Giese Park Civics Meet On Monday

The Giese Park Civic Association will meet August 4 at 7 p.m. in the community room of the Hicksville Library. The main topic will be an update on the Giese Park issue.

At the last meeting of the association on June 30, plans for proposed development of the property by the Town of Oyster Bay were presented to the residents. These plans included two soccer fields, an off street parking facility, a children's play area and underground plumbing for a future restroom building. These plans were unanimously denounced by the residents who stated that the plans represented a sports complex rather than a park and that such a facility was not appropriate for a residential neighborhood in close proximity to private homes. Alternatives to these plans were discussed, which included a more passive

park, the return of the property to the tax rolls for the building of homes and the development of senior citizen housing. All of these ideas were acceptable to the residents, whose utmost concern is maintaining the residential atmosphere of the neighborhood. A town attorney has been requested to attend the meeting to answer questions concerning the issue. Also at the meeting, plans will be discussed for residents to go to Town Hall to express their views to all members of the Town Board.

A spokesperson for the association has stated that the town's plan for the property is estimated to cost the taxpayers approximately \$700,000 and could very well be more. The spokesperson also stated that the quality of life of the neighborhood is at stake and urges all interested persons to attend.

McDonald's Hearing Rescheduled For Aug. 26

The Oyster Bay Town Board has rescheduled a public hearing for August 26, on an application for a special use permit in Hicksville, according to Town Councilman John Venditto.

Venditto said, "The applicants, McDonald's Corporation and Paumanock Development Corporation, are requesting a special use permit to erect a restaurant with a drive-thru window in an 'H' industrial district."

The property is located on the east side of Broadway (Route 107), south of Louis (First Street) in Hicksville.

"Prior to the original July 8 hearing date," Venditto explained, "the attorney for the applicant requested an adjournment. The Town Board was able to add the hearing to the calendar of August 26, 1986."

The hearing has been scheduled for 10 a.m., in the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Blood Transfusion Service At Hosp.

The Mid-Island Hospital Transfusion Service has been granted renewal of accreditation by the American Association of Blood Banks (AABB), according to James J. Dickson, Administrator of the 223 bed health care facility.

Accreditation occurred after an intensive on-site inspection by specially trained representatives of the Association. They established that the level of medical, technical and administrative performance within the facility met or exceeded the rigorous standards set by the AABB.

By successfully meeting the requirements for Certification, the Mid-Island Hospital's Transfusion Service joined more than 2,200 similar facilities across the United States and abroad that have earned the Accreditation rating and recognition.

Mr. Dickson said: "The AABB's inspection and accreditation procedures are voluntary. It is not legally necessary for a blood bank or transfusion service to be accredited, but like many others, our facility has always sought accreditation because it represents a level of professional and medical expertise that meets and exceeds government regulations. The primary goal of the program is to assist facilities like ours to achieve excellence, and thus provide higher quality blood, blood components and other services to patients."

Dr. Manuel Bigvera, Director of the Hospital's Transfusion Services said, "the standards for blood banks and transfusion services are written by a distinguished panel of experts in the field, composing the AABB Committee on Standards. The AABB National Committee on Inspection and Accreditation assures compliance before granting accreditation."

Founded in 1947, the AABB is the only national organization in the United States devoted exclusively to blood banking and blood transfusion services. Its membership of scientists, physicians, nurses, medical technologists and administrators is engaged in all aspects of the field. Other programs and services offered by the AABB include the national clearinghouse, a mechanism allowing donors to replace blood for friends or relatives living anywhere in the country; the rare donor file; frozen blood depots; continuing education programs, reference laboratories for information exchange and consultation; a voluntary hepatitis detection/testing program; public professional information services and professional publications.

Hicksville Bd. Appoints Willet Avenue Principal

In a short mid-summer session held Wednesday, July 30, the Hicksville Board of Education approved the appointment of Michael Dunn as Principal of Willet Avenue School. Mr. Dunn replaces Jack Schwartz who served one year as the school's administrator following the death of John Maher.

The Board was asked to accept the salary recommendation in Superintendent Catherine Fenton's contract. By a vote of 6 to 1, Dr. Fenton received approval for an 8% adjustment, raising her annual salary to \$51,000.

President William Bennett focused on the Board's five-year goals formulated in 1985. The Board set specific achievement aims in the areas of mathematics and language arts, guidance services on the secondary level, tracking student mastery of basic skills and developing an improvement plan for the secondary program.

Under the secondary program plan, the Board has targeted the implementation of the Regents Action Plan and the improvement of the academic climate in the high school. Mr. Bennett noted that recent correspondence from a Hicksville resident pointed out that of the some 400 students in the class of 1986, only 26 youngsters, 6 1/2%, received a Regents diploma. Mr. Bennett said the district will be looking into the fact that such a low number of students are going into study for Regents diplomas.

The Board unanimously adopted Policy JGDA - Suspension of Handicapped Students. Because of their specific handicapping condition, certain identified students may be unable to meet behavioral standards. The policy states: "If it is determined that there is no direct link between the student's misconduct and his/her handicap, the student will be subject to the (behavioral standard) provisions of Policy JGD."

The Board received correspondence concerning low Kindergarten enrollment in one elementary school. Mr. Bennett referred the matter to Sept. Fenton and explained that enrollment is examined at the end of August and, at that time, determinations are made as to the number of classes warranted for each grade on the elementary level. The summer often brings additional residents to the district, and final figures are not available until that time.

Other actions by the Board included:

- Approval of a 9th grade social studies textbook, "Exploring World Cultures", Ginn & Co., 1986. Administration also recommended for approval the textbook "Health", Scott, Foresman - 1987, for use in Grades 11-12.
- Setting the annual fee for the district's independent auditors (Danziger, Newborn, Popkin, Tumpowsky & Co.) at \$12,000. In the last seven years, the annual contract fee has doubled, reflecting the addition of a program audit to the regular financial audit as required each year.
- Award of bids totaling \$394,920.45 for various basic services (fuel oil, sanitation, oil burner, uniform rental), as well as reconditioning of athletic equipment, sheet music, piano tuning and science supplies and equipment.
- Approval of recommendations on educational and civil service personnel matters including four resignations and eight teacher appointments.

The Board will hold a special meeting on Wednesday, August 13, in addition to its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, August 27. All meetings are held at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building.


The last of the Spring/Summer Workshops is "Nature's

workshop series for the fall and winter.



Truck Stopped With Haz. Chemicals

On July 24 at 6 p.m. the Highway Patrol stopped a tractor trailer eastbound on the L.I. Expressway, east of exit 40 Jericho. The tractor trailer is owned by the Captree Chemical Corp., 445 Winding Road, Old Bethpage. Upon inspection of the trailer it was found to contain a 55 gal. drum of Hydrogen Peroxide leaking.

Emergency Service Bureau personnel, Hazardous Material Unit, were called to the scene and closed the expressway down e/b east of exit 40. The expressway was reopened about 25 mins. later after the vehicle was removed to a safe location. About one gallon of Hydrogen Peroxide had leaked and three to four gallons of other chemicals were found to have leaked from what is believed to be from overfilled drums and a heat build up in the trailer. The combination of chemicals when combined could cause an extremely unstable situation. Two members of the ESB Haz Mat Unit entered the trailer with protective suits to aerate the trailer and check the other drums. The Jericho FD was at the scene if a wash down was needed as the interior of the trailer was inspected.

The operator John P. Rado of Huntington Station was issued 10 summonses under the New York State Transportation Laws.

Stamp Machines Added In P.O.









Easy diet changes lower fat intake

Dear Shirley: Can you give me some quick, easy ways to lower the fat in our diet?

My husband has been told to lower his cholesterol and I need to lose weight, so if we eat a low-fat diet won't that help both of us?

I work every day and I don't have time to read long books, but if you could put some tips in your column, we would really appreciate it. Thank you. — Jean and Jerry.

Dear Jean and Jerry: You're right, a low-fat diet will help you both. You can make these easy changes that will lower both cholesterol and fat considerably:

Use non-stick spray coating for all pans instead of oils or fat. Buy only lean meats. Remove any visible fat from all meats and poultry.

Use low-fat yogurt instead of sour cream. Use fettuccine instead of egg noodles. Use soft "diet" margarine instead of butter and then reduce quantities. Use "low-cal" salad dressings.

Skim off fat from all stews, casseroles, soups, chili and gravies. Use skim or low-fat dairy products and limit egg yolks to three or four per week, including cooking.

There are some great, new low-fat recipes books out now and you don't have to read the whole book, just pick out what pleases you.

Better Homes and Gardens has a good one titled "Low Fat Cooking." It's inexpensive and has many recipes.

Dear Shirley: I have seen some recent ads for some kind of pollen that is supposed to be a unique food for people. They said it's the best source of energy.

What I want to know is, should I buy some of this stuff? I am very low on energy, but it seemed quite expensive so I don't want to waste my money if it won't help me. I am a 72-year-old man. — H.R.W.

Dear H.R.W.: Pollen of any kind has no unique nutritional qualities that work to supply more energy. There are many inexpensive vitamin/mineral supplements at your local food or drugstore that will work for you. Use your money for good food and not gimmicks. There is a lot of questionable activity going on in the promotion of pollen and it is under federal investigation.

Dear Shirley: Is there any truth to the idea that taking magnesium supplements will lower a person's blood pressure? I have also heard

that calcium helps.

Could you give me some information about this? Is it still important to lower the salt intake?

I have high blood pressure and I am very interested in getting it under control. — Mr. H.M.

Dear Mr. H.M.: In a recent double-blind study, magnesium supplements did not affect a drop in blood pressure. Calcium, however, has been shown to help in certain cases.

A low-salt diet is usually recommended, plus weight reduction if one is overweight.

Medications are available to help lower blood pressure and you should see your doctor for the individual help you need.



TOB Will Amend 'Family' Definition

The Oyster Bay Town Board passed an August 26 hearing date to amend the Code of Ordinances as it relates to the definition of "Family" according to Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan Jr.

Hogan said, "the previous definition of family stated that a family is: any two (2) persons not related by blood, marriage, or legal adoption, living and cooking on the premises together as a single, non-profit housekeeping unit, both of whom are sixt-two (62) years of age or over, and residing on the premises. All other family units had to be related by blood, marriage or legal adoption."

In 1985, after several years of litigation, the Court of Appeals of the State of New York found that the Town's existing definition of family was unconstitutional since it discriminated on the basis of the traditional family definition and further on the allowance for elderly persons to share their home with an unrelated senior adult. The court decision left the method by which a Town could limit the number of unrelated persons residing together in its local municipalities.

"The Town, following a review of the various definitions used by other Towns, has patterned the new definition in conformance with the New York Court of Appeals recent decision and the leading United States Supreme Court decision," said Hogan. The new definition states that a "Family" is: any number of person, not exceeding two (2), not related by blood, marriage or adoption, and any ward of either unrelated person living and cooking together as a single housekeeping unit."

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 26, beginning at 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Our Children



Should boys do housework?

Q. Don't you think a healthy, active 14-year-old boy should help with the chores around the house? I can't imagine you saying "no," but if you did my husband would probably jump up and down with joy because you would be on his side.

We have three daughters and this big lug of a son, and my husband feels it is all women's work around the house. He comes home after work, settles down with his TV and beer and would like nothing better than to have our son join him. (He hasn't brought up the beer question yet, but I know that will come in time.)

In the meantime, all the girls and I are setting dinner and setting the table while both males are glued to the television.

I'm fed up and I sure need your support.

A. You have it, and I hope it does you some good. I wonder where he has been during recent years when so many women are sharing both the work world and the home activities with men. From diapering and feeding the baby (men), to driving a truck and entering medical and law schools (women), changes have taken place that lead to shared responsibilities. They would begin early (certainly before a boy is 14), but since it can't be any earlier than it now is, this seems to be the time to list home activities and work out "ownership" of them. You, your son, all three girls — and their father — ought to be involved. If he refuses, you might try it out with your four children.

You haven't mentioned how your daughters feel that things have been going at home, but I imagine they also would like more fair sharing of the home responsibilities.

Your son may actually enjoy participating, and if he is made aware that he has been left out (especially if you and the other children have more conversation and fun by involvement in the chores), he may offer to help. If he does, just accept the offer graciously without an "I've won" comment or smile.


Your situation reminds me of the so-called "Grandma's Law" which states that if you do this, I'll do that — or if you do these household chores I will reward you in some practical, sincere way with a "thank you," a compliment, or some other indication of how much I appreciate your involvement.

Q. A recent stage that our 11-year-old daughter has entered is driving me up the wall. She and a girlfriend of hers are inseparable, and when they are together all they seem to do is giggle and whisper. Because they are so silly, secretive and immature, I wonder whether you can suggest some ways I can help them get through this phase in their lives.

You might try having a closed door between you and them, and perhaps turn up the TV a bit louder in the room where you are. It won't "cure" them, but it might help preserve your sanity.

Q. My husband and I grew up with pets, but because we both work we didn't think it was fair to have one. However, now we have a young child, a boy almost 2 years old, and somehow we would like to have a pet for him (and for us too, of course). What we are concerned about is how well he will handle the animal. It will probably be a puppy. Do you have any suggestions as to how we can help him develop some empathy for this planned family addition?

Your handling of an attitude toward the puppy will provide a model for your little boy. Gentleness, a light touch, a display of warmth, all combined with the kind of firmness needed, often demonstrate for children that they are the way to treat a pet. If you (1) select a dog of the type that is protective and can adapt to occasional childish pranks and short attention spans and (2) monitor the relationship as much as possible, especially during the first weeks and months, you can probably look forward to an enjoyable experience for your son and both of you.

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

First SSI check may be prorated

Q. I just received my first Supplemental Security Income check. However, the amount seems quite small. Are you paid benefits from the first day of the month or from the day you apply for benefits? I didn't apply until almost the end of the month. — R.B.

A. Your first SSI check may be prorated. This means you will be paid only for the days of the month that you were actually eligible for SSI. You will not be paid for any days before the date we found you eligible for SSI. (Usually this is the date you applied for SSI.)

Q. My husband was injured while at work. He has filed a workers' compensation claim. It appears that he will not be able to work again for a very long time. Can he also file for Social Security disability? — N.F.

A. Yes. However, the Social Security disability check must be reduced if the total combined payments to you and your family are more than 80 percent of your average current earnings before becoming disabled. All earnings covered by Social Security, including amounts above the maximum taxable by Social Security, may be considered when figuring average earnings. For more information, contact your nearest Social Security office.

Q. Is it possible to pay into Social Security without working to get the necessary quarters of coverage? I have been told I need eight more quarters of coverage. — E.M.

A. No. In order to receive Social Security payments you need credit for a certain amount of work under Social Security. You can

earn Social Security credits if you work in covered employment as an employee or if you work for yourself.

In 1986 you earn one quarter of coverage for each \$440 of your covered annual earnings up to a total of four quarters for the year. No more than four quarters of coverage can be earned for any one year. If you work for yourself, you earn one quarter of coverage for each \$440 of your covered self-employment income, up to a maximum of four quarters for the year.

Contact your local Social Security office for additional information.

Q. What is the earliest age at which I can retire, and how does early retirement affect my Social Security benefit? — M.W.

A. You can retire and get Social Security as early as age 62, but your retirement check will be reduced permanently. The amount of the reduction depends on the

number of months you get checks before you reach 65.

If you start your checks early, you'll probably receive the same total sum in benefits over the years, but in smaller amounts to take account of the longer period of time you'll get them.

Q. I will be 65 later this year. I am in good health and plan to continue working. Will my continued work after 65 increase my Social Security benefit? E.K.

A. Your additional earnings may result in higher benefits. Social Security will automatically refigure your benefit after the additional earnings are credited to your record. In addition there is a special credit which adds 3 percent to your benefit for each year (1/4 of 1 percent for each month) after 65 that you do not get benefits because of work.

Q. I am receiving payments as a wife of a disabled person and as a mother of a 15-year-old child. If this child is in school, when do payments from Social Security stop for her and myself? My husband at age 65 was put on regular Social Security but we continue to receive payments. E.S.

A. If a worker is receiving retirement or disability benefits, monthly benefits can be made to an unmarried child under 18 (or under 19 if a full-time high school student). As a wife, if you are under age 62, your benefits will cease when the child reaches age 16. Contact your local Social Security office for additional information.

Q. My neighbor recently received a letter saying his disability would be reviewed. I thought Social Security had stopped re-examining people who get disability benefits. Please explain? D.B.

A. There had been a moratorium on the review of disability cases; however, as of January 1986, we have resumed the disability review. The reviews serve two purposes: first, to make sure those who are truly disabled receive all payments they are entitled to; second, to assure taxpayers that the money they pay into the disability trust fund goes to those who meet all requirements for benefits.

Q. My husband and I both receive SSI. Because of marital difficulties, we plan to separate for a while. Will this affect our SSI? D.W.

A. Yes. A change in your marital status could affect the amount of payments due you and your husband. You should notify Social Security if you separate. Any Social Security office can give you information about how this could affect your payments.



Callers Mixed In Sanctions By U.S. Against S. Africa

Callers to Input were mixed in their opinions on sanctions for South Africa in answer to this question: "Do you think that the United States should declare sanctions against South Africa at this time?" Here are some of the answers:

If some of the countries and people calling for sanctions were also working on a long-range transition plan, then the whole thing would make sense.

Yes. We must impose sanctions on South Africa to prove that America believes in freedom for everyone. We cannot go on dealing with a country that produces its products through slave conditions. We have to be ready to accept the consequences of standing up for a principle and we must pass sanctions right away.


POLITICAL HYPOCRISY

The groundswell for sanctions against South Africa is so politically and hypocritically inspired that it almost defies the expression of reasonable opinion one way or the other. Even the one man whose supposedly unprejudiced views helped to keep the radical sentiments under some kind of control, Bishop Tutu, went off the deep end recently in telling the world that the West should "go to hell!" Frankly, I believe that sanctions are likely to produce quite the opposite of the effects they are intended to do. For one thing, I believe that the black majority is not ready to take its place in the governmental or economic scheme of things -- no matter whose fault it is -- they just haven't got any of the basic requisites which would enable them even to start taking a significant place collectively in the national scheme of things. Any drastic change overnight would place them under the questionable control of despots of their own race and they would be no better off than before. The present government grew to its present state because they brought with them new ideas and an acceptance among trading, scientific, technological and consuming nations. The world, and that certainly includes us, critically needs the products that only South Africa can supply and any sanctions which would deprive us of that supply, even for a relatively short while, would produce short and long-range problems of grave consequence to our national interest. We are so worried about opinion if we should not support the black majority that we are ready to take the simplest apparent solution which, in my opinion, would actually be catastrophic. We should convince our friends abroad of the wisdom of getting President Botha and his supporters to see the light and to enact such legislation as would clearly demonstrate a complete change toward the abandonment of apartheid. He should select those blacks who have already demonstrated their capability and understanding of the consequences to the improvement of their long-range position. It's a job for teamwork and clearly spelled-out goals. It cannot be accomplished by sanctions.

The second attempt at enrollment was when my daughter turned 6. I was registered for part time studies. Regrettably, she was admitted to the hospital two days before the start of classes for an undiagnosed ailment. The high white blood count concerned me and I anticipated the worst. Fortunately, everything turned out all right but this anxiety provoking situation resulted in the curtailment of my plans.

As the years passed, I managed to take some evening courses. The idea of a major was indefinite, but there was no hurry. My practical nature considered business as a wise choice, but my aesthetic temperament relished liberal arts, especially journalism.

With all the ominous impediments deterring my progress we found it would be more feasible to tackle day classes when my daughter was older. However, this idea did not work out as most of the middle years were spent dealing with recurrent respiratory infections and a good

deal of school absence. I abhorred the "happy homemaker" role and yearned to develop my potential. But, I could not in good conscience go off and do my own thing at my child's expense. She was my number one priority.

It is ironic that throughout all these priority situations, the thought of giving up my ambition did not waver. The rapid acceleration of time brought us now to high school graduation and acceptance into four colleges! The time has come, and was ideal. Both mother and daughter would be students concurrently!

As the fates would allow, the financial picture at home changed and necessitated an additional income rather than increased educational expenses. The college deposit had been sent in and I was to register in a week's time. What was I going to do now? My husband told me to go in spite of the fact that he personally felt "my time has past". I am psyched up for higher learning, but a part of me retreats feeling guilt-ridden and selfish. I suppose its night school ad infinitum....

Is it any wonder I detest priorities. It has postponed my life, dreams and ambitions, representing adherence to primary responsibilities and self deprivation.

I am back in a dead-end job performing the same uncreative work I despised twenty five years ago. My mood is pessimism for the future coupled with a conscious realization of broken dreams. I am beginning to believe in the futility of my endeavors. But, my essential gripe is not knowing when it is ever going to be my time for consideration as a "priority".

Salads all dressed up, perfect for summer

If summer is the time to replace hot meals with cooler creations, then the homemade deli salad is the no-sweat answer.

CUCUMBER DILL SALAD

4 European (long thin) cucumbers sliced thin, lightly salted and drained in a colander and patted dry.
One-half cup white wine vinegar
One-fourth cup sugar
One-fourth teaspoon salt
One-fourth cup dill, fresh chopped
One-eighth cup ground dill seed
2 tablespoons shallots
One-fourth teaspoon white pepper
1 and one-half cups sour cream
One-half cup plain yogurt

Combine vinegar, seasonings, sour cream and yogurt. Add thinly sliced cucumbers. Allow to marinate 1 hour in refrigerator before serving.

Serves 10

WHITE BEAN SALAD
2 pounds white beans, soaked and cooked until tender and rinsed under cold water
1 cup olive oil
1 cup red onion, chopped
2 tablespoons garlic, minced
1 cup tomatoes, chopped
1 tablespoon oregano leaves, chopped
One-half cup diced green olives
One-half cup diced Greek olives
One-half cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
One-fourth cup orange juice
One-half cup chopped parsley
Salt and pepper to taste

Combine cooked beans with olive oil, lemon juice and orange juice. Add onion, tomatoes, olives and seasonings. Finish with parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Marinate at least 3 hours before serving (best if left overnight in refrigerator).

PASTA SHRIMP SALAD
One and one-half pounds fettuccine noodles
Three-fourths pound cooked shrimp
2 stems broccoli
20 mushrooms (sliced)
4 tomatoes (cut in wedges)
Oregano to taste
Black pepper to taste
Dijon dressing
1 egg yolk
4 tablespoons vinegar
1 clove garlic

2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
15 tablespoons olive oil
Salt and white pepper to taste

To make dressing, blend egg yolk, vinegar, garlic and mustard in food processor for 1 minute. Keep processor running and add 15 tablespoonsfuls of oil. Add salt and white pepper to taste.

Cook fettuccine, following package instructions. Drain, toss with other ingredients. Add Dijon dressing.

FISH FILLETS WITH LEMON-CAPER SAUCE

1 pound firm, white fish fillets
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
One-fourth cup dry white wine or dry sherry
2 tablespoons capers, drained
One-half teaspoon anchovy paste
1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
1 teaspoon dill weed
5 tablespoons butter
2 scallions, finely chopped
1 heaping tablespoon sour cream
Flour for dredging
Salt and pepper to taste

Chopped fresh parsley (about 1 tablespoon) for garnish
Parsley sprigs (for garnish)

Total preparation/cooking time: 20 minutes

In a non-stick skillet, heat 4 tablespoons butter over medium-high heat. Dredge fillets in flour, saute 3 to 4 minutes per side until crisp and lightly browned. Add salt and pepper while sauteing. Versatile, varied summer squash

Serves 4 to 6.

SUMMER SQUASH PARMESAN
1 and one-half pounds summer squash, sliced one-quarter-inch thick
1 cup crushed dried bread crumbs
One-quarter cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley
1 teaspoon dried leaf basil
Dash pepper
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Preparation Time: 5 to 10 minutes

Cooking Time: 5 to 7 minutes (plus 1 to 2 minutes standing time)

Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Arrange sliced squash in bottom of a 1-quart glass casserole. Sprinkle with crushed, dried bread crumbs. Set aside.

In small bowl, combine Parmesan cheese, parsley, basil and pepper. Toss with fork to mix and sprinkle evenly over bread crumbs.

Place butter or margarine in glass custard cup; microwave 30 to 45 seconds to melt. Drizzle over Parmesan mixture.

Cover and microwave 4 to 6 minutes, rotating dish one-quarter-turn every 2 minutes until zucchini is crisp-tender. Let stand 1 to 2 minutes before serving.

Pattypan, yellow crookneck, and the ubiquitous zucchini are three varieties of abundant summer squash that keep cooks busy devising new recipes all during peak season (April through August).

FAMILY ZUCCHINI

1 and one-half pounds zucchini
One-quarter cup butter or margarine
1 and one-half cups shredded mild cheddar cheese
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 (4-ounce) can mushroom stems and pieces, drained
1 tablespoon minced pimento
One-quarter teaspoon each onion salt and pepper
1 (3-ounce) can french-fried onion rings

Preparation Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 15 minutes
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power); MEDIUM-HIGH (70 percent power)

Wash zucchini, trim off ends, and cut into one-quarter-inch cubes. Combine with butter in one-and-one-half-quart glass casserole. Cover and microwave 5 minutes on HIGH, stirring after 2 and one-half minutes.

Stir in cheese, eggs, mushrooms, pimento, onion salt and pepper. Reduce oven setting to MEDIUM-HIGH, cover and microwave 5 minutes, stirring after 2 and one-half minutes.

Sprinkle top of casserole with french-fried onion rings. Microwave, uncovered, on MEDIUM-HIGH 5 minutes longer or until heated through and knife inserted near center comes out clean.

Chilled soups ease summer heat

GARDEN GAZPACHO

4 large, ripe tomatoes
1 large cucumber
1 small red or green pepper, seeded and chopped
1 small sweet red onion, chopped
1 quart tomato juice
Juice from two limes
1 tablespoon olive oil
1 small clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon minced fresh thyme or 1 teaspoon crumbled dried thyme
One-quarter teaspoon pepper
1 (2 and one-half ounce) can sliced ripe olives, drained

Cut tomatoes in half; squeeze out seeds and discard. Chop tomatoes. Peel cucumber; scoop out seeds and discard. Combine in large bowl with all remaining ingredients except ripe olives.

Cover and chill at least several hours, or overnight. Serve cold, garnished with sliced ripe olives.

Serves 4 to 6.

MIDDLE-EASTERN SUMMER SOUP

1 large cucumber
1 quart unflavored yogurt
One-half cup chopped fresh mint leaves
One-half cup raisins
One-half cup pine nuts or chopped walnuts
One-quarter cup chopped parsley
1 tablespoon each olive oil and lemon juice
One-quarter teaspoon each salt and pepper
One-eighth teaspoon garlic powder
Water (optional)
1 lemon, thinly sliced
Dash paprika

Peel cucumber; slice lengthwise into halves. Scoop out seeds and discard. Coarsely grate cucumber.

Place cucumber in large mixing bowl. Add yogurt, mint leaves, raisins, nuts, parsley, olive oil, lemon juice, salt, pepper and garlic powder. Stir to blend well. (If you prefer a thinner soup, add a little water.)

Cover bowl and refrigerate several hours or overnight. Serve in individual bowls topped with a lemon slice and a dash of paprika.

YOGURT BISQUE

1 large cucumber
2 cups unflavored yogurt
2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
One-half cup chopped onion
1 small clove garlic, minced
One-quarter teaspoon dried dill weed
One-quarter teaspoon each salt and pepper
2 large or 3 small tomatoes,

seeded and chopped
One-quarter cup sliced green onion

Peel cucumber, slice lengthwise into halves. Scoop out seeds and discard. Cut into chunks and combine in blender container with yogurt, vinegar, onion, garlic, dill weed, salt and pepper. Cover and process briefly, until blended.

Stir tomatoes into yogurt mixture. Cover and chill at least two hours, or overnight, to blend flavors.

Serve chilled, in individual bowls, and garnish with sliced green onion. Serves 4.

CHILLED ORANGE-YOGURT SOUP

2 cups orange juice
2 cups pineapple juice
3 whole cloves
2 tablespoons honey
2 tablespoons cornstarch
One-quarter cup lemon juice
One-quarter teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup unflavored yogurt
1 orange, cubed
One-quarter cup almonds, sliced

In medium-size saucepan, mix orange juice and pineapple juice with whole cloves. Bring to a boil; simmer 10 minutes, remove cloves.

In cup, mix honey and cornstarch. Add to boiling juices and cook until slightly thick, about 2 minutes. Cool. Stir in lemon juice and cinnamon. Chill mixture thoroughly.

Before serving, stir in yogurt and orange. Garnish each serving with about 1 tablespoon of sliced almonds.

Serves 4 to 6.

more easily dried materials for arrangements. Every few years, in fact, we seed a small patch of wheat just for a fresh supply of the attractive seed stems, which are especially nice in Thanksgiving arrangements and for adding to dried bouquets, wall hangings and wreaths for kitchen decoration.

Red-twigged dogwood shrubs offer brightly colored bare twigs and branches for dried designs. The lacy skeletons of their flower clusters are also attractive dried, as are those of the elderberry. Queen Anne's Lace, a very common, beautiful "weed", produces broad, flat and lacy, white flower heads that dry into light and airy, starlike seed pod clusters.

Pearly everlasting and goldenrod are two more commonly found wild plants that dry nicely and are most useful in everlasting arrangements. The first receives its name for the pearly whiteness of both its fresh and dried flowers. The fat clusters of shiny white flowers with their dark golden centers atop light grey stems and foliage make handsome additions to dried designs.

The flat flower heads of all the yarrow - white, gold, yellow, pink and red - dry well too. Another achillea, The Pearl, bears small white double flowers that dry nicely and are valuable for a dash of frothiness to an arrangement.

Backyard Gardener

The numbers of wild and cultivated garden plants that dry easily and well for winter bouquets is quite surprising. I've found that after just a little experience drying flowers the easy way - hanging them upside down in small bundles in a dark, airy place - just the look of a flower or seed head often indicates quite clearly its suitability for easy drying.

Last year, for example, we had a nice patch of French sorrel, whose leaves we love to munch for their lemony fresh tang, go to seed. It was fascinating to watch the stems grow - and grow - until they produced many sprays of thickly clustered, tiny seed pods in pink and creamy green. They looked as though they might dry well.

Cut and gathered with elastic bands into bundles of just a few stems each and hung upside down in a cupboard, the clusters did drop some of their seed capsules but not enough to affect their appearance. In fact, brought out late last winter, the tall stalks looked surprisingly lovely, their feathery texture and delicate colors quite intact.

I used the tall, elegant look of these dried sorrel seed stalks as the background for an arrangement in an old shopping basket that had na. filled with he! held the stat. together.

er with other dried seed pods and flowers made a warm statement of welcome against the wall facing our front door.

The sorrel seed stalks in the final arrangement combined nicely with narrow, twisted pink spikes of Russian statice (*Statice suworowii*) and the broad, pink-bronze heads of dried showy sedum, accented with shiny pink and white daisy-like *Xeranthemum* blooms on their slender, airy stems.

Leisurely but regular prorlings through the garden can unearth surprising and unusual materials for dried arrangements - an onion plant in flower, for example, or a plantain weed in the lawn with its narrow, nicely curved spike.

Chive flowers and flowering ornamental onions (*Allium*) seed balls and heads all dry well too. Even garlic and leek plants are potential dried decorative materials.

Nigella, or love-in-a-mist, seed pods are airy, delicate affairs perfect for dried bouquets. Poppy seed pods, commonly found in home gardens, are useful additions to winter arrangements. Even lily and peony seed pods can be used in this way. For accents of silver in arrangements, dusty miller and Silver King artemisia are easily air-dried as well.

Freshen up an aging bath

Q: I have a small, windowless bath that has been untouched since the house was built in the '50s. Everything still works, it's just dark and claustrophobic. How can I modernize it without remodeling? — M.B.

Q: We are newly married and just beginning to furnish our apartment. The problem is that we need everything and are constantly frustrated by our champagne tastes and beer budget. Do you have any tips for making the most of what we've got? — A.F.

A: There is absolutely no reason why you cannot live in style, regardless of your budget. Indeed, budget restraints can provide the anvil on which to forge a unique and personal style.



In good condition, a clock like this should sell for about \$2,000.



Points on Pets

Q. Is it abnormal for a mare to carry a foal for 12 months? Our mare is nearing 12 months now. She seems to be normal in every way.

I have heard that it is possible to induce mares to foal. Is this a dangerous procedure for the mare or foal?

A. It is often difficult, if not impossible, to predict precisely when a particular mare is going to foal. The duration of pregnancy in horses is variable. It is usually between 320 and 360 days.

Although most people calculate the expected date of parturition as 11 calendar months from the last breeding, it is not uncommon or abnormal for 12 full months to elapse between breeding and foaling in some mares.

Male foals are carried one to two days longer than female foals. Foals born from January through April have gestation periods about 10 days longer than foals born from May through September.

It appears that the fetus itself dictates the duration of pregnancy. Whenever the uterine environment is no longer suitable for the development of the foal, the mare is stimulated to give birth.

One of the earliest indications of approaching parturition in the mare is development of the mammary glands. The udder starts to noticeably increase in size about three to six weeks before foaling. The udder becomes distended with colostrum about two days prior to foaling and oozing of this colostrum, "waxing," from the teats can be observed in approximately 95 percent of mares six to 48 hours before foaling. Usually, within four hours of parturition slight

sweating in the flank region and behind the elbows can be seen.

The mare usually will not eat. This rolling helps rotate the foal into the normal position for birth. All of these signs become progressively more intense until the water bag ruptures and the mare gets into actual labor.

If these signs are seen for longer than four hours and it is not apparent that the foal is going to be born very soon, the mare should be examined by a veterinarian to ascertain if the foaling is normal.

Because it is difficult to predict precisely when a particular mare is going to foal, many veterinarians now induce foaling with drugs within one to two hours of foaling. As the preparatory stage of parturition advances the mare becomes restless, shows signs of abdominal pain, switches her tail and lies down and gets up more frequently than usual. The mare may stretch as if to urinate and have small, frequent bowel movements.

During the latter part of the preparatory stage of foaling the mare may roll back and forth. Elective induction of foaling ensures the presence of professional assistance at the time of foaling.

The criteria used to determine if a mare is ready for induction include the length of pregnancy, udder development, and genital tract relaxation. The length of pregnancy should be near 330 days to ensure complete maturation of the foal. Foals born prior to this time are often immature.

The udder should be well developed and contain colostrum at the time of induction. It is a disaster to have a foal born to a mare without milk. The cervix, opening of the uterus, should be relaxed and easily dilatable prior to induction. This is something that your veterinarian can evaluate for you.




