Change Of Zone Hearing May 20

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that the Town Board has scheduled a May 20 public hearing on a request for a change of zone in Plainview.

Clark said, "The applicant, Jacob S. Rand, a Family Primary Care Physician, is requesting a change of zone from 'D' residence district to 'R-O' residence office district, for a medical office."

The property is located on the northeast corner of Pasadena Drive and Old Country Road, also known as 654 Old Country Road, in Plainview.

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 20, beginning at 10 a.m. in the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Hicksville Residents Vote On Wednesday

Hicksville residents will go to the polls on Wednesday, May 7, to decide on the Hicksville School District Budget for 1986-87 in the amount of \$40,967,679. This figure will carry an estimated tax rate increase of \$2 per \$100 assessed valuation.

An additional proposition has been added to cover a transportation referendum. The public will vote on an expenditure of not more than \$350,000 to amend current limits for K-6 in excess of 1/2 mile and students in 7-12 in excess of 1 mile. The current limitations are K-3 limit of 1/2 mile; grades 4-6 limit 3/4 mile; grades 7-9 limit 1 1/2 miles; and grades 10-12 two miles.

Two seats on the Board of Education will expire in June and both incumbents, Lawrence Wolfsen and Arlene Rudin, have chosen not to seek re-election. The three year terms will be sought by Daniel Arena and Carole Wolfe in an uncontested race.

Hours for voting are between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. in the seven election districts.

Giese Park Battle Continues

On Wednesday, April 16, the signed petitions from the rally at Giese park on April 13th were submitted to Supervisor Joseph Colby and the Town Board by Thomas McGovern. The petition requested alternate park plans to those proposed by the Town and presented by Councilman Thomas Clark. A cover letter was submitted with the petition expressing the concern of the residents and asking to be more directly informed of any plans for this area.

In response to this action, Mr. McGovern received a letter from Deputy Supervisor James Bell acknowledging the receipt of the petition and noting the residents' views concerning Giese park. Also, Mr. Bell stated that arrangements were being made for a meeting with Mr. McGovern and Town representatives to see what compromises could be reached. Mr. McGovern has since received an invitation for him and members of his committee to attend said meeting which is to be held on May 6th. Also scheduled to attend are Councilman Clark and representatives from the Parks Department and the Hicksville American Soccer Club. Results will be announced in a later newsletter.

There have been some strong urgings by local residents surrounding Giese Park to pursue the formation of a Civic Association. To this end, Mr. McGovern has contacted local civic associations and has spoken to an attorney. He has learned that there was a local civic association in action in 1971 that fought for the Giese Park property to remain off the tax rolls as opposed to the area being sold to a private developer. News From Road Runners

Nationally ranked endurance runners Luis Rios of Brooklyn, Samara Balfour of Manhattan and Marjorie Kroeger of Syosset will be among the field of 42 runners who will compete in the second annual Long Island 12 Hour Ultramarathon Run at Syosset High School on Saturday, May 10.

Rios' string of ultra victories includes first place finishes in the 1984 Prospect Park 12 Hour Run, the 1985 Sri Chinmoy 70 Miler, and the 1982, 1983 and 1985 Crocheron Park 12 Hour Run. He also completed 421 miles in the 1984 New York Road Runners Club 6 Day Race on Randall's Island.

Balfour and Kroeger are both National TAC age group record holders. Balfour holds the record at 100 miles for 49 year old women, with a time of 18 hours, 23 minutes 54 seconds, and Kroeger holds the 50 kilometer record for 50 year old women, with a time of 4:23:13.

Local favorites who will be competing in the Ultra include Jeff Jacobs of Plainview, who captured 2nd place in the 1985 Eisenhower Park 50 Kilometer Run, and has been among the top finishers in the past three Katerskill Spring Rush Iron Man competitions. "Ironman" triathlete Stan Wunderlich of Woodbury, and Liz Flahavan of Hicksville, whose credits include third place finishes in the 1985 Philadelphia to Atlantic City 100 Kilometer Run and in the 1985 Forest Park 40 Miler. The field also includes eight runners who are attempting their first ultramarathon.

The 1986 edition of the Long Island 12 Hour Run is being conducted by the Plainview-Old Bethpage Road Runners Club, and directed by Club President Mike Polansky and veteran ultramarathoner Larry Davidson. Technical assistance will be provided by David Katz of Finish Line Promotions.

"We are quite pleased to once again bring together this unique combination of elite ultrarunners and those who are new to the ranks of endurance athletes," Polansky noted. "May 10 promises to be a big day for endurance running on Long Island."

The starting gun will go off promptly at 6 a.m. on the morning of the 10th.

Most Callers Believe School Bds. Don't Need To Stump

Most callers to Input think that school boards should not go out stumping to have budgets passed in answer to this question: "Since the court has ruled that school districts cannot directly appeal to residents to vote for the budget in taxpayer funded material this year do you think school districts will have it more difficult in getting their budgets passed? Here are some of the answers:

DOESN'T MATTER

It does not really matter how much the school boards push budgets. What matters is whether the people think the increase is in line with what they can afford to pay. If the school district asks for a small increase and the public believes it is a good school district they will get the budget passed regardless of how much advertising they put out.

GOOD IDEA

It was high time that school boards were given guidelines on what they could use tax money for in presenting the budget. I can remember many districts sending out a flyer to every house telling them to vote for the budget. But I remember when a group opposed to the budget asked for equal time at taxpayer expense they were told that the Board would not allow it. We have a tradition in this country of protecting free elections and keeping the government free of partisan politics. Then it is no wonder that school districts that are asked to be models for upcoming generations should have to adhere to the same tradition.

LITTLE CHANGE

There will be little change. Most school districts won't tell you exactly whether you should vote for the budget or not but they will tell you what will happen if you don't. They will say that the kids will have to walk miles to school; that there won't be any athletics or other extracurricular activities and that if you don't pass the budget that it will only affect the rate a small amount because salaries are already agreed to under contracts. So why get worried about the budget? J.R.

WRONG WAY

I hadn't heard that school districts cannot ask you to vote for the budget. I think they ought to be able to tell you why they favor it and why they want us to vote for it. I see nothing wrong with that and if they are not able to do that this year then it is wrong.

TIRED OF BUDGETS

I am tired of school budgets. They are always formed by lobby groups who are only thinking of what they can get out of the taxpayers. The parents want the taxpayers to provide things they won't give. The teachers organizations have only the good of their members at heart and the school board members are ineffective. It is high time we stopped fooling ourselves that we can change things. It never happens.

MATTER OF PRINCIPLE

While in the past I have objected to the practice of the school system using its official institutional publication to ask for votes approving the annual school budget, I don't believe that a legal restriction on that practice will greatly affect the outcome. It's more a matter of principle in that there is a rightful resentment against the employment of one's own financial support to appeal to the general public to vote for something to which he or she is opposed. I still find it difficult to accept the pat rationale for the continued and apparently unrestrained increase in school taxes when school registration is down year after year. The entire concept in Garden City at least, is based upon the concept as expressed in a 1985 issue of the official newsletter "Within Our Schools" of the assumed ability of our taxpayers to pay and the far out theory that the continued improvement in our schools is a tacit form of insurance toward the maintenance and improvement of our property values. Some of us want to continue to be able to afford to live in Garden City and increases in our property values do not put food on the table, clothes on our backs and enable us to pay the increasing taxes which are sold to us on the basis that everything the School's Board and Administration decide is absolutely necessary. Our apparent capitulation to the union demands of a virtual 7% across the board annual increase in pay over three years in the face of a lower increase in the cost of living adjustments in other fields is so difficult to accept. Elder citizens in Garden City, largely dependent on fixed income and limited in Social Security increase to 3.1% this year, certainly offers some kind of valid counter argument to the negotiated teacher COL increases. To answer your question further I think that the schools have lost an important vehicle in presenting their case to the public but the affirmative votes are so deeply entrenched and so well organized that the "nays" haven't got a Chinaman's chance especially in the face of the ever-present and fearsome alternative of the austerity program in the event of defeat. But, in our democratic society, a basic privilege and responsibility is the right to vote and there is no excuse for anyone to stay home and shirk that responsibility.

READER RATINGS

Q. If bouillon is served in a cup, do you drink it? Should you take part of it with the spoon? What if the cup has two handles. Do you use both hands?

B.K.

A. Spoon up part of the bouillon before taking it up to drink. If the cup has one handle, hold it in one hand. If it has two handles, hold it by both handles. If the bouillon has solids in it, take them up with the spoon before drinking the bouillon.

Q. If someone asks you to dinner, shouldn't he make the reservations, tell you where to come, and pay for the meal?

A. Yes. The person who does the asking takes the responsibility for making the arrangements and for paying unless it is clearly understood beforehand that it is "dutch."

Q. Who is served first at table and when is the proper time to begin eating?

F.G.D.

A. The hostess is not served first unless she is the only lady at the table or is alone with her husband and children. If Grandmother or even a young girl guest is present, the dishes are first presented to her after inspection by the hostess. When the hostess is serving from in front of her place, with or without the aid of a servant, she is served next to last and her husband last. For her to serve herself earlier will mean her food will be cold and her filled plate in the way.

After several people have been served, urged by the hostess, guests begin eating so their food will not be cold. And, except at breakfast, the polite husband waits until his wife has been served before beginning to eat.

Rx for a healthy heart

Here's a prescription for healthy living. Eat with your heart in mind.

That may not be as easy as it sounds; our aboriginal forebears did a better job of it than we do.

Since most of their protein was on the hoof, cave cuisine tended to consist mostly of inherently low-cholesterol, low-sodium fruits, vegetables, grains, tubers, roots, berries, beans, nuts and seeds. Plant foods provided 60 to 80 percent of the diet in those primitive societies.

Modern technology — which assures us a longer life through the use of vaccines and antibiotics — also has enabled us to all but reverse this percentage. To excessive protein we have added equally excessive amounts of fat, sugar and sodium, so that we now can expect to live long enough to succumb to such chronic illnesses as heart disease, hypertension, stroke and cancer.

A 1982 report from the National Academy of Sciences established that at least 50 percent of fatalities from the 10 leading causes of death in the United States are lifestyle related.

What that means, Jane Brody says in her comprehensive "Good Food Book: Living the Carbohydrate Way," is that we are "wiping out the public health gains of our younger years by the way we live, and especially by the way we eat.... A vast body of evidence indicates that the current American diet contains too much fat, sugar, protein and too little starch..."

Correcting that situation doesn't mean giving up all your favorite foods; it simply means establishing a more sensible nutritional profile — one high in complex carbohydrates (fruits, vegetables and whole grains) and low in protein, fat, sodium and cholesterol.

Since heart-healthy recipes are healthy overall as well, the following dishes are appropriate for the whole family. They were designed to fit into a diet moderately low in calories, cholesterol and sodium. They were not intended to supersede dietary restrictions prescribed by a physician.

Main dishes and desserts are emphasized, since they are generally the hardest for people to adapt. Calorie, cholesterol and sodium counts are given where available.

SPICY MEXICAN SNAPPER

5 tbsps. polyunsaturated oil
1 small onion, chopped and 1 clove garlic, minced
1 can (28 ozs.) peeled whole tomatoes
1 can (6 ozs.) tomato paste
1 tbsp. lemon juice
2 tbsps. sugar
1/4 tsp. each cinnamon and thyme
Dash cayenne
1/4 tsp. ground cloves
2 lbs. red snapper, haddock or other white fish fillets
1/2 cup flour
Stuffed green olives

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in large skillet. Add onion and garlic and cook until onion is tender. Add undrained tomatoes, tomato paste, lemon juice, sugar, cinnamon, cayenne, thyme and cloves. Mix well, crushing tomatoes. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer covered for 15 minutes, stirring often.

Cut fish into serving size portions. Coat fish with flour. Heat 3

tablespoons oil in large skillet. Sauté 3-4 of fish at a time until browned on both sides. 4-6 minutes. Add more oil, if needed. Arrange fish on a serving plate and top with sauce. Garnish with olives.

Makes 6-8 servings, 265 calories, 0 mg cholesterol and 130 mg sodium per serving.

FRUIT WITH YOGURT

Fresh fruit:
1 1/4 cups diced oranges
2 cups halved grapes
2 bananas, thinly sliced
1 papaya, diced
1 can (1 lb., 13 ozs.) pineapple chunks or fresh pineapple
2 tbsps. lemon juice
2 cups low fat yogurt, plain
1/2 tsp. ground cardamom
2 tbsps. rose water
1 tbsp. sugar or honey, optional

Combine oranges, grapes, bananas, drained pineapple chunks and papaya in a large bowl. Gently fold in lemon juice. Chill 1/2 hour. Combine yogurt, cardamom and rose water, sugar or honey, if desired. Chill. To serve spoon fruit into sherbet glasses, top with chilled yogurt mixture.

Makes 8 servings, 145 calories, 3.5 mg cholesterol and 43 mg sodium per serving.

QUICK CHICKEN KEBABS

2 tbsps. lemon juice
1 tbsp. polyunsaturated oil
1 clove garlic, crushed
1/4 tsp. each rosemary and ground black pepper
1 lb. boned skinned chicken breasts, cut in 1 1/2-inch chunks
1/2 lb. zucchini, cut in 1-inch chunks
8 cherry tomatoes

Mix lemon juice, oil, garlic, rosemary and pepper, set aside. Arrange chicken, zucchini and tomatoes on skewers. Brush with lemon juice mixture.

Broil 6 inches from heat source, basting and turning frequently for about 10 minutes or until chicken and zucchini are tender.

STUFFED TOMATO SALAD

1 whole chicken breast
1 tbsp. margarine
4 large firm ripe tomatoes
1/4 cup wheat germ

1/4 tsp. crushed thyme leaves
1/4 tsp. pepper

Skin, bone and dice chicken. Saute chicken in margarine until tender, about 5 minutes.

Cut thin slice off stem end of each tomato. Scoop out pulp leaving shell intact. Drain. Dice tomato tops and pulp. Mix with sauteed chicken, wheat germ, onion, green pepper, curry powder, thyme and pepper. Spoon into shells.

To serve cold, place in beds of lettuce, garnish with avocado wedges and ripe olives, if desired. To serve hot, place in shallow baking pan. Bake at 350 F for 25 minutes or until heated through. Top with yogurt, if desired.

FRESH PEAR SOUFFLE

- 2 large ripe pears
- 3 tbsps. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 5 egg whites at room temperature

About 25 minutes before serving preheat oven to 450 F.

Core then cut pears into bite-size pieces. In covered blender container at high speed, blend pear pieces until uniform, stopping occasionally to scrape container with rubber spatula.

TURKEY SCALLOPINI

- 1/4 cup margarine
- 1/2 lb. thinly sliced mushrooms

- 1 tbsp. water
- Chopped parsley

Melt 2 tablespoons margarine in a large skillet over medium heat. Add mushrooms and saute until tender. Remove from pan.

Combine flour and pepper, coat turkey with flour mixture, shaking off excess. Melt remaining margarine in skillet over medium-high heat, and brown turkey on both sides a few pieces at a time, allowing 1-2 minutes per side. Remove from pan. Slowly add dry sherry and water to skillet, stirring until liquid is slightly thickened and smooth. Return turkey and mushrooms to pan until just heated through. Arrange on a serving platter and garnish with chopped parsley.

calls for Oriental eggplant, use one common eggplant in place of four of the Oriental type.

Cooks preparing eggplant for the first time may be surprised at the amount of oil eggplant absorbs as it cooks. This quality has been known to cooks in the Middle East for centuries, as the following traditional tale indicates.

An imam (priest) was so taken by an eggplant dish his fiancee prepared for him that he asked that her only dowry be a supply of the oil needed to cook it. Before the wedding, the legend continues, servants arrived at the imam's house bearing two huge urns of olive oil. For the first two nights after the wedding all went well. On the third night, however, the imam came home to a bare table and a weeping wife.

"What has happened?" he cried.

"Alas, our wedding oil has all been soaked up by the eggplant!" the bride sobbed, and the imam fell down in a faint.

One of the most popular Middle Eastern eggplant dishes, Imam Baalid, is named in honor of the hapless priest.

Eggplant isn't really quite this oil-absorbent, but it is a good idea to drain it carefully on paper towels after it is cooked. Another good idea is to mix a lighter, unsaturated oil with virgin olive oil for cooking eggplant.

EGGPLANT PARMESAN

- Preparation/cooking time — 15 minutes plus do-ahead steps
- 8-12 slices of eggplant, (skin removed) 1/2 inch thick, from the widest part of two large eggplants
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup virgin olive oil (add more during cooking, if needed OR mix olive oil with equal amount of safflower or peanut oil)
- 1/4-1/2 tsp. dried oregano
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup coarsely grated fresh Parmesan cheese

DO-AHEAD STEPS

- 1 Steam eggplant slices — 2 or 3 at a time — for 2-3 minutes, turning once. Drain, pat dry and allow to cool 10-20 minutes.

- 2 While eggplant is cooling, whisk eggs lightly in medium bowl.

- 3 Dip eggplant slices in egg, then coat with bread crumbs.

FINAL STEPS

Lightly saute garlic in oil, over medium heat. Add 2-3 slices of eggplant at a time. Sprinkle lightly with oregano, salt and pepper while cooking. When eggplant is light-golden brown, drain well on paper towels.

When all slices have been cooked, place on large baking tray or aluminum foil, cover with Parmesan cheese and broil briefly (about 1 minute), until cheese is melted and bubbling. Serve with pasta and your favorite tomato or white clam sauce.

Serves 4.

EGGPLANT CASSEROLE

- Preparation/cooking time — 35 minutes

- plus do-ahead steps
- 1 medium-sized eggplant
- 1 cup fresh cracker crumbs
- 1/2 stick butter, plus more for dotting
- 1 pinch nutmeg
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1/2 cup heavy cream

DO-AHEAD STEPS

- 1 Peel and cube eggplant and soak in cold salted water 30 minutes.
- 2 Drain and boil in enough salted water to cover, until tender. Drain well and transfer to large mixing bowl.
- 3 Mash eggplant with fork. Add 1/4 cup cracker crumbs, butter, nutmeg, salt and pepper and cream. Blend well.

FINAL STEPS

Pour eggplant mixture into shallow baking dish and sprinkle with remaining cracker crumbs. Dot generously with butter. Bake, uncovered, at 350 F for 30 minutes or until golden brown.

NOTE: Performing do-ahead steps up to 24 hours ahead of time improves casserole's flavor.

Serves 4 as a vegetable course, or 2 as a main course.

EGGPLANT STUFFED WITH SAUSAGE AND FETA CHEESE

- Preparation/cooking time — 40 minutes plus do-ahead steps
- 2 eggplants, 1 lb. each, or equivalent
- 1/2 lb. bulk pork sausage
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tsp. dried oregano
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 lb. feta cheese
- 2 eggs beaten with 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/2 cup (approx.) fresh bread crumbs
- Salt and pepper to taste

DO-AHEAD STEPS

- 1 Cut eggplants in half lengthwise and scoop out pulp, leaving a 1/4-inch-thick shell.
- 2 Chop pulp coarsely and sprinkle generously with salt. Place salted pulp in colander and allow to drain 30 minutes, then roll in double layer of paper towels and squeeze gently to dry.

- 3 Meanwhile, sprinkle inside of eggplant shells generously with salt and pepper, and drain upside down on paper towels 30 minutes, then pat dry.

- 4 Sauté sausage until browned. Drain on paper towels.

FINAL STEPS

In olive oil, sauté the onion and garlic until soft. Increase heat, add eggplant pulp and sauté another 5 minutes.

Add sausage, parsley and oregano, and salt and pepper to taste. Mix well and remove from heat. When cool, add crumbled feta cheese and milk-egg mixture. Fill shells and sprinkle with bread crumbs. Drizzle with a little more olive oil and bake 30 minutes at 375 F until golden brown and bubbly.

Eggplant excellent as meat substitute

Many people today are reducing their consumption of red meat, or eliminating it entirely from their diet. Fortunately, there are lots of excellent main course recipes that use little or no meat, and today we're featuring two that have eggplant as their central ingredient. Today's other recipe is for a quick and easy eggplant casserole that can serve either as a meatless main course or as a distinctive vegetable course.

In Italy, China, France and other countries, eggplant has long been valued both as a satisfying meat substitute and as a vegetable accompaniment to other dishes. Today's recipe for Eggplant Parmesan is an original one — quite different from the usual casserole-type preparation — which has

received good reviews from both carnivorous and vegetarian guests. Eggplant Casserole, with cream, butter and fresh cracker crumbs, is a rich, yet delicately flavored dish. Eggplant Stuffed With Sausage and Feta Cheese, with a flavor reminiscent of Greece, is a hearty entree that is both delicious and dramatic.

The large, dark-purple eggplants (*Solanum melongena*) familiar in this country are native to the warmer parts of Europe. They are called aubergine in France, and many English-language cookbooks also refer to them by this name. Oriental eggplants are much smaller and more elongated than the ones common here. As a rule of thumb, if you're following a recipe that

Q: I am currently in the process of buying a piece of property where the seller is deceased. The loan company states on one of the items a requirement for funding is the receipt and approval of a building permit for rear patio enclosure and covered patio. The family member who is the seller has no idea if there was or ever had been a building permit. The escrow person says it is my responsibility to get the permit since I am applying for the loan.

I think this escrow person is wrong. I didn't know anything about this when I saw the house. How was I to know whose responsibility it was to get the record of the building permit?

If I am unable to get the loan, I have incurred some expenses and I am losing out. Also, do I have the right to impose some of these expenses onto the seller since I was not informed? The loan amount is for 30 percent of the purchase price.

Whose responsibility should it be to get the record of the building permit? Your answer may help us to decide to purchase the house or not. — F.L.

A: If there is no record of a

building permit for this addition to the house, the seller is responsible to pay for one and get it recorded. Sometimes the type of loan will determine whether you will need the permit or not, or if the price of the permit can be negotiated.

For a California Veterans Loan or a FHA loan, it is a must to have the building permit in order to qualify the property for a loan. Sometimes with a VA loan or a conventional loan this can be negotiated.

However, the lack of the permit may affect the appraiser's evaluation of the property. In most cases the seller would be held responsible for providing a record of a building permit, unless the buyer and loan firm agree otherwise.

Regardless of the responsibility of obtaining the permit, you will want the property properly recorded if you continue with the purchase. The lack of a proper building permit will likely affect any future sale of the property and this again would become an issue.

Q: Last November I had a telephone call from a reader who

wanted to know a cleaning formula for varnished woodwork.

She mentioned something she had remembered reading some time ago about turpentine and/or vinegar.

"I couldn't find the reference in past Gene Gary columns and have been scanning copy for such a formula since, to no avail," she said.

"If you could find it and send me a copy of the article, great; if not, possibly you could mention such a formula in a forthcoming column." — M.B.

A: I am happy to repeat the formula:

In a double-boiler, heat a mixture of 1 quart warm water, 3 tablespoons boiled linseed oil and 1 tablespoon turpentine. Keep the mixture warm, but not boiling. Apply with a soft cloth and wipe dry.

A simpler method would be to use Murphy's Oil Soap, which is a commercial cleaner. It is distributed by the Phoenix Corp., Cleveland, Ohio 44122.

Dr. Wallace: I am 17 and my boyfriend is 19. He is a super-guy but he does have one flaw. He drinks. Oh, don't get me wrong, he is not an alcoholic but he does have two or three beers every Friday and Saturday night. I'm concerned that he might be stopped for drunk driving, but Tim says that three beers in an hour does not mean that he is drunk.

Dr. Wallace: I don't think he is a drunk, either, but sometime he drives a little odd and I get a little scared. When I question him, he only calls me an "old bag" and tells me to keep quiet. Help! — Judy,

Judy: Most states and provinces consider a driver "drunk" when his blood alcohol level is 10 or greater. For a 150-pound person, this means four drinks consumed in one hour. A drink consists of a 12-ounce beer, 6 ounces of wine or 1 ounce of 80 proof alcohol.

It appears that three beers would not constitute a drunken driver but according to The National Student Educational Fund, after three drinks within an hour, the drinker's judgment can be considered unsound. He will not think clearly. His reasoning is less reliable. He may do or say things that are rude and unreasonable.

So, although Tim is not legally drunk, I wouldn't ride with him after he has been drinking. In alcohol-related crashes, 22 percent of those killed were passengers. Maybe if you stop riding with him after he has been drinking, he might just get the message and give up his dangerous habit. In a few months it will be against the law for 19-year-olds to drink in Minnesota.

Dr. Wallace: How did the national symbol, Uncle Sam, get started? I've looked everywhere and I can't find out. As you recommended, I went to my librarian and she couldn't help. — Phyllis,

Phyllis: Your librarian should have been trained with mine. Four minutes after I proposed your question to her she had an answer. Not only did she find the answer, she typed this for me from the book, "1,000 Questions and Answers" (Treasure Press, 1985).

"It is thought that the original Uncle Sam was an affable, pleasant man named Samuel Wilson, (1776-1854), who lived in Troy, New York State, and supplied beef to the U.S. Army in the war with Britain in 1812. Wilson was known locally as 'Uncle Sam' and, as government purchasers stamped U.S.

on the barrels of meat being shipped, local workmen referred to it as 'Uncle Sam's beef.'

Tradition has it that the name was picked up by soldiers and soon came into familiar usage as a nickname for the United States. A resolution passed by the Congress of the United States in 1961 recognized Wilson as the namesake of the national symbol."

Dr. Wallace: I am 13 and live with my mother and stepfather. My parents were divorced two years ago and my mother married Jim last year. By the way, Mom is 33 and my stepfather is 62.

No one really wants to think about passing on from this earth. It is to the unknown, at a time uncertain other than knowing that it will happen to each of us at some time in the future. So, in our day-to-day activities, we really don't give it a lot of thought; perhaps that is a mistake.

Perhaps for one or two days, each of us should address that question, not for our individual benefit but in concern for those who will survive. Unless we tend to the subject in advance, those survivors will have to deal with our affairs, our estates, our obligations — all in addition to any memorial service or event.

What we have created as our individual estates can be and should be our individual obligation for disposition, not the burden of others. This means communication and resolution now — facing up to the question and making determinations and records. When resolved, the questions become answers and we can put them behind us and go forward.

Use this checklist for yourself:

• Wills — Have you prepared a will for the disposition of your estate as you want it accomplished? Have you identified your assets for your attorney? Have you identified those to be heirs — family, friends, organizations, charities? Have you checked the will lately for any recent changes? Has it

been checked by your attorney so that it will be held valid in court?

• Trusts — Either as an alternate to a will or as an addition, have you considered a trust arrangement for your assets to effect the smoothest, least taxable transition of property to those you want as recipients? Have you considered the transfer of property but retaining full use of it until death? Are there other considerations that can be handled by a trust arrangement — to avoid probate in the courts and possible determination otherwise by the state?

• Pre-Needs — Have you already arranged and funded your disposition on death? You can pre-purchase all funeral needs, and remove that incredible burden from family and friends at a time of very high emotion. If you think about it now and resolve it, you and your survivors will never have to think about it again.

• Records — Have you identified in a single place records on all your assets, your insurance, titles to properties, numbers of bank accounts and safety deposit boxes, receivables and obligations and more? Have you communicated the location of those records (in a fireproof location, of course) to your attorney and/or key family members or your named executor? Decor Score**How to cope
with too much sun**

By Sharon Owen Haven

Q. After adding on a greenhouse-type addition to our living room to bring in the sun, we are finding that we have too much of a good thing. The sun is blinding during certain parts of the day. Our carpeting and upholstery are fading.

We find we are not using this area very much. Is there some way of decorating this space which would make it more comfortable and less susceptible to sun damage? J.G.

A. Since your purpose in remodeling was to add a sun room and not a sauna, take a look at some of the solutions pictured here. By treating their greenhouse-type addition as outdoor space rather than interior space, the home owners came to amicable terms with the sun.

Notice the ceramic tile flooring. The tile absorbs the sun's heat during the day to keep the house warm at night and it does not fade. You can always add area rugs in the shaded portions of the space if tile seems too cold to you.

Furniture made for the outdoors is also a good choice. Note how the home owners have creat-


ed two furniture groupings in the space — a formal living room grouping in the part of the room that does not get direct sun and a casual grouping in the greenhouse area.

The casual grouping of fade-resistant natural canvas deck chairs, cushions and pillows can be recovered or replaced without breaking the bank. Wicker, willow, rattan or plastic furniture will also work well in hot spots.

Don't neglect window coverings. There are many types of films and coatings you can use on the glass itself to lower the admission of heat and infrared rays. In addition, a low-profile window treatment (such as mini-blinds) retains the character of the space while protecting it from blinding glare at certain times of the day.

Q. I have a terrible time buying furnishings because I am never sure if they will look good or fit right when I get them home. What can I do about this? C.T.V.

A. It never hurts to keep a floor plan drawn to scale on graph paper, tucked in your purse for

emergency buying cravings. You can measure on the spot and see if the piece you like will fit.

When shopping, be sure to ask if, it is possible to try out pieces at home before you buy. Many businesses will let you take furnishings home on 24-hour approval.

You might also consider the services of a professional interior designer, particularly if you are frequently indecisive and have difficulty "picturing" a potential design decision. They can save you a fortune in expensive mistakes.

Most clock collectors itch for an Ithaca

Q. This antique Ithaca clock has a calendar and compensates for leap year. Can you tell me when it was made and its value?



A. This is an Ithaca No. 35 parlor clock and was made in the fourth quarter of the 19th century. The value would be in the \$3,000 to \$5,000 range.

The company was founded by H.B. Horton and stayed in business well into the 20th century.

Ithaca clocks are the first choice of most collectors and most models sell for over \$1,000.

Q. I see a lot of items marked "Made in Czechoslovakia." What can you tell me about these in general?

A. Czechoslovakia was founded in 1918. Most of the items you see were made between 1918 and 1938; a few are from the years following World War II. Since all of them are less than 70 years old, the prices are quite moderate.

- Amber ashtray — \$25.
- Bowl, 3½ inches, iridescent pink, decorated with King Tut — \$225.
- Rose bowl, spattered ruby glass — \$35.
- Toby mug — \$40.
- Pitcher — \$35.
- Humidor — \$175.

- Plate, rooster in center — \$20.

Points on Pets

Q. Are dogs susceptible to prostate disease like older men are? Our 8-year-old mongrel male dog seems to have difficulty urinating, but does not seem to be suffering any pain.

Our dog has not been neutered. Should we have had him castrated when he was younger? Would castration be of benefit now?

A Prostatic disease is fairly common in intact male dogs older than 6 years of age.

The prostatic gland located at the neck of the urinary bladder secretes a milky fluid during ejaculation. This gland may become enlarged, infected, abscessed, cystic or tumorous.

Prostatitis, an inflammation or infection of the prostate gland usually arises following infection of the urinary tract. Infectious agents from other parts of the body can be carried to the prostate by the circulatory system.

Most dogs exhibit pain with prostatitis. There usually is loss of appetite, fever and vomiting. Many affected dogs are reluctant to move and have arched backs.

The veterinarian diagnoses prostatitis by carefully evaluating the history, clinical signs, physical examination and digital palpation of the prostate gland. Clinical laboratory tests performed on a urine sample or washings of the urethra often are utilized to confirm the diagnosis. Radiographs of the pelvic area also are quite helpful.

Prostatitis usually is treated successfully by antibiotic therapy. A bacterial culture and sensitivity test determine which antibiotic to

prescribe. If the prostate is abscessed, surgical drainage may be necessary. Chronic prostatitis often is complicated by cyst formation, requiring correction by surgery.

Most uncastrated dogs older than 5 years of age have some enlargement (hyperplasia) of the prostate gland, similar to the syndrome seen in elderly men. An enlarged prostate in an older dog is often due to hormonal imbalances. Very enlarged prostates cause difficulty in urinating, straining while urinating and dribbling of urine. There may be interference with bowel movements because of pressure on the colon by the enlarged prostate.

Veterinarians can diagnose prostatic hyperplasia by digital palpation of the enlarged gland. A biopsy may be required to rule out a tumor as the cause of enlargement.

Castration, which results in permanent reduction in the size of the gland, is the best treatment for prostatic hyperplasia. An alternative to castration, chronic administration of female hormones, may have serious side effects.

While abnormal condition of the prostate is serious, most dogs can be treated successfully. If you suspect your dog has prostatic disease, you should have your veterinarian conduct a thorough physical examination as soon as possible.
