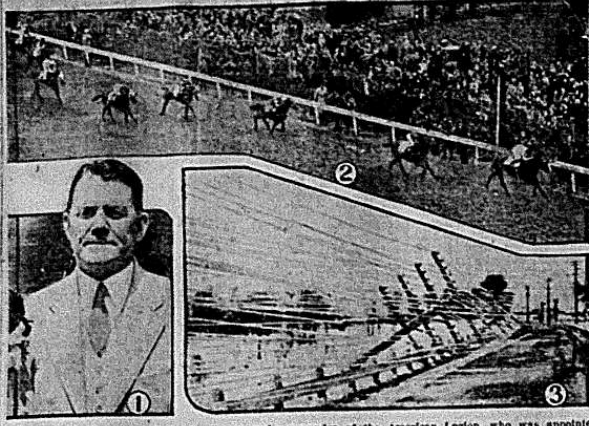

## Voters Reject Syosset Vamps' Building Site

Proposal Defeated Decisively For Second Time

## SIZE OF PROPERTY AND COST OPPOSED

## Taxpayers' Association Campaigns Against Fire Commissioners

The second attempt to persuade voters of the Syosset Fire District to spend \$12,000 for an acre of land to be used as the site of a fire house was decisively defeated at a special election Monday evening. The vote was 150 to 55.

Monday evening's election was the second defeat suffered by the same proposition within a month. In April, voters turned it down by a vote of 112 to 60. When it was learned that it would be submitted again, members of the Non-Partisan Taxpayers' Association, headed by Richard P. Babcock of Woodbury, campaigned actively against it.

The taxpayers are opposed to buying the land because they believe an acre is more than is needed and because the price of \$12,000 is held to be too much. The property is said to be foreclosed a mortgagee of the property amount to approximately \$12,000.

In a letter to voters widely distributed in Syosset, members of the taxpayers' group conceded that the present fire house was too small, not fireproof and lacking essential parking facilities. Everything had been done, the letter explained, to convince the fire commissioners, who had refused to consider anything but their original plan for the site and a probable \$35,000 two-story fire house, and who showed no consideration for the small land owner, already overburdened with taxes.

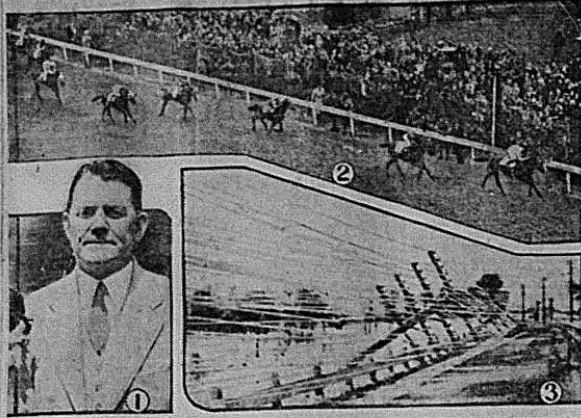

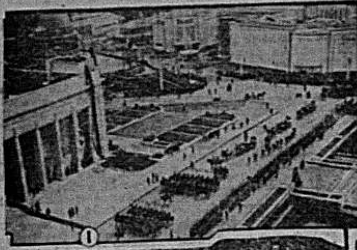

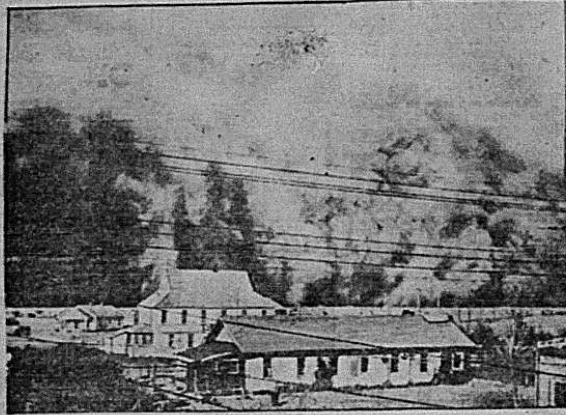

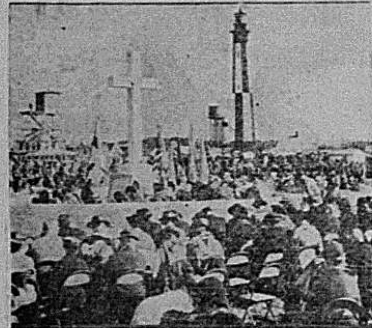

Town-Built Incinerator Favored By Howard C. Smith

Construction of a municipally owned, town-built incinerator plant at a cost of 60 per cent less than bids submitted by private firms was favored before the eyes of the town board Tuesday by Councilman Howard C. Smith, chairman of the town incinerator committee. Councilman Smith said that recently he had examined an incineration plant at Princeton, N. J., used by three units, which had been built in 15 months, 30 per cent of it paid for by federal funds and the entire cost being 60 per cent of bids received by the Oyster Bay town board.

A history of the Oyster Bay incinerator project was given by Councilman Smith after a letter from Arthur A. Ballantine, urgently requesting action on the construction of a garbage disposal plant, had been read. The councilman said the committee had early discovered that under state laws the incinerator could not be built as a municipal project without delay, considerable expense and other complications. One of the complications, he explained, was that the town could not contract for garbage disposal with an incorporated village for more than two years. This would mean that it could not guarantee sufficient income to amortize this bonds before undertaking the project.

Governor Lehman Vetoes Nassau 'Ripper' Legislation

Approves Provision For New County Charter To Be Voted On Here In November

A major portion of the Democratic plan for reorganization of Nassau County government, known as the "ripper" legislation, was vetoed by Governor Herbert H. Lehman on Friday. At the same time, however, the Governor signed a bill providing for a new county charter, which will be submitted to the people at the November election this year. The measures vetoed, which Republicans charged were "ripper bills," included: 1. Requiring the county to establish a new system for adoption of an annual budget. 2. Repealing a law requiring the county to set up a revolving fund. 3. Abolishing the office of Town Treasurer of Hempstead and transferring powers to the Supervisor. 4. Abolishing the office of Supervisor at Lawrence from the Town of Hempstead.

The Democratic program bills for Nassau were jammed through the Legislature in response to directions issued by Postmaster General James A. Parley, the Democratic State and National Chairman. The bills were handled jointly by two Brooklyn Democrats, Senator Joseph Esquiro and Assemblyman Daniel McNamara. Because of the Governor's veto of the bill designed to abolish the office of additional Supervisor of the town of Hempstead, Republican County Leader J. Russell Sprague, who now holds the place, will be permitted to retain the position. The office pays a salary of \$10,000 a year. Lehman attached a memorandum to each bill vetoed. Of the annual budget bill, the Governor said: "The purpose I consider to be very good. And I wish that I could approve it. However, it contains provisions which make me fearful that continuation of unemployment relief might be seriously impaired because of the inability of the county to issue bonds. He said he could see no reason at this time of preventing the continuation of the method of financing through the revolving fund. Only a brief memorandum accompanied signing of the Charter bill. This bill provides for a new county charter for Nassau. Its provisions, however, cannot become effective until the charter has been submitted to the people of the county at the general election this fall and approved by them. This bill is approved." He signed four other bills affecting elections in the county. He approved them without comment. The measures provide judicial review of village elections, and a bi-partisan board of elections.

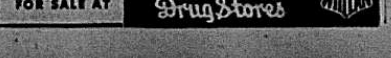

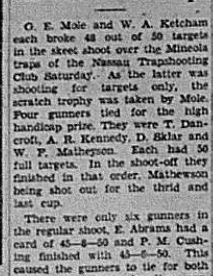

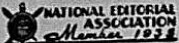
