Each year, American Legion Posts throughout New York State sponsor selected students from their local high schools to represent them in the Boys State program. Sponsored entirely by The American Legion, this program is part of the overall Legion "Americanism" effort, and is aimed at teaching our youth the basics of the unique American political system.
These young adults are selected on the basis of their academic achievement, their social participation and awareness, and their community-related activity. Ath-

letic achievement may also play a part in the selection process. In other words, students selected for the Boys State program must be well-rounded and active both intellectually and socially.
Each local Legion Post pays for transportation and room and board for its Boys State representative at an upstate college campus, where the boys spend a week campaigning and electing a full slate of State officials, from Governor to Lieutenant Governor to members of the State Legislature, etc.. They will then activate bills on various subjects which, in some cases, actually wind up as part of our State law.

Dangerous Building Ordinance Hearing

An addition to the Town's Code of Ordinances reidentifying the current section of "Dangerous Buildings" and the establishment of economic penalties as an incentive for curing dangerous conditions in buildings will be the subject of a September 12, public hearing of the Oyster Bay Town Board, according to Oyster Bay Town Councilwoman Ann R. Ocker.

"The proposed addition, which

would be included in the "Dangerous Buildings" section of the ordinance, would establish a series of fines for any person who creates or allows a building to remain dangerous. Fines would begin at \$350 and escalate to \$1,000," Ocker stated.

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Self-Defense Course For Women

Editor's Notebook

How New Yorkers feel about the State's measures to improve highway safety was revealed in a new telephone survey of licensed drivers. The survey tested levels of support for the seat belt law, 21-year old alcohol purchase age, tougher laws to combat drunk driving and the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit. The survey also measured support for additional measures to prevent repeat drunk driving offenses.

The survey, of 1,000 randomly selected licensed drivers in New York State, was conducted for the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee by the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research in Albany.

The following are the key findings of the survey:

- Almost all (98 percent) of the drivers surveyed felt that drinking and driving was the most serious traffic safety problem. The second-most frequently mentioned traffic safety problem was speeding, regarded as a serious problem by 76 percent of the respondents.

- A majority (56 percent) believed the 21-year old alcohol purchase age is effective in reducing alcohol-related deaths and injuries. Fifty-four percent said they believe tougher penalties will be the most effective deterrent to drinking and driving.

- A majority (60 percent) believed that the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit in New York State should not be increased.

- A majority (88 percent) support equipping school buses with seat belts, up from 80 percent in 1986 (when legislation was passed requiring seat belts in all new school buses).

The survey also gathered information on attitudes concerning new highway safety proposals.

More than three-quarters (77 percent) of the respondents support a requirement that all persons convicted of drinking and driving undergo testing for a drinking problem.

The survey also found that, although only 11 percent of bicyclists wear helmets, 73 percent favor a law requiring the use of bicycle helmets by children, and 60 percent favor mandating helmet use for adults.




