So, at the May 25 meeting, Bob Kluck, the Controller for the Parks Dept. and Lenny Kunz, the Deputy Commissioner of Parks brought along the set of slides and lots of information.

Mr. Kunz showed the slides and accompanied them with a most interesting description of how the former Bruce Estate was converted to what promises to be

a very challenging golf course. The designers (golf architects) made use of as much of the natural features of the estate, such as wooded areas, hills, meadows, trees, etc. in laying out the 18 hole course. Some added extra features included a few man-made lakes as well as numerous bunkers or sand traps.

## Editor's Notebook

It is not easy to talk about some of our best friends, but we just have to do it. The friends in this case are the herds of wild deer found in eastern Long Island and elsewhere. The problem is a new disease called Lyme disease.

Lyme Disease, named after the town in Connecticut where it was first identified, is a bacterial infection caused by the spirochete *Borrelia burgdorferi* transmitted by the deer tick, *Ixodes dammini*. It produces a multitude of symptoms which may, but not always, include malaise and fatigue, fever, rashes, blurred vision, neurologic and cardiac abnormalities and arthritis.

In children, particularly those who live and/or vacation in the eastern portion of Long Island, many physicians diagnosed their symptoms as JRA prior to knowledge about Lyme Disease becoming common. JRA has no long-term treatment and is not curable. Even late discovered Lyme Disease is curable after treatment with intravenously administered antibiotics.

In 1982, Lyme Disease was first found to be caused by the deer tick. A year later a serology test was perfected which is still the most helpful diagnostic test for the disease.

The best prevention is to avoid close contact with deer.






