Bus Driver Arrested For Abuse

Detective Ray Storck of the Second Squad reports the details of an arrest for sexual abuse and assault third degree. The arrest took place in Hicksville on November 3 at 8 p.m.

It was alleged that at 3:25 p.m., Kenneth Averett 44, of Roosevelt, was driving a bus for Wee Transport, 42 E. Carl St., Hicksville. The bus had left from the Center for Community Adjustment, 2850 N. Jerusalem Ave., Wantagh, to drop off

youths in the Syosset area. While in the bus Averett sexually abused a 15 year old boy and another youth sustained a contusion to his right wrist when he was involved in an altercation with Averett. The youth with the injured wrist was taken to Syosset Hospital by his parents and was treated and released.

Averett was arrested at the Wee Transport facility in Hicksville and will be arraigned 1st District Court on November 18.

Hooker Plant Cleanup With Superfund Money

The Hicksville Community Council opened its 1988-89 season with its monthly meeting held on Thursday, November 3. As a service to its members and local residents, a candidates forum took place. The second half of the evening's program was a presentation by representatives of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on the site activity at Hooker-Ruco.

Many candidates, incumbents and opponents, from all levels of government-federal, state and local-and all political persuasions-Republican, Democrat, Right-to-Life - approached the podium to introduce themselves and tell a little bit about their qualifications. The candidates touched on a wide range of subjects, including, taxes, the death penalty, the transportation bond issue, the environment, the establishment of group homes for the mentally disabled and LILCO.

The Hooker plant, a 14-acre site on New South Road which at present produces plastics, polyester and polyurethane, has been chosen as an EPA "Superfund Site." Superfund was enacted in 1980, one of the last pieces of legislation signed by President Carter, and identifies sites for high-priority hazardous waste cleanup. The law provides broad federal authority and resources to respond directly to releases (or threatened releases) of hazardous substances that could endanger human health or the environment. The program is funded by taxation of the petroleum industry.

The causes of potential hazardous wastes at the site stem from activity prior to 1975, which included the possible burial of barrels of solidified latex and the release of PCBs. All hazardous waste is now legally removed from the site.

The EPA program consists of evaluation and cleanup. The agency identifies the Potentially Responsible Persons (PRPs) and tries to get the PRPs to do the cleanup. If they are not successful, EPA will do the work and try to recoup the money from the PRPs.

Doug Tomchuck, EPA site director, explained that EPA has done a preliminary investigation. The agency has also succeeded in securing owner Oriental Chemical Company to do the work, with EPA oversight.

The long process toward cleanup begins with a further investigation. EPA has drilled wells at the property in order to analyze ground water. The object at this time is to determine, via the flow of ground water, the extent of contaminants. The current work plan includes a geophysical survey, soil survey and sampling, surface sampling around tanks, sump and other areas, and air monitoring. Upon approval, this work should begin in February.

A representative of the Nassau County Health Department said that at present there are levels of some chemicals in the form of industrial solvents in Hicksville water, but they do not present a risk to health or a need for the closure of wells. The level of contaminants in the water exceeds the five parts per billion standard which becomes effective in New York State in January 1989.

A question-and-answer period followed the presentation.

A green van traveling northbound in the left lane and a brown sporty type car also northbound but in the right lane of South Oyster Bay Road, appeared to both strike McDonald. Both vehicles left the scene.

McDonald was transported to NCMC, E. Meadow where she has been admitted in critical condition with head trauma, shattered pelvis and fracture to the right leg.

Agnes McDonald succumbed to her injuries and was pronounced dead at 11:30 p.m., October 31, by Dr. Gelben of the Hospital Staff.

Fourth Graders To Lloyd Manor



Editor's Notebook

Government policies to safeguard America's traditional dependents - children and the elderly - may be due for some serious rethinking, according to a study by Peter A. Morrison of the Rand Corporation.

The instability of family life, he says, is already eroding the ability of many Americans to meet the needs of the young. If current trends continue, more than half of first marriages will end in divorce. Among six year olds, two out of three white children, and 19 out of 20 black children will live in a one-parent family before they are 18. Also, about 21% of all children born in the U.S.A. are now born out of wedlock.

On the other end of the scale, 12% of the population, about 28 million Americans, is over 65. By the year 2025 the figures will reach 19.5% or 59 million. There will also be a disproportionate shift to the very old age group. In 1950 a 65 year old could expect to live 13.9 more years. By 1985 the figure was 16.8 years.

As the nation looks forward to a new four-year administration in Washington, it might be as good a time as any for Congress to cast a sharp eye on America's changing demographic patterns and make positive plans for the future. Otherwise the burden of caring for young and old dependents could prove to be a financial burden on U.S.A. workers in the not so distant future.





A 1982 graduate of Plainview Old Bethpage High School, he joined the Navy in August 1983.


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


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
