\$3 Robbery At Cantiague

'Gloria' Takes Its Toll In Many Hicksville Areas

Hurricane 'Gloria' may have pulled its punches as far as the metropolitan area was concerned but it was powerful enough to topple thousands of trees in Nassau and Suffolk County. Coming ashore about noon, it was strong enough to cause flood tides on the south shore and put much of Nassau and Suffolk into darkness. In Hicksville electric power was still out in some sections as late as Sunday evening. Touching a fence electrified by a fallen power line sent one Hicksville woman to the hospital with shock and burns. Getting ice for refrigerators and freezers was a problem. While most people were lending a neighborly hand in the emergency, there were some reports of profiteering among sellers of ice. LILCO crews were confined, seemingly, to daytime restoration efforts because of the many fallen-tree entangled live power lines.



Postal Service honors youth groups with new stamps. Roger Nienaber, Hicksville Manager/Postmaster will present a representative from each of the organizations depicted on the above stamps with a First Day Cover Cancellation at the Hicksville Post Office Safety Fair on Sunday, October 13.

"By proclamation of the United Nations General Assembly, 1985 has been designated as "International Youth Year," said Roger Nienaber, Hicksville Manager/Postmaster.

The Postal Service is issuing a block of four stamps honoring youth groups on October 8. Depicted on the stamps are the Boy Scouts, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), Youth Camping and Campfire. Each stamp features an outdoor scene and representative individuals from each particular youth group.

At the Safety Fair on October 13, at the Hicksville Post Office from 1 to 5 p.m., Mr. Nienaber will present representatives of each of the youth groups with a First Day Cover Cancellation. Each group will also have a display at the Safety Fair. These groups are vital in providing our nation's youth with unique opportunities to participate in a wide variety of character developing programs and in teaching the importance of safety, health and first-aid," said Mr. Nienaber.

In addition to displays by these youth groups, this year's Safety Fair will be the first time the Postal Service opens its Driver Training Simulator to children. Children sit in the driver's seat as a movie showing hazardous driving conditions tests their driving skills.

Another new feature at the Safety Fair is Carrier Safety Town. Children become letter carriers as they deliver mail and learn about the many hazards faced by their mailmen.

There are over 50 other exhibits by the Hicksville Fire Department, Nassau County Police Department, the Long Island Railroad, the American Red Cross, American Cancer Society, Plainview Health Center and many other organizations.

Crowd At LILCO Demands Dry Ice

A crowd of 175 people became unruly at the LILCO Main Office on Old Country Road in Hicksville at 8:30 a.m., September 29, when they were told there would be no dry ice distributed at the plant.

LILCO security called the police after the arrival of a trailer load of dry ice. Apparently people had been lining up since early this morning to get some dry ice. After the truck's arrival the crowd became disorderly and demanded they open the gate and give them the dry ice. The police responded with one sergeant and three cars and at 9:10 LILCO staff advised the crowd that no distribution of ice was going to be made. The area was cleared in an orderly fashion by 9:25 a.m.

It is unknown where the people received the information that LILCO was going to give away the dry ice.

Vets Should Record Discharge

"Many veterans are not aware of the fact that they can have their discharge from military service recorded, free of charge, at the office of the County Clerk in his/her home county," according to Oyster Bay Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

"Under New York State law," Hogan said, "the veteran can have the discharge papers filed at the Nassau County Clerk's office and, after filing, the veteran, his dependents or survivors may obtain a copy any time it may be needed. Recording the discharge is especially important," Hogan continued, "since following the death of a veteran, the survivors

must produce the veteran's discharge when applying for a variety of benefits."

Regardless of when a veteran was discharged or released from service, the official papers can be recorded.

"I urge every veteran who has not already done so, to record his discharge papers in order to avoid possible future problems should the papers be misplaced or lost," Hogan concluded.





Our Children



Grandma insists on giving kids candy

Q. I have a wonderful mother, but she is killing my children with kindness. Well, not exactly, although it is coming pretty close. She loves my children, but one way in which she shows her affection is in giving them presents whenever she comes to visit.

Every time it is the same thing — candy. I tell her it is harmful to their teeth and their general health, but she just will not change her ways. Her response is that there was always candy around the house when my sisters and I were kids, we ate it often, and there were no bad results. I'll admit that our teeth and health have been pretty good, but I still don't want my children to have candy.

Once she brings it into the house, it is difficult to keep them away from it, but what to do? Any ideas?

A. It isn't easy to argue with facts. One of them is that sugar causes tooth and other problems. Familial tendencies through genetics may combat that conclusion, but you are basically correct. Your opinion can include not only sweets, but also smoking and excessive alcohol.

It will obviously take tact and sensitivity on your part to handle this problem with your mother. Expressing your love and your desire for her to be with your children will have to be balanced with a firm request that her gifts be limited to non-edibles because you have a balanced diet for them well in hand. There are so many other gift possibilities that can relate directly to individual interests of your children, perhaps including books, recordings or hobbies.

Too many grandparents have a mistaken notion that they have to "buy" the affection of their grandchildren, not realizing that their time, ability to listen, and showing an interest in and understanding of what the youngsters are doing are far more important. Recognition of their achievements and an appreciation of their problems are among the "sharing" factors from which a grandparent (and the children involved) can derive so much enjoyment.

Q. I would like to react to the individual who wrote to you requesting aid in keeping their son, 7 years old, and a black school chum apart.

My reply is simple. "Dear sir or madam, your racism is showing."

A. Your response isn't much different from my original one. I replied, "Your question deserves another very brief one: Why? Please write again and verbalize your objections, which are implied in your letter. Then let's talk about it."

I haven't heard from that letter

writer again, but I'm not surprised.

Q. I just can't get my 2-year-old to brush his teeth as he should. In fact, I don't seem to be able to get him to do most things that he ought to be able to do — like dressing himself, eating neatly, going to bed when he should or handling the bathroom in a clean way.

My husband says I'm just too impatient with him, but I don't really think I am. After all, I tell him constantly what to do, but he just won't listen.

My husband suggested that I write to you about all this. I don't really see the purpose in doing so because it is all just a matter of getting the little fellow to follow some commonsense ways of beginning to get along in this world.

Don't you agree?

A. Yes — and then again, no. One of the biggest problems parents face is being unrealistic about the capabilities of their children. Your expectations seem to be far in excess of what most 2-year-olds can do. They have had such a little time to learn all the skills of cleanliness and order that you seem to expect it is really a matter of readiness.

Your pediatrician and some of the better books on child development might help out. Writings of Dr. T. Berry Brazelton could be a good starting point.

Jericho Teacher On Education Comm.

Robert Lynch, Social Studies teacher at Jericho Senior High School, will serve on the Education Commission of the States. Mr. Lynch accepted an invitation from Hon. Thomas H. Your Social Security

Custodial care not covered by Medicare

Q. My mother-in-law, who is in her 90s, must be assisted with walking and getting in and out of bed. She is becoming more and more feeble.

Would Medicare pay for her care in a nursing home? — P.A.

A. Care that is primarily of a personal nature and can be provided by people without professional skills or training is considered custodial care. For example, custodial care includes help in walking, getting in and out of bed, bathing, dressing, eating and taking medicine.

Medicare does not cover care if it is mainly custodial.

Q. Can victims of the new disease AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) receive Social Security disability benefits? — L.L.

A. A person with AIDS may be found to be disabled based on the regulation that defines disability as the inability to do any substantial gainful activity (work) because of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment that has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months or to result in death.

In evaluating AIDS, the important aspect of this definition is "expected to result in death." As with any other impairment, the documented medical findings must be comprehensive and detailed enough

to clearly establish that the individual has AIDS.

Application for disability may be made by mail, by telephone or in person at any Social Security office.

Q. I recently applied for Supplemental Security Income payments and was told I must notify Social Security if I give up my apartment (I live alone) and move in with someone else.

How does this affect me? — C.C.

A. Your SSI payment is reduced by one-third if you live in another person's household and receive support and maintenance from that person. The one-third reduction takes the place of actually counting the dollar value of the support and maintenance as income.

The amount of the SSI payment is based on the amount of other income a person has.

Q. My next-door neighbor received an increase in his July check. Cost-of-living adjustments are paid in January. What would this increase be for? — F.J.

A. Almost 2 million working beneficiaries received a benefit increase in their July checks based on additional earnings since their benefits were last computed.

Benefits for working beneficiaries are recomputed automatically.

Dear Shirley: We are a black American family, and lately we've had more than our share of health problems.

Both my mother and father have

high blood pressure that was just diagnosed, and now my brother and I have it, too. My mom and dad are in their late 60s, my brother is 38 and I'm 34.

It seems impossible that we could all have the same thing, but I'm wondering if it could have something to do with the way we eat? Are there certain foods that could cause it? We are all a little overweight, but I've seen other people who are a lot fatter. *

Can you give me some ideas that might help? — E.R.J.

Dear E.R.J.: For some unknown reason, more black Americans suffer from high blood pressure, and more severely, than others in the population.

The American Heart Association says that as many as one-third of all black Americans have the disease, compared to 22 percent of white Americans.

The most important thing is to identify and treat it as soon as possible. Age, sex, race and family history are all factors that contribute to it. The older a person becomes, the more likely it may develop. If parents have or had high blood pressure, the potential is even greater.

Stopping smoking, weight reduction, a low-salt diet and daily exercise help lower blood pressure for a great many people. There are no specific foods that cause hypertension, but there is new evidence that high-calcium foods may help it — soft bones of fish, green leafy vegetables, fruits, cereals and low-sodium dairy products. Lower the fat, salt and calories in your diet to lose weight and help your blood pressure.

There are some new "potassium sparing" diuretics on the market that are very effective and comparatively inexpensive.

Dear Shirley: I have always loved watermelon, but after reading about the poison they put on them, I'm afraid to buy any. They say the scare is past, but how do we know?

Do you know what the stuff was? How does it affect a person? Why don't they check these things?

I think it's terrible to let people get sick like that, don't you? — Mrs. W.P.

Dear Mrs. W.P.: Yes, indeed, and obviously, more accurate testing is sorely needed. The offending material is a pesticide called aldicarb, sold under the brand name of Temik.

Apparently, even if inspectors had tested the poisoned melons, they would have been certified as edible and sent to market, because the screening methods are inadequate to detect the breakdown products of the chemicals. Aldicarb sulfoxide is formed when the pesticide breaks down in the soil. It caused a flu-like illness in many people who ate the tainted melons.

Testing only for the presence of a compound and ignoring its possible breakdown by-products may miss the most toxic elements. While aldicarb is not legal for use on watermelon, there seemed to be some loopholes in the law.



Vase made in France

By James G. McCollam

Q. This vase is 10 inches tall, tan with brown and red trim. It is signed "LeGras" on the side. On the bottom it is marked "France."

Please tell me whatever you can about this.



A. Auguste LeGras founded a company in St. Denis, France, in 1864, which produced cameo and enamel decorated glass that was very popular and has become quite valuable.

Your vase was made between 1900 and 1920. It should be worth from \$325 to \$375.

Q. When I contacted a china replacement service about buying individual pieces of Haviland china, I was shocked at the prices.

If a cup and saucer is worth \$65, my 80-piece service for 12 should be worth about \$5,000 (after spending over \$1,000 to fill in the missing pieces).

Frankly, I could use a little advice on the subject.



A. First you have to understand what a china replacement service does. They carry an inventory of antique and collectible china in which they have a huge investment. When you spend \$65 for a cup and saucer, it is \$50 for service and \$15 for china.

If you spent \$1,000 to complete your set of Haviland, you would have invested more than your set is

worth. If you would get your money's worth in satisfaction — OK.

Q. I have recently acquired a few souvenir spoons and think it might be interesting as a hobby to collect more.

Please state your opinion and some typical prices.

A. This is a worthwhile hobby, particularly if you concentrate on sterling spoons with no enamel trim. Silverplate wears off and enamel chips.

You might select one category — cities; here are some typical prices — all sterling silver:

Montreal, maple leaves on handle — \$25.

St. Louis, 1904, buffalo handle — \$45.

Albany, N.Y., state seal on handle — \$30.

Boston, Old North Church — \$30.

Harrisburg, Pa., floral handle — \$40.

New Orleans, city seal — \$25.

Portland, Maine, Longfellow handle — \$60.

Casper, Wyo., Indian on handle — \$60.

Sonora, Calif., pick and shovel — \$25.

You will find that prices usually will depend on how much the buyer is willing to pay. This is one field of collectibles where prices are really negotiable.

Library Equipment To Aid Hard Of Hearing

The Hicksville Public Library has purchased equipment to assist the hard of hearing to enjoy the concerts, lectures, discussions and films offered in the library auditorium.

Funded in part by the Auditory Assistance Equipment Grant from the Nassau Library System, this new service includes a small pocket-size transmitter and lavaliere microphone that are used by the speaker/performer, and a battery-operated receiver (about the size of a bar of soap) and a lightweight, foam-cushioned pair of headphones that are used by the listener. The receiver, which weighs in at a scant four ounces, is contained in a soft leather pouch which may be clipped onto a belt or handbag or simply held in one's lap. The thin, flexible headband is easily adjustable to head size or hairdo. Produced by Com-Tek, this auditory assistance equipment allows each listener to sit anywhere in an audience within a 200 to 500 foot range of the speaker/performer with personal control over the volume of sound in his or her receiver. There are no wires, no visible connections with the speaker's microphone or transmitter. The set enables the user to enjoy high fidelity reception without distracting room reverberation and background noise. As one first-timer user described the experience, "You can actually create your own peaceful little world of sound."

In announcing this unique outreach service, Library Director Kenneth S. Barnes said, "For years, libraries have been concerned with the sight problem of patrons and have been able to offer a variety of reading materials in Large Type and in recorded 'Talking Books' format. Today, we, in Nassau County, are able to extend library service to more people and in an additional sense...through the very real sense of Hearing."

For further information about Com-Tek auditory assistance equipment, please contact Ms. Suzanne Welker at the Hicksville Public Library.

In our video cassette collection, now numbering nearly 300, we have a number of close-captioned films that are usable for persons with a hearing impairment. The user must purchase a caption decoder or a television with built-in closed caption capability. If you have a hearing problem and wish to know what is available, you can visit the library or call us at 931-1417 for information.







Most Callers Think Some Farm Help Needed

Most callers to Input believe that the government should do more to help farmers in answer to this question: "Farmers are presently in a difficult financial situation in many places. Do you think the government should financially help farmers in difficulty?"

SHORT TERM

In general I believe that the government should have a helpful attitude towards farmers. We know that the health of the nation is tied to the growth of food. Unfortunately I believe that farm programs of the government have done harm to farmers rather than to help them over a long term. Farmers were subsidized not to grow crops. The rules were written so loosely that many people got into farming on the basis of gaining a public subsidy. So yes, the government should help farmers but it should carefully plan what it is offering and only do it on a short term basis.

HELP OVERSEAS

The problems on farms have been gaining for a number of years. BACK TO FREE ENTERPRISE

The graphics shown to illustrate the farm subsidy question tell a couple of stories. But, I think that more than anything else, they point up the fact that for 30 years the only reason the public "benefits" from government farm support is that they pay invisible premiums on agricultural products through their federal income taxes. As a result, farmers are not subject to the same marketing pressures which influence the price of other products or services. Obviously, without that support, the trend comparison between the farmer and the psychiatrist would not have shown that much of a disparity in the product price to the customer over a thirty year period. I am a firm believer in free enterprise and market influences and the mere fact that the farmers through the years have not had to devise new approaches to meet changing competitive conditions has robbed agriculture of the need to be innovative. Furthermore, it has spawned a new breed of absentee farmers who purchase acreage to be worked by others solely for the supports made available by an overly generous government. We have created this monster and perhaps it is too late to pull back completely at this time but we should definitely head in that direction with help made available on a case by case basis to farmers in difficulty awarded only on the basis of curing an immediate problem and with guide lines and performance criteria established toward programs of self sufficiency.

Farmers got into financial trouble by over expanding their land holdings and becoming a highly leveraged operation, very susceptible to upside changes in interest rates. Farmers re-mortgaged their already owned properties to buy additional land and now are having difficulty in paying the carrying charges on these mortgages. Farmers who did not speculate that inflation would continue up, up and away and did not borrow to buy more land, are not now in a financial squeeze. These high interest rates that have placed many a farmer in financial jeopardy, are mainly a reflection of the government spending more than it had on so-called social justice programs and being forced into the debt market driving up interest rates. The problem must be solved before it becomes too big to stop. The best medicine for the farmer, as well as every other small business person, is lower interest rates. Our Congressmen should be required by the voter to bring government expenditures in line with government tax receipts - to stop spending more than the government takes in. We all have to learn to kick the government subsidy habit whether we are a farmer, a student, or a senior citizen, otherwise we will all start experiencing the farmers' financial problems.

Q. Some restaurants make a big thing over a lobster tank, but I think it is disgusting to have to kill these animals in order to get a meal. Why do they have these tanks?

A. The reason is simply that lobster has to be freshly killed to be eaten. The lobster tank lets the diner see that what he is getting is really fresh lobster. Possibly some squeamish people believe that the lobster tank should be somewhere else but most diners want to see the live ones and if you do not, you should be suspicious. They are killed instantly in boiling water.

Q. Are restaurants allowed to serve you something else if you ask for "Coke" or "Coca Cola" and they do not serve it?

A. The answer is technically they are not. But many will say that they only carry "Pepsi" or another beverage. But you should be able to know in advance and refuse something you did not order. At least the "Coca Cola" company probably would want it that way, and "Pepsi" will also if it is the other way around.

Q. In a good restaurant that we attended recently an accordian player came around to each table and asked whether we had any requests. My wife made a request and the musicians played it. Is this music provided by the restaurant or should I have tipped? J.B.

A. Generally the musicians are paid by the restaurant to entertain all of the diners. But when you make a special request it is expected that a small tip will accompany the request. In this case \$1 would have been a fair tip.

Q. When a man and woman come into a restaurant, who asks for the table?

A. Traditionally the man asked for the table and talked to the head waiter, then the woman went first following the head waiter. Presently people who are not traditionalist where the woman is the host for the evening, she could ask for the table particularly if a reservation was in her name. The seating order is still the same with the woman going first.

Q. It is often confusing in restaurants to know whether to pay the waiter or to pay on the way out. What is the rule? D.C.

A. There is no rule of etiquette because each restaurant determines its own system. But generally the check will say, "Please pay server," or "Please pay the cashier." When in doubt it is never out of order to ask the waiter.

Big on broccoli

Scoring with pasta

By Verne Palmer

Rare is the home these days that doesn't harbor a football fan somewhere on the premises.

What that means is that weekends from late summer to early January are one long succession of TV gridiron clashes. Whether you regard that fact with enthusiasm or resignation, you can make the most of the situation by inviting a group of like-minded souls to share the fun(?)

Football parties lend themselves to entertaining of the very best kind — little effort and lots of fun.

Avoid being tied to the kitchen all day by planning a buffet of flavorful foods that guests can enjoy as the spirit moves them.

Imaginative pasta salads not only make good eating but also won't leave your buffet table looking limp and bedraggled as the afternoon wears on.

Team up fanciful shapes such as twists and shells, or more conventional noodles or fusilli, with such diverse companions as crunchy broccoli, chunks of ham, tender-crisp zucchini, bell peppers, cauliflower, water chestnuts, ripe olives, tomatoes, mushrooms, onions, capers, asparagus, peas or cheese.

For a final flavor touch, add a zesty oil and vinegar or creamy dressing and blend the whole together.

The salads can be made the night before, leaving the morning for laying out a complementary selection

of sliced meats and cheeses, imported mustards, deli breads, fresh fruits and relishes.

CALIFORNIA PASTA SALAD

1 (6 oz) pkg pasta twists
Flowerets from ½ head
fresh broccoli
1 (3 oz) slice ham, diced
½ red onion, sliced and sep-
arated into rings
4 scallop tops, chopped
½ red bell pepper, cut in
chunks
½ cup black olives, sliced
Bottled or homemade oil
and vinegar dressing

Prepare pasta according to package directions. While pasta is cooking, steam or microwave broccoli flowerets until tender crisp. Allow broccoli to cool.

Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl and toss until thor-oughly coated with dressing.

Refrigerate for at least 30 min-utes to allow flavors to mingle.

Oyster appetizers

1/4 cup snow peas, fresh or frozen
 1 cup broccoli flowerets
 1/4 cup chicken broth
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced
 1 medium tomato, diced
 1/4 cup water chestnuts, sliced
 2 tbsps ripe olives, sliced
 1/4 cup fresh parsley, minced
 2 tbsps Parmesan cheese

Heat olive oil in medium skillet. Sauté garlic, basil and oregano. Stir-fry snow peas and broccoli. Cook, covered, 3 minutes. Add chicken broth. Remove from heat. In large bowl, sprinkle salt on cooked noodles. Add mushrooms, tomato, water chestnuts, olives and parsley. Toss. Add hot vegetable and spice mixture to noodle mixture. Toss to mix. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Serves 4.

GARDEN PASTA SALAD WITH PESTO SAUCE

1/4 cup salad oil
 1/2 cup walnut pieces
 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
 2 tbsps. basil leaves, crushed
 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
 1/4 tsp. salt
 1 1/2 cups lightly packed fresh parsley leaves
 4 cups cooked ziti macaroni
 1 cup sliced yellow squash
 1/2 cup califlowerets
 1/4 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
 1/4 cup sliced radishes
 1 tbsp. sliced green onions
 Shredded Romaine
 6 cherry tomatoes, halved

To make sauce: In covered blender container, combine 6 tablespoons oil, walnuts, cheese, basil, garlic powder and salt. With rapid "On-Off" action, blend to coarse puree. Add remaining oil and parsley. Repeat "On-Off" action until mixture is pureed (do not overblend — small particles of parsley are desirable).

In large bowl combine cooked ziti and remaining ingredients except Romaine and tomatoes, with dressing. Toss to coat pasta mixture evenly. Cover; refrigerate at least 4 hours. To serve: Line serving platter with Romaine; top with salad. Garnish with cherry tomatoes.

Makes 7 cups or 8 servings.

PIZZERIA SALAD

1 (10 oz.) pkg. tagliarini (flat noodle) pasta
 Italian dressing (see below)
 2 cups turkey ham chunks
 1 cup chopped tomato
 1 cup sliced mushrooms
 1 cup cubed mozzarella cheese
 1/4 cup sliced ripe olives
 1/4 cup sliced green onions

Cook tagliarini as package directs; drain. Prepare Italian dressing; pour over pasta while still warm. Add remaining ingredients; toss gently. Serve immediately or chill if desired.

Makes 6 to 8 appetizer or luncheon servings.

Italian Dressing: Combine 1/4 cup red wine vinegar, 1/4 cup salad oil, 1 clove fresh garlic, minced; 1 teaspoon each sugar and prepared mustard, 1/2 teaspoon each Italian herb seasoning and seasoned salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

Oysters, once thought of as a food for the rich, or for those lucky enough to live near an oyster bed, are now available, at very reasonable prices, in almost every part of the country. Many great appetizers include oysters as their main ingredient, and today's recipes are for three of our favorites. Each can be prepared in just a few minutes.

One still occasionally hears the old adage that oysters can safely be eaten only during those months that include an "r" — September through April. This once-valid caution dates back to the time when refrigerated shipping was a chancy business at best, and oysters that were shipped during the hot-weather months of May through August were likely to arrive in questionable condition.

With today's fast and efficient shipping, oyster lovers can safely indulge their palates during any month of the year. When it comes to taste, at least in some parts of the country, the "r" rule may still have some validity. Oysters in northern waters breed during the warmer months, and many feel that they do not taste as good during this period. Southern oysters breed year-round, and so are equally good at any time.

Lists of dishes served at banquets in the New England Colonies soon after they were founded almost always included oysters. Indians introduced the settlers to the tasty bivalves, eaten *au naturel* from the half-shell just moments after they were pried from the bed. No account that we have been able to find gives the name of the intrepid Pilgrim who first gulped down a raw oyster, but one does wonder if he didn't first look over his shoulder to be sure that the Indians weren't rolling on the ground, laughing at his gullibility in eating such an outlandish-looking creature.

Oysters in the shell should be alive when you buy them, and their shells tightly closed. They should have no odor other than a light briny smell. Oysters can be kept alive in water for a couple of days. The water should be changed at least daily, and some cornmeal added to get the oysters to release any grit inside the shells.

Shucked oysters should be plump when you buy them. Their liquor should be clear, and the oysters should have no sunken or shriveled areas. Prepare them as soon as possible after you buy them.

Today's oyster recipes come from three different parts of the world. Lemon Oysters are a favorite appetizer in many parts of Africa. Oysters Parisienne are our version of a recipe from a wonderful neighborhood restaurant in Paris. Oyster Fritters are from the Low Country of South Carolina.

OYSTER LEMONS

4 large lemons
 4 ozs. smoked oysters
 8 ozs. cream cheese
 2 dashes Tabasco or to taste
 Salt and freshly ground

black pepper to taste

Cut top third off lemons and scoop out flesh and reserve. Cut skin off pointed ends of empty lemon shells, so that they will stand on flat surface. The tops of lemon shells may be scalloped with sharp knife, if desired, to make a more attractive presentation.

Using fine strainer, extract 1 tablespoon of juice from reserved lemon flesh and cut some thin strips of peel from removed tops of lemons, for garnish.

Drain smoked oysters and reserve liquid.

In blender, place oysters, cream cheese, Tabasco, salt, pepper and lemon juice and blend well until smooth. Add some of reserved oyster liquid if necessary to allow mixture to blend completely.

Fill lemon shells with oyster mixture and garnish top with lemon peel strips.

Serves 4 as an appetizer.

OYSTER FRITTERS

4 egg yolks
 1/2 tsp. salt, or to taste
 1/2 tsp. freshly ground black pepper, or to taste
 1 1/2 tbsps. minced onion
 5 tbsps. flour
 1 cup chopped, drained oysters (fresh or tinned)
 4 egg whites
 Vegetable shortening for frying

Beat egg yolks until smooth and creamy in texture. Add salt, pepper and onion. Whisk in flour, a bit at a time. Fold in oysters.

Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into mixture above.

Heat shortening and drop fritter mixture in, a spoonful at a time, and fry until golden brown.

Serves 4 as an appetizer.

OYSTERS PARISIENNE

24 oysters on half shell
 Rock salt to hold oyster shells
 1 cup softened butter or margarine
 1 1/2 tbsps. chopped scallions
 2 tbsps. chopped parsley
 1 1/2 tbsps. freshly squeezed lemon juice
 1/4 tsp. minced garlic
 Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
 1/4 cup bread crumbs
 4-8 lemon wedges

Place oysters on bed of rock salt in shallow baking pan(s).

In medium bowl, mix butter, scallions, parsley, lemon juice, garlic, salt and pepper, whisking until well blended.

Top oysters evenly with mixture, sprinkle with bread crumbs, dot with butter and bake in preheated 350 F oven until bread crumbs are golden brown — about 8 minutes.

Serve immediately with lemon wedges.

Serves 4 to 8 as an appetizer.

Microwave Magic

The cauliflower

The French know the cauliflower as *chou-fleur* — it sounds prettier, doesn't it? Like broccoli, brussels sprouts and spinach, this is one of those vegetables you either love or hate with a purple passion.

And speaking of purple, the Italians prize the purple-headed cauliflower (try saying that five times in a row!) that grows in their country.

The cauliflower found in American markets is a creamy white, but if you should notice a few brownish spots here and there, just shave them off with a sharp knife.

When shopping, look for unblemished heads with compact flowerets and fresh-looking green stems. Use as soon as possible after purchase and store, refrigerated, no longer than five days.

While it's available year-round, September and November are peak cauliflower months, so check your market for specials.

This vegetable is rich in vitamin C, and it's kind to dieters, too, with only 28 calories per cup. Raw flowerets are lovely on a platter of crudites, and taste great with creamy dips. And cooked cauliflower goes well with a variety of sauces.

To microwave frozen flowerets, place one 10-ounce package (about 1½ cups) in a 1-quart glass casserole with 2 tablespoons water and ¼ teaspoon salt. Microwave, covered, on HIGH (100 percent power) 8 to 9 minutes, stirring after 4 minutes. For two packages, microwave 12 to 14 minutes.

Mark Twain once called this vegetable the "cabbage with the college education." Why, I haven't the foggiest. But it is a smart idea to include the cauliflower in your diet. The following microwave recipes will give you some ideas:

CAULIFLOWER WITH CHEESE SAUCE

1 medium-size cauliflower
½ cup water
½ cup mayonnaise
2 tbsp. milk
¼ tsp. each dry mustard and ground white pepper
½ cup shredded cheddar cheese

Wash cauliflower well, removing outer green stalks. Break cauliflower into flowerets.

Place flowerets in a 1½-quart glass casserole with the ½ cup water. Cover and microwave 12 minutes on HIGH (100 percent power), stirring after 6 minutes. Drain, then return to casserole dish and cover. Set aside.

To make cheese sauce, combine mayonnaise, milk, dry mustard and white pepper in small glass mixing bowl. Stir in shredded cheese.

Microwave, uncovered, on HIGH (100 percent power), stirring every 30 seconds, just until cheese melts. (Watch carefully to avoid overcooking.)

Stir well and serve over cooked cauliflower.

Serves 4 to 6.

CHINESE CAULIFLOWER

1 medium head fresh cauliflower
½ cup water
½ cup each diced onion and celery
2 tbsp. butter or margarine
1 cup hot water
1 chicken bouillon cube
1 tbsp. cornstarch
1 tbsp. soy sauce
¼ tsp. pepper

Remove outer green stalks from cauliflower and discard. Rinse cauliflower thoroughly under cold running water.

Place whole cauliflower, stem side down, in 2-quart glass casserole dish. Pour in water. Cover and microwave on HIGH (100 percent power) 10 to 13 minutes, turning cauliflower over after 7 minutes. Drain well, return to dish and cover. Set aside.

In a 1-quart glass container, combine onion, celery and butter. Microwave, uncovered, on HIGH (100 percent power), 5 minutes, stirring after 2½ minutes.

Dissolve bouillon in hot water. Blend small amount of cold water with cornstarch to make runny paste. Stir into bouillon with soy sauce and pepper. Pour over onion/celery mixture, stir.

Microwave, uncovered, on HIGH (100 percent power) for 2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds.

Place cooked whole cauliflower on serving dish and pour sauce over top. Serve immediately.

Serves 4 to 6.

MIXED VEGETABLE RELISH PLATE

½ small fresh cauliflower
3 stalks celery
2 carrots
1 small onion
1 (4-oz.) jar chopped pimiento, drained
½ cup wine vinegar
½ cup olive oil
½ tsp. salt
½ tsp. leaf oregano, crumbled
¼ tsp. dried basil
¼ tsp. pepper

Separate cauliflower into flowerets; slice larger ones in half. Trim celery and cut, diagonally, into 2-inch slices. Scrape carrots and cut diagonally into 1-inch slices. Peel onion and cut into chunks.

Combine cauliflower, celery, carrots, onion and pimiento in 4-quart glass casserole. In small mixing bowl, combine remaining ingredients; pour over vegetable mixture. Stir well.

Cover and microwave 15 minutes on HIGH (100 percent power), stirring every 5 minutes.

Let stand, covered, until cool, then refrigerate at least 1 hour before serving. Arrange chilled vegetables on platter to serve.

Serves 6.

Here's How

Q. I have a 7-year-old stucco house that appears to be in need of paint for appearance's sake. Beige color was mixed into the stucco before application, and the coloring is uneven.

I have had several estimates from painters. One would spray it with one coat, another would roll it on with one coat, and the third would roll on two coats and apply Thompson's Water Seal to the lower 3 feet.

A fourth said not to paint the stucco because paint seals in moisture, and when it needs restuccoing in about 10 years, the painted stucco would have to be sandblasted.

What is your recommendation? I need to make a decision soon. — D.M.K.

A. If the stucco is in good condition, by all means paint it. Select a good-quality stucco or masonry paint. There are many quality alkaline-resistant paints, and each has its advantages and disadvantages.

For example, latex paints for

use on masonry surfaces can be used with confidence. They come in a wide variety of colors, are water-thinned and can be applied to a damp surface. Indeed, the surface should be dampened before applying the first coat if you select a water-base paint.

Oil-base stucco and masonry paints are similar to conventional house paints in many respects. Their flat or low-sheen qualities tend to hide surface irregularities and these paints produce good results when concrete and adjacent wood trim are to be painted the same color.

An application of Thompson's Water Seal on the lower 3 feet after painting will help protect the finish from moisture from such sources as watering the lawn or rain. This is a good idea.

If the stucco is in good condition, I can see no reason for you to consider restuccoing. Stucco surfaces maintained properly and painted periodically should last for years.

The foundation should be painted

ed to match the beige of the new siding, as you do not want this to stand out.

Q. The fiberglass shower pan in our 5-year-old home is becoming increasingly hard to keep clean with dirt streaks appearing only a few days after each cleaning. Apparently the surface of the pan has become worn, enabling the dirt to accumulate easily.

We use a specially designated cleaner for fiberglass, but it still requires scrubbing and does not stay clean long.

Is there any product or technique for resealing the surface? We've inquired about professional refinishing, but discovered it is prohibitively expensive. Any suggestions would be welcome. — G.G.M.

A. Fiberglass can be painted with special paints. Consult your local paint dealer for the type he would recommend.

You may want to consider one of the newer linear polyurethane paints, which are very durable and now are used on boats because of their long-lasting qualities. They are more difficult to apply than regular paint, but will last five years or longer. Paint should help smooth the surface of the worn fiberglass and make cleaning easier.

exactly what to do, and if you follow them exactly, you probably will lose weight because all do involve some form of calorie reduction.

All are promoted as "easy," "foolproof," and above all "quick." All have some new gimmick that's presented as a "scientific discovery." The need for unpleasant things such as exercise, willpower, changing eating behavior is ignored or downplayed. Many include testimonials and "success stories" of people who have lost weight following the diet.

You can lose weight on just about any diet if you take in fewer calories than you use up in your activities. But what you want to do is lose weight in a healthful way and KEEP IT OFF. So don't be misled by the diet profiteers. Ask these questions of any diet plan:

1. Is the diet nutritionally well-balanced? Does it include foods from all the food groups? — Milk and cheese. Meat, fish, poultry, eggs, legumes. Fruits and vegetables. Breads and cereals.

2. Does the diet include a wide variety of foods that you like and normally eat — not just a few foods — so that it will not become monotonous or impossible to follow? Are they foods you can afford and not some high-priced special products?

3. Is the diet really low in calories so you can lose weight on it, but not so low that you will be undernourished or hungry all the time?

4. Is the diet lower in calories because of reduction in size of servings and in amount of high-calorie extras — fats, sugars, cream sauces, salad dressings, desserts, candy, fried foods, alcoholic beverages, etc.? (Yes, people with weight problems MUST learn to eat less of these.)

5. Will the diet teach you new, healthful eating habits that you can follow the rest of your life (with some added calories once weight is lost)? Only by doing this will you maintain your weight loss.

In today's world you, as a senior citizen, can test your own eyes regularly, lower your telephone costs, gain more from your Social Security and look forward to a possible new treatment for severe rheumatoid arthritis. For your interest and benefit, here is a briefing.

Testing Your Eyes

You can check your own eyes for macular degeneration — that is, deterioration of the part of the retina that controls the ability to read, drive and see color. Find something with a straight edge such as a door frame or flagpole and stare at one point on that edge for a few seconds. According to *Prevention* magazine, if any of it looks wavy or as if part of what you see is missing, you may have macular degeneration.

The Minnesota Society for the Prevention of Blindness provides this personal test and others, which can be received by sending \$1 to Prevent Blindness, P.O. Box 1528, St. Paul, MN 55101.

If you feel you have reason for concern after taking the test, consult with a competent medical professional.



Points on Pets

Kennel cough is a common complaint

Q. We left our dog at a local dog and cat boarding kennel recently when we went on vacation. Our dog now has an intermittent cough and some discharge from her nose.

The kennel operators told us that this is very common and that we should not worry about it. Should we take our dog to our veterinarian? We do not want to be overly anxious, but we do want to do what is best.

A. The coughing syndrome you describe constitutes one of the most frequent complaints registered against boarding kennels for dogs and cats. The disease is commonly called "kennel cough" or "canine cough," because dogs often contract the disease while boarding at a kennel.

At many kennels, boarders often are exposed to other dogs carrying the disease or to contaminated premises. Because kennel cough is highly contagious and readily spread among dogs, it can be picked up at even the cleanest kennels. Kennels are to blame for the disease only inasmuch as they force many dogs to live in close quarters with each other.

Dogs with kennel cough usually are bright, alert, eat well and do not have a fever. They have a dry hacking cough or bouts of deep, harsh coughing often followed by gagging. Foamy mucus is often produced by the gagging.

Coughing usually can be precipi-

tated in dogs with kennel cough by applying external digital pressure to the trachea or larynx.

Many viruses and bacteria have been associated with the disease. The parainfluenza virus and the canine adenovirus 2 have been implicated in many cases. Vaccines are available for both of the viruses and studies in boarding kennels have demonstrated that vaccinated dogs are far less likely to catch kennel cough.

Many cases do not require treatment, with the cough usually subsiding within about two weeks. However, many veterinarians recommend antibiotics to prevent secondary bacterial infection of the upper respiratory tract during the convalescent period.

Children's cough suppressants are often helpful if the cough is overly frequent and tires your dog. It must be remembered that coughing is a protective mechanism designed to clear secretions from the larynx and air passages, so coughing should not be unduly suppressed.

Dogs with kennel cough should not be further stressed. They should be allowed to rest and be kept in a comfortable environment. They should be quarantined from other dogs to prevent exposing them.

Although annoying, kennel cough is not usually very serious. Fear of the disease should not keep you from boarding your dog.


