#### Compost Program Saves Fees

The Town of Oyster Bay has realized a savings of more than \$270,000 in garbage shipping fees as a result of its leaf composting program, according to Town

program, according to Town Supervisor Angelo A. Delligatti "Between November 9 and December 15, the Town collected 2,627 tons of leaves, which were taken to a recently completed nine-and-a-half-acre composting site," said Delligatti. "At the current shipping rate of approximately \$103 per ton, the Town has saved about \$270,581 by composting rather than shipping the leaves. Since the Town is still collecting leaves, the savings will be even greater by the end of the leaf collection season.'

Delligatti noted that the Town began a pilot composting pro-

gram in November, 1987. Data collected from that project was used to craft a Town-wide

composting program.

"The composting program is another step in the Town's ongoing efforts to reduce the ongoing efforts to reduce the amount of materials in the disposable waste stream," Delligatti stated. "Our program follows guidelines established by New York State and has been commended by Senator Joseph L. Bruno, Vice Chairman of the New York State Legislative Committee on Solid Waste Management.'

The composted leaves will be used to enhance the soil at Town park facilities. They will also be used as part of the capping program at the now closed Plainview- Old Bethpage landfill.

#### Two Hicksville Sites Ready For Action Chosen For Group Homes

Further steps have been taken toward the establishment of two sites in Hicksville as community residence facilities for mentally disabled

After review of several sites either earmarked by the State Mental Health Department or proposed as alternate sites by concerned residents, the Central Nassau Guidance and Counseling Services, which has been working in the Hicksville community for 17 years, is in the process of acquiring 499 Jerusalem Avenue and 302B John Street. These two sites will be the first group home residences Central Nassau

is seeking to operate.

As yet, Central Nassau has not finalized purchase of the sites, but they are working toward closing dates. The agency will receive grant money from the State for each site.

After purchase of the sites, renovations are expected to be made. Before the opening of the homes, Central Nassau must receive certification from the State after a joint inspection by the State Office of Mental Health and the Nassau County Mental Health Department. The State is responsible for monitoring group home programs, conducting spot checks and carrying out inspections of the facilities.

Upon receipt of certification, Central Nassau will set an opening date for the homes and begin to interview candidates for placement. Mr. Ken Moskowitz, project director from Central Nassau, said that each home will accommodate ten residents. When interviewing referrals for placement, the agency gives priority to clients who are from Hicksville and the surrounding area, if such referrals come to their attention,

#### Editor's Notebook

The Nassau County Department of Health advises residents that during the winter months not to judge outdoor conditions by the temperature alone. The wind chill factor can create effects of lower temperatures which can lead to frostbite.

Frostbite is caused by prolonged exposure to freezing temperatures, and during the initial stage the victim may be unaware of being affected.

Residents should be aware of the symptoms of frostbite and take the necessary precautions to avoid it.

· First degree frostbite usually causes a whitening of the skin, often followed by redness, itching, tingling, and loss of feeling. Numbness can occur so quickly that the victim, unaware of being frostbitten, may remain outdoors, increasing his or her chances of permanent damage.

• In second degree frostbite, tissues turn a purplish color, with blisters forming on the skin. Severe frostbite can lead to gangrene, and the affected part may have to be

amputated.

If frostbite strikes, do not rub the affected area! Get the victim to a warm place, provide warm liquids if the person is conscious and quickly warm the frozen part by applying warm water. Medical attention should be sought for all but the mildest cases.

The best defense against frostbite is to dress warmly in windproof clothing especially for head, ears, fingers and toes, and to go indoors, if possible, when you begin to feel

To The Editor:

A serious charge was made by you, Mr. Goldstein, in a letter which appeared in the January 13th Mid Island Times. You state that the Hicksville School District is not producing students who can compete for placement in the top schools, I disagree with you. Like all test scores and statistics, they can always be interpreted in different ways. We have many test scores that show an upturn in the abilities of our students to achieve, and I would be glad to forward that data to you or to anyone interested in reviewing our test scores.

With respect to Dr. Fenton's contract, we evaluate her performance on an annual basis and we observe her capabilities and performance of duties throughout the year. It is on that basis that we make our decision. Dr. Fenton has been our superintendant for six years, and she has turned this district around and made it educationally productive. Her advice is also sought by many of her peers not only here in the state of New York, but nationally as well. So yes, Mr. Goldstein, we know what we have, and we do

not need a crystal ball. We have one of the best superintendants in the country, and that is based on observations of not only this Board of Education, but prior

The parents and taxpayers of this community have not indicated in any way their dissatisfaction with the performance of Hicksville's super-intendant. Yes, we have received a few letters over the years from parents and members of the community who were concerned had different opinions on certain matters or practices. However, this happens in any school district, in any government agency, or in any business.

In your letter you gave the impression to the reader that the board action in renewing the superintendant's contract inappropriate and illegal because we acted a year and one-half before the contract ended. The contract that we have with the Superintendant of Schools states that the renewal shall be brought to the board's attention eighteen months prior to the termination of the contract. It further states that the Board of Education must give the superintendant one full year's notice if we are not to renew the contract. Those were the terms of the contract agreed to by the Board of Education, and we acted in accordance with the contract. What we did was legal and proper and is followed by other Boards' of Education throughout our state. We as trustees of the Board of Education must abide by the spirit and context of law, and that is what we did.

We as a Board of Education, have a distinct responsibility under the state law to negotiate and renew contracts with both individuals or bargaining units. We do not go out into the community and ask our taxpayers if we should renew a negotiated contract with teachers, secretaries or custodians. The people in the community rely on our sense

of good judgement in this regard.

If I had to underscore one important quality that I see in the superintendant, it is simply this: She listens, and does not go forward with a recommendation if it is not agreed to by members of the Board of Education. If a board member disagrees with the recommendation, she always finds a way to satisfy that board member's needs and comes up with an agreeable solution. If the Board of Education disapproves the superintendant's recommendation it is immediately dropped and within twenty-four hours we have a new approach to the problem or situation. I feel that flexibility is a great quality and that is why I, as one board member, have great respect and admiration for our superintendent. Dr. Fenton.



In the intervening years it has done much within its ranks to maintain the family atmosphere that has largely characterized Grumman since the company started operations in 1930.

The restoration team is believed to be the only retiree group in the country to have such a relationship with its former employer.

Another group of local volunteer retirees is the Model Technology Group. Numbering just ten members, this unit assembles and paints in military colors and markings miniature models of Grumman products for promotional and employee relations purposes. The group has worked on more than 6,000 models in the last decade.

The Bethpage chapter also sponsors an 18-team mixed bowling team and a three-league golf effort. Further, it maintains a sunshine committee which raises prize money for gifts for sick retirees, a visitation group which visits such shut-ins, and a legal committee which advises members on legal matters pertaining to senior citizens and Grumman retirees in particular.

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

#### Yevoli Wants Raceway Probe

Assemblyman Lewis J. Yevoli (D-Old Bethpage) has officially called on Attorney General Robert Abrams to launch a full investigation of commercial development plans at Roosevelt Raceway, Westbury and to commence a receivership proceeding on the property to protect the public interest. Terming the closing of the historic Raceway 'a severe blow to the economy of the Town of Hempstead and to Long Island," Yevoli said, "the current probe would go on while simultaneous criminal investigations into the use of Hempstead Town Industrial Development Agency bonds is underway by United States Attorney Andrew Maloney and Nassau District Attorney Denis Dillon. "With the current dark cloud of

corruption hanging over the Raceway." Yevoli said, "there is no question the entire 172 acres should be placed in receivership until state and federal probes are completed into the track's purchase by Roosevelt Raceway Associates in 1984.

The Hempstead Town Indus-trial Development Agency approved \$54 million in tax-free bonds five years ago with the stated intent of preserving harness racing and savings jobs in the purchase by Roosevelt Raceway Associates, a limited partnership that contributed \$1000 in the deal. Assemblyman Yevoli will be meeting Senator Emanuel Gold who has also called

for the action by Abrams.

Assemblyman Yevoli concluded: "It's outrageous that this political combine could get that funding and then be in a position to sell off the Raceway property for upwards of \$200 million. Nassau County has been ripped off for tens of millions of dollars."

The site is located on the west side of Route 107, south of South Oyster Bay Road, north of Cental Park Avenue in Hicksville.

#### POTENTIAL ENVIRON-MENTAL IMPACTS AND EFFECTS:

The proposed action is projected to result in the generation of 1,058 vehicles during the weekday commuter peak hour. Approximately 1,179 vehicles would be generated during the Saturday peak hour. This vehicular generation has the potential to adversely affect the area's traffic patterns.

The site is located in an area which is classified as nonattainment for monoxide - a situation which can be directly related to traffic generation. The high vehicular generation rate noted above has the potential to further increase carbon monoxide levels in the area.

The project site is located in a water district which has been affected by the NYS Dept. of Environmental Conservation limitations on water use. That water district has indicated that any increase in water use could adversely affect the district. The proposal - with its projected water usage of close to 2 million gallons per year could have an adverse affect on the local water district.
