Registration Open For Tennis Inst.

Pedestrian Robbed Crossing Street

The second squad reports the details of a pedestrian robbery in Hicksville at 9:10 p.m. June 28.

The victim, Joseph Falcone, 30, from East Meadow, was at the intersection of Old County Rd. and Underhill Avenue, when he was suddenly accosted by a black male, armed with a handgun, accompanied by a male Hispanic, who demanded his money. After getting \$190, both men ran from the scene.

No injury was reported and both suspects were about 22 years of age. The second squad is investigating.

Hicksville Motel Hit By Two Fires

The Hicksville Motor Lodge at 429 Duffy Avenue near Old Country Road was hit by two fires this past week. All guests were evacuated safely. No injuries were reported.

The Hicksville Fire Dept. received the alarm on June 28 at 1:14 a.m. and upon arrival found one room on the number two floor involved in fire and heavy smoke. Four units under Chief Farrell responded with 35 members. The fire was under control in 15 minutes. An estimated \$10,000 damage was sustained. The cause was determined to be a short circuit near a bed.

The Motel continued to be a hot bed of activity when, on June 29 at 3:42 a.m. Hicksville firefighters were called for yet another blaze on the number two floor; this one two doors down from the

first fire. Again, all occupants evacuated safely. 30 firefighters under Asst. Chief A. Wigdzinski responded with 4 units. This fire, which also caused heavy smoke, was termed suspicious by County Fire Marshals. An estimated \$3,000 in damage was sustained by this blaze. The room was unoccupied at the time the fire started.

Natural Gas Leak Evacuates 100

A construction crew working in front of 95 Cantiague Rock Road, Hicksville, dug up a Lilco gas main on June 28. Hicksville Fire and Haz-Mat Units responded under Asst. Chief A. Wigdzinski. Nearby buildings were evacuated as a precaution. No fire or explosion resulted. The alarm was reported at 5:27 p.m. The area was closed down for about 45 minutes.

Editor's Notebook

This week we marked the Fourth of July, America's birthday. It was a time for expressing pride in the nations accomplishments, which are many and great. However, there is one area where our country still has far to go, and that is child welfare.

Please consider the following statistics; They do not speak well of us as the richest nation on earth:

The United States has the highest child poverty rate of any industrialized nation. One out of every five American children is poor.

The infant mortality rate (Deaths per 1,000 live births) in the United States (11) places it 19th in the ranks of the nations in the world; behind Finland, Japan, Canada, Hong Kong, Singapore and only slightly ahead of Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and Costa Rica.

Of the Class of 2000 who are entering first grade this year,

- One out of every four does not live with both parents.

- More than one out of five is poor.

- More than one out of every two (60%) has a mother in the work force, yet few have access to adequate child care.

- More than one in five have no medical insurance coverage.

- At least one in three has never seen a dentist.

The U.S. teen pregnancy rate is twice as high as rates in Great Britain, France or Canada and three times that of Sweden, and seven times that of the Netherlands.

16.8 million children live in one-parent households, nine out of ten headed by a woman.

The U.S. Department of Education estimates that 220,000 children are living in homeless families.

1,375 teenagers drop out of high school

1,849 children are abused

3,288 children run away from home

375,000 Infants are exposed to health threatening drugs

1 in 10 mothers take illegal drugs during pregnancy

Two Men Rob Sizzler Rest.

The second squad reports the details of the armed robbery of the Sizzler Restaurant in Hicksville, at 10:45 p.m. June 28.

Two black males, one armed with a shotgun and the second with a pistol, entered the restaurant, at 290 Old Country Road, through an unlocked kitchen door. Once inside they herded all the seven employees of the closed restaurant on the floor, then took the manager, Michael Martell into the office where he was forced to hand over the receipts. The suspects also robbed some of the employees of their tips before leaving in an unknown direction. A combined total of \$4,600 was taken.

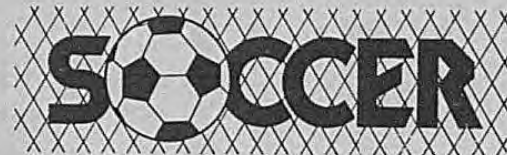

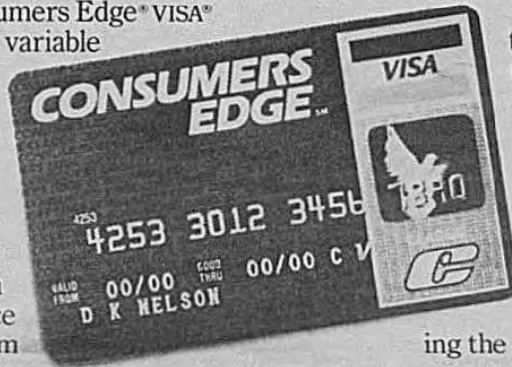
