money is wasted and would be far better spent on wholesome foods that provide much more than a single nutrient.

Older people need about the same amount of protein as younger people, but sometimes because of poor dentures or lack of money, they may not get it. Good, soft and inexpensive protein sources are eggs, cottage cheese and other cheeses, peas and beans. Lean meats, fish or poultry are recommended daily, if possible.

Many elderly people need more calcium and vitamin D because

use more sugar and salt to increase food flavors. Using more herbs, spices and lemon helps improve tastiness and is much more healthful.

# Our Children



## A case of parent abuse

You think you have problems? "Listen in" on this letter received recently, and see whether you would be willing to change places.

"First, I want to thank you for answering my letter about my girls' dressing problem. I was really surprised to hear from you and especially because you sent a handwritten answer.

"I really have a lot of problems. The main one is that my children and I do not know how to talk to one another. My middle one cannot answer me without yelling. Yes, I admit, I yell too, but not while just talking.

"As soon as they wake up the answering back starts. It is so difficult to get them to be agreeable with me. With my oldest it is related to getting her hair looking just right. I do the hair, and if it isn't flat enough she yells or refuses to go to school. So we do it one more time, and then if she still doesn't like it, I refuse to do it over, and she usually leaves, yelling at me.

"The funny thing is that they ask for my opinion, but if it doesn't agree with theirs they get angry and the fighting starts up again.

"I was hoping (but I am leery about it) to get some counseling help with the children. What do you think about the idea of children and parents getting counseling together?

"Because I have many problems raising these 9- and 10-year-olds maybe the counseling could help. They talk about child abuse, but what about parent abuse?

"I would just like to have one happy day with the children.

"My husband even said one morning, 'It's not you. It's them.' I felt pretty sane then because I really had felt it was totally my doing.

"One more thing — how can I keep our 2-year-old from learning the answering back, the name calling, and the words like 'I hate you'? Did you ever hear a child tell her mother that she hates her? Whenever something goes wrong, I get the blame and then I start yelling back.

"What I am looking for is an instant way of solving everyday encounters with the children. My husband and I seem to be losing their respect."

That wasn't the entire letter, but I think you get the idea of this mother's misery.

When I wrote to her I suggested that she and her husband consider family counseling, including the 9- and 10-year-old in it. I also suggested she locate a copy of Thomas Gordon's book "Parent Effect-

iveness Training" and the writings of Haim Ginott.

But an "instant" way of solving family conflicts? Hardly. It takes time, patience, common sense and maybe even more.

Q. My question isn't in the earth-shaking parent areas of discipline, adolescence or learning to read. It is just a simple one of opinion — is it a waste of money to put a camera in the hands of an 8-year-old?

He wants one and my husband thinks he can handle it, but I feel there is plenty of time, so why push? What do you think?

A. An inexpensive, automatic camera might be a practical, enjoyable item for a child the age of your son. Taking pictures and loading and unloading film are far more simple procedures than they used to be. It can become a fascinating hobby that might mature into more sophisticated practices for a child who is interested.

This question relates to a "readiness" factor that is so important in a youngster's development, whether we are thinking about eating neatly, beginning to read, handling numbers in arithmetic — or taking pictures.

If the child is ready, it is not a matter of pushing. It is more a factor of capitalizing on "the teachable moment."

# Your Social Security

## Apply promptly for SSI benefits

Q. Can Social Security disability benefits be retroactive? Is it the same for SSI disability? — C.D.

A. Entitlement for Social Security benefits may be established up to 12 months before the application is filed.

However, for SSI, no payments can be made for any day before an application is filed. People who think they may be eligible should apply as soon as possible at any Social Security office.

Q. My daughter had been receiving SSI but her condition improved last year and she returned to work. As a result, her checks stopped.

However, her condition has now deteriorated. What does she have to do to get her checks again? — G.A.T.

A. She should reapply for disability benefits at her local Social Security office. A new determination will be made on her disabling condition.

Q. After I remarried I had a daughter by my second husband. He recently died following a short illness. I also had two children by

my first husband, who is also deceased.

Could the children from my first marriage become eligible on my second husband's record? — J.B.S.

A. Yes, if he was providing half of their support at the time of his death. Particulars should be discussed with your local Social Security office.

Q. My youngest daughter was killed in an auto crash three years ago. Since then her two small children have lived with me. I have fully supported them. The children's father is also deceased.

I plan to retire next year at age 65. Can I receive Social Security for my grandchildren? — F.B.P.

A. It is possible that your grandchildren can be entitled to benefits on your record.

Because the dependency requirements which your grandchildren must meet are quite strict, you should contact your local Social Security office for particulars.

## ANTIQU OR JUNQUE



### Stripping original finish diminishes chair's value

By James G. McCollam

**Q.** This chair has a rush seat and is painted black. The decoration seems to be stencil work and is in fairly good condition.

What can you tell me about its vintage and value? Should I strip it down and refinish it?



**A.** First of all, don't strip the original finish and stencilling. Clean it thoroughly and give it a coat of flat varnish to protect the old finish. This way, your Sheraton Fancy Chair will be worth about \$225 to \$275. If you strip it and refinish it the value will be about half that.

Chairs like this were popular during the second quarter of the 19th century.

**Q.** "Willow" pattern china has me confused. As antique shows and dealers' shops, the prices range from cheap to very expensive. Can you explain this to me?

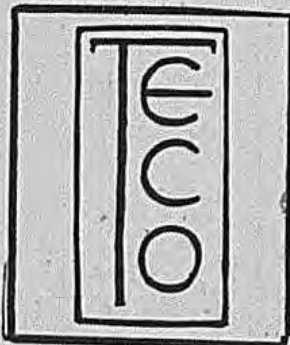
**A.** The "Willow" pattern — usually blue on white — was devised in the late 18th century by Thomas Minton; by 1830 there were over 300 makers of "Willow" in England alone. Even today, there are dozens of companies producing it.

The most desirable will be those pieces marked "Allerton" or "Ridgway." If the mark includes the word "England" the pieces date from 1891 or later. Without "England," the vintage is late 19th century.

Typical prices for 19th century "Willow" ware are as follows:  
Dinner plates — \$15-\$20.  
Cup and saucer — \$20-\$30.  
Teapot — \$75-\$95.  
Sugar and creamer — \$60-\$70.

**Q.** We have a 9-inch green pottery vase marked "TECO" as shown in the enclosed sketch.

What can you tell us about its vintage and value?



**A.** This was made by the Terra Cotta Tile Works of Terra Cotta, Ill. The company was founded in 1881 by William D. Gates. The "TECO" mark was used from 1902 into the early 1920s.

Your vase would probably sell for \$125 to \$135.

# Hicksville Man Makes North Pole Trip

USS Tre pang (SSN 674) is shown surfacing through the ice at the North Pole. One of the periscopes is raised and the fairwater planes which normally control the ship's depth while submerged have been rotated to the vertical or upright position to help break through the ice. Crewmen climb from the bridge down the metal rung ladder to the ice below.

A Hicksville man has the distinction of being re-enlisted by the Chief of Naval Operations on the way to the North Pole.

Mark Paternoster, an interior communications chief petty officer in the Navy, recently re-enlisted for four more years, and Adm. James Watkins, CNO and a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, administered the oath of allegiance aboard the USS Tre pang (SSN 674) homeported here.

Tre pang, a fast attack nuclear submarine, was conducting special operations under the polar ice cap, and Adm. Watkins was visiting as part of a fact finding mission. A few days after the swearing in ceremony, Tre pang surfaced through the ice at the North Pole.

Born in New York City, Paternoster was reared in Hicksville and was graduated from Hicksville High School where he was president of the audio visual club, a member of the radio club and the all school council. He also performed in some school plays.

Paternoster joined the Navy in 1967—two months after he was graduated from high school. He has attended 47 different Navy schools including career counseling, recruiting, electronics and electricity, submarine and interior communications.

In addition to Tre pang, he has served aboard the USS Theodore Roosevelt (SSBN 600), USS Daniel Boone (SSBN 628), USS Tecumseh (SSBN 629), and the USS Whale (SSBN 638). He made five patrols each on the Roosevelt and the Boone and four on the Tecumseh—all fleet ballistic missile subs.

During various deployments, Paternoster has visited Scotland, England, Italy, France, Spain, Sardinia, Canada and Bermuda. "But the under the ice run was by far the most interesting deployment I've had," Paternoster said. "It was nice to have the CNO do the swearing in ceremony.

The chief went on to say that the North Pole "is something you'd have to experience to believe. You have to see it to appreciate it. A lot of people don't realize what it is like," he added.

On Tre pang, Chief Paternoster is the leading petty officer of the interior communications division and the command career counselor.

During previous duty stations ashore, he has worked at the Naval Submarine Support Facility here and has been on recruiting duty in the Haverhill, Mass. area. While serving as a recruiter, he was the recruiter of the year for his zone in 1983 and earned six gold wreaths for excellence in recruiting.

Paternoster is married to the former Miss Patty Sclaff of Scaford. They have two daughters, Kristina, 9, and Laurie, 7. Mrs. Paternoster is active in Girl Scout activities, and Paternoster has taught electronics and electricity in area high schools.

The chief has served two years aboard Tre pang which is staking claim to a record time under the polar ice cap. "We were under for almost two months, and that is as long as many new people had been to sea in one stretch," Paternoster said.

After the ship surfaced at the North Pole, several crewmembers installed a flag pole and hoisted the National ensign. Others decorated another make shift pole with directions to their hometowns and favorite sports, along with estimated distances.

Many walked around the ship and the flag pole so they could say they had been around the world in 80 seconds. After Tre pang submerged she circled the geographic pole to make certain everyone had been around the pole at least once.

Cmdr. R.D. Woolrich, commanding officer of the Tre pang, called the cruise an experience that the officers and men will remember for the rest of their lives.

### Death Penalty Falls Again

As a prime sponsor of the bill A-2922 which provides a death penalty for criminals convicted of certain acts of murder, I was frustrated by the Assembly's failure to override Governor Cuomo's recent veto of this measure. In essence, this bill would have given juries the option of imposing the death penalty on criminals convicted of capital offenses such as:

- \*victim is murdered while defendant was in act of committing certain felonies (rape, robbery, kidnapping).
- \*victim's death occurred at the hands of a paid assassin or professional killer.
- \*victim's death was caused by severe intense suffering (torture/murder); or the defendant knowingly created substantial risk of death to others (bombing a public building).
- \*victim was murdered to prevent given testimony at trial.
- \*defendant was previously convicted of committing murder, attempted murder or manslaughter and is on trial for committing the same crime.

Additionally, this bill requires a two-tier trial procedure. The first trial would establish the defendant's guilt or innocence. If convicted of any of the crimes described above, a second jury after hearing the facts again, then sentences the criminal to death or life without parole. This process was intended to meet all constitutional requirements and to provide maximum protection against someone erroneously convicted receiving the death penalty. Obviously, the crimes covered in A-2922 are vicious, wanton acts of murder. It is difficult to have any sympathy for violent criminals who have absolutely no regard for the life of another human being.

As expected, Governor Cuomo vetoed the measure. In June, I and 93 of my Assembly colleagues, voted to override the Governor's veto. When the final vote was tallied we had fallen just seven votes short of the 101 needed for an override. As a result, New York State still does not have a death penalty.

There is no singular solution to the lawlessness and violence that pervades our society. But I believe the enactment of the death penalty would serve as a deterrent to the frightening number of vicious murders that are being committed on a daily basis.

## Tashlich Service, Picnic On Sept. 22

Rabbi Gary G. Perras has announced that The Manetto Hill Jewish Center is holding its annual Tashlich Service and picnic on Sunday, September 22. The program will begin with a car caravan leaving the synagogue at approximately 10:15 a.m. Upon arrival at Roosevelt Park in Oyster Bay, the Tashlich ceremony will be held.

Following the ceremony, everyone is invited to picnic and participate in the games and athletic events. Persons wishing to participate are requested to bring their own dairy lunch and to be at the synagogue parking lot by 10 a.m. This event is open to the entire community at no charge. In case of rain, the Tashlich Service will be held and the picnic will be cancelled with

no subsequent rain date.

### Tashlich: Background Statement

The Tashlich ceremony involves standing before a running body of water on the first afternoon of Rosh Hashana (the second afternoon if the first day coincides with the Sabbath), reciting a number of Psalms, shaking the corners of one's garments to symbolize the shaking off of one's sins, and throwing bread crumbs to the fish. This custom probably dates from the 14th century and its name Tashlich (you will cast away), is derived from a passage in Micah 7:19 in which God is depicted as casting all our sins into the depths of the sea.

Since there is no running water near The Manetto Hill Jewish Center and driving on the holy days is forbidden to traditional Jews, the members of The Manetto Hill Jewish Center observe the Tashlich ritual on the Sunday between Rosh Hanana and Yom Kippur. This also enables many more people to participate in the ceremony.

Water in the Jewish tradition is compared to the Torah (the Bible or all of God's teachings). Both are deemed to be universal, to bring life, to refresh the soul of man, and to cleanse. The symbolism of the running water is to remind us that time, just like the river, flows in one direction only. Opportunities to do good, once lost, are irretrievable and we should, therefore, use each moment of our lives wisely.

The symbolism of fish in the river is a reminder that just as fish may be easily caught in a net, every human being will ultimately be caught in the net of death and final judgment. Hopefully, this awareness will encourage the participants to give more thought to repentance and living righteously.

The feeding of the fish in the river helps us begin the New Year with a righteous act - showing kindness to God's creatures. Kindness to animals is a major obligation in the Jewish tradition and is deemed to be a prerequisite for non-Jews, as well as for Jews, in order to enter Paradise.

The Jewish faith realizes that changing one's life for the better does not come easily. Genuine spiritual change requires time, effort, courage, and sacrifice. For that reason, the Jewish High Holiday period extends for 40 days and is highlighted by various services and rituals such as Tashlich which are intended to touch and challenge the faithful.

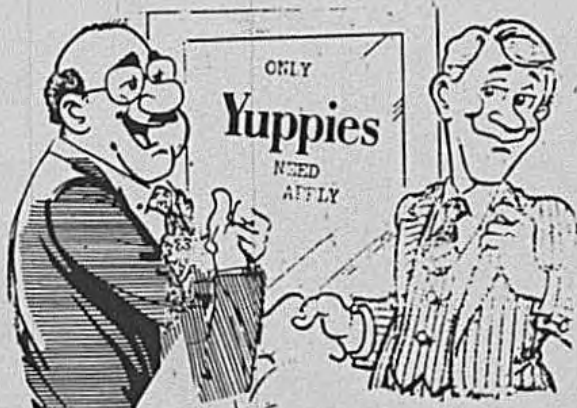

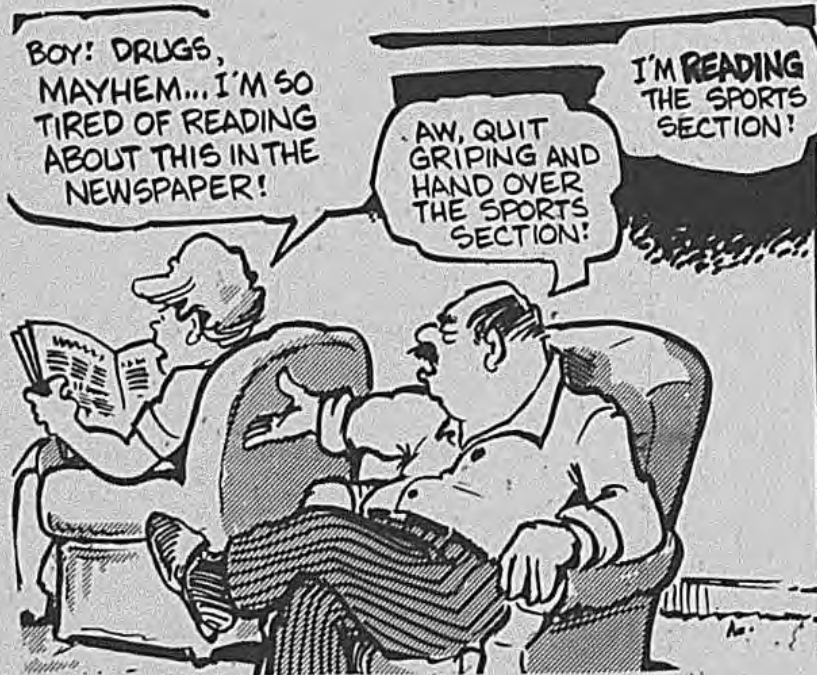

## Callers To Input Unsure What To Do About AIDS

Most callers to Input were unsure of what should be done in answer to this question: "Do you think children AIDS victims should be allowed to attend regular school classes?" Here are some of the answers:

### NOT HERE YET

I am very glad that the question on AIDS is not one that is presently in our school districts so far as I know. The reason is that I hope that by the time the question does get to us that there will be a more definite answer. As a Christian I feel that we must extend our hand to those in need but at the same time I do not know whether that includes endangering those who are placed in our care such as children. It is a question without a good answer presently. G.V.

### AGAINST AIDS

I am against having children in school who have AIDS. This is not solely because I think that they will be a danger to other children but because by the very nature of the disease the AIDS victims will be subject to catching diseases from regular students. AIDS means that the victim is unable to ward off common diseases so any decision to mix those victims with regular children will have a deadly effect on the victims. J.E.

### DON'T KNOW ENOUGH

The trouble with the AIDS question is that we do not know enough about AIDS to answer the question. If the health department had more information on how to prevent the disease, then we would not have a problem in deciding. Children should not be kept from school because they have a disease that cannot be transmitted but who can say that AIDS is such a disease? M.R.

### PROTECT ALL

I would allow a child with a case of AIDS to attend school if given the full assurance that it is not communicable. The difficulty now is one of confidence in the authorities who seem to be unsure themselves. Long ago we decided that communicable diseases have to be isolated and this was not as a stigma against those with the disease but simply to protect the others. There really can be no change from that idea. K.E.

### FOR SEPARATION

I think we can only deal with a theoretical answer to this question. Based upon assurances which the medical world have given i.e. that the risk of contagion is nil, children AIDS victims should be allowed to attend regular school classes. But what mother in all conscience would knowingly permit her child to associate with other children who are so afflicted. It took numberless years to dispell the fear of leprosy as a social disease but in retrospect, humankind just had to go through this era of fear and respect until more was known about the disease and cures were developed. Obviously, any child separated from his or her peers because of the affliction can't help but suffer the pangs of a social outcast but think of the reverse where the child is not separated and has to undergo the pointed avoidance of classmates both physically and intellectually day after day. Is one situation more hurtful to the child than the other or will the deliberate separation under constant study and care prove to be the most likely to bring about an eventual solution and proper psychological care in the interim. I opt for the latter. P.G.S.

### MOTHER'S VIEW

I'm a mother and love children but parents of AIDS' children should not seek to send them to school. No one knows for sure what the outcome of their being in close contact with other healthy children will be in years to come.

### TOO LITTLE KNOWN

The AIDS question is a puzzling one. On one hand I sympathize with the poor child who received the virus because of a blood transfusion needed to save his life. On the other hand, too little is known of the consequences to freely say they should be allowed admittance to schools with other healthy children. The medical profession has not always been absolutely correct with evaluations in the past and who knows what future damage will be brought on children? But, I guess the strong opinions of doctors and nurses would have to weigh heavily on any decisions I would make. Thank goodness I don't have any small children directly involved or I'm sure my response would be quite different. R.N.

### PAST ISSUES

#### WHERE WERE THEY?

At the expense of belaboring an issue I would like to reply to V.G. and A.M.'s reply in a recent Input column. They referred to revenge in the loss of an American life and they equated our thinking with Nazi thinking and they implied prejudice. Were these persons alive in 1945? Were they in a battle area and were they aware of the public and governmental feeling at the time? Secondly, the word revenge means, literally, "to get even." The bomb was dropped to shorten conflict on both sides. It was not a pay back. Thirdly, if the decision makers in the USA didn't think of American lives who would? 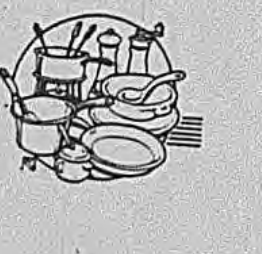

## READER RATINGS



Q. Recently I called one of the larger catering places to arrange to hold a small luncheon six months from now. I was told that they would never consider anything that near at hand unless there was a cancellation and that I ought to give at least a year's notice. Is this true all over? B.H. A. Probably a year's reservation at the large catering places is about right but that might not be your only option. You mentioned that it was a luncheon and it may not have needed a great deal of space. For something like that you ought to contact a restaurant that you like and see if they have an off day and whether they could accommodate you with a room. Many restaurants do this and you are better off than having gone to a large caterer. They don't need a year's notice either.

Q. Is it ever correct to have ones elbows on the table when one is eating? I was brought up to think it is not.

J.P. A. It is not correct to put one's elbows on the table when one is eating but it is permissible to rest them on the table between courses.

Q. Is it proper to apply lipstick at the dinner table?

W.C. A. You don't do it in anyone's home. You may, however, apply lipstick and a dab of powder at a restaurant table. If you are traveling abroad, applying cosmetics at a restaurant table is often considered gauche. If you are with a party of Americans, on the other hand, you may wish to follow your own custom in the matter. It is wise to be discreet.

Q. My husband buries his head in the newspaper at breakfast and doesn't say a word to me throughout. He just hands me the second section. Shouldn't a husband be expected to carry on some conversation with his wife at breakfast.

R.T. A. No one should be expected to carry on a conversation at breakfast. Many people don't really wake up until later in the day. Enjoy that second section. This is not a new rule, by the way; it has always been so.

Q. Restaurants nowadays do not know a thing about etiquette. Last night at a dinner they served salad. Isn't there a special salad fork that is supposed to be used in restaurants?

M.H. A. Yes. The salad fork has special cutting edge on one side of it and is usually shorter than a regular fork. Most restaurants are so busy getting cutlery together if they have a big crowd at dinner, that they do not set out the forks or knives right.

## 'Silver Palate' sequel hits pay dirt

If you're just about to send for some mail-order Cajun seasoning, you may want to reconsider. Julee Rosso says the trend has peaked.

So, who is Rosso that she's able to predict what's hot in the culinary world?

She's an entrepreneur of a million-dollar gourmet food line and a co-author of one of the best-selling American cookbooks of all time, "The Silver Palate Cookbook," for starters.

"We've been Cajuned and Tex-Mexed to death," Rosso explained during an interview, promoting the new "Silver Palate" sequel, "The Silver Palate Good Times Cookbook."

"If foods are hot just to be hot, we're missing out on the other flavors, which should be enhanced to get the full taste of the dish," said Rosso.

"That's another extreme (the highly spiced foods) we've gone to, and we're missing a lot of flavors," said Rosso.

According to Rosso, new food trends will include the many unusual fish on the market as consumers become more comfortable cooking fish as well as the return of "chicken that tastes like chicken," referring to free-range, scratching chicken.

"Consumers will demand higher quality chicken, and it will chal-

lenge the poultry growers," Rosso said. "Quality will continue to influence the marketplace."

It was the consumer's quest for fresh, high-quality foodstuffs that helped propel Rosso and her co-author, Sheila Lukins, into the food big time.

It all began in 1977 when Lukins was catering from her home and Rosso was marketing director for Burlington Industries.

"Someone suggested Sheila would be good to cater an Oleg Cassini party I called her, and later I watched her work. I never saw anyone who worked as fast in the kitchen as I did," Rosso continued.

"Our shop was basically going to be a hobby. It was going to be this tiny store (it's 156 square feet, about the size of a bedroom) — how much time would it take?" she said, laughing at their naivete.

Ultimately, the gourmet take-out was a success, as was the Silver Palate's catering and its gourmet products line. Then came the first cookbook, a chatty volume with whimsical black and white line drawings by Lukins.

Although Rosso calls it "peasant food," Yuppies and others took "The Silver Palate Cookbook" into their hearts and kitchens, buying almost 800,000 copies since it was published in 1982.

According to Workman Publishers, the "Silver Palate Cookbook" is by far that firm's No. 1-selling cookbook and one of this country's best-selling cookbooks of all time. The second "Silver Palate" book, which dwells on foods suitable for entertaining, is fast headed that way, according to Deborah Broide, publicity manager at Workman.

The new book contains 450 recipes and more of Lukins' fanciful drawings. It also includes party menus and party tips, timed to the seasons and special fare for the holidays.

Here is a selection of recipes from "The Silver Palate Good Times Cookbook."

### RATATOUILLE WITH LEMON AND BASIL

About 1 1/4 cups best-quality olive oil

1 large eggplant, unpeeled, cut crosswise into 1-inch slices

1 large yellow onion, cut lengthwise into 1/4-inch slivers

2 medium-size zucchini, cut lengthwise in half and then into 1-inch slices

5 large cloves garlic, minced

2 cups firmly packed whole basil leaves, plus additional for garnish

1/2 cup fresh lemon juice (2 lemons)

Coarsely grated zest of 2 lemons

1/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp. freshly ground black pepper

1/4 cup chopped fresh Italian parsley (or cilantro)

Heat 3/4 cup of oil in heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Add several eggplant slices and saute, turning occasionally, just until golden. Remove from skillet, cut into 1-inch cubes and place in deep ovenproof casserole. Repeat with remaining eggplant, adding oil if needed. Preheat oven to 350 F. Quickly saute onion and zucchini in 1/4 cup of oil in skillet and remove to casserole. Add garlic, 2 cups basil leaves, lemon juice, lemon zest, salt and pepper to vegetables and stir to mix. Bake covered 1 hour. Taste and adjust seasonings and stir in parsley. Serve hot or at room temperature. Garnish with whole basil leaves. Makes 8 servings.

### CAJUN HAMBURGERS

2 lbs. ground lean beef

1 green bell pepper, cored, seeded and minced

1/2 cup chopped green onion

3 cloves garlic, minced

2 tsps. ground cumin

2 tsps. dried oregano

1 tsp. dried thyme

1 tsp. paprika

Red pepper flakes, to taste

Salt, to taste

6 hamburger buns, toasted

Sliced tomatoes

Sour cream

Combine beef, green pepper, green onion and garlic in mixing bowl. Add cumin, oregano, thyme, paprika and red pepper flakes and salt to taste and mix until blended. Shape meat into six patties. Broil, fry or grill meat to desired doneness. Place hamburgers on toasted buns and top with sliced tomatoes and sour cream.

### CASHEW STICKS

A crunchy addition to any cocktail party.

16 slices sandwich or other firm white bread

1 cup cashew butter

1/4 cup vegetable oil

Preheat oven to 350 F. Trim crusts from 12 slices of bread. Cut trimmed bread into 1/4-inch wide strips. Place strips flat on baking sheet and bake just until lightly toasted. Place trimmed crusts and remaining 4 slices of bread on another baking sheet and bake until golden. Process to fine crumbs in food processor fitted with steel blade or in blender. Transfer to shallow bowl. Heat cashew butter and oil in small saucepan until blended and warm. Dip toasted bread sticks completely into cashew mixture and then coat with bread crumbs. Let sticks dry flat on baking sheet. Store in airtight container.

### WARM POTATO SALAD WITH FRIED POTATO SKINS

There have been many versions of warm French potato salads, but the Silver Palate has added a new twist for Americans who love potato skins.

8 medium-size boiling potatoes

12 slices bacon

1 medium-size red onion, chopped

1/4 cup wine vinegar

1/4 cup olive oil

1 heaping tbsp. Dijon-style mustard

Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

1 cup chopped fresh Italian parsley

2 tbsps. chopped fresh tarragon

1 egg, beaten

Vegetable oil for deep frying

Scrub 3 potatoes under running water to remove any dirt. Peel these potatoes with a paring knife in wide strips, taking about 1/4 inch of potato flesh along with peel. Cover potato peels with water and set aside. Peel remaining potatoes in regular manner with vegetable peeler and discard peels.

Drop all potatoes in cold salted water to cover in large pan and cook until tender but still firm, about 30 minutes. Meanwhile, chop bacon and fry in medium-size skillet until crisp. Drain on paper towels.

Add onion to hot bacon fat and saute until limp. Remove from heat and whisk in vinegar, olive oil, mustard and salt and pepper to taste.

When potatoes are done, drain, let cool slightly and slice. Place potatoes in large bowl and pour bacon fat dressing over top. Add parsley and tarragon and gently toss to combine. Taste and adjust seasonings. Fold in bacon. Cut reserved potato skins into 1-inch squares and toss with beaten egg. Heat oil in deep-fat fryer to 375 degrees. Add potato skins, shaking basket to separate peels and fry until crisp and browned, 5 to 7 minutes. Transfer warm potato salad to serving bowl and sprinkle top with fried potato skins.

Serve warm. Makes 8 servings.

## Tomatoes have a special appeal

Tomatoes, in addition to their fresh taste and eye-catching color, have a special appeal for the cook in a hurry — there are dozens of ways to quickly turn a few tomatoes into a feast.

Two of today's recipes, Cold Curried Tomato Soup and Tomatoes with Artichoke Hearts and Sour Cream Sauce, both delicious and sophisticated dishes, will leave your guests wondering when you had the time to create such treats. Each takes just a few minutes to prepare, with no cooking involved. We have served each as a light lunch by itself and as the first course of a dinner, always to rave reviews.

Tomato Chutney quickly and easily adds a piquant note to meats, vegetables and a variety of other foods.

If you've ever grown tomatoes, you know that they resemble Ogden Nash's description of what happens when you shake a ketchup bottle — "None will come, and then a lot'll." Fortunately, there are lots of ways to convert a bumper crop of tomatoes into sauces, pickles and condiments that will last almost until the next year's crop is ready for harvesting.

If you lack either the space or the inclination to grow your own tomatoes, roadside stands can be a source for fresh, juicy tomatoes. Store-bought tomatoes often seem to have been chosen for their ability to survive long-distance shipping rather than by any criteria of taste or texture. A writer for the *New Yorker* magazine, angered by the perfect-looking but tasteless tomatoes at his local market, conducted an impact test which proved that the tomatoes exceeded the federal standards for car bumpers.

Wherever your tomatoes come from, a few tips will help you prepare them to perfection.

To skin tomatoes, immerse them in boiling water for 30 seconds or so — the skins then will peel off easily. To flavor the tomatoes before peeling (as in today's recipe for Tomato Chutney), boil them in vinegar or in a mixture of vinegar and water. Holding tomatoes on a skewer over a gas flame until the skin blackens will also make them easy to peel, and imparts a delicious smoky flavor.

To seed tomatoes, cut them in half crosswise and squeeze out the seeds into a sieve set on top of a bowl, to save the juice that would otherwise be lost during seeding. Tomatoes to be included in long-cooking recipes like stews or curries should generally be seeded, since the seeds can give off a bitter taste during extended cooking.

Salt and salad dressings cause tomatoes to release their moisture, so salads that include tomatoes should be dressed and seasoned just before serving.

Tomatoes' acid reacts with aluminum and non-stainless steel, producing a bitter taste — so always cook tomatoes in enamel, stainless steel or coated cookware.

### COLD CURRIED TOMATO SOUP

- ½ cup plain yogurt
- ½ cup sour cream
- 2 cups tomato juice
- ½ tsp. olive oil
- 1 tbsp. red wine vinegar
- 2 dashes Tabasco sauce
- 1 tsp. freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 tsp. minced lemon zest (optional)
- ¼ tsp. salt, or to taste
- 2½ tbsps. freshly minced onion
- 1 tsp. or more curry powder, to taste

In medium-size bowl, whisk yogurt until smooth. Add remaining ingredients and continue to whisk until well mixed in.

Refrigerate, covered, until chilled.

Serves 4.

### TOMATOES WITH ARTICHOKE HEARTS AND SOUR CREAM SAUCE

- 6 large tomatoes, skinned and seeded
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1 tsp. dried dill weed (for sprinkling tomatoes)
- 1 pt. mayonnaise
- ¼ pt. sour cream
- 1 tsp. or more curry powder, to taste
- 1 small onion, grated
- Juice of 1 fresh lemon
- 1 jar artichoke hearts in oil

To skin tomatoes, dip them in pan of boiling water for about 30 seconds, until skins split. After this, skins will slip off easily. Cut around stem and scoop out all seeds and juice with spoon.

Sprinkle skinned tomatoes inside and out with salt, pepper and ½ teaspoon of dill. Place upside-down on rack or paper towels to drain.

Meanwhile, mix together mayonnaise and sour cream. Add curry powder, grated onion and lemon juice. Start with about 1 teaspoon of each and add more to taste. Sauce should be refrigerated for an hour before serving.

While sauce is chilling, stuff one or two artichoke hearts into each tomato. Half an hour before serv-

ing, cover each tomato with sauce and sprinkle with freshly chopped dill or dried dill weed.

Serves 6.

### TOMATO CHUTNEY

- 1 tbsp. minced garlic
- 1 tbsp. chopped ginger root
- 1½ cups wine vinegar
- 2 lbs. ripe tomatoes, boiled in vinegar, seeded and peeled
- ¼ tsp. cayenne pepper
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1½ tps. salt

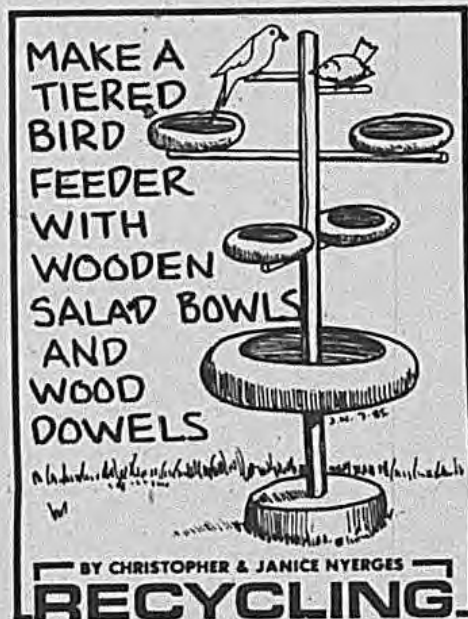
In blender or food processor, blend garlic, ginger and half of vinegar at high speed until smooth.

In heavy, 4-quart saucepan (non-metallic, so it won't react with acid in tomatoes), place rest of vinegar, tomatoes, cayenne, sugar and salt.

Bring to boil and add garlic and ginger pureed in vinegar. Reduce heat and simmer 2 hours or until chutney becomes thick enough to coat wooden spoon dipped in it. Stir occasionally during simmering — more frequently after chutney begins to thicken. Remove from heat, allow to cool, spoon into small jars and refrigerate.

Yields about 2½ cups.

Note: This chutney will keep, tightly sealed and refrigerated, for several weeks.

## Finger foods for the cocktail set

Hardly a day goes by that you don't use the fork for something. It's an invention we take for granted, like the wheel — we use it so much, it's hard to imagine that it wasn't always around.

But in fact, the fork has only been in common usage since the 18th century. Before then, it was an oddity throughout most of Europe. Small forks are known to have been in limited use as early as the 10th century, but somehow the utensil never really caught on until 700 years later. In the meantime, people used, you guessed it — their fingers.

Today, we consider the fork an indispensable utensil at most meals. But there are some foods made especially for the fingers. Many appetizers, for instance, are small, bite-size and made to be picked up and popped in the mouth with no further ado.

The custom of serving tasty morsels of food with cocktails before the main dinner course began in Scandinavia, where the spread was known as the *aquavit* table. (The idea was to keep drinking guests from ending up *under* the table, by serving appetizing goodies with the alcohol.)

From Scandinavia, the custom spread to Russia and thence to France, where the piquant treats were dubbed *hors d'oeuvres a la Russe*. (Hors d'oeuvres, in case you're wondering, means "outside the chef's main work.")

In Japan, appetizers (*zatsuki*) are served with small, steaming-hot towels (*oshibori*), which are used to wipe the fingers clean. *Oshibori* are now available in a number of import shops. If you're fond of serving finger foods, but can't find *oshibori* in your area, just dampen small, folded washcloths with steaming hot water, and offer to guests after the appetizers. It's a useful and very civilized custom your guests are sure to appreciate.

A final note about hors d'oeuvres: Avoid drippy or messy foods which are awkward to handle with the fingers. Instead, serve appetizers like the ones below. They're non-messy, microwaved in minutes (more time to mingle) — and they're finger-lickin' good!

### CHEDDAR

#### SHRIMP SQUARES

- 8 slices firm white bread
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 egg, separated
- 1/4 tsp. dried dill weed
- Dash pepper
- 1 (4 1/2 oz.) can small cooked shrimp, well drained

Trim crusts from bread with sharp knife. Brown bread lightly in conventional toaster, and cut each slice into 4 squares. Set aside.

In mixing bowl cream together butter and cheese. Blend in egg yolk, dill and pepper.

Beat egg white until soft peaks

form; fold into cheese mixture.

Divide shrimp evenly atop toast squares. Top each with a mounded spoonful of cheese mixture.

Arrange toast squares on two paper plates. Microwave uncovered, one plate at a time, on HIGH (100 percent power), 1 to 1 1/2 minutes, or until heated through and cheese melts.

Makes 32 squares.

### ROQUEFORT PECAN CANAPES

- 1/2 cup cream cheese
- 1/4 cup Roquefort or blue cheese, crumbled
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/4 tsp. paprika
- 20 crackers or toast, rounds

Place cream cheese in small glass bowl and microwave, uncovered, at LOW (30 percent power) 30 seconds to 1 minute, until cheese is soft.

Blend in Roquefort cheese and half (1/4 cup) of chopped nuts, Worcestershire sauce, dry mustard and paprika. Stir to combine thoroughly.

Spread mixture evenly over crackers and sprinkle with remaining nuts. Arrange 10 canapes on 10-inch paper plate and microwave, uncovered, at MEDIUM (50 percent power) 1 minute, until heated through. Repeat with remaining canapes.

Serve immediately. Makes 20 canapes

### HERBED

#### MUSHROOM NIBBLES

- 1 lb medium mushrooms (48 or so)
- 1 small stalk celery, minced
- 1/4 cup minced onion
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 tbsp grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 tsp. dried basil
- 1/4 tsp. dried marjoram
- 1/4 tsp. each salt and pepper
- Paprika

Wipe mushrooms gently with damp cloth. Remove stems and chop fine. Reserve caps.

Combine chopped stems, celery and onion with butter in 1-quart glass casserole. Microwave, uncovered, 2 to 3 minutes on HIGH (100 percent power), stirring every minute. Onion should be tender and translucent.

Add bread crumbs, Parmesan, basil, marjoram, salt and pepper, tossing to combine thoroughly.

Fill mushroom caps with stuffing mixture, pressing gently with hollow of small spoon to mound top. Sprinkle lightly with paprika.

Arrange filled mushroom caps on 2 10-inch paper plates, with smaller mushrooms toward center.

Microwave, one plate at a time, on HIGH (100 percent power) 3 to 4 minutes, rotating plate one-half turn after 2 minutes. Serve hot.

Makes about 4 dozen appetizers.

## Here's How

### Use drain solvents very carefully

Q. We have heard varying opinions on the use of chemical solvents to clear clogged plumbing drains. Can you give us some advice on this? We are having a problem that we suspect is due to a clogged drain. — L.W.

A. To protect yourself and your plumbing equipment, be sure you know what you are doing when you use chemical solvents to clear a clogged drain.

Use drain solvents with the utmost care and according to directions on the package. The Plumbing-Heating-Cooling Information Bureau says that unless so used, the solvents can be highly injurious, not only to the plumbing system but to yourself and others as well. If incorrectly used, solvents can cause serious damage to the pipes, chromium drain outlets and fixture enamel, and bring about adverse effects to the user from skin contact and fumes.

If you use a solvent, follow di-

rections to the letter — no shortcuts. And if you use one and it doesn't accomplish the purpose, tell your plumbing contractor what you have done before letting him begin work.

Most solvents will work as advertised, but just be careful.

Q. I would like to know the best method for completely repainting a shower stall. — R.C.

A. You do not say what material the shower walls are made of.

If shower walls are concrete, paint them with a good concrete paint, such as one of the rubber resin enamels.

If they are of wood, any waterproof paint should serve.

If they are slate, they should not be painted at all but given a coat of floor sealer.

If they are of any other material, such as metal (except stainless steel or aluminum), use any waterproof enamel. There are

even special paints available today for ceramic tile.

Stainless steel can be protected with wax, while aluminum can be protected with lacquer or wax.

Q. In the upstairs hall we have a dry, tightly covered closet we'd like to line with cedar and use for storing winter clothes.

Is this a difficult job, and where can the cedar be obtained? — V.L.N.

A. Many lumber yards sell tongue-and-groove cut cedar boards for just this purpose. No unusual skill is needed, but, of course, the more skill and care employed, the neater the results.

Be sure to clean out all dust from cracks in the floor, corners, etc., before going ahead. Moths like to lay their eggs in dust, too.

Cedar-odor spray is an excellent (though somewhat temporary) treatment for any type of wood walls.

percent to 40 percent discounts for senior citizen travelers. Your travel agent should know about the advantages of your age and be able to advise you. Ask about the best fares, comparing any saver fares with the senior citizen discount advantages.

Hotels and motels have senior citizen rates — again varying in qualification from 55, 60, 62 or 65 — and include Holiday Inns, Days Inns of America, Vagabond Inns, Travelodge, Super 8 Motels and others. Also ask about special discounts or package rates for low travel days — such as Sunday through Thursday in off-season resort areas, or weekends in high business-traffic hotels or cities. Almost every hotel chain has an "800" toll-free telephone number and you can get these numbers through the information operator or by phoning a local facility of the hotel or motel chain. Your travel agent should also have the detailed information for your most advantageous rates.

Restaurants are discovering mature adults in increasing numbers with discounts for your patronage at times when they can use more business: late breakfasts and early dinners (generally from 4:30 to 6:30 in the evening). Discounts range from 10 percent to as much as two dinners for the price of one. In some restaurants the discount dinners have slightly smaller portions — so, if you have a hefty appetite, be sure to ask in advance.

Attractions, from Disneyland to Sea World to local museums and theaters, are now offering discounts for seniors. The qualification age varies by attraction, ranging from 55 to 65. In most cases they do not promote the discount so your best bet, when at the ticket booth, is to ask for the senior citizen discount rate. It works.

Dr. Wallace: I am 18 and I've decided to stop smoking.

I've been puffing away for three years, but last Friday I threw away my remaining cigarettes and vowed I'd never smoke again. But now I'm having second thoughts. It's been four days and I've got a headache and I'm as nervous as a cat.

Please tell me how long I'm going to have to put up with this misery? — Sid.

Sid: Cigarette withdrawal lasts about a week, so hang in there.

The Lung Association lists eight separate side effects. For you and the many teens who pledged to quit smoking, please take note. Some smokers have all eight when they quit smoking; others only one or two. Fortunately, these conditions are easy to deal with and won't last long.

1. Cough: It happens because the lungs are cleaning themselves, getting rid of tars. Cough drops or cough syrup should relieve it.

2. Constipation: Here and there, some people complain of constipation when they quit smoking. If that happens to you, try bran or prunes. If neither does the trick, check with your doctor.

3. Slight sore throat: Although tobacco irritates your throat, it also numbs it. So, when you stop smoking, you may feel some brief discomfort as your throat returns to its natural, normal state. Liquids, such as water and fruit juices, can help.

4. Lack of concentration: Try deep-breathing exercises to get extra oxygen to your brain. Try stepping up your level of physical exercise for the same purpose. And avoid alcohol, which cuts the amount of oxygen your blood brings to your brain.

5. Headache: Try getting extra rest. Do deep-breathing exercises. And, of course, there's always aspirin. But use it sparingly. And don't take it on an empty stomach.

6. Nervousness: Drink lots of liquids, such as water and fruit juices, to get the nicotine out of your system as quickly as possible. It takes about a week. Stay away from coffee and cola drinks for a while.

7. Trouble sleeping: Try deep-breathing exercises and other relaxation techniques you may be familiar with. If you still have trouble sleeping, talk to your doctor.

8. Tiredness: Try stepping up your level of physical exercise. And try giving yourself an extra hour

of sleep.

Many who stop smoking eat more because food triggers the need for a cigarette. Be wise, don't overeat.

Dr. Wallace: Please tell me what to do. My parents are on vacation and my brother, 19, and I, 17, were left at home to take care of the house and pets.

I love my brother very much and thought that I knew him well but apparently I didn't. Every night he smokes at least one marijuana cigarette. Some nights he smokes as many as three. He says that sometimes it takes that long to get him high.

I asked him how long he has been using pot and he said he has been smoking it regularly for over two years. He also asked me not to tell our parents (my dad is a minister) and I promised that I wouldn't.

Now I feel that if I don't tell my parents, my brother might get started on harder drugs. I'm really confused.

Please tell me what to do. I want to tell my parents but I don't want to be a tattletale. Help! — Bev

Beverly: A promise must be kept. But keep reminding your brother that smoking pot not only is a crime, it also is hazardous to his health. However, if the time comes when he has "advanced" to additional drugs, notify your parents immediately.

Dr. Wallace: My girlfriends don't do drugs but they do get high by whiting out — they sniff typewriter correction fluid.

I'm told that the stuff is not habit-forming and is relatively safe. Is this true? — Judy

Judy: If you are asking me to give you the OK to start "whiting out," you have written to the wrong columnist.

Corrective fluid's solvents can cause heartbeat irregularities, kidney failure and nervous system damage.

Stay a wise young lady. Don't get involved. Your body will thank you.

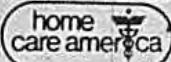

**Owning dog involves responsibilities**

**Q.** Our neighbors bought a Boston bull terrier approximately six months ago. They let the dog run freely all over the neighborhood and it terrorizes other dogs and children at the park. The neighbors say they feel it is not natural to chain or pen dogs.

The local humane shelter personnel have impounded the dog twice.

What can we do? We are worried that the dog will hurt a child.

**A.** There are a lot of responsibilities involved in owning a dog. These include feeding, grooming, preventive health care, housing, exercising, loving and disciplining the pet. Unfortunately, not all owners accept all of the responsibilities for their pets.

The problem you have presented is really not a pet problem. It is a human or owner problem.

Many communities have laws restricting the free roaming of pets. If your community has such laws, you should notify the appropriate authorities, either the personnel at the humane shelter or law enforcement authorities. Most animal shelters charge a fee at the time an owner claims a pet - this may encourage your neighbors to change their attitude.

If your neighbors are reasonable individuals, talking with them directly about the problems their dog is creating by roaming freely in the neighborhood may solve the problem. If your neighbors refuse to correct the problem and the dog causes you or your family any physical harm, you should consult your attorney regarding the enforcement of local regulations regarding pets.

**Q.** We recently moved to an area where porcupines are common. We have two dogs that enjoy

hunting and romping in the country.

What should we do if either of the dogs tangles with a porcupine? Is it difficult to remove porcupine quills?

**A.** Porcupine quills are extremely irritating to most pets and can be a source of deep infections if not removed correctly.

Probably the most important thing to remember in removing porcupine quills is to remove the whole thing. If the quill breaks, a fragment usually is left under the skin. With time, these fragments work themselves deep into the tissues where they cause serious infections.

To remove a quill, you should grasp it with a pair of pliers near the point where it disappears into the skin and then with a quick, powerful tug, pull it out. Of course the dog will have to be restrained by another individual. Because of the pain involved, it may be necessary to place a muzzle on the dog. Quills often are found on the face, nose, lips, feet and legs of dogs and cats. It is not unusual to find them inside the mouths of pets.

If an animal has a lot of quills or if the entire quill cannot be removed easily at home, take your pet to a veterinarian. Anesthesia of the pet makes removal of the quills much easier.

Your veterinarian also may prescribe a prophylactic antibiotic. Attacks by porcupines can be extremely serious and should not be taken lightly.
