Six-Year Campaign To End With Opening Of Hospital

Meadowbrook Hospital, the new Nassau County institution on Bethpage Turnpike, near Hempstead, will be opened officially on July 13. Supervisor A. Holly Patterson, chairman of the committee to arrange for the opening of the hospital, announced this week it will be open for inspection on July 12 and 13, he said.

Invitations to the ceremonies will be issued by George L. Hubbell, chairman of the board of managers of the institution. The hospital was authorized by the voters of Nassau County after an active campaign had been conducted by the Medical Society of Nassau County. The society is represented on the board of managers by Dr. Benjamin S. Seaman.

Six years ago Dr. Seaman approached Supervisor J. Wilbur Doughty, then Republican leader of the County. Although Mr. Doughty seemed interested, nothing definite came of the interview until five years ago, when he was stricken with a fatal illness. Dr. Seaman was his physician. A few hours before he died, Mr. Doughty summoned Dr. Seaman. His last message was "You're going to get your hospital. See Russ about it." Russ is Supervisor J. Russell Sprague, the present Republican leader and Mr. Doughty's nephew.

A referendum for the hospital was submitted to the voters in 1929 after the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Supervisors. A fight to place the resolution on the ballot was led by Mr. Sprague. The voters carried the referendum by a vote of 11,000 to 7,000. The second floor is for general surgery and hospitalization, while on the third floor are the children's and maternity wards and operating rooms. The main building is arranged to handle 600 patients. At present there is equipment for 300 cases.

Alexander J. Meffas, recognized throughout the country as a hospitalization expert, is superintendent. The attention of District Attorney Martin W. Littleton was drawn to the case when the proprietors of the plant reported to the police district attorney. Equalization Rate Is Higher, Tappen States

New Figure Of 61 Is 'Break' For Town, Says Supervisor

Oyster Bay's equalization rate, which was 44 last year, has been fixed at 61 this year, Supervisor Harry Tappen announced on Monday. The higher rate, he said, was a definite "break" for Oyster Bay and would mean that the township would not be penalized as heavily by the State this year as it has been in the past.

The supervisor also reported that he had high hopes that the 1935 assessments would be maintained at a higher level than those of last year. The board of review, of which he is a member, has heard most of the Grievance Day protests already and has agreed to make adjustments in some of them.

Mr. Tappen said he was relieved to know that most of the assessments would stand because last year so many were cut that the town revenue was affected, a higher tax rate threatened as well as the equalization rate.

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Mayo Bungalow To Remain On Beach, Board Decides

A week has passed since Walter Mayo and his family were evicted from their Centre Island Beach home and the Town board is still undecided as ever about what it will do with the bungalow occupied for 13 years by the former beach caretaker.

Whether the Town owns the small Cape Cod bungalow or not is said to be a debatable question. Supervisor Harry Tappen informed The Enterprise-Pilot Monday that the cottage probably would be left as it is for the time being, an opinion in which he was confirmed by Board members meeting in executive session Tuesday.

Robert P. Ludlum, leader of the 21 heirs who claim Centre Island Beach, appeared at the Board meeting Tuesday morning and announced that he had purchased the Mayo cottage and wanted Mr. Mayo to be left in possession of it. Mayo, he said, would act as caretaker of the beach and his services would cost the Town anything. Mr. Ludlum seemed surprised and heard when the Board refused to take action, and he was informed that a suit would be brought from Town Attorney Charles L. Wood.

For a few days after the eviction last Wednesday Mr. Mayo and his family were housed temporarily with Mrs. Mayo's brother, George Bell of Oak Street, The City. Glenn and Clayton stayed at a boys' camp on Centre Island Beach. Since then Mr. Mayo has rented a cottage on Ferry Avenue from Isaac Wansor and the family is occupying it.

The Centre Island Beach cottage is still being guarded by Bayville special police both to prevent the family from re-entering it and to protect it from the curio.

Shuster-Gaio Investigation Will Continue

July Grand Jury Takes Over Probe Of Fur Plant

Conditions at the Shuster-Gaio fur dyeing factory in South Farmingdale, which have been having financial difficulties since it moved to village a year ago to escape union regulations, will be investigated by the July-August grand jury, it was revealed this week.

The June grand jury terminated its session on Friday, but before doing so voted to refer the case to the new grand jury. The June jury recently heard several of the union officers who live in Brooklyn testify, and their reports led them to ask that the investigation be continued.

Assistant District Attorney Albert M. De Maio, who presented the testimony, declared this week that the case is not yet finished and that it is not yet known what the outcome will be. The case is in the discretion of the grand jurors. The new grand jury will report on Monday July 8 to Judge Cortland Johnson in the Nassau County Court.
