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

STOP Collection Sched. For May 21

Many common garden, household and car maintenance products are actually materials which are hazardous household chemicals, according to Oyster Bay Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes.

"To assist residents in the safe disposal of these products," Hynes said, "the Town of Oyster Bay will sponsor another special S.T.O.P. (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants) program collection day. The third of eight scheduled this year, the collection will take place on Saturday, May 21, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the Town of Oyster Bay's Department of Public Works garage, 150 Miller Place, Syosset."

Resident response has been very good, as evidenced by what the Town has collected. Publicity surrounding the S.T.O.P. program has raised the public's awareness of which chemicals are harmful and why special handling is necessary for these products so that any potential negative environmental impacts are avoided.

"The success of the S.T.O.P. program depends on the participation of you, our residents," said Hynes. "Take advantage of this opportunity to dispose of the unused chemical products in your home. You'll be doing yourself and the environment a favor."

Hicksville School Vote Set For Next Wednesday

Residents of the Hicksville School District will go to the polls next Wednesday, May 25, from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. to vote on their proposed school budget and for two members of the Board of Education.

The tentative 1988-89 budget amounts to an even \$44 million, a 5.5% increase over the present figure. If approved by voters, the new Hicksville budget will bring a tax rate increase of \$1.43 per \$100 assessed valuation, or \$27.29 per household.

Incumbents Thomas Nagle and William Bennett are seeking re-election to the Board of Education. Opposing Mr. Nagle is Patricia Rooney while James Martillo and William Collins are vying for Bennett's seat.

Voting will take place in each of the seven polling places located at the following elementary schools: Burns Avenue, East Street, Woodland Avenue, Lee Avenue, Fork Lane, Dutch Lane, Old Country Road Schools.

Absentee ballots can be picked up in person on May 24. A seven day request is needed for mailing requests. Callers can obtain further information at 933-6592 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. regarding applications.

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

**RESOLUTION NO. 457-1988
BOND RESOLUTION DATED
May 10, 1988.**

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,745,000 SERIAL BONDS OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK AND THE APPROPRIATION AND EXPENDITURE OF \$1,040,500 CURRENT FUNDS OF SAID TOWN TO PAY THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF MACHINERY AND APPARATUS AND MOTOR VEHICLES FOR THE USE OF VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS OF SAID TOWN.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. For the class of objects or purposes of paying the cost of the purchase of machinery and apparatus to be used in connection with the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance or removal of snow and ice from any physical public betterment or improvement of the Town of Oyster Bay, each item of which costs in excess of \$15,000 but less than \$30,000, at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,725,200, and for the class of objects or purposes of paying the cost of the purchase of motor vehicles, at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,060,300, such machinery and apparatus and motor vehicles to be used by various departments of and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, there are hereby authorized to be issued \$1,745,000 serial bonds of said Town pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, and there are hereby authorized to be expended \$1,040,500 current funds of said Town, which current funds are hereby appropriated therefor.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the plan for the financing of the aforesaid purchase of machinery and

apparatus is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$1,320,000 of the \$1,745,000 serial bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 1 hereof. Further details concerning said bonds will be prescribed in a further resolution or resolutions of this Town Board; and

b) By the expenditure of \$405,200 of the \$1,040,500 current funds of said Town appropriated pursuant to this resolution. Said current funds shall constitute the down payment required in connection with such purchase pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the plan for the financing of the aforesaid purchase of motor vehicles is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$425,000 of the \$1,745,000 serial bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 1 hereof. Further details concerning said bonds will be prescribed in a further resolution or resolutions of this Town Board; and

b) By the expenditure of \$635,300 of the \$1,040,500 current funds of said Town appropriated pursuant to this resolution.

Section 4. It is hereby further determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid purchase of machinery and apparatus is ten years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, and that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid purchase of motor vehicles is five years, pursuant to subdivision 29 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized for the purchase of machinery and apparatus will exceed five years.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The faith and

credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 7. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Locust Valley Leader, Massapequa Post, Mid Island Times, and Syosset Tribune, the official newspapers, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 9. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum.

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

Museum Exhibit Honors War Dead

For the fourth year, the month of May at the Hicksville Public Library sees an exhibit honoring the over forty Hicksville men who lost their lives in the wartime service of the nation.

Prepared by the Historical Committee of the Hicksville Gregory Museum under the leadership of Richard Evers, the "Hicksville's Last Full Measure of Devotion" exhibit sensitively immortalizes the brave young lives lost in both World Wars, and in the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

Photographs of the community's casualties bring home starkly the enormity of the human sacrifices Long Island (and every American community) has made on the altar of national honor, security and idealism. The large printed scroll on display recalls the village's three sons lost in World War I, the over 20 men taken by World War II, the four heroes of Korea and peacetime service training, and the 14 dead in the long Vietnam struggle.

Of particular interest this year in the Museum-Library recollection of war's cost are the memorabilia and documents of Charles Wagner of the U.S. Army, the namesake of Hicksville's American Legion Post 421, who was mortally wounded in the First World War. On display for many years at the former Legion Hall, the framed documents presented to Wagner's parents by the governments of the United States and the Republic of France and the American Red Cross evoke poignant memories of the first "war to make the world safe for democracy."

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
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
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Local Army Man Reshaping Costa Rica

Not long ago Valle la Estrella, Costa Rica enjoyed the quiet life. Transportation, whether gasoline fueled cars or alfalfa fueled burros, bumped and scraped between villages over often impassable, deeply rutted roads and rocky, serpentine donkey trails. Life was simple, but it was

harder than hell getting around. That's all changing. Gullied thoroughfares and switch-back paths are being bulldozed into full-fledged roads. Rivers have been tamed with bridges. What may be an engineering miracle of sorts for the people of Valle la Estrella and neighboring communities, is really little more than

Yankee ingenuity and a lot of elbow grease, due to the efforts of soldiers like Army Spec. 4 Michael T. Notti of Old Bethpage.

Notti, 26, and the men and women of Task Force 536 are in Costa Rica for the Caminos de la Paz (Roads of Peace) road and bridge building exercise. The exercise offers real-world training

to the Panama-based soldiers, while giving the Costa Ricans of this province tangible and needed improvements to their road system.

"I serve the battalion training officer by taking care of all administrative correspondence, reports and other paperwork associated with our shop," said Notti, an administrative specialist with Headquarters Company, 536th Engineer Battalion from Fort Kobbe, Panama. "I also take care of our equipment, such as tents, camouflage nets and our briefing area."

Nearly 460 Army engineers, medical specialists and support troops from Panama are involved in the exercise, which began in early February and is scheduled for completion in mid-May. The engineers are constructing and improving 11.2 kilometers of all-weather road and building two bridges with help from the Costa Rican Ministry of Public Works and Transportation. Along with road construction, U.S. troops are also conducting well drilling projects as well as medical and civil assistance programs during the exercise.

While most of the GIs involved with the Roads of Peace exercise find aiding Costa Rica with their skills rewarding, many find living in the tropics is far from comfortable. Clothes never seem to dry, the earth tends to either be rock hard or the consistency of pudding, and while the facilities on the camp are adequate, they are also quite Spartan.

"We've well taken care of our here," said Notti. "It certainly is nice to take a shower at the end of a hard day, and the food is tolerable and there's enough of it. I think it's quite nice to get the chance to train in the jungle and learn the 'do's' and 'don'ts' of living in a tropical rain forest. I've learned how to work in the inferno-like heat and the humidity without much relief. Pacing myself and drinking lots of water are very important to working here."

"Plus, the discipline of seeing a mission through despite the hardships and lack of comforts is one of the good things I'm getting out of this."

However, despite the seemingly endless cycle of "work, eat and sleep," many soldiers find they enjoy the experience of helping this Central American neighbor and meeting its people.

"I like Costa Rica," said Notti. "The people are very friendly. I'm quite touched when we ride by in our vehicles and the people almost invariably wave and smile at us."

"The country and the jungle are very beautiful too. I'm fascinated by the variety of plants, animals and birds. And I'm impressed by Costa Rica's love for democracy and its leadership striving for peace in this war-torn region of the world."

A 1979 graduate of John F. Kennedy High School, Plainview, Notti went on to earn an associate degree in liberal arts from the State University of New York at Farmingdale before entering the Army.



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Historical Society Visits Schools



Mrs. Kotlus' first graders wore pilgrim costumes for the Historical Society's visit.

A representative from the Huntington Historical Society visited second graders at Kramer Lane School and second graders and Mrs. Kotlus' first graders at Charles Campagne School to supplement their Social Studies unit on communities. Mrs. Talmadge asked students to imagine how 18th century homes differed from today's homes. There was no electricity or running water. Water was drawn from wells and boiled at the fireplace. People used outhouses and taking a bath was a huge project, which involved drawing water from the well, heating it at the fireplace, and pouring it into the tub. As many as ten people used the same water, which was so dirty by the time the baby was bathed that the phrase "don't throw out the baby with the bathwater" originated.

In a slide presentation, Mrs. Talmadge discussed farm life.

Everyone had a little farm on which they grew their own produce. Pigs were important for fat to preserve meat and make soap and candles; for skin which was used for leather and shoes; for bristles to make brushes; and for meat. Geese gave eggs and their feathers were used to make pillows, mattresses and quilts.

School in the 1700's was only conducted three months a year, because students were needed on the farm during the other nine months. Students were often assigned to bring logs for the coal stove as homework. Children used slates as paper was scarce and teachers were very strict.

Eighteenth century toys were simple, and Mrs. Talmadge brought skates and cornhusk dolls to demonstrate.

All the children enjoyed the PTA sponsored presentation.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions heretofore duly had and taken in accordance with the provisions of Section 202-b of the Town Law, and more particularly an order dated May 10, 1988, said Town Board has determined it to be in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Parking District at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,500,000; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide funding for such project; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. For the specific object or purpose of paying part of the cost of the increase and improvement of the facilities of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Parking District in and for said Town, there are hereby authorized to be issued \$1,350,000 serial bonds of said Town pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$1,500,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:


