U.S. Agents, Alleging Evasion Of Tax, Dismantle Jericho Inn

The Jericho Inn, on Jericho Turnpike, midway between Westbury and Jericho, a "Cory Retreat to Meet and Eat" was dismantled by department of internal revenue agents on Sunday following a raid Saturday night in which the proprietor, Fred Keck, and a bartender, Frank Blake, were seized on a charge of selling liquor on which no license had been paid.

Keck and Blake, who live at the inn, the spacious, two-story, stucco structure, were arraigned before a United States commissioner in Brooklyn immediately after their arrest and released on \$1,000 bail pending a hearing. The raid in which six federal agents took part and the dismantling of the inn with axes and crowbars were the first incidents of their kind on Long Island since the repeal of prohibition.

Five patrons were in the establishment when the agents took it over at 9 o'clock Saturday night. They were ordered to leave Sunday night, one or more federal agents stood at the inn's entrance, advising

Fire Destroys Frame School At Syosset

Thirty-Five Year Old Structure Covered By \$12,000 Insurance

The school, which was entirely constructed of wood, was built about 35 years ago. Eleven years ago it was repaired and an addition was put on at the front. The building consisted of three large rooms which had been used in recent years as a meeting place for the Boy Scouts and other local organizations. At one point the site of the old building is not more than 60 feet from the new school, and while the blaze was at its height, windows in the newer building had to be closed to protect furnishing and equipment from the heat.

The heavy containing the old building that has been familiar to generations of Syosset school children crashed to the ground with a roar that many bystanders thought was an explosion. Soon after this the roof collapsed and the complete destruction of the building was only a matter of minutes. A motorized lawn mower and some garden tools which had been housed in a lean-to which had been attached to the school were saved.

Then the next question before the house is: "Where shall we eat?" And you think and think and think, and say a placid you think of except the usual tea room places that are grand for lunch but no place for a dinner date, then is the time to lean heavily on the North Shore Hostess. For she has spent a mad winter trying out new places to eat. The fascinating places that serve cocktails and wine are legion. We will just assume you have your pet spots and pass on to dinner.

Dinner requires the picking of a mood before you choose your restaurant. If you feel in the mood for noise, crowds, a speedy show, choose one of the Broadway dinner restaurants. The diners are about the same, the prices vary within a dollar or two, and the shows depend on beautiful girls. But that type of place fits a mood of carnival and gaiety.

The foreign flavor is largely in the nationality of the entertainers. If, however, you are ravenously hungry and wish the fun of watching your appetite with hers devour, wander over to the East Fifties and there you will find a famous Swedish restaurant that is famous for its huge display tables of appetizers. A courteous waiter hands you a small plate (it is nowhere near large enough) and you start around the table. The artistry of the table is commented on by everyone. You take anything you wish, Swedish meat balls are one of the best choices. Their entire preparation takes three days. There is every variety of

spiced, the six food dishes are unequalled anywhere in town. The liver paste is good as well as the large size shrimp boiled in their shells, and garnished with huge bunches of parsley, the ends of the parsley dipped in paprika. Many a customer goes back for a clean plate and a new variety of dishes. You may, if you find it possible, eat a whole dinner afterwards, but a dinner of the Kungsblom appetizers and pumpernickel bread followed by crackers, cheese, coffee is a perfect dinner. In case you are interested, their bar is particularly nice.

If you like the simplicity of an Italian dinner, and feel the occasion calls for economy try Bartolotto on West 48th Street. Their maitre d' is unexcelled, their broiled mushrooms as an entree, and their spaghetti Milanese as a main course, are amazingly well cooked and seasoned and make a mighty good dinner. Their wine prices are low and the domestic wines very satisfactory. If you happen to like a sweet wine try their muscatel.

For a place with a flair, go down to Charles on 12th Street. Very French, very suave and about \$5 for two. Their onion soup is real onion soup, there is no substitute nor fake about it. It has a surpassing richness and flavor. For a main course try the casserole of sea food. You will be tempted to dunk the bread in the gorgeous rich sauce. If you simply cannot resist genuine French pastry and the pastry table is right under your eyes all evening, heave a sigh and mean that you shouldn't touch it, and then having satisfied your conscience order a chocolate almond loaf and eat every bite. It is delicious.

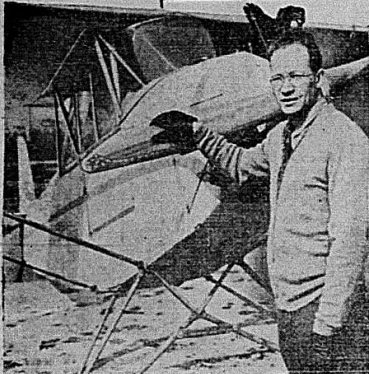

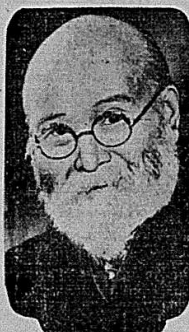

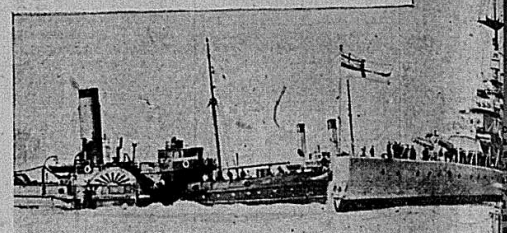

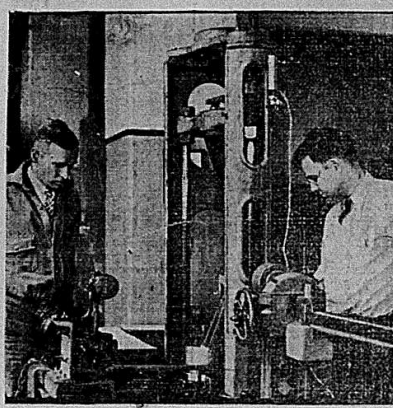

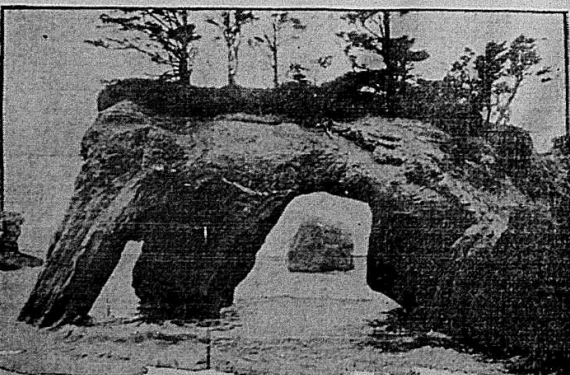

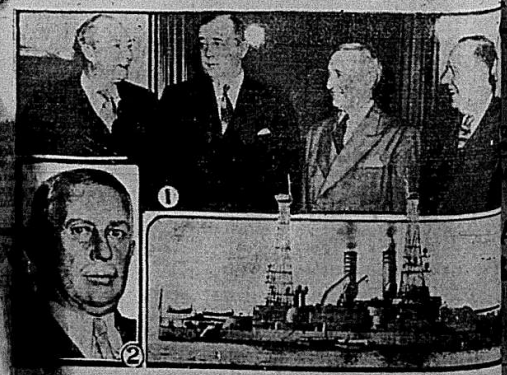

In your report to stockholders of Long Island Lighting Company, dated January 25, 1935, you referred to the fact that our Committee of stockholders and consumers had not made any constructive suggestions to the Company.

In the circular issued by the Committee on January 8, 1935, it was stated that the Committee was formed to take such action as the Report of the Public Service Commission, when made, would indicate desirable but would gladly cooperate to do so.

We desire to obtain from you direct certain information for the purpose of expediting our investigation. This information is peculiarly within your own knowledge and it is hoped that you will send us without delay the following data:

- (1) The cost of maintaining the New York office of the Long Island Lighting Company;
- (2) The names of, and the amounts paid to, officials, employees, attorneys, accountants and appraisers who have received more than \$7,500 per annum for the past three years;
- (3) The aggregate amount received by you from the Long Island Lighting Company and from E. L. Phillips & Company as salary and other compensation for the past three years;
- (4) The aggregate amount paid to E. L. Phillips & Company by Long Island Lighting Company for its services each year for the past ten years;

Rattlesnakes On Island? Dr. Ditmars Wants To Know

Anyone who sees a rattlesnake or a copperhead or a puff adder wild on Long Island can earn a lot of gratitude by immediately notifying the Long Island Chamber of Commerce or Dr. Raymond L. Ditmars at the Zoo in Bronx Park. Alive or dead, the specimen will be scientifically identified. It is just possible that there may still be some poisonous snakes living wild on the island, but Dr. Ditmars, a snake expert, does not think so. He thinks they have been extinct for the last 25 years.

The information bureau of the Long Island Chamber gets inquiries every year about poisonous snakes in the remote sections of Long Island. The latest on file is from H. E. Miller of Box 252, R. D. 2, Stratford, Conn. He wants to know where the rattlers and copperheads are to be found. There have been many reports

of rattlesnakes and copperheads killed in the wild woodlands of Suffolk County during recent years. The latest was from a point north of Patchogue last summer when a big rattlesnake was reported to have been destroyed in a brush fire.

So the call goes now, before the snakes come out from their winter hibernation, for the public to be on the lookout. Scientists will be glad to determine whether specimens are of the dreaded kinds with poison fangs or, as they think more likely, the harmless hognoosed or possibly the water snakes.

That there have been timber rattlesnakes on Long Island years ago is not questioned, but workers at the Zoo think Mr. Crotochus Horridus, formerly abundant in Long Island, has had a knock-out from some kind of a depression.

Nassau Gets Over Million In State Aid

Total Special Taxes Amount To \$1,171,917 In Fiscal Year

(Special To The Township Press) Albany, March 21—It was announced on Monday by Morris S. Tremaine, state Comptroller, that moneys distributed to Nassau County from special taxes during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1934, were as follows:

From the motor vehicle tax, \$469,578.91; income tax, \$269,757.53; franchise tax, \$56,494.22; bank tax, \$6,339.99; motor fuel tax, \$148,855.63; mortgage tax, \$41,077.02; alcoholic and beverage tax, \$179,953.36. Total special taxes that Nassau County received were \$1,171,917.48. In this Nassau was fourth county in the state, exclusive of those in Greater New York.

Other sums paid localities by state appropriations and federal grants gave to Nassau for highways, \$20,185.62; educational purposes, \$2,226,591.16; health and laboratories, \$8,344.59; social welfare, \$106,228.01; and aid for emergency relief from appropriations and federal grants.
