Boundaries Approved To Test Town Recycling Prog.

Boundaries have been set for a pilot recycling project in the Town of Oyster Bay. The recycling project was approved at the Town Board meeting Tuesday. The month has been changed from February to March for starting the test plan. The area includes Plainview and Old Bethpage. The new rules are for the separation of newspapers, glass, metal and garbage. Bottles and cans have to be soaked to have labels removed. Instructions are being sent to the area included in the program.

Boundaries approved by the board for the recycling project include homes in Plainview and Old Bethpage bordered on the north by the Northern State Parkway; on the east by Washington Avenue, the Nassau-Suffolk county line and Round Swamp Road; on the west by Central Park Road, South Oyster Bay Road, Old Bethpage Road, Michael and Crescent Drives, Haypath Road and Cindy Drive; and on the south by South Park Drive, Joann Drive and Barry Lane.

P.O. Requests Ice, Snow Removal

"The hazards of snow and ice cause numerous accidents and injuries to letter carriers and to other delivery people. Prevention is simply a matter of clearing, salting and/or sanding the stairway or pathway to provide safe access to the mailbox or front door," said Roger Nienaber, Hicksville Division General Manager/Postmaster.

The Postmaster stressed, "Ice is particularly dangerous on steps and any walking surface, especially painted wood or concrete, like stoops and porches. We will get the mail through, but we need a little help from our customers."

In addition, items such as children's toys, sleds, accumulation of wet leaves, loose bricks, broken steps and cracked walkways are contributing factors in many injuries sustained by delivery people, visitors or family members. The Postal Service urges everyone to examine their property and make any repairs as needed. The elimination of these hazardous conditions will benefit all concerned.

Hicksville Redistricting Study Urged By Wolf

Trustee Carole Wolf sparked the January 28 Hicksville School Board meeting by calling on the Board to begin a study of the redistricting of the school population beginning in February. She cited the "unfair advantage" some district youngsters have over others whose schools must house larger numbers of students.

Also addressing the Board on behalf of Superintendent Catherine Fenton was Assistant Superintendent Dr. Robert Couillard who outlined a School-Business partnership with Multivire, a local manufacturer of computer components. He also advised the Board on social security cards for children and the district's elementary music program.

Mrs. Wolf requested of Board President William Bennett that the redistricting study be placed on the agenda of the February District Facilities Committee meeting. She also called for a study of school closings, all in an effort to correct imbalances throughout the district. These imbalances have been caused by population shifts since the last time Hicksville schools were redistricted some 30 years ago.

Mrs. Wolf said that the Board "must move" on this issue. She stressed a solution which will be demographically and economically sound and one which will be "fair to students, teachers and taxpayers alike."

President Bennett assured Mrs. Wolf that the entire Board will be taking up this issue "within the next month." He said he would speak to the Superintendent and the matter will be moved forward without delay.

The School District has entered into a business partnership with the local firm, Multivire, a producer of copper plate boards for computer systems. The give-and-take package includes such worthwhile advantages to students as part-time employment while in school and sharing of programs. Since entering into the agreement, school staff members have worked at the factory and Multivire employees have been to Hicksville schools. Multivire has taken advantage of such courses as English As a Second Language, algebra and computer technology. At this time, plans are being developed to begin a day care center so that school staff and factory employees can obtain childcare for youngsters during working hours. Dr. Couillard remarked that this "official partnership" is the beginning of "an on-going working relationship" with an eager business right here in our home town.

The Federal government has passed legislation requiring all natural born citizens, including children, to have a social security card. Normal procedure calls for the presentation of a birth certificate. The Social Security Administration has enlisted the help of the School District in aiding parents in this matter.

The District has agreed to verify this information for the Administration, since parents must present such proof when registering children for school. The district will send home, through the students, a form from Social Security to be filled out, and the Administration will send the card directly to parents.

Dr. Couillard also reported on the very successful, first Elementary All-District Concert which took place on January 20. He said this event was part of the district's adoption of a strong education process in music. The district considers the arts as one of the basic skills and vows to accomplish a knowledge and understanding of visual arts by all students. Dr. Couillard pointed out that due to declining enrollment, the pooling of musicians gives worth to the ensemble and produces quality music.

The Board received correspondence from Assemblyman Fred Parola urging Board members and citizens to watch carefully education aid in Governor Cuomo's proposed budget. The budget gives Hicksville \$416,000 less in aid this year, leaving a gap which, if not amended, would have to be tightened through taxpayer dollars. Mr. Bennett quoted Mr. Parola as saying, "The Governor has, in fact, told the suburbs to 'drop dead'."

The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Wednesday, February 25, at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building.

To the Editor:

The petitions have been spread about establishing an expanded County legislature. At issue is better representation.

Why? Those that advocate this change feel that this would be a possible solution to the Republican control of Nassau County government. The presumption is that with these added representatives, we'll possibly have more Democratic elected legislators.

This also infers that there is some Democratic organization with popular candidates. I don't see this. On the local level, I have seen either no district leadership or a constant flux of temporary interest. Even in the local polling places, Democratic Party people have had to be obtained from adjoining counties.

Candidates for local positions, on the Democratic line, have in many instances not even aroused familiarity. The Democratic county leaders have been ready to accept positions of appointment in areas such as Comm. of Elections. Or, they decided to return their efforts to their more lucrative private practices.

We know there are many issues to address, but I do not see the Democratic Party consistently taking up the gauntlet. We also know it is very hard to buck an entrenched Republican leadership. But, sacrifice and dedication are needed—but do not seem to be forthcoming.

On the other hand, the majority of the electorate seems to appreciate the dominant Republican candidates. Mr. Mondello has stated his sincere appreciation and desire for county service. Mr. Gulotta has stated his desire to make tax cutting a priority in his new administration. Certainly with the efforts of these two prominent, powerful and dedicated men, we will reap continued interest and fair direction for all county residents.

Their direction in housing, water and waste control, and proper fiscal management in our varied services will continue to reflect the desires of those interested enough to vote them into power.

Power corrupts, some say. I say power produces. Diversity must be developed within the structure. Expanding positions only create more costs to taxpayers.

If the Democrats are really interested in effecting change, they should show more leadership, dedication and sincere effort with the issues and greater effort in organizing the electorate.

The fourth game was another 0-0 tie, with the Massapequa Mac/Blue. The fifth game was a 1-0 loss to the

Massapequa Mac/Red, leaving the Shamrocks in third place at the end of the preliminary round.


Island Trees, who had been undefeated in the prelims, lost the first playoff game 1-0, to eventual Tournament victor, East Islip. The Shamrocks then defeated Massapequa Mac/Red 3-1 on two goals by Eric Blicker and one by Matthew Pordum. The finale was a defensive masterpiece, as both goalies made numerous unbelievable saves, through two nine-minute periods, and two five-minute sudden death overtimes, with the penalty shot at the 4:40 mark deciding the game, 1-0 in favor of East Islip.


Diabetes/Stress Hospital Program

Stress affects all of us. But for people with diabetes mellitus, the pressures of daily living are compounded by the difficulties of coping with a chronic illness. To help diabetics handle stress and to educate them on the impact of stress on the management of their disease, The Community Hospital at Glen Cove is sponsoring a free program titled "Diabetes and Stress," on Saturday, February 7 at 1 p.m.

The meeting, which will take place in the hospital's Pratt Auditorium, will feature a panel of experts - a psychiatrist, an endocrinologist, a diabetic nurse educator and a social worker - who will examine stress and diabetes looking at both its psychological and physiological effects.

Panellist Michael Melamed, M.D., is associate director of Community Hospital's Psychiatric Department. Dr. Melamed will look at the psychological ramifications of dealing with a long-term disease, and he will outline the kinds of emotional problems a diabetic may face. How those pressures affect a diabetic's body chemistry will be discussed by endocrinologist Tharakaram Ravishankar, M.D., medical director of The Diabetes Center. And altering the management of diabetes for stressful times will be covered by Janice Kiernan, R.N., nurse educator at The Diabetes Center. Finally, practical stress reduction techniques will be demonstrated by Frances Carmichael, C.S.W., of Community Hospital's Social Work department.

"Diabetes and Stress" is presented as a public service of The Community Hospital at Glen Cove. While the program is free, those wishing to participate are asked to register in advance. The number to call is 676-500, extension 2140. Refreshments appropriate to diabetic diets will be served.

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
