holding that Harold L. Ickes, Secretary of the Interior and Public Administrator, had committed an irreparable offense in issuing General Order No. 128 withholding \$1,800,000 from the Tri-Borough Authority in an attempt to force Robert Moses, City Park Commissioner, to resign as chief executive of the authority.

After his father lost his money, Mr. Guthrie took a job as office boy in the law firm of William Seward, Crawford and De Courcy.

was associated in that controversy with the lawyers, Robert C. Bageroll and Roscoe Conkling. Before the Supreme Court in 1924 Mr. Guthrie argued the constitutionality of the income tax law which he won the right to bring about the adoption of the 16th amendment.

In spite of Mr. Guthrie's pleading the 10 per cent tax on income-parity was held constitutional by the Supreme Court in 1918. Again before the court in 1923 he won the right to force Catholic schools to register under the state's public school system.

When the Federal government sought to revoke German citizenship of the French Legion of Honor, Mr. Guthrie was president of the American Society of the Legion of Honor of France.

Mr. Guthrie served as special deputy attorney general for New York State in litigation before the United States Supreme Court over the state's emergency housing laws.

POPULAR PANACEA NO. 1

(Reprinted from the Nassau Daily Review)

Reports from various sections of the country show that the Townsend old age pension plan is spreading like the Anti-Saloon League a decade ago.

The Townsend proposal has gained so many members since a year ago it will be an issue in the coming session of Congress that is likely to receive as much notice as the veterans' bonus.

Prospects of the movement ever becoming more than an aggressive minority do not seem dangerous.

In the past the Populists, People's Party, Socialists and National Prohibition Party have seemed to be gaining in importance, but the test of a Presidential election has always shown them up.

What Benefits Have the People Received from the Pennsylvania Railroad's Interest in the Long Island Rail Road?

FIVE times as many people live in Queens, Nassau and Suffolk Counties today, as compared with 35 years ago. Retail merchants in these counties do ten times as much business as they did then—about \$400,000,000 today as compared with \$35,000,000 in 1900.

The Long Island Rail Road has been responsible to a great extent for this growth in the development of Long Island. It has overcome the barrier of the East River. It has provided safe, dependable rapid transit with the convenience of frequent train service.

That year, 1900, the Pennsylvania Railroad purchased an interest in the Long Island Rail Road. The Long Island Rail Road's revenues and credit were wholly inadequate to meet the requirements which it faced: the need for better service, for a direct line to Manhattan and terminal facilities there, for track elevation to meet the demands of the city, for grade crossing separations and for other improvements.

What the Pennsylvania Railroad did in 1900 was the beginning of vast expenditures on its part to build up the Long Island Rail Road, to modernize its equipment and facilities, and to improve its service. And these expenditures have continued through 35 years. They are going on today.

ONE of the first acts of the Pennsylvania Railroad was to guarantee payment of the Long Island's many obligations, including interest on its bonds which the Long Island could not pay.

- to separate from the street level 143 miles of track in Brooklyn and Queens, to eliminate grade crossings, to acquire steel cars to replace wooden ones, to rearrange and expand its facilities at Jamaica, to install automatic block signals and other safety appliances, to improve and strengthen its roadway, and to build extensive freight yards and stations.

With the aid of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Long Island Rail Road was able to lay the foundations of a Greater Long Island.

Subsequently, and due principally to this special support, the Long Island Rail Road nearly expended \$100,000,000 to electrify 448 miles of track to give its passengers the safety of steel cars, cks and passenger equipment on the Long Island Rail Road—all-steel construction. It was the first railroad in the world so equipped. And in 1910, by virtue of the Pennsylvania Railroad's expenditure of \$115,000,000 for the building of the Pennsylvania Station and its vast tunnel system, Long Island people got a terminal in Manhattan, a vital factor in Long Island's growth, but one which the Long Island Rail Road itself could not afford.

THE Long Island Rail Road itself employs 5500 people whose earnings for the most part are spent on Long Island for food, for rent, for clothing, for house repairs, for taxes, etc.

Yet for the convenience, the improved running time and the quick accessibility to Manhattan made possible by the combination of tunnels and station, the commuter pays very little.

About 3 cents a ride, or less than a subway fare, is chargeable on a commutation ticket for the convenience of a direct route to the heart of Manhattan. And that applies only to the commuter using the tunnels and Pennsylvania Station. Those using Flatbush Avenue do not pay, although they derive the advantages which the tunnels and terminal have meant to Long Island.

Would the commuter be better off today if the Rail Road stopped, as it once did at Long Island City and ceased to run into Pennsylvania Station?

The rental the Long Island Rail Road pays the Pennsylvania Railroad for the use of the tunnels and terminal has been declared reasonable and fair by the Interstate Commerce Commission and the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission has been sustained by the Supreme Court of the United States.

THESE facts are not always fully realized by the people of Long Island. Yet they are all a matter of public record.

Since 1900, the Pennsylvania Railroad has invested \$55,000,000 in the improvement of the Long Island Rail Road. By accepting capital stock in payment of debts and advances, and through its assistance in retiring bonded indebtedness, the Pennsylvania Railroad has enabled the Long Island to reduce its fixed charges and to maintain a most conservative capital structure.

In this entire 35 year period (1900 to 1935) no dividends were paid by the Long Island Rail Road except during the six years between 1928 and 1933.

The average annual return which the Pennsylvania Railroad has received on its investment in Long Island's development has been infinitesimal.

Grocery Reaps Repair Benefits

Careful Modernizing Improves Appearance, Trade

Recently planned and executed modernization of the grocery has brought double benefits to Louis Ziehl of Martinsville, N. Y. Besides virtually doubling the appearance value of his grocery, the improvements to his store have materially added to its sales ap-

pearance and all at the cost of only \$2,100. Details of the Ziehl store improvements are significant in that they show how such projects might readily be carried under the provisions of the National Housing Act in any of a thousand other situations. The outstanding features of the modernized store are: new store front, \$200; carpenter mason complete with plaster board ceiling, \$300; building repairs, \$125; electrical work, \$80; installation of new double-entry store, \$60; concrete work, \$25; total, \$1,125. "Therefore," according to the contractor who improved the property, "for an expenditure of approximately \$1,245, Mr. Ziehl transformed a building with an approximate value of approximately \$5,000 into one worth at least between \$6,000 and \$10,000. Mr. Ziehl not only realized an earning or increase in value through the remodeling, but his business increased substantially along with it. Must be Carefully Watched

Children's Eye-Diet

ARE you one of those enlightened, modern mothers who serve carefully-planned, well-balanced meals to their children? If you are, you know the importance of proper diet to the child's health and well-being.

But do you know that just as the human system requires a well-balanced diet for good health, so do eyes require well-balanced lighting for easy, comfortable and safe seeing? They do. And quantity is no better a substitute for quality in lighting than in food. A combination

of the two is just as important in the case of eyes as in the other.

The notion that the only thing needed for good seeing is a good pair of eyes is at out of date as a kerenevance. In total darkness, even the best pair of eyes is worthless, you know. And when children are permitted to read and study on poorly-lighted floors, their eye-diet is being neglected.

The illustration at upper left shows just what I mean. When children are too far away from the lamp to use their eyes safely for close seeing, when they are in their own shadow, and when their positions are such that both eyes cannot be in focus on the work, they are likely to develop

eyestrain, or "indigestion of the eyes."

When, on the other hand, they sit comfortably at a well-lighted desk or table with an abundance of soft, well-diffused light coming from a modern table or floor lamp, they have a well-balanced eye-diet that helps to forestall the eyestrain that afflicts most of every five children today.

Young eyes, like young bodies, need care and exercise. They should be regularly exercised by an eyesight specialist. And at all times, they should be kept in good condition by light of right quality, so that their sight may be preserved for as long years ahead.

Tips On How And What To Improve

Check Rafts

Roofs suffer during the winter from the action of snow and frost, so make yours as tight as possible before it has to withstand their attacks. Examine the roof carefully and replace any broken or cracked slats or tiles or shingles you may find. If your roof is covered with paper or felt shingles in leaky spots, fasten down with a little roofing cement any gaps that may have appeared.

Remove Leaks

When the leaves fall and blow about they will leave up spider-fines and at the base of triffles. Clean them away, as they will hold dampness all winter and rot out the wood against which they have come to rest.

Improve Ceiling

Now that the furnace calls you down into the cellar several times a day, make it a permanent place to stay. A coat or two of whitewash applied to the ceiling and walls will lighten it up wonderfully and incidentally, be very unobtrusive for any bugs that may have decided to do their wintering there.

Recank Windows

The chinking around windows and doors frames to masonry joints dries out with time, and that, together with the shrinkage of the wood, will open up cracks that will cause leaks both of air and water.

Occasionally check the wrapped, cut and over your trousers to see if they are too tight.

For an easy and safe way to fill a hole in a wall, use a mixture of plaster and hair. It is a great material.

Q-After a heavy rain I notice a damp spot on my wall in the corner of one of my rooms. The walls are of solid brick. Can you tell me the cause and suggest a cure?

A-Undoubtedly the brick work at that corner needs pointing up. Usually there is a damp spot at that corner which may leak, causing an excessive amount of water to run down the brick. Point the bricks carefully and replace the mortar spots if necessary.

Q-What is the best way to store my coal?

A-Use some kind of partition or screen to keep the coal from blowing and cleaning materials. Put up two or three shallow shelves, placing the lower one four and a half feet above the floor. Have a plank strip just under the lowest shelf and have a strong cord or wire loop on each beam and rope and hang them on hooks. The shelves should be just deep enough to hold one row of cans and bottles.

Q-The drain from my ice box gets clogged frequently. Can you tell me how to fix it?

A-Undoubtedly the pipe is too small. It should be at least an inch and a half in diameter. It should have no sharp bends or

WINTER BUILDING

Increased Efficiency. As to expense, the actual cost of the extra work and precautions necessary will be, in most cases, completely offset by the increased efficiency and greater supply of labor, the increased availability of materials, the stillness on the part of contractors and subcontractors to accept lower profits in order to hold their organizations together and pay overhead expenses, and the extra time the contractor and architect will have to devote to the job.

SAVING WITHOUT SCRIMPING

Christmas Dinner Vegetables Are As Important As The Meat

By EDITH M. SHAPCOTT. Nutritional-Farmer Home Making Center-New York.

Your Christmas vegetables, remember, are just as important as your Christmas meat, whether that be a goose, chicken, capon or turkey.

Let us consider, then, two green vegetables which are excellent with roast fowl, cauliflower, a fancy parley food, the best popular than cabbage or even Brussels sprouts.

Even so, in the hands of many cooks it becomes either stringy or limp because no fitness is exercised in its preparation.

As with most other vegetables, in addition to the usual quantity of salt, a small amount of sugar added to the head up, add one quart of water. Now put it in a saucepan with the head up, add one quart of boiling water, one pint milk, one tablespoon salt and one teaspoon sugar. Cook 25 minutes, or until soft.

Drain, place on a hot serving dish, sprinkle with yolk of two hard-boiled eggs forced through a strainer and mixed with one tablespoon of chopped parsley and one-third cup cream beat drumb cooked in butter until browned. Serve at once.

Beet (or as it is sometimes called, beet plant) is a vegetable that is not so commonly used as the

other winter vegetables; yet it is most delicious with roast goose, chicken or turkey. It appears in markets after the first frost, and may be had from October until March. It is somewhat similar to the parsnip in flavor, but more delicate.

Wash, scrub and put safely in a pot of water to which a little vinegar has been added to prevent discoloration. Drain, cut in inch slices and cook until soft in boiling salted water. When a little sugar has been added, here again you will find the dash of sugar adds a certain richness to this pleasant vegetable.

Now prepare a rich cream sauce, put the drained saffron into a buttered saffron dish, pour over it the cream sauce, dress with buttered crumbs and brown lightly in the oven.

Caution! Sweet potatoes go very well with either the cauliflower or the saffron and to which a little salad of lettuce or endive with dressing will be found to be sufficient.

A third recipe which you will like to use for a supper dish sometime following the Christmas feast is this one for saffron croquettes:

Soak the scraped whole vegetables in boiling salted water until soft. Drain and mash; season with butter, salt, pepper and one teaspoon sugar. Mix well and shape into small flat cakes. Roll in flour and saute in butter.

Or cook the saffron as outlined for the two other recipes, drain, put in a pan with three tablespoons melted butter; roll; add one teaspoon finely chopped parsley and one-half teaspoon chopped chives. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and one tablespoon sugar.
