Town Annex To Receive Taxes

The Town Clerk's Annex, located in the Town Parking Garage at Newbridge Road and Duffy Avenue in Hicksville, will be open to receive general tax payments, on Tuesday, August 4 through Friday, August 7, and then again on Monday, August 10 and Tuesday, August 11, according to Town Clerk Ann R. Ocker and Receiver of Taxes Gery F. Musiello.

"In order to provide this service to residents," Mrs. Ocker explained, "the office will remain open from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. to receive tax payments."

"Residents may also pay in person at the Receiver of Taxes Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall West, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay and at Town Hall South, 977 Hicksville Road, Massapequa, during the hours of 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., weekdays."

"When paying in person..." Mrs. Ocker noted, "residents are urged not to pay by cash, only checks or money orders will be accepted and they should bring the entire tax bill. Please do not write on, or deface, the stub as it can cause rejection of the payment by the computer."

Arrest Stops Break In

The Eighth Squad reports the arrest of a 17 year old youth and juvenile accomplice for attempting to burglarize a Hicksville gas station, July 16.

Officer James Brophy, of the Eighth Precinct had just gone off duty and observed the two by one of the bay windows of the Arrow Gas Station, 980 South Broadway, Hicksville. Officer Brophy pulled over and turned out his lights. He observed the pair attempting to enter the station through a bay window by using a window cutter.

Officer Brophy confronted them and placed both under arrest, and waited for assistance to arrive. The 17 year old, identified as Charles Cassano, is charged with Attempted Burglary 2nd Degree and Possession of a Weapon, 3rd Degree, that being an automatic pistol. He will be arraigned at First District Court. The juvenile will appear at Family Court.

The weapon Cassano had was not loaded.

The specific Ronald McDonald House which Ms. Cuzzi spoke about is the world's 100th Ronald McDonald House which is a two story, 18 bedroom residence adjacent to Schneider Children's Hospital at Long Island Jewish Medical Center, designed as a home-away-from-home for families with children in treatment for severe illnesses.

Residents Abiding By Water Restrictions

According to a spokesman at the Hicksville Water District, residents of the area are abiding by the recently imposed water conservation regulations. As of April 1st, the District amended its water plan to conform to Nassau County's Ordinance No. 248-A-1987 which took effect on July 8. The following restrictions apply:

a. No lawn irrigation/sprinkling any day including weekends 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

b. Even numbered premises may irrigate/sprinkle on even numbered days and odd numbered premises on odd numbered days.

Fines of \$50 for first offenders; \$100 for second; \$200 for third and \$500 for each and every offense thereafter will be imposed by the Nassau County Police Department when necessary.

Homeowners are urged to check toilets and faucets for leaks. Toilets are notorious for hidden leaks and can waste hundreds of gallons a day undetected. The best way to check is to drop a little food coloring into a tankful of clear water and wait 5 to 10 minutes to see if it shows up in the bowl. Typical faucet leaks are usually caused by worn washers. Something a homeowner can fix themselves. Dripping faucets and showers can waste 2-10 gallons of water per hour.

County-wide restrictions have been set in motion for those residents with underground sprinkler systems and commercial car washes must use recycled water in their operations. Firefighting apparatus is not affected by the restrictions, however unauthorized use of fire hydrant water will be subject to fines.

Duffy Park Civics Win 'Red Bag' Waste Fight

Approximately seventy members of the Duffy Park Civic Association were informed by their president, Kathy DellRosso, at a Tuesday night meeting that American Medical Waste Systems, located on Duffy Avenue, will no longer handle so-called "red bag" infectious medical waste at the Hicksville site.

Mrs. DellRosso was contacted by Larry Lawrence, general manager of American Medical, who informed the group that it had contacted state agencies with regard to transferring its infectious waste division operations outside Hicksville in November due to concerns of the community about waste health hazards.

The Duffy Park Civic Association has actively campaigned against the operations being conducted at the Duffy Avenue location.







Our Children



Father insensitive to his son's needs

Q. My oldest son is 8 years old and has suffered from having a demanding father. It has caused tremendous stress and pressure in school, extreme emotional frustration and worry beyond his years. I have two other small children and also can see the effects on them.

It is so sad that fathers cannot listen to their wives more to realize they (the wives) know what is best for the children. Men always find time to read the papers and stay abreast of the world, but few seem to have the time to read up on child care and how to cope with and raise children.

More fathers should be aware of how sensitive little people can be. Children are young for such a short time, facing a lifetime of having demands put on them.

A. Some fathers may be offended by your generalizations about

their lack of understanding regarding their children. They may want to point out that not all mothers have the knowledge and feelings you seem to have.

A trend is evolving about which your husband may not be aware. More fathers are becoming involved with their children, perhaps due to there being two working parents in many families.

Sensitivity to the needs of children is growing among both parents. There are many publications that can be helpful for fathers as well as mothers, including "Parent Effectiveness Training" by Thomas Gordon. You may want to visit a good bookstore or your local library, buy or check out one or two books or periodicals, and just happen to leave them around the house where your husband might see them.





Editor's Notebook

The other day someone called this newspaper and asked whether we accept unsigned letters. The answer was no, all letters have to be signed. However, the name of the writer may be withheld at his/her request.

Frankly, we much prefer signed letters. There is something forthright about the person who writes a letter, then takes the credit (or blame) for the views expressed.

Occasionally, however, there is a reason for someone not to divulge his/her identity. A person working for a municipality, as an example, might hesitate to complain about a government problem, fearing his/her job might be in jeopardy.

We hope such things don't occur nowadays in our area, but they could. And recriminations of this kind would be hard to prove.

Letters are always welcome when they express a point of view which has substance. Those which come just before the school or village elections and urge everyone to vote for a particular candidate without giving good reasons are useless. They often end up in the waste basket.

Letters should also not malign people. Certainly they can express strong opinions, but they should not be used to villify or to impugn unworthy motives. No one can get into another's heart or mind; it is better to stick to facts.

It is also a fallacy in logic (argumentum ad hominem) to attack another person, hoping this will destroy the person's arguments. A thing is true or untrue, regardless of who says it or why.
