Vamps Busy With Fire, School Bus

Hicksville Fire Fighters and Rescue Personnel have been kept busy during the last two weeks.

A house fire at 17 Hunter Street on May 7 was reported to Hicksville Firefighters at 8:37 p.m. Fifty-five firefighters and 9 units responded under Chief of Department Anthony Wigdzinski. Two firefighters were slightly injured and treated at the scene and released. Fire officials reported the 2nd floor had flames coming out of every window upon arrival. There was a three minute response to the scene from time of report. Cause of fire is under investigation by County fire officials. There were several occupants in the house that had to be asked to leave the dwelling, when fire units arrived on the scene. Damage was estimated at \$150,000 and the delayed reporting had an impact on the severe damage estimate.

In another house fire, this one a neighborhood eyesore for many years, a house at 14 Memory Lane was destroyed by fire on May 13. The Hicksville Fire Dispatcher received multiple calls on this fire at 11:22 p.m. and a general alarm

brought out 70 firefighters, 9 units under Hicksville Fire-Rescue Services Chief Anthony Wigdzinski. The lone occupant who has lived there for many years with no electric, sewer or water service, was in the hospital for undisclosed reasons when the fire broke out. Fire officials are investigating the cause and Chief Wigdzinski has requested the Town of Oyster Bay to take appropriate actions with the unsafe structure. At 7:51 a.m. the next day Firefighters were back when the flames flared up again. The house was infested and packed with refuse and drums of sewer waste. Firefighters had to be decontaminated along with their equipment after the fire was extinguished.

Another structure fire, this one a one room and contents fire occurred on May 16 at 115 Broadway, second floor rear. The alarm was reported to Hicksville Firefighters at 5:10 p.m. and brought out 75 members, 11 units for a general alarm under Asst. Chief Patrick Scanlon. The fire was confined to room and origin with some water damage below in a delictessen.

Memorial Day Parade, Services On Monday

For 68 years, the community of Hicksville, lead by its veteran organizations, have come together on Memorial Day to honor men and women who lost their lives in the service of our country. This year's parade and services, sponsored by the Hicksville War Veterans Committee and hosted by the American Legion Charles Wagner Post #421, will take place Monday, May 27. Post Past Commander John Rizos is Chairman of the event.

Marching units will assemble at 8 a.m. in the Sears Parking Lot; kickoff time is 9 a.m. sharp. The parade will proceed south on Broadway, pausing briefly at the John F. Kennedy Memorial, in the park area just north of the Memorial Fountain, for the placing of a wreath. The Kennedy Memorial was erected in 1965 to honor Hicksville's war dead and bears the names of 28 servicemen.

The parade will continue south on Broadway, turn west onto Old Country Road, south onto Jerusalem Avenue and past the reviewing stand between 3rd and 4th streets. Formal services will take place at the War Memorial Site on the Middle School grounds immediately following the parade's end.

Units and their auxiliaries represented will be the William Gouse Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #3211, Gier-Levitt Post #655 of the Jewish War Veterans, the Masonic War Veterans, the Nassau Chapter Vietnam Veterans of America and the Disabled American Veterans. The Parade Grand Marshal is Al Wengenheim of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Honorary Grand Marshal is Leroy Whitelaw, a Jewish War Veteran of World War I.

Participants will include the Hicksville Schools bands - Senior High Marching Band, Middle School band and the all-district elementary band - scouts, sports teams, twirlers and women's clubs among others. There will be four divisions in all.

Three Gold Star Mothers will take part in this year's parade and services. They are Mrs. Libertad Kozma, whose son Lt. Carl N. Kozma, U. S. Army, lost his life in Vietnam; Mrs. James Stolz, whose son Lt. James E. Stolz, U. S. Marine Corp., was also lost in Vietnam; and Mrs. John Waters, whose son Lt. Col. Joseph Waters, U. S. Air Force, lost his life while serving as a test pilot of supersonic aircraft in California.

The program will include two student speakers from Hicksville High School, Christopher Munson and Cynthia Taylor. The principal speaker will be James Carroll, Past Grand Knight of the Joseph Barry Council Knights of Columbus and a retired disabled New York City fireman. Also expected to be seated at the reviewing stand will be Nassau County Executive Thomas Gulotta, Oyster Bay Town Councilman Tom Clark, State Assemblyman Fred Perola and Hicksville Schools Superintendent Catherine Fenton. Operation Desert Storm veterans have been invited, but it is uncertain if those men and women will be able to attend since they are still on active duty.

Richard Evers, Americanism officer for the Charles Wagner Post will read the 1868 general orders of Major General John Logan, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, naming Memorial Day as a special day for honoring the graves of soldiers. Wreaths will be placed at each of the memorials - World War I, World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. The invocation will be delivered by Rev. Richard Smeltzer of the Hicksville United Methodist Church, and benediction will be offered by Rabbi Edward Goldstein of the Hicksville Jewish Center. Musical selections will be played by the combined Hicksville Middle and Senior High School bands.

New Survivors With Health Care

With the sophistication of and the advancements in medical care, an increasing number of children on Long Island are surviving with complex health care needs. Where can these families with technology-dependent, chronically ill, medically fragile, isolated children go for help?

On May 9, a conference on The New Survivors was held at Variety Pre-Schooler's Workshop in Syosset, presented by the Regional Planning Group of Nassau County (RPG). It provided answers for a capacity group of 20 parents and professionals. Participants saw a docudrama in which parents gave a moving presentation about their experiences with a baby who needs constant medical care and supervision and the frustrations and struggles they face getting help. A distinguished panel of professionals addressed the issues raised by the parents' presentation.

Recycling Lesson Given Students

Nancy Strub, Community Information Aide for the town of Oyster Bay, visited the Old Country Road School in April to speak to each grade level about recycling. Students were taught a valuable lesson about the environment and each class was awarded a certificate of environmental achievement.

The children learned that recycling means using something over again. Glass jars and bottles, aluminum and metal cans, news papers and plastics are some of the things that can be recycled after we've used them. When we recycle, we have less trash to dispose of and we don't need to take as many natural resources from the earth and the forests.

Ms. Strub discussed the Town's own recycling program called S.O.R.T. (Separate Oyster Bay's Recyclables Today). By separating recyclables from regular garbage, they can be collected by special S.O.R.T. trucks and made into new products. Ms. Strub

showed the classes samples of recyclable materials including plastic which the Town can convert into "plastic lumber" used, for example, to build park benches.

Discussion also revolved around recycling leaves and other naturally grown products (such as cut grass) which can be used in a compost to make mulch, a natural fertilizer.

Through the aid of this program, the students have learned that the earth's natural resources - the land, water, air, minerals and plant life - are precious gifts and it is our responsibility to take good care of them.

Each student was "appointed" as a Recycling Ranger, Special Assistant to Town Supervisor Angelo A. Delligatti by taking the Recycling Ranger Pledge. In the pledge, the students promise to recycle and to tell family and friends why recycling is a good thing to do and to help them to learn how to recycle.
