5 Injured In Car Crash

On Friday evening, the Hicksville Firefighters were called out to a car accident, at the intersection of Jerusalem Avenue and Second Street.

Upon arrival, Chief Wigdzinski encountered a serious accident with multiple aided. Chief Wigdzinski immediately notified his incoming units what the situation was, and also summoned additional ambulances from the Nassau County Police Department and the Jericho Fire

Building Owners Want Permission For Stores

Owners of the newly built, one story office building on Broadway, between West Cherry Street and West Nicholas Street appeared before the Town of Oyster Bay Board on Tuesday to ask permission to rent some of the space to retailers.

Business manager and officer of L & K Holding Corporation, Michael M. D'Auria told the board that he has had very little response from people looking to rent the area as offices. He said that after erecting a sign on the land six years ago, 100 phone calls came from retailers and three for office space.

Mr. D'Auria told the board that residents would be better served by renting the space to retailers. He referred to a survey taken by St. Ignatius Church, located across the street, which asked its parishioners what they would like to see done to the land. The largest percentage (38%) responded "stores."

Mr. D'Auria said that the firm was not interested in pizza parlors or chinese take-out restaurants. He said he has negotiated thus far with two podiatrists and has been approached by Fireside Deli, as well as a video chain for the remaining spaces. He added that he was able to negotiate with the latter two without a special permit.

In a bulletin put out by St. Ignatius, the pastor wrote that he hoped a bakery or an Italian deli would be allowed to move in.

"I can't find people who want office space," Mr. D'Auria told the board, "and I don't think you want an empty building," he added after telling of two cases of vandalism to take place at the vacant offices.

L & K Holding Corporation's attorney, Eric Rockel, said that should the permit be granted, no changes would occur in the basic exterior, but interior modifications may be necessary.

He continued by saying the parcels lend themselves to retail units rather than offices because professionals prefer to make appointments rather than meet people "off the street." He said that retail stores would not change the character of the area, but instead be an improvement over a vacant lot. Mr. Rockel also stated that retail stores, unlike offices, are usually never vacant for long periods of time.

Joseph F. Geraghty, a realtor for over forty years, said he had surveyed the area, in light of the application, and concluded it was better suited for retail stores. He added that there were no apparent safety hazards or parking problems.

The only resident to speak was Robert Rennart of Mayfair Lane. He said he has lived in Hicksville, for 39 years and liked it better when stores lined either side of Broadway.

"Today, I have to go to King Kullen, or way up to Pathmark, and stand in line for milk or a bag of potatoes," he told the board. He concluded that he was in favor of the special use permit.

The building is located in a G zoning district for offices. The land was acquired six years ago by L & K Holding Corporation. Construction of the building began in May of 1988 and was completed in November that same year. The parking lot is currently being paved.

The board will make a decision on the special use permit in the future.

Editor's Notebook

There was once a widely circulated "witicism" that went like this: "Would you buy a used car from someone like that?" The idea, of course, was that most people buy used cars "on faith," rather than knowledge or experience.

The saying was a bit unfair since, most used car dealers are no doubt trustworthy, like most other business people. Nevertheless the Department of Motor Vehicles has seen fit to provide some tips for consumers in purchasing used cars:

- Read and save all paper work, including estimates, work orders, invoices, warranties, and guarantees. If you don't understand something, ask questions.

- Before purchasing a car, test drive it. Check its performance, handling and comfort. Drive in both stop-and-go city traffic and on highways. If the car is used, have a mechanic you trust inspect it and go with you for a test drive.

- If you request it, a repair shop must provide a written estimate for the repairs, and they may charge a reasonable fee for developing the estimate. The charge for a repair may not exceed the written estimate without your consent.

- A shop may not repair your car without your written or verbal consent. Ask about the cost of repairs before giving your consent.

- You are entitled to claim replaced parts if you request them in writing before repairs are done. Replaced parts may be very important evidence if you have a complaint about unnecessary repairs.

- If a problem arises, discuss it with the dealer or repair shop manager, not just a salesperson or mechanic. If your complaint cannot be resolved through your warranty, guarantee or discussions with management, contact DMV for information and assistance.

Under New York's repair shop law, DMV may only accept complaints filed within 90 days or 3,000 miles after the repair, whichever comes first. Consumers with complaints against dealers, auto repair shops or inspection stations should contact Consumer Services, DMV, Box 2700-ESP, Albany, N.Y. 12220-0700. Call (518) 474-8943 in the Capital District, or 1-800-342-3823, toll free, from elsewhere in the state between 9 a.m. and noon weekdays.

To The Editor:

I have been on the Hicksville Board of Education for almost two years and I don't think that there has been one meeting that I didn't leave thinking "I should have said...." Last night, Monday, March 6, after the Town of Oyster Bay Task Force on Parks and Recreation/Facilities meeting, I felt the same way.

After a year of the Re-organization Ad-hoc Committee meetings, one of the recommendations made to the Board of Education by some community members was to look into the sale or lease of excess acreage at some of our schools. I had mentioned that if the Board were to sell property the community would not have any control over what the buyer would build. The committee then suggested that the Board lease the property placing conditions on the lease so that the property could only be used for some type of park.

Last night we had the opportunity to hear such a proposal. Hicksville is one of the largest communities in the Town of Oyster Bay without a Town Park. As a member of the Task Force, I thought this would be a chance for Hicksville to get something for our town tax dollars: to upgrade the conditions of our fields, to add park security and police to decrease vandalism and vagrancy and to give our children a safer place to play. As a mother who drives to the Syosset-Woodbury Community Center, I also thought that perhaps the Hicksville residents could have a location at which the town could offer some of its many programs.

It was a very interesting and informative meeting and whatever the results, I would still like to see our town taxes spent somewhere in Hicksville.

All the preliminary work is done for you. There are many new job openings for the spring months in the business community.

The work of the Employment Program does not end there. Once a job is found, the teen is offered the opportunity to learn job skills necessary in the work force. Skills include: filling out a job application, interview techniques, and resume writing. We will not send you out for a job until you feel confident you will succeed. Water Dist. Comments On Food, Water

Pesticides have garnered significant media attention over recent weeks. The Natural Resources Defense Council, based in Washington, D.C., has upset the applecart, so to speak, via its charges that pesticides used to protect crops actually pose a serious cancer threat.

Allowable levels of pesticides in apples are set at 1 part per million, which equals 1000 parts per billion (ppb). According to Richard A. Humann, Chairman of the Hicksville Water District Board of Commissioners, the standards set for apples, and for all food, for that matter, are far more lenient than those set for drinking water. In the Annual Water Supply Statement that will be mailed at the end of the month, each consumer of the Hicksville Water District will see that the drinking water standards for pesticides are set as low as 1 part per billion. Further, detection limits are as low as 3/100 of 1 part per billion.

Testing performed on Hicksville's water revealed that none were detected in the District's distribution system. "Clearly, this is another example of drinking water standards being far more stringent in most cases, than those set for food," Commissioner Humann points out. Nicholas J. Brigandi, another Hicksville Water District Com-

missioner, further points out that lead in drinking water is set at only 5 parts per billion under the proposed standard, as opposed to 1000 parts per billion, the allowable amount for grapefruit. The amount of temik allowable in the drinking water in which you would boil a potato is limited to 7 parts per billion. Yet, 1000 parts per billion of temik are permitted in the potato itself.

Even in light of the already stringent standards in place of drinking water, utilities are required, according to Hicksville Water District Commissioner Gilbert E. Cusick, to inform the public if on one day they exceed a standard by even one percent. "It doesn't seem appropriate that people can eat apples, grapefruit and potatoes every day of their lives without any Health warning them to limit their consumption to one or two a week."

The Board of Commissioners for the Hicksville Water District unanimously contend that the disparity between food and drinking water standards is unreasonable. Furthermore, they believe that the Health Department should be required to inform consumers on the dangers of some of the constituents found in food and set new, more stringent standards for food and identify its levels of consumption.

\$98,000 Grant For Recycling

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Angelo A. Delligatti recently announced that the Town has been awarded a \$98,000 recycling grant from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. The monies will be used for public education activities aimed at enhancing participation in the Town's recycling programs.

"We are extremely pleased to accept this grant," said the Supervisor, "which was awarded by the DEC on the merits of our recycling program. These State funds will help to educate Town residents to the importance of

recycling and, hopefully, garner their support in achieving maximum Town-wide recycling."

The grant will be utilized for the production and distribution of various recycling informational materials, such as newspaper and electronic media advertisements, slide shows and other promotional items. Additionally, said Supervisor Delligatti, these funds will be used to employ a Community Information Aide, whose responsibilities will involve the presentation of recycling education and awareness material through the Town's school districts, civic organizations and other community groups.



Yevoli Speaks Out Against Alcohol

Assemblyman Lewis J. Yevoli (D. Old Bethpage) has proposed legislation that would make it illegal for those under age 21 to have alcoholic beverages in their possession. It would amend the alcoholic beverage law in relation to possession by minors of liquor with the intent to consume.

"Several years ago we passed a law banning the sale of alcoholic drinks to those under age 21," Yevoli said. "However, attention was not given to the fact that many teenagers transport liquor by person or in cars and there is no law to prevent it. What has happened is that many minors are still exposed to alcohol. If this bill is passed, it will certainly result in less deaths and injuries on our highways involving minors and will lessen the number of DWI cases statewide."

Yevoli said the measure has the support of a great majority of college and high school officials, student leaders, the State Conference of Mayors and the New York State Medical Society.

Concluded Yevoli: "While the age 21 minimum drinking law has lowered liquor sales in bars and taverns to minors, enactment of this provision will enable police and municipal officials to break up beer parties often held on public property such as parks and school grounds. If a minor is apprehended with alcohol in his or her possession, the beverage will be confiscated. I know it will make our roads and highways that much safer."

Town Unveils Affordable Mortgage Plan

Declaring that the average house costs twice as much as the average household can afford to pay, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Angelo A. Delligatti today, March 13, 1989, unveiled an Affordable Mortgage Program that will result in 20-30 new mortgages each year for first-time homebuyers.

Delligatti noted that the impact of the housing-cost spiral is particularly evident in the Town of Oyster Bay where the wealth of its north shore villages has had a tremendous impact on land values.

While referring to a chart that demonstrated median income and median home prices, Delligatti showed that an Oyster Bay family with a median income of \$59,000 could afford to purchase a home valued at \$141,000. Unfortunately \$141,000 is \$35,000 less than Oyster Bay's median priced home. For that family to afford the median price home of \$176,620, they would require an income of \$73,827.

Delligatti said, "The Town's Affordable Mortgage Program will be designed to permit a family with a median income to purchase a median priced home." This will be done through down payment assistance and a contribution toward the reduction of monthly mortgage payments. In the example given, a family with an income of \$59,000 could purchase a home valued at \$175,000. The Affordable Mortgage Program would contribute 10% of the sale price toward the down payment and the applicant would contribute an equal amount. In addition, the Program would loan sufficient capital, in this case \$25,200, to reduce the mortgage rate from 11% to 8%, thereby making monthly payment realistic.

"The approach is unique in that we are not constructing

subsidized units - the most common approach to affordable housing on Long Island," said Delligatti. "I have chosen this mortgage approach for a number of important reasons. First, very little, if any, land within the Town exists at a cost that would make the construction of affordable housing, affordable. Secondly, by allowing our residents the opportunity to shop for a home in our Town, it allows them the freedom of choice and the probability of selecting a home in the community in which they grew up, close to family and friends."

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
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Military Ball Marks Legions' 70th Anniversary
