## Humann Re-Runs For Water Board

It is with considerable pleasure that a Committee to Support the re-election of Mr. Humann to the Board of Commissioners, Hicksville Water District, can announce his candidacy for the office. He has been a member of a strong three man board of community minded citizens who have been at the helm of our water supply system during a period of tense times in this area and beyond. The Board has been constantly under pressure to maintain the quality and quantity of our water supply, which they have done in a convincing manner.

Once again there has been a continued update of water treatment projects at various well sites in the Hicksville Water District during 1989-90 with a strong accent on advanced technology to ensure the community a leading role in this crucial area. As before, the Board has continued

its commitment to controlling such costs without the need to finance, but rather to pay as we go. The community's strong desires for "home-rule" has made this type of fiscal control a responsibility of locally elected officials.

Mr. Humann had as a collateral duty this past year the role of a legislative watchdog. The Board has long been active in monitoring such state legislation as relates to matters concerning our most stringent drinking water standards. Commissioner Humann did an outstanding job in this capacity and just several weeks ago appealed to local consumers to write in support of such consumer-oriented legislation which prohibits scare tactic advertising and calls for bottled water testing bill S-7614B, bottled water testing (Sen. Tully) and Bill A-3765C (Assemblyman DiNapoli) which calls for an end to scare tactic advertising, on the part of the home water filter industry.

We feel the re-election of Richard A. Humann as Water Commissioner would be of positive advantage to the community. He is "home-town," positively interested in local affairs, a member of the fire department, active in church matters, a man concerned with civic affairs of his town. It is our desire to see him returned to office by asking for the voters of Hicksville to turn out Thursday evening, August 30, between the hours of 7 and 10 p.m. at the main firehouse on 20 East Marie Street in Hicksville.

Kim Bowman of Maryhaven Center of Hope was the first woman finisher in 20:20, setting a new women's course record in the process, but Debbie Tirrito (21:00) and Eleanor Carroll (21:46) of IBM Corporation took third and fifth places respectively to lead IBM to victory in the women's division. 4th place woman Paula Contegiacomo and Lance Hugelmeyer led Grumman to the Co-ed team title as well.

Petersen was followed across

the finish line by Terry McVeigh (18:01) of Lancer Insurance Company, Ken Bohem (18:13) of The Athletics Shop, Ed Von Bevern (18:19) of Grumman, and John McGorry (18:19) of South Oaks Hospital. Last year's women's division winner, Kathy Damon of Alexander & Alexander, was second this year in 20:55.

But the real story of the evening was the incredible turnout, with nearly 2300 runners from 142 corporations and government agencies on hand for what has now become Long Island's second largest running event. 1722 runners from 125 organizations competed in the 1989 edition of the event, and 847 runners from 78 organizations competed in 1988.

### Immersion For Students

Lisa Schindler from the Jericho School District will be more fluent in Spanish when she returns to her classroom this fall - she spent the month of July participating in the Nassau BOCES Foreign Language Immersion Program.

Designed to mimic the experience of visiting a foreign country, the program encourages the spontaneous, conversational use of language. Instead of sitting in classrooms, youngsters play sports, shop for and cook ethnic meals and go on field trips. The program's two sites - the Adelphi University campus and Clark Garden in Albertson, are well suited to outdoor activities.

This year, teenagers from 21 Nassau County school districts took part in the program, including Lisa from Jericho.

For teenagers interested in beginning a language that's not usually part of the high school curriculum, intensive introductory courses in Russian and Japanese were offered at the same time as the immersion program. Nomita M. Rao from Jericho attended the Japanese course.

The Foreign Language Immersion Program is only one of several specialized summer programs made available through Nassau BOCES. The others include Marine Biology/Oceanography, Summer Arts Academy, Young Writers Enrichment and Extended-year Special Education Programs.

## Editor's Notebook

It has been proposed that plans that would create a "Downtown Nassau," be placed before the voters of Nassau County in a referendum for their approval or disapproval. This sounds like a good idea.

These plans include: development of the Roosevelt Raceway property including construction of 12 office buildings, two hotels, theatres and other commercial building along with a small affordable housing development. The plans also include construction of a \$25 million upscale shopping mall, adjacent to the Roosevelt Raceway property, and a major expansion of Roosevelt Field Shopping Center.

This "Downtown Nassau" would affect the quality of life in the county for generations to come. Because of the scope of development being considered, it could be time to depart from the normal method in which these matters are handled. The matter of the development of Downtown Nassau should in fairness be put to the voters in referendum, a countywide referendum. While there is nothing in law that requires such a referendum, there is also nothing in law that prohibits it.

It is interesting to note that when Joseph Galante of Mineola spoke during a recent hearing on development plans and asked for a countywide referendum, he received a standing ovation from those attending the meeting.

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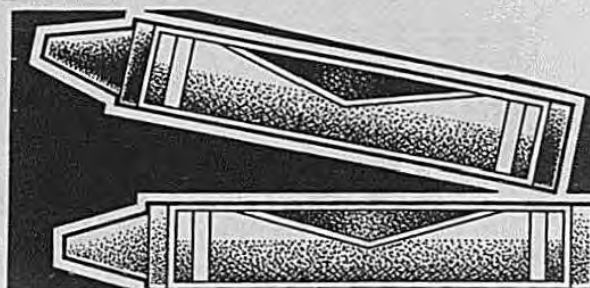
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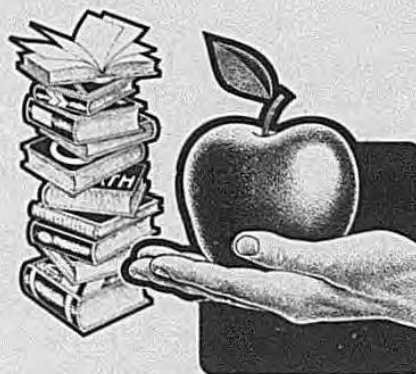
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# New Procedure For Gall Bladder

A revolutionary new technique for removing a gallbladder through a patient's navel will soon be practiced by several surgeons at Syosset Community Hospital. Called laser laparoscopic cholecystectomy, this technique will mean a considerably reduced hospital stay for the patient as well as a faster return to normal activities. Conventional gallbladder removal involves cutting through the abdominal wall and requires a five or six-day hospital stay and weeks of recuperation. The laser procedure significantly reduces pain and blood loss and leaves the patient with a minimal amount of scarring. The shorter hospital stay and faster recovery it produces save both time and money for the patient.

According to Seymour Grauer, M.D., Director of the Department of Surgery at Syosset Community Hospital, the procedure is a breakthrough for patients suffering gallbladder problems. It is estimated that over one-half million individuals undergo total gallbladder removal each year. More common in women than men, gallbladder problems affect twenty million people in the United States alone.

The exciting new technique combines the advantages of laparoscope (a one-half inch diameter tube with a videocamera permitting doctors to see inside the abdomen) with the sophisticated KTP:YAG laser recently purchased by Syosset Community Hospital. The laser uses a new type of crystal that produces a unique emerald-green color. The light's color or wavelength is perfect for a variety of surgical applications. Traveling through a flexible fiberoptic thread, the laser light can simultaneously seal blood vessels as it cuts through tissue.

Viewing the gallbladder on a video screen, the surgeon performs the operation with instruments inserted through small punctures. The gallbladder is ultimately removed through the

puncture made for the tiny laparoscope. The entire procedure takes about one and one-half hours.

Dr. Grauer describes the laser technique as "an elegant way of performing surgery." He credits the minimal amount of bleeding and cutting involved in this high-tech approach for the relatively little discomfort patients experience.

Before they could perform gallbladder removal with the KTP:YAG laser, Dr. Grauer and Ronald Forlenza, M.D., Associate Director of Surgery, participated in intensive inservice training programs which included one directed by Dr. Eddie Reddick, the Nashville, Tenn., surgeon who created the procedure about two years ago. Dr. Reddick himself certified both surgeons for use of the laser. Other Syosset Community Hospital surgeons are presently involved in similar training programs. The hospital expects that many of its surgeons will be using this technique for gallbladder removal in the near future.

Dr. Grauer plans to perform the first KTP:YAG laser procedure at Syosset Community Hospital in early September. He feels that eventually up to seventy percent of all gallbladder surgery at the hospital will be done by this technique. Several other kinds of surgery will also involve the KTP:YAG laser. These include breast surgery as well as many procedures that are performed by gynecologists, urologists and orthopedists.

As a grand finale to the second year of a unique, free, month-long tennis program for more than 45 Town of Oyster Bay youths - the Spiegel Associates/Gene Mayer Junior Tennis Academy - world class tennis greats participated in an inspiring tennis exhibition. In addition, a fast serve contest and an awards ceremony took place with new Wilson tennis racquets awarded to deserving young players, it was announced by Arthur D. Sanders, president of Spiegel Associates.

Supervising the "fastest serve contest" and performing in the special tennis exhibition was Colin Dibley, a former U.S. Open and Wimbledon champion in the 35 and over division. Dibley also was clocked as having the fastest serve in the world at 147 m.p.h. In addition, former New York Jets wide receiver and Dix Hills resident Wesley Walker gave a

"pep talk" to the students about studying hard in school and saying "no" to drugs and alcohol.

"This year's program created a tremendous interest within the community," noted Sanders. "We received more than 150 applications and Spiegel Associates is now considering expanding next year's program so we can accommodate an even greater number of aspiring players."

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## Season yields fresh fruit salads

One of the best things about summer is the piles of fruit on roadside stands, in supermarkets and in farmers' markets. I could wade in the berries, melons and pineapples. I never seem to get enough.

Usually I eat the fruit out of hand, often before I get the produce home. But if I have an abundance or can wait, I make one of my favorite fruit salads. I make a lot of salad and pull it out of the refrigerator, pile on a fruity dressing and call it a meal.

It doesn't really matter what goes into a fruit salad so long as it is summer's best and the dressing is bland and low-calorie.

I have put oranges and sweet onions together more than once to great advantage. Oranges, in fact, balance off almost any other fruit and make the salad safe for bananas because they coat them with juice and keep them from turning black. Oranges and apples go well together, and pineapple is good with other fruit that's not quite so sweet.

I know the usual dieter's plate of fruit and cottage cheese really isn't low-calorie at all, but mine is and the combination works. An-

other favorite is oranges and carrots. The two are instant friends, the same color, and make a dazzling combination.

### SUMMER FRUIT SALAD

- ½ cup fresh strawberries, halved
- 1 cup melon balls (cantaloupe, honeydew or cava)
- ½ cup pineapple chunks, fresh, or if canned, unsweetened
- 1 teaspoon rum
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 4 to 6 lettuce leaves

Yields 4 to 6 servings. Each serving has about 80 calories, no cholesterol, no fat and a trace of sodium.

Combine all ingredients in bowl. Mix well and chill for several hours. Serve in glass goblets or on lettuce leaves.

### COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD WITH FRUIT

- ½ cup orange juice
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 1½ teaspoons balsamic vinegar or lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- ¼ teaspoon curry powder
- 1 cup unsweetened pineapple cut in chunks, fresh or canned

- 1 navel orange, peeled and cut in 1-inch cubes
- 3 kiwis, peeled and cut in cubes
- ½ cup fresh blueberries
- 6 strawberries, hulled and halved
- 1 cup low-fat, dry-curd cottage cheese

Yields 2 to 4 servings. Each serving has about 260 calories, 5 milligrams cholesterol, 1 gram fat and 18 milligrams sodium.

Combine orange juice, honey, vinegar, cornstarch and curry powder in saucepan. Over medium heat, cook, stirring constantly until thickened, about 2 or 3 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and chill.

Mix pineapple, orange, kiwis and blueberries in bowl, cover and refrigerate. To serve, add strawberries to bowl of fruit. Add chilled dressing and gently toss. Spoon cottage cheese on individual serving dishes and top with fruit and dressing mixture. Serve chilled.

### ORANGE AND CARROT SALAD

- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 2 oranges, peeled and sec-

- tioned
- ¼ cup raisins
- ½ cup non-fat yogurt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 4 to 6 lettuce leaves (optional)

Yields 4 to 6 servings. Each serving has about 130 calories, no cholesterol, a trace of fat and 50 milligrams of sodium.

Combine carrots, orange sections and raisins in bowl and gently mix. In another bowl combine yogurt, vanilla and honey and mix well. Spoon dressing over orange/carrot mixture and toss. Chill before serving. Serve on lettuce leaves or in individual bowls.

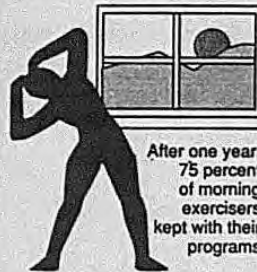

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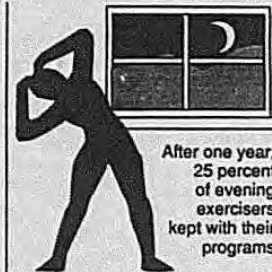

After one year, 75 percent of morning exercisers kept with their programs.



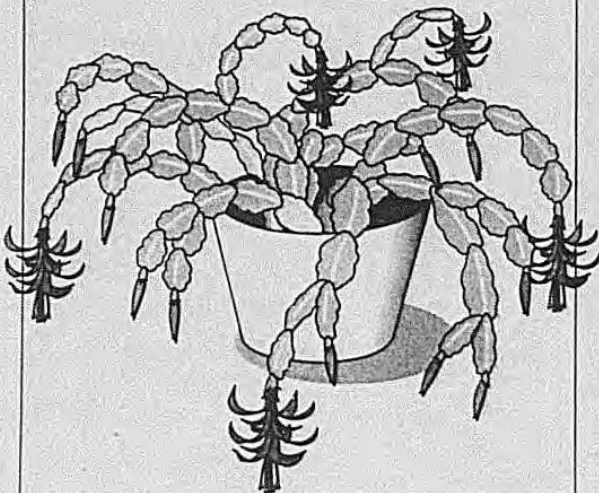
After one year, 25 percent of evening exercisers kept with their programs.

## GARDEN TIPS

### Container planting concerns

- **Watering problems:** General weakening and disreputable look in container plantings probably lies in watering disorders - uneven or inadequate moisture levels in the soil or soggy conditions.
- **Powdery mildew:** Not difficult to catch this disease early - pick off and destroy infested leaves; follow up with mild fungicide spray.
- **Aphid infestations:** Most easily controlled if spotted early and dealt with promptly - pinch off and destroy infested plant parts, squish aphids and wash away remains; follow up with aphid spray.
- **Spider mites:** Tiny creatures suck plant juices, producing mottled, grimy appearance. Infested plants need to be washed thoroughly and frequently and sprayed with a miticide.

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### THE UNITED STATES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY INVITES PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE PROPOSED REMEDY FOR THE SYOSSET LANDFILL SITE SYOSSET, NEW YORK

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), will hold a Public Meeting for the Syosset Landfill site to discuss the Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS) and the Proposed Plan for protecting human health and the environment from contaminants at the site. Based on the work done at the site to date, EPA is announcing a preferred remedy for the first phase of cleanup. The meeting will be held on August 8, 1990, at 7:00 p.m. in the Oyster Bay Town Hall, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay, New York.

The options evaluated for addressing contaminants at the site are the following:

- Alternative 1 No Further Action.
- Alternative 2A New York State Part 360 Regulated Low-Permeability Soil Cap.
- Alternative 2B New York State Part 360 Regulated Geosynthetic Membrane Cap.
- Alternative 2C Landfill Closure for Municipal Landfills with a Low-permeability Asphalt Cap.

EPA's preferred remedial alternative is Alternative 2B. Although this currently is the preferred alternative, EPA will consider written comments on this proposed alternative, as well as the other alternatives that were considered. Comments must be received on or before August 27, 1990. The final decision will include a summary of public comments and EPA responses.

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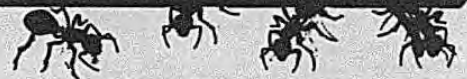


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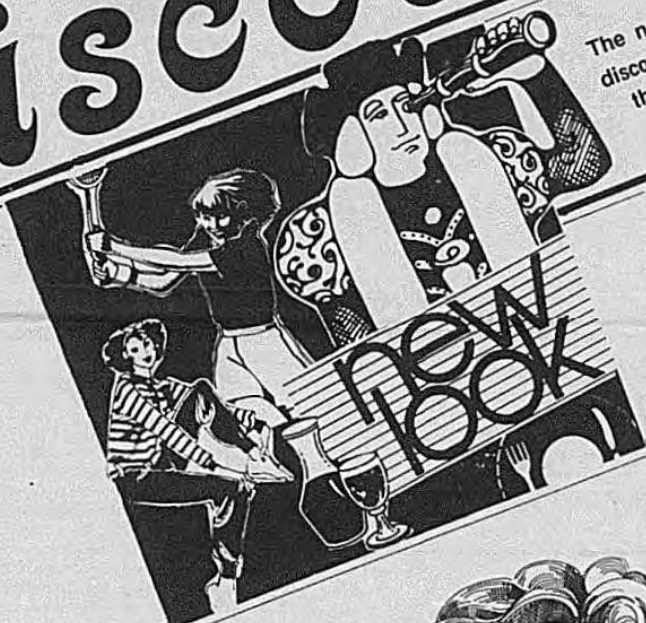

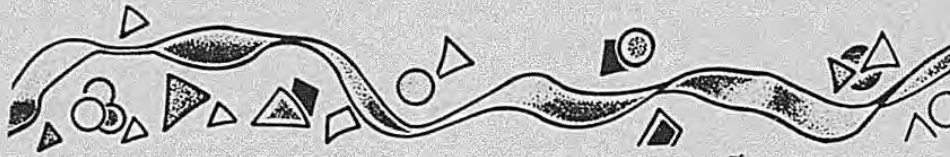
### PAST ISSUES

## “Mutter”

You didn't know your grandmother, did you?" "She was a great lady." No, I didn't really know her. I was only two years old when she died. But I heard so many stories about her I felt that I really knew her. The man who asked the question was a very physical man, but the way he said, she was a great lady, made him seem like a soft teddy bear.

Every one called her Mutter. She was born in Germany and she had a little German accent. However, no one dared to insinuate that she was anything but a red, white and blue American.

Her hero was Teddy Roosevelt, who was fighting the war in Cuba. Mutter went "down" San Juan Hill with him and had his picture hanging in her window.

The only argument her daughter, my mother, dared to have with Mutter was when Teddy Roosevelt's name came up. Her daughter would shout, "He is a war monger." To which Mutter would reply, shaking her finger at her daughter, "He is brave, he is my Teddy."

I suppose there were woman activists before Mutter. Aside from Teddy Roosevelt, Mutter was dedicated to getting every woman "Out of the kitchen." Her daughters all had to be able to support themselves before they married.

Like it or not, they were "Out of the kitchen." Two of her daughters were milliners, my mother was a bookkeeper for a firm of pork stores. To this day there are a few of these stores in existence. Her oldest daughter, who was married, ran her husband's office, while another "child" secured from an orphanage ran her household.

Mutter, herself, operated a bakery - European style. You entered the shop, selected your pastry, sat down at a little table where you were served a cup of Mutter's delicious coffee.

Mutter operated this shop for many years. It was where the man who inquired if I knew her, first met her.

He eulogized, "Mutter ran a great bake shop. In those days you didn't have Santa Claus in the stores at Halloween, and bathing suits at Christmas."

"Do you know what hot cross buns are?" he asked me. "They are a small square bun with a honey coating and a white icing cross on top."

"Mutter only sold these hot cross buns on Good Friday. On Good Friday there was a line of people waiting outside the store waiting to buy them.

When Mutter was sixty-five she hung up her apron and retired. She hung up her apron but not her "gloves." The neighborhood she was planning to retire to was embroiled in a zoning dispute. The area was one of small wooden homes, with little front lawns, and back yards for washlines and small vegetable gardens.

Into this oasis a builder came. He wanted to put up a four story apartment house. Apartments with one or two bedrooms, steam heat, electricity, hot water and an elevator.

This was ideal as far as Mutter was concerned, so she entered the war on the side of the builder. Talking to and telling all the women how nice it would be just to turn on the faucet and have a nice warm tub to relax in. Not to have to make a fire in the stove and carry wood and coal. Well the builder won and Mutter retired to world of near luxury.

Mutter's cozy apartment was around the corner from one of her daughters who had four sons. The mother was out of the kitchen and running her husband's business. When the boys needed a button sewed on, a pants leg shortened, Mutter was always ready to help.

However, she had one hard and fast rule. She didn't open her sewing machine 'til she finished reading her morning paper. Nothing changed this. Many times a young man sat in his underwear waiting for Mutter to finish her reading and then she was ready to wait upon him.

To balance things, one day each week, Mutter went to a local hospital and sewed layettes, baby blankets and bed sheets, after which she had tea and shared her homemade cake with the other ladies.

Mutter, who never had a sick day in her life, woke one morning aware that something was wrong. She was stricken with a kidney ailment. In those days there weren't any drugs or dialysis to treat this. For three weeks Mutter lie in her bed slowly dying.

Mutter had a very dear friend who sat at her bedside, held her hand and at times read the bible to her.

Every once in a while Mutter would ask, "Do you think I did things in His way?" Then her friend would squeeze her hand and say, "God loves you. He will be waiting for you." Mutter replied, "I hope so." Then she closed her eyes for the last time.

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Q. I am one diner who enjoys eating the skin as well as the mealy part of the potato. However, I'm not quite sure how this should be done - can it be cut with a knife first?

A. It's fine to use a knife provided only a small amount is cut at once. It would not be proper to cut up the whole potato skin at the same time, any more, say, than if it were a portion of meat.

Q. If bouillon is served in a cup, do you drink it? Should you take part of it with the spoon? What if the cup has two handles. Do you use both hands? B.K.

A. Spoon up part of the bouillon before taking it up to drink. If the cup has one handle, hold it in one hand. If it has two handles, hold it by both handles. If the bouillon has solids in it, take them up with the spoon before drinking the bouillon.

Q. When I am on a diet, I find it difficult to find things at restaurants. What do you suggest? C.B.

A. The suggestion is that you check ads and call restaurants. Many of them have special diet plates that will be just what you are looking for. Some restaurants will allow substitutions and you can make your own plate but you cannot be sure of this unless you check the restaurant policy in advance.

Q. Years ago I used to attend many formal dinners in various fine restaurants and hotels. In those days the meals were always concluded with demitasse, never full cups of coffee.

While I do not go out as much as I used to, I do notice that these days demitasse is seldom served at the end of formal dinners. Is this custom dying out?

A. Yes, to a certain extent, I would say. There is a certain bowing to popular demand - most people prefer a full cup of coffee. Also, we are living in a much less formal world, whether for good or bad, than in the past, and this spirit of informality affects dining.

**A.** This is one of those things for which there is no real rule. You just use common sense. I would say put it on the tablecloth, for if you put it in the ash tray it may start a fire, and if you put it in your saucer it may cause the cup to tip over when you put it back in the saucer.

**Q.** Have you any tips for parents who take their children to restaurants? These experiences can be hectic, but I feel they are a necessary part of the youngsters' training.

**A.** Why not pick a restaurant that features children's menus. Avoid places with gourmet food and elaborate service. Choose meals with a few courses as possible. Select foods you know children like-but they are excited and restless, so do not expect them to finish everything on their plates.

Q. We are not wine drinkers. If we're giving a party, what kind of wines should we stock in order to take care of our wine-drinking friends' pleasure - from cocktail hour through dinner? W.L.

A. For the cocktail hour you might have on hand dry or sweet sherry, or dry or sweet vermouth, or any of the popular "apertiffs". Many choose a glass of dry white wine at the cocktail hour (either chilled or "on the rocks").

for the first course, or to drink with any fish, salad, chicken, veal or fruit, a chilled white wine is nice (such as Chablis, Soave, Riesling, Chenin Blanc, Pinot Chardonnay).

For the meat or game course (or the salad with cheese), serve a Burgundy, Bordeaux, Chianti, Dabernet Sauvignon or Zinfandel at a cool room temperature (from 60 to 70 degrees).

Rose wines should be chilled, like white wines. A rose is best served with a light dish and is more popular in hot weather than in cold.

For dessert you may serve the same wine you had from the previous course. Or if it's something festive like an anniversary, dessert time is the moment to bring on the champagne (the drier the better!)

Some people enjoy a sweet wine with dessert such as port or a sweet sauterne or sherry, but one seldom sees this custom followed anymore in this country.

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**Q.** When eating out, I am often tempted to enjoy my pie or pudding served with whipped cream. Tell me, how many calories do I actually save when I skip this all too delicious extra?

**A.** Whipped cream has 28 calories per tablespoon, so I would guess that the number of calories in the topping adds up to 150 or 200.

**Q.** While dining out recently I was served iced tea without any service place under the glass. What should I have done with the spoon after I used it for stirring? I hated to place it directly on the clean tablecloth.

**A.** I think you should have asked the waiter to bring you a small plate on which to repose the spoon. It would certainly not be correct to leave the spoon in the glass while drinking the tea. As you say it would also not be advisable to place it on the tablecloth.

Imperfect service is a common complaint by those who dine out. Even the best restaurants have difficulties of this kind once in a while.

If you find a restaurant has excellent food but is lacking in fine service, a word to the manager (or to "input") might be helpful in correcting the problem.

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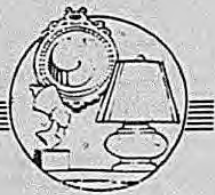
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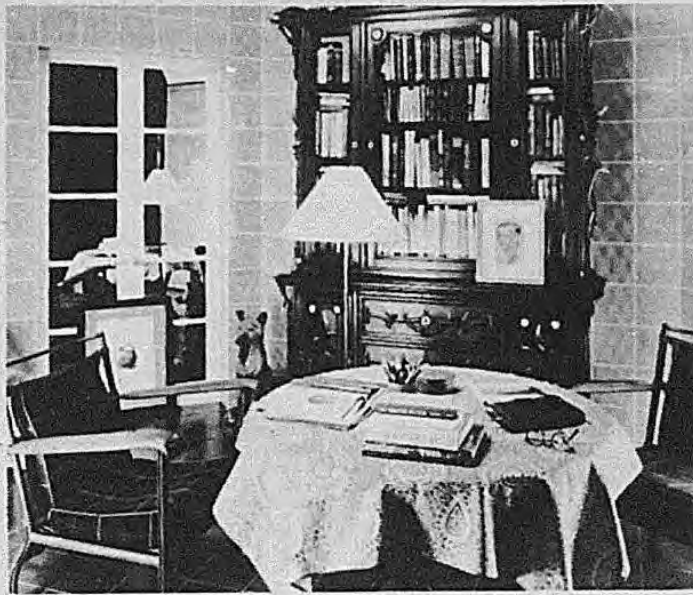

## A private room



**Q.** I want to turn a small bedroom into a dressing area/study combination for my husband. It's next to his bath and I'm thinking about using the same ceramic tiles that are on the walls in the bath.

I've seen all-tile rooms in Europe but never here. Is it an outlandish idea? — J.G., Chicago

**Q.** My 4-year-old daughter is allergic to almost everything, including pets, the dirt in houseplants and dust. I can't even put a rug on the floor of her room or curtains at her windows.

I've put up a darling and really colorful wallpaper and border, but the floor looks so cold. Should I paint it to brighten things up? — E.S., Beach Park, Ill.

**A.** What do you care if it is? Your husband has the final word: It's his private room.

Obviously, at least one top U.S. interior designer shares your enthusiasm for ceramic tiles on the wall.

The room we show here was done by Gary Hager of Parish-Hadley Associates, New York, one of the country's oldest and most prestigious design firms. So it's news when Hager chooses to tile all the way to the ceiling line. The floor also is ceramic tile — navy blue to contrast with the brown-and-cream tiles on the wall (all made in Italy by Cisa).

It's a tailored, masculine color scheme that works quite handsomely in this library ... and could do the same for your husband's new quarters.

**A.** You can paint the entire floor and/or dress it up with an allergy-free *faux* rug you can also paint.

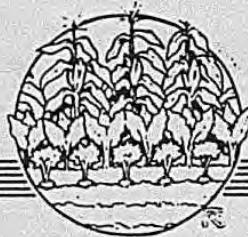
Here is inspiration passed along

## Backyard Gardener

### I enjoy my thrifty ecosystem, and so can you!

Of increasing appeal to me with each year that I garden is the efficient, thrifty ecosystem that operates within the confines of the property. I suppose it's the neatly interlocking, conserving nature of the system that so deeply satisfies my frugal nature.

In this working garden, nothing is wasted. All its by-products are recycled and used to nurture continually thriving growth. Just about everything that grows yields some materials that can be composted and used to supply the garden with organic matter — the key to good soil and plant health.

Current research by agricultural scientists has shown that applying chemical fertilizers even up to five times the normal rates has not made up for commercial crop production loss in soils deficient in organic matter, which one research scientist describes as "the glue that holds soil particles together. It also improves the soil's water-holding capacity. It is vital to the maintenance of a healthy soil."

The same truth is evident in the home garden. Fat-textured soils translate into fat growth. And a

soil that has been well-fed with regular additions of home-grown compost and other texture-building materials, such as seaweed, old animal manures, leaves and green manures, will become easier and more pleasurable to work with each year. This spring as I dug and planted the vegetable and annual flower plots, I marveled at how easy the soil was to work — like cutting into soft butter.

It's an ongoing and deeply satisfying process, this nurturing of the soil via composting. Every weeding, thinning and general garden cleaning session adds layers of humus-in-the-making to the heaps. And composting is such a handy way of using garden "wastes." Everytime I gather vegetables for a meal, I bring a sharp knife with me and trim the plants for the kitchen right into a compost heap, of which there are several in the garden.

I find having several compost heaps on the go to be successful, because it allows me to add to each pile what it needs next to keep the ingredients well-balanced between soft, nitrogen-rich materials and harder plant parts.

Ideally, soft, green, nitrogen-rich materials such as lettuce foliage and grass-mowings should be alternated with harder, nitrogen-balancing materials such as chopped stems and stalks, sawdust and straw, for a fast-working heap and a balanced finished product. The nitrogen in the soft matter energizes the bacteria that break down the harder materials.

I find that hard things such as corncobs and stalks decompose nicely if they are broken or chopped well before being put on the compost. Of course, if one is fortunate enough to own a mechanical shredder, this is easily done. The smaller the bits, the faster the decomposition. For the rest of us, it's my experience that breaking these harder materials by hand is not so difficult if it's done as soon as the material is available, before it dries and hardens — corncobs are harvested, for example.

In this oasis of conservation that is the garden, household materials are enlisted as well. Old nylon stockings cut into strips make soft ties for securing plants to their stakes. Plastic bottles are useful recycled as scoops, plant labels and spot irrigation stations for individual plants (punch holes

in the bottle bottoms).

Kitchen vegetable and fruit trimmings are not wasted, either. I keep a container for these beside the sink and empty it into a covered pail at the back door. I bury the contents right in the garden where additional moisture retention and humus are needed — next to the root area of grape plants growing at a hot south-facing fence, for example, and in between the pea rows.

Ashes from wood stoves and fireplaces are useful in the garden, too. But they act like lime to reduce acidity and must not be used around acid-loving plants such as rhododendrons and azaleas. Early in the spring I dig a thin layer of ashes into the plots for annual flowers and vegetables, except the potatoes, which grow more free of scab in slightly acid soils.

In the fall, I scatter ashes under the fruit trees, roses and cane fruits and around the perennial flowers, including peonies. The potash in the ashes acts as a cell strengthener and hardener, making this recycled material a good winterizing agent. Potash also contributes to strong, sturdy growth and abundant flower and fruit production.

## Microwave recipes that cut the mustard

Mustard — if all you know is the mildly flavored, bright yellow kind you put on hot dogs as a kid, you're not being adventurous enough.

Next time you're in the supermarket, take a look at the condiment section. You're bound to see at least several different varieties, and if you check out a specialty shop, you'll probably see many more than that.

Our word "mustard" comes from the French. Roman troops led by Caesar planted mustard seeds in the hills of Dijon, France, and the famed mustard from that region is prepared according to standards set hundreds of years ago.

Dijon mustard is now very popular in North American cuisine. In fact, nowadays, most of the mustard seeds used in Dijon are grown in the United States and Canada. Made of ground mustard seeds, white wine, vinegar and spices, the creamy gray-yellow preparation comes in several varieties and in varying strengths, and makes an excellent condiment or cooking mustard.

English and German varieties are hearty and grainy.

English mustard is sharp in flavor and blended with coarsely ground mustard seeds. It's a popular accompaniment to beef and cheese dishes, and is often served with bangers and pickles as a pub snack.

German mustard is also coarse, and ranges from pale yellow and mild to strong and brown. Served with sausages and pork dishes, it's also delicious slathered over warm pretzels.

Cooking mustard tones down its natural pungency, but uncooked mustard is very hot. To make your own mustard, place 3 tablespoons dry mustard in a small bowl. Gradually stir in enough white wine, vinegar or milk to make a thin paste. Season with salt to taste and let stand about 10 minutes to develop flavor. Flavor changes rapidly once liquid is added to the powder, so don't mix too far in advance or it may turn bitter.

Vary the flavor of mustard by mixing with beer, champagne, sherry or red wine.

Some mustards have added spices, freshly ground black or white peppercorns, or herbs (like tarragon or basil), and some include honey or a hint of garlic.

Make an excellent mustard-dill butter by combining ½ cup softened butter with 2 tablespoons snipped fresh dill weed, 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard and a dash, each salt and pepper. Cream together and chill to allow butter to harden before use.

(Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.)

### MICROWAVE MUSTARD SAUCE

- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon flour
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons prepared Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons water
- ¼ teaspoon mustard seeds
- Dash each salt and pepper

Yields about ½ cup.

Preparation time: 5 to 10 minutes.

Cooking time: 1¼ to 2¼ minutes (plus 1 minute standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Place butter or margarine in 2-cup microwave-safe glass measure. Microwave about 15 seconds, or until melted. Blend in flour, then slowly blend in vinegar. Add sugar, mustard, water, mustard seeds, salt and pepper. Microwave 1 to 2 minutes, or until mixture comes to a boil.

Stir and let stand about 1 minute before serving over sliced beef or pork.

### KIELBASA AND CABBAGE

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium carrot, sliced thin
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1 pound kielbasa (Polish sausage)
- 4 cups shredded cabbage
- ¼ cup sour cream
- 2 tablespoons prepared Dijon mustard
- ¼ teaspoon dill seed
- Freshly ground black pepper to taste

Yields 4 servings.

Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.

Cooking time: 14¼ to 20 minutes.

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Combine onion, carrot and butter in 2½-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover and microwave 4 to 5 minutes, or until onion is translucent and carrot is tender.

Remove casing from sausage and slice into ½-inch pieces. Add to casserole with shredded cab-

bage. Cover and microwave 9 to 12 minutes, or until cabbage is limp and tender, stirring gently every 5 minutes. Drain off excess liquid.

In small bowl combine all remaining ingredients. Stir gently into cabbage-kielbasa mixture. Cover and microwave 1¼ to 3 minutes longer, to heat through.

## Steaks on the grill — a fish story

Come on over for steaks on the grill — it's likely that you will have a choice of tuna, salmon, swordfish or halibut at our house these days!

As more people become aware of the enormous diversity, healthful qualities and great taste of seafood, fish markets have begun to answer the demand. Steaks are among the saltwater treasures that lend themselves particularly well to grilling.

Because they are sturdy, fish steaks can be cooked directly on the grill instead of requiring special equipment, such as the hinged baskets needed for more delicate fish filets.

Because of their meatier texture and wonderful flavor, these steaks also have wide appeal to people who consider themselves non-fish-eaters.

Finally, the most common varieties of fish steaks (tuna, salmon, swordfish and halibut) are nearly always interchangeable, so even small markets with limited choices offer recipe options.

There are a few important rules that apply across the board for fish steak grilling:

First, because fish is relatively low in fat, steaks must be coated with at least a light brushing of oil to prevent them from sticking to the grill.

Second, steaks should be cut at least ¾-inch thick so that they can be properly seared on the outside without unduly drying out the interior.

Third, the subtle flavor of fish steaks lends itself to an unlimited variety of simple sauces and marinades.

### TIPS

• We have said it before, but it bears repeating. Get to know a trustworthy fishmonger who will offer invaluable assistance and sell you quality seafood.

• In grilling, cook fish the equivalent of eight to 10 minutes per inch of thickness over medium-hot coals.

### GRILLED TUNA STEAKS PROVENCAL

- 1½ pounds tuna steaks, each about ¾-inch thick and cut into 4 pieces
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 2 anchovy fillets
- 10 ounces plum tomatoes, seeded and diced (about 1 cup)
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil or 1 teaspoon dried
- 1 teaspoon small capers, drained
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- Coarse ground pepper
- Fresh basil leaves, optional garnish

Yields 4 servings.

Build medium-hot barbecue fire or preheat broiler. Brush tuna with 1 tablespoon oil. Let stand while grill heats and sauce is prepared.

In medium skillet, heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil. Add garlic and anchovies, mashing anchovies against skillet with back of spoon. Cook over medium-low heat 1 minute. Add tomatoes, basil, capers and lemon juice. Simmer, stirring about 45 seconds until tomatoes are heated through. Taste and add pepper. Remove from heat and reserve while cooking fish.

Grill tuna for 6 to 8 minutes, turning once until lightly pink in center.

Serve tuna with sauce spooned over and basil leaf as garnish, if desired.

### LEMON-TARRAGON SALMON STEAKS

- 6 tablespoons olive oil
- 1½ tablespoons lemon juice
- ¼ teaspoon grated lemon zest
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh tarragon, or ¾ teaspoon dried
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 1½ pounds salmon steaks, each about 1 inch thick and cut into 4 pieces
- Thinly sliced lemon for garnish
- Tarragon or parsley sprigs for garnish

Yields 4 servings.

Build medium-hot barbecue fire or preheat broiler. In small bowl combine oil, lemon juice, lemon zest, tarragon, parsley, salt and pepper.

Brush salmon with some of oil mixture and let stand 5 minutes. Grill or broil for total of 8 to 10 minutes until fish is just cooked through, turning once and brushing 3 or 4 times with oil mixture.

Serve salmon drizzled with any remaining flavored oil and garnish with lemon slices and tarragon or parsley sprigs.

## Springtime at the Coyote Cafe

Mark Miller warms up easily to the subject of spring.

"It starts in late April in Santa Fe, the town is full of lilacs, the snow starts running, the Rio Grande is up and we can go trout fishing," Miller says wistfully. "The town has a real excitement, (a feeling of) real expectation. It's had its quiet time, and now it gears up for summer business."

That same excitement is carried over into the kitchen of Miller's nationally known Coyote Cafe restaurant.

"There are so many wonderful spring foods," Miller said.

"Spring silver salmon is real good. It migrates south and feeds on shrimp beds (in the winter), then goes north, so it's nice and fat and flavorful and oily from the winter season."

When Miller owned the Fourth Street Grill in Berkeley, Calif., he staged an annual spring salmon festival.

"We had salmon carpaccio, salmon tartare, salmon ravioli and enchiladas of smoked salmon with chipotle cream sauce."

Today, the popular chef concentrates on the flavors of the Southwest.

"Right now, my growers are starting to get me special greens, baby lettuces, baby mustard greens, even wild watercress from streams," he said.

"This is also the season the cactus is blooming in the southern part of the state. We get honey from the yucca cactus, and cactus grills really well. It goes well with corn, tomatoes and cilantro," he said, citing a familiar Southwestern trio of flavors. "And I use it in soups, juicified in salad and raw in salsas."

Miller uses red chili honey to glaze the spring silver salmon he serves during the spring season. Made from New Mexico red chili powder, roasted garlic and wild honey from Taos, N.M., the glaze complements the fish's natural flavors.

"I like the combination of chilies with fish as long as the chili is a flavor element and not a heat element," Miller said. "It (the chili) perks the dish up and doesn't take away from the subtlety of the fish."

An anthropology student before he took to the kitchen, Miller has submerged himself in the culture and traditions of New Mexico, where he took up residence five years ago.

"When the cafe opened, there was some resistance from the local people," he said. "They said our food was modern, not traditional, but we are traditional. Their definition of tradition is just a little more narrow than my definition."

"Some say, 'But my grandmother didn't make it that way,' but that doesn't mean your grandmother did it the right way," he continued, waving his hands for emphasis and tugging at his short, reddish beard in mock exasperation.

"I'm interested in re-creating some of the more traditional dishes done in the home, but maybe not seen for the last 200 years," he said. "Corn's been used for 5,500 years, chilies have been around 6,000 years. That's what I'm talking about when I talk about traditional: not what your grandmother ate."

These recipes, taken from "Coyote Cafe" (Ten Speed Press, \$24.95), bring out the best in both farmed salmon and the wild salmon that will be increasingly available throughout spring and summer.

### SALMON FILLET AND BLACK BEAN SALSA

4 salmon fillets, 8 ounces each

Sea salt to taste

8 tablespoons red chili honey (see note)

Black Bean Salsa (recipe follows)

Yields 4 servings.

Preheat oven to 450 F. Lightly salt both sides of each fillet.

In large saute pan or oven pan placed in oven, sear fillets for 2 minutes on one side. Before turning over, brush each fillet with 1 tablespoon honey on uppermost side. Then cook other side for 5 minutes, and brush tops with another tablespoon of honey.

Place a serving of Black Bean Salsa on each plate, top with salmon, and serve immediately.

Note: Red chili honey is a specialty product from Taos, N.M. You can make your own by blending ½ cup of wildflower honey with a large pinch of red chili powder and ¼ teaspoon crushed garlic.

### BLACK BEAN SALSA

3 cups cooked black beans

4 tablespoons minced canned jalapenos

1 medium sweet red pepper, roasted, peeled and diced

1 medium sweet yellow pepper, roasted, peeled and diced

4 tablespoons sauteed minced wild boar bacon with its fat (or Amador, Smithfield or Harrington's corn-cob-smoked bacon, or any other bacon)

1 teaspoon orange zest

2 teaspoons gold tequila

2 teaspoons fresh lime juice

2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

2 cloves garlic, roasted, peeled and minced

2 tablespoons minced cilantro

1 tablespoon minced marjoram

Yields 3 cups.

Black beans should be cooked about 1½ hours. (The beans should be firm and just tender.) Put beans in bowl and fold in remaining salsa ingredients, being careful not to crush the beans. Serve hot or at room temperature.

### PAILLARD OF SALMON WITH SQUASH SALSA AND CHIPOTLE CREMA

4 salmon paillards (preferably Pacific salmon), about

7 ounces each, 4x6x½-inch thick

1 teaspoon fine sea salt

1 cup Squash Salsa (recipe follows)

2 cups Chipotle Crema (recipe follows)

2 tablespoons canned chipotle chilies in adobo sauce, pureed

Yields 4 servings.

In large non-stick saute pan, lightly salt salmon and cook until brown and crispy but still moist, about 2 to 3 minutes per side. Salmon should be rare to medium-rare inside.

Spread ½ cup Chipotle Crema on each plate, and place salmon in middle. Draw zigzag design in the crema with pureed chipotle. Put ¼ cup of squash salsa on top of each paillard of salmon. Serve immediately.

### CHIPOTLE CREMA

2 cups Mexican Crema (recipe follows)

1 clove garlic, roasted and peeled

2 tablespoons canned chipotle chilies in adobo sauce

Yields about 2 cups.

Puree crema with garlic and chipotle (for a milder sauce, use less chipotle). Leave at room temperature.

### MEXICAN CREMA

1 cup heavy cream (preferably unpasteurized)

1 tablespoon buttermilk (preferably raw)

Yields 1 cup.

Heat cream in saucepan to warm (approximately 70 F). Do not overheat. Remove from heat and pour into clean container. Add buttermilk, cover with cheesecloth, and place overnight in warm location (75 F) to set. The consistency of crema the following day should be of a loose sour cream. If any mold has developed, toss mixture out and start again.

Once set, crema should be stored in refrigerator in clean, covered container (it will keep for at least 1 week).

### SQUASH SALSA

1 small zucchini

1 small yellow summer squash

1 small carrot

2 tomatillos

1 medium tomato

1 clove garlic

3 serrano chilies

½ small red onion

1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh marjoram

4 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil

1 tablespoon unseasoned rice vinegar

Sugar to taste

Salt to taste

Yields 2 cups.

Trim ends of squashes, peel carrot, and husk and rinse tomatillos. Finely dice (¾ inch or less) squashes, carrot, tomatillo, tomato, garlic and serranos. Dice onion equally finely, put in strainer, rinse with hot water, and drain.

Then combine all ingredients. Add more serranos or 2 diced canned chipotle chilies for an extra hot salsa. Let sit for at least 1 hour at room temperature before serving.

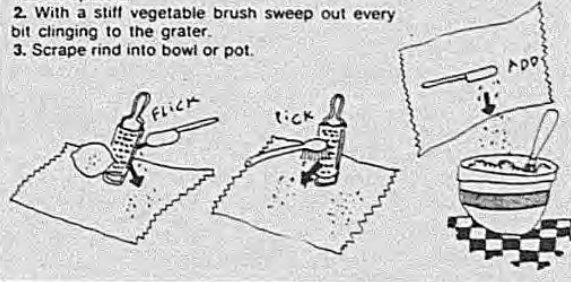
## KITCHEN HINTS

### Simple way to retrieve grated citrus rind

The sharp cutting teeth of graters trap rind. Do not grate the bitter white pith underneath.

Here's how to do it:

- Working over wax paper, scrape rind from the inside with a narrow rubber spatula.
- With a stiff vegetable brush sweep out every bit clinging to the grater.
- Scrape rind into bowl or pot.

## Vegetarian quiches

In these days of low-fat and cholesterol-conscious menus, quiche is not likely to ever make a big comeback. And rightly so, since the egg-rich and creamy quiche of yesteryear probably should be thought of in the category of a special treat. But the basic approach of the quiche presents a pleasing option for vegetarians, especially when it is prepared in healthful versions that are full on flavor and low on fat.

There are numerous ways to cut down on the fat and calories while making a quiche, and many contemporary cookbooks use one or more techniques for doing so.

One approach is to prepare the quiche without a crust, thus eliminating the fat required to bind the crust together.

Using a minimum of the egg-milk custard and a maximum of vegetable filling also cuts down on both the calories and the fat in a quiche.

Here are some tasty recipes that use a variety of these health-conscious approaches.

### SPRINGTIME QUICHE

- 12 cups trimmed fresh spinach leaves
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- ¾ cup chopped peeled shallots
- 3 plum tomatoes
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- ¾ cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- ¼ cup chopped fresh dill
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon zest
- ½ teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon dried bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Yields 1 (8-inch) square quiche. Rinse spinach well and place in large saucepan with just water that clings to leaves. Place saucepan over low heat and stir to wilt spinach, 3 to 4 minutes. Drain well, squeezing out excess moisture. Chop coarsely and set aside.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Melt butter in small skillet and saute shallots over medium-low heat until translucent, about 5 minutes. Set aside. Halve tomatoes and squeeze them, releasing and discarding seeds and juice. Coarsely chop and set aside.

In medium-size bowl, whisk together milk, eggs, Jack cheese, dill, lemon zest, salt and pepper. Stir in reserved spinach, tomatoes and shallots. Thoroughly butter an 8-inch square baking pan. Add filling and sprinkle with bread crumbs and Parmesan. Bake until golden, about 25 minutes. Let quiche stand 10 minutes before slicing into squares and serving.

### Laurie Grad's ASPARAGUS FLAN WITH PASTA

- 1 cup small dried pasta shells
- 1 pound asparagus, stalks trimmed, cut on the bias into 1½-inch lengths (2 cups)
- 3 eggs
- ½ cup non-fat milk
- ½ cup low-fat milk
- ½ cup part-skim ricotta cheese
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 scallion, finely minced
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- Salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste

Yields 6 servings. Preheat oven to 375 F. Spray an 8-inch square oven-proof dish with vegetable cooking spray. Drop pasta into pot of boiling water and cook until just tender. Drain, run under cold water

and drain again. Drop asparagus into pot of boiling water. Allow water to return to full boil, drain, run under cold water and drain again.

In food processor or blender, combine remaining ingredients and puree for just a few seconds until smooth. Place drained pasta and asparagus in prepared dish and stir to distribute evenly. Pour remaining ingredients over and bake 40 minutes, or until lightly golden and knife inserted in center comes out clean.

Let sit for 10 minutes before cutting into squares. Carefully lift with spatula, and serve hot.

## Scaring children is dangerous foolishness

**Q.** My brother-in-law is an idiot. That's a fact. There is no other way to account for the way he acts with our children.

He thinks it is the height of hilarity when he scares our two young ones, grabbing them suddenly, coming from behind and scaring them, making his voice sound eerie, laughing like a wild thing, and a lot more. Recently both of our youngsters have had nightmares that seem to relate to what he does to them.

He has been married three times (now he isn't). Each wife said he was abusive, and I have a feeling he used ridiculous scare antics on them, too.

Something has to be done about all this before my children and I lose our minds. My husband keeps saying, "It's all in fun." I don't see anything funny in this at all.

**What do you think I should do — try to ignore his stupid behavior and avoid a confrontation, or take some action? If I do, what do you suggest?**

**A.** I'm surprised you have put up with such dangerous foolishness. It's past time for you to continue being patient. There is a desperate need to put a stop to it, firmly.

The next time he pulls something like he has in the past, tell him to stop it:

- "It's no joke."
- "Cease and desist."
- "Grow up."
- "Play' with someone your own size."

"You're not welcome here if you do any of this even one more time."

You might discuss these approaches and others you think of with your husband. This is too serious for him to be reluctant or fearful about getting involved.

Please act quickly, with or without his assistance. I'm as concerned about this situation as you are.

**Q.** As a teacher I am always interested in new developments that help enrich the lives of my students. As I'm sure you recognize, it is so hard to keep up, even though I read a lot of educational journals and other materials. Still, some good things can easily slip by.

Are there any new items that have come to your attention which I may not have heard of? If so, will you please share them?

**A.** Here is one that can be of interest to conscientious teachers like you, your children, and also their parents. Its major emphasis is on how parents (and of course, teachers too) can use public television to help children, both at home and in school. It is a link between television and academic subjects.

Because you didn't mention the ages of the children with whom you work, I'll include several program possibilities at different grade levels: "Lonzo Ago & Far Away" and "WonderWorks" (grades one through nine, reading and literature); "Square One TV" (elementary mathematics problem-solving); "Degrassi High" and "Eyes on the Prize II" (to complement junior and senior high school social studies).

I hope you have a nearby public television station. The people there can probably share information with you about date and time schedules for such offerings.

**Q.** Our son has a learning disability that causes him to have difficulty with reading, spelling and other language skills. Fortunately he has had excellent teachers who are sensitive to his needs. He is now 9 years old.

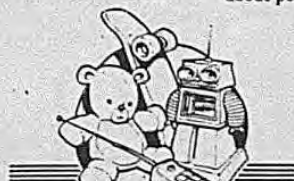
One thing they have difficulty with is that when he gets frustrated (which probably happens more often than it does with normal children) he loses his temper, occasionally to the point almost of hysteria.

I've heard and read about Ritalin as a medication to control such acting out behavior.

**What do you think about that?**

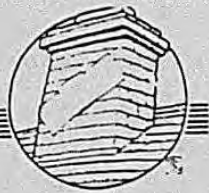
**A.** Because I'm not a physician, answering your question wouldn't be appropriate for me.

I do know that many physicians recommend its use, but you really ought to check with your own doctor. He or she may know your son and the family well enough to offer a personalized opinion. In your discussion with that individual you might also consider asking about possible side effects.

# Here's How

**Q.** I recently paved my yard with common red brick. The employees of the contractor poured a wet cement mix and sponged the grout between the bricks, apparently not rinsing the sponge enough to leave the brick clean.

When the brick dried, the natural red color of the brick became a dull grayish color. Can anything be done to restore the natural color of the bricks? — M.C.

**A.** To remove the dried residue of mortar, first try cleaning the brick by scrubbing with a solution of ½ cup trisodium phosphate and ½ cup household detergent dissolved in 1 gallon of clean water.

Scrub with a stiff fiber brush (do not use wire). Thoroughly wash off all cleaning solution, dirt and mortar crumbs, using clean pressurized water.

If the condition still persists, use a solution of muriatic acid recommended for removing hardened mortar. Mix 1 part acid to 10 parts clean water.

Use extreme caution when dealing with acid mixtures. Mix in a non-metallic container and pour the acid into the water, never water into acid. Be careful to

avoid splashing. Wear old clothes, rubber gloves and goggles.

Presoak the area, flushing off all loose mortar and dirt. Soak with plenty of water before applying the acid, so the acid and dissolved mortar will not be drawn into the face of the brick.

Apply the acid solution with a rag mop so it can soak into the brick. Allow it to act for a few minutes, then flush off with plenty of clear water. Scrape off any globs of hardened cement with a putty knife or screw driver.

You may want to test the acid mixture in a small inconspicuous area first, since minerals found in brick vary from area to area, and some cleaners can react with them in unexpected ways.

For example, an acid used on bricks with high copper content could turn them green. Acid solutions should never be used on light-colored brick. After cleaning, neutralize the acid with ammonia, followed by ample rinsing again.

After the brick is thoroughly clean and dry, apply a masonry sealer for protection. These are available in either clear or colored solutions that can enhance

the red color of your brick.

**Q.** How can I remove dried paint that was splattered on our patio when the house was painted?

**A.** To remove splattered paint, the most important step is to act fast. For oil-base spots and stains try a rag dipped in mineral spirits, then rinse the area.

Latex paint is water soluble up to 24 hours. Soak a rag in water and scrub the spot.

If the paint has dried for more than a day, try a commercial enzyme cleaner such as De-Solv-It, Oops or Goof-Off (available at larger housewares or hardware stores.)

If your patio is concrete you might try a regular paint stripper-remover. Test in an inconspicuous place first.

**Q.** How do I remove some old adhesive vinyl strips that were put in the bottom of our fiberglass shower some years ago?

**A.** Carefully remove as much of the material as you can with a razor. Use extreme caution not to cut too deeply into the fiberglass surface.

There are a number of products that you can use to dissolve the remaining adhesive residue. The one that works successfully will

depend on the chemical makeup of the adhesive.

Try spraying either Spray 'n Wash or Endust on the adhesive residue (this can also be tested prior to any removal of the strips, as sometimes the adhesive underneath will soften and strips can be lifted off without scrubbing).

Let set until the adhesive is softened, then scrape with a plastic knife or spatula (one that won't mar the fiberglass finish).

Another method is to dampen paper towels with isopropyl alcohol. Lay over adhesive and cover with a plastic film to prevent drying. After the adhesive is softened, pick it up with strips of masking tape.

A 50-50 mixture of xylene and isopropyl alcohol finishes the cleanup (alcohol mixed with solvent reduces smearing often created when using a solvent alone).

Another product that can be used successfully is photographic film cleaner, available in most camera stores. This works fast because it evaporates quickly and should be used only when plenty of ventilation is provided.

### Creative gift giving to grandchildren

Give your grandchildren something to grow on, something you can enjoy with them. The recommendation is made by Shari Lewis, famed ventriloquist, puppeteer, singer, dancer, author and symphony conductor.

"Parents are concerned about what children eat for their health, but often neglect what goes into their young minds. General television programming is not going to challenge them — in fact, most of it is mindless," Lewis said in an interview.

She had just completed an on-camera interview on a morning TV program, where her statements were similarly candid.

"Children today should learn about their own culture and history and about their own and other religions. I think grandparents may provide that kind of experience and learning for the children, and enjoy the participation themselves."

Lewis learned skills, lore and to stretch her imagination while growing up in a theatrical family. Her father was the official magician for New York City, her mother a music coordinator for the board of education.

By age 11 she could perform magic, puppetry, sing and dance. Her father did not make her an assistant in his act, but instead encouraged her own act and direction in entertainment. She learned and added ventriloquism to her skills to a level where she would be recognized as one of the world's best in the art.

A one-time role on the "Captain Kangaroo" CBS-TV program when she was a teen-ager brought Lewis immediate, positive response from viewers and launched her major media career. For 30 years she has entertained, drawing audiences into the imagination and creativity of her stories and songs.

"Children need to hear language that is better than they hear on TV or the street. They need to know more about their world so they can discover more about themselves. They need to engage in conversation where they can stretch their imaginations and powers of observation.

"The process," says Lewis, "may be as simple as a five-minute relationship at a time — a one- or two-minute story, with discussion about the story with a parent or grandparent."

The process can be accomplished by telephone as well as in person, she adds.

Shari Lewis advises grandparents to give books and quality video programs, not because she has written some 46 books and had produced a dozen videos, but because "you are assured of the quality of this 'good food' for the mind. Then as the grandparent you may share the stories with the

children. Read to them, talk to them about their own observations."

#### SHARI LEWIS BOOKS

Doubleday has published a series of "one-minute," 48-page books by Lewis, with separate volumes on Jewish stories, Bible stories, Greek myths, Easter stories, Christmas stories and fairy tales.

The most recent title is "Shari Lewis' One Minute Stories of Great Americans." The four-color books range in retail price from \$5.95 to \$9.95, and should be available through bookstores.

#### SHARI LEWIS VIDEO

Here are "101 Things for a Child to Do" on video — tricks, games, silly sayings and crafts — presented by Lewis. Each is presented in a numbered segment so that the tape can be rewound and played accurately.

Consider buying the videotape for yourself, too, as half of the elements will teach you things that you, in turn, can teach the children. This video should be available through video and bookstores.

#### LEARNING LANGUAGES

Give your grandchildren a fun introduction to foreign languages. Even preschoolers should enjoy the "Teach Me" tapes developed by Judy Mahoney of Edina, Minn.

Using audiotape cassettes and 20-page coloring books, this series presents nursery rhymes, simple folk songs and dialogue at beginner and intermediate levels in French, Spanish, German and Japanese. English translations are included for all of the lyrics and dialogue.

For grandparents, the "Teach Me" programs may provide a quality experience for grandchildren, whether they are working with the tapes in person or sending them to the youngsters 1,000 miles away. The tape/book programs range in price from \$12.95 to \$13.95.

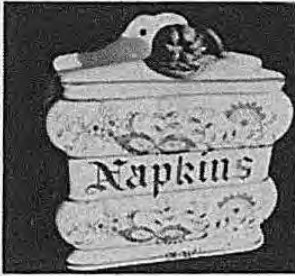

## Napkin holder is 'fake' Meissen

**Q:** Enclosed is a picture of my napkin holder. It is marked on the bottom with crossed arrows and "Blue Onion."

I have been told that it is quite valuable. Can you provide any information for me?



**A:** The "crossed arrow" mark was used by the Kalk Porcelain Factory in Eisenberg, Germany.

The original "Blue Onion" pattern was introduced by the State's Porcelain Factory at Meissen in the 18th century.

Your holder is a "fake" Meissen made in the early 20th century and would sell for about \$35 to \$45.

**Q:** The attached mark is on the bottom of a porcelain vase. It is 10 inches tall and has an oval base with a long neck and two handles. There is a picture of a lady with peacock in a dark panel with gold trim.

Can you tell me anything about the origin and value of my vase?



**A:** This mark indicates that your vase was made by Zeh, Scherzer & Co. in Rehau, Germany, around the turn of the century. It would probably sell for about \$225 to \$235 in an antique shop.

**Q:** Can you tell me anything about a beer stein in the shape of a man's head? He has a mustache and is wearing a helmet with an eagle on top. It is titled "Kaiser Wilhelm II" and is marked "Musterschutz."

**A:** This stein depicts Wilhelm II, ruler of the German empire until World War I. "Musterschutz"

means that this design was patented or copyrighted.

Since steins like this, made about 1900, have sold for over \$2,000, you should have it examined by a local expert.

**Q:** I have a blue-and-white, 6-inch-diameter plaque depicting a stork with two cherubs. I thought this was made in England by Wedgwood, but I find that it is marked "Germany" on the back.

Can you explain this and estimate its value?

**A:** Blue-and-white Jasperware was made by Wedgwood and other companies in England and Europe.

Your plaque was made by an unknown company in Germany during the early 1900s. It would probably be worth about \$35 to \$45.

**Q:** Can you provide some information about my hand-painted porcelain bowl? It is 7 inches in diameter and has three handles. It is decorated with red roses with green leaves and gold trim.

The mark on the bottom is "R.S." and a star in a wreath with "Germany" underneath.

**A:** The mark you describe was used by the Schlegelmilch Porcelain Factory in Suhl, Germany, during the early 1900s. It would probably sell for \$65 to \$75.

**Q:** Can you identify and evaluate a porcelain figurine of a nude girl standing beside a pedestal? She is holding her clothes in one hand. Imprinted on the bottom is "Zsolnay, Pecs." The overall height is about a foot.

**A:** Your figurine was made by a company founded by Vilmos Zsolnay in Pecs, Hungary, in 1862. It was made about 1890 and would probably sell for about \$300 to \$350.

### Wedding party photos are cherished

Weddings are remembered with photos, so take plenty of them.

#### Tips for taking wedding pictures:

Let the professional photographer take the formal wedding picture poses. Stay out of the professional's way.

# Points on Pets

## Environment not usually the source of feline leukemia

**Q:** Our cat did not even appear to be ill until she died recently of feline leukemia. Where did our cat get this disease?

**A:** Can humans get leukemia from cats? Would it be safe for us to get another cat?

Leukemia in cats is caused by a virus called the feline leukemia virus (FeLV). Approximately 50 percent of all free-roaming cats in urban and suburban populations are infected sometime during their lives. In rural cat populations and in closely confined single-cat households, the infection rate has been reported to be less than 5 percent to 6 percent.

Susceptible cats become infected with FeLV by contacting saliva, urine or feces from infected cats. The leukemia virus is commonly spread between cats that groom or bite each other, share litter pans or use common food and water dishes. The virus can also be transmitted from infected queens to their litters prior to birth.

The feline leukemia virus is unstable outside of the cat's body. Therefore, a contaminated environment is usually not the source of the virus.

Many cats carrying the leukemia virus do not show any external signs of illness. Others experience weight loss, listlessness and anemia. Cats with FeLV are more susceptible to other diseases and stresses. Minor surgery or environmental changes may cause a FeLV-infected cat to become sick.

Your veterinarian can conduct a laboratory test on a blood sample to determine if your cat is infected with FeLV. If your cat tests positive for the virus, your veterinarian can make recommendations regarding how you should handle your cat.

There has never been any evidence that any human has gotten leukemia from a cat. However, children should be taught at an early age how to play with dogs and cats and to wash their hands following play with their pets.

## YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

### Widows are usually eligible for SS payments

**Q:** My mother is 57 years old and recently widowed. She was married to my stepfather for 9½ years before his death.

**A:** Will she be able to collect anything as his widow even though the marriage didn't last 10 years? — Y.M.

**A:** Your mother will be able to collect widow's benefits as early as age 60, assuming your stepfather had enough work under Social Security.

The 10-year marriage duration requirement applies to divorced spouses.

**Q:** I receive Supplemental Security Income. Is it necessary to report that my name is on a bank account even if the money actually belongs to the other person? — D.S.

**A:** If your name is on any bank accounts with another person or other people, you must inform the Social Security Administration about the account, even if you do not consider that the money belongs to you.

You must tell us about such an account even if you do not use the money or the account.

**Q:** I receive Social Security disability benefits.

**A:** My former employer told me that I can work part time on a trial basis. How much can I earn? — E.B.

**A:** If you are still disabled and meet all other requirements, generally you can have a trial work period.

Benefits can continue for up to nine months while you test your ability to work. The nine months need not be consecutive. Only months in which you earn over \$200 gross wages count as trial work months.
