Covenants Imposed On Zone Change

The Oyster Bay Town Board has granted a change of zone for a residence-office for real estate or law office use in Hicksville, subject to numerous restrictive covenants, according to Town Councilwoman Ann R. Ocker.

"The applicants, Serge deLoutsky, Anita Lo and Joseph Adragna, were seeking a change of zone from 'D' residence district to 'R-O' residence-office district, for a parcel located on the east side of Newbridge Road, south of the intersection formed by Newbridge Road and the south side of Old Country Road, also known by the street address of 199 Newbridge Road," Ocker said. "In approving the application, pursuant to a public hearing held on March 15, the Board imposed 18 restrictive covenants."

Among the covenants are requirements that the exterior of the building, the parking area, fencing and landscaping areas are to be kept in a neat and clean condition and the lawn be properly maintained. Hours of operation for all office use will be limited to 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and must be closed on Sunday. The

Board also stipulated that there will be no neon, rotating or illuminating signs installed on the premises, and that no lighting shall penetrate from the property onto residential homes or neighboring parcels. All outdoor lights shall be extinguished no later than 11 p.m.

With regard to office use, the Board mandated that the use of a real estate office is restricted to permit no more than four (4) persons, clerical or professional, to work on the premises at any one time. The premises may be used for one other additional use provided that the second floor is used solely for residential purposes and that no medical or medical-related office is permitted.

Additional covenants require that the main entrance to the premises faces First Street, and that debris, garbage and refuse shall be stored in covered garbage containers.

"No building permits or certificate of occupancy will be issued," Ocker stated, "until a 'site plan' has been submitted and approved by the Town Board."

Exxon Given Approval To Rebuild Gas Station

The Oyster Bay Town Board imposed 28 restrictive covenants on a special use permit granted to Exxon Corporation that will allow the demolition of an existing station in Hicksville and construction of a new one, according to Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

"The applicant was seeking the special use permit to demolish a gasoline service station on the southwest corner of Old Country and South Oyster Bay Roads and erect a new four-bay service facility with two canopy structures," Hogan stated. "Pursuant to a public hearing held on March 1, the Town Board has approved the special use permit subject to 28 restrictive covenants."

The Board covenanted that a 24-hour self-service operation may be conducted, but a full-service pump must be available between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Repairs are restricted to between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. with no repair of vehicles permitted outdoors.

The Board further stipulated that no sale of convenience store products will be permitted without obtaining a special use permit from the Town, which would require a public hearing. No signs advertising the sale of non-related automobile supplies will be erected. A maximum of two vending machines will be permitted, and no pinball or other types of amusement games will be allowed on the premises.

With regard to the sale and storage of vehicles, the Board prohibited the selling of new or used cars, trucks or trailers. They also prohibited the use of the property for day or night storage.

Parola Urges School Bus Action

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) said today there is no reason school children should have to ride in uncomfortable yellow school buses on long distance field trips and urged legislative action on an amendment proposed by Sen. Norman Levy to ease certain travel restrictions.

Currently, school children are prohibited from riding in any vehicle other than designated yellow school buses manufactured after 1977. This has presented a problem for schools with plans for lengthy field trips or activities away from their home schools.

of vehicles of any kind. Outdoor storage of equipment and supplies is also forbidden, and all waste and debris must be stored in closed containers.

Hogan said that the canopy will be no more than 17 feet high and will have no lighting on the facade. Back lighting will be permitted provided that no lights project beyond the canopy. All other exterior lighting must be directed so it does not interfere with surrounding properties or vehicular traffic. All signs must conform to Town ordinances.

The Board stated that there will be no charge for the use of air hoses. Any external audio system of bell hoses must be installed so as to be inaudible at a distance greater than 25 feet from the main location of the system. Other covenants imposed relate to the proper and environmentally-safe installation of the gas tanks, requirements for a ground-water monitoring system, and landscaping of the property.

Hogan noted that no building permit or certificate of occupancy will be issued until a site plan has been submitted to, and approved by, the Town Board. The plan must be to scale and show the location of all buildings on the property, the dimensions and color of the proposed canopy, the location of the groundwater monitoring well, the size and location of underground tanks, the location of the pump islands, all access and egress, landscaping, the layout and striping of parking areas, the location of dumpsters, signs and lighting, and any other information requested by the Department of Planning and Development.

"I would like to see this nonsensical statute corrected," said Sen. Levy's bill will do so," said Parola. "While safety is always our key concern, I believe that this legislation will both protect our students and eliminate the hardship imposed by current law without reason."

"This is a common sense issue," said Parola. "I am hopeful that we can clear up this inconvenience with the proper legislation when we return to Albany next week, and I have urged the legislative leadership to adopt this legislation which will provide a clear solution."

Editor's Notebook

Are School Buses Safe?

The big, yellow school bus is an American institution that rolls through our neighborhoods every morning and afternoon transporting millions of children over 3.3 billion miles each year.

Are school buses safe? Yes, they are extremely safe. Most of the relatively few school bus-related fatalities each year are occupants of other vehicles or children who are killed while getting on or off the bus - not the occupants of the bus itself.

Mile per mile school buses are at least four times safer than automobiles. These are several reasons: because they are larger, school buses tend to get the upper hand in most crashes. There are special traffic laws for school bus safety. The buses must meet rigorous federal safety standards especially written for school buses and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reviews these standards regularly to make certain the pupil transportation system in this country is as safe as possible. Parents should not believe there is any safer way to send a child to school. Even walking to school is more dangerous than taking a bus.

And the U.S. Department of Transportation is looking for ways to make this safe form of transportation even safer. For example, it is testing new and improved materials that are more flame retardant, examining the number and placement of additional emergency exits, and taking a careful look at the location of the fuel tank.

How can a community keep its school buses safe? Local school boards are responsible for administering pupil transportation under criteria adopted and monitored by the state governments. They should monitor and press for enforcement of laws and regulations on school bus driver selection, training and licensing, maintenance, evacuation and safety drills. The laws on combating drunk driving and on not passing stopped school buses are particularly important and should be strictly enforced.

Postal Service employees at the Hicksville Post Office and the Mid-Island Mail Processing Facility in Melville raised \$2,500. They purchased over 350 turkeys which were distributed to 15 various welfare agencies throughout the Long Island area.

Herb Lippert, postal supervisor, has chaired the drive for the past ten years. The week before Thanksgiving he and a group of fellow postal workers began purchasing the turkeys at local area supermarkets. They then made arrangements with the recipient agencies to have them pick up the turkeys in Melville. Those agencies that can't pick up have their turkeys delivered by one of the postal volunteers.

Chemlawn Given Special Use Permit

The Oyster Bay Town Board has imposed 16 restrictive covenants on a special use permit granted to Chemlawn in Hicksville, according to Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes.

"The applicants, Sante Nicolia and Chemlawn Services Corporation, requested the special use permit to operate a tree, lawn, shrub care and maintenance business in an 'H' industrial zone located on the east side of Charlotte Street approximately 280 feet south of the intersection of Charlotte and West John Streets in Hicksville," Hynes stated. "In granting the permit, which was the subject of a public hearing on June 14, the Town Board proscribed 16 restrictive covenants to ensure that the business will be operated and maintained in an orderly manner."

Hynes said that among the covenants, the Board is limiting the use and occupancy of the building to a single tenant and prohibiting any expansion from its present size. The Board also stipulated that all loading operations must be conducted within the building.

With regard to storage of waste and debris, they must be kept in closed containers fenced in on three sides. Garbage pickup is limited to between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. All chemicals must be properly stored and dispersed in accordance with state and local ordinances.

Other covenants state that no exterior audio communication system will be permitted, all









BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Article I, of Appendix A of the Town of Oyster Bay Code of Ordinances, "Motor Vehicle & Traffic Chapter 17," be and the same is hereby amended by ADDING Section 17-119-b to read as follows:

"Sec. 17-119-b. Metered Parking for Parking Fields H-8, H-9 and H-12, Hicksville.

(a) Purpose. It is the purpose of this ordinance to prevent communities from parking in the stalls in the Parking Fields H-8, H-9 and H-12, Hicksville, so that such parking may be used by the customers of local merchants in the vicinity of said parking.

(b) There shall be metered parking in Parking Fields H-8, H-9 and H-12, Hicksville. Such meters shall have a four-hour limit, and be at a cost of twenty-five cents for the period of said limit. Usage of said meters by those using the stalls in the abovementioned parking fields shall be required from 9:00 a.m. through 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays.

(c) The abovementioned metered parking shall apply to all stalls in the aforementioned parking fields and shall displace all other metered and non-metered parking arrangements in the said parking fields."


