New School Budget Vote August 10

Again, as at the June meeting, Hicksville residents approached the trustees of the Board of Education at their July 13 meeting to urge a budget revote as soon as possible. Calling the 17-vote defeat not a mandate, the residents expressed pleas from various corners of the community to have a budget in place before the first day of school, so that the business of education would not be disrupted.

Heeding these pleas, the Board slimly agreed to a revote date of August 10. The motion received its four votes for passage, upon trustee William Bennett's initiation and statement of willingness "to gamble" on a summer revote. Mr. Bennett noted that the tax rate increase per \$100 assessed valuation on the \$44 million budget proposed May 25 was as low as \$1.43. He added that Hicksville has seen an addition of several new businesses this year and that when this is factored into the calculations, the tax rate should be even lower.

Trustee Bennett suggested a budget figure to reflect \$43,950,000, calling on Administration to lower the budget by \$50,000 in any one of such areas as retirement fund, personnel, transfer of funds or reassessed fuel bills. The Board agreed to the new budget figure of \$43,950,000.

The Board further agreed to hold a Registration date on August 3 from 3 to 8 p.m., along with the August 10 revote to take place from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Both events will be held at the usual polling places. The revote cost to the district is \$7,200.

The District has had the absentee ballot in place since the 1987 vote. Because of the swiftness of this revote, a certain urgency is placed on receiving and returning the ballots. The application is a standard form and is available at the District Clerk's office in the Administration Building, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The District Clerk will mail the ballot to all those filling out an application. Residents wishing to pick up the absentee ballots personally are urged to call the District Clerk's office and arrange to pick up on Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. All ballots must be returned either by mail or hand delivered by 5 p.m. on the date of the vote, August 10.

Residents on the permanent disabled list will automatically receive the ballot as soon as it is available. Printing will be done by the district.

Elaine Kabakoff of the Hicksville Teachers Congress informed the Board that the HTC, the PTA Council and the Teachers Aide union will join together to mount a telephone campaign urging residents to vote. Board trustees were further urged personally to do their share to promote budget passage.

Represented in the audience was a large gathering from the senior citizen community. Spokesperson Myra Giansante, a member of the Continuing Education Advisory Committee, reprimanded the Board for eliminating the senior citizen activities in the contingency budget. She categorized the seniors' activities as a part of the Continuing Education Program, which was approved for the contingency budget at the June meeting. Mrs. Giansante said that for so many years the seniors have "(paid) taxes, built these buildings and raised these children" and that they have "never been put down to this degree."

In explanation, Counsel Gregory Guercio reiterated that in the absence of a budget, the district is not permitted to run recreational programs. The seniors portion of the Continuing Education Program is funded by the district. Trustee Daniel Arena said that the district is "not trying to take anything away from the senior citizens," but that it is clearly an item which would be disallowed by the State Commissioner of Education.

Superintendent Catherine Fenton requested that the Board postpone discussion of two items for further consideration in a contingency budget--driver education and interscholastic athletics. She suggested discussion of these items if necessary following the August 10 vote.

The Board approved the school calendar for 1988-89 contingent upon negotiations. Classes are scheduled to begin on Wednesday, September 7. The calendar sets aside three days in March for Easter Recess and two days in April for the Passover Holiday. These school closings coincide with the BOCES schedule.

In response to inquiries from the public, Attorney Guercio revealed that the rezoning application for two Burns Avenue property parcels

"He began his career singing on local radio in Baltimore, later moving to New York where his appearance in Romberg's 'New Moon' became his passport to the Broadway stage. He has a number of recordings to his credit and has won numerous honors for his work, including New York City's highest cultural honor, the Handel Medallion.

"Lois Hunt began her career by winning the Metropolitan Opera's Auditions of the Air," which

resulted in a five-year contract with the company," Marcellino said. "Despite her success in the field of opera, she sought to broaden her horizons and moved into the popular milieu of Broadway show tunes, making her debut in 'The Sound of Music.' In the second session, Toni showed a humorous film on a good babysitter and a bad babysitter. The kids found the film very informative as well as entertaining. Toni also taught basic first aid skills.

The third and final session was what everyone was waiting for. The students got to learn diapering on dolls donated by the Red Cross. After final review, each student received an official Red Cross Babysitting Certificate and the class ended with a party!

has been filed with the Town of Oyster Bay and that the district is waiting for a hearing date. Mr. Guercio also noted that although the Superintendent's contract is clearly an austerity item, the Board has the authority to approve an 8% increase for the coming year.

Prior to this business meeting, the Board held its annual reorganization meeting. District Clerk Janet Ullrich administered the oath of office to the six Board members present, including newly elected trustee Patricia Rooney. Resident William Kelly noted the absence of trustee Daniel MacBride and added that Mr. MacBride had attended only two meetings since last summer. Mr. Kelly said that the citizens of Hicksville deserve an active member and be called on Mr. MacBride to show up at meetings or "hand in his resignation."

The Board elected the following officers for the 1988-89 year: President JoAnn Miltenberg, Vice President Daniel Arena, Secretary Carole Wolf, and Deputy District Treasurer Pat Rooney.

The following appointments and official designations were made: Janet Ullrich, District Clerk; Tina Inocco, District Treasurer; Marie Egan, Purchasing Agent; Gregory Guercio, Legal Counsel and the firm of A. W. Oldehoff and Company as the district's independent auditing firm.

The Mid Island Times was designated an official newspaper; depositories include Chemical Bank, Citibank, Bank of New York, Manufacturers Hanover Trust and National Westminster Bank; and Seaman and Eisemann was designated the district's official insurance broker.

The Board established the date for the 1989-90 Budget vote to be May 10, 1989. The schedule of dates for regular meetings for the coming year was accepted, as was the committee meeting dates for 1988-89.

The next scheduled general meeting of the Board will be Wednesday, August 31, at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building. It was also announced that a special meeting will be held on Thursday, August 4, at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room.

Permit Granted For Office Bldg.

A request for a special use permit to allow an office use in an "H" industrial zone has been approved by the Oyster Bay Town Board, according to Town Councilwoman Ann R. Ocker.

"The applicants, Baldwin & Cornelius, P.C., and Moser Realty Corp. were seeking a special use permit to allow part of a building in an 'H' industrial zone to be utilized for office space in conjunction with the operation of an engineering firm," Ocker explained. "The property is located at the southwest corner of Executive Drive and Express Street (Long Island Expressway Service Road)."

In granting the request pursuant to a March 15, public hearing, the Town Board did place a number of restrictive covenants on the property. Among the stipulations were that the building will be limited to a single occupant and that no exterior alterations to expand the building can be made. Also, a trailer now on the property must be removed within one month from the granting of the

application.

With regard to parking, the Board covenanted that a variance may be applied for to reduce the required number of parking stalls to 75, but sufficient area must be available to accommodate any possible future increase in parking needs. In addition, the Board addressed the storage and disposal of garbage and refuse stipulating that it must be stored in closed containers, fenced in on three sides, and that garbage pickup may not be made between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m.

Ocker noted that no certificate of occupancy will be issued until a site plan has been submitted to, and approved by, the Town Board. The plan must show the location of all access and egress; the layout and striping of parking areas; the location, size and composition of areas to be landscaped; the location of dumpsters; and the location, size and type of signs and lighting.

Guide Dog Program For Kiwanis Club

At a recent weekly meeting of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club, Ms. Emily Biegel, the Director of Administrative Affairs for the Guide Dog Foundation for the Blind, Inc., was the guest speaker. In her presentation, Ms. Biegel spoke about how the Foundation selects and trains the dogs, and then demonstrated how the dogs work.

There are ten Guide Dog schools in the United States, and the school in Smithtown, N.Y. is the fourth oldest in the country. The school formerly accepted donations of dogs, but at present, they breed their own. This way, they feel that the pups would have the personality, temperament and ability to be trained as guide dogs. They have found out that the Labrador Retrievers and Golden Retrievers are the most acceptable breeds. It is estimated that it costs about \$15,000.00 to fully train a guide dog.

The pups begin their training with "Puppy Walkers" who keep the pups in their homes. The pups are exposed to all types of situations such as normal activity

in the home, children, traffic, noises, etc. to accustom the pups to a variety of potential problems. Later, sighted trainers will train the dogs in harness to avoid obstacles in a series of repetitive exposures to such obstacles. Subsequently, blind people train the dogs for about 3 weeks locally, and later take them into traffic, subways, day and night. Dogs and blind individuals waiting for a Guide Dog are matched during the training process.

After talking about how the dogs are trained, Ms. Biegel took "Bali", the Guide Dog who accompanied her on this visit to Kiwanis on a demonstration around the room. With voice commands in "Guide Dog language", and her hand on the harness, Ms. Biegel began walking, and let Bali get "boxed in" in an area too small to get through. Bali maneuvered Ms. Biegel out of this area, and continued walking until she found the hallway through which they originally came into the room. A positive demonstration!

Local Youth Touches Future At Space Camp

Elizabeth Rickmeyer of Hicksville explored the future of space travel and experienced astronaut training activities during a five-day program at U.S. Space Camp near NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

More than 3,500 young people from all 50 states and around the world will participate in five and three day Space Camp programs in Florida this year, building and launching model rockets, experiencing astronaut training simulators, and participating in simulated missions using Space Camp's Space Shuttle and mission control mockups.

Open to youngsters in grades four through seven, Space Camp introduces trainees to the history of space exploration during tours of KSC and its visitor's center, Spaceport USA.

They also are introduced to astronomy while working with telescopes at the Brevard Community College Planetarium.

Astronauts train for many years before their first flight. Space Camp trainees are involved in a variety of specific astronaut training activities, from packaged food and waste management systems to life support systems for living in space. They try on spacesuits and helmets, and study actual Mercury and Apollo spacecraft that flew in space.

A highlight of the session puts youngsters in the role of astronauts preparing for space walks and coping with the "zero gravity" of space. They practice in the Moon Walk Trainer, which simulates the sensation of walking on the moon, where body weight is one-sixth that of Earth.

Family members are invited to graduation ceremonies at Spaceport USA's Galaxy Theater on Friday. Where each trainee receives Space Camp wings, a certificate, and a group photo. Special team awards are presented, concluding an exciting week.

Other Space Camp programs at U.S. Space Academy in Huntsville, AL, include U.S. Space Academy Level I for young people in grades seven through ten, Space Academy Level II for high school juniors and seniors, and college freshmen, Adult Space Academy, and "Teaching the Future: Teacher's Space Orientation Course".



Student Wins Grumman Scholarship

Michael Jay Cohen of Old Bethpage, a June 1988 honor graduate of John F. Kennedy High School, has won a \$24,000. Grumman Science and Engineering Scholarship.

The award includes \$6,000 a year for four years toward tuition at any accredited engineering college of Cohen's choice. In addition, Cohen will have a summer job at Grumman through his college career and a Grumman job offer after graduation. He'll study electrical or aerospace engineering at Princeton.

Grumman has awarded 12 such scholarships in 1988 to seniors from Nassau and Suffolk high schools.

A student with a well-rounded high school career, Cohen ranked 10th in his class of 220.

Among his academic achievements, he received the French, Math, Biology and English awards.

In extracurricular activities, he was a member of Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD); Metmunc-Model United Nations; Mathletes, the Math Club Team; Foreign Language Club; Project Outreach, a community service organization, and a Kennedy Carnival volunteer.

In the community, he belonged to the Whitman Flyers, a radio-controlled airplane club. In sports, he was a member of the 1985-86 Plainview-Old Bethpage Intramural Team. Cohen also studied a college level physics course.

Since starting the scholarship program in 1944, Grumman has given grants to well over 500 students, totaling (considerably) over \$3-million. High school seniors in Nassau and Suffolk Counties and Grumman dependents anywhere in the country are eligible to compete.

This year there were 166 applicants. The group was narrowed to 24 finalists, with 12 winners.

Under a policy begun in 1987, the remaining finalists receive \$1,000, a year for four years at college and summer employment at Grumman.

At least three of the winners must be Grumman dependents. This year seven of the winners were dependents, and five out of

the remaining 12 finalists were dependents. Should a winner drop out of the program, a finalist receives the remainder of the scholarship money.

Scholarship finalists must earn a combined verbal and math Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score of 1,200 or higher. (1,600 is the highest possible score.) Students are also required to take the National Engineering Aptitude exam.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens and have a career interest in engineering or major supporting field within the scope of Grumman activities. These areas include, in engineering: aerospace, civil, electrical, industrial or mechanical; and in science/technical areas: applied mathematics, computers, materials or physics.

Young Cohen is the son of Gerald N. Cohen, a salesman with Andover Togs in New York, and Janet Debra Schuman, a software engineering group leader with Grumman at its Melville installation.

Applications to compete for the scholarships are available in Nassau and Suffolk high schools, public and private.

LEGAL NOTICE AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY CHAPTER 22 VEHICLES FOR HIRE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting Section 22-23(b)(1), "Restricted and unrestricted licenses" of Chapter 22, "Vehicles for Hire," in its current form and adding a new Section 22-23(b)(1) as follows:

DELETE: Section 22-23(b)(1) and in its place **ADD:** New Section 22-23(b)(1) to read as follows:
1) Licensee operates and maintains a bona fide terminal within the Town of Oyster Bay or an incorporated village within the area of the Town of Oyster Bay, except that persons holding a valid tow car license of the Town of Oyster Bay as of March 31, 1977, may apply for and be issued unrestricted license, even if the applicant's terminal is not within the Town of Oyster Bay, if otherwise qualified.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Editor's Notebook

Nassau County District Attorney Denis Dillon has reiterated his call to the New York State Legislature to pass a law removing the limit on prison sentences for defendants convicted of multiple felonies. Under present law a defendant convicted of multiple unrelated felonies and given consecutive prison sentences can serve no more than 25 to 50 years in prison. Dillon's bill would remove the cap completely.

As a case in point, Dillon refers to an ongoing case on Long Island that benefits the criminal. The so-called South Shore serial rapist, Scott Carroll, was recently convicted of 31 counts of rape, sexual abuse, sodomy, burglary and grand larceny. A judge sentenced Carroll to 323-646 years in prison. Under existing law he'll be eligible for parole in 25 years. What makes this worse is that Carroll is now awaiting trial on 12 additional counts of attempted murder, rape, sodomy, sexual abuse and burglary. Even if convicted, the defendant cannot receive any additional time in prison. "This is outrageous," says Denis Dillon.

"This law totally frustrates the intent of the court in sentencing a violent, vicious offender. It gives the criminal a free ride for the additional felonies committed prior to the imposition of the first sentence. This type of back door sentence reduction is totally at odds with reasonable attempts to provide a sufficient scope of punishment for serious, violent offenders," says Dillon.

The District Attorney added, "By removing the limits on adding the periods of consecutively imposed indeterminate sentences, the bill will permit the sentences served to be a far more accurate reflection of the intent of the sentencing court. In permitting the punishment imposed to more appropriately fit the nature of the crimes committed, the bill adds an extra measure of deterrence and increases the ability of the criminal justice system to protect society from its most serious offenders."

Dillon said the bulk of the blame for this bill previously failing in the legislature thus far is the Assembly Speaker who has opposed this bill since its introduction in 1981 when he was Chairman of the Codes Committee. He urges the residents to let elected officials in the State Legislature know how they feel about this bill and what he calls the lack of justice created by the current state of the law."


