School Tax Due On April 1

Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes Gary F. Musiello, reminds residents that the second half of the 1986-87 School Tax Levy is due on April 1 and may be paid, without penalty, through May 11, although you are urged to mail your payment at least ten days prior to the May 11 date.

"By law, a taxpayer has a 40 day grace period from the date the tax is due during which payments may be made without penalty," Musiello explained.

"After the 40 days, a 1% penalty is added for each month the tax remains unpaid, retroactive to April 1."

Residents can pay in person at the Tax Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall, West Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay or at Town Hall South, 977 Hicksville Road, Massape-

qua. They may also pay by mail. The Town Clerk's Annex, Newbridge Road and Duffy Avenue, Hicksville, will be open to accept payments from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. on May 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 11.

When paying your tax bill in person, residents are reminded to bring the entire tax bill with their payment. Payments being made by mail for the second half of the year should include Stub #2.

The Tax Office will be sending a computerized receipt but you are advised to retain your cancelled check as additional proof of payment.

Musiello cautioned residents not to write on, cut, fold, staple or otherwise deface the tax stub as it can cause the computer to reject the payment.

Voter Regis. At Hicksville Library

Voter registration will take place at the Hicksville Public Library on April 1 from 3 to 8 p.m.

If you are not registered to vote, you may take advantage of this opportunity to do so.

You may register to vote if you are a citizen of the United States, have lived in the District 30 days and are 18 years of age or older.

The Library Budget vote will be held on Wednesday, April 8 from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The library is accessible to the handicapped. It has ramps, an elevator and a parking space for the handicapped.

Street Sweeping Project Begins

"On March 16, the Town of Oyster Bay's Department of Public Works, Highway Division, began its annual street sweeping program," according to Town Councilman Angelo A. Delligatti.

"The initial sweeping after winter is a time consuming effort," Delligatti said. "Sweeping 780 miles of Town roadways, 1560 miles of curbing and acres of commuter parking fields is a major task."

The first sweeping takes more than twice the normal time because the 12,023 cubic yards of sand/salt mix that was spread during snow clearing operations must be cleaned up.

To speed up the process, a Town employee will assist each sweeper by picking up large branches, papers, moving garbage pails and removing other obstacles in the path of the sweeper.

"As in past years, resident cooperation in keeping parked cars off the street between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. is essential to the successful and rapid completion of this program," Delligatti noted. "Cards will be placed in the doors of homes where the sweeper was unable to clean near the curb alerting residents that the sweeper will be returning in the next few days and asking residents to remove their vehicle to facilitate the cleaning process."

Residents are asked not to place heavy debris on Town roadways, because they can cause problems to the sweepers and may clog catch basins, resulting in flooding conditions.

\$1.9 Million Increase In Hicksville Budget

The Hicksville School Board voted to accept a 1987-88 school budget of \$42,574,330 for printing purposes at its meeting held on Wednesday, March 25. Board President William Bennett outlined the budget, a 4.7% or 1.9-million-dollar increase over the previous year. He termed the budget "a very tight, minimum budget," reflecting \$1.8 million of mandated expenses in the areas of fringe benefits, terminal pay, transportation, legal fees and sanitation.

In other action, the Board brought to an end the suspicion and doubt surrounding the proposed Burns Avenue School sale by the passage of a resolution proposed by Trustee Daniel MacBride which states: The Burns Avenue School property is not for sale at this time. The resolution also calls for the writing of a letter to the Delco Corporation expressing this intent.

The residents at the meeting spoke out loud and clear about their opposition to the sale of school properties and particularly the incident at Burns Avenue. There was strong feeling for the "neighborhood school," and there was agony on the part of long-time residents "fighting for (their) lives." Mr. Bennett said that in his abundant conversations with residents in the past month, he began to see the Burns Avenue School as "the center of life for that community."

Last year, the Board cut expenses in an effort to get the 1986-87 budget passed after its initial defeat. At that time, the Board applied \$1 million of surplus money to reduce the tax rate increase. With the approval of the budget by the voters, this brought the tax increase to approximately \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation. A budget of \$42,574,330 could bring an increase of as much as \$1.93.

Budget review is still in progress and the Board will hold its public budget hearing on Wednesday, April 29, for community input and questions. Trustee Thomas Nagle emphasized that he will be making recommendations for review by the Board and the public by the April 29 meeting. (This newspaper has printed information on voter registration, as well as the date of budget vote and school board elections. Further information can be received by contacting the School District Clerk's office.)

President Bennett announced the formulation of an Ad Hoc Advisory Committee to be charged with the study of district reorganization of the elementary level. He appointed Trustees Carol Wolfe and Daniel Arens as co-chairs and announced that further developments on the Committee could be expected by the April 29 meeting. Mr. Bennett expressed the desire to attract a cross section of residents to serve on the committee to ensure optimum range of views and credibility. The committee will study the options and alternatives which serve the best interests of the community at large. A report will be received by Superintendent Catherine Fenton, and then recommendations will be made to the Board. The earliest elementary reorganization could be expected in September of 1989.

In the Superintendent's Report to the Board, Dr. Fenton discussed a request for a change in school hours by the secondary building principals. Senior High School Principal Richard Hogan states that the students in a four-year high will be serviced better if they begin at 7:45 a.m. and are dismissed at 2:23. This will provide for four separate lunch periods. Mr. Hogan anticipates additional after-school activities, and by beginning school earlier, the students have an advantage after school.

Junior High School Principal, Gerald Klein, on the other hand, feels that starting the middle school students at 8:15 or 8:30 a.m. will better suit their needs.

The Board acted with unanimous passage on the award of a bid in the amount of \$76,290 to Central Contracting Corporation for the sale and removal of the temporaries at the Junior High School. Central Contracting was the lowest of five bidders, and the bid includes a provision to have all work completed before August 16, 1987.

The Board also unanimously approved the expenditure of no more than \$1500 for the hiring of a handwriting expert to help the district identify the person or persons responsible for defacing of schools through graffiti. Trustee Carol Wolfe addressed the seriousness of the problem when she told the audience that driver education cars have been taken out of service due to defacing, and that the district pays some \$90,000 a year to clean up the graffiti left on school property.

The next regular meeting and annual budget hearing will be held on Wednesday, April 29 at 8:15 p.m. in the Senior High School Cafeteria.

Hicksville -- Then And Now



You might call Hicksville a one-horse town back in 1907 when this postcard photo was taken, looking north on Main Street, and showing a solitary horse and wagon clippety-clopping along the road. This was before the thoroughfare was renamed Broadway and Route 107. The view is from just south of Cherry Street, with the familiar spire of St. Ignatius Loyola Church looming at center. Buildings at right housed the Post Office and Broadway Hotel.



In the same view, taken a few years ago, Old Dobbins has galloped right out of the picture to be replaced by modern horsepower. Old faithful, St. Ignatius, still dominates the scene, while several of the old structures at the right are surprisingly still intact. The Telephone Pioneers of America, the largest non-corporate contributor to the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation's restoration project, has earned a place in the rich history of Liberty Island in New York harbor.

The Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, governing body of the restoration effort, has agreed that, in recognition of the efforts of the Pioneers who raised more than four million dollars, one of two theatres in the refurbished complex will be named for the Pioneers.

The Paumanok Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers of America, which covers Nassau and Suffolk Counties, raised over \$60,000 of the four million.

The Committee expects the restoration of Ellis Island to be completed in 1988.

Fork Lane Kids Speak With Indian Tongue

Each student chose one Indian tribe, other than the Long Island Algonquins, to research in detail. The students located information about their tribe in the areas of: food, shelter, clothing, transportation, government and tribal life.

Andrew Etergineoso, David Nelsen, Robert DiCerbo, Jennifer Murray, Brian Zeiders, Scott Levy, Scott Schuhert and Vincent DePaoli each made or drew a replica of the Iroquois' long house. Some of these structures were so authentic that the roofs could be removed and viewers could see samples of Iroquois tools and household belongings.

Eileen Hayden and Joseph Ching studied the Hopi Indians, of the Southwest. Both Eileen and Joseph made posters depicting the tools, pottery, weapons, and houses of the Hopi.

Kim Spiegel and Priti Tewari reported on the Pueblo Indians, also of the Southwest. Kim made a diorama of a Pueblo village and Priti showed examples of clay pottery, jewelry, shelter and clothing.

Keith Carpenter researched the Mandon Indians and constructed a large replica of a Mandon teepee.

Kathy Tomoloni studied the Cherokee Indians and described how this tribe tried to conform to the white man's laws and way of life. Annmarie Fulfar also chose the Cherokee. Annmarie went into detail explaining every aspect of Cherokee life.

Dutch Lane School is proud to have helped raise (as of the latest count) \$4000 for such a great cause.





Speaks On Blind To Kiwanis

Mr. Frank Romano, the Associate Director of the Helen Keller Services For The Blind was the guest speaker at the March 18 luncheon meeting of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club. Kiwanis Program Chairman John Fitzpatrick escorted Mr. Romano into the room and introduced him to those present, which happened to include an Interclub from the Manhasset Kiwanis Club.

After lunch, Mr. Romano began his address to the group by telling them that the Helen Keller Services For The Blind was previously known as the Industrial Home for the Blind. Among the details, facts and figures which he mentioned were such items as: at least 430,000 Americans are "Legally Blind" which means that their visual acuity does not exceed 20/200 in the better eye with corrective lenses, or their visual field is less than an angle of 20 degrees (20/200 means being able to see no more at a distance of 20 feet than a person with normal sight can see at 200 feet); many services and activities are available to blind individuals through his organization at no cost to those they serve; the Helen Keller Services For The Blind does not do any door-to-door soliciting for funds; donations are accepted from

individuals, groups, organizations, etc.; the braille equivalent of a printed textbook might run 20 volumes, and the Helen Keller Braille Library prepares these for blind students by way of volunteers transcribing each book page by page into braille, these pages are then duplicated in electric copying machines and collated, bound and packed for distribution to students; special classroom aids such as braille compasses and rulers, embossed maps are also supplied by this library.

Mr. Romano also distributed a variety of literature and brochures, including cards with the braille alphabet in raised dots and a card with the simulated face of a braille watch, the use of which he demonstrated on his own wrist watch since he himself is totally blind.







Make an effort to visit the library in April and see the work of this accomplished young man.





Many Ideas On How To Get Affordable Housing On L.I.

Input callers had a variety of ideas on whether there should be more two family and other multiple dwellings in Nassau County in reply to this question: "Do you think the answer to more affordable housing on L.I. is to have more two and other multiple dwellings?" Here are some of the answers:

MORE LEGAL DWELLINGS

Yes. We should allow people to split their houses legally and rezone more houses as legal two-family houses in many places. In this way, the two-family houses would be lower priced than one family and both families would pay their share of taxes for services. As it is now in many places, there are illegal two-family houses and they are not paying any second share for the services they use. J.E.

NO EASY WAY

There is no easy solution to getting affordable housing. The cost of construction keeps going up. The cost of taxes is up and starting families have little choice but to live in apartments or borrow down payments from relatives. The answer might be for the government to help finance more starter type housing in new areas. H.E.

DIFFICULT GOAL

Although buying real estate is considered being a wise investment, being able to afford your own home on Long Island is a goal which is difficult to reach for many. In my opinion, one answer to this problem would be to buy a house that is just not for one family. For those who could not afford that, another alternative would be to buy a condo or co-op. More suitable housing is a possibility with these options. C.P.

WATER SHORTAGE

As far as more multiple dwellings and two-family dwellings here in Nassau, that's out. There's a water shortage, not enough garbage collections and many other things to be considered. Why should we have to pay?

NEED MORE

Yes, if there were more multiple dwellings in the area, the rents would have to go down to a decent level. I think it's ridiculous to pay \$650 for three rooms. But, we people who cannot afford a house are forced to pay high amounts like that. Most mortgages are lower than that. It doesn't take a genius to figure that if there's more to choose from, landlords will have to lower the rent. Nowadays, landlords get whatever they ask for because apartments are so scarce.

INCREASED VALUE

At the first "Town" meeting in Garden City, the accent was definitely on the increasing value of homes in the Village, a trend which seems to be limitless. Clearly, the continuous rise in taxes seemed to have no deterrent effect on newcomers interested in purchasing a home, many of whom sought the benefits of the outstanding values for education, recreation and community life. Actually, a point was made that residents should not be overly hostile to tax increases as the emphasis on maintaining and encouraging continued rises in property values was indeed related to expanding public services and, consequently, higher taxes. This doesn't take into account the fact that many of the residents who have been identified with the growth of Garden City over the years find their incomes in retirement diminishing to the point where rising taxes are a burden with the only alternative the need to relocate elsewhere. In this regard, studies have been, and are being, made to encourage the development by private enterprise of multiple dwelling houses on Long Island and there apparently has been a sufficient demand demonstrated to warrant special efforts by the county to follow through on the idea. While this has been directed to elderly residents who really have no choice but to relocate and for whom it has a definite appeal, it would not solve the problem of many of the younger generation who are employed on Long Island and can ill afford expensive homes. Already, it has been made quite evident that a point has been reached where this is a critical element in staffing commercial enterprise with young career people who find it difficult to find suitable residence near their place of employment. I believe that there is nothing new in the idea of inexpensive apartment-type housing for those who want to live in a bucolic atmosphere without the problems of maintaining a house, so I am sure that affordable multiple dwellings would provide answers for many residents. However, we cannot avoid tempering this with the fact that extreme caution must be observed in consideration of the mounting concern over the adequacy and quality of Long Island's water supply.

Q. Is it proper to tip soup or dessert dishes? And when is soup eaten with a spoon? I sometimes see people drinking bouillon, etc. directly from a cup. Is this correct?

C.T.

A. The tipping of a soup or dessert dish is acceptable if the plate is tipped away from the spoon, not toward the eater. Soup or bouillon served in a handled cup or (Oriental fashion) small, cup sized bowl may be drunk. If there are vegetables or other garnish floating on top, these may be lifted off with the spoon before the soup is drunk. Noodles or other things which may be in the bottom of the cup are spooned up after the liquid has been drunk.



Cooking Corner

Take this pepper and stuff it!

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS

6 large green peppers
1 pound ground beef
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup finely chopped onion
1 cup cooked rice
1 can (15 ounces) tomato sauce
1 tablespoon Worcestershire
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon basil leaves, crushed
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup shredded cheddar cheese

With sharp knife, slice tops off green peppers; discard seeds and membranes. Finely chop pepper tops to make $\frac{1}{2}$ cup; set aside.

In 10-inch skillet over high heat, heat 1 inch water to boiling. Add pepper shells cut side down. Reduce heat to low. Cover; simmer 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Drain peppers on paper towels. Empty water from skillet; dry skillet.

In same skillet over medium-high heat, cook beef, onion and chopped green pepper until meat is browned and vegetables are tender. Pour off fat. Stir in rice, 1 cup tomato sauce, Worcestershire, salt and basil. Heat to boiling; remove from heat.

Spoon meat mixture into pepper shells. In 10x6-inch baking dish, place stuffed peppers upright. Pour remaining tomato sauce over peppers. Cover with foil.

Bake at 350 F 30 minutes. Uncover; sprinkle each pepper with cheese. Bake 10 minutes more.

Makes 6 servings.

STUFFED BELL PEPPERS ITALIANO

1 pound mild Italian sausage
1 large onion, chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced or pressed
1 large eggplant, cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cubes
1 large tomato, chopped
 $\frac{1}{4}$ pound mushrooms, sliced
1 teaspoon each thyme leaves, ground cumin and crushed fennel seeds
8 large red or green bell peppers
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped walnuts
1 egg
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese

Remove sausage casings; crumble meat into wide frying pan over medium heat and cook until browned. Add onion and garlic and cook, stirring, until onion is soft. Stir in eggplant, tomato, mushrooms, thyme, cumin and fennel seeds. Cook, uncovered, stirring

occasionally, until eggplant is very tender to bite and liquid has evaporated (about 15 minutes). Let cool slightly.

Cut off pepper tops; remove seeds. Drop peppers and tops into large quantity of boiling water, boil, uncovered, for 3 minutes. Drain, plunge into cold water, then drain again. Arrange peppers in a greased, shallow 2-quart baking dish. Stir walnuts, egg, and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of cheese into vegetable mixture; evenly spoon into peppers. Replace pepper tops.

Bake, covered, in a 400 F oven for 25 minutes or until hot throughout. Uncover, remove pepper tops, sprinkle filling with remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cheese, and bake for 10 more minutes or until cheese is melted. Replace tops, if desired.

Makes 8 servings.

PEPPERS STUFFED WITH SPANISH RICE

4 large sweet green or red peppers, washed
4 cups Spanish rice
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup coarsely grated Monterey Jack or sharp cheddar cheese
1 cup water (about)

Preheat oven to 375 F. Slice top from peppers, hollow out and parboil.

Stand close together in an ungreased shallow 1-quart casserole, fill with Spanish rice and sprinkle with cheese. Pour water around peppers.

Bake, uncovered, 45 minutes until peppers are tender, checking occasionally to make sure water hasn't boiled away — there should be a little in the bottom of the casserole at all times. Using 2

large spoons, lift peppers to a heated dish and serve.

Makes 4 servings.

The remaining recipes are from HP's "The Best of Cooking for All Occasions." In the first two recipes the filling and pepper bake together; in the third recipe the pepper serves as a fresh and colorful natural container.

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS WITH PEPPER SAUCE

4 medium green bell peppers
1 day-old dinner roll
1 onion, finely chopped
 $\frac{1}{4}$ pound mixed lean ground beef and pork
2 eggs, beaten
1 can (about 8 ounces) whole-kernel corn, drained
Salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste
1 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 $1\frac{1}{4}$ cups beef stock
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup half-and-half
1 teaspoon cornstarch
1 tablespoon bottled green peppercorns, drained

Halve bell peppers and remove seeds; do not remove stems. Tear roll into small pieces and soften in a little cold water; squeeze out any excess moisture.

In a bowl, mix softened roll, onion, beef, pork, eggs, corn, salt, white pepper and paprika. Stuff bell pepper halves evenly with meat mixture. Melt butter or margarine in a saucepan; add peppers, stuffed sides up. Cover and cook 5 minutes.

In another saucepan, bring stock to a boil; pour around peppers, cover and simmer 30 minutes longer.

To serve, lift peppers from pan, transfer to a warm platter and keep warm. Skim and discard fat from cooking juices.

In a small bowl, stir together half-and-half and cornstarch; stir into cooking juices. Cook, stirring, until sauce is slightly thickened. Stir in peppercorns. Spoon sauce over peppers.

Makes 4 servings.

Sweet peppers will maintain their quality for several days if stored in a plastic bag in the refrigerator. Once cut, however, they should be tightly wrapped in plastic and used within 24 hours.

Overcooked peppers can become bitter, so prepare with care. Experts recommend parboiling peppers that are to be stuffed for about 5 minutes, then draining them and rubbing them with oil. Peppers stuffed with cooked foods should be baked in a preheated 350 F oven for 15 to 25 minutes. Those stuffed with uncooked mixtures should be baked at 350 F for 30 to 50 minutes.



Salad dressings

HOMEMADE SALAD DRESSINGS are one of the best investments of time a busy cook can make. Just a few minutes' work can produce a dressing perfectly suited to the salad you're serving, and to the other courses you've planned.

For many people, salad dressings are something poured from a bottle or, at best, something whipped up from a packet of pre-mixed ingredients. While some of the commercially produced dressings are fairly good, none can compete with a dressing made with fresh ingredients.

The list of potential salad and dressing ingredients is almost endless. When you are planning a salad, think of the rest of the courses, and the textures and tastes that would complement them best. Salads can also add color to a table, so consider, too, the visual effect of the salad you are planning.

Each of today's recipes can be kept in the refrigerator for several days. In the case of the Spicy Sour Cream Dressing, a day in the refrigerator adds greatly to the flavor.

GARLIC DRESSING
1 to 2 cloves garlic, finely minced
½ teaspoon salt (or to taste), preferably coarse kosher or sea salt
¼ teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper (or to taste)
2 tablespoons vinegar
½ to ¼ cup olive oil

Total preparation time: 4 minutes

It is best to make this dressing in a round-bottomed, oiled wooden salad bowl. Put salt, garlic and pepper in bowl and use back of a fork to mash mixture against sides of bowl. The coarseness of salt and pepper will help to pulverize garlic. When mixture has become pastelike, add vinegar and stir to dissolve salt. Add olive oil (½ cup to start, add to taste), and blend vigorously with a fork.

Makes enough for a large salad for 4.

HERB DRESSING
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 teaspoon dill weed
¼ teaspoon tarragon
1 pinch thyme
1 pinch oregano
1 tablespoon fresh parsley
½ teaspoon salt (or to taste)
¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper (or to taste)
1 teaspoon soy sauce
2 tablespoons vinegar
½ to ¼ cup olive oil

Total preparation time: 15 minutes

Stir all ingredients except olive oil together until mustard is dissolved. Allow to stand for 10 minutes, then blend in olive oil. Start with ½ cup, and add additional oil to taste.

Makes enough for a large salad for 4.

SPICY SOUR CREAM DRESSING

1 to 2 large cloves garlic, finely minced
1 teaspoon dill weed
¼ cup chopped fresh parsley
1 teaspoon salt (or to taste)
½ teaspoon pepper (or to taste)
1 tablespoon lemon juice
8 ounces sour cream

Total preparation time: 2 minutes

Mix all ingredients together and stir briskly. If possible, make this dressing ahead of time — even the day before. Garlic and black pepper make this a fairly spicy dressing, so you may want to experiment to be sure that it's not too piquant for your taste.

Makes enough for a large salad for 4.

PEANUT BUTTER AND PEPPER DRESSING

2 tablespoons smooth peanut butter
3 tablespoons warm water
2 tablespoons soy sauce
1 tablespoon cider vinegar
2 tablespoons corn oil
2 teaspoons hot pepper oil or 1 teaspoon cayenne
2 teaspoons sugar
½ teaspoon salt
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 tablespoons minced scallion

Total preparation time: 5 minutes

Combine peanut butter with warm water to form smooth, thin sauce. Add all remaining ingredients except garlic and scallion and blend until smooth. Just before serving, stir in garlic and scallion.

Makes enough for a salad for 4.



Microwave magic

When buying live oysters, avoid those with broken shells. Shells should be tightly closed, so discard any whose shells gap open and do not close immediately when tapped. The oyster "liquor" should be thin and clear, and there should be no ammonialike odor.

To open oysters in the shell, scrub well and rinse in cold water. Insert the point of a sharp knife into the hinged end and push the blade in until the valves begin to separate. Run the knife around the shell, separate valves, and loosen the oyster.

To microwave six fresh, live oysters, combine ¼ cup water with one tablespoon butter in a two-quart glass casserole. Microwave one minute on HIGH (100 percent power) to boil. Arrange oysters in dish, adding ¼ cup dry white wine and two cloves garlic, minced. Cover and microwave about three minutes. Let stand, covered, two to three minutes (until shells open slightly). Open and serve on the half-shell, using liquid as dipping sauce.

Also available frozen and canned, oysters are rich in minerals and a good source of protein.

MICROWAVE OYSTERS ROCKEFELLER

1 (10-ounce) package frozen chopped spinach
12 large oysters
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Tabasco sauce
Dash salt
2 tablespoons butter
¼ cup dry bread crumbs
¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese
½ teaspoon dried parsley flakes

Preparation Time: 5 to 10 minutes

Cooking Time: 10 to 13 minutes
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Place spinach in small dish. Cover and microwave 5 to 6 minutes, stirring after 3 minutes, until heated through. Drain thoroughly, then squeeze in paper towels to remove excess moisture. Set aside.

Divide oysters among 4 small glass serving dishes, or place 3 oysters in each shell. Sprinkle lightly with lemon juice, Tabasco sauce and salt.

In small glass bowl combine butter, bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese and parsley flakes. Microwave 15 to 20 seconds, until butter melts. Stir to moisten dry ingredients.

Spoon cooked, drained spinach over oysters, then sprinkle evenly with crumb mixture. Cover loosely with wax paper. Microwave 5 to 7 minutes, or until oysters are done.

Serves 4.

SCALLOPED OYSTERS

3 packages (12 ounces each) frozen oysters, thawed
¾ cup butter
2 cups fine soda cracker crumbs (about 40 individual squares)
½ teaspoon each pepper and nutmeg
½ cup half-and-half
Fresh parsley sprigs (for garnish)

Preparation Time: 5 to 10 minutes

Cooking Time: 14 to 17 minutes
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

NOTE: Crush soda crackers with rolling pin to make fine crumbs.

Drain oysters well, reserving ¼ cup liquid. Set aside.

Place butter in small glass mixing bowl and microwave about 1 minute, or until melted. Add cracker crumbs to melted butter and stir to moisten.

Spread one-third of crumb mixture over bottom of shallow 10x6-inch glass baking dish. Cover with half of the oysters and sprinkle with a little pepper and nutmeg. Top with one-third of remaining crumbs, then cover with remaining oysters and sprinkle with remaining seasonings. Sprinkle remaining one-third of crumbs evenly over top.

Combine half-and-half with reserved oyster juice; pour evenly over top. Microwave, uncovered, 13 to 16 minutes, rotating dish one-quarter turn every 5 minutes, until oysters are done. Garnish with parsley sprigs and serve immediately.

Serves 4 to 6.

EASY OYSTER CREAM SOUP

1 pint fresh oysters
1 quart half-and-half
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
½ teaspoon onion salt
Dash garlic salt
¼ teaspoon white pepper
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, cut into small pieces
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Preparation Time: 5 minutes
Cooking Time: 10 to 13 minutes
Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power) Serves 4 to 6.

Shell oysters and drain, reserving liquid. Combine liquid with half-and-half in 2-quart glass casserole. Cover and microwave 8 to 10 minutes, stirring after 5 minutes, until mixture is almost boiling.

Stir in oysters, Worcestershire sauce, onion and garlic salt, and pepper. Microwave 2 to 3 minutes, stirring every minute, until oysters begin to curl around the edges. Stir in butter until it melts. Ladle into serving bowls and sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Here's How

Q: We have a white ceramic tile floor in our bathroom. At one time I used a liquid wax on the floor. As a result, over a period of time, the grout in between the tiles has become discolored.

Can you tell me what would be effective for cleaning the grout? — J.D.

A: The grout between the tiles is a very porous material. It may be impossible to lighten the stains caused by wax.

However, try applying a thick mixture of household scouring powder and hot water. Let this paste stand for five to 10 minutes, scrub with a stiff-bristled brush and rinse well.

If stains remain, apply undiluted bleach for at least five minutes, rinse well and dry.

If this treatment fails, you can replace the existing grout with a new surface coat. Purchase a grout saw from your local tile dealer. This is an instrument you can use between the tiles to remove about one-half of the existing grout. Apply new grout over the older grout remaining.

Once the floor is cleaned and dried, the grout joints can be treated with an acrylic sealer to help them stay clean longer. Repeat this treatment once every

three to four months.

You can also seal the grout joints with Genuine Old English Lemon Oil Furniture Polish. Apply three consecutive coats, letting each coat dry for an hour before applying the next one. Remove excess polish from glazed tile and ceramic mosaic with damp sponge.

Q: The previous owner of my house painted the ceramic tile in the master bedroom shower stall with epoxy paint that I would like to remove. It appears that the ceramic tile in another bathroom was also painted with epoxy paint, but this was removed (except for traces here and there).

Can you tell me how to remove it without damaging the ceramic tile? — O.M.W.

A: Check with your local paint dealer for a recommendation on a paint remover for epoxy paints. Follow manufacturer's directions carefully. I suggest that you test the product in an inconspicuous area to see how well it removes the paint. It is also important that you inspect the condition of the tile underneath the paint.

The standard recommendation for preparation of a tile surface

for painting is to roughen the surfaces so the new coats of paint will adhere to the tile. You may find that it is very difficult to remove the paint and that the tile surface underneath is too damaged to be appealing.

Q: Is there any way you can get a stuck glass stopper out of a bottle? I have tried to no avail. I need help. — I.W.

A: Cold will do the trick at times. Put the bottle in your refrigerator for about an hour. Remove and try pulling the stopper with firm gentle pressure.

If this fails, try WD-40. Be sure the bottle is dry, then apply it around the stopper and let set before applying pressure.

One caution, if the glass bottle is a delicate crystal, it might not sustain extreme temperature.

Q: I am the owner of an all-brick home that has been painted about 23 years ago. I was not the person who painted it.

I would like to know if sandblasting can damage the brick and mortar. Are there any particular precautions that should be taken? — E.J.W.

A: If the brick is in good condition you should not have any problems with sandblasting by a qualified contractor.

Contact a professional company in your area and ask for an inspection and price estimate on the job. You may want to get two or three opinions and price bids for the job. Be sure to check references of the contractor and have a written contract for the work to be done.

vances in computerization being developed now within the Social Security Administration.

Hardy says that "within the reasonable future, Social Security should be able to prepare an annual printout report to all eligible adults, say from age 50 or 55, updating each individual's benefit levels as earned to that date."

Q: There are just the two of us — no children — and everything we own is in both of our names. Is it necessary for us to have a will? — A.C.

A: With all possessions in both names all property should pass easily and legally to the survivor, if one of you precedes the other in death. Still, you should have an attorney check the actual wording of how both names are listed on all real property titles. A will may help guarantee that right of survivorship.

By not having a will you will not have directed the disposition of your estate should you both die simultaneously, such as in an accident. By not having a will, drawn and agreeable to both of you, the survivor, if one dies earlier, faces the burden of such a decision alone regarding the disposition of the estate.

I would recommend that you do create a will, assuring the right of survivorship and directing the disposition of your estate should you both die simultaneously. Such a document may also direct the disposition of your estate if one of you is a lone survivor.

You have worked and saved to provide for that estate. It has been part of your productive lives. How do you want the value of your estate to be directed when you are no longer here? Perhaps you can designate it to benefit a charitable cause, to help fund a recreation center in your city or to benefit others in a permanent way. You can direct this as your order in a will.

Without a will and without heirs the state would declare you were intestate (without a will) and claim all of the estate as income to the general fund or other fund.

I suggest you explore the subject together and then take your desires and directions to your attorney. You can protect each other as survivors and assure your legacy at the same time.

Q: As a veteran, I received an increase in my benefit by only \$5 this year. Last year it was \$11. Why? — R.T., Fresno, Calif.

A: Cost-of-living increases for veterans' benefits, Social Security and other federal retirement or disability programs, are indexed to the rate of inflation. In earlier years the rate of inflation was higher, so the cost-of-living increase was significant. Last year, as the rate of inflation was only 4 percent, Congress could have skipped any COLA increase. By special legislation the increase rate was set for 1987 at 1.3 percent. That is why your increase was \$5. My own service-connected disability check (at 10 percent disability) went up just \$1.

Garlic: gutsy, and good for you!

Eating garlic may not give you the sweetest breath in town, but it can help protect you against heart disease, according to recent studies.

The artaking of the pungent bulb appears to reduce cholesterol and triglyceride levels in the blood, inhibiting the formation of blood clots. Garlic also plays a role in lowering high blood pressure and warding off infection (not to mention vampires).

Garlic has a gutsy flavor you either love or hate — no middle-of-the-roaders here! Using a garlic press intensifies the flavor and releases more of the harsh oils, so I prefer my cloves minced. For a milder, more mellow flavor, peeled cloves may be boiled in a small amount of water for about five minutes before mincing.

To peel individual cloves, press gently with the flat side of a knife or blanch for several seconds in boiling water, then plunge into cold water and skin will slip off easily.

GARLIC 'N' PARSLEY POTATOES
1 1/2 pounds potatoes
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 large cloves garlic, minced
1/4 teaspoon salt
Freshly ground black pepper

Preheat oven to 350 F.

Scrub or peel potatoes and cut into even-size 1/4-inch cubes. Boil in water to cover about 15 minutes, until potatoes are just tender.

Place potatoes in shallow baking dish. Add parsley and toss. In small bowl thoroughly blend together butter and garlic. Dot potatoes with garlic butter and sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper.

Bake in preheated oven 40 to 45 minutes, stirring gently several times, until golden brown. Serves 4 to 6.

LEMON GARLIC STRING BEANS

2 cups string beans, washed, trimmed and cut into 2-inch lengths
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 clove garlic, minced
1/4 teaspoon dried crushed basil
Juice of 1/2 lemon
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper

Bring 2 cups water to rolling boil in saucepan. Add string beans and cook until just tender, 7 to 10 minutes (do not overcook).

Drain beans and return to hot saucepan. Add all remaining ingredients and saute, tossing, for about 1 minute. Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

BASQUE BROCCOLI

2 heads fresh broccoli
1/4 cup olive oil
2 tablespoons minced fresh garlic
1/4 teaspoon dried hot red pepper flakes
1/4 teaspoon salt
Freshly ground black pepper

Wash broccoli and cut into florets. Peel tough stalks with vegetable peeler and cut into thin strips.


In large pot bring to a boil enough water to cover broccoli. Add broccoli and cook briefly, 3 to 4 minutes, until bright green and crisp-tender. Drain thoroughly.

Heat oil in large, heavy skillet. Add broccoli, garlic, red pepper flakes, salt and pepper. Cover and cook 3 to 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Serve immediately.



Backyard Gardener



Rx for cabin fever

It seems to me that early spring, when outdoor gardening enthusiasts are becoming sorely afflicted with cabin fever, is a most appropriate time to invest in a good gardening book, either for yourself or as a gift for a green-thumbed friend or relative.

By far the most extravagantly beautiful of all the more recently published garden books that have been sent to me for reviewing and a perfect book for any serious lover of roses, is "Classic Roses" by Peter Beales (Holt, Rinehart and Winston; 432 pages, hardback \$45). This is a unique book, an illustrated encyclopedia and grower's manual of old roses, shrub roses and climbers.

Beginning with the history and evolution of the rose, the author proceeds to describe the many ways in which old and shrub roses can be incorporated into the garden landscape and to suggest some amiable garden companions to these roses. The third part of the book deals in a most clear and personable manner with the growing of roses, from purchasing and planting through pruning each type, fertilizing, propagating and controlling pests and diseases.

But the greater part of the book is a comprehensive dictionary of old roses, covering over 1,000 species and hybrids by family. In the family chinensis, for example, are included tea roses, our modern-hybrid teas and climbing hybrid tea

roses. Floribunda (cluster-flowered) roses and modern shrub roses are included in the family synstylae and I was surprised to find among the modern shrub roses the 1987 All-America Rose Selections award winner Bonica. It was developed in 1984.

Each rose is described concisely, with details of the flowers and their scent, foliage and fruit. Given also are the size and shape of the plant, and coded notations suggest the rose's suitability for various soils, sites and uses — including container culture.

Illustrated with 540 color photographs which are artistically in-

terspersed with a pleasantly readable text, "Classic Roses" is, indeed, a classic work and a visual delight.

Natural and lovely companions to old roses in a garden are herbs, and in its sixth printing now is Garden Way's "Growing and Using Herbs Successfully" by Betty E.M. Jacobs (Storey Communications Inc.; 223 pages; soft-cover, \$8.95.)

This most useful, information-packed book is geared to the needs of the beginning herb gardener as well as to the keen amateur and the potential commercial grower of herbs. The author opens with a selection of 32 starter plants for a basic herb garden, with details on the needs and uses of each herb. Then, after a section on selecting and planting purchased herb plants and starting herbs from seed indoors and out, another chapter entices the keen herb gardener into the delights of 32 more suggested herbs.

Reference lists of perennial herbs offer a quick guide to the best method or methods for producing more plants from an originally acquired one. The methods — division of the plants and its roots, simple and mound layering, stem cuttings, root cuttings, runners — are made clear and simply by careful step-by-step instructions and line drawings.

After detailing the harvesting, drying, storing and freezing of herbs, the author goes into the growing of herbs for profit. Here are valuable tips on which fresh herbs and herb plants are the best sellers, and on basic equipment and soil preparation needed to get started. Included, too, are suggestions and directions for making culinary, cosmetic and perfumed herb products to sell.

Individual chapters are devoted to parsley and chives, herbs that are much in demand. And most helpful for anyone thinking seriously of getting into the herb business are tips on building a successful herb business — obviously gleaned from years of firsthand experience.

Rough textures enhance casual Western interiors

Q. After a trip to Santa Fe, N.M., we find ourselves smitten with things Southwestern. We bought some rugs, artwork, pottery, baskets, etc., and would like to decorate our living room in this style.

Other than dark wood floors and a stone fireplace, there is nothing even remotely rustic about our living room. How can we give it that casual Southwestern styling we like? — S.C.

A. One of the charms of the Southwestern style is its simple, rough-hewn quality. Of course, few people are seriously willing to sacrifice comfort to achieve this effect. Who really wants a foot full of splinters from a rough-sawn wide plank floor?

You can, however, get the effect you are after with a more comfortable update of the building techniques of the Old West. Make good use of textures in areas that contribute to your style without causing inconvenience or discomfort.

A rough-textured finish plaster on your walls, painted an off-white, will give a rustic whitewashed effect and that clean, bright look of the desert. You also might want to strip and lighten your wood floors to give them a sun-bleached appearance. Your stone fireplace sounds like it fits in already. Rough false beams on the ceiling or a rustic ceiling treatment (like that using pine peeler poles as shown in the photo) also can contribute to the look you are after.

Arches, of course, are very Southwestern and an element your architecture may not provide. But a fabric-covered arched lambrequin over the window can be an inexpensive way to add this element and provide a suitably simple window treatment as well.

Q. We have installed a heat-conserving fireplace unit with metal and glass doors for the purposes of energy conservation. It is undoubtedly efficient but it looks so small and unimportant in our living room wall. Is there some way we can give it more importance and pizzazz? — D.G.

A. Your fireplace probably looks unimposing because it is out of scale with the wall around it. That can be remedied easily by providing it with a dramatic "frame."

If your home has traditional styling, you might add a free-standing fireplace facade of wood, stone or marble. Some antique fireplace facades are available through salvage companies and there are new reproductions on the market too.

In more contemporary homes, fireplace openings can be framed simply with ceramic tile, marble, chrome, mirror, fine woods — actually any material that is appropriate to the setting.

Whatever the style or material used, you can make your fireplace a dramatic focal point by "matting and framing" it as carefully as you would a favorite painting.



Your tea set is silver-plated



Q: The mark on the bottom of this silver set is "Dixon," followed by a picture of a trumpet. Can you tell me anything about its vintage and value?

A: Your tea set is silver-plated and was made in Sheffield, England, by James Dixon & Sons during the late 19th century.

A dealer would sell this for from \$325 to \$375 in good condition.

Q: This mark is on the bottom of my cup and saucer. I always thought it was Meissen but someone told me recently that it was a fake. I hope you can clear this up for me.



A: Your friend probably is right. The mark you sent me was used by Meissen from 1723 to 1736 during the reign of Augustus Rex. It also was used on fakes by Helena Wolfsohn, R.E. Haidinger and others in the late 19th century.

The original pieces of Meissen were for the use of the king, so it is unlikely that you have a cup and saucer that was originally the property of Augustus Rex of Saxony.

If your cup and saucer are 19th century fakes, they would be worth about \$100. Originals would be worth several thousand dollars.

Q: We have a large serving dish that is very brightly colored. It is unmarked, but we have been told that it is Majolica.

Please tell us what Majolica is.

A: Majolica was first made in the 16th century. It was of Italian origin and has been made all over the world since then. Most of the Majolica seen today was made in America in the last quarter of the 19th century. There also was some made in Italy in the mid-19th century. Wedgwood made Majolica and there were several potters in Germany producing it. It ranges in price from less than \$100 for recent pieces to several hundred dollars for pieces 200 to 300 years old.

Points on Pets

Q: We have a 3-year-old quarter horse gelding. My neighbor says that I should have the horse dewormed and treated for bots.

I am not familiar with bots. What are they and how can I prevent them in my horse?

A: Horses, mules, donkeys and ponies may be infected by many internal parasites. Generally, these parasites can be categorized as either round worms or as insects with an internal stage of development.

The common round worms include ascarids, strongyles, threadworms, pinworms and stomach worms.

The most common insect with an internal stage of development in the horse is the stomach bot.

Worming following the first frost is usually aimed a controlling bots. An explanation of the bot's life cycle will help explain this recommendation.

Bots are the larvae or immature worms of the botfly. The adult botfly resembles a bee and is active from early summer until the first hard frost in winter.

During the warm months of the year, the adult botflies lay eggs on the hair of the horse's chest, forelegs, neck and nose. One to two weeks following laying, the eggs hatch. The larvae then enter the horse's mouth as the horse licks itself.

For approximately one month the larvae move through the body of the horse and eventually reach the stomach. The bots attach themselves to the inner lining of the stomach wall where they mature. After maturing the bots detach themselves from the stomach lining and eventually are passed out of the horse in the manure.

During the passage the bots mature into pupae. Once outside the horse, the pupae burrow into the ground. Adult flies develop in the pupal casts and then emerge during warm weather.

Botflies are killed by freezing temperatures. Control of stomach bots should include fly control, egg removal and periodic worming. Although the flies can be killed with insecticides, it is difficult to completely control bots by this means.

Eggs can be removed from the horse by frequent grooming. The eggs must be removed at least twice weekly for effective control. Horses should be wormed at least twice yearly to control bots.

Horses should be wormed after the first frost to kill any internal bots and during early spring to kill any larvae that were in the horse's tissues at the time of the previous treatment. The spring treatment should also reduce the number of live pupae passing from the horse in its manure.


There are many wormers on the market. Not all the horse wormers are effective against bots. Many of the anti-bot preparations are toxic and should be used with extreme care. Therefore, it is wise to consult your veterinarian as to the type of drugs you should use on your horses.

The consequences of not controlling bots can be disastrous. Because bots attach to the inner lining of the stomach, they interfere with digestion. If enough bots are present, they may block the opening into the small intestine and cause colic and even rupture the stomach. By utilizing the simple control measures outlined here, the problem of bots can be avoided.
