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

permission to erect, maintain and operate a drive-in window in an already existing fast food restaurant."

New Water Rates In Effect January 1

The new water rate structure adopted by the Board of Water Commissioners at their meeting of December 17, 1987 which is effective in your January 1, 1988 billing: 10,000 gallons or under \$6.00 minimum; 11 to 30,000 gallons .75 per thousand; 31 to 50,000 gallons 1.00 per thousand; 51 to 70,000 gallons 1.25 per thousand; over 71,000 gallons 1.60 per thousand.

The above rates have been adopted with the feeling that consumers who do conserve water should benefit with lower rates. The consumers who wastes water naturally will pay the higher rate.

Our biggest problem with residential high consumption is underground sprinkler systems that do not have moisture control sensors or rain sensors installed.

Chairman Richard A. Humann stated "There is nothing more frustrating than to see a sprinkler system on when it is raining."

The problem the District has with commercial accounts is when they have plumbing problems that are not repaired immediately.

The message the Board is trying to put to consumers is "Save Water Have Lower Water Bills and Help the District come near it's New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Pumpage Cap."

District Fence Built To Stop Dumping

In response to a number of inquiries from various community interests, the Board of Commissioners, Hicksville Water District, has had erected a protective fencing around the site of its new well field between Old Country Road and Plainview Road somewhat opposite South Gate.

This parcel of land has been secured from the Town of Oyster Bay on a long term lease. The transaction was of mutual interest to both parties, the Water District needed a new well site and the Town was anxious for the availability of funds to be used in the construction of the new park site.

The fence was erected before

construction of the pump house and the planting of shrubs in order to prevent any further dumping of refuse at the site by persons unknown. The area enclosed by the fence is the leased portion, the balance is maintained by the Town and further dumping would be subject to such penalties as the Town would normally impose.

It is anticipated that the balance of the construction work would go forward within the Water District site during 1988.

300 Pupils Evacuated Because Of Gas Leak

The Second Precinct reports the details of a gas leak and evacuation that occurred on Burns Avenue, 100 feet north of Hawthorne Street, Hicksville at approximately 11:40 a.m., December 22.

James Muhr of Huntington Station, an employee of Sidney B. Browne & Sons, 235 E. Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, was conducting a probe excavation at that location for future roadway repair and struck a LILCO gas line.

Approximately 300 pupils from the Burns Avenue Elementary School and 20 nearby homes were evacuated as a precautionary measure. The area was declared safe at 12:47 p.m. by gas superintendent Richard Peschke of LILCO. No injuries were reported.

The children were to be transported to another Hicksville school, authority Principal Dr. F. Burke. LILCO is presently at the scene making repairs.



It was an afternoon of music, dance and theater dedicated to the American immigrants. On December 8, Mrs. Pasetsky's fifth grade class at Burns Avenue school entertained the entire school with music, dance and theater to promote a better understanding of immigration. Students did a variety of skits. One was about why people immigrated to America. They traced the stories of the Pilgrims in the 1600's to the immigration of the Russian Jews in the 1900's. The students also explained to their audience that people are still immigrating to this country because of the freedom we have to offer.

STEP participants work together in small support groups. Parents become actively involved in discussing common concerns and learning specific child-training principles and techniques.



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
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Mid-Island Hosp. Sibling Classes

Winter Driving Car Care Tips

Winter weather brings with it special concerns and safety hazards for all. As the barometer plummets and snow and ice fall, it's wise to prepare for poor driving conditions as early as possible.

To make this winter a safe and trouble-free time for Long Island drivers, the experts at Garage Management Corporation, owners of 46 indoor parking garages located throughout Manhattan recommend that at the onset of the snow season drivers equip their cars with proper "tools of the road" and prepare their engines for lower temperatures as well.

"Taking steps in advance to have your car prepared for the ice and snow on the roads can make driving in poor weather a safer task," notes Michael Tive, director of marketing for Garage Management Corporation.

These auto experts offer the following cold weather check list for car owners:

For the Trunk:

- *Snow Brush/Ice Scraper
- *Strap-On-Chains
- *Sand: Fill a plastic milk container with salt and keep this in the trunk. Sand provides more traction on ice and will not corrode your car's paint or trunk.
- *Extra Anti-Freeze
- *Battery-Operated Flash Light and Emergency Flasher
- *Jumper Cables: Cold weather causes batteries to lose power.
- Engine Care
- *Use a lighter oil, such as 10 W 40 grade.
- *For older cars that tend to burn oil, use a 20 W 50 grade.
- *Do not allow the gas tank to dip below $\frac{1}{2}$ tank. A low tank allows water in, which can freeze and clog fuel lines.
- *Use gasoline anti-freeze. Poured directly into the tank, it evaporates condensed water and stops the gasoline from changing composition.

Tires and Traction

*Check tire pressure each time that you fill-up. For every 10 degrees that the temperature drops, tires lose one pound of air pressure.

*Extra weight in the trunk for additional traction: Add 75 pounds for sub-compacts, 100 pounds for compacts and intermediates. Large cars need no more than 150 pounds of added weight.

*Never add weight to the trunk of a front wheel drive car.



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


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
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Busy, Exciting Week For V.F.W.

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TRAVEL TALK

For many of us the Christmas Holidays are followed by the "post season blues." Busy days of holiday preparation and celebration pass all too quickly; and by the time the last decoration is put away, we (or perhaps it's me) feel quite let down.

In an effort to avoid these blues, I thought it might be productive to focus on the positive (by positive I mean the future) so I assembled a calendar of forthcoming events at some of the nation's most popular vacation areas that might be of interest to would-be travelers.

ARIZONA: This state is a beehive of activity during the winter months and a grand place to warm up, view magnificent scenery and even ski. The following are a few samples of the state's attractions for the month of January.

In Flagstaff there will be a Hopi Kachina doll display at the Museum of Northern Arizona throughout the month, January 1-31. During the full month, there will also be a style display of traditional Mexican kitchens at the Presidio State Historic Park in Tubac (south of Tucson), January 14-17. Tucson will host the Southern Arizona Square and Round Dance Festival which attracts participants from around the country. In the Phoenix/Scottsdale area, the 53rd Annual Phoenix Open Tournament featuring the P.G.A. tour's finest golfers will be held January 25-31. Phoenix will host the world's largest classic and collectible car auction at the Municipal Stadium, the Barrett-Jackson Auction, January 21-24; and Scottsdale will be the site of the Parade del Sol Parade, a horse-drawn parade which is another world's largest event, to be held on January 30th - the Rodeo performances begin on February 4th.

NEW YORK STATE: Lake Placid is the training ground for many U.S.A. Olympic teams and a great place to see pre-Olympic trials. The bobsled, biathlon, luge, ski jumping and Nordic Combined competitions should provide plenty of thrills during the month of January. Event information may be obtained by calling the Olympic Regional Development Authority toll-free on 800-462-6236. Lake Placid will also be the site, starting February 26th, of the Winter Empire State Games - our local Olympics. The games will continue until March 6. February is Winter Carnival and Ice Palace building month - Ice Palace spectacles will be held at Saranac Lake, February 10-14 and Chautauqua Lake, February 12-21. Closer to home is the Boat Show at New York City's own Javits Convention Center, January 7-17.

CALIFORNIA: In 1988 California will host three great football events - The Annual Tournament of Roses Parade and Game in Pasadena on January 1, The Shriner's East-West All Star Football Classic (college all-stars) and Pageant in Palo Alto on January 16th, and the big one itself, The Super Bowl, which will be played in San Diego on January 31. California (a golfer's paradise during the winter months) hosts an array of golfing events: The 29th Annual Pro-Am Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in Indian Wells, January 20-24; The AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am Tournament, February 1-7; and The Vintage Chrysler Invitational in Indian Wells where PGA Senior Tour players will compete for a purse of \$350,000. Another big golf event is the Shearson-Lehman Brothers, Andy Williams Open Golf Tournament in San Diego, February 17-21.

And off-beat entertainment, one can attend the Mushroom Fair (San Mateo, January 17), the Annual Bull and Gilding Sale (Red Bluff, January 20-23), Old Time Fiddle Contest (Cloverdale, January 30), World Championship Crab Races (Crescent City, February 14) and much, much more, i.e. ski races, film festivals, citrus fairs, and festivals of all sorts.

FLORIDA: This cooler season of the year is a grand time to visit Disney World, Florida Cypress Gardens, Sea World and the multitude of attractions in the Orlando area. Lines are shorter, and if you have to wait, at least it's not in the broiling sun. By the way, Disney World has a new Information and Reservation Center located at the intersection of I-75 and S.R. 200 in Ocala, open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Help in obtaining reservations for hotels, dinner shows and character breakfast reservations may be gotten there.

Looking ahead to Spring, don't forget that Florida is home to the major league's spring training camps. You might wish to see how the Mets in Port St. Lucie or the Yankees in Fort Lauderdale are shaping up.
