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

New Gas Stations Must Provide 'Full Service'

The Oyster Bay Town Board approved a number of amendments to the Town's Building Zone Ordinance at its Tuesday, June 21, hearing, according to Town Councilman John Venditto.

"The Board made several changes in the ordinance with regard to gas stations," Venditto said. "All new gas stations will be required to provide a full service island between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. All existing stations must provide full service to handicapped drivers with State or municipal identification between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. In addition, proper identification must be provided for any service island designated as a full service island for handicapped drivers."

"Regarding hours of operation for gas stations, the Board approved an amendment that prohibits a gas station from operating between 10:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m. the following day without obtaining special permission from the Town Board," Venditto stated. "The Board also stipulated that no station may

operate between those hours if it fronts a Town road or abuts residential property on any side.

"The Board approved amendments to two sections of Article III of the Building Zone Ordinance," Venditto stated. "The first provides for the conversion of an attached garage to habitable living space provided that it did not require a variance for construction and that it has a side yard of not less than four feet.

"The second concerns the construction of swimming pools on corner lots in any residential district," Venditto continued. "It allows for their placement in the innermost corner of the plot provided the pool does not extend beyond the actual front setback of the residential structure or the required front setback of the structure in that zone, whichever is greater."

Venditto noted that a public hearing on the gasoline station amendment was held on April 19, while a hearing on the garage and pool amendments was held on April 26.

Local Residents Named To ECC

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Angelo A. Delligatti announced that nine community residents have been appointed as new members to the Town's Environmental Control Commission.

"Since the establishment of this citizen advisory group in 1972, its members have coordinated and advised the Town on a variety of environmental projects and problems," said Delligatti. "We are now in the process of developing and implementing a Townwide recycling program. With guidance from the ECC, we will put together educational programs for both children and adults. We will also use their expertise to reach out to all of our residents with a message that recycling saves natural resources, energy and money."

Delligatti noted that water conservation is another target area where the ECC will assist in the development of a comprehensive program of public education designed to effectuate beneficial changes.

Residents selected to join the commission include representatives of civic associations, the media and education -- all environmentally concerned individuals. They are:

"We are very grateful that these individuals have accepted our invitation to serve on the Commission," said Delligatti.

Hicksville Board Seeks Contingency Budget

The Hicksville Board of Education has determined that a budget re-vote date is not imminent and has fostered that decision on the new board which will be seated at the July Reorganization Meeting. The makeup of the new board will remain the same, except for the inclusion of Mrs. Patricia Rooney who will replace trustee Thomas Nagle.

Having failed to obtain a 1988-89 school budget at the May 25 vote, the School Board is faced with several options under the State guidelines. The trustees may prepare a contingency budget or present the original budget request or revision to the voters.

At the June 22 meeting, the School Board trustees approved items for inclusion in a contingency budget. These items required discussion at a public meeting prior to implementation by Administration. The approved items are:

•Summer School. The program will run from July 1 through August 14. No supplies will be provided. The Board felt that this remediation is necessary to maintain the basic educational program.

•Chapter I Program. This remedial reading and math program will continue within the Federal government guidelines.

•ESL Program. This English-as-a-Second-Language program is directed toward students entering kindergarten in September. Its aim is to prepare students for basic studies.

•Summer Music Program. Materials not needed for this program. This year, band students were scheduled to go away to music camp for five days. However, the program will run at the high school, as it has been in the past.

•Capital Improvements. The Board will go ahead with the removal of temps and replacement of fuel tanks. All other items in capital improvements would be held until an approved budget is secured.

•Transportation. According to State guidelines, only students who are two or three miles from their schools are eligible for transportation. It is estimated that only 7 buses will be needed to fulfill this State mandate, rather than the district's usual 26. The Board directed Administration to inform the transportation companies of the district's new busing needs and inform the public as to the new eligibility list.

•Administrative Workshops. Summer workshops will be held in district facilities. Three teachers scheduled for training will be allowed to continue their programs outside the district, since counsel noted that such workshops are specifically authorized by statute.

•Continuing Education. This program for the adult community will continue, since it is basically self-supporting.

•Evening High School. The evening high school is a continuation of the daytime program with the inclusion of Employment Preparation Education. Both are mandated programs receiving state aid.

•Summer Driver Education. The Board approved summer driver education as part of the regular basic program offered to high school students. Several members of the audience raised doubts as to whether this program is being offered. President Nagle said that the Board will review this program again at the July meeting, if they are misinformed.

•Foreign Language Immersion Program. Although counsel advised that inclusion of this program in a contingency budget could be called into question by the State Education Commissioner, the Board approved this BOCES-sponsored, enrichment extension program for foreign language students. Tuition is shared by the district and the parents.

•Use of Playing Fields. Board approved community use of fields at no cost to the district. Any extra costs over and above regular maintenance would have to be passed onto the organization requesting use.

The following items were not approved for inclusion in the contingency budget:

•Supplies. A contingency budget calls for the deletion of the purchasing of new equipment, supplies and materials. The Board agreed to a deletion of \$1,389,385. Further the Board ordered use of general supplies now on hand, basic supplies such as crayons, pencils, paper and art supplies. Distribution will be on a district-wide basis. Administration is also directed to notify the community when supply runs out, at which time students must provide their own supplies.

•Town of Oyster Bay Youth Activity Contract. Program does not provide basic educational instruction.

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

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


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

College Notes

Only 1/2 of 1% of the nation's students are honored for two consecutive years. Miss Tobin, a 1988 graduate of Hicksville High School, will be attending Mt. St. Mary's College in Emmetsburg, Maryland on an academic scholarship.

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Curriculum Writing. The summer writing in question would be updating courses and enriching documents, not basic programs. These summer writings do not affect September programs.

Gregory Museum. Disallowed at this time. Richard Evers of the museum informed the Board in public session that the museum concurs, in light of the budget constraints, and that the museum will bear those costs at present.

Senior Citizen Activities.

The trustees discussed a timeframe for a re-vote. The consensus was that a summer vote should not be taken. Trustee William Bennett said that "summer voting puts the budget in jeopardy." He further added that the Board should not come up with the same figure since "the feeling out in the community is that our budget is too high."

The tax levy for the district is required by law to be established in August. The Nassau Department of Assessment, when pressed, informed the district that the absolute latest date for filing with the Board of Supervisors would be the 16th of September. Without a budget in place at that time, the district would be forced to borrow on a Budget Anticipation Note for the 1988-89 school year. Passage of a budget after the September deadline would mean that residents could be hit with a large increase in tax levy in order to cover needed borrowing, plus other increases in the new budget.

Trustee Carole Wolf urged a vote as soon as possible in September in order to meet the September deadline and not delay the establishment of the tax rate. Mr. Nagle pointed out that a vote may actually be taken 14 days after a legal advertisement appears in the newspapers.

In the Superintendent's monthly report to the Board, Dr. Catherine Fenton alerted the community to the change in course study instruction levels in the secondary schools. Dr. Fenton said that results of the community survey two years ago pointed out that residents wished to see students achieving Regents diplomas since these courses provide higher standards than those of the local diploma. At present, the course levels are basic (for students with reading and mathematics difficulties), standard, Regents and Honors.

In September, the district will change the levels at the middle school to basic, Regents and Honors, thereby dropping the standard level. In ninth grade, the three levels will exist for English and Social Studies, and possibly in math and science. The district intends to phase out the standard level in grades 10, 11 and 12, as the students progress.

Dr. Fenton also announced that the district's annual sale of excess equipment is to take place on June 27, 28 and 29 in the Dutch Lane Temporaries.

Further Board actions include:

• Passage of an 8% salary increase for the Superintendent of Schools for 1988-89. This \$7,000 increase will bring the Superintendent's salary to \$95,000.

• The Board approved the extension of the School Lunch Program Contract and the transportation contracts for the 1988-89 school year in accordance with the Metropolitan Regional Cost of Living Index or 4.9%, whichever is less.

• Adopted policy covering school security, and traffic and parking controls.

At the public session, a member of the Northwest Civic Association urged the Board to support its efforts against the erection of an office building at West John and Strong Streets. The petition will come before the Town Board in the coming weeks.

There was some discussion as to the ethical and legal practices followed during the recent election of trustees. Resident Carolyn Kelly supported a majority election of trustees, rather than the present policy of running for a particular seat. Several residents questioned the amounts of monies spent by certain candidates and referred to some derogatory statements made in a political mailing. Residents put the Board members on notice that they will not tolerate such actions. An argument ensued between one board trustee and PTA Council President Norma Goerke, when the PTAs were accused of not fully supporting the current budget. Mrs. Goerke said that the PTAs had supported the budget, although they had opposed the deletion of the position of Assistant Director of Pupil Personnel Services.

The Board set Wednesday, July 13, as the date of its Reorganization Meeting. The meeting will take place at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building.
