Plans To Resubmit Budget Undecided

In a very tight vote, the \$44 million Hicksville School Budget was defeated by 17 votes at the annual elections held on Wednesday, May 25. The vote was 1452 "no" versus 1435 "yes."

Voters reelected incumbent William P. Bennett to a three-year term as trustee, and also elected newcomer Mrs. Patricia Rooney over incumbent Thomas F. Nagle. Mrs. Rooney will serve a three-year term commencing on July 1, 1988.

Board President Thomas Nagle indicated that no action has been initiated by the Board as a result of the budget defeated. Mr. Nagle advised that this matter will be taken up by the new Board of Education which will be seated in July.

Trustee William Bennett pointed out the time constraints, noting that the present budget ends on June 30. He recounted that the Board must review the budget; voter registration, public advertising and a public hearing must be held, and absentee ballots must be printed prior to a new budget vote. Since the Board has traditionally avoided the scheduling of a second vote during the summer months, both Mr. Nagle and Mr. Bennett concurred that a re-vote was not likely to occur before September.

Without a budget in place by July 1, the school district will automatically go on "austerity." Under state rules and guidelines for austerity, the district could, among other measures, curtail extra curricular activities including the sports program, halt the purchase of new library books and new equipment, and restrict transportation for students in grades K-12. Assistant Superintendent William Hall said that the District is in the process of evaluating summer programs and formulating recommendations for the Board.

In the Superintendent's monthly report at the May 25 Board meeting, Dr. Catherine Fenton informed the Board that a request has been received from outside the district to purchase obsolete kitchen equipment. Dr. Fenton stipulated that the request could only be considered with the understanding that it is equipment the district would not be using in the future.

The Superintendent outlined the work of the District's Facilities and Operations Department to install energy conservation lighting and other equipment in various buildings. In light of LILCO's new reimbursement plan for initiation of energy conservation, the district could possibly recoup a maximum of \$10,000 for each building by continuing to install such devices in the coming school year. Dr. Fenton estimated a more realistic reimbursement of approximately \$5,000 per building if the district continues in this manner and seeks reimbursement from LILCO.

Dr. Fenton reviewed the latch-key child program outlined at the April Board meeting. She cited some 205 responses to the survey conducted on behalf of the YMCA and sent to parents of elementary school children. The survey sought to establish whether or not the district perceived a need for an after school child care program. Dr. Fenton said that the responses were given to the YMCA. The Superintendent plans further discussion with the Board as to whether such a program should be considered.

Further Board Action:

*The Board approved a resolution authorizing the sale of \$7 million in Tax Anticipation Notes for the 1988-89 school year.

*The Board approved the reinstatement of \$10,000 in the proposed budget towards the purchase of a van. It was noted that overhaul of the present van could cost the district some \$5,000.

*The board granted tenure to five administrators and also to 17 teachers, some in the second tenure area.

*The Board accepted the resignation of Dr. Dan McCann, Principal of Old Country Road School. Trustee Carole Wolf said that Dr. McCann will be missed, since he "added so much to the curriculum of the district."

The Board postponed adoption of the 184 school-day calendar for 1988-89 pending further discussion by teaching staff. (In 1989, the Jewish Passover holiday and the Christian Easter holiday occur approximately one month apart.)

A resident and member of the Duffy Park Civic Association called on the Board for support in its efforts to close the Twin County Asphalt

Dr. Fenton acknowledged that there were some problems, and that the Facilities Department would look into this matter.

The next regular meeting of the Board will take place on Wednesday, June 22, at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building. 
\$300 Robbed From Local Store

sweater. He took \$300, then left the store, and was joined by a second male white with dark hair. The pair were last seen fleeing on foot westbound on Old Country Road.



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





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


