## Nassau Farmers Market Will Close In December

The Farmers Market, located on Route 107 in Bethpage, has announced that it will close its doors to the public on December 24, after 33 years at that location.

Noting a change in buying habits, Manager Chuck Schnepfer said that the Market is open two days a week, Friday and Saturday, making it difficult to attract working women. "With all the shopping centers and supermarkets in the area, it makes it hard to compete," he added.

Approximately 300 booths of varied merchants comprise the Farmers Market. However, food products have been the primary attraction to shoppers throughout the years, especially ethnic items.

Merchants will be offering discounted and final sales until closing date in December. Beginning on Sunday, December 14 the Market will remain open seven days a week to attract Christmas shoppers.

The property, owned by Nassau Farmers Market, Inc., will not be sold. However Mr. Schnepfer added that the building might be razed sometime in the future to accommodate other business there.

## Special Report: Reorganization Means Hiring Administrators

Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Catherine Fenton, put the wheels in motion for the implementation of the reorganization of the secondary level when she recommended and received approval for the creation of three administrative positions at the Board's general meeting on September 24.

A group of Kindergarten parents also attended Wednesday's session, and the Board ratified contracts with major labor unions.

Woodland Avenue School parents petitioned the Board to split their Kindergarten class, since they feel the needs of 28 students are being compromised. A spokeswoman for the group said that the youngsters in this class should "receive the same high quality of education as every other Kindergarten in Hicksville."

In a late-night executive session held after the public adjournment, the Board directed Superintendent Fenton to split the existing Kindergarten. Administration will bring in a teacher guide for the additional class, while it proceeds to advertise and hire a full-time teacher.

Voting 6-1, the Board approved the creation of a coordinator of the high school transitional program. Dr. Fenton expressed the wish to have this position filled during this school year, so as to afford a smooth turnover to a 9-12 high school.

The Board squeaked approval of two new assistant principals for the middle school by a vote of 4-3. Trustees Carol Wolf and Jay Schwartz both questioned the expense considering the stringent budget under which Hicksville is operating this year. The Superintendent indicated that these positions would be filled at a later date.

Each assistant principal would be responsible for redesigning curriculum and coordinating instructional program. They would be responsible for "team" teaching of teachers, a team being comprised of one teacher each in English, social studies, math and science. These teachers would interrelate studies for the students in their group.

The Board unanimously ratified contracts with the Hicksville Congress of Teachers and the Hicksville Secretaries Association for the period July 1, 1986 to June 30, 1989. Also unanimously approved was a contract with the Custodial Unit of CSEA Local 865 retroactive to July 1, 1985 and terminating on June 30, 1987. President William Bennett said that it was a "pleasure of the Board of Education to act on these matters." He commended all parties on both sides of the table for the manner in which they conducted the talks.

The Board instructed Dr. Fenton to accept \$6900 under Gov. Cuomo's Excellence in Education Program, which was set up to improve teachers' salaries. Although Hicksville teachers are paid above the median level in Nassau County, the Board felt this option should be followed up with the Congress of Teachers. If an agreement is not attained by the District and the Congress, the monies will be returned to the State.

Turning away from past inclinations, the Board voted 6-1 to eliminate three Teacher Aide positions.

In further discussing the impact of a smaller student population in the junior high school, the Board directed Dr. Fenton to investigate the cost of demolition of the temporary units behind the school. The Board also asked her to inquire into rental possibilities. Dr. Fenton said that this information would be useful to her in preliminary planning for the 1987-88 school budget.

A resident approached the Board requesting bus privileges for her child. Upon listening to her plight, President Bennett said her case would be reviewed. He further commented that as a result of the pleas by Mrs. Kittick and other concerned parents, he wrote to State Senator Marino urging him to sponsor a bill in the State Legislature to allow local school districts to determine hazards in their districts and provide transportation where warranted.

The Board received a presentation by Robert Durso, Director of Instruction, outlining data on student math performance during the previous school year. The test figures show that students throughout the district improved at a better-than-average rate. Highest gains were in concepts and weaker gains were achieved in problem solving. Mr. Durso looked to further in-service training to improve scores.

The next regular meeting of the Board will take place on Wednesday, October 22, at 8:15 p.m. in the Administration Building.

On Saturday, October 4, the town of Oyster Bay in conjunction with the Hicksville Fire Department will be holding its first S.T.O.P. Program (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants).

As you know it is very difficult, if not impossible, to dispose of Hazardous Materials safely without harming our ground water and environment.

On this day, October 4, homeowners may come to the Hicksville Fire Department Headquarters at 20 E. Marie St. from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. to dispose of certain hazardous materials that they may have. These materials may be certain paints, pesticides, chemicals, etc. By disposing of these toxic materials, you will also be helping your fire fighters in that if these toxic materials are subjected to fire be it in the home, garage, or storage shed, they become extremely dangerous and unstable.

The waste hauler that will be handling this project has requested that certain products not be acceptable such as aerosol cans, unlabeled chemicals which cannot be classified, radioactive chemicals, flammables, latex paints, Silver 34ST and explosives.

Large residents to please take advantage of this worthwhile project and stop throwing out pollutants. Again the date is Saturday, October 4, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

## Firefighters Learn Haz-Mat Technique

A special eight-hour seminar on hazardous material leaks and spills was held in Hicksville on September 14. Hosted by the Hicksville Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response Team, the seminar drew over 100 paid and volunteer firefighters from the tri-state area.

Hands-on practice in the control of hazardous material spills and leaks enabled firefighters to sharpen their skills. In recent years, an alarming increase in Haz-Mat incidents has

prompted fire officials to seek specialized training such as provided here by Safety Systems out of Jacksonville, Florida. The Hicksville Fire Department and Safety Systems have been training together since 1980, and this seminar is the fourth hosted in recent years by Hicksville. The Safety System team is led by Ron Gore, Captain of the Jacksonville, Florida, Fire Department Haz-Mat team—one of the first in the United States.

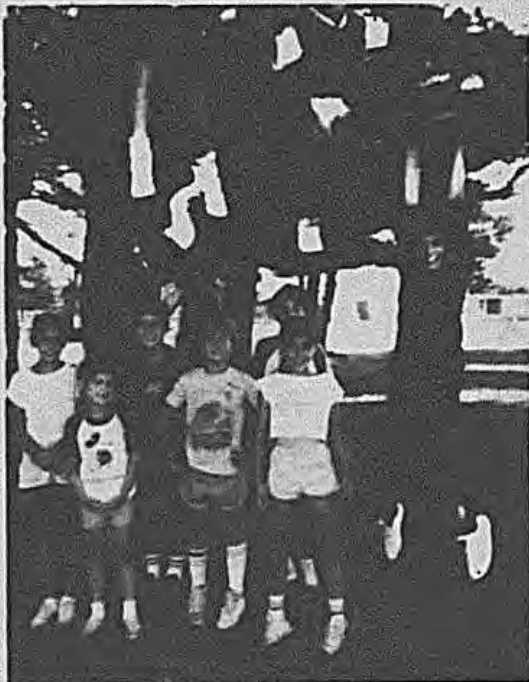

## Our Children

### 'Is my baby all right?'

**Q.** Perhaps I have nothing to worry about and you may think I'm an overanxious mother (that's what my husband calls me), but I'll ask my question anyway.

**Is it normal for a baby to spend a lot of time just looking at a mobile hanging over her crib? I always thought an infant's attention span is very short, but there she is, hour after hour (or at least it seems that long to me), just watching that thing hanging over her.**

**My concern is that if she's so satisfied with a "nothing thing" like that then perhaps she is slow in her development.**

**Can you provide some consolation?**

**A.** Babies are often so intrigued with moving, colorful items that they can be absorbed by them for considerable periods of time. Yours may be one of them.

**However, you might want to receive more information as it applies to your own infant from your family physician or pediatrician. A professional person who knows your child can help provide more details about her place in the normalcy range.**

**Another source that you might be interested in the book titled "Is My Baby All Right?" by Virginia Apgar and Joan Beck.**

**Q.** Our daughter is a high school student. A good friend of hers recently committed suicide and that, naturally, has shaken her up as well as others in an informal kind of group to which they all seemed to belong.

**She insists, and so do the other friends, that there was no hint of a problem because he appeared to be well adjusted, happy most of the time and a good student. The "why" question keeps coming up among them, but there is no answer evolving.**

**We and other parents want to help them out, but they haven't sought our help nor do they discuss the matter with us.**

**What advice do you have to offer about this sensitive situation?**

**A.** Because the details you provided are somewhat sketchy it seems questionable, and maybe even dangerous, for an outsider to get involved. If assistance is needed and wanted it probably ought to be located closer to the young people.

**Perhaps their school counselors should be informed about your**

**concern, although they already may be aware of it.**

**Another possibility might be if one of the parents of a student in the group is a qualified professional in either psychology or psychiatry.**

**Q.** I can't stand the dingy, dirty teeth created by the braces my kid wears. The braces are a necessity because his teeth looked awful, sticking out so much. But they don't look any better now, as dark as they are.

**He won't brush his teeth enough to get rid of the filth, so what do you suggest?**

**A.** A quick visit to the man or woman who provided the braces, and questions about proper brushing practices, good brushes and recommended toothpaste or other cleansing materials — and having your son along on the visit. I hope your orthodontist will be graphic with him on the dangers involved in slovenly care of braced teeth.

### Get immediate aid for bulimic daughter

**Dear Shirley:** I am quite certain that one of my daughters has been doing that binge-purge thing for several months. I don't know whether it's called bulimia or anorexia, but she really looks bad, and I am very worried about her.

**She is 17 years old and is as thin as a rail. She refuses to talk about it, and I can't get her to go to our doctor. She doesn't think there is anything wrong, because many of her friends look just as thin as she does.**

**Do you know of anything that would help her? I am at my wit's end. — K. Johnson.**

**Dear K. Johnson:** Bulimia is a severe and dangerous eating disorder that must be treated at once. Get her to a doctor for a complete physical evaluation and use any means necessary to get her there. Why not enlist the help of the other mothers whose daughters seem to be doing the same thing?

**Check your local area for support groups or call these two well-known organizations for help:**

- Bulimia, Anorexia Self-Help (BASH), with headquarters in St. Louis, Mo., phone 800-227-4785.
- The National Anorexic Aid Society, in Westerville, Ohio, phone 614-895-2009.

**Do it now. These kids need help.**

**Dear Shirley:** Is it true that some kinds of amino acids can stimulate the brain and make a person think better? I have been told that it will help me, but I'm

not sure the individual who told me knows what she is talking

about.

**I am a freshman in college and I would like to help myself get better grades.**

**Do you suggest I do this and, if so, what kinds of amino acids should I get? — Jerome**

**Dear Jerome:** Certain amino acids can stimulate the brain or thought processes, but it may not be in a desirable way.

**One man was recently reported in the American Journal of Psychiatry by his psychiatrist, as psychotic and hallucinating after taking up to four grams of the amino acid L-glutamine every day for three weeks. When the supplement was discontinued, the symptoms disappeared.**

**Another report told of a man taking L-glutamine and experiencing loss of sleep, hyperactivity, and a sharper mental activity but in a very uncomfortable way. When he stopped the glutamine he recovered.**

**The long-term side effects of taking amino acid supplements are unknown, but recent cases suggest that high doses of amino acids may change brain function. I would not advise that you expose yourself to these unnecessary dangers.**

**Dear Shirley:** I have had psoriasis for several years, and I recently read an article that said a low-protein, low-calorie diet is supposed to help it.

**Does that work, or what kind of a diet should I go on to help my problem? I am not overweight, in fact I probably should gain a few pounds, but I'll diet if it would help because I hate having psoriasis. — N.H.**

**Dear N.H.:** Recent studies on various diet manipulations did not prove to be effective in treating psoriasis.

**I would not recommend that you go on a low-protein, low-calorie diet when you are already a little underweight. The current thinking is that low-calorie diets may even harm psoriasis patients.**

**Stick to a good high-nutrient diet with a large variety of foods.**

## Requiem Mass For Charles Lynch

A large congregation was present for a requiem Mass at St. Ignace Loyola Church, this past Monday, for Hicksville civic and political leader, Charles F. Lynch of Cottage Boulevard. An attorney, Mr. Lynch died unexpectedly of heart failure this past week. He had long been an effective and admired leader in the Ernest Franke Republican Club of Hicksville, having served as its President. Active in a number of civic causes over the years, he was a member of the Ad Hoc Citizens Advisory Committee for the Development of Downtown Hicksville in 1979-1980. Charles Lynch was much respected for his outstanding gentility, for his affability, objectivity, and wise counsel.

Mr. Lynch was 55, a veteran of the Korean War and a graduate of St. John's Law School and New York University. At the time of his death he was serving as legal advisor to Nassau County Supreme Court Judge Bernard McAffrey. Prior to this he had served in the same capacity for Nassau Supreme Court Judge John Burke. His earlier career in the law included service as Deputy Town Attorney and Deputy Nassau County Attorney.

Charles Lynch is survived by his wife, Patricia and Daughters Kathleen, Maureen Whipple, Jeanne and Dianne.

## School Tax Payments Due

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Gary F. Musiello reminds residents that the first half of the 1986-87 School Tax Levy is due on October 1, but may be paid, without penalty, until November 10, 1986.

"By law a taxpayer has a 40-day grace period from the date the tax is due," Musiello explained. "After that period, a 1% penalty is attached for each month retroactive to October 1."

Residents can pay in person at the Tax Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall West, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, and at Town Hall South, 799 Hicksville Road, Massapequa, or they can pay by mail. When paying in person, residents should bring the entire tax bill. Those paying by mail should detach and enclose Stub #2 with the payment. Musiello noted that taxpayers should allow a few extra days for mail delivery to avoid any late penalty.

"Residents are asked not to write on, deface or staple the stub," Musiello concluded. "I recommend that paper clips be used instead because any defacing on the stub will cause rejection of the payment by the computer. Your cooperation is appreciated and will enable us to process your payments in a shorter period of time."

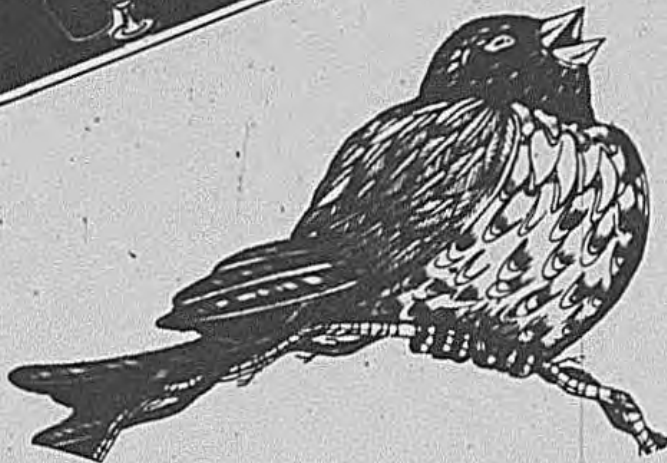

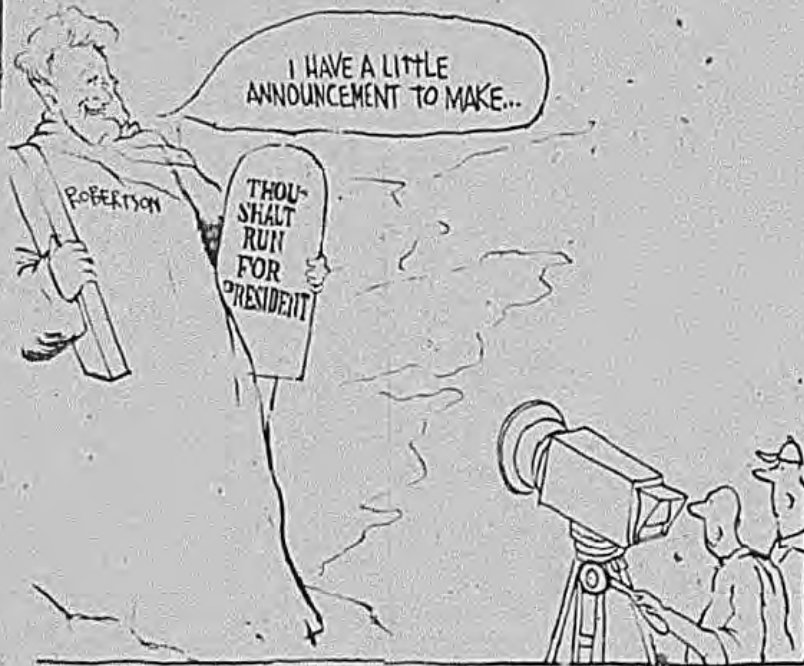

## Input Callers Against Spy Trade Concessions

Most callers to Input are against the United States making any concessions to the USSR in the Daniloff case in answer to this question: "Should the United States make concessions for the release of Daniloff from the United States Embassy in Russia?"

### WILL ESCALATE

No. We cannot make any concessions in the Daniloff case if we are certain that he was not engaged in spying activities. If we make concessions, it will be an open door to holding and framing any news person or traveller in the USSR and the whole thing will escalate although the names will be different. J.T.

### IS HE A SPY?

The only thing that bothers me about the Daniloff case is whether we can be sure that he was not a spy. So far as the President saying he isn't a spy goes, President Eisenhower declared emphatically that Gary Powers, the shot-down pilot, was on a weather mission over Russia only to admit some time later that he was not telling the truth and that Powers was indeed on a spy mission. I find that the press, which is ordinarily so skeptical of everything the government and particularly the President says, is ready to accept this statement of innocence without a word of opposition. Therefore, the press seems to have a double standard when it is one of their own. If Daniloff is not a spy, we should not make concessions. If he is a spy, we might as well trade him for Zakharov and be done with it. L.E.

### LOOKING BAD

Once again the United States is looking pretty bad. We should not even consider any concessions. The USSR just framed Daniloff and is using the incident to get back a spy of their own who has been spying on us for some time. We should make no concessions. F.W.

### QUETLY DO SO

While on the surface we should not make any concessions for the release of Daniloff, the facts are that we will have to quietly do so. We want to get the reporter back and a life is at stake. While we can talk with bravado, there is really no sense in making Daniloff into a sacrificial lamb. W.R.

### FREEDOM ISSUE

While we may make some concessions to the USSR to get the release of Daniloff, it is time to settle the issue of freedom for our tourists and journalists to travel in Russia and make a reciprocal arrangement with them for their people here. Presently we are letting their news people have the run of the country and their tourists go where they wish, but we are not getting the same treatment. If they want to continue being repressive, then we should do the same thing with them when they visit the United States. N.W.

### HARD LINE

We have to take a hard line and not negotiate with kidnapers. Every time we or someone gives in to extortion, they end up worse than if they had stood their ground. If Daniloff is not a spy, then we have to demand he be turned loose. Otherwise, we are giving in to pressure and it will only end up with more newsmen being held whenever the USSR wants to get something. A.R.

### NO CONCESSIONS

My answer is no. We would be foolish to make concessions for the release of someone who was legally in the country and going about the business of collecting news. The Russians are bluffing because they know the truth and if they think we won't move an inch, they will back down. They have no real motive for keeping Daniloff so they might as well expel him if we won't play the game. K.F.

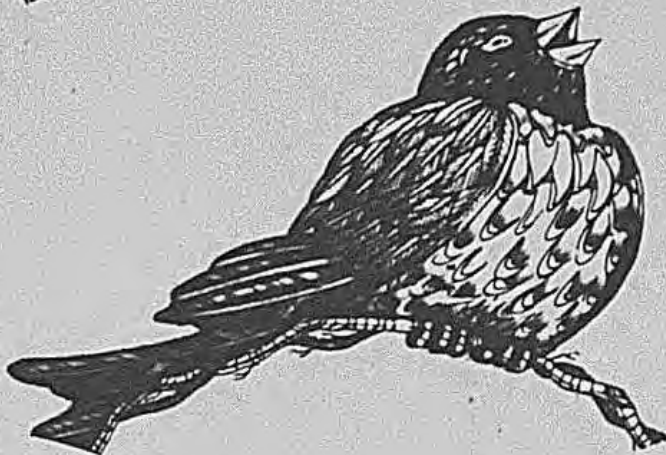
### NO CAPITULATION

Let's assume that Nicholas Daniloff is really a United States spy as the Russians state unequivocally. Under normal circumstances, he would be tried in the USSR and, if found guilty, would be subject to whatever punishment applies for that kind of crime. I guess we might have recourse to the World Court to appeal the decision but beyond that, the normal penalty under Russian law for espionage would apply and we would have no choice but to accept it on the assumption that the trial was outwardly fair and the evidence incontestable. The same applies in reverse to our condemnation of Gennadi Zakharov. Any national of another country found to be clearly guilty of spying on the host country patently has assumed the risks of that persuasion and should be prepared to suffer the consequences. Spying is not like attending a tea party and the price of getting caught can be disastrous and final. We should not exchange Zakharov for Daniloff, otherwise the whole thing is a sham. He should be tried for spying and be given whatever penalty or dismissal the evidence would warrant. If we don't and instead make such a trade, there would be no limit to the trumped-up charges the Russians would make against Americans in the USSR under similar circumstances in the future. We might decide to apply pressure in the form of political or economic sanctions, but under no circumstances should we capitulate and make concessions of any kind. P.G.S.

## A Gift Of Nature

My fuchsia basket finally found its way to the hook on the post of our front entrance. I promised myself I would water it daily to encourage the magnificent purple and red blossoms to bloom. As soon as the flowers started budding, we noticed some birds pecking away at the new buds. My first instinct was to shoo them away, but my ten-year-old nature lover told me not to.

I stopped and looked at life through his eyes, and the joy he experienced in seeing one of these feathered creatures right at eye level two feet from his screen door.

One morning my son was checking to see if his friend was perched on the fuchsia basket.

"Mom, hurry!" He ran inside and grabbed a footstool to allow him to peek inside the plant, and lo and behold, our transient boarder was setting up a home. There nestled in the leaves and flowers was a tiny nest with five little eggs in it. What a treasure! Now we had to be careful not to touch, disrupt or drown our new tenants. The challenge was to water their new home very carefully along the rim and hope the expectant parent didn't feel threatened. We noticed her pecking from her perch in the tree, but we didn't get a reaction.

So, now mama or papa had to sit on the fragile eggs so their babies could be born. Every time someone went in or out of our front door, the poor parent almost jumped out of its feathers as it bolted from its nesting and took to the nearest tree to escape our intrusion. So for a few days, we skirted the pathway and went about our life through the back door.

Again - "Mom, hurry! Come here. Hurry!" Sure enough, we had a birth in the family. A furry little marble-sized bundle, undistinguishable as birds, but alive and throbbing, inhabited the nest. It only took a few days to witness the overcrowding condition in this tiny nest, but finally we could see little heads bouncing around and hear the squeaks when mama came with breakfast.

What followed was more of a lesson in life than I could ever have given. We watched in wonder as these babies matured. They ate, took naps, fought, yes, they actually shoved each other around. It all made such sense to my three children. One wanted the top, one wanted food first, one wanted to sleep. So I found myself lecturing my children on sharing, loving and growing up.

One day I grabbed my camera to capture the oldest sibling taking a walk around his territory. It was a little unsettling to him and he looked at me suspiciously. But I couldn't resist the opportunity to record this event on film. My oldest child wondered if I ever made the same fuss over his first steps. Another jab in my side for neglecting my children and making a fuss over someone else's.

This bird had less patience than I thought - he just spread his wings and flew! Brother number two followed in his path. How incredibly rude! I didn't get the picture. Brother number three also took flight, but brother number four was scared to death, and obviously a little hesitant to leave home, but ready or not, he spread his wings - and crashed into the azalea bush! Mama saw this from her perch and squealed. My son saw this and ran to rescue the bird. He quickly put on rubber gloves and rushed to put the bird back home in its nest next to the one egg that never quite made it. Then he did it again, and again without success. We rescued him each time and made sure he was safe. Mama came and gave him a scolding. We tried to ignore the argument and realized we should keep our distance.

A few days later, he was gone. I tried to make my son realize that the bird probably finally learned to fly and that his mother was guiding him the whole way. "Honey," I reassured him, "he couldn't stay here forever. He had to leave home someday. He'll be okay. His mother will protect him."

We let go of our feathered family, but the nest remains, with one lovely egg still in it, and fuchsia blossoms all around, but the lesson was there. We all learned to stop and study the cycle of life through that tiny family that only stayed a short time.



Q. I have heard it said that white wine is best with chicken. However, one of the best restaurants I know frequently serves chicken in a sauce made with red wine. I would appreciate your comment.

A. You are quite correct! The French, who may well be the best cooks in the world, prepare their famous coq au vin dish with red burgandy wine. Incidentally, when chicken is served this way, it is preferable to order red wine rather than white to accompany the entree.

Q. When eating out, I am often tempted to enjoy my pie or pudding served with whipped cream. Tell me, how many calories do I actually save when I skip this all too delicious extra?

A. Whipped cream has 28 calories per tablespoon, so I would guess that the number of calories in the topping adds up to 150 or 200.

Q. I am in the habit of dining with my wife at a certain local restaurant which offers wonderful food at reasonable prices. Usually when I see the proprietor on the way out, I compliment him. My wife tells me this is out of line, but I see nothing wrong with expressing my gratitude whenever someone, including a restaurant owner, has done a commendable job. What is your opinion?

A. I'm with you all the way. I feel sure the proprietor appreciates your thoughtfulness and that your kind words would encourage him to continue doing his best.

Q. Once or twice a year the members of my club go to an ultra expensive restaurant where there is a wine steward. If we accept his services, how much should we tip him?

A. It is proper to tip a wine steward ten percent of the bill in round figures.

Q. Many years ago when I was growing up, roast beef was almost always served with a thick brown gravy. But today, "roast beef au jus" is the usual listing I see on restaurant menus. Can you explain this change?

A. There is a growing belief that the natural flavor of food may be enhanced, but should never be covered up by heavy sauces or gravies. Today, people are more health conscious than they used to be and they often try to avoid foods such as gravies which have a high calorie and cholesterol content.

## Perfect for a potluck, buffet offers 30 dishes

The Indonesians have celebrated life with food for generations. With the spices native to their corner of the world, the islanders made a name for themselves with their unusual sauces for pork, vegetables and seafood.

Indonesia was the site of this mysterious paradise, an archipelago of more than 3,000 islands stretching a distance of 3,000 miles, from Sumatra in the west to the wild coast of New Guinea in the east.

Indonesian cooking is infinitely more varied than the Indian (from which it is derived), it is not as ceremonial as the Japanese (but far spicier and with a greater dimension of flavors), and it is different from the great Chinese cuisine, which extended an early influence.

The Indonesian culture absorbs four foreign elements: Indian, Chinese, Arabian and Dutch Colonial. Each group contributed something in direct proportion to the length of its influence and the receptivity of the native Indonesians.

Beverages that go well with the highly flavored foods are fruit drinks, iced tea and cold beer (Dutch beer would be appropriate). Water is always served to quench thirst, and beer is suggested to accompany the meal.

Here are recipes to create some of the classic Rijstafel dishes. Sources of the recipes are Chef de Koning and Chef Reint Reinders of the La Jolla Marriott Hotel, who also has a Dutch background.

Note: Not familiar with some of the ingredients? Most Asian markets carry a full range of coconut milk, shrimp paste, tamarind, shrimp chips and other elements of this Indonesian buffet.

### ROEDJAK

(Spicy Fruit Salad)

- 1 green pear
- 2 cucumbers, peeled, halved and seeds removed
- 1 firm green apple
- 1 green mango
- 1 large orange, peeled and divided into sections
- ½ teaspoon dried red hot chili, soaked in 1 teaspoon water
- ¼ teaspoon shrimp paste
- 3 tablespoons light or brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon tamarind, dissolved in 1 tablespoon water
- ½ cup pineapple, cut into ½-inch pieces

Coarsely grate the pear, cucumbers, apple and mango. Remove as much skin from the orange sections as possible and quarter them.

Crush chili, shrimp paste, sugar and salt together with the tamarind liquid to make a paste. Add pineapple to the other fruits and cucumber, combine with the sugar paste and toss well. Serve at room temperature. Yields 6 servings with other foods.

### CRISP SHRIMP WAFERS

Look for packages labeled *Krupuk* at Asian food stores or some large supermarkets. When the multicolored or plain white wafers are deep fried, they puff and curl, forming unusually shaped light snacks.

8 ounces dry shrimp wafers

Cooking oil for deep frying

Fry shrimp wafers, a few at a time, in deep hot cooking oil (375 F) about 5 seconds or just until they puff and rise to the top. Remove with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels. Serve immediately or store in an airtight container for up to 2 days.

### SAMBAL CONDIMENT

Much as tomato salsa is a constant condiment for Mexican cuisine, so too is Sambal for the Indonesian food. Double or triple the recipe to have enough of this spicy sauce for use with foods other than Indonesian. Sambal is sold in jars in Asian markets.

- 2 fresh hot red peppers
- 2 fresh hot green peppers
- 2 medium tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and finely chopped
- ¼ cup finely chopped shallot or green onion
- 1 teaspoon finely shredded lime peel
- ¼ cup lime juice

Cut peppers open. Discard stems and seeds. Finely chop peppers. In a small bowl combine the red and green hot peppers, tomatoes, shallot, lime peel and juice. Cover and chill until serving time. Yields about 1¼ cups sauce.

### FISH AND CRABMEAT FRITTERS

- 12 ounces fresh or frozen cod or flounder fillets
- 6 ounces fresh crabmeat or 6 ounces frozen crabmeat, thawed and drained
- 2 eggs
- ½ cup rice flour or all purpose flour
- 1 green onion, finely chopped
- ½ teaspoon finely shredded lemon peel
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 or 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- Cooking oil

Thaw fish, if frozen. Cut into pieces. In a blender container, or

food processor bowl, combine fish, crab, eggs, flour, onion, lemon peel and juice, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover; blend until smooth. Spoon about ¼ cup batter onto a hot skillet, lightly greased with cooking oil. Spread mixture to a 3-inch patty. Cook 3 minutes per side or until golden. Remove and keep warm in 325 F oven while frying remaining batter. Arrange on platter. Yields 10 fritters.

### BUMBU BALI DAGING

(Spicy Beef in Red Sauce)

The Bumbu Bali has an attractive thick red sauce with an essentially spicy, somewhat pungent flavor. The red sweet pepper is added to give the sauce its vivid color and to dilute the sharpness of the hot chili.

This may be prepared in advance and stored in the refrigerator for up to two days, or frozen until needed. Thaw for two hours at room temperature before reheating.

- 2 red semi-hot chilies, sliced
- ¼ cup sliced onion
- 2 cloves garlic, sliced
- ½ cup sliced sweet red pepper
- 2 cups coconut milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 1 slice ginger, about 1 teaspoon
- 2 salam leaves
- 2 pieces of laos (galanga root)
- 2 kemiri nuts, crushed (candlenuts)
- ½ teaspoon shrimp paste
- 1 teaspoon tamarind, dissolved in 1 tablespoon water
- 1 pound boneless chuck, cut into 1-inch cubes

Blend the chilies, onion, garlic, red sweet pepper and ¼ cup of the coconut milk into a coarse paste.

Pour the sauce into a saucepan with the salt, sugar, ginger, salam, laos, kemiri, shrimp paste, tamarind liquid, beef and the balance of the coconut milk (1½ cups). Cook one hour or a bit more, or until the beef is tender, basting frequently to create a smooth sauce. Yields 6 servings with other dishes.

### AJAM BESENGEK

(Chicken in Coconut)

- Sauce:
- 1 cup coconut milk
- 2 teaspoons tamarind

- ¼ cup sliced onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 4 kemiri nuts, crushed (candlenuts)
- 2 teaspoons sambal (see recipe above)
- 2 teaspoons coriander (cilantro)
- ¼ teaspoon turmeric
- ¼ teaspoon shrimp paste
- ¼ teaspoon laos
- 1 teaspoon lemon grass
- Chicken:
- One chicken cut into 4 pieces

Blend all sauce ingredients very well and bring to a boil. Add chicken and stew 45 minutes. Serve hot.

### NASSI GORENG

(Fried Rice, Indonesian style)

- ¼ cup Indonesian soy sauce
- ¼ teaspoon garlic powder
- ¼ teaspoon laos powder
- 1 tablespoon hot chili sauce
- 1 white onion, chopped
- 12 ounces corned beef
- 1 cup rice, cooked dry and fluffed
- 12 green onions, sliced

Over medium heat, combine soy sauce, garlic powder, laos and chili sauce in large skillet. When well blended, after about 4 minutes, add onion. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add corned beef (shredded with a fork) and green onion.

When well mixed, add rice and cook an additional 6 to 8 minutes. Stir constantly to prevent scorching. Serve on platter with cucumber and tomato slices and sweet pickle garnish. Yields 4 servings.

### PERKEDEL PISANG

(Banana Fritters)

- 4 bananas
- 2½ cups flour
- 1½ cups milk
- 1½ tablespoons baking powder
- 2 eggs
- 1½ teaspoons vanilla
- 2-3 tablespoons sugar
- Cooking oil

Mash bananas. Whip together flour, milk, baking powder, eggs and vanilla. Combine bananas and flour mixture, then stir in sugar to taste. Drop by spoonfuls into hot oil. Fry until crispy brown on the outside and completely cooked inside. Yields 8 servings.

## Chinese dry-frying

Dry-frying, the subject of today's column, is a perfect technique for the after-work chef. Meats cooked in this fashion are cut into thin strips, and so cook very quickly. If you cut the meat and vegetables to size ahead of time, you can whip up a beautiful dry-fried meal in 10 minutes or so.

In recent years, as Americans have become more conscious of

the connection between diet and health, fried foods have often been singled out as a culinary menace for their saturated fat content and high calorie level. In some cases the reputation is deserved, but many fried foods are both healthful and low in saturated fats.

The Chinese have three methods of frying — stir frying, deep frying and dry frying. In stir frying,

ingredients are cooked very quickly in a wok containing a small amount of very hot oil — usually two or three tablespoons.

In deep frying, fairly large pieces of meat or mixed ingredients are fried in a larger quantity of oil, much as we would fry chicken or potatoes in this country. A good example of this technique in Chinese cooking is shrimp toast — in which a shrimp batter is fried on toast points to produce a delicious greasy treat.

Dry frying is perhaps less familiar to most Americans than either of the other Chinese frying techniques. In dry frying, meat or poultry is cut up in very thin pieces, then cooked in a cup or more of hot oil until it is brown, crisp and quite dry. The result is that the meat has, if anything, less fat or oil in it than it did before it was cooked. Some moisture is regained when the meat is combined with other ingredients, such as vegetables or soy sauce. The crispy texture that dry frying imparts gives an added dimension to the dish.

Ingredients marked with an asterisk in the recipes below are available at Oriental groceries or in the Oriental sections of many supermarkets.

#### DRY-FRIED SHREDDED BEEF

- 1 pound lean beef, cut pieces about 2 inches long and the thickness of chopstick
- ¼ cup dry white wine, for marinating beef
- 2 cups peanut oil, plus 2 tablespoons
- 2 tablespoons hot bean sauce\*, or to taste

- ½ teaspoons cayenne or to taste
- 1½ tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1 tablespoon minced fresh ginger root
- 2 tablespoons minced scallions
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil\*
- 1 cup shredded cabbage
- 1 cup shredded carrot (cut the size of matchsticks)
- ¼ teaspoon sugar
- 2 tablespoons dry white wine
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, or to taste

**Do-Ahead Steps:** 1. Cut beef, carrots and cabbage as directed. 2. Mince garlic, ginger and scallions.

In a medium bowl, mix together shredded beef and ¼ cup wine, and allow to stand a few minutes or more. Meanwhile, heat 2 cups oil in wok over high heat. When oil begins to smoke, carefully add handful of the beef and fry until browned and slightly shriveled. Remove from oil and drain on paper towels. Repeat procedure for the rest of the beef.

Pour off the oil and wipe the wok with paper towels. Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil until smoking hot. Toss in hot bean sauce, cayenne, soy sauce, garlic, ginger, scallions, sesame oil, cabbage and carrots. Stir-fry for 1 minute and then add the cooked beef, sugar, 2 tablespoons wine and the black pepper. Stir-fry for another minute or two until all ingredients are heated through.

Serves 2 to 4 as a main course.  
Total preparation/cooking time — 25 minutes (including do-ahead steps).

#### RED SNAPPER SAN LUCAS

- ½ teaspoon onion powder
- ¼ teaspoon each dried tarragon leaves, salt, ground black pepper
- 1 pound red snapper fillets
- 1 lemon, thinly sliced

Preparation Time: 5 minutes  
Cooking Time: 5 to 8 minutes  
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

In small dish combine onion powder, tarragon, salt and pepper, stirring with fork to blend.

Arrange fish in oblong glass baking dish (skin side down). Sprinkle blended seasonings evenly over fish.

Cover loosely with wax paper and microwave three minutes. Carefully rearrange fish and cover each fillet with two slices of lemon.

Replace wax paper and microwave two to five minutes longer (depending on thickness of fillets), or until fish flakes easily with fork. Serves four.

#### TARRAGON MUSHROOM CAPS

- 1 pound fresh, whole mushrooms
- ¼ cup butter or margarine
- ¼ cup minced onion
- ¼ cup chopped fresh parsley
- ½ teaspoon dried tarragon leaves, crumbled
- 1 cup sour cream (or one-half cup sour cream and one-half cup plain, unflavored yogurt)
- 2 tablespoons dry white wine
- ¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper

Preparation Time: 5 to 10 minutes  
Cooking Time: 13 minutes (plus 5 minutes standing time)  
Oven Setting: Medium-High (70 percent power)

Wash mushrooms and pat dry. Remove stems and reserve for another use.

In 2-quart glass container combine mushroom caps, butter, onion, parsley, and tarragon. Cover and microwave eight minutes, stirring gently after four minutes.

Stir in remaining ingredients, cover and microwave five minutes longer. Let stand, covered, five minutes before serving. Use as a sauce over cooked sliced beef, baked potatoes, steamed vegetables, etc., or serve mushroom caps as an appetizer. Makes about two dozen.

#### MICROWAVE BEARNAISE SAUCE

- 12 recipe 4 egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1 teaspoon each tarragon vinegar and white wine
- ¼ cup butter
- Dash each salt and freshly ground white pepper
- Pinch ground tarragon

Preparation Time: 5 to 10 minutes  
Cooking Time: 1 to 2 minutes  
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Combine egg yolks, grated onion, vinegar and wine in container of blender.

Place butter in 1-cup glass measure and microwave one to two minutes, until melted and bubbly.

Turn blender to highest speed and add melted butter in a slow, steady stream. Continue blending until sauce is creamy.

Season with salt, white pepper and ground tarragon to taste. Serve immediately over grilled steak, steamed green vegetables, poached fish or eggs.

Makes about one-half cup.

## Tempting tarragon

Tarragon is native to the Siberian tundra, and was unknown in Europe until sometime during the 16th century. Later, French chefs fell in love with the herb, dubbing it *estragon* (little dragon) because of its serpentine roots. The plant has long, thin green leaves that are sold fresh, dried or dried and ground.

This is the essential herb in Sauce Bearnaise, an important herb in salad dressings and a wonderful flavoring for vinegars. And it is one of the important *finestherbes* of classic French cuisine.

Each herb has a traditional symbolic meaning, and tarragon is said to symbolize unselfish sharing. This herb has a mild touch of sweet anise (licorice) flavor, and complements veal, seafood, poultry and egg dishes. It blends well with mushrooms, peas, beets, greens and tomato dishes. Tarragon also adds a distinctive touch to mayonnaise-based dressings and sauces.

To make your own tarragon-flavored vinegar, microwave wine

vinegar at HIGH (100 percent power) to not-quite-boiling. Stir in sprigs of fresh tarragon (about three tablespoons per quart). Let cool, then seal in tightly lidded jar and stash in a dark cupboard for three weeks. Strain out tarragon and bottle vinegar. Use in salad dressings, to marinate fresh vegetables, or in Microwave Bearnaise Sauce (recipe follows).

For a simple tarragon-mushroom sauce for fish, microwave three tablespoons butter on HIGH setting for one to two minutes. Add one cup finely chopped mushrooms and two tablespoons minced green onion. Cover and microwave on HIGH setting three minutes, stirring every minute. Blend in one tablespoon lemon juice and one teaspoon dried tarragon leaves. Serve immediately over poached fish.

Use this herb sparingly: a little will lend a subtle, aromatic hue to delicately flavored sauces, while too much can overpower other flavors with a decidedly licorice tang. Substitute tarragon, if necessary, with chervil.

#### HAZELNUT CHEESECAKE

- 1½ cups hazelnuts, shelled, toasted, hulled (almonds blanched, toasted, can also be used)
- ¼ cup graham cracker crumbs
- Butter
- 2 pounds cream cheese, room temperature
- ½ cup heavy cream
- 4 eggs
- 1¼ cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Reserved nuts

**Nuts:** Preheat oven to 400. Place nuts on a baking sheet or in a skillet. Bake, stirring often to brown evenly. When nicely browned, remove and cool. Cool oven also.

**Crust:** Butter bottom and sides of 8-by-3-inch round pan well, shake crumbs around bottom and sides until well coated. Shake out excess; set pan aside.

**Cheesecake:** When ready to make cheesecake, preheat oven to 300. Place nuts in blender or food processor and blend to desired texture (crunchy cake — coarse/finer; smooth cake — almost pastylike). Set aside.

Place cream cheese, cream, eggs, sugar and vanilla in bowl of electric mixer. Beat at low speed, increasing to high as the ingredients blend. Continue beating until smooth. Add nuts and blend thoroughly; pour and scrape batter into prepared pan and shake gently to level.

To bake: Set round pan inside a slightly wider pan. Pour ½ inch boiling water into larger pan. (Do not let edge of cheesecake pan touch the larger pan.) Place in 300 oven. Bake 2 hours. Turn off oven, let cake set in oven 1 hour longer. Lift cake out of water bath, place on rack. Let stand at least 2 hours. To unmold, place a round cake plate over pan, turn both upside down. Serve lukewarm or at room temperature.



# Here's How

**Q:** We have a chain-link fence which encloses the back yard. Several sections are rusted. I am not sure what the fence was constructed of, as I always thought regular chain-link fences were rust-free. I don't want to replace the fence, but I feel we need to do something about the rust and protect the rest of the fencing. Do you have any suggestions? And, is it feasible to paint the fence? — A.W.

**A:** You are wise to act now to protect your fence. First you must attack the rust problem. There are several ways to handle a rusty surface to stop the corrosive effects of the rust and prepare for a rust-protective treatment such as painting. The newest method of treating rust, and one of the easiest, is to convert the rust to another kind of compound that is non-corrosive and even protective. An example of a rust-converter is TruStan, a solution that is applied to the rusty surface with a stiff brush and in 12 to 24 hours alters the chemical composition of the rust to a blue-black compound that can be primed and painted. Rust-Oleum also manufactures a converter called Rust Reformer

which will convert a rusty surface to a protective coating without sanding or priming. Converters should be used with care and you should wear gloves and goggles while applying. After treatment you can paint your fence. First cover foliage and anything else needing protection from splattering with dropcloths. Attach extension poles to paint roller for areas hard to reach. Two persons should work, one on each side of the fence. One applies the paint with a 1 1/2-inch nap roller. A second person follows (on the other side) using a dry roller. This picks up and transfers excess paint to cover the other side. Be sure to use a good grade rust resistant paint (Rust-Oleum is a brand that specializes in paints and primers for metal).

**Q:** Several times we have found water on our bathroom floor under the water closet tank. At first we thought the tank was leaking, but it appears to be nothing but water forming on the porcelain and then dropping on the floor. Can you tell us what causes the problem and how to correct it? — L.N.

**A:** This problem occurs particularly in summer months. The condensation of water vapor in the air is the cause of the dripping. Moisture forms on any surface which holds a liquid that is cooler than the air. Sometimes this can be prevented by enclosing the outside of the tank with a fabric material. The condensation can be reduced if you use a ventilating fan in the bathroom. Another solution is to have a plumber install a mixing valve which will warm the water entering the tank. If the water in the tank is at room temperature, there will be no condensation on the outside of the tank.

**Q:** We have a ceiling in our family room-kitchen which is a vinyl-coated ceiling tile. This has turned a dirty yellow. I have tried a number of ways to clean it to no avail. Can this ceiling be painted? — F.W.

**A:** Yes, the ceiling can be painted. First scrub the tile with water and detergent. Then wipe the surface with liquid sandpaper. Apply a coat of enamel undercoat, let it dry, then apply one or two coats of non-yellowing white enamel. Keep in mind that even the best non-yellowing enamel will eventually become discolored by the oil and steam that float around the kitchen.

# Mainly for Seniors

There's news of specific interest in mature adults this week and in this column we've researched and digested the information as most relevant to you.

## Postage and Social Security

Legislation several years ago was enacted to assure the issuance of social security checks for the third day of each month — and the system has been working, with the checks actually being mailed earlier and then held in post offices for delivery on the third or earlier.

But the question of the postage for those checks was analyzed by U.S. Senator Pete Wilson (R-Calif.) as possibly being in jeopardy under the budget limitations of the Gramm-Rudman-Holdings deficit reduction law. Wilson proposed, and the Senate passed, legislation which would modify the system by which the government pays for benefit checks to be printed and mailed so as to preclude the possibility of either temporary suspensions or delays in checks being mailed. Until now the U.S. Department of the Treasury incurred the mailing costs for the checks and in turn bills the Social Security Trust Fund for the cost of the mailings. It is that procedure that could come under the deficit reduction limitations, even though the funds for the Social Security checks were protected.

Wilson introduced the legislation to streamline the procedure

so that the processing of checks is paid directly from the trust fund and is, therefore, protected from budget cuts. There is no known opposition to the legislation, so that enactment can be assumed as Congress wrestles to conform the deficit reduction demands of the Gramm-Rudman-Holdings legislation.

So, continue to anticipate your Social Security check in your mailbox on a timely basis.

## Your Mind is Sharper

The results of a 10-year study have been announced by psychologist Walter Cunningham of the University of Florida. Elderly people's minds stay sharper far longer than popular conceptions. Cunningham tested 1,100 people between the ages of 51 and 92, in 30 Florida cities, 10 years ago and then retested 450 of them recently to see what changes had taken place in their intellectual abilities.

"Intellectual abilities of elderly people show no statistically significant decline," states the researcher, "while most intellectual skills show only modest decline."

# Decor Score



## Accentuate the positive

By Sharon Owen Haven

**Q:** I have an air conditioner which is located dead center and 26 inches down from the ceiling in the middle of my dining room wall. How can I arrange pictures around it so it looks more attractive? — E.H.

**A:** Short of moving the air conditioner to a new location (which would be the ideal solution), you would be best to take a fool-the-eye approach.

By painting the air conditioner the same color as the surrounding wall, you will give it less attention. If the room has nice moldings or other architectural detailing, you might paint the walls a dark color and the detailing a bright, light contrasting color. This will make the room's appealing features more important visually.

Collections of artwork and accessories can also provide an alternative focal point for the eye. Again, color can provide a dramatic backdrop for these collections, as the wall pictured illustrates.

So far as arranging the artwork itself, there are few rules beyond trying to achieve balance — in terms of color, mass and spacing. That is, try to avoid overcrowding or bunching of heavy or dark items in one portion of the arrangement.

Planning is important, so try using paper cut-outs of your artwork, to size, and colored light or dark to match. Move these around on your wall until you get a balanced arrangement that pleases you.

If you still feel uncertain, you can get more detailed guidance from *Picture Framing and Wall Display* from Sunset Books.

**Q:** I am having no luck in finding a tasteful shower curtain that goes well with my bathroom. The solid colors are too boring and the patterns I've seen won't work. Is anyone making good shower curtains? — D.T.

**A:** Why don't you make your own? It is a simple matter to cut a printed bed sheet to size or sew together a couple of lengths of fabric of your choice. Lay the fabric against a clear plastic shower liner and mark spots on the fabric for hanger holes. Depending on the fabric, you can reinforce the holes with a buttonhole attachment on your sewing machine or punch right through.

The liner will protect the fabric from water and the fabric itself can be removed from time to time

and laundered. Not only can you have an endless selection of patterns this way, but the fabric provides a softer, more tactile element in your bath than plastic would.

A delightful and inexpensive

treatment I've seen was accomplished first by splattering the walls of a bath with paint. Then, the same paint was splattered on heavy muslin and made into a matching shower curtain in the manner described above.

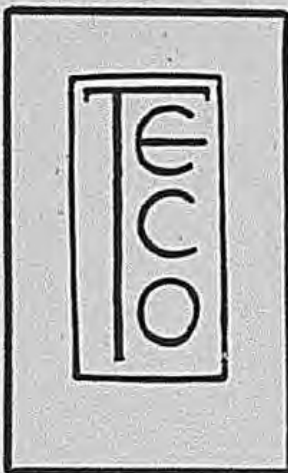
Q: Enclosed is a picture of a clock. It is marked "E. Howard & Co., Boston, No. 70." It has an eight-day, weight-powered movement.

A: This was made by the Terra Cotta Tile Works in Terra Cotta, Ill. The company was found in 1881 by William Gates.

In 1902 the company started making an Art Pottery line bearing the mark, "T O". Your vase was made between 1902 and 1915. It would sell for about \$175 to \$225.

# Points on Pets

**Q:** We are confused about all the different dog foods on the market. We really do not know which one to pick. What is the difference in dry dog foods and canned dog foods? How long have commercial dog foods been available? Any information that you can give us will be appreciated.

**A:** The first commercial dog food dates prior to 1900 James Spratt, a lightning-rod salesman from Cincinnati, Ohio, became the first manufacturer of commercial dog food when he concocted "dog cakes," composed of blended wheat meal, vegetables, beet root and meat. The first canned dog food was introduced in 1922. The first commercial pet food association, the Society of Pet Food Industry was formed in 1935.

During the last 50 years the pet food industry has developed dramatically. The major types of commercially available dog foods today include dry, canned, and semi-moist foods. In addition, your veterinarian has a variety of prescription diets for special situations. Examples of these include canned foods for elderly dogs, obese dogs, dogs with kidney problems, dogs with heart problems, pregnant dogs and just weaned puppies.

All dogs require protein, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals in correct amounts and ratios for their particular state and physical conditions. Dry dog foods, as their name implies, contain a relatively low percentage of moisture. The primary source of energy in dry dog foods is carbohydrates provided by cereal grains. Whenever dry dog foods are used it is imperative to have plenty of clean, fresh water available at all times.

Canned dog foods are at the opposite end of the scale from dry dog foods in terms of moisture

content. The canned meat varieties of canned dog foods contain both meats and cereals. Cereal grains such as corn or barley, supply the carbohydrate. The protein is derived from meat, meat by-products, poultry and soybean meal. Fats, vitamins and minerals complete the ration.

Semi-moist dog foods first appeared in grocery stores in the 1960's. They are intermediate between dry and canned dog foods in amount of moisture content. Like humans, there appears to be some difference of preference by different dogs for different diets. Some dogs appear to prefer the dry diets while others prefer canned or semi-moist diets. You should experiment until you find a diet that your dog readily eats. Diets should be chosen from dog foods labeled "complete." Such diets contain all of the nutrients required by dogs in amounts required for their complete nutrition. In other words, nothing other than water, has to be given in addition to the complete commercial food.

Pet foods labeled as snacks or treats generally are not complete diets. Therefore, they should not make up more than 10 percent to 15 percent of the dog's total diet. It is important to read the labels of whatever diet is used, to determine the exact amount to be fed to your dog. Your veterinarian can help you decide which diet is best suited for your particular dog.

Dog food manufacturers have spent a lot of time and money developing balanced, palatable diets for our pets. Generally, commercially available diets are of much higher quality than those prepared at home.
