## Fireworks Fatal To 20 Yr. Old Man

Eighth Squad Det. Lt. Thomas Sinclair reports the details of a fatal accident due to fireworks that occurred at about 9:30 p.m. June 25 at Lincoln Road Park, Plainview.

Michael Goldbach, 20, of 32 Lincoln Rd. with Eric Yudin, 22, of 4 Sarah Dr., Old Bethpage, and Joseph Catalano, 30, also of 32 Lincoln Rd. (Michael's uncle) met at the uncle's home. Acting together, they decided to detonate a 6 in. professional pyrotechnic air display. The device was purchased by Eric the night before in a Plainview shopping center from a youth in a van. The three men took the device to the ball field in the vicinity of second base. They sunk a 6 in. diameter pipe into the ground and loaded the device. Eric then lit a match but the wind blew it out. Michael then bent over the tube to shield the match from the wind. Eric again lit a match and touched the fuse which detonated immediately. The projectile struck Michael in the chest and set his clothes on fire.

The uncle rushed Michael to Central General Hospital, Plainview where he was later pronounced dead at 3:44 a.m. from an impact wound that caused internal injuries.

No charges have been filed and the investigation is continuing.

## Youth Council Aid Local Security

Currently, the Hicksville Youth Council is sponsoring three Neighborhood Watch groups. Members of these groups have gone through two training sessions approximately one and one half hours in length. These training sessions are run by the Nassau County Police Department. These groups have learned basic home security techniques, observation skills, and accurate crime reporting skills. These Neighborhood Watch groups

Det. Lt. Thomas Sinclair, Commanding Officer of the Eighth Squad, urges that parents and young people be aware of the tremendous danger involved with the use of the pyrotechnic device involved in this fatal incident report.

The device has a one ounce base propellant on a 5-6 ounce projectile about the size of a baseball or a little larger. It is believed the device is made in Japan and that it is designed for use by professional fireworks users.

It has a two foot fuse on it, but the police warning is that it is not a slow burning fuse, but instead detonates immediately when ignited.

Additionally, the police say they are looking for the seller of the device. It was purchased Tuesday night, June 23, 1987, in the parking lot of a shopping center in the business district of Bethpage. The seller is described as a male white, about 25 years of age. He has brown hair and an average build. He made the sale from an old brown van in which he had additional devices of the kind involved in the death and other devices as well.

If anyone sees this person or is approached to buy such devices, they should not become involved. Police should be called via 911.



### Finamore-Wells Engagement



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

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## Hicksville.... Then And Now



Jerusalem Avenue looking south in 1954, from north of the L.I. Railroad grade crossing was a tree-canopied avenue beyond the intersection (on right) of Newbridge Rd., which then terminated at Herzog Place. The spire of the Community Reform Church is visible at right rear. Also on the right, the east end of the Hicksville R.R. Station and the offices of Karl Weber, the realtor and attorney Alexander Newcorn. Krasner, Bass & Co., the C.P.A.'s were there too. On the left in front of the railroad water tower (this was still the age of steam locomotives) is G.H. Stattel's farm machinery dealer.



Thirty years later, the horizon is much changed by the overpass of the L.I.R.R. The trees are largely gone south of Herzog Place, and Newbridge Rd. doesn't come here anymore. In place of the many-gabled Victorian Reform Church (which relocated as the Parkway Community Church under Pastor D. McDonald) the National Westminster Bank, U.S.A. can be seen, in center background. The railroad station was relocated to the West in 1963-64. The Hicksville Pro Shop (right) opened in 1981. The Flynn-Noumann Agency is upstairs. The water tower went with the Age of Steam and Stattel's last out to the widening of Jerusalem Avenue in the early Sixties.



Whereas, it is now desired to provide funding for such project; Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. For the class of







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
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## Grandparents Day At Woodland

The Hicksville Public Library Board of Trustees will hold a reorganization meeting on Tuesday, July 7, at 7 p.m. in the Local History Room of the Library.

If you are a non-driver, you know how many times you have been asked for a driver's license for identification. Now the Department of Motor Vehicles issues Non-Driver Identification cards.

Tuesday, July 14, from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at The Hicksville Public Library the Department of Motor Vehicles will process registrations for non-driver I.D. cards.

Applications are now available at the library.

Applicants must be over age 18. A New York State resident and you can not hold both a driver's license and a non-driver I.D. card.

Applicant must bring:  
• Proof of age (birth certificate, medicare card, etc.)

• Proof of address (LILCO bill, library card, etc.)

• Check made out to Commissioner of Motor Vehicles - Do not fill in amount - (fee will vary, to a maximum of \$6.50)

• If I.D. will replace your driver's license, bring the license with you.

Someone will be on hand to assist with filling out the application and to photograph the applicant. A temporary I.D. will be issued and the non-driver I.D. will be mailed within 45 days.

In celebration of the bicentennial year of the Constitution of the United States, The Hicksville Public Library will have an exhibit

• "Censorship in Schools and Libraries."

The exhibit was assembled by the Long Island Coalition Against Censorship, an alliance of organizations that have joined together to oppose censorship and to defend the rights of free speech and free press as guaranteed by the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Some of the material was adapted from the famous exhibit prepared by the New York Public Library in 1984, with ideas and comments contributed by the Long Island Coalition Against Censorship.

The exhibit consists of 24 illustrations of censorship with related text for each one. 10 of the incidents took place on Long Island during the past 30 years. The remainder of the exhibit consists of the text of the First Amendment, definitions of censorship and incidents of censorship in chronological order that have occurred in the United States during the past 100 years. The exhibit will be on display the first 3 weeks in July.

The Hicksville Public Library will show two short films about The American Revolution on Friday, July 3, at 2 p.m.

**The American Revolution: Part I**  
Subtitled "The Cause of Liberty", this is a dramatization based on The Papers of Henry Laurens, President of the First Continental Congress, and his son, John. John is studying law in London during the 1770's and is deeply disturbed by the conflicts that are driving the colonies to the brink of war with the mother country. He eventually decides to leave his English bride behind and sails for America even as the Declaration of Independence is signed.

**The American Revolution: Part 2**  
Subtitled "The Impossible War", this continues the story of Henry and John Laurens. John, home to South Carolina, finds that life is virtually unchanged. He joins the army and travels north to fight the British. Henry

sees only corruption and political intrigue in the halls of the Continental Congress. After the British surrender at Yorktown, John heads south to urge formation of black regiments against still existent pockets of trouble and is tragically killed in a post-war ambush.

This program is free and all are welcome.
