## Broadway Mall Ordinance Changes

A public hearing was set by the Town of Oyster Bay Board for August 15, at 10 a.m., in Town Hall to amend the Code of Ordinances for Motor Vehicles and Traffic at the Broadway Mall, formerly Mid-Island Plaza. It is necessary to list the shopping center under its new name so that the ordinances reflect the new owners, Delco Development Mid Island Company.

A letter to Genevieve M. Fischetti, Assistant Town Attorney, from Dolores Fredrich, an attorney representing the developers, states that additional applications have been filed with the town which would involve the relocation of the movie theater. The letter notes that since this and other changes being considered would affect traffic signage and restrictions, Raymond Keyes and Associates, the developers site engineers were asked to prepare a map depicting existing traffic conditions.

In other business of the July 11 meeting, the Board approved the modification of restrictive covenants over 30 years old for Walter M. Stillger, Monique M. Stillger and James Thomas Martino. The three had petitioned the Board in December for the change in order to use a house on Park Avenue in Hicksville as an architects office.

Other covenants have been declared including the use of the property for professional offices only, a staff limited to nine persons and that the property be maintained with a residential appearance.

The Board also granted a special use permit to the Mobil Oil Corporation to utilize its property on Broadway, near Nevada Street as a public garage, convenience store and gasoline filling station.

This, too, was accompanied by several covenants, including that the property not be used as an auto body repair shop, that all store products be pre-packaged, no alcoholic beverages be dispensed and that no vending machines be permitted.

Public Storage, Inc. and Richard Parmett were granted a special use permit to operate their storage business on Hempstead Turnpike, east of Hicksville Road in Bethpage, after a recommendation from Richard Blankfein, Commissioner of the Department of Planning and Development stating that the site plans submitted were in order and that development of the property would be compatible with the surrounding area.

A special use permit was granted to the Nassau Center for the Developmentally Disabled and Mid Island Industries to expand the existing Nassau Center facility to occupy the entire premises New South Road in Hicksville.

Finally, the Board granted permission to Aquacade Swimming Pool, Inc. to use Abe Levitt Parklet in order to gain access to 61 Belfry Lane in Hicksville.

## Dr. Lowell Glatt Receives Award

Lowell D. Glatt, O.D., of Hicksville has received the American Optometric Association's 1989 Optometric Recognition Award.

The award is given to doctors of optometry who have completed 150 credit hours of continuing education in their field over a three-year period. Fewer than 1,600 of the nation's 25,400 practicing optometrists have earned the Optometric Recognition Award.

## Vandals Damage New Fire Dist. Sub Station

Fire District Commissioners reported recent acts by vandals at the new uncompleted fire sub station on Levittown Parkway have resulted in additional costs to taxpayers. Last month someone broke in and stole tools and parts from an emergency generator valued at \$3500. This past week windows were broken and the outside of the building was vandalized.

These actions have forced the commissioners to post security guards during all non-working hours. A reward has been offered to anyone for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone stealing or vandalizing district property.

## Driver Escapes Car Wreck And Fire



On July 8, at 7:56 p.m. a car driven by Mike DiRocco 20, of Hicksville, westbound on East Marie Street failed to negotiate a curve, struck a utility pole overturned and caught fire. The car came to rest on the Firehouse ramp. Firefighters quickly extinguished the fire. DiRocco suffered a leg injury and was transported to Nassau County Medical Center via F.D. Ambulance. There were no other injuries.

## 12 Restrictions On Office Property

Twelve restrictive covenants have been placed by the Oyster Bay Town Board on approval to modify prior restrictive covenants, according to Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

"The applicants, Walter M. Stillger, Monique M. Stillger and James Thomas Martino, were seeking permission to modify the declaration of covenants and restrictions for a building in Hicksville, to allow for use as an office," Hogan stated. "In granting the modification pursuant to a public hearing on December 6, 1988, the Town Board placed 12 restrictive covenants on the property, which is located on the northwest corner of Park Avenue and Heitz Place, also known as by #150 Park Avenue in Hicksville.

The Town Board stipulated that the property shall be used for professional offices only with a staff limited to no more than nine

persons at any given time. The Board further required that the premises shall be used as the office for one professional and that the hours of operation will be limited to 8:30 a.m. through 10 p.m., weekdays and 8:30 a.m. through 6 p.m. on Saturdays, and 10 a.m. through 2 p.m. on Sundays.

With regard to the building, the Board stated that the owner cannot make any structural or expansion changes without permission of the Board and that the building shall be maintained to keep its residential appearance.

Hogan noted that no building permit or certificate of occupancy will be issued until a site plan has been submitted to, and approved by, the Town Board. The plan must show location of access and egress; location of all lighting and signs; landscaping and any other details deemed pertinent by the Department of Planning and Development.

# Editor's Notebook

## ANTI-DRUG TEAM HITS THE STREETS

It is good to learn that a newly formed Nassau Police Department Narcotics Enforcement Team (NET) is now in action today against street level drug dealers, as announced by County Executive Thomas S. Gulotta and Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi at a Mineola press conference. NET is designed as a flexible, highly mobile strike force.

It will operate on a saturation basis, moving quickly into neighborhoods and employing 'buy and bust' tactics in an undercover operation. The officers for NET are said to be hand picked from the best street smart patrol cops.

It is hoped NET will not only enable the County to put these street level drug dealers behind bars where they belong, but will also free up other Narcotics Bureau personnel to deal with the middle and high level drug dealers.

The County notes it is often the street level drug dealers who prey upon our children. It is they who seek to peddle drugs to children on the streets of our country for profit motive, without concern for our children's health or safety. This cannot and will not be permitted in Nassau County, officials say.

Deputy Chief John D. Cleary is in charge of the new project. A long time veteran of Nassau Police work, Cleary has spent many years in the Detective Division.

He has a lieutenant and three sergeants in the NET unit. The nucleus of the team is subject to expansion and the exact number in the special force remains a tactical secret.

The public is invited to assist police by calling a Narcotics Hotline number - 535-7750 - which operates 24 hours every day. Callers remain anonymous and are not required to participate in arrests or trials. The information on drug sales and operations are screened and evaluated by Narcotics Bureau officers and much of the information gained will be fed to the NET operation for action.

When an area is targeted, NET will move in to immediately start enforcement. Commissioner Rozzi says, "It will be a saturation operation and will continue until the dealers are in jail or run off."

Let us hope so - it sounds almost too good to be true.

## Asbestos Removal Man Killed Company Named In Gun Firing

CCKN Systems of Brooklyn was awarded the asbestos removal contract for the Charles Campagne School by the Bethpage School Board during the July 11 meeting. The bid was for \$378,755. Work is expected to begin this summer.

Other actions taken during the meeting were in the area of personnel. The resignation of Assistant Principal of the Bethpage High School, Robert Puentes, for retirement purposes was accepted. Mr. Puentes was with the district for 37 years.

Three probationary appointments were also approved. Matthew MacDonagh and Timothy Voels were appointed as teachers for students with handicap conditions, and Brad Gaito was appointed districtwide supervisor of science.

Linda Galati was appointed part time English teacher.

The next meeting of the Bethpage Board of Education will be Tuesday, July 25, at 8 p.m., in the Board Room.

## 'Music Under Stars' At Bethpage Park

Mrs. Ocker noted that both the "Music Under the Stars" series and the children's program are being sponsored by the Cultural and Performing Arts (CAPA) Division of the Town's Department of Community and Youth Services.

Detective Lt. John Nolan, Homicide Squad, reports the details of a fatal shooting that occurred on July 16, at a gas station in Hicksville.

Early in the evening a Levittown man brought his car to a Mobile Service Station, located at Old Country Road and Duffy Avenue, Hicksville. The man had a friend that worked at the station part time, and he planned on doing some work on his car while he visited him. The man, his friend, and several other people were gathered together inside the station. While there, the man produced an illegally owned semi-automatic pistol, which he believed to be unloaded. At one point the pistol was pointed at the part time worker and he was shot in the right side of his body. This was at approximately 7:15 p.m.

The man fled the service station in his auto while the other people called for the police. At 7:17 p.m. the police received the call for the shooting. The man who was shot was transported to the Nassau County Medical Centre, East Meadow, by police ambulance. After a police notification was broadcast, police officers Gary Carpenter and Brian Dieterich of the 8th precinct apprehended the suspect in front of his home. Police say the gun used in the shooting was recovered and the man was brought to the 2nd precinct.

The shooting victim was pronounced dead at 8:17 p.m. by Dr. Siskend, of the NCMC Hospital staff. The victim has been identified as Michael Denenberg, 19, of 101 Albatross Road, Levittown.

## Nostalgic School Photo Exhibit

Hicksville High School alumni are enjoying a large exhibit of school photographs now on display at the Hicksville Public Library. Covering the decades from the 'twenties through the 'seventies, yesteryear's school days come alive splendidly in "School Nostalgia, 1925-1975."

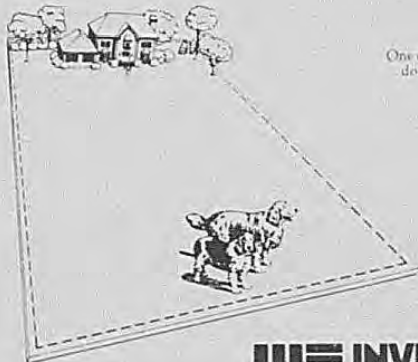

**WHEREAS**, all conditions precedent to the financing of the capital project hereinafter described, including compliance with the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, have been performed; and

**WHEREAS**, it is now desired to authorize the financing of such capital project; **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT**

**RESOLVED**, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

### LEGAL NOTICE

**Section 4.** Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

**Section 5.** The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

**Section 6.** The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

**Section 7.** Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in *Massapequa Observer*, *Bethpage Newsgram*, *Hicksville Illustrated News* and *Locust Valley Leader*, the official newspapers, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

**Section 8.** This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum.
