Hicksville Residents Reject School Budget

At the Annual District Elections held May 7, Hicksville residents rejected by a 39 vote margin a \$40,967,697 budget proposed by the Board of Education for the 1986-87 school year. A transportation referendum seeking to lower eligibility for bus privileges was also defeated by a vote of 965 to 898. This defeat ended a nine-month battle by some residents to extend the district's transportation limitations which had eliminated some students after the district's eligibility review last summer.

Two new trustees were elected to the Board, Carol Wolf receiving 1,091 votes and Daniel Arena with 1,175 votes. They will assume their 3 year board seats on July 1. Mrs. Wolf and Mr. Arena will fill the seats vacated by Lawrence Wolfson and Arlene Rudin.

Speaking on behalf of the Board, President William Bennett said he was "somewhat surprised" by the defeat of the budget. He said that the vote (951-912) indicated to him that Hicksville residents "do want to provide necessary monies for education", but that a \$1.99 increase in the tax rate is "not acceptable".

The budget will be put under further review by the Board and additional cuts will be sought. Mr. Bennett said that the Board plans to meet on Wednesday evening, May 14, and that Mrs. Wolf and Mr. Arena are being involved in the review process.

Upon further amending the budget, the Board has the option to place a new budget before the electorate. Mr. Bennett indicated that this has been standard practice in such cases. If a new vote is decided upon, that vote will take place either on June 19 or June 25.

The next regular meeting of the School Board will be on Wednesday, May 28, at 8:15 p.m. in the Administration Building.

On Friday, May 9, the third

no one from the Town of Oyster
Bay gave attention to this event,
the honorees from the Township
of Oyster Bay were the only
people who did not receive
recognition from their representa-
tives of government. A citation
from the town is usually in order.
It seems like a small thing, in
light of what Vern Wagner and
others like him have given of
themselves.

Congratulations to the Shamrocks and assistant coach Denise Harkins, for an outstanding contest, despite playing without any subs, forcing all 11 boys to go all the way.

Two Arrested In Bethpage

Both suspects were finally apprehended in the rear of 32 Central Avenue, Plainview. 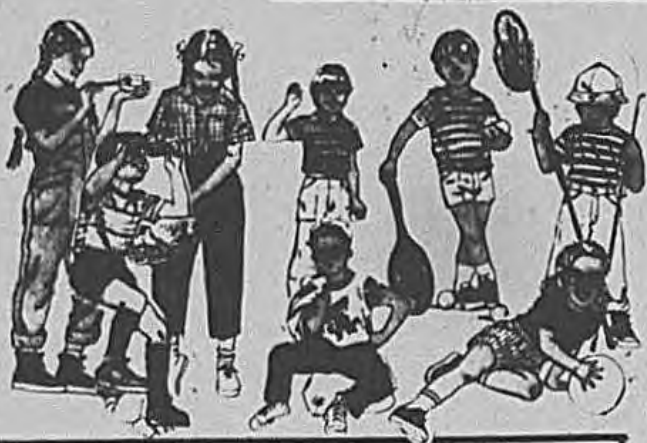

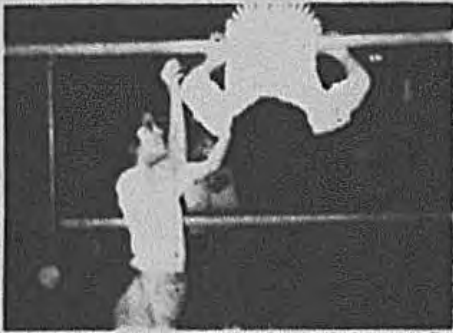

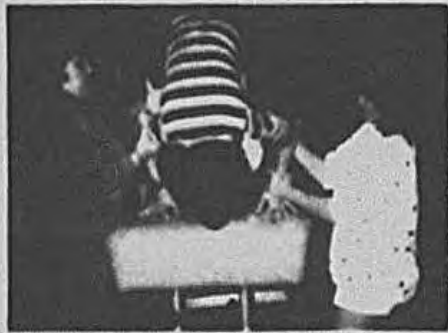

Plant Study At Woodland

Which type of soil will nourish the plant best? The answer to this question was Mrs. Starnes' fifth grade class' objective for the recent science lesson on plants.

The class planted radish seeds in five different kinds of soil: sand, vermiculite, humus, garden soil and peat moss. The students fortified some potted seeds with potash, nitrate of soda or phosphorus.

The pots were kept in tinted domed terrariums, to observe transpiration and minimize moisture loss. Some control pots were in unfertilized soil. The rate of germination was recorded.

The plants in humus did best. Those in peat moss and sand failed to germinate. The plants in tinted yellow terrariums grew tallest.

The class drew flower diagrams and studied photosynthesis. The culminating activity will be a visit to Clark Garden to study pollination by honey bees.

Woodland Students Visit Clark Garden

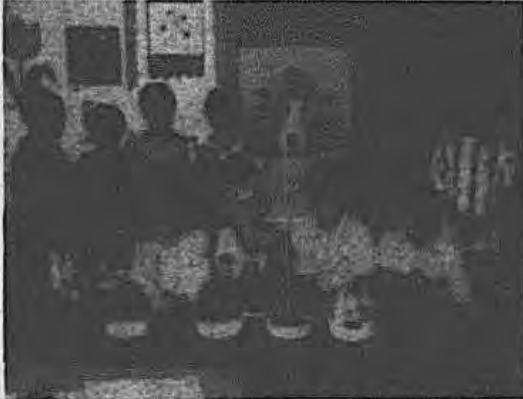

The master bee keeper showed

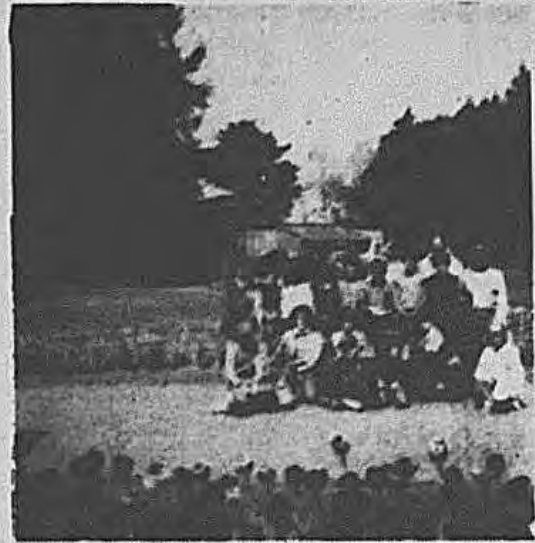
the students specimens of pollen granules, honey combs and parts of a bee hive. Everyone sampled wild honey on a cracker.

The class then went to two on site bee hives where the students stood very still as the honey bees buzzed about them.

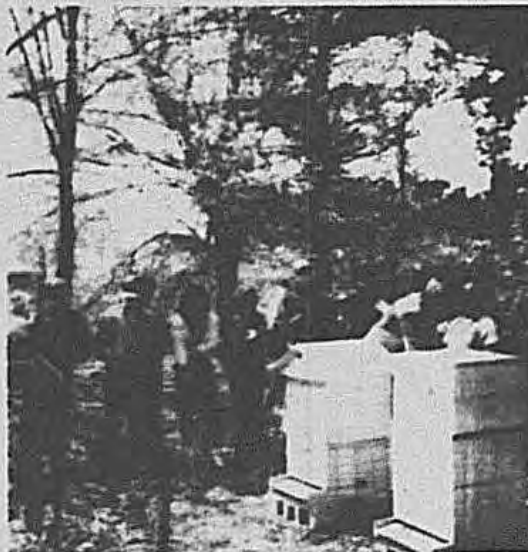

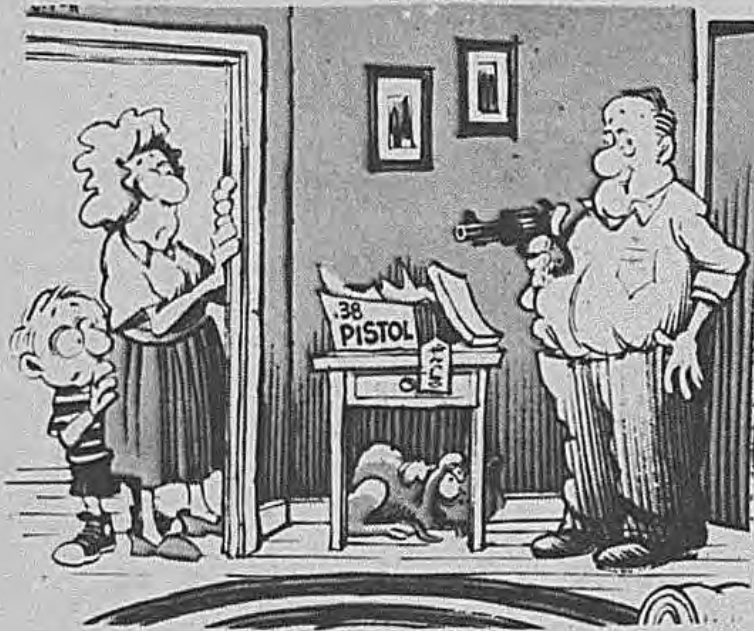

Input Callers Say Nuclear Accident Will Have Temporary Effect

Most callers to Input believe that the nuclear disaster in Russia will only have a temporary effect on the use of nuclear power in answer to this question: "Do you think the Russian nuclear disaster will curtail the use of nuclear power throughout the world?" Here are some of the answers:

THINGS TO BE LEARNED

Yes. The nuclear plant disaster in the USSR will have a great effect on the use of nuclear power but I think it will not stop its use. Many things could be learned from this disaster and if the world were allowed to have a fair summary of what went wrong (and why) everyone would benefit. But even without Russian help, we will be able to find our some valuable guards against the spread of radioactive matter. L.K.

PUSHING TOO HARD

There is a danger in our pushing the Russians too hard and being too critical that the idea will be spread throughout the world that nuclear power cannot be made safe enough to use. If this happens, then the world will not have a permanent source of power and will be in great difficulty when oil runs out. J.N.

DISTORTIONS

In one odd way, the nuclear accident in the USSR proved an important point. Mass hysteria and mass contamination are not necessarily the conclusion of a nuclear accident. The fear-mongers have overplayed their hand. When they say it will be necessary to evacuate a million people on Long Island, they are distorting the patterns of Three Mile Island and what happened in the USSR. M.K.

TOO DANGEROUS

It is my opinion that we should stop trying to make alibis for nuclear power. It is just too dangerous. While the number of casualties reported from the USSR from so tremendous an accident was low, generations to come will feel the effect of this radiation. The accident proved once again that there are no totally safe plants. L.E.

WILL SETTLE DOWN

Putting too much emphasis on the Russian accident and using it to brow beat them will have the effect of hurrying nuclear plant expansion. But this accident will settle down to a scale that people can understand and it will give them something to gauge the hysteria of the SANE groups against. N.T.

MAY DELAY

The Russian nuclear disaster may delay the use of nuclear power throughout the world but eventually oil will run out and it will be a case of nuclear power or freeze to death - even out on the east end of Long Island.

LONG RANGE PERSPECTIVE

Hopefully not! The world is running short of extractive products such as oil and clearly something must be done to conserve and substitute. We can only bemoan the penurious and lax attitude which the Russians displayed first in choosing the system they did with inadequate containment and protection in case of a nuclear accident and secondly, in playing down the seriousness of the disaster when it occurred. To subject peoples of other nations to their callous disregard of the civilized concern which should be the norm between such neighbors regardless of political feelings is inexcusable and vies with the holocaust in the complete subjugation of human concern. However, that both is and isn't the question. My feeling is that the Russian nuclear disaster can serve only to harden the resolve to continue the use of atomic power but with heightened and improved safeguards in construction and operation. The need to rely upon nuclear power to offset the eventual loss of petroleum as a traded commodity cannot be denied. This is especially true in those countries where the decision to convert to and to use such power is in the hands of their government such as in France, Great Britain, Germany, Italy and others. Even with the reduction in the cost of oil, those governments have not been swayed from that objective long range, and, the only reason it becomes a problem here is because of an uneasiness and distrust implanted by a vocal minority of anything nuclear and their ability to make the headlines with an ultimate effect on whatever voting clout they might have at the polls. In my opinion, nuclear power world-wide is here to stay and to proliferate. Other substitutes such as solar and wind power have not caught on despite government encouragement and, as I stated at the outset, regardless of what OPEC may do, eventually we have got to rely on something else and so far, I see nothing better than nuclear power. Whatever Happened To Patience?

"Patience" has always been considered a virtue. Today, it appears somewhat of a nonentity that has exited from our daily lives. The 80's lifestyle is hedonistic and conducive to instant satisfaction on demand. Whatever happened to the adage "all good things come to those who wait"?

There is a "one hour service" mentality today that has deterred attempts in waiting for anything. We can have our suits pressed, eyeglasses made, hairstyle blow dried, enjoy breakfast at a fast food restaurant while shopping with our instant credit card - no patience required. Are we utilizing these timesavers to best advantage? Perhaps, if we make time for using instant fitness in a 45 minute aerobics class or jogging session.

This impatience has contributed to numerous lucrative markets to accommodate individuals who can't wait, or don't want to be bothered with additional work - disposable services where paper goods from coffee cups and diapers to plastic dinnerware can be purchased easily and disposed of at will. There is Federal Express and Instant Printing as well as instant tanning salons, video recorders and 60 minute photo developing outlets. The list continues ad infinitum.

Dr. Benjamin Spock, noted pediatrician and authority on child care, cautioned parents in his earlier books against instant gratification for babies. This might range from picking up an infant too quickly, feeding on demand or succumbing to temper tantrums. But, isn't this the very behavior practiced by adults today?

I am an advocate of the rewards of patience. The greater percentage of luxuries and demi-necessities were appreciated far more when a wait was involved. "Nothing worthwhile ever comes easy". True, with some exceptions like pizza, MTV - 24 hours of non-stop gratification and Instant Lotto.

What will the impact of all this impatience be on the present generation? Is impatience the precursor to easy defeat and apathy? Are they going to expect instant success, forfeiting drive and ambition when their aspirations are not met quickly enough? Their tolerance levels have been lowered by conditioning to impatience. Is instant divorce another learned example of the easy way out rather than working through problems with one of the greatest virtues "patience"? It really does go a long way if you just give it time.....

Q: What is the policy of restaurants when a waiter spills something on you? **F.P.**

A: There is no set policy except that the management usually is very apologetic. Almost all places ask to assume the cost of cleaning your clothing. Others do this and void the check for the entire meal. Or small spasms they usually do what they can at once to clean up the spot. If you happen to hit at the right time you will get the best but later it will get more soggy. The best tip is ordering the potato, ask the server whether they are freshly baked or not. If not, better take something else.

Q: When figuring the tip for service, how is it figured, on the total bill with tax or on the bill before tax? **E.R.**

A: Generally it is figured before the tax is added although the amount of a tip is a purely personal thing and it ranges from 15 to 20 percent. Usually where the service is great you compute it as high as 20 percent.

Q. At a table with others we don't know at a banquet, what do you do about tips—if anything?
A. At public dinners there is sometimes a small card on each table which reads "Gratuities have been taken care of by the Dinner Committee"—a very good idea. If there is no such card at the table, the waiters, immediately after the service of dessert and coffee and before the speaking begins, come to the host or hostess of each table and place a silver salver before him or her, often with a murmured explanation that something is expected for the table's waiters. Unless all at the table are personally invited guests, the host or hostess makes no attempt to tip for the whole table but after placing a dollar (per service for which he or she feels responsible) on the tray, directs the waiter to the gentlemen at the table, each of whom should leave (at \$10 per plate dinner) a dollar and a half for himself and the same for the lady he escorts. Women should never be approached for tips if there are gentlemen at the table.

Q. Last night we had fish and the host ordered a burgundy wine for the table. Isn't this use of a red wine in poor taste?
A. If it is in poor taste it would be up to the people consuming it to determine that it was not to their liking. The old fashioned etiquette about red wines being for meat and white for fish were a tradition but no one has to honor a tradition that is not to their particular liking. Get red wine with fish if you like.

TURBOT BRAISED WITH CHAMPAGNE AND WILD MUSHROOMS

- 1/2 bottle Moët & Chandon
- 6-oz. Filet of Turbot (from Holland)
- 8-ozs. unsalted butter
- 2 tbsps. finely chopped Shallots
- 2 tbsps. finely cut chives
- 1 lb. small oyster mushrooms (stems removed)
- 3 cups heavy cream
- Salt and pepper to taste

Use 2 ounces butter to coat large skillet.

Add shallots and Moët & Chandon to skillet.

Season turbot fillets with salt and pepper, and add to skillet with the oyster mushrooms.

Place buttered parchment paper on top, and place in hot oven for 15 minutes.

Remove turbot fillets, and re-serve in warm place.

Put skillet on high fire, and reduce until about 1/2 cup of broth is left.

Add cream and reduce further, until sauce becomes thick enough to coat a spoon.

Place turbot fillets on hot plates.

Remove sauce from fire, and whisk in the remaining butter and chives.

Spoon sauce over turbot, and serve with flowers made from puff pastry.

Serves 6

Note: The very dry, yeasty and full-bodied Dom Perignon, 1978, goes very well with the beautiful texture and rich preparation (with cream and butter) of the turbot.

RANCHO BERNARDO INN'S FRESH SALMON TARTARE WITH CAVIAR

- 12 ozs. fresh salmon steak completely clean all bones removed
- 6 slices smoked salmon
- 3 ozs. Sevruga Caviar
- 1 lemon
- 1/2 cup regular homemade mayonnaise
- 1 tsp. finely chopped cornichons
- 1 tsp. finely chopped fresh tarragon
- 1 tsp. finely chopped shallots
- 1 tsp. finely chopped chives
- 1 tsp. Quality dijon mustard

Chop fresh salmon very finely with knife. (Do not use grinder or any other method).

Combine mayonnaise with lemon juices, mustard, chives, shallots, tarragon and cornichons in salad bowl and mix gently.

Add salmon to this mixture and work gently.

Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Divide the salmon mixture over the six smoked salmon slices and

make rectangular package.

Place in the center of chilled plate, and place 1/2 ounce of caviar on top of each package.

Garnish with sprigs of fresh dill. Serves 6

Note: The Dom Ruinart Blanc de Blanc served with this dish, dry, crisp, and very clean, underlines the quality and freshness of the salmon and caviar preparation without overpowering it.

GEORGE'S AT THE COVE ANAHEIM PEPPERS STUFFED WITH FLASHGRILLED ABALONE

- 8 Anaheim peppers (charred and peeled whole)
- 1 lb. abalone steaks (white preferable)
- 1/4 pound Maui onion (medium dice)
- 1/4 lb. white corn kernels (fresh)
- 1 bunch cilantro (medium chop)
- 1/2 cup Parmesan (freshly grated)
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 shot brandy
- 1 oz. clarified butter
- 1 pint fresh salsa

On the charbroiler, grill the abalone very hot on each side about 1 1/2 minutes or until 3/4 of the way cooked. Cut into thin julienne.

In a saute pan add 1 ounce clarified butter, the onion, corn and abalone. Cook until onions are clear. Cool. When cool, add the cilantro and the brandy, salt and pepper to taste. (Reserve at room temperature.)

On a cutting board lay out the chilies lengthwise. Slice from the stem cap down 3/4 of the way. Leave the seeds if you like it spicy.

Stuff the chilies with abalone mixture, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and bake at 350 F about 10 minutes. Serve on fresh salsa.

GEORGE'S AT THE COVE BLUE CHEESE FLAN

- 10-inch pie plate or spring form pan
- 1/4 cup dry white bread crumbs
- 2 tbsps. butter at room temperature
- 8 ozs. blue cheese
- 1 lb. cream cheese
- 3 eggs plus 1 yolk
- 1 1/2 cups sour cream
- 1 tsp. salt
- Freshly ground pepper
- 1 tsp. fresh dill or 1 tsp. dried

Butter pie plate, press bread crumbs into it, refrigerate. Blend butter, blue cheese and cream cheese with food processor. Next blend in the eggs, 1/2 cup of sour

cream and seasonings and herbs. May keep overnight in refrigerator.

Pour mixture into pan and place in 375 F oven. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until custard has puffed and just set. Remove from oven, spread remaining sour cream on the top and finish cooking for last 20 minutes. Remove from oven and serve immediately. May also be served cold.

Serves 6 to 8

PIRETS POACHED PEACHES WITH GORGONZOLA

- 4 ripe peaches, skin removed, lightly covered with lemon juice
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup white wine
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup cassis
- 4 strips lemon rind
- 4 tbsps. gorgonzola cheese

Dissolve sugar in liquid ingredients.

Bring to a simmer for 3 minutes.

Poach peaches in liquid for approximately 4 minutes, or until a skewer penetrates easily.

Cool peaches in liquid. When cooled, remove pit, making as small an incision as possible.

Fill with nugget of gorgonzola cheese.

Serve in a glass with poaching liquid and a sprig of mint.

Note: You may want to top with caramelized walnuts.

PIRETS SALMON SALAD WITH CORN AND NEW PEAS

- 8 oz. salmon filet, bones and skin removed and sliced evenly on the diagonal into 4 portions
- 3 tbsps. chopped shallots
- 2 tbsps. lemon juice
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 1/2 cup fresh cooked corn, removed from cob
- 1/2 cup new peas
- 4 leaves butter lettuce
- Salt and pepper to taste

Season salmon with salt and pepper and poach in wine, lemon juice and shallots.

Add peas and corn to pan. Heat gently.

Place salmon and vegetables on butter lettuce.

Sauce the salad with poaching liquid and a dollop of Caper whipped cream.

(This salad is also delicious served cold.)

CAPER WHIPPED CREAM

- 1/2 cup whipped cream
- 1 tbsp. tomato puree
- 2 tbsps. fresh chopped tarragon

Whisk cream, tomato puree, tarragon and lemon juice together.

Chinese soups quick, easy and delicious

Chinese soups make an excellent first course for both Oriental and Occidental dinners, and can be the main course for a lunch or a light evening meal. Like many Oriental dishes, they are both visually attractive and nutritious. The versions included in today's column can be prepared quickly and easily in the American kitchen.

Soups are an important part of almost every Chinese dinner. Instead of serving them as a first course, as we do, the Chinese serve soups at the end of the meal. Typically, Chinese soups are a light broth, usually clear or translucent, with vegetables, spices and, sometimes, meat added. An exception are the "winter soups" of Hunan province, which are thick and hearty, and help drive

off the bitter cold of the Hunan winters.

Some of the traditional Chinese soups contain very expensive or hard-to-obtain ingredients. Serving these soups is a message to guests that their presence is a very special occasion. Birds' Nest Soup, for example, is made from the nests of tiny swifts that live only along sheer cliffs, so that gathering the nests is both difficult and dangerous.

Today's recipes are for two traditional Chinese soups — Shining Noodle Soup from Hunan Province and Hot and Sour Soup from Szechuan Province — and for an original creation, Chicken and Watercress Soup, which uses many of the traditional Chinese ingredients in a new combination.

We have adapted the two Chi-

nese recipes somewhat, so that ingredients are available at supermarkets or, as noted, at Oriental specialty stores.

A couple of the ingredients may be unfamiliar to many readers, but are available in any Oriental food store. Tree ears, optional in the recipe for Hot and Sour Soup, are a wood fungus used in many Oriental recipes. Their taste is similar to that of mushrooms, but they have a delicate flavor all their own. The noodles for the Shining Noodle Soup, though they are called "vermicelli," must not be confused with the pasta of the same name that you will find in every supermarket. The staff at any Oriental market will know just what you want.

When you thicken the broths for today's soups, be sure not to make them too thick. They should be transparent, and have a light, velvety texture.

Ingredients available at Oriental specialty stores are indicated by an asterisk (*).

HOT SHREDDED BEEF AND SHINING NOODLE SOUP

- Preparation/cooking time: 25 minutes
- 1/2 to 3/4 lb. beef, shredded with a sharp knife
 - 1 tsp. cornstarch
 - 1 tsp. water
 - 1 pinch black pepper
 - 1 tsp. soy sauce
 - 3 tbsps. peanut oil
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1 tbsp. fermented black beans, rinsed and chopped
 - 1 tsp. minced garlic
 - 4 cups chicken broth
 - 1 cup (or one 2-oz. bunch) shining noodles, (Chinese vermicelli)*, soaked in hot water for 20-30 minutes, until soft
 - 1 tsp. cayenne
 - 2 tbsps. soy sauce
 - 1/2 tsp. sesame oil
 - 2 scallions, thinly sliced

In medium bowl, mix together cornstarch, water, pepper and soy sauce. Add shredded beef and toss well. Heat wok over high heat and add peanut oil. Heat until oil just begins to smoke.

Add salt, black beans and garlic, and mash together with long-handled fork until they give off a pungent fragrance. Add chicken broth and drained noodles and bring to a boil. Add shredded beef, cayenne and soy sauce, and stir. Return to the boil.

Remove from heat, garnish with sliced scallions and sesame oil, and serve.

Serves 4 to 6.

HOT AND SOUR SOUP

- Preparation/cooking time - 25 minutes, plus do-ahead steps
- 6 dried Chinese mushrooms*
 - 6 tiger lily buds (optional)*
 - 6 tree ears (optional)*
 - 1 large pork chop
 - 2 chicken breasts, skinned and boned with all fat removed
 - 8 cups chicken broth
 - 4 slices smoked ham, cut into thin slivers
 - 1/4 cake tofu, cut into small pieces
 - 1/2 cup canned bamboo shoots, thinly sliced*
 - 4 scallions, thinly sliced

- 1 egg, beaten
 - 2 tbsps. cornstarch dissolved in 1 tbsp. water
- Seasonings:
- 2 tbsps. soy sauce
 - 2 tbsps. rice wine or cooking sherry
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1 tsp. ground white pepper
 - 3 tbsps. white vinegar
 - 2 tbsps. sesame oil*
 - 1-2 tbsps. hot pepper oil
 - 1/4 tsp. ground coriander

Do-ahead steps:

1. Place dried mushrooms, tiger lily buds and tree ears in small bowl and cover with boiling water to soften. Allow to sit for about 20 minutes.
2. Drop pork chop into small pot of boiling water and cook about 5 minutes, or until cooked through. Remove and set aside to cool.
3. Shred chicken meat with sharp knife, and mix it with a spoonful of cornstarch mixture.
4. Shred into matchstick-size pieces the cooled pork, tiger lily buds and bamboo shoots. Slice mushrooms and tear tree ears into small pieces.

Final steps:

In large pot, bring broth to a boil and allow to simmer about 10 minutes.

Drop chicken into simmering broth.

Add pork, tiger lily buds and bamboo shoots, mushrooms and tree ears to simmering broth, along with ham, tofu and scallions.

While soup is simmering, pour beaten egg in in a stream, stirring with a fork or whisk. Add remaining cornstarch mixture. Add seasonings. The sour, hot and salty flavors should balance, so adjust seasonings to taste. A little more cornstarch may be added too, depending on personal preference. This soup should have a velvety texture, but should not be too thick.

Serves 6 to 8.

CHICKEN AND WATERCRESS SOUP

- Preparation/cooking time - 25 minutes
- 9 cups chicken broth
 - 2 chicken breasts, skinned and boned with all fat removed
 - 2 tbsps. cornstarch
 - 1 tbsp. dry sherry
 - 2 bunches of watercress
 - 1 cake tofu
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 6 thinly sliced scallions
 - 3 tbsps. soy sauce
 - 2 tbsps. sesame oil*

In large pot, bring chicken broth to a boil and simmer for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, shred chicken meat and marinate briefly in cornstarch and dry sherry.

Wash watercress and remove large stems. Set aside in a colander to dry. Cut tofu into small chunks. With broth simmering, pour beaten egg in in a stream, stirring with a fork or whisk. Add shredded chicken, scallions, tofu, soy sauce and sesame oil. At this point the soup can be set aside.

Just before serving, bring soup to a boil and add watercress, stir and allow to cook 1 or 2 minutes.

Serves 6 to 8.

Aside from their wonderfully appetizing looks and marvelous, exotic flavors, Oriental foods always seem to sport such interesting textures. Contrast is the name of the game here. Chewy or soft foods are often jazzed up with a bit of crunch: from toasted cashews or slivered almonds to bits of crisp-tender celery, sliced water chestnuts, or bamboo shoots.

The last is ubiquitous in Oriental cookery. These are the young, tender, edible roots of certain bamboo plants (not all bamboo is edible). And only the white, inner section of the shoot is eaten.

It's almost impossible to find fresh bamboo shoots in most parts of this country, so most of us must make do with canned bamboo shoots. But that's not so bad, since these munchy morsels are already peeled, cut, precooked, and ready to eat. All you have to do is drain them.

If, after opening a can, you don't use all the shoots at once, drain them and place in a jar filled with water. Cover tightly and refrigerate. Change water each day, and sprouts will remain fresh for up to a week.

While bamboo shoots aren't terribly nutritious, they do add a lot in the way of texture — and for not too many calories (about 40 per cup). Add to salads, egg dishes, any stir-fry dish and Oriental soups, like today's Egg Drop Soup. (If you have a few leftover mushrooms, peas or a bit of cooked chicken, cut into small pieces and add to soup for more flavor.)

Bamboo Chicken with Snow Peas is as flavorful as it is pretty to look at, and Oriental Stir-Fry makes an elegant side-dish with a simple broiled steak.

EGG-DROP SOUP

- 2 (13 3/4 oz.) cans chicken broth
- 2 tpsps. each cornstarch and water
- 1 (4 oz.) can sliced bamboo shoots, drained
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- Soy sauce and pepper to taste

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Pour chicken broth into 1 1/2-quart glass casserole. Cover and microwave 4 minutes.

In small dish, stir together cornstarch and water to make smooth paste. Gradually blend in a little of the hot broth, to thin, then stir cornstarch mixture into broth in casserole.

Stir in bamboo shoots and green onions. Cover and microwave 2 to

3 minutes longer, stirring every minute, until soup is clear, slightly thickened and heated through.

Remove from oven and immediately stir in beaten eggs. Season, if desired, with soy sauce and pepper. Serve hot.

Serves 4.

ORIENTAL STIR-FRY

- 2 tbsps. butter or margarine
- 1 (6-oz.) package frozen Chinese snow pea pods
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced mushrooms
- 1/4 cup canned bamboo shoots
- 1 green onion, sliced

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Thaw snow peas, in package, 2 to 3 minutes on HIGH, or until they can be easily separated.

Preheat browning skillet as directed by manufacturer. Add butter or margarine and allow to melt. Immediately add all remaining ingredients.

Cover and microwave 4 to 6 minutes, stirring every 2 minutes* until vegetables are crisp-tender, and heated through.

Serves 3 to 4.

BAMBOO CHICKEN WITH SNOW PEAS

- 3 whole (or 6 half) breasts of chicken, skinned and boned
- 1/2 lb. fresh Chinese snow pea pods, or 2 (6 oz.) packages frozen snow peas, thawed
- 1 (4 oz.) can mushroom stems and pieces, drained
- 3 green onions, sliced
- 1 (6 oz.) can bamboo shoots, drained
- 1 chicken bouillon cube, or 1 tsp. bouillon granules
- 3 tbsps. soy sauce
- 3 tbsps. water
- 2 tbsps. cornstarch
- 1/4 tsp. each salt, pepper and sugar
- 1/4 cup slivered almonds

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Cut chicken into small chunks. If using fresh pea pods, rinse thoroughly and trim off ends.

Place chicken in 2-quart glass casserole, cover. Microwave 6 to 9 minutes, stirring every 2 minutes until chicken is no longer pink.

Stir in pea pods, mushrooms, and onions. Cover and microwave 3 minutes, stirring after 1 1/2 minutes.

Stir in bamboo shoots.

In small bowl, blend together chicken bouillon, soy sauce, water, cornstarch, salt, pepper and sugar. Pour over chicken mixture.

Cover and microwave 3 to 5 minutes longer, or until sauce thickens and dish is heated through. Sprinkle with almonds.

Serve hot over rice.

Here's How

Q. We have just purchased a 30-year-old home with pine ceilings and beams throughout. We really like the wood ceilings. However, in one room someone has spray-painted stripes in fluorescent orange along with glow-in-the-dark snowflakes which are stuck on the ceiling.

We would like to remove the spray paint and snowflakes without damaging the wood. We would appreciate any help you can give. — Mrs. D.

A. First try removing the stuck-on snowflakes by saturating as much as possible with Spray and Wash (sold in supermarkets for use on stubborn laundry soil). This should release the adhesive quality of the stuck-on appliques.

Once you have removed the snowflakes, you will need to remove the paint with a commercial paint remover. I suggest that you treat the entire ceiling. The stripes may take more than one application. Be sure to follow manufacturer directions carefully.

Refinishing the ceiling is going to be quite a chore, but it is the only way to maintain the natural

look of the pine wood. Once all of the existing finish and paint on the ceiling have been removed, you can seal the surface with Thompson's Water Seal in color, which is a transparent color that will restore the natural look. Or, you can use a penetrating sealer for wood. Check with your local paint dealer for recommended sealers.

Q. I have an antique cut-glass vase that has a mineral buildup from water. I have tried everything to remove this cloudy appearance without any success.

I would appreciate your help in finding a way to remove this and restoring the beauty of the vase. — J.W.G.

A. White vinegar, heated but not hot, applied with a stiff toothbrush will usually remove this type of stain. If this fails, use a strong solution of oxalic acid. Be sure to wear rubber gloves.

Q. We live in a house whose previous owners used tile scraps to cover walls around the bathtub. The problem the glue used in put-

ting up the tile leaked and dripped in several places.

I have not had success in cleaning the glue off the top of the tile with household cleaners. Do you have any suggestions? — S.L.D.

A. First check with a local tile dealer and see what he would recommend for cleaning the tile mastic you might purchase from a tile dealer. Unfortunately, it is hard to know what type of glue was used and different types of glue would call for different cleaning methods.

If you have no luck with the tile dealer recommendation, try using a hair dryer to heat the glue. When it becomes tacky, you may be able to scrap the excess glue off the tile. Be careful not to damage the surface of the tile.

If this does not achieve the desired result, try rubbing the affected areas with a fine grade of steel wool and naphtha.

Q. I read recently in your column about how to restore the red color to a concrete patio. Could the same process be applied to red bricks? Would the application of Thompson Water Seal tend to leave the surface tacky? Thank you for a prompt reply. — L.R.R.

A. To clear the concrete patio, and to clean your brick, we recommend a strong solution of trisodium phosphate and warm water (1 cup to 1 gallon of water). If the brick is excessively dirty add household bleach to this mixture (1 quart to every 3 gallons of solution).

"My Body — My Decision" presents in readily understandable text what you should know about the most common female surgeries. Each of the procedures is presented as a chapter, with sections including a definition of the disease or organs to be affected, abbreviations, common and technical names for the procedure, the functions of the body parts affected — and then what happens in the removal and after the removal, how common the surgery, a description of the procedure, the testing process (before, during and post-operative), advantages and disadvantages of the surgery, the type of anesthesia used, possible complications, the probable outcome from the surgery and post-operative concerns.

The book is a no-nonsense guide to the procedures and what they mean to your body — pro, con and otherwise — and presents its in-

Decor Score

Q. We have a window-sized opening between our living room and dining room.

We like this opening because it makes the rooms seem larger and provides both rooms with more natural light. Our problem is that the "window" visually dominates the living room and is rather low so that most of our furniture can't be used along that wall.

Any ideas? — C.Y.

A. Take a look at the room pictured for some artful solutions to your problem.

Notice how a low built-in sofa has been used along this wall, centered upon the opening. The sofa does not obstruct the opening and directs the attention of those seated to views elsewhere in the room. This minimizes the "window" as a focal point since you surely wouldn't want to place your seating so that you and your guests face a framed view of the dinner remains.

Because the opening occupies a space over the sofa that might otherwise be taken by a work of art, try treating the view as a painting. Use matching or complementary colors in the dining room and compose the furnishings (as much as possible) to create an appealing "picture" from the living room.

You might also want to put the opening to work. If it is deep enough, the "windowsill" can double as a buffet surface on the dining room side with recessed lights above.

Presto! You've got a very serviceable work of living (and dining) art.

Q. We are getting ready to decorate a room for our 4-year-old. I read somewhere that the choice of colors for children is really important. Is this true or just hype? — M.D.

A. Some very interesting recent research indicates that this is indeed true. Several studies have shown that children prefer bright primary colors (used either alone or in combination) to any blendings of these colors.

Studies also have demonstrated that even infants have particular color preferences and that color can affect mood and activity level.

Designers who specialize in children's rooms feel it is important for a child to choose the colors of his room. Some even claim to see improved attitudes, behavior and school work in children whose rooms were designed around their favorite colors.

If your child is pre-verbal, you can determine his favorite color by offering him the same toy in an array of colors. See which one he reaches for or looks at the most. Like an adult, a child's color preference can change through time.

Q. I need to add some personality to my living room. Please give me some ideas for a country casual look.

I'm starting from scratch because I have recently taken up old carpeting and refinished the wood floors. I will slipcover my sofa and chairs. — T.B.

A. Furniture is important in a room and creates a style, but the background and accessories are equally important, so consider all three elements.

Providing the proper background can be done with an attractive country casual wallpaper. Or paper the upper half of the walls and wood panel the lower half. Add wide wood molding to the ceiling, at the floor and around the windows.

Top your gleaming refinished floors with a primitive rug.

Accessorize with country items — both decorative and functional. Slipcover your furniture in fabrics that lend an appropriate traditional feeling to your room — heavily woven and textured solids, stripes, florals, floral-stripes, paisleys, plaids and checks.

Q. Soft blue-gray carpeting was installed in my condominium by the previous owner who liked blue, greens and turquoise. Those are not my favorite colors and I want to change the color scheme, but I hate to rip up the nearly new plush carpeting.

What colors could I combine with it to warm up the rooms? — R.C.

A. A beautiful possibility would

be rose and mauve. Paint the walls the palest mauve and add deep tones in the upholstery. Try to combine the blue/gray and the mauve/rose in a floral fabric for draperies or blinds and maybe an important chair or pair of chairs. That combination can be beautiful beyond words — so soft and restful, yet so warm.

Q. I love the look of country English but I fear I cannot reproduce the look in my little apartment, although I have some nice English reproductions such as a Queen Anne dining suite, a pair of Chipendale end tables, and a Chesterfield sofa.

Is it possible for my English furniture to create a kind of English charm? — P.B.

A. Certainly you have an excellent start. Use a large floral pattern on some furniture, tiny floral prints on other pieces and perhaps a plaid or two-color stripe on something else.

Use an important window treatment in the same fabrics such as draperies with cornices and swags. Accessorize with gleaming silver, crystal and brass.

Check books featuring historic homes of Britain. Look at wall accessories and how favorite plates, for example, can be massed together on a wall. Or hang an important picture on a wide ribbon affixed to the ceiling cornice.

Add stock moldings to your walls for a hint of architectural detailing.

Q. What can you tell me about this watch? It is an American Waltham No. 5,615,262.

The multicolor 14K hunting case is set with a one-third carat mine-cut diamond. The movement is a 17-jewel Crescent St.

Q. I have a 13-by-17-inch Wedgwood platter decorated all over with flowers and birds. A copy of the mark is enclosed. Can you tell me when it was made and its value?



A. Your platter was not made by the famous Josiah Wedgwood of Etruria. It was made by Podmore Walker of Tunstall. They tried to capitalize on Josiah's fame.

It was made in the mid-19th century and would sell in the \$125 to \$135 range.

A. The serial number indicates that your watch was made in 1891. Although the value will vary according to the current price of gold bullion (about \$350/troy ounce at present), it should be worth from \$3,000 to \$4,000 depending on the quality of the diamond.

Q. I have been collecting bells for several years without really knowing much about their actual values and desirability as collectibles. Could you list some of the more popular ones and their market value?

A. Practically all kinds of bells are collectible. It is just that some are more valuable than others.

- Animal bells (horse, cow, sheep, etc.) — \$5 to \$35.
- Carnival Glass (Fenton) — \$375.
- Carnival Glass (Imperial) — \$125.
- Railroad Dining Car — \$125.
- Pewter (Normal Rockwell) — \$35.
- Hummel, Freedom — \$85.
- Trolley Car — \$85.
- Cranberry Glass — \$20.
- Cut Glass — \$150.
- Solid brass (all kinds of figurals) — \$50 to \$200.

Points on Pets

Q. I am caring for a pregnant ewe for a school project. Although I have read some information regarding pregnancy disease in sheep, I still feel unprepared to properly care for my ewe. Any information that you can give me will be greatly appreciated.

A. Pregnancy disease in sheep is known by many names. Examples are ketosis, lambing sickness, twin lamb disease, lambing paralysis and pregnancy toxemia.

Pregnancy disease in ewes is very serious during late pregnancy.

Early signs of the disease are often erratic and difficult to detect. Symptoms include listlessness, loss of appetite, aimless walking, leaning against solid objects, twitching of muscles of the ears and around the eyes, unusual postures, grinding of teeth, progressive loss of reflexes, blindness, unsteadiness and coma.

Pregnancy toxemia occurs in all breeds of ewes, and usually is seen in second and subsequent pregnancies. Thin ewes and obese ewes carrying twins or triplets are most likely to develop the disease. It is observed most commonly during the spring months when most ewes are in late pregnancy and lambing.

The primary predisposing cause of pregnancy disease is undernutrition in late pregnancy. Eighty percent of the lamb's physical growth occurs during the last six weeks. The growing lamb fetuses require approximately 80 grams of glucose daily. The normal non-pregnant sheep produces and uses for its maintenance approximate-

ly 90 grams of glucose daily. Therefore pregnant ewes, especially ewes carrying twins or triplets, often do not have an adequate supply of glucose to support their own maintenance and the growth of their lambs.

Pregnant ewes should not be stressed during late pregnancy — any external stress, such as fasting or transporting, predisposes them to pregnancy disease.

The diagnosis is usually based on the clinical signs and tests for ketone bodies in the urine. Your veterinarian can instruct you regarding testing your ewe.

Treatment usually involves the administration of glucose solutions intravenously. If advanced signs are seen, an emergency cesarean section may be required.

The extremes of physical condition, thinness and obesity, should be avoided. During the last two months of pregnancy, the dietary energy and protein should be gradually increased. The diet should contain approximately 11 percent protein. A daily grain supplement consisting of one-half pound of corn or barley per ewe is an excellent energy source.

Pregnancy disease in sheep can be avoided through proper management procedures. Your veterinarian can give you additional advice on raising your ewe and can evaluate your nutritional program.

Raising lambs can be a very enjoyable and profitable experience.
