Hicksville Zone Change Denied By Town Board

The Oyster Bay Town Board has denied a request for a change of zone in Hicksville, according to Town Councilwoman Ann R. Ocker. Ocker said, "at a public hearing on Tuesday, February 9, the applicants, Robert R. Brown and Robert J. Brown, were requesting a change of zone from 'D' residence district to 'G' business district, to permit the premises to be used to provide off-street parking spaces for forty (40) additional cars in connection with their automobile dealership."

The property (Robert Chevrolet) is located on the south side of First Street just west of South Broadway, Hicksville.

In denying the application, the Town Board stated that the change of zone would adversely affect the general appearance and be incompatible with the character of the area and would interfere with the health, peace, quiet and comfortable enjoyment of the life and property in an area composed primarily of residents.

Twenty assorted silver pieces with a value of possibly \$100,000 were stolen from Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, 130 Jerusalem Avenue, Hicksville between 3 p.m. July 7 and 8:45 a.m. July 8.

Church secretary Jean Blaha found the loss when she came to work. She said the loss included chalices, patens and ciboria used in the church services. The missing objects were memorials donated by parishioners during the 90 year history of the church in Hicksville.

Entry to the building was made through a storage room window on the side. Several doors were pried open to gain entry. Rev. Dominick Ciannella, church rector, was not available for comment.

"In order to provide this service to residents," Mr. Marcellino explained, "the office will remain open on the designated days from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. to receive tax payments."

Residents may also pay in person at the Receiver of Taxes Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall West, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, during the hours of 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., weekdays.

"When paying in person, residents should bring the entire tax bill along with their tax payment in the form of check or money order," Musiello noted. "No cash will be accepted and please do not write on, or deface the tax bill stub as it may cause rejection of the payment when being processed into the computer."

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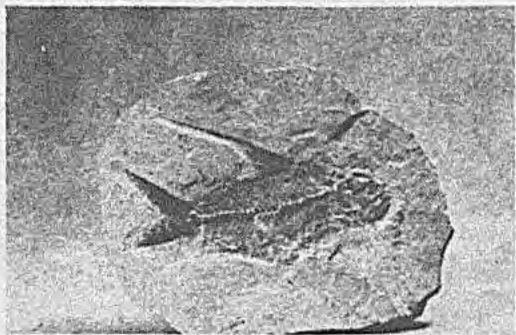
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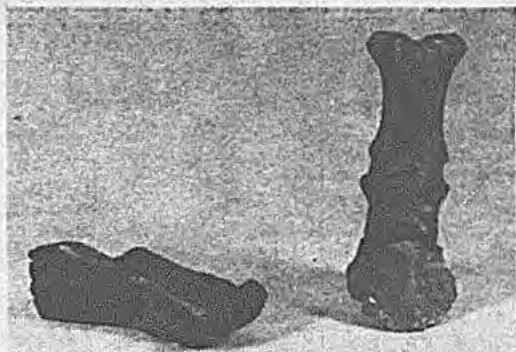
Mineral Sale At Gregory Museum

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Editor's Notebook

I suppose it has happened to most of us these warm summer nights: a bike coming out of nowhere, on the wrong side of the road, with the rider wearing dark clothing.

Our first impulse is to get out of the way quickly. The second feeling is one of relief that an accident did not happen, when it so easily could have.

Our third emotion could be a feeling of anger at the bicycle owner for not being more careful.

Police statistics tell us that more than 50,000 bike-related injuries occur each year and more than 1000 cyclists are killed. People are vulnerable on a bike--there is little to protect the rider in a fall or collision. Moreover, bikes are often hard to see--motorists aren't used to sharing the road with cyclists.

Many accidents occur because of lack of control (due to hitting a bump or loose gravel), mechanical problems (such as brake failure, chain slippage, loose pedals, problems in changing gears) or entanglement (feet, loose clothing, packages, etc. getting caught in the wheels or chain). An even more important reason is failure to abide by traffic laws.

Here are a few guidelines for cyclists, old and young, to observe for their own safety; according to a recent Police Department brochure:

- Turn with care. Most bike accidents happen at intersections. Look and listen for cars before you proceed. If traffic is heavy, walk your bike across.

- Think ahead. Anticipate others' mistakes. Leave room and time for defensive action. (For example, cars making right turns might not see you.)

- Obey traffic regulations. Lights, signs, signals, etc., are for bikes as well as cars. Be familiar with local driving regulations.

- Signal before you turn or stop. Signal well in advance, then use both hands to control your bike.

- Don't show off. Don't weave, race or stunt ride in traffic; don't carry riders or large bundles.

- Keep to right. Drive single file, and always ride with the traffic.

- Avoid heavy traffic. Plan your route to use bike paths, less heavily traveled roads. Don't drive on high-speed highways.

- Easy does it. Be careful pulling out of driveways, alleys, or when entering traffic. Watch for cars, pedestrians.

- Yield to cars -- even if you're "right." Remember, a car is faster, bigger, heavier and harder to maneuver than a bike.

- Watch for pedestrians. Children (especially) may run into your path. Give them the right of way. Stay off sidewalks.

- Beware of parked cars. A door might suddenly open, forcing you into traffic, or a car might pull out into traffic right in front of you.

"Under the direction of conductor and lead singer Ada Cavallo, The New Xavier Cugat Orchestra is carrying on the fine traditions of Latin music made popular by the group's founder," Delligatti stated. "The colorfully dressed musicians play a selection of songs including many Cugat standards as well as reworked versions of American pop favorites such as Barry Manilow's 'Copacabana,' Richie Valens' 'La Bamba' and a medley of tunes from Walt Disney productions."

On Tuesday, July 26, Al Martino will take center stage at John J. Burns Town Park, Merrick Road, Massapequa, beginning at 8:15 p.m. In the event of rain, the auditorium of Massapequa High School, Merrick Road, will be the location for the evening of easy listening melodies.

"Al Martino's big break came in 1952 when he recorded the million-seller 'Here in My Heart,' which catapulted him to the top of the music world just a couple of years after he won first prize on an Arthur Godfrey Talent Scout show," Delligatti stated. "Stardom proved to be too much for the young Martino, so he took a break and then headed to England, where he honed his talent. He finally returned to America in 1959 and has never been out of the performing spotlight since, making concert tours and recording hits such as 'Painted, Tainted Rose,' 'Living a Lie,' 'I Love You More and More Each Day,' 'Spanish Eyes,' 'Mary in the Morning' and 'Volare.'"

Rounding out the week will be an evening of 50's music performed by The Revivals on Friday, July 29, beginning at 8:15 p.m. Tappen Beach, Shore Road, Glenwood Landing, will provide the setting for the program, which will be held in the auditorium of the Glenwood Landing School, Cody Avenue, in the event of rain.

"The Revivals have captured the unique sound that has made the music of the 50's so endearing," Delligatti said. "Organized in 1983 without any intention of performing professionally, group members soon realized they had an original sound and started appearing at Long Island night spots. They have since played throughout the tri-state area, on television and on radio and recently released an album entitled 'I'm So Young Again.'"

Capt. Speaks On Patriotism

U.S. Navy Captain Wendell E. Brown will speak on "Patriotism and Youth" at the Plainview, New York State Center of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on Sunday, July 24, at 7:30 p.m. Youth from ages 12 to 18 are encouraged to attend.

Captain Brown is Commanding Officer of the Naval Plant Representative Office at Grumman Corporation in Bethpage. His duties include performing production acceptance test flights of the Grumman-built F-14 Tomcat jet aircraft, accepting modified and new production aircraft into the Navy's inventory.

A 1965 graduate of the United States Naval Academy, Captain Brown earned the Navy pilot's wings of gold and was designated a naval aviator in 1966. He subsequently served in fighter squadrons deployed aboard three aircraft carriers and earned the Meritorious Service Medal with Gold Star, the Air Medal, and several campaign and unit citations. Captain Brown also served as the F-18 Hornet program manager's representative at the McDonnell Aircraft Company in St. Louis and as program manager for the AIM-54 air-to-air missile while at the Naval Air Systems Command in Washington, D.C.

Captain Brown received the Master of Science degree in aeronautical engineering from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School in 1972, attended the Armed Forces Staff College in 1975, and graduated from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in June of 1986.

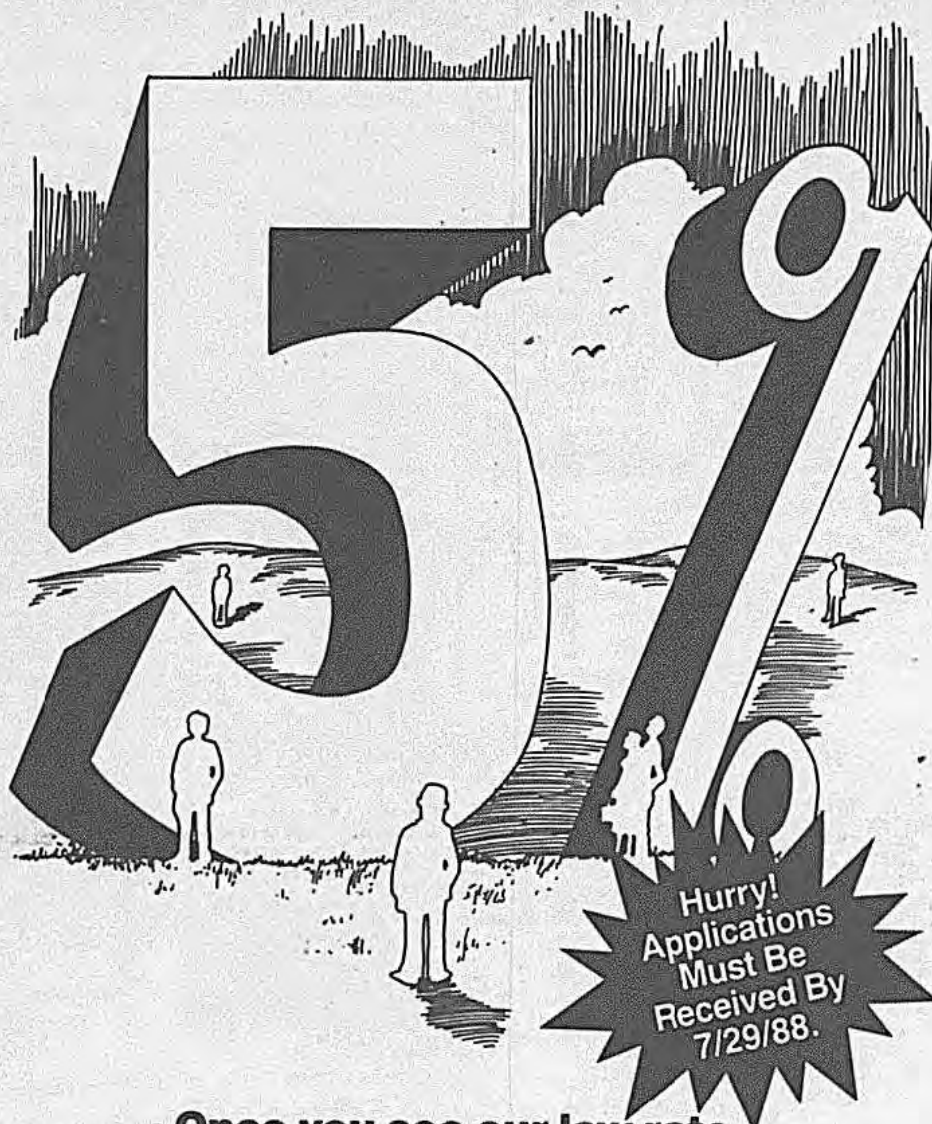

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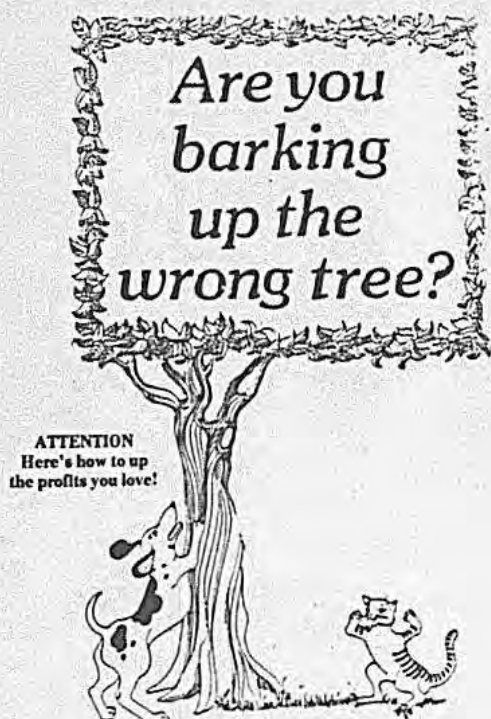

Parola Announces Survey Results

For the 11th straight year, Assemblyman Fred Parola and his volunteers greeted commuters at LIRR stations around the 14th Assembly District and surveyed opinions on the performance of the Long Island Rail Road.

According to this year's survey results, the on-time performance of commuter trains is the top priority area that commuters would like to see improved. In addition, cleanliness, the clarity of announcements on platforms and trains and parking continue to be in need of improvement.

In late June, questionnaires were distributed to commuters at the Bethpage and Hicksville stations between the hours of 5:45 a.m. and 8:20 a.m. by Assemblyman Parola.

"Local commuters say they have experienced a decline in regard to the trains running on time. This year 23 percent of the respondents rated on-time performance as 'good,' compared to 40 percent last year," Parola said. "The LIRR has to continue to work to improve its performance and keep the trains running on time."

Parola reported that the most necessary areas of improvement cited include commuter car cleanliness, air conditioning and heating maintenance, and parking availability. However, he noted that according to the commuters who responded, parking at their local station has

shown steady improvement.

"Our local governments are working to increase parking at a number of stations, with construction for additional spaces proceeding at the Wantagh and Seaford stations and they are to be commended for these efforts," Parola said.

Other survey results reveal that almost 70 percent of the commuters rated the cleanliness of commuter cars as either fair or good and about two-thirds found that public service messages to announce delays and cancellations are inadequate on both the trains and platforms.

Parola said the survey results have been sent to LIRR management and he will monitor future service improvements.

"As I said last year, conditions such as poor communications and lack of cleanliness, however, will improve only when management makes the commuter its top priority and increases employee productivity."

"I thank all of the commuters who took part in this survey and will continue to work for improved conditions to make the daily commuter experience more reliable and comfortable," Parola said.

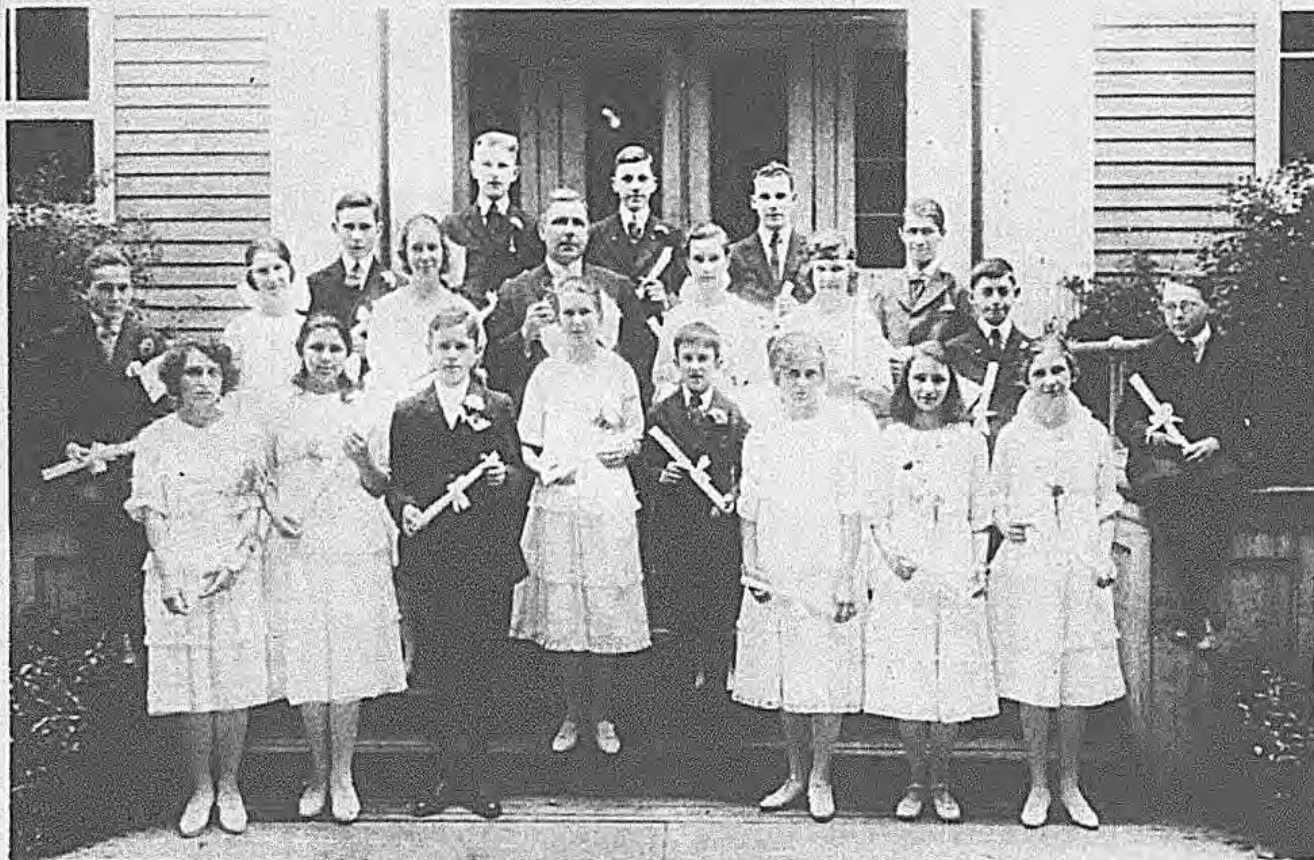

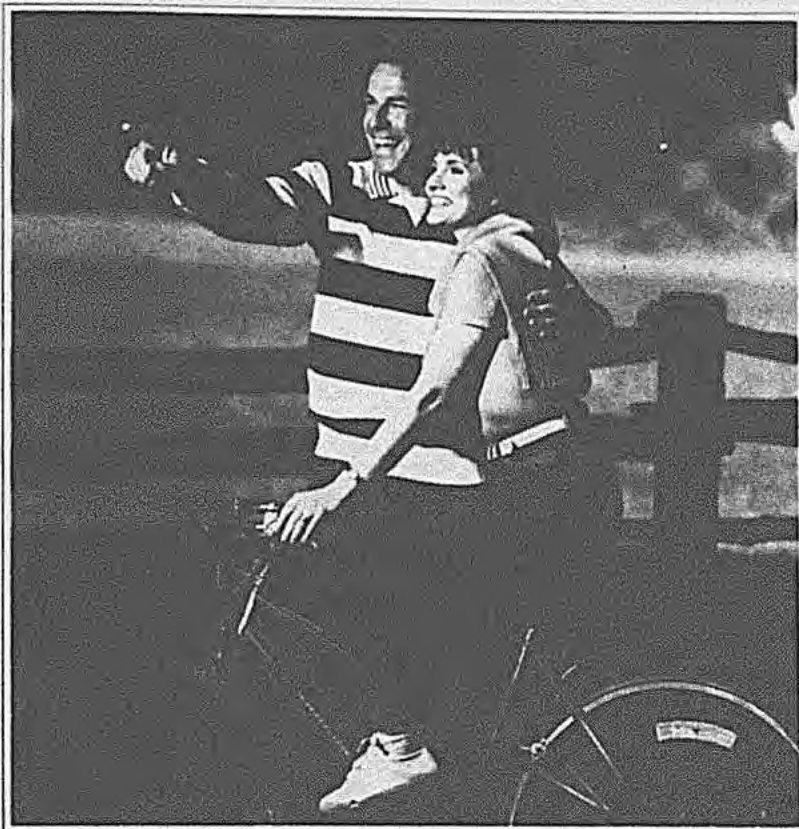
