Results Of Plainview 10K Long Island Run

Kevin Boyle of Wantagh took the lead in the first mile and was never headed, as he captured the 9th annual Plainview 10 Kilometer Long Island Championship Run on April 5 in 32:36. It was a repeat performance by Boyle, who had also won the 1984 edition of the Run.

Islip speedster Marilyn Milligan shattered the women's record in winning the women's division of the Run in 35:49, the fastest 10K time recorded by a woman on Long Island so far this year.

The Witold's Runners Team captured the men's team title, and the Plainview/Old Bethpage Road Runners Club "Fast Feet" team won the women's team trophy.

Perhaps the most impressive performances of the day were by Bethpage's Jeanne Ofenloch, who took the first place trophy in the women's 55 to 59 age group in 42:46, more than 12 full minutes ahead of her nearest rival, and by Ted Haiman of Witold's Runners, who took first place honors in the 40 to 44 age group and fourth place overall with a time of 32:53.

More than 800 runners finished the Run, which was sponsored by the Plainview/Old Bethpage Road Runners Club and David Lerner Associates. Technical expertise was provided by David Katz of Empire Time Promotions.

All proceeds of the Run went to the Memorial Sloan Kettering Hospital for Special Surgery Children's Prosthesis and Rehabilitation Foundation, a special program established for the rehabilitation of young people who have had legs amputated as a result of bone cancer. The program is headed by Paddy Rossbach, herself an amputee who has overcome her disability to become an accomplished athlete. Paddy was one of several amputee competitors who successfully completed this year's Plainview Run.

The Town of Oyster Bay was a prominent part of the ceremonies opening the U.S. Army Intelligence Corridor Exhibit in the Pentagon Building, this past Monday. On hand as special guests of Lieutenant General Sidney T. Weinstein, the Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence, were Town of Oyster Bay Historian Dorothy Horton McGee and members of the TOBAY Bicentennial and Historical Commission of which she is chairman.

The newest of many colorful exhibit areas in the Pentagon Building, the Army Intelligence Corridor, was dedicated and unveiled with appropriate ceremonies. The exhibit depicts the activities of intelligence services in the wars of America, from the Colonial Period to the present and projects its employment into the future.

A pre-dedication concert by the United States Army Band (Perishing's Own) was a prelude to dedicatory remarks by the Secretary of War, John O. Marsh, Jr., by Army Chief of Staff, General John A. Wickham, Jr. and Colonel (Dr.) Jerome Haggerty, Intelligence Historian. A tour of the exhibit corridor and a reception for guests followed. Members of the Town of Oyster Bay Bicentennial and Historical Commission present with Miss McGee were: Richard Evers, Historian of the Gregory Museum and Americanism Chairman, Charles Wagner Post 421 of the American Legion, Jack Sumroy of Muttontown and John H. Meyer,

Trustee of the Massapequa Historical Society and their wives. Town Liaison to the Commission, Kevin Comolugic, was also part of the Oyster Bay party.

Town Historian Dorothy McGee, a distinguished local historian, received the special thanks and appreciation of the military leaders for her authoritative cooperation in providing source information pertaining to the long un-revealed and vital Townsend - Woodhull spy ring which served General Washington so well during the American Revolution.

Miss McGee's historical novel, "Sally Townsend, Patriot", first published in 1952, makes a strong case for the critical role of the teenage daughter of Samuel Townsend whose family owned today's historic landmark, Raynham Hall in Oyster Bay. Young Sally Townsend was highly instrumental in providing her undercover agent-brother, Robert with information which uncovered and frustrated the British Major John Andre - Benedict Arnold plot to surrender the fortifications at West Point to the British Army. It was another occasion in which the Oyster Bay Bicentennial-Historical Commission and its Chairlady were able to prominently focus attention on Oyster Bay and Long Island's historical contributions to the Nation.





Apples don't fall far from the tree

By Willard Abraham, Ph.D.

Q. Maybe this is what I should call a "non-problem," but I'll try it out on you anyway. Is it possible for a child to be too clean and orderly?

Our 11-year-old boy strikes me as bending over in that direction. He always washes his hands before dinner, takes a shower without being pressured, keeps his room and clothes in spick-and-span condition, picks up his stuff, has a neat desk, and gets all his schoolwork in on time. His teachers have told me that he acts that way in school, too.

Until recently I just took all of this for granted, but my sister brought it to my attention. She has three really messy kids and always seems to be picking up after them. Frankly, I'd rather have mine the way he is, but I began to wonder whether I have a problem and should do something about it.

By the way, my husband is pretty much the same way as our son, and he is a joy to live with because of his good habits (and for other reasons too).

A. An old line, sometimes true, is that "apples don't fall far from the tree." It sounds as though your son has inherited some traits that your husband has. Let's hope his future wife is as appreciative as you are.

Extremely compulsive behavior may be worth talking over with a school counselor or a child psychologist, but if your youngster limits his orderliness to the kind of examples you have given, there doesn't seem to be a problem.

Your sister's comments appear to reflect at least a little dissatisfaction with her own children, and perhaps a bit of envy of your situation.

Q. My husband brought home a computer a few months ago, and for a short while it was exciting to have it. Our children loved the games, but that didn't last long. Since then it has just been gathering dust.

Because it cost a lot of money out of our limited budget, this situation bothers me.

Any suggestions?

A. A visit to the place where it was bought might be in order, with questions like these: What other capabilities does the equipment have? How about some uses for you and your husband, as well as for the youngsters? If it serves few purposes beyond the game involvement, what possibilities are there for an inexpensive trade-in that can broaden the family participation?

A few concrete, practical answers may help you get more satisfaction from the investment.

Q. Many times I've heard how important it is for parents to stimulate creativity among their children, especially when the kids are young. I always agreed with that idea — until now.

Our 4-year-old loves the crayons we gave him, but I didn't anticipate that he would use the wall for them! Our home is a mess, and I don't know how to get out of this situation.

A. Washable crayons and large sheets of paper may help out. So might substitute creative activities suggested by his preschool teacher, ones that would relate to what goes on there.

If he doesn't go to a preschool, how about seeking one that has a competent staff, excellent program and good facilities, and that you can afford. Then, through a parent-preschool partnership you may be able to start a creativity program at home with which you can live comfortably.

Widow eligible for benefits at 60

Q. I am a recent widow, 58 years of age. My husband and I were married for 32 years before his death. He worked and paid into Social Security up until he died.

I have worked sporadically over the years and I feel I am disabled at the present time. Am I eligible for disability or widow benefits on my spouse's Social Security? — M.W.

A. You will be eligible for widow benefits on your deceased husband's record at age 60. You may be eligible for disabled widow benefits, which can be paid as early as age 50, if you have a medically determined physical or mental impairment that is expected to result in death or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months, and is deemed to be so severe as to prevent you from being able to engage in any gainful activity.

Consult your local Social Security Office for further details.

Q. I will be 65 in September 1986. I have earned 16 quarters of coverage under Social Security. Will I be eligible for monthly Social Security benefits? If not, what

happens to the money I paid into Social Security? — A.P.

A. A person attaining age 65 in 1986 needs 35 quarters of coverage.

The taxes you paid remain in the trust fund. No refund is made because the contributions of all are used to contribute to the security and welfare of those eligible for payment. This reflects a general principle in taxation that the tax is applied to all in the taxable group even though certain individuals may not directly benefit, e.g., a school tax.

Q. What determines how much your Supplemental Security Income check is? I have a friend who just moved from out of state and receives a considerably different amount than he had been receiving. — I.J.

A. The SSI program provides a national minimum benefit amount that is standard in all states. Amounts paid can vary according to other income received (e.g., earnings and Social Security) and the living arrangements of the recipient (e.g., residence in one's own home or household of another or in an institution).

The maximum federal benefit amount is currently \$336 per month for an individual and \$504 per month for a couple. States may choose to supplement the federal payment.

Q. My husband was married to his first wife for 20 years. She was employed over the years as a teacher. After his divorce we were married in 1971. His ex-wife remarried and I think has divorced her second husband.

Does she have any claim on my husband's Social Security in the event of his death? Will I be entitled? — T.C.

A. It is possible that your husband's former wife might be eligible for benefits on his record in the event of his death. However, whether she is entitled or not does not affect your entitlement.

Q. I am a native-born U.S. citizen and have worked all my life in the United States. I will be age 65 next October and currently am receiving Social Security benefits.

My wife, who is a Mexican citizen and lives in Mexico, will be 62 next November. Can she draw a check in Mexico? — F.G.P.

A. While out of the country, your wife must meet a special residency requirement to receive benefits as a spouse. Because she is not a U.S. citizen, she must have lived in the United States for at least five years.



We are living in a dangerous world and to use weapons to prove a point is not the solution. Major wars have been ignited by single military incidents. Reagan and Khadafy should prove their macho images in private. The only thing the U.S. has done was to bring worldwide attention to a madman who is enjoying every minute of it. **A.M.**

NO SENSE

While we legally had the right to enter the Gulf of Sidra it just didn't make any sense to waste all that manpower and expense just to taunt Col. Khadafy. Besides sinking a couple of his patrol boats, all that was accomplished was to stir up another crazy Palestinian terrorist in placing a bomb aboard an American airliner, killing four innocent people. Had the Congress been consulted in advance, it would have achieved the level of a declaration of war and placed Khadafy on the alert to create for the issue a facade of innocence and a stigma of injury and unfairness putting the U.S.A. in an untenable position - an almost defenseless situation vis-a-vis our allies particularly in the Eastern Hemisphere whether or not they harbored any fondness for Khadafy. My own feelings are that the majority of the nations contiguous to or economically tied to Libya - their public utterances to the contrary - were not at all unhappy with this bit of military theatre in the Mediterranean. The Number Three In Superstition And Religion

"Trouble comes in threes" is an old axiom in many countries of the world. Many of us believe this adage because if we hear about a tragedy somewhere our minds start looking for other events of similar nature. Sometimes we find them and sometimes we don't, but we will remember the coincidences and forget the others.

Human beings are a superstitious lot. For instance, how many of us will refuse to walk under a ladder, knock on wood, read astrology columns in newspapers, throw rice at weddings, bet on "lucky" numbers in lotteries, etc.

The numbers three and seven are especially popular for most of us. Indeed, as an experiment you might ask a friend to pick a number between one and five. The odds are great that he will choose three. And if you ask him to choose between five and ten--it will likely be seven.

One reason for this, according to psychologists, is that we humans like the middle position of a series. Thus, if you ask your friend again to choose between 50 and 60, the chances are good that he will say 55. Try it at a party sometime and people will think that you are a mind reader.

Experienced lawyers know that judges often choose the middle number too. Thus if the lawyer asks for \$10 million in a Hollywood type divorce case, the judge and jury will probably award the plaintiff \$5 million. Many a show girl has gotten rich overnight using this principle.

The ancient Greek philosophers studied the meaning of life and the relationship between things to one another. Heraclitus (504 BC) taught his followers, for example, that "the conflict of opposites becomes the supreme principle of the world."

Further, he said, "opposition brings concord. Out of discord comes the fairest harmony. It is by disease that health is pleasant; by evil that good is pleasant; by hunger, satiety; by weariness, rest."

Socrates (469 BC) and his pupil Plato (427 BC) believed that life is made up of opposites, such as hot-cold; white-black; high-low; great-small; increase-reduction; good-evil; justice-injustice; love-hate; wisdom-folly; pleasure-pain; virtue-baseness; soul-body; wetness-dryness; life-death, etc.

But it was another famous philosopher, Pythagoras (530 BC) who devoted his school to the belief that "all things are numbers." He maintained that "the whole heavens formed a musical scale and number" and even such things as reason, justice, and marriage were identified with distinct numbers.

His more famous discoveries were in mathematics--i.e. the Pythagorean Theorem (in a right triangle the sum of the squares of the legs is equal to the square of the hypotenuse) and in astronomy (the universe is spherical in shape and finite in size).

More modern philosophers like Hegel (1770 A.D.) taught that there were not just two but three forces in the world. The third being the middle ground between the extremes. That is not hot and cold but hot, warm and cold; not large or small, but large, medium and small; not black and white, but black, grey and white, etc.

An important feature of this philosophy is the male-female principle.

A typical family begins when a young man (male) asks a young woman (female) to marry him. In due course they have children who might be considered sexually neutral until they reach puberty or go off and start their own families.

In the physical world there is the important principle of positive and negative electricity. But we know from experience that not every piece of steel we pick up is polarized--most of it is non-polarized or neutral.

Then there are three states of matter--solid, liquid and gaseous; the three modes of heat transfer--convection, conduction and radiation; the three parts of the visible world--earth, sea, and sky which in turn are inhabited by animals that walk, swim or fly.

Lastly, there is man himself. And according to the Bible, he is made up of body, mind and spirit. The Bible also says that man's soul separates him from body at the time of death and goes to either heaven, purgatory or hell.

The three major religions of the world--Christianity, Judaism and Islam are in substantial agreement on this latter point. However, they seem to part company on the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. This is the central mystery of the Christian faith but Jews and Muslims do not put much stock in it. The reason is that the Holy Trinity is proclaimed only in the New Testament which they do not accept as Divinely Inspired.

In essence Christians believe that God being numerically and individually one, exists in three Persons distinct from each other, and yet each really identical with the same Divine Nature. The Father is unbegotten, the Son, begotten, and the Holy Ghost proceeds from the Father and the Son as from one principle. Each Person is really distinct from the other, each is the true, eternal God, and yet there is only one God. This is the mystery of the Trinity. (The Holy Bible-Dictionary, copyright 1956, The Catholic Press, Inc., Chicago.)

The majority of Christians whether Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox or Protestant, recite this belief when they say the Nicene Creed adopted by the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D.

While Christians cannot say exactly what the Holy Trinity is, they do tell what it is like. One thought is that the Trinity is like a family with the father as the head, the Son, in the role of wife-partner, and the Holy Spirit in the role of child.

Moreover, some say, if the world were a family owned business like a grocery store you could say that God the Father, started it and manages it; God the Son, operates it, and God, the Holy Ghost, it and runs errands.

Finally, the Bible says that "God created man to his own image" (Genesis 1:27) is it not possible that He also created the world in the image of the Holy Trinity?

Q. What do you do if you think you've been invited to a restaurant, so you don't bring any money and then you're suddenly confronted with having to pay half the bill?

A. You must pay your share of the bill in this circumstance. It happens often in our lives, simply because we don't pay enough attention to communicating and preplanning our engagements. We should all be specific about when, where, and who pays, when dates and arrangements are jointly made.

If you're in a restaurant with no money in a situation like this, go to the captain and tell him your plight and that you will send the money tomorrow by messenger. If you show identification and if you sign a receipt for money owed, you might be able to arrange for payment of your share tomorrow. Otherwise you are going to have to borrow money from your friends at the table. It is embarrassing, but come up with a logical excuse for not having money or credit card.

Q. Is it proper to tip soup or dessert dishes? And when is soup eaten with a spoon? I sometimes see people drinking bouillon, etc. directly from a cup. Is this correct?

A. The tipping of a soup or dessert dish is acceptable if the plate is wiped away from the spoon, not toward the eater. Soup or bouillon served in a handled cup or (Oriental fashion) small, cup sized bowl may be drunk. If there are vegetables or other garnish floating on top, these may be lifted off with the spoon before the soup is drunk. Needles or other things which may be in the bottom of the cup are spooned up after the liquid has been drunk.



READER RATINGS

Q. I've notice many restaurants are now doing away with white tablecloths in favor of colored cloths of beige, light pink, peach or light gold. What do you think of this trend?

A. I happen to like it. I find tablecloths of a soft light color are easy on the eyes and add to the relaxing atmosphere. But this is just a personal opinion. Of course, white cloths are always correct and probably will continue to be preferred in more formal restaurants.

Q. Not long ago I ate in one of the most expensive restaurants on Long Island. Everything was beautifully cooked and served, but ketchup was placed on the table in the original Heinz bottle. I was appalled!

A. Perhaps the restaurant was afraid diners would not recognize the ketchup if it was placed in anything except the familiar bottle. I agree, though, that a Heinz bottle was out of place in the setting you describe. A small crystal dish, with a word of explanation from the waiter, would have been more appropriate.

Q. What are the rules of etiquette for eating cakes or confections?
A. Large pieces of cake should be eaten with a fork, and so should large or small cakes that are sticky or messy. Tiny cakes served in a paper frill may be picked up by the fingers and eaten the same way as chocolates or bonbons.

Q. The term "smorgasbord" has been around a long time and everyone knows it means buffet. But I would like to know the derivation of this word.

A. Smorgasbord comes from the Swedish and it can be translated simply as "sandwich table".

Variety breads a novel base for French toast

Ah-h-h, French toast — It's an all-American breakfast treat that can be prepared in minutes and pleases eaters of all ages. And its delicately crunchy crust and sweet, soft interior have a way of unlocking memories of family get-togethers around the kitchen table.

"Pass the syrup."
"Do you want some sliced strawberries on your plate?"
"Mom, is the next batch ready yet?"

Chances are, the remembered French toast had a base of white sandwich bread, which came straight from a plastic bag and was pumped with preservatives. Perhaps the stub end of a loaf of sourdough bread was used occasionally, but that was the extent of morning experimenting.

But who says French toast need be made with white sandwich bread and served with maple syrup?

Why not dip an English muffin in the milk-egg-sugar liquid and then saute that in the classic style of French toast? Then whirl a few strawberries (fresh or frozen) in a blender, pour the puree over the steamy muffin and top the delicious fare with a mound of sliced berries.

Or consider slicing some slightly stale blueberry muffins in half-inch-thick rounds, preparing them in the French toast manner, spooning fresh blueberries atop the muffins, maybe pouring a puree of raspberries over the top, and, *voila!* Blueberry Muffins à la Française.

And there is no reason to keep the French toast concept sweet. For instance, soak slices of dill-rye bread in the milk-egg mixture, eliminating the sugar and perhaps including grated Parmesan cheese. After sauteing the bread, top it with sizzling sausage meat and stir-fried pepper slices for a delightful and unusual breakfast dish.

To get started, here are some recipes for Basic French Toast and a few variations on the theme. For those who love to bake, recipes are included for creating some breadstuffs useful as bases for creative French toast ideas.

And the mix and match chart below can help launch new concepts for the breakfast plate.

BASIC FRENCH TOAST

- 4 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 2 tps. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla (optional)
- ¼ tsp. ground nutmeg (optional)
- 8 slices day-old bread or other bread product
- Butter or margarine

In bowl, beat together eggs, milk, sugar, vanilla (if used) and nutmeg (if used). Place bread slices on rimmed baking sheet. Pour egg mixture over bread and let stand a few minutes. Turn slices over and let stand until all egg mixture is absorbed. Melt butter on griddle or in frying pan over medium heat. Add a few bread slices at a time and cook until browned; turn and brown other side. Place cooked toast on serving plate and keep warm in a 150 F oven. (If oven is preheated to 150 F, then turned off, it will retain enough heat to keep toast warm without overbaking.) Re-

Makes 4 servings of 2 slices each.

FREEZER FRENCH TOAST

Prepare French Toast, but once egg mixture is absorbed by bread slices, freeze them on baking sheet, uncovered, until firm, then package airtight and return to freezer. To serve, place desired number of frozen slices on lightly greased baking sheet. Brush each slice with melted butter. Bake in preheated 500 F oven for 5 minutes. Turn slices over, brush with melted butter, and bake for 5 more minutes or until nicely browned.

French toast recipes from *Sunset's "Easy Basics for Good Cooking"*.

THE BEST BANANA BREAD

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- ¼ tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. soda
- ½ tsp. salt
- 2 tps. shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg
- 2 tps. sour milk
- 1½ cups mashed, ripe bananas (2-3 medium-size bananas)
- ½ tsp. vanilla
- ¼ cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease 9x5-inch bread pan, line with waxed paper and grease again.

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt; set aside. In large mixer bowl, cream shortening and sugar. Add egg and beat well. Add milk, mashed bananas and vanilla. Mix in dry ingredients. Beat at low speed just until mixture is smooth. Stir in nuts.

Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake at 350 F for about 1 hour or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Let bread stand 5 to 10 minutes before removing from pan. Bread will slice easier the second day.

Note: To make sour milk, add a few drops of vinegar to milk and

allow to stand a few minutes.

This English Muffin recipe calls for part whole wheat or graham flour, which makes for a tastier and more wholesome muffin. If you prefer the traditional white, simply substitute white flour for the whole wheat.

For French toast, some may prefer to pre-toast the split muffins (they should be pried apart, not cut with a knife) and then proceed with dipping them in the milk-egg mixture, thus retaining the look of toasted English Muffins.

ENGLISH MUFFINS

- 1 tps. active dry yeast
- 1 tps. sugar
- 1½ cups warm water
- 3 tps. non-fat dry milk
- 1 tps. coarse salt or 2 tps. table salt
- 1 cup whole wheat or graham flour
- 1¾-2 cups white flour, preferably unbleached
- ¼ tsp. baking soda dissolved in 2 tps. warm water

In medium-size mixing bowl, dissolve yeast and sugar in ¼ cup water. Stir dry milk and salt into remaining cup of water and combine with yeast. Add whole wheat flour and 1¾ cups of white flour and beat, either by hand or with electric mixer, for several minutes. Dough should be like thick pancake batter but more gummy, and should just begin to leave sides of bowl. Add a little more white flour if needed to reach this consistency. Then cover bowl with plastic wrap and set in warm place for 1¼-1½ hours or until double in bulk.

Now uncover bowl and beat in dissolved baking soda thoroughly. Let dough rest, covered, while preparing baking setup.

Thoroughly grease inside of rings (cleaned, emptied 6½-ounce tuna fish or cat food cans with top and bottom lids removed) with shortening or butter. Heat 1 or 2 large heavy skillet until almost smoking, then brush with shortening, or oil and set rings inside (large skillet should hold 4). Lower heat and ladle about ¼ cup of dough into each ring. Dough will still be very elastic — more like chewing gum or Silly Putty. You may have to chop off your ladleful from bowl with knife. Try to even out each portion of dough by poking with finger so that it fills whole ring. Bake over low heat 5 minutes, occasionally moving each ring a little once dough has set. Top surface should now have lost moist look; lift ring off and turn each muffin over to bake on other side 5 minutes. Repeat this procedure, greasing rings and skillet again, until all dough is used.

Cool muffins on racks, and store in plastic wrap until ready to eat. Then tear apart and toast, either in toaster or under broiler. Makes 12 muffins.

Note: For about 35 cents a dozen, this recipe makes English muffins that would cost close to \$2 in the supermarket.

CHOCOLATE NUT BREAD

- 3 ozs. (3 squares) unsweetened chocolate

- 8 tps. (1 stick or ¼ cup) butter, softened
- 3 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- ¼ tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 2 tps. vanilla extract
- ¼ cup chopped nuts

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease and flour two 8½x4½x2½-inch loaf pans. Melt chocolate and butter together in small pan over low heat; set aside to cool.

Stir and toss together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Place sugar, eggs, milk, vanilla and nuts in large mixing bowl and beat together until blended. Add combined dry ingredients and chocolate mixture and beat until batter is smooth.

Divide batter evenly between prepared pans and bake about 45 minutes, or until broom straw inserted in center of loaf comes out clean. Remove from oven, let cool in pans about 5 minutes, then turn out onto rack to cool completely.

CRANBERRY BREAD

- 3 cups flour
- 1 tps. baking powder
- 1½ tps. baking soda
- 1½ tps. salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups whole cranberry sauce, fresh or canned
- ¼ cup milk
- ¼ cup vegetable shortening, melted
- ¼ cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease and flour two 8½x4½x2½-inch loaf pans.

Stir and toss together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Place eggs, sugar, cranberry sauce, milk, shortening and walnuts in large mixing bowl and mix well. Add combined dry ingredients and beat just until batter is smooth.

Divide batter evenly between prepared pans and bake about 50 to 55 minutes, or until broom straw or skewer inserted in center of loaf comes out clean. Remove from oven, let cool in pans about 5 minutes, then turn out onto a rack to cool completely.

Chef Leonard Schwartz of 72 Market Street restaurant in Venice, Calif., created this French toast variation.

SOUFFLE TOAST 72

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup half-and-half
- 1 tps. sugar
- ¼ tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tps. Cointreau
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 4 slices day-old thick-cut egg bread
- 1 tsp. sweet butter

Preheat oven to 400 F. Beat eggs with cinnamon and sugar to form paste. Whisk in vanilla, half and half, Cointreau. Trim slices of

egg bread, then cut in half and place in dish. Pour egg mixture over bread. Soak 2 hours (at least) so bread absorbs as much of mixture as possible.

Heat saucepan. Place sweet butter in pan, followed by bread. Brown bread on one side, turn over and place in oven uncovered. Bake 10 minutes, until bread puffs up like a soufflé.

Remove from pan, sprinkle with powdered sugar and garnish with sliced fresh fruit. Serve with warm maple syrup.

The taste of whole wheat and a drizzle of honey make a wonderful full-flavored bread. Try as small dinner rolls, as well as a perfect breakfast or sandwich loaf.

PANE INTEGRALE CON MIELE

(Whole Wheat with Honey)
Starter (optional)
¼ tsp. active dry yeast
½ cup warm water
1½ cups (200 grams) unbleached all-purpose flour

Stir yeast into water in medium-size mixing bowl; let stand until creamy, about 10 minutes. Stir in flour with 70 to 100 strokes of wooden spoon. Let rise covered 6 to 24 hours. Measure ¼ cup (50 grams) for this recipe.

Dough:

1¼ tps. active dry yeast or
½ small cake (12 grams)
fresh yeast
1 tbsp. plus 2 tps. honey
1½ cups warm water
3¼ cups (500 grams) whole wheat flour
1½ tps. (8 grams) salt

By hand: Stir yeast and honey into ¼ cup of water in a large mixing bowl; let stand until foamy, about 10 minutes. Chop starter into small pieces and add to dissolved yeast. Pour in re-

maining 1¼ cups water and squeeze starter between fingers until starter is in little shreds and water is chalky. Mix flour and salt and stir 1 cup at a time into yeast mixture. Stir until dough comes together. Knead on floured surface, sprinkling with additional whole wheat flour, until dough is fairly smooth and has lost most of its stickiness, about 8 to 10 minutes.

By mixer: Stir yeast and honey into water in mixer bowl; let stand until foamy, about 10 minutes. Chop starter into small pieces and add to dissolved yeast. Stir with paddle until starter is in little shreds. Add flour and salt and mix until dough comes together. Change to dough hook and knead 2 minutes at low speed and 2 minutes at medium speed. Dough should be fairly smooth and have lost most of its stickiness. Finish kneading briefly by hand on floured surface, if you want.

First Rise: Place dough in oiled bowl, cover tightly with plastic wrap, and let rise until doubled, about 2 hours.

Shaping and Second Rise: Turn dough out onto well-floured surface and shape into round loaf without punching dough down. Place loaf on lightly oiled baking sheet or peel sprinkled with cornmeal. Cover with waxed paper or towel or lightly oil top and cover with plastic wrap. Let rise until doubled, 45 minutes to 1 hour.

Baking: Heat oven to 450 F. If using baking stone, turn oven on 30 minutes before baking and sprinkle stone with cornmeal just before sliding loaf onto it. Bake 10 minutes, spraying 3 times with water. Reduce heat to 400 F and bake 25 minutes longer. Cool completely on a rack.

Makes 1 round loaf.

½ cup sour cream
½ cup mayonnaise
1 tbsp. fresh chopped parsley
1 tbsp. minced onion
1 tsp. dill weed, dried (or 1 tsp. fresh)
1 tsp. Beau Monde seasoning

Combine all ingredients and blend well. Refrigerate. This dip has an even better flavor the day after it is made.

SPINACH DIP

1 (10 oz.) pkg. raw spinach
½ cup sour cream
¼ cup mayonnaise
¼ cup minced fresh parsley
¼ cup finely chopped scallions
1 small clove garlic, finely minced
¼ tsp. pepper
¼ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. celery salt
Small pinch nutmeg

Remove stems from spinach and wash it. While spinach is still

wet, place it in saucepan and steam it over medium-high heat until it wilts. Remove and drain in colander, then squeeze out remaining moisture by wrapping spinach in paper towels.

Chop spinach finely, combine it with remaining ingredients and chill.

Makes about 1½ cups.
GUACAMOLE

2 ripe avocados
¼ medium onion, minced
3-4 cherry tomatoes, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
Salt and pepper to taste
1 pinch hot red pepper (or more to taste)
1 tsp. fresh lemon juice
1 tsp. olive oil

Scoop flesh from avocados and mash with fork until nearly smooth in texture. Whisk in remaining ingredients and refrigerate at least 1 hour before serving.

Microwave with wine

As early as 10,000 years ago, the humble grape was being transformed into that favorite of all libations, wine. Poets have sung its praises throughout the ages, and Plato wasn't far wrong when he claimed, "Nothing more excellent or valuable than wine was ever granted by the gods to man."

Julius Caesar ordered his soldiers to drink red wine every day to prevent illness — probably one of the few orders his men didn't mind following!

In her book "Stay Healthy With Wine" (Signet Books), Marjorie Michaels recalls that during a six-month period in 1871 at the Elisabeth Hospital in Darmstadt, Germany, "755 patients were treated with 4,633 bottles of white wine, 6,233 bottles of red wine, 60 bottles of champagne and 350 bottles of port wine." Talk about taking the cure! No matter what their various complaints, those patients were feeling no pain.

The lovely liquid, whether red, white or somewhere in between, is as wonderful to cook with as it is to imbibe. It's a wonderful medium for poaching fish, and beef and chicken are always fancier when a splash is added to the recipe.

A nice bonus is that whatever isn't used in the dish you're preparing can be sipped while you cook. Galloping Gourmet-style. (Don't worry — all the best chefs do it!)

COMPANY MEAT BALLS AND GRAVY

1 lb. lean ground beef
¾ cup fine dry bread crumbs
2 eggs
½ cup dry red wine
¼ cup minced onion
3 tps. minced parsley
¼ tsp. dried dill weed
¼ tsp. each salt and pepper
1 tbsp. butter or margarine
1 tbsp. flour
½ tsp. Kitchen Bouquet
¾ cup water

OVEN SETTING: HIGH (100 percent power).

In medium mixing bowl combine beef, bread crumbs, eggs, wine, onion, parsley, dill weed, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and form into 16 meat balls.

Arrange meat balls in 2-quart glass casserole dish. Cover and microwave 6 minutes, rearranging meat balls after 3 minutes. Let stand, covered, while making gravy.

Place butter in small glass dish; microwave 15 to 30 seconds, or until melted. Stir in flour to make smooth paste, then blend in Kitchen Bouquet and water. Pour over meatballs.

Microwave, covered, 6 minutes

longer, stirring after 3 minutes. Let stand, covered, 5 minutes before serving over hot rice or noodles.

CHICKEN BERENICE

1 (3 lb.) chicken, cut into serving pieces
Salt, pepper and paprika
¾ cup dry white wine
¼ cup butter or margarine
3 tps. chopped green onions
½ tsp. dried tarragon leaves
½ cup light cream or half-and-half
1 (8 oz.) can mushroom stems and pieces, drained

Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Arrange chicken pieces in 13x9-inch glass baking dish. Sprinkle lightly with salt, pepper and paprika, then add wine. Cover and let stand at room temperature 1 hour, to marinate, then drain off wine and reserve.

Dot chicken pieces with butter, sprinkle with chopped green onions and tarragon. Cover and microwave 5 minutes.

Rearrange chicken pieces and baste. Replace cover and microwave 5 minutes longer.

Stir together reserved marinade and cream; pour over chicken and add mushrooms. Microwave, uncovered, 5 minutes longer, or until meat is tender and no longer pink near bone. Let stand several minutes before serving.

RUBY WINE CONSOMME

4 cups canned beef broth
1 cup dry red wine
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. lemon juice
¼ tsp. each salt and pepper
Thin slices lemon and fresh parsley sprigs, for garnish

Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Pour broth into 2-quart glass casserole. Heat to boiling, 6 to 8 minutes.

Stir in all remaining ingredients except lemon slices and parsley. Microwave 4 minutes longer.

Serve hot, garnished with lemon slices and parsley.

Here's How

Q I have called several refinishers pertaining to my problem, but no one knows what I am talking about.

The home my 91-year-old mother lives in has southern gumwood all around the living room and dining room. Through 50 years of living there, it has never been cleaned.

I have just moved in and would like to know how and with what I can get the black gummy stuff off and clean it, and then put a good wax on it. — N.N.

A I suggest that you test a small area first to see what kind of results you can get with a cleaner such as 409. It may take several applications to remove the built-up layers of dirt and grime.

If this doesn't work, try liquid sandpaper or naphtha. Again, this may require several applications for complete removal of the dirt. You may find that this process dulls the wood finish and you will need to sand the entire surface and apply a coat of clear satin-finish varnish to bring out the natural luster of the wood.

After refinishing, Liquid Gold is a good product to use to maintain the finish of natural wood and protect the surface.

If you can't restore the wood to a suitable color, you might consider painting the surface after it has been thoroughly cleaned.

Q Our 10-year-old split-level home has several water leaks. Some water comes through the ceiling, some through the top of the windows and some through the bottom edges of a sliding glass door. The roof is of the flat-top variety.

Where might I locate a "leak specialist" who does not have a vested interest in selling us a new roof or new windows but one who can pinpoint our "leak" problem? — V.M.L.

A For the ceiling leaks and roof problems, I suggest you check with a roofing contractor. Estimates are usually free, and these professionals should be able to tell you if your roof is repairable or whether a new roof is required. Check with at least three different

contractors for estimates and opinions. Also check references. Ask for names of previous clients who can vouch for work performed in the past.

Regarding the leaks around the windows and sliding glass door, check the Yellow Pages for a caulking contractor. Many of these contractors will not do residential or single-family jobs. However, you may find one that will do smaller residential work. Again, get an opinion and price quote before proceeding. Your windows and door should not have to be replaced.

Unfortunately, much of this type of work is perfect for a good handyman, which is the most difficult type of work to hire done. If you have friends or neighbors who have had a good experience with a local maintenance person and can recommend someone, you might consider this for your caulking repair problems.

I would stick to a roofing expert to analyze and correct the roof problem.

start with the you, the individual, and your concern for your own health, your own body, your own future life.

What can you do? Try these suggestions:

- Go to the library to get a good book on nutrition — one that stresses the four basic food groups, reduced intake of fats, cholesterol, caffeine and drugs. Reject any book that claims to be the "miracle" solution or uses diet approaches that reject the four basic food groups.

- Develop menu solutions that meet these recommendations so that your proper nutrition can be all the more pleasurable.

- Ask your doctor for his recommendations on positive health through nutrition and exercise. If he doesn't have good answers, find another doctor who will.

- If you are taking medication or a combination of medications, ask your pharmacist to brief you on the toxic effect of those medications, any possible complications in the combination, the side effects of the medications used. Medications, while causing an effect in one direction, actually create an imbalance in another area of the body. In terms of physics, for every action there is a reaction — and so it is in drugs and medications. Not all reactions are serious or endangering, but you should be aware of what they are so you can identify the symptoms if they are significant.

- Ask the question: "Is this surgery or procedure necessary?" Many surgical procedures performed over the past 10 years in the United States were absolutely unnecessary. The costs were borne, in the main, by taxpayers and insurance companies — and both look to you to fund them, as citizens or policy premium payers. If surgery is recommended by your doctor, take the time and invest the money to get a second opinion — doctors do make mistakes, and it is your body.

- Write your congressional representative, stating that you want a new, positive and preventive health concept in research and Medicare.

Dr. Wallace: Please print my letter. I want all teens to hear my story. Maybe it will help them.

When I was 14 I left my friends because I felt they were not cool enough. I wanted to be popular so I joined a club (some call it a gang). Soon I was talking and dressing just like all the other club members and I did all the stupid things they told me to do.

It didn't take long for my grades to suffer. My parents did all they could to encourage me to do better in school, but I just didn't care. I was more interested in getting high and being in gang fights.

Then one day I came to school and a "club" member told me that one of our members had been shot and was in the hospital. A week later I went to his funeral. That very day I realized that my old friends and parents were right.

The gang members were really not friends. They were only using me.

As I write this, I will graduate in a few months and have great plans for my future. If I hadn't changed my ways, I might not have had a future. I might not have had a life. — Jose

Dr. Wallace: I am a reasonably intelligent 16-year-old, but I don't know what my IQ (intelligence quotient) is.

Do you know where I can take an IQ test? — Tom, Ontario, Calif.

Tom: Chances are that you already have taken an IQ test somewhere in your educational background.

Have a chat with your counselor and ask to have that information (it is not a secret) given to you. If, for some reason that doesn't get the job done, have Mom ask the counselor to see your cumulative records which have your IQ score recorded.

It's possible your counselor can have you retested. Ask!

Dr. Wallace: Why don't you tell your teen readers the benefits of real birth controls and how to use them instead of advocating that abstinence is the best form? You really are not doing us a favor. — Karen

Karen: My prime concern is indeed to encourage teens to abstain from premarital sex. To expound on the "benefits" of "real" birth controls would send a message that premarital sex is OK or that abstinence is an unattainable goal.

Dr. Wallace: I work part time in a fast-food restaurant and I observed something very strange. More girls than boys who frequent the establishment seem to smoke. I realize that women's lib is the "in" thing but this is overdoing it. — Kevin

Kevin: You are very observant. According to the American Lung Association, for the first time, more teenage girls than boys are smoking. It's the first time in American history that more females than males in any age category are smokers. The association said there are 1.7 million teenage girls who smoke (12.7 percent) compared to 1.6 million boys (10.7 percent). The increase in female smokers has had its effect. The incidence of lung cancer among women has increased over 500 percent since 1950.

Dr. Wallace: A buddy and I plan to travel through Europe this summer. We understand the best way to travel is by train. Do you know if it is possible for us (we are in college) to buy a student rail pass and, if so, where can we get one? We plan to be gone about one month. — Jerry

Mainly for Seniors

Twenty years ago, then-Gov. Walter J. Hickel of Alaska raised questions about health care, introducing concepts that were pooh-poohed by politicians and many so-called medical experts.

Why can't we concentrate on keeping people healthy rather than just focusing our research and development on surgery aimed at repairing or removing diseased organs. We need preventive medicine in this country," he said.

Hickel had set his own regimen of diet and exercise and maintained it positively for years, gaining a reputation for his inexhaustible energy, imagination and accomplishment.

"Why do we have 'drugstores' Why don't we, instead, call them and direct them to be 'health stores'?"

The concept was positive and simple, keep people healthy naturally, through diet and exercise.

"Keep the body moving," the governor would tell me, "and give it the kind of fuel — nutrition — that it needs to function as it should."

As a consultant to the governor, I was given the challenge of finding support for the position, so that perhaps we could develop in the 49th state a real model for the nation.

First, the federal government would not listen. Research funds were determined, and their direction did not allow positive research into nutrition as a way to keep the body working best and to

avoid illnesses before they occur. The body, we reasoned, functioned because of what each of us puts into it and how each of us uses it. If we were not feeding or exercising the body properly to keep it functioning best, was there not a cause-and-effect relationship in actually creating illness or other problems? Our pleading fell, in the main, on deaf ears.

Might the cost be far less if we addressed preventive care by direction and action? The medical establishment lobbied against all funding by Medicare for preventive health care, and caused its specific deletion from the start of the program. And, as those of us who were advocating otherwise projected, the medical costs in this country escalated far ahead of any national inflation. Today's financial solutions in Medicare are to pay less for the same procedures — it makes economic sense and, perhaps, even medical sense for some patients, while being injurious to others.

But what of preventing the illness or problem?

Hickel identified the solution as a "health model" rather than a "medical model," and those terms are used today in debates over the direction for health and medicine in this country.

From this reporter's experience in covering the medical and health subject for years, I cannot project any positive resolution — because of politics — in the foreseeable future.

The answer, therefore, needs to







Eating area needn't scream 'dining room'



DOUBLE DUTY — Multifunctional furnishings double for dining or conversation. White background serves to visually enlarge small apartment.

Q. My husband and I live in a very small apartment. The kitchen is open to the living room and there is no dining room.

We're forced to create some kind of eating area in the living room, but I don't want it to dominate our main living space or take up much room. How can we handle this? — J.D.

A. A multifunctional approach that uses a minimum of furniture, such as the room pictured, gives you an appealing living/eating space that doesn't scream "dining room" at you.

Note first that the room's background is all white — ceiling, walls, floors and window treatments. This serves to visually enlarge the small space.

Next, notice how the upholstered seating that stretches the length of the wall conserves space, unifies the design and does double duty for dining or conversation. The simple narrow pedestal table serves for space-saving, low-profile dining. It can be easily moved crosswise to the kitchen end of the room as a beverage and hors d'oeuvres buffet for a party.

The Mexican armchairs do not look like typical dining chairs and can be moved into alternate conversational groupings. Also observe how the tree planter and ottoman provide a subtle separation between the living and dining areas. The ottoman can even serve as an extra dining seat!

Q. My kids are wrecking my new paint job on their walls with tape and tacks for posters and papers that they seem to change weekly.

A. It looks awful! What can I do? — D.S.

A. How about making them a deal they can't refuse? Tell them you will create one special wall for their poster art and memorabilia if they will keep their grubby hands off your paint job on the other three.

One quick and inexpensive way to create this display wall is to use lightweight foam core board (check your local architectural and graphic arts suppliers).

Pad the core board with a layer

of bonded quilt batting, stretch fabric or a sheet over it, and staple to the back. These lightweight panels can be held in place with a perimeter molding or a few small finish nails.

Now your kids can have an ever-changing array of wall art that always looks fresh because they can use pins and tacks that will not leave noticeable marks in the fabric. And you will now have time to paint the town instead of your kids' walls.

Table classified as Country Sheraton

Q. This dark brown mahogany table is 29 inches high; the top measures 21 by 22 inches.

When was it made? What was it used for? How much would it sell for?



A. This little candle stand would be classified as Country Sheraton and was made in the second quarter of the 19th century.

It should sell for about \$225 to \$275.

Q. The attached mark is on the bottom of my Belleek cup and saucer. It is pale lavender with gilt trim.

Can you tell me when it was made and what it is worth?



A. The cup and saucer were made by Ott & Brewer in Trenton, N.J. The factory was managed by William Bromley Sr., who learned his craft in the original Belleek factory in Ireland.

Your cup and saucer should sell in the \$125 to \$135 range.

Q. Are orange juice reamers really collectible? I see so many at flea markets and antique shows and they are priced so high.

A. I asked the same question a few years back and was severely criticized. We have a glass reamer that has been in the family for about 60 years and I don't know whether to keep it in the kitchen cabinet or in the safe deposit box.

They range in price from \$5 to over \$300. My advice is to stick with the ones marked with the manufacturers' names on them. There are some unmarked valuable ones, but it takes an expert to identify them.

Molting a natural process for birds

By R.G. Elmore, D.V.M.

Q. Our 3-year-old male canary has quit singing and seems to be losing feathers all the time.

A. When do pet birds normally molt? Is it possible the lack of singing and loss of feathers are related? How can we correct these problems?

Shedding of old feathers for new ones, or molting, is a natural process in pet birds. Usually, loss of feathers does not indicate an illness or disease.

During normal molting, birds lose only a few feathers at any given time — bald spots are not noticeable and flight is not impaired.

Most small birds molt for the first time at about 6 months of age, many large birds not until they are a year old. Once molting begins, most birds molt on a fairly regular basis year after year.

Molting usually occurs during late summer or early fall. There is quite a bit of variation in molting patterns among various types of birds. For example, dimorphic birds — those that assume a special plumage during the breeding season — usually molt twice each year. Parrots usually molt over a long period of time.

It is not uncommon for male canaries and other singing finches to quit singing while they are molting. This lack of singing is normal and therefore should not

worry you.

Molting is stressful for most birds. The production of new feathers requires additional energy. Therefore it is important to provide molting birds with extra varieties of seeds and food, adequate vitamins, exercise and plenty of rest.

Normal molts can last up to three months. Continuous molting or molting for periods longer than three months is abnormal.

Environment plays a role in molting. Inadequate ventilation during warm weather or placing the bird too close to a heater can cause continuous molting.

Another common mistake resulting in continuous molting is placing the bird's cage directly in front of a sunny window. Glass intensifies the heat of the sun and while some direct sunlight can be beneficial for most birds, too much can be harmful. An uncaged bird usually will not spend too much time on a sunny windowsill — most birds know when they have had enough.

If you question whether your bird's molting is normal, you should have your veterinarian examine him. If he does not treat birds, ask him to refer you to a veterinarian who does. Veterinarians specializing in bird diseases can be found in most large metropolitan areas or at any major university veterinary clinic.

DEAR HICKSVILLE RESIDENTS

The task of preparing the budget for the 1986-87 school year was a particularly difficult one this year. As always, the Board of Education and the Finance Committee reviewed each expenditure carefully to be sure that the budget was fiscally sound while also enough to provide for the level of educational programs that the community wants and expects from its schools. During this review process, we found dramatic increases in the cost of transportation and liability and health insurance. These substantial increases in areas beyond our control frustrated the efforts of the Board to minimize an increase in the tax rate, yet the budget presented here represents an increase of only 3.8% over last year's total. The budget of \$41,023,697 will require an estimated tax rate of \$25.48, a difference of \$2.04 compared to 1985-86.

The budget presented here for your information is aimed at maintaining an educational program which meets state mandates and Regents Action Plan requirements as well as goals set by the Board as part of a long-range plan. We present these figures for your study prior to the annual budget hearing scheduled for 8:15 p.m. on Tuesday, April 22, in the cafeteria of the high school. At that time, the public will have a last chance to be heard before the budget is presented to the voters on May 7. We hope you will attend and take part in this important process on behalf of the children of Hicksville.

In order to vote, you must be a United States citizen 18 years of age or older, and you must have been a district resident for at least 30 days prior to the vote.



Code 5000: Pupil Transportation

This section includes all costs for transporting students to and from public, private, and parochial schools according to Board of Education policy. Part of this category is the costs of clerical salaries and supplies and equipment used by the Transportation Office.

The Board of Education provides bus transportation as follows:

- Grades K-3 living more than one-half mile from school
- Grades 4-6 living more than three-quarters of a mile from school
- Grades 7-9 living more than one and one-half miles from school
- Grades 10-12 living more than two miles from school

Transportation of children to public, private, and parochial schools outside of the district is provided up to the New York State mandate of 15 miles. Transportation of handicapped students is mandated by state law up to 50 miles.

Code 7000-8000: Community Services

The district takes an annual census to keep Pupil Personnel Services up to date and to help ascertain the extent of available state and federal aid for students based on district population and attendance. This budget code provides for the maintenance of district mailing lists, registration of Kindergarten children, student records, and operation of attendance records. Also included are salaries for the Youth Program and contractual services from the Gregory Museum. Clerical staff and expenses for materials and supplies are also covered by this code.

Code 9000: Undistributed Expenses

This category includes employee benefit expenditures, transfer funds, and debt service. Employee benefits are mandated and regulated by negotiated contracts. They also include the costs of short-term borrowing to meet cash flow requirements.

NOTE: Capital fund expenditures (\$331,900) are 34% state-reimbursable on eligible projects. District-wide projects for the 1986-87 school year include the following items: Roofing repairs and replacement of floor tile at various locations, replacement of prime windows, remove and replace fuel storage tank, also eliminate one fuel tank, structural repair (brick work), replace existing oil burner with combination gas/oil, installation of fire hydrant on school grounds, extension of existing irrigation, sealing and lining track, continuation of toilet alterations, refurbishing Little Theater, construction of Press Box, tennis court resurfacing, extension of fire detection systems, concrete where required.

PROPOSITION RESOLVED

That the current transportation limit of 1/2 mile for students in grades K-3, 3/4 mile for students in grades 4-6, 1 1/2 miles for students in grades 7-9, and 2 miles for students in grades 10-12 be amended to provide transportation to students in K-6 in excess of 1/2 mile and to students 7-12 in excess of 1 mile effective in the 1986/87 school year at an additional cost not to exceed \$350,000.

CALCULATING YOUR TAX

In order to support the proposed 1986-87 school budget, the district must raise revenues through the property tax levy in the amount of \$29,617,597. This is the cost to Hicksville residents after applied surplus funds, state aid, and revenue from such local sources as interest, tuition, and income from health services has been deducted. This represents an estimated tax of \$25.48 per \$100 assessed valuation, or an increase of \$7.04 over last year's tax rate. The table shown will help you to estimate your tax for the 1986-87 school year.
