Voters Approve Budget Second Time Around

With two weeks left on the current school fiscal calendar, Hicksville residents approved the School District's \$42,259,330 budget for 1987-88. Some 2296 voters returned to the polls on Wednesday, June 17, 26 residents shy of the 2322 who came out for the May 6th vote. But the voters approved the budget by 250 votes, as opposed to the previous 54-vote defeat. The budget carries an estimated tax rate increase of \$1.51 per \$100 assessed valuation.

Trustee Carole Wolf reported that the Ad Hoc Committee on Elementary Reorganization met twice during June, and 25 of the 26 members compiled 38 different proposals. The committee will meet again on Wednesday, September 9, at which time they will divide the options down to ten for the October meeting.

The Board handled educational and civil service personnel items, including appointments and excesses. Mary Sue Carr was appointed Assistant Principal of the Senior High School, and Mr. Gregory Romano will assume the position of Supervisor of Academic Enrichment. Mr. Romano replaces Marie Marshall who has been appointed as Assistant Principal of the Middle School.

Six positions, two teachers and four teacher aides, were abolished in the special education area on the elementary level due to declining enrollment. This action brings the District's number of elementary self-contained classes to eleven.

Having completed assigned duties, the positions of transitional coordinator at the Middle and Senior High Schools was abolished. The coordinator position of Junior High School Social Studies was also deleted.

The trustees unanimously approved an 8 1/2% salary increase for Superintendent Catherine Fenton, bringing her annual salary to \$88,000. The Board also approved a contract with Attorney Gregory Guercio, at an increase from \$27,500 to \$30,000 for the year covering July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988.

Other items acted upon and approved by the Board included: Payment in the amount of \$3,250 to Brunswick Appraisal Associates for the appraisal of the Burns Avenue School and property; approval of the renewal application for the Special Milk Program and School Lunch Program Contract for 1987-88; approval of the extension of transportation contracts with Harran Bus Company, TomFor Bus Company and We Transport for 1987-88 at an increase of 4%; and the award of bids for repair and maintenance work in the amount of \$145,659.

In Dr. Fenton's monthly report to the Board, she updated progress on the Board's five year goals set in 1985. In the area of Language Arts, she reported that under the district's new writing program at the elementary level, each child retains a folder containing his/her work from kindergarten through 6th grade. During 1987-88 the writing program will be extended into the Middle School.

In the Mathematics area, students are being given tests at the beginning and end of each year to measure growth within the academic term. The district has also sought to improve the guidance area on the secondary level. In doing so, the district has attempted to form a system wherein the entire 7-12 grade level will be working as a unit. The middle school and senior high school guidance chairs will complement each other and be able to transfer student records more easily.

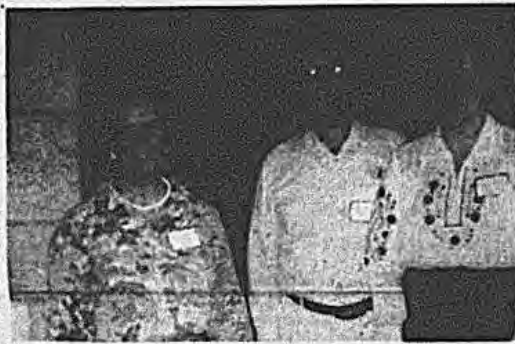
Another long term Board goal is to track student mastery in basic skills. On the secondary level, competent students are being required to take Regents courses. The Board will review all goals at its July organizational meeting.

The Board and Superintendent were questioned by former trustee Arlene Rudin concerning a recent newspaper article, "Education Funds Fail the Test." The article states that the number of Hicksville

6th graders passing remedial reading has dropped from 86% to 83% from 1983 to 1986. Dr. Fenton contends that since the newspaper article includes special education students and the district's computations do not, figures tend to be slanted downward.

The article also points out that only 60% of high schoolers are passing English Regents. Dr. Fenton agreed with the newspaper figures, but stated that Hicksville has set the standard that the Regents program is the level of achievement for the district. (In the well publicized survey conducted last year, residents expressed the desire for the District to set a Regents goal, and students are now being actively encouraged to take Regents classes.)

Dr. Fenton also mentioned that the district has increased the amount of graduates seeking post high school education from 69% in 1983 to 76.3% this year.

Board President William Bennett presented plaques commemorating service on the Board to out-going trustees Jay Schwartz and Lawrence Moor. Mr. Bennett spoke about Mr. Schwartz' tenure as President of the Board, and he thanked him for his many contributions in the policy area. Mr. Bennett characterized Mr. Moor as "the silent man" and one whom he would personally miss as a fellow trustee. Eight professional staff members were also honored for their outstanding achievements.

The Hicksville School Board will hold its annual organizational meeting on Tuesday, July 7, at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building. New trustees Joanne Miltenberg and Mark Cardella will be seated at this meeting.

Solid Waste Removal Hearing Set For July 14

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a hearing to consider amending the section of the Code of Ordinances dealing with Solid Waste.

Some of the proposed changes are necessary to amend previously adopted recycling guidelines. The current ordinance requires labels, metal caps and neck rings be removed from bottles being recycled. Since the Town has procured a vendor who does not require this, the section can be eliminated from the Code. Additional subsections of the recycling ordinance would require homeowners to plainly mark their addresses on recycling pails and use water-proof containers for any excess recycling material which cannot be placed in the designated pail.

Under consideration will be changes brought about by the Town's revised bulk pick-up and rubbish policy. These changes would include the number and weight of containers, restriction on the size of rubbish articles and the number of bulk items which can be placed for collection on any one day.

An increase in the top fee will also be taken under consideration. The proposal would increase the tip fee to \$3.75 per 100 pounds, effective November 1, 1987.

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, July 14, at 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Vehicle Limits Set In Plainview

Oyster Bay Town Councilman John Venditto announced that the Town Board has acted today, June 9, to prohibit trucks with a gross weight of more than 18,000 pounds (9 tons) to travel on specific streets in Plainview.

The Code of Ordinances has been amended to read that trucks weighing more than 18,000 pounds will no longer be permitted north and southbound on Round Swamp Road between Old Country Road and Quaker Meeting House Road, on Bethpage-Sweet Hollow Road, east and west, between Round Swamp Road and the Town of Oyster Bay-Town of Huntington boundary line, and on Old Bethpage Road, north and south, between Plainview Road and Round Swamp Road.

According to Venditto, surveys were conducted by both the Nassau County Police Department and the Nassau County Department of Public Works which resulted in the Oyster Bay Town Board holding a public hearing on March 31. The surveys were done at the County level since Old Bethpage Road and Round Swamp Road are both owned and maintained by Nassau County. The Town's function is to enact traffic regulations within the guidelines recommended by that agency.

Venditto noted that the Town has met with the Nassau County Police Department so that they are aware of the problem and to request conscientious enforcement of this new ordinance, and of existing traffic regulations in the area.

P.O. Window Service Changes

The Hicksville Post Office has been adjusting their window hours to better serve its postal customers. As a result of this testing, Roger Nienaber, General Manager/Postmaster of the Hicksville Division is pleased to announce that beginning June 15, the Hicksville Post Office will have a full service window open until 7 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday. This is in addition to our Express Mail window that is open Monday through Friday until 8 p.m. We will also adjust our opening hours to 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday on a trial

basis. A decision on permanent hours will be made after a feasibility test has been taken. "Communications with our customers is vital to the future of the Postal Service," says Roger Nienaber. "Adjusting hours lets our customers know we care about their needs and that we, in the Postal Service, are willing to listen to them and change to meet their needs. Lifestyles are changing, customers want convenience and to be a truly successful organization we must satisfy all their mailing needs."

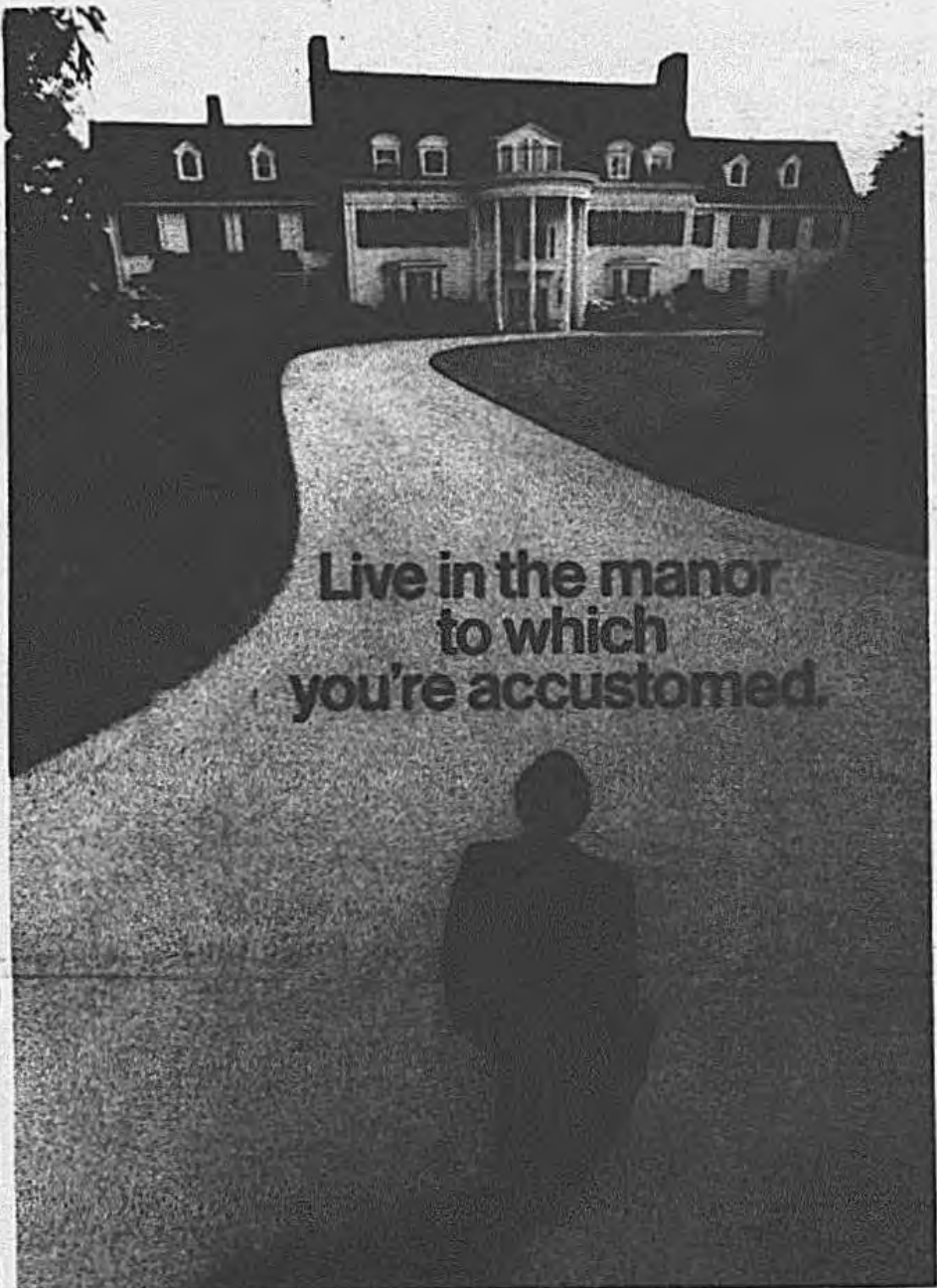



Regional Simplicity (and lower rates too!)

Wouldn't it be nice if it were easier to tell how much a call from Pelham to Patchogue would cost? Or from Queens to White Plains? Or Nyack to Manhattan? And wouldn't it be nicer yet if these calls cost less?

We're taking the New York Metropolitan Area and eliminating all bands and zones, replacing them with just seven regions:

New York City, Nassau, Eastern Suffolk, Western Suffolk, Lower Westchester, Upper Westchester and Putnam, Rockland and Southeastern Orange Counties.

When dialing from region to region, all calls from any point in one region to any

point within another will be billed at the same rate. That means, the call from Pelham to Patchogue will cost the same as a call from Pelham to Montauk because both Patchogue and Montauk are in the Eastern Suffolk region.

The seven new regions are larger than your present local calling areas, and eliminate long distance pricing within the New York Metropolitan Area. As a result, the average residential telephone bill will be reduced by about 2.5 percent and the \$4 monthly allowance will apply to a larger area—the entire downstate metropolitan area. Charges for less than 2 percent of calls made in this area will be increased slightly. Special volume discount plans will be available that could offset this increase and provide further savings for most customers.

If the Regional Call Plan is approved and becomes effective August 30th, you'll see some changes on your September phone bill. You should see lower rates. You will certainly see a simpler bill, with charges identified under the regions you already know. Lower rates, easier to understand bills and just seven familiar regions.

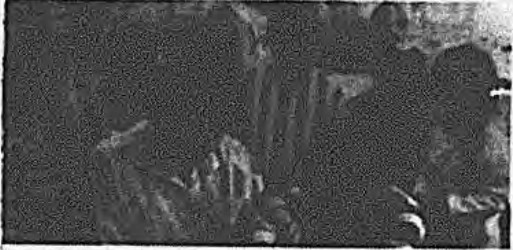
The children were able to watch the butterflies hatch the day after Memorial Day. It was really quite a comical experience watching these beautiful creatures wriggle their way out.

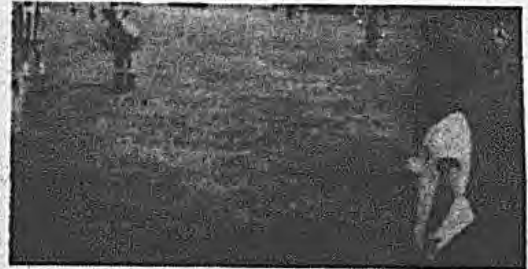

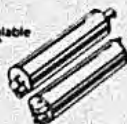

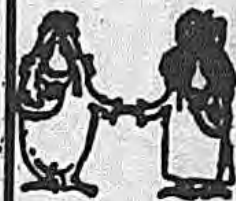

Long Island's growing economy will cause record-breaking demand for electricity this summer.

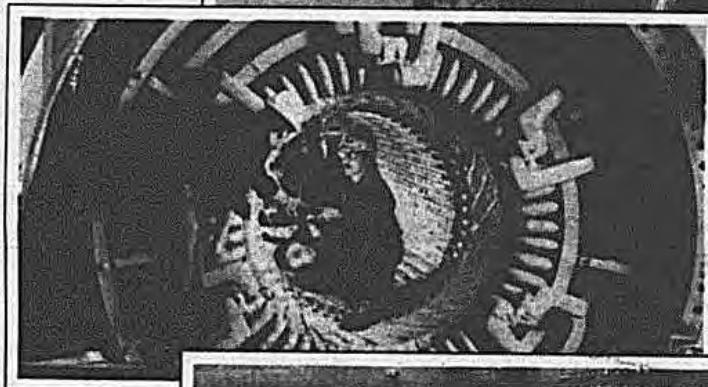
LILCO Efforts
