Saloy of St. Martin of Tours, Bethpage, will be ordained to the priesthood in St. Agnes Cathedral, Rockville Centre on Saturday, June 4. Bishop John McGinn will perform the ceremony which begins at 11:30 a.m. They were ordained to the diaconate on May 1 by Bishop Francis J. Mugavero of Brooklyn.

Kevin M. Smith, the son of Patricia A. and William F. Smith, will celebrate a Mass of thanksgiving on Sunday, June 5, at 12:45 p.m. in Holy Family Church, Hicksville. Father Harold P. Buckley of the faculty at Cathedral College, Douglaston, will be the homilist. Assisting will be Fathers Robert J. Thelen, dean of seminarians at Immaculate Conception Seminary; Edward C. Fitzpatrick, director of Prison Team Ministry; Mario C. Costa, pastor of St. Paul the Apostle, Jericho; and Gerard A. Ringenback, a spiritual director of Immaculate Conception Seminary. A second Mass will be held on Saturday, June 11, at 7:15 p.m. in St. John Nepomucene Church, Bohemia, where he served his pastoral year. Receptions will follow both Masses.

Born in Bethpage, Father Smith was educated at Hicksville

public schools; the former St. Pius X Preparatory Seminary; Cathedral College; and Immaculate Conception Seminary. He worked for five summers with the diocesan Prison Ministry Team.

Before studying for the priesthood, he served as a paramedic with an ambulance corps in college and tried the restaurant arts and construction.

Thomas G. Saloy, the son of Mildred C. and Gerald R. Saloy will celebrate a Mass of thanksgiving on Sunday, June 5, at 3 p.m. in St. Martin of Tours Church, Bethpage. Father Michael R. Ade, chaplain at Holy Trinity High School, Hicksville, will be the homilist. Assisting will be Redemptorist Father George Keaveney, St. Martin's pastor, and priests of the parish. A reception will follow the Mass in the school. A second Mass will be celebrated on Sunday, June 12, in St. Brigid's Church, Westbury, at 12:45 p.m.

Born in Bethpage, Father Saloy was educated at St. Martin of Tours School, Holy Trinity High School, Cathedral College and Immaculate Conception Seminary. He served his pastoral year at St. Brigid's in Westbury and assisted in the summer Bible School and youth program of St. Bernard's in Levittown in 1985 and 1986.

Father Smith said he was led to the priesthood by the example of others. His family, a parish priest and his own skills or gifts provided support or were instrumental along the way.

His main aim is to be approachable and available to people. "I know this is demanding but I'm energized by people," he said. "If I can help people see Christ more clearly, that's what gets me going." By contrast, he said, other kinds of work he's done have just been jobs, 9 to 5." Father Saloy sees the challenge of the priesthood as "making the Gospel come alive" in our consumer-oriented, high technology society and making that relevant as we enter the year 2,000."

He said he hopes to bring to his priesthood his "excitement and love for ministry and for the Church."

Father Gordon noted that he and Father Saloy will be the first two graduates of Holy Trinity Diocesan High School to be ordained for the diocese.

He spoke of his family as having been a key element in his discovery of his vocation. "Vocation in any form begins within the context of the family," he said.

Seven others will be ordained at St. Agnes including Marian R. Bicz, a native of Poland.

Memorial Day Parade Services On Monday

Hicksville will honor its deceased veterans of the nation's wars on Memorial Day with a traditional parade and solemn services. The village's observances will be sponsored by the combined veterans posts of Hicksville with the Henry Bell Post of the Masonic War Veterans this year's host and chairing post. Frank Molinari, Past Commander of the Hicksville American Legion is the Parade Grand Marshal.

Organizations parading will be assembling at the Sears Store parking field between 8 and 9 p.m., Monday, May 30. The parade will commence at 9 a.m. sharp. The line of march will be Broadway, south to Old Country Road, on westward to Jerusalem Avenue, and south to Fifth Street. The parade reviewing stand will be on the west side of Jerusalem Avenue, facing the War Memorials.

Memorial Day services will be held at Hicksville's War Memorials site, the south end of the Middle School. Among the invited speakers are Hicksville High School seniors Eric Nicolls and Dawn Trenka. In the event of rain, the parade will be cancelled and memorial services will be held in the Middle School auditorium.

The public is cordially invited to witness the annual parade and to attend the memorial services remembering and honoring the over 40 Hicksville young men who lost their lives in the service of God and country, from the First World War to the long ordeal of Vietnam. For these citizens who have not yet had the opportunity to see Hicksville's newest monuments to the honor of the men and women who served in the Korean and Vietnam Wars, Memorial Day will provide an occasion to do so.

There are few villages in the U.S.A. which equal Hicksville for its tangible remembrance of our nation's defenders. All five of our memorials will be garlanded with flowers this Monday.

Building Demolition To Be Decided In July

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a hearing date on Tuesday, July 12, on a request for a change of zone from "D" residence to "F" business in Hicksville according to Town Councilwoman Ann R. Ocker.

"The applicant, Jerry Spiegel, is seeking a change of zone from 'D' residence to 'F' business to permit the demolition of three existing residential structures and the construction of a two-story, office building," Ocker said. "The property is located at the northwest corner of West John and Strong Streets, also known as 92, 102 and 106 West John Street."

Ocker noted that a hearing on the application was originally scheduled for Tuesday, April 19, but was postponed to be sure there was adequate notification of area residents by the applicant.

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Street Closing Hearing June 21

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a hearing date of Tuesday, June 21, on a proposal to close access to Richfield Street in Plainview, according to Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

The Town has received a petition from residents on Richfield Street requesting that the street be permanently closed to traffic," Hogan explained. "It would be closed at a point approximately 185 feet south of Richfield Court and 28 feet north of Oakwood Lane and a dead-end would be constructed to prohibit the flow of traffic."

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

To the Editor:

While my children, along with hundreds of others, re-register to play Hicksville soccer, it has come to my attention that our teams are woefully short of soccer fields on which to play.

This season, the travel teams have been reduced to one playing on one field at Cantisgue Park. Because of the lack of Town maintenance, Grumman's two soccer fields are covered with dandelions and clover. In addition, the two baseball diamonds, that are part of the soccer fields, are constantly in use for adult baseball. This past weekend, one team had a make-up game at Tudor Field, where the grass was ankle high and which features a baseball diamond on the playing area. The Intramural program, due to its ever-increasing enrollment, including a new Girls Division, is also in need of playing areas.

Newsday recently featured Sachem Soccer Club's enormous soccer facility and I have seen it as well. While I realize that Sachem encompasses a much larger area, it's a major disappointment to me, to see Hicksville's soccer fields reduced to zilch while other towns readily support their local clubs. I cringe when I drive by the empty, large-sized plot, namely Geis Park, that might have been turned into additional soccer fields for our youngsters but now sits unused, save or a local dog or two.

My point is this: I want my children playing organized sports in general and soccer in particular. Sports is a healthy way for kids to let off steam, learn to be part of a team effort and a character builder to boot. As a parent, I feel it is the right of all Hicksville children, including mine, to have soccer fields made available to them. These teams represent Hicksville. There must be a large field, somewhere, that could be used as a permanent facility for the youth of our town. Do the local politicians care? Has general apathy set in? Do the children of our town are also its future.



Editor's Notebook

The mere thought of asbestos in school buildings usually sets off a frenzy among residents. Here are the rules concerning its removal:

The New York State School Asbestos Safety Act requires public school officials to inspect all public elementary and secondary school buildings, to determine if asbestos containing materials are present. If asbestos is suspected to be present, samples must be taken and analyzed by a certified laboratory. If confirmed, and the material is damaged, loose, friable (capable of being crushed or removed by hand pressure), dusting, flaking, or water damaged, it is then defined as an "imminent hazard to health."

If an imminent health hazard is found, the State law then requires a safe, orderly and expeditious abatement by containment, encapsulation, removal, or other method acceptable to N.Y.S.

Encapsulation is a process involving the application of a covering material directly to the surface of the asbestos hazard.

Containment is the process of constructing an air-tight barrier around the asbestos hazard. Similar to encapsulation, it is less expensive than removal and is designed to prevent asbestos fibers from leaking into the air.

Removal is the most radical and expensive abatement procedure. In practice, it is often impossible to remove all asbestos and health experts have warned that it may create more of an actual health hazard than what was present before the abatement.

Schools are required to send their management plans to the New York State Education Department by October 12, 1988 for review. EPA regulations also require similar actions from private schools (K-12) officials.

Implementation of plans must begin on or before July 9, 1989 and must be completed in a timely fashion.

Gert Paul read a letter from our Assemblyman, Dan Firsia, who is trying to get planting on the medians of Broadway. She also reported a positive conversation on beautification with Kevin Conologue, Assistant to Mr. Dilettatti, Town Supervisor. Hopefully Hicksville shall improve in appearance.

Mr. Larry Weintraub introduced the new executive board and they were installed by Councilman Kenneth Diamond in a very warm and gracious ceremony. Mr. Diamond referred to us as an excellent civic association and praised our level-headed leadership.

Also in attendance was Mr. Marc Herbst recently elected trustee on the Hicksville Public Library Board.

Appropriately, one of the door prizes was a garbage can on a cart. Following the meeting, the membership enjoyed a gala social hour.




