# Memorial Day Parades, **Observances Held Locally**

This weekend, in communities across the nation, Memorial Day, or

This weekend, in communities across the nation, Memorial Day, or Decoration Day, will be marked by parades and observances honoring the men and women who gave their lives in the service of their country. Memorial Day dates back to post Civil War years. Several communities claimed the beginning of the holiday, and in 1966, the United States government declared Waterloo, New York, the birthplace of Memorial Day. The people of Waterloo observed Memorial Day on May 5, 1866 to honor the soldiers who died in the Civil War. In 1868, Major General John A. Logan, Commander of the Canad Army of the Republic named May 30, as a special day for Grand Army of the Republic, named May 30, as a special day for honoring the graves of the Union soldiers.

Today's observances, celebrated in most of the states with the exception of several southern states, also honor deceased military personnel of the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean and Vietnam Wars. Beginning in 1971, the date of observance became the last Monday in May.

Since the end of World War I, Memorial Day has also been "poppy day." The sale of small, paper poppies was to benefit disabled veterans.

In the local area parades, residents from a variety of organizations will be in the line of march, including veterans groups, the departments, scouts, school marching bands, CYO, 4 H, sports teams, senior citizens, women's clubs and mounted police units. This year's

observances shape up as follows: In Hicksville, the annual parade and cermonies will be hosted by the Gieir-Levitt Post 655 of the Jewish War Veterans. The parade will kick off at 9 a.m. on Monday, May 29, from the Sears parking lot, and proceed south on Broadway, west on Old Country Road, and south on Jerusalem Avenue to the War Monuments on the Hicksville Middle School property. Ceremonies will take place following the parade. This year's principal speaker is Gen. Bernard Saul, U.S. Air Force (Ret.).

The William M. Grouse Jr. Post 3211 and the Ladies Auxiliary will be selling poppies along the parade route; proceeds will go to help veterans who have been hospitalized.

At the last regular meeting of the VFW Post 3211, Christine Levoy of Centerreach was selected as the 1989 Poppy Queen. Seven-year-old Christine is the granddaughter of post member Raymond Guilfoyle. and her proud parents are Gary and Christle Levoy. She will be participating in the parade on the 29th. Post 3211 will also distribute

some 200 flags along the parade route.

The American Legion Post #175 will host the annual Syosset Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 29. The marchers will form between 9 and 9:30 a.m., on Humphrey Drive at the Variety Pre-Schoolers Workshop. Step off is at 10 a.m. and the parade will proceed east on Dawes Avenue, north on Jackson Avenue, west on Muttontown Road, south on Queens Street, east on Underhill Road to the Veterans Monuments. Ceremonies will be conducted at 12 noon. Plainview American Legion Post 1812 and the Irish American Club

will place wreaths and conduct services at the Washington Park Monument Site on Friday, May 26, at 7 p.m. Plainview's parade participants will assemble between 9 and 9:30 a.m. at the Old A&P Shopping Center on Old Country Road (the present site of the new Medical Arts Buiding). The parade will proceed east along Old Country Road, north on Manetto Hili Road, east on Washington Avenue and will end at the Plainview/Old Bethpage Park. The parade will stop briefly at Central Island Nursing Home, so that the bands can play for the veterans and residents there.

In Bethpage, assemblage of marchers takes place at 9:30 along Central Avenue, the lower part of Broadway and the parking fields south of the railroad tracks. The parade begins at 10 a.m. sharp and proceeds north on Broadway to Benkert Street, west on Benkert to Stewart Avenue, north on Stewart to the Community Park. Memorial services will be held at the monument at 11 a.m. The parade is under the direction of the Bethpage Memorial Committee which consists of the American Legion, the VFW and its Auxiliary and the Bethpage Fire

Department and its Auxiliary.

In case of inclement weather, residents will be notified by a blast of the fire horn at 9:25 if the parade is cancelled. If it should rain, services will be held at the park stage at the appointed time.

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
